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Understanding Home Mortgages

There are many, many different types of mortgages. The two most common types of mortgages are fixed rate and adjustable rate (ARM).

Fixed Rate Mortgage

With a fixed rate mortgage your interest rate is set prior to closing on your home and does not change for the entire term of the loan.

Pros of Fixed Rate Mortgages:

• You know what your monthly payment amount will be and it will not change.

 No worries about interest rate hikes that will raise your amounts.

Cons of Fixed Rate Mortgages:

• Initial interest rate is higher than an adjustable rate mortgage.

• If interest rates decline, it will not lower your payments.

• If the interest rates decline significantly, you can refinance your mortgage to take advantage of the lower interest rate.

Refinance charges will be incurred, so the interest rate drop must be able to justify these costs.

Remember that a mortgage is an expense that will be with you for a long time.

Therefore, it's prudent to see which one will give you the best deal. Remember that a few dollars a month will really add up over 15 or 30 years.

Adjustable Rate Mortgage (ARM)

With an adjustable rate mortgage the interest rate will vary throughout the term of the loan. How often the rate changes depends upon the adjustment period of the loan.

Pros of Adjustable Rate Mortgages:

• Adjustable rate mortgages are initially priced at lower mortgage rates than fixed interest rate mortgages, resulting in a lower initial payment.

• Adjustable rate mortgages generally have a rate increase cap (a cap is a maximum) per year and lifetime cap on the interest rate. It may be better to use an ARM when rates are up high, and they are less advantageous when rates are low.

• If you plan to be in a house for only 3-5 years, an ARM allows you to pay lower monthly payments for those 3-5 years than a fixed rate mortgage.

• If interest rates drop, an ARM provides a way to participate in these lower rates without having to refinance your house. This can save you closing costs.

• The adjustable period is key to the loan. How often they adjust the payment is important because you want the longest adjustable period. Most decent ARMs have an adjustment period of one year, so your monthly payments remain the same for a year, then increase or decrease the next year.

Cons of Adjustable Rate Mortgages:

increase the amount of your payments.

• If you have a cap over 2%,

• Interest rate hikes will


your monthly payments can go up significantly.

• Catch up clauses can come out of nowhere. If the cap was 3% and the rate rose 5%, the loan provider can invoke a "catch up" clause the following year, which will significantly increase your monthly payments.

• Avoid adjustable rate mortgages with negative amortization!

• Be very wary of the word "discount" when looking at ARMs as this means the loan will most likely have a shorter adjustment period which will lead to higher costs in the long run.

Just like fixed rate mortgages you should shop around for the best deal if you are interested in an adjustable rate mortgage.When you compare quotes make sure to pay close attention to the caps and other details that are unique to adjustable rate mortgages. ###

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


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Police Chief Warns of Scams

Chief Michael Colaneri reminds residents that as spring approaches, residents should be aware of warm weather scams.

Questionable people usually prey upon senior citizens and people living alone because they would rather deal with a lone decision maker.

With no one to confer with, it makes it easier for them to weave their web of deception.

The Chief said, "They prey on senior citizens because they have the time, they're home, and they're mellow in their older age. They try to see the good in everybody."

People should be suspicious of unsolicited work offers. "The day of door-to-door salesmen is over," the Chief said

"If you've got somebody going door to door for house repairs, the chance is good that it's some kind of scam."

They say they are doing the house down the street and offer a discount.

Sometimes they will try to

Hasbrouck Heights Police scare their prospects by bringing up dangerous situations that must be corrected immediately, but most often, nothing is wrong or minor repairs would be needed.

> One of the more common scams is to knock on the door and tell the homeowner that they do roofing, and when passing by they noticed that the roof is badly damaged.

> They explain how the home is being damaged even before leaks become visible.

> They use high pressure, aggressive tactics and convince the homeowner that the roof needs immediate attention.

> They ask for cash and say they will need to get some supplies and be right back. That's the last you will see them or your money.

> Always remember to use common sense and think about it for a minute. How can these strangers show up and tell you about a serious problem that you are unaware of?

> In another variation of this scam, workers will begin a home repair job such as repaving a driveway, take the deposit, and never return to finish the work.

The bogus contractor will begin the job and tell the resident that the damage was worse than originally estimated, so he

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or she will have to pay more money.

