






place finishes thus far. Their coaches attribute the team's many successes to their hard work, dedication, and team unity along with the outstanding support they receive every week from family and friends.




62 Students Get the BUG


Here was the man portraying Jesus leading a cast member to Salvation. That young man is still with us.



About Easter

Easter, Pascha, or Resurrection Day, is the most important religious feast in the Christian liturgical year. It celebrates the resurrection of Jesus, which Christians believe occurred on the third day after his crucifixion some time in the period A.D. 27 to 33.

Easter also refers to the season of the Church year called Eastertide or the Easter Season. Traditionally, the Easter Season lasted for the forty days from Easter Day until Ascension Day but now officially lasts for the fifty days until Pentecost. The first week of the Easter Season is known as Easter Week or the Octave of Easter.

Easter is termed a movable

Christian holy day because it is not fixed in relation to the civil calendar. Easter falls at some point between late March and late April each year (early April to early May in Eastern Christianity), following the cycle of the moon.

Easter is linked to the Jewish Passover, not only for much of its symbolism, but also for its position in the calendar.

The Last Supper shared by Jesus and his disciples before his crucifixion is generally thought of as a Passover meal, based on the chronology in the Gospels.

Joining the Big Easy during select numbers were Lucy (trumpet) and Jeff (guitar) Weinman of the "Skillet Lickers."


After expenses, about \$1,000 in cash, plus food donations collected, benefited the Hasbrouck Heights Food Bank.


























Reflections

Shalom

The same day, at evening, being the first day of the week, when the doors were shut where the disciples were assembled for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood in the midst, and said to them, "Peace be with you." John 20:19

In John 20:19 Peter and the other disciples have an encounter with the Risen Christ. This is where faith is born. The setting is the evening of Easter Sunday in a room that may well have been where the Last Supper was held three days before.

While John and Peter may have believed that Christ had risen and Mary Magdalene had testified of her meeting the Risen Christ (John 20:18), the reality of the resurrection has not taken hold of their lives. They were still living in fear. They were in a locked room. But suddenly Jesus is there visibly.

We must take notice of our Lord's Easter greeting to these men, "Peace be with you" or "Shalom." Jesus stills their anxiety and confusion with the familiar word of greeting, "Shalom."

Now "Shalom" is more than the absence of stress. In its Old Testament context it means "well being" in its fullest sense. It encompasses all the blessings of the Kingdom of God. Shalom is life at its best under the gracious hand of God.

By Christ's resurrection "Shalom" is now a realizable blessing not only for the disciples, but for all who have placed their faith in the Risen Savior. "Shalom" is the compliment of "It is finished;" the words Christ uttered on the cross just days earlier. By the finished work of the cross, peace has been accomplished between God and His people ("therefore being justified by faith we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ" Romans 5:1) The peace of reconciliation

The great mystery is not unanswered prayer; it's unfinished prayer

and life from God is imparted to all who believe.

To give His disciples further assurance, Jesus shows them His hands and side (John 20:20). He is recognized by His scars. The reaction of the disciples is one of great joy and gladness.

This Easter may you experience the message of Easter - "Shalom" and celebrate with great joy that we have a Risen Savior! ###



Mike Rozema began his talk by fielding questions before sharing his thoughts.

He grew up in Fair Lawn, NJ. He attended Sunday School and Church every Sunday. He said that through his family he was given a relationship with faith.

His grandfather was a minister. He asked his mom, what thoughts her father left her with. She said two things. First is your responsibility to the Lord, how you live your life and how you treat others. Second, the importance of faith and family combined.

His was a sports family and in school he played baseball, basketball, wrestling and soccer. He went to St. John's College. In his early college days he played short-stop and found it difficult. It was a tough time, but he turned to his faith.

He said he never prayed for "hits," but prayed "to do what I'm supposed to do."

During his Junior and Senior years, he thought he did well.