The best way to avoid becoming a victim of a home repair scam is not to allow people to do repairs unsolicited.

On some occasions scammers have been known to work in tandem, gaining access into the home on the pretense of using the bathroom. While one of them has the attention of the homeowner, one of the other men or women will quickly search for cash and valuables to steal.

Never let any of these people in your home under any circumstances.

The Chief said, "Most people are inherently good. Most businesses are legitimate and provide good services at fair prices.

However, the consumer should be suspicious of any cold call or visit to your door without an appointment.

Anyone coming to your door should be able to identify themselves with proper I.D., company uniform or commercial vehicle (it is required to be *lettered with the name and base* town of the company).

Most importantly, do not be pressured by anyone. Follow your instincts; if you are uneasy, lock your door and call a neighbor or the police."

If senior citizens ever suspect a problem, the most important thing to do is call the police at 201-288-1000.

"If they feel that they have been scammed, there's a good chance that they're not the first one and we need to know about it," Chief Colaneri said. "The more reports we have, the better chance we have of catching them." ###

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HHPD Runs for Special Olympics

On June 1, 2007, the Hasbrouck Heights Police Department will join 2,700 officers in the 24th Annual Law Enforcement Torch Run to benefit Special Olympics New Jersey.

The Department will receive the Torch from the Lodi PD at about 9:30 a.m., run down Williams Avenue to Shop-Rite for a brief ceremony, then proceed back to the The Boulevard, and run from Williams to Lincoln Avenue (about 2.4 miles) where they transfer the Torch to the Wood-Ridge PD.

During the run along The Boulevard, children from Lincoln, Corpus Christi and Euclid Schools cheer and high-five our Department.

This celebrated 27-leg journey carries the Special Olympics New Jersey "Flame of Hope" a distance of nearly 900 miles throughout the Garden State to the College of New Jersey, Ewing, where it ignites the cauldron for the Opening Ceremonies.

This program helps provide 15.000 children and adults with intellectual disabilities the opportunity to train and compete, free-of-charge, in 22 Olympictype sports, year round.

Special Olympics New Jersey helps participants develop physical fitness, demonstrate courage, experience joy and participate in a sharing of gifts, skills and friendship with their families and other Special Olympics athletes.

Last year the HHPD ranked 4th in the state, raising \$26,000.

The Department's fund raising efforts began on January 12, 2007, when they held their annual beefsteak dinner at the VFW, raising \$11,000.



Firefighters Work Under Brutal Conditions

In the grip of winter's extreme temperature of 17 degrees, with NNW winds at 17 mph, gusting to 25-35 mph, and a wind chill of one degree, South Bergen Zone II Mutual Aid Fire Departments worked below the manufacturing floor in a 4' x 4,' 200-foot long tunnel that housed a conveyor belt used to move raw material fibers.

Firefighters with full turnout gear and special tools used confined space techniques to search the tunnel for the fire from both ends in two-man teams. The fire was contained to the tunnel and did not appear to affect the building.

East Rutherford is the F.A.S.T team for Hasbrouck Heights. Due to weather conditions, the 2nd alarm company standby was used to relieve them.Venting was accomplished by opening the tractor-trailer dock door bays and letting the high winds clear the smoke. ters for any other alarms that might occur while the Department was in Teterboro.

Meanwhile, Moonachie and Wood-Ridge engines, along with Little Ferry Ladder, checked a waterflow alarm Gentile and Mark Tomko, were on the scene.

Chicago-based Smurfit-Stone operates the Teterboro Corrugated Container Plant, which manufactures combined board sheets, then prints and

a 2-alarm call at 200 Hollister Road in Teterboro for a smoke condition at 10:30 p.m. on March 5, 2007.

Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department provides Teterboro with fire and ambulance services.

Engine 2 was first on the scene and dropped a 5" hose at the entrance and proceeded about mid-way down the build-ing's parking lot.

An area search was made to find working fire hydrants. Hydrant water was connected to the pumper.

Department members searched the 93,000 sq. ft. smoked-filled facility and determined that fire was hidden Water was applied from a 2" hose, but the fibers floated and the fire was elusive. The tunnel had a build-up of fibers.

Lodi Foam Unit 616 was called to the scene. This dense foam smothers fires, prevents air from reaching the flammable materials, and lowers the heat of combustion by cooling action.

Connecting to HHFD Engine 2, the specially trained Lodi Foam Unit team entered the building and filled the tunnel with foam. Speedy Dry was applied throughout the scene due to icy conditions.

One Heights firefighter was injured and taken to HUMC.

The fire was deemed to be extinguished at 1:00 a.m. When the scene was secured, the 3rd alarm companies were released from fire headquarters. As soon as all HH units were packed up, the 2nd alarm units were released from the scene.

A 3rd alarm company was on standby at HH fire headquar-

at 100 Hollister. It was determined to be caused by the hydrant being used for the 200 Hollister Road fire.

The Teterboro DPW was notified of icy conditions at the working hydrants and United Water was notified of inoperable hydrants at 1:45 a.m.

Engine 2 was taken out of service because the water hoses were frozen. The hoses were taken back to the firehouse where they were thawed and repacked onto the engine the next day.

Mutual Aid towns participating included: Wood-Ridge, Lodi, East Rutherford, Moonachie and Little Ferry.

Full Pink Moon

The April full moon will appear on Monday, April 2, 2007, at 17:16. It is called the "Full Pink Moon."

According to the Farmer's Almanac, this name came from the herb moss pink, or wild ground phlox, which is one of the earliest widespread flowers of the spring.

Other names include the Full Sprouting Grass Moon, the Egg Moon, and, among Coastal tribes, the Full Fish Moon, because this was the time that the shad swam upstream to spawn.

The Native American Indians of the northern and eastern United States kept track of the seasons by giving a name to each recurring full moon. European settlers followed the custom. ###



HHPD Gets "Livescan" Fingerprint System

The Hasbrouck Heights Police Department has acquired an automatic "Livescan" fingerprint system that is online all the time.

The main console is located in the Police Department. A portable kit allows the Department to go to schools to conduct the child safety ID program (see related story).

Both the console and mobile unit cost \$25,000. \$20,000 came from confiscated drug funds and \$5,000 was donated by an anonymous Hasbrouck Heights resident.

Inked Fingerprints

A known print is the intentional recording of the friction ridges, usually with black printer's ink rolled across a contrasting white background, typically a standard white fingerprint card.

With traditional ink fingerprinting, the Department had to create three fingerprint cards: Hasbrouck Heights Police Department, NJ State Police and FBI.

Inked cards sent to the NJ State Police and FBI could take 4-6 weeks for processing. If the fingerprints were unacceptable, the person had to be re-fingerprinted.

Electronic fingerprinting established standardized data elements for the booking transaction that facilitates the sharing of information between participating agencies and supports the FBI's goal to move to electronic fingerprint submissions.

Benefits

"Livescan systems allow the department to produce consistent high quality fingerprint images, thereby reducing rejection rates from the FBI, saving time and money in processing and in other related administrative costs," stated Police Chief Michael Colaneri.

The manual booking process often required the booking officer to take anywhere from 3 to 10 sets of fingerprints while the livescan fingerprint device only requires a single set of fingerprints that can print out any number of copies for record purposes.

Digital prints taken from a suspect can be processed and checked in a matter of hours instead of taking several days or weeks.

Federal Bureau of Investigation

The Integrated Automated Fingerprint Identification System, more commonly known as IAFIS, is a national fingerprint and criminal history system maintained by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), Criminal Justice Information Services (CJIS) Division.

The IAFIS provides automated fingerprint search capabilities, latent searching capability, electronic image storage, and electronic exchange of fingerprints and responses, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

The IAFIS maintains the largest biometric database in the world, containing the fingerprints and corresponding criminal history information for more than 50 million subjects in the Criminal Master File in Clarksburg, WV.

Old paper fingerprint cards for the civil files are still manually maintained in a warehouse facility (rented shopping center space) in Fairmont, WV. The fingerprints and corresponding criminal history information are submitted voluntarily by state, local, and federal law enforcement agencies.

tion Unit classifies, searches, and verifies all criminal and noncriminal fingerprint card submissions.

Positive identification of arrested individuals is returned within two hours while the suspect in still in custody.

The master fingerprint file contains over 2 million fingerprint cards of which over 1 million are criminal arrests.