He noted that at St. John's they kept discipline and structure in faith and your relationship with Jesus. And he said, we would pray before every game. He mused, "when a priest was on board the bus, you also watched what you said

He was drafted by the Atlanta Braves organization. He noted that they had a baseball chaplain and held 11:45 Chapel on the field or in the dugout.

Mike said, "when you play all the time, I saw Sunday as a re-start -- time to go back to my relationship with Jesus."

He said he surrounded himself with the right people -- people he would like to be and not to go out with the wrong crowd. "I didn't realize that at the time, but now, the friends he made in baseball -- they also went to Chapel."

"We hold a responsibility to the Lord." Mike shared three thoughts.

Keep it even: Turn to faith, succumb to faith: when times are tough and when times are good.

A higher standard: Hold yourself accountable for your actions -- right or wrong. My moral compass is to hold myself to a higher standard.

Company you keep: Surround yourself with the right people.

At the end of the day, focus your faith on Jesus Christ, but it is up to you to develop your own faith. ###

PSE&G Focus on Energy & Conservation

As part of their policy you don't use. to keep the community informed on various topics, the Hasbrouck Heights/Teterboro Kiwanis Club sponsored a program presented by the Public Service Electric and Gas Company (PSE&G) of New Jersey on March 5, 2009.

PSE&G representative Regional Public Affairs Manager Dave Hollenbeck outlined ways in which the consumer can protect the environment as well as conserve energy.

Mr. Hollenbeck first shared facts about his company. PSE &G was founded in 1903 by Tom Mc Carter. Their total assets are \$28.4 billion dollars; their annual revenue is \$12.0 billion dollars and they have approximately 10,500 employees. PSE&G is a regulated public utility company engaged in the transmission and distribution of gas and electricity to nearly three quarters of New Jersey's population. They are 2.1 million electric customers and 1.7 million gas customers. It services approximately 2,600 square miles, from Bergen to Gloucester Counties. Some of the examples Mr. Hollenbeck shared with the group regarding conserving energy and protecting the environment were:

- Lowering your thermostat just 1 degree will reduce your heating bill by 3 percent.
- · Cover your window air conditioners to reduce drafts.
- Install insulated or lined drapes on your windows.
- · For hot air heating systems, clean or replace your furnace filter.
 - · Seal flues in fireplaces

- · Wrap an insulation blanket around the tank of your water heater.
- Install low–flow shower heads and take a five-minute shower instead of a bath.
- · Seal wall switches and electrical outlets with small foam gaskets.
- Install a programmable thermostat.

At the conclusion of his presentation he answered many questions from the residents who attended. Kiwanian President Burnett Eglow expressed his thanks to Mr. Hollenbeck for an excellent presentation and his acknowledged those who attended.

AARP Members Learn More About Scams

Detective Sergeant Jamie A. Barrios of the Hackensack Police Force was the guest at the March 13, 2009 meeting of the Central Bergen Chapter 418, AARP. He provided tips on how to protect yourself and your family against scams. The focus of his presentation was on scams against seniors.

Sergeant Barrios first discussed the reasons the elderly are targeted by scams. He stated the older citizens are more likely to keep money in their homes; they were generally raised to be polite and trusting therefore it is difficult for them to say "no" or just hang up the phone. Seniors are less likely to report a fraud because they are too ashamed at having been scammed, or because they are concerned that relatives may conclude that they no longer have the mental capacity to take care of their own financial affairs. The con-man relies on the fact that elderly victims often make poor witnesses because of the effects of age on memory. Some seniors have poor vision and declining physical and mental health.

Sergeant Barrios stated that the con-man has the desire and the ability to commit a crime; it is the victim that provides the opportunity. If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

Some of the ways to protect



yourself from a scammer is to remember never to give out your personal information to anyone over the phone or by mail. You don't have to listen to someone who phones you if you don't want to. It is okay to hang up when someone is talking. You can also demand to be taken off their call list; beware of "Too Good to Be True" deals; and never be afraid to report to the police when you feel you have been victimized.