Since May, 1990, latent identifications utilizing AFIS were made in over 7,800 previously unsolved crimes which included 228 homicides.

Approximately 40 percent of all criminal fingerprint card submissions are being electronically forwarded to the State Bureau of Investigation via livescan technology.

The Automated Fingerprint Identification Unit is currently upgrading to Fully Integrated Fingerprint Identification System (FIFIS), which provides for the electronic transmission of fingerprint cards 24 hours a day from the point of booking, using livescan devices, to the State Bureau of Identification (SBI), thereby providing rapid identification while the suspect is still in custody.

At the end of the identification process, the suspect's criminal history record is automatically built and the fingerprint card is then electronically transmitted to the FBI's Integrated Automated Fingerprint System (IAFIS).

About Fingerprints

On the palmar surface of the hands and feet are raised surfaces called friction ridges.

Friction ridges are formed during fetal development. Fingerprints are the result of minute ridges and valleys found on the hand of every person.

No two persons have exactly the same arrangement of ridge patterns, and the patterns remain unchanged throughout life. Even identical twins do not have the same fingerprints.

First systematic use of fingerprints in the U.S. was by the New York Civil Service Commission for testing. Dr. Henry P. DeForrest pioneered U.S. fingerprinting in 1902.

In 1903, the New York State Prison system began the first systematic use of fingerprints in the U.S. for criminals.

In 1905, the U.S. Army begins using fingerprints and the US Department of Justice forms the Bureau of Criminal Identification to provide a centralized reference collection of fingerprints.

In the early days of J. Edgar Hoover's directorship of the FBI, a long held goal of American law enforcement was achieved: the establishment of an Identification Division.

Tracking criminals by means of identification records has been considered a crucial tool of law enforcement since the 19th century, and matching fingerprints is considered the most accurate method.

By 1922, many large cities started their own fingerprint collections and by 1926, law enforcement agencies across the country began contributing fingerprint cards to the Bureau of Investigation.

By 1946, the FBI had processed 100 million fingerprint cards in manually maintained files; and by 1971, 200 million cards. ###

Project Kid Care ID

Since the 1970's, the Hasbrouck Heights Police Department has conducted the Project Kid Care ID Program for all Corpus Christi, Euclid and Lincoln School 2nd Graders beginning in April and ending in June.

Each Kid Care Photo ID Kit includes a standardized head-and-shoulders ID photo, fingerprints, child's vital statistics, valuable emergency information, and the rules of safety. The kit also includes two wallet IDs.

Digital Fingerprints

Friction ridges can also be recorded digitally using a technique called livescan.

Livescan refers to the process of capturing fingerprints directly into a digitized format as opposed to traditional ink and paper methods.

Fingers from a hand are first electronically scanned at 1,000 dpi, followed by a scan of each finger.

Each scan verifies the quality of the fingerprint image immediately, allowing for a rescan if necessary.

This reduces the chance of a police department prematurely releasing a dangerous criminal.

Livescan is integrated with the Hasbrouck Heights Police Department Records Bureau and about half of the police departments in Bergen County that have digital fingerprinting machines.

Livescan technology also integrates with multiple federal and state databases.

The electronic submission of fingerprints to the FBI reduces the identification response time from several weeks to less than two hours.

This process virtually eliminates the rejection of finger-

All US states and many large cities have their own Automated Fingerprint Identification System (AFIS) databases, each with a subset of fingerprint records that is not stored in any other database. Thus, law enforcement fingerprint interface standards are very important to enable sharing records and reciprocal searches for identifying criminals

NJ State Police

The NJ State Police Autoprints by the FBI because of mated Fingerprint IdentificaFingerprints offer an infallible means of personal identification.

There are three basic fingerprint patterns: arch, loop and whorl and many sub-classifications.

In Mark Twain's 1883 book, "Life on the Mississippi," a murderer was identified by the use of fingerprint identification.

Juan Vucetich made the first criminal fingerprint identification in 1892. He was able to identify Francis Rojas, a woman who murdered her two sons and cut her own throat in an attempt to place blame on another. Her bloody print was left on a door post, proving her identity as the murderer.

These photo IDs are used for missing children.

Det. Sgt. Joseph Rinke emphasized, "Kits are kept by the family. The digital photo and fingerprints are purged after the session and are not saved on the system. If the ID is lost, the process must be repeated."

Captain John DeLorenzo said, "This digital system is cleaner than the inked fingerprints. Sometimes fingerprinting a fidgeting youngster was difficult. With this new digital ID program, the quality of each fingerprint is validated immediately." ###

Boulevard in Bloom 2007

The Hasbrouck Heights Chamber of Commerce, in cooperation with the HH Garden Club, invites businesses and residents to sponsor a flower pot with planting to be placed along The Boulevard during 2007.

To launch this Boulevard beautification program, Gateway Realtors, Otterstedt Insurance Agency and Heights Flower Shoppe seeded this program by generously purchasing 36 flower pots in 2006. Additional flower pots were contributed by residents, with a total of 40 planters installed in 2006. This translated to about 3 planters per block, or 75% of The Boulevard.

The Garden Club says, "Let's Keep It Grrrowing!, by expanding this successful program in 2007 to include the remaining portions of The Boulevard."

They continued, "Here is an opportunity for you to have a direct and immediate impact in beautifying Hasbrouck Heights. This program adds visual interest and aesthetics to The Boulevard streetscape, while acting as a catalyst for further improvement."

They remind everyone that every penny that is donated

goes directly towards the purchase of flowers, plants, pots and materials.

The goal for 2007 is \$6,000, with about \$1,500 to replenish the 40 existing planters. The balance would expand the program along the Boulevard.

The basic planting work will be done by the Garden Club at the DPW on May 19, 2007.

Once the plantings have been completed, the DPW will then move the flower pots to their Boulevard location. They have agreed to water the plants along the Boulevard during the season. Merchants who have planters outside their door are encouraged to assist in watering, especially during the summer months.

After the summer, the DPW collects the flower pots and stores them for the winter.

Throughout the program, members of the Garden Club maintain the planters.

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Old Man Winter Has Made Up For Lost Time!

Another snow and sleet event pelted Hasbrouck Heights and the Teterboro area on March 16 into March 17 (*see picture of local DPW working hard as usual in these storms*). I measured 5 inches of snow here in town but it was not JUST snow.

It was our second "tough" winter storm with quite a bit of sleet mixed in (we had other storms of purely snow besides these mentioned here). In fact, similar to the previous sleet storm, THIS storm had many hours of steady and sometimes heavy sleet falling.

The temperature started out at 39 degrees in Hasbrouck Heights shortly after midnight on the early morning of March 16. Rain had fallen intermittently from March 15 to March 16. Then, wet snow began to mix in by 1 a.m. to 3 a.m. early March 16 as the temperatures dropped on a stiff northerly wind.

By 3 a.m. to 6 a.m., snow was falling throughout the region with temperatures now below freezing! Icy paved surfaces quickly developed.

Periods of snow and sleet then continued well into the day on into the night-time hours.

Now, this 5" snow event has increased our winter total to nearly 20 inches. Our normal winter total in these parts is approximately 27 inches... so, we are getting there.

Something we thought we would NEVER do during the "oh so mild" months of December and January!

Getting back to snow events, March, and even April, are months not uncommon to snow storms. In the "Blizzard of 1888," we had 31" of snow here.

Some of the more recent March snow events were 18" in 1967, 19" in 1960 and 16" in 1958. Will it snow in April you ask me?

Yes, I think it will. However, it's impossible at this juncture to say if we will get anything to write home about. The odds are against it.

However, previous Aprils boast snow amounts of 14" back in 1875 but a more recent April "snow event" was just 3 years ago, on April 7. We had 4" right here in Hasbrouck Heights.

The near terms weather maps show me that we will warm up for the last week of March into the first few days of April ...hopefully, that won't be an April Fools' joke.

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Simple Words of Kindness Can Go a Long Way!

- "Great job"
- "You're special"
- "You're #1"

• "You are a valued member of the team"

I wonder how often we stop to give praise to those closest to us. It seems people have little time and more pressures of life to keep moving and being responsible to our employers and jobs.

Simple words of kindness can go a long way. I have found the friendlier and more positive I am, the friendlier people respond in kind, back. I do believe in the phrase "You get what you give, and you give what you get."

Adults need to hear words of kindness and to be validated for a job well done.