Keeping Teterboro Runways Safe

March 1st Snow Event Illustrates Work Crews' Continued Diligence

Keeping Teterboro Runways Safe

With a snow event predicted for Sunday, March 1, continuing into Monday, March 2, 2009, Teterboro Airport activated its snow plans.

Teterboro Airport snow plans are re-examined each September and revised based on experiences during the previous winter season, physical modifications or temporary closures of airside areas, and tenant and other operational changes. The FAA approves the Teterboro Airport Snow & Ice Control Plan -- which is part of the Airport's Annual Certification Inspection.

The airport maintains 24-hour contacts with several weather services, in addition to its satellite feed of weather updates.

Based on forecasts (some predicting over a foot of snow), Teterboro Airport maintenance and operations marshalled resources of personnel and equipment.

A briefing for all airport operations, tenants, etc., was conducted on Friday, February 27, 2009, with an update on

Saturday.

They reviewed staff responsibilities, snow removal priority runway de-icing procedures, inspection and reporting techniques, communications techniques and equipment inventory.

Areas of responsibility: AvPorts airfield operation areas -- runways & taxiways; FBOs & tenants - de-icing aircraft, snow removal for areas within their leasehold. The Port Authority oversees all activities.

Snow Removal

At Teterboro Airport, the access and fire department roads, in conjunction with the runways, receive first priority for snow removal, followed by appropriate taxiways and holding aprons.

Starting at 9:30 p.m. Sunday night, the process of snow removal began.

A crew of 8 airport maintenance and 13 airport operations personnel handled the equipment for this snow event.

Teterboro Airport has two active runways 6-24 (6,013 feet) and 1-19 (7,000 feet), with seven ramps and 4.2 miles of

taxiways.

The 150' wide runways were cleared with two multifunctional vehicles working in formation. Each unit is 68' 7" in length, has a 30' plow on the front, a 22' rotating broom in the middle, and a blower on the back. Each runway takes about six passes depending on the rate of snowfall.

Working at the same time, taxiways and emergency routes are cleared with 24' plows.

Plows have special poly edges on the bottom portion of the plow blades that are strong enough to remove snow, but are pliable enough to contour around and not damage inpavement navigational lights on runways and taxiways.

It took 30 minutes to clear a runway and corresponding ramps.

De-icing

After the plowing operation is completed, a de-icing truck sprays liquid de-icer on the runways, and taxiways.

For this snow event, liquid potassium acetate was used. It is a protective coating for the runway and prevents ice

and snow from bonding to the surface.

One 4,000 gallon truck boom sprays runways in 12 minutes per runway at 7.7 mph. A second 1,500 gallon truck sprays the taxiways.

(Note: If it was very icy, a solid runway de-icer, anhydrous sodium acetate, would be applied with a spreader.

Rock salt is not used as it is corrosive. Regular sand is not used. If required, a special aviation grade sand is used.

The Port Authority uses only the safest available non-corrosive materials regulated by the FAA.)

De-icing was conducted three to four times through Sunday night and Monday morning.

Runway Testing

At about 10 p.m., a continuous measuring friction tester started and continued every 45 minutes to measure the traction of the runways and taxiways.

Programmed for the entire length of each runway, the FAA approved friction tester is a modified SAAB car with a "5th" measuring wheel

mechanically geared to one of the car's rear wheels. The gear ratio is such that when moving along the runway, it rolls with a certain, fixed slip ratio.


These vehicles report friction values which are forwarded to the ATCT (air traffic control tower) who relays readings to pilots.

The airport utilizes stateof-the-art sensors embedded in both runways which relay conditions and surface temperature to a constantly monitored computer at the airport's operations desk.

Summary

About six inches of measurable snow fell at Teterboro Airport. By Monday afternoon, the runways and taxiways were cleared and the problem was wind blowing snow on the runway.

The airport can't have over 1/2" of snow on the runway or it is closed. During this snow event, the airport was operational throughout the cleanup efforts except for about 20 minutes to clear the runway intersection of 1-19 and 6-24. ###