My sons recently told me that they are proud of me for staying my course of wellness. "You look great, Mom!"

All that hard work is paying off. I told my sons how wonderful their kind words made me feel.

Wouldn't it be nice to hear kind words more often from others?

If we model sincerity and kindness, chances are we can get some of that back in return. Good character and kindness begin at home.

I was reading through my teacher curriculum and came across a wonderful lesson. It talked about giving praise as a way to positively reinforce good behaviors.

Like Pavlov's dog, each time the bell rang, the dog would get a treat and be positively reinforced for his good behavior. The dog was also patted on his head and praised as a way to let the dog know that he acted appropriately and made the "right" choice. This experiment was effective in showing that positive praise is actually more important than punishment for wrong-doings.

Of course, it is important to receive a paycheck for doing your job. However, studies show, that people happiest on the job are those who are respected and praised often for a job well done. That "pat on the back" can lift the spirits of employees and create an atmosphere of job commitment (American Journal of Psychology).

So remember, praise and validation can go a long way towards creating loyalty and commitment from others at home, at school, and on the job.

Board of Health Food Guidelines for Take-Out and Delivered Foods

In today's busy world, take-out and delivered foods are experiencing runaway popularity.

Some foods are hot and some are cold when purchased. Foods from fast food restaurants are most often consumed immediately.

Take-out foods may be purchased in advance for eating at a later time, such as a party platter or a cooked holiday meal.

No matter what the occasion, more and more people are relying on others to prepare their food.

The Board of Health recommends to keep hot food safe, keep them at 135°F or above. Cold foods must be kept at 41°F or below. Bacteria can grow rapidly between 41°F and 135°F.

Discard all perishable foods such as meat, poultry, eggs, and casseroles, left at room temperature longer than 2 hours; 1 hour in air temperatures above 90°E.

This includes leftovers taken home from restaurants. Use a food thermometer to monitor the internal temperature of the food.

A preheated oven, chafing dishes, preheated warming trays, or slow cookers may be used.

If you plan to eat at a later

time, take-out or delivered food should be divided into smaller portions or pieces, placed in shallow containers, and refrigerated.

When storing leftovers, your refrigerator should be at 40°F or below.

Cooked meat, poultry or pizza can keep for 3 to 4 days. Luncheon meats, eggs, tuna and macaroni salads should be kept for only 3 to 5 days.

Foods stored longer may begin to spoil or become unsafe to eat. Do not taste leftovers if kept longer than the appropriate time. Your refrigerator should be checked to make sure it is keeping all foods at 41°F or below.

To do so, a thermometer should be kept in the warmest part of the refrigerator and should read between 36 & 38ºF. ###



United Under God's Tent

On Friday, March 2nd, women representing every Church in Hasbrouck Heights, organized and conducted a World Day of Prayer (WDP) Service.

This year's annual ecumenical service was held at St. John The Divine Church at 1:00 p.m.

WDP is a worldwide ecumenical movement of women who come together to observe a common day of prayer.

Throughout the entire day, women (*men were also welcome*) collectively pray starting on the west side of the international dateline at sunrise and ending on the east side at sunset.

The prayers of people from 170 countries and regions follow the sun's path around the globe, with the first sunrise and ending at the last sunset.

Through WDP, women affirm their faith in Christ; share their hopes, fears, joys, sorrows, opportunities and needs, become more globally aware, become enriched by faith experiences of Christians from other countries and cultures; and become aware of their talents so as to use them in service to society.

The movement brings together women of various races, cultures and faith traditions in closer fellowship, understanding and action throughout the year. displaced families and refugees around the world, as well as in their community.

Each year the ecumenical prayer movement chooses the writers of a different country to set a theme and develop prayer guides for the annual event, held on the first Friday in March.

Through preparation and participation in the worship service, they can come to know how their sisters of other countries, languages and cultures understand the biblical passages in their context.

They can hear their concerns and needs and can feel themselves in solidarity with them.

In this way, it is possible to experience the richness of the Christian faith as it grows deeper and broader in an international ecumenical expression.

The theme this year was "United Under God's Tent" (or mantle), and was developed by a group of women from Paraguay.

The Paraguayan committee developed the theme "United Under God's Tent" as its theme and the ñandutí, a classic Paraguayan handcraft based on woven floral patterns connected by a single thread, as a symbol of that unity within diversity and is used by women of Paraguay for the prayer service.



The program began with three women forming a tent proceeding to the altar.

lace called ñandutí.

In the worship's prelude, the ñandutí (*lace table cloth*) is attached to a colored background suspended from a rustic wooden cross. Nine circles or squares cover the lace.

Three women came forward carrying a cloth and a pole. They formed the entrance of a tent by raising the cloth in the middle with the pole, and holding the ends at two sides.

Seven women spoke during the service. Each voice spoke a sentence about the women of Paraguay.

Their prayers, presented in sequence by each voice, were a call to worship, invocation, thanksgiving, confession and words of forgiveness, Bible readings, offering, dedication, intercession and concluded As each woman finished, she placed a mandala representing the unity of the whole, the ñandutí.

Throughout the service, several hymns and responses were sung. Several ladies responded in Spanish.

Light refreshments followed the service.

Worldwide Themes

The World Day of Prayer liturgy was designed by the women of South Africa in 2006 and the women of Poland in 2005. Future worship themes include:

• 2008: "God's Wisdom Provides New Understanding" --Guyana

• 2009: "In Christ, There Are Many Members, Yet One Body" -- Papua New Guinea

• 2010: "Let Everything That Has Breath Praise God" -- Cameroon

• 2011: "How May Loaves Have You?" -- Chile

The first organized World Day of Prayer held nationally in the United States was in 1920.

About the Art of Paraguay

God has given us a rich land of many colors. In the art, the red earth predominates, speaking to us of passion and strength, like that of our people who have daily worked and struggled to fulfill their hopes and ideals.

On this earth there grows an abundance of plants and trees, sprouting with new life, bringing hope and reminding us that positive change reaches toward the heavens.

The clear sky in shades of blue covers us all in its embrace.

In the center is the ñandutí, a creative symbol of two cultures—the European and the indigenous—where designs of nature unique to Paraguay are brought together using one thread, to create unity in diversity.

Over all is the quiet presence of God, as though it were a tent, constantly protecting us.

About Ñandutí

Ñandutí (*niun-doo-tee*) is a Guaraní word - ñandu (*spider*) and tí (*the last part of morotí—white, pure*). In ñandutí, or spider-web lace, all threads are united at one point; there are no loose threads.

Nandutí is woven in various designs and sizes, which implies diversity as well as unity.

To make the ñandutí, a cloth is stretched over a wooden frame; the frame serves as a support for the weaving.

It is very delicate handwork that requires concentration and patience; an error can damage all or part of the woven piece.

Once the ñandutí is removed from the base cloth, the weaving is starched to give it more body. ###

Through World Day of Prayer, women affirm that prayer and action are inseparable and that both have immeasurable influence in the world.

WDP reminds us that tens of thousands of people are crying out for aid because they have been made homeless by natural disasters and regional conflicts.

Participants are encouraged to think about actions one can take to further support the 2007 theme, which centers on It is a way of imagining how God acts. For Abraham and Sarah, God was like a mantle, protecting them in their call.

As I write this, we are in the middle of the Lenten Journey marching toward Palm Sunday, Holy Week, and Easter.

And as I write this, I am reminded of how the journey impacts us.

In America, dyeing eggs and hunting for them started in the 1700s (many attribute this practice as beginning with the Pennsylvania Dutch settlers).

However, eggs were being decorated in England during the middle ages.

The colors painted on the eggs were intended to represent the colors of spring - the sunrise, flowers, and new growth.

Many cultures throughout the world have looked at the

It is about hope and grace. It is a chance to come - once again or for the very first time - into right relationship with the One who makes us whole.

It is an opportunity to be made new and in the image of the Christ.

It is about accepting the gracious gift of God's love and to live everyday and in every way differently because of that amazing gift.

It is about worshipping with a faith community – acknowledging that others are gathering with theirs - and celebrating the gift of life, hope, and possibility.

This Easter Sunday take the opportunity to worship, pray, and commune with other faith journeyers.

It will change your life – in ways you can never imagine.

Go ahead and buy new shoes if you need them, dye eggs with your kids or grandkids, and bake your ham for lunch.

But first accept the gift of Easter and your life will change - forever. ###
