St. Joseph Table

About 300 attended The "Saint Joseph Table" (*La Tavolata di San Giuseppe*), held on Saturday, March 17, 2012, at 7 p.m. at the school gymnasium, across from the Church on Spring Street in Lodi. The menu consisted of the traditional food items: "St. Joseph's Pasta," bread in honor of Saint Joseph, and the "Saint Joseph Zeppole." Because this holiday often falls during Lent, the dishes are all meatless.

There was also a sharing table where anyone attending the event was welcomed to bring an appetizer (non-meat item) or a dessert item that was divided up and shared with all guests.

Rev. Michael Marotta, C.R.M., Pastor, blessed the food. There was DJ entertainment during the evening.

On Monday, March 19, the actual feast day of Saint Joseph, there was a solemn Mass celebrated at Saint Joseph's Church at 7 p.m. This was a bi-lingual Mass in Italian and English celebrated by Bishop Edgar da Cunha.

In keeping with tradition, the Society handed out bread in honor of Saint Joseph to all parishioners on March 17, 18, and 19 after each Mass.

Antonino Pollaro, President of the St. Joseph Society, elaborated by giving a brief history of the "Tavolata di San Giuseppe" ("Saint Joseph Table").

The "Saint Joseph Table" was founded in Sicily during the Middle Ages.

History tells us that Sicily had been in severe drought for an extended period of time. No crops grew and countless people died of famine.

The peasants prayed to Saint Joseph to intercede with God on their behalf to bring much needed rain to the island. Their promise in return was to have a special feast honoring Saint Joseph.

By miracle, the rains came and the peasants were able to plant their crops.

With the harvest, the people prepared a feast of foods from their crops which has become known as the "Tavolata di San Giuseppe" ("The Saint Joseph Table").

Ecumenical World Day of Prayer: Let Justice Prevail!

On Friday, March 2, 2012, at 1:00 p.m., a World Day of Prayer Ecumenical Service was held at First United Methodist Church, Hasbrouck Heights. Light refreshments followed.

World Day of Prayer (WDP) is a worldwide ecumenical movement of women of many faith traditions who come together to observe a common day of prayer each year on the first Friday in March -- to which all people are welcome.

Each year, a different country serves as the writer for this annual worship service. For 2012, Malaysia developed the theme, "Let Justice Prevail!"

Throughout the entire day, women in more than 170 countries and regions, collectively pray all over the world, beginning with the first sunrise in the Pacific region, shining its light on the country of Malay-

sia and, in turn, the rest of the world and ending at the last sunset. These prayers follow the sun's path around the globe. WDP's motto is "Informed prayer leads to prayerful action."

The women who prepared the 2012 service opened with the greeting "Selamat datang" -- "peace and welcome" as a reminder that harmony as a people is rooted in peace and welcome.

"In Malaysia, we cherish peace. We are a diverse population -- Malays, Chinese, Indians and decendants of the orginal inhabitants. Welcome is important to us. Historic migrations of people from other parts of Asia challenges Malaysians to integrate. It is the largest destination country for migrant workers, as well as a temporary home for refugees.

Peace and welcome are parts of daily life when Muslims, Buddhists, Hindus, Christians and followers of traditional religions can be found living in the same family and community. Therefore we are continously learning to tolerate, understand and accept

one another."

The women name fair and just governance as the basis for peace. They encourage participants to respond from their own context to the theme.

A clear message emerges. It takes courage, compassion and active engagement for justice to prevail.

They ask us to work with God and with each other to create a world in which each gender, race, culture, religion and state is honored, nurtured and empowered.

The Bible readings speak to the peace, patience, persistence and prayer that are necessary for justice to prevail. ###

Rev. Joseph Pickard Retires

Laughter, tears, singing, and praying, filled the sanctuary of St. John the Divine Episcopal Church on February 12, 2012, as The Rev. Joseph Pickard celebrated his final service before beginning his retirement.

Parishioners from St. John's Episcopal Church, Hasbrouck Heights, and St. Martin's Episcopal Church, Maywood, were joined by family, friends, community members, and people from around the Diocese of Newark.

The Rev. Canon Greg Jacobs, representing the Bishop's Office, assisted in a wonderful celebration that capped a rich ministry in Bergen County and Northern New Jersey. "PapaDuk," as Fr. Joe is known by many people, came to St. John's in 1996.

His optimism, enthusiasm, and boundless energy have imbued the congregation with a sense of possibility and surety in knowing God's abundant Grace.

In 2009 he began working with St. Martin's, seeking to bring the two congregations together in worship and ministry.

Nearly 200 people attended the festival celebration and the Reception following the Service.

The Honorable Rose Heck and Councilwoman Pam Link read a resolution declaring February 12, 2012, "Father Joseph Pickard Day in the Borough of Hasbrouck Heights."

It has always been the Vicar's goal to work with community based congregations helping them to develop strong lay led ministries.

During his years at St. John's, he launched the Education for Ministry (EFM) Program. This four year curriculum (covering Hebrew Scriptures, Christian Scriptures, Church History and Ethics) helped prepare many participants from different denominations to serve God in the world.

Fr. Joe always enjoyed working collaboratively with community members.

"The interconnectedness of all our lives does not end at the doors of our Churches. We gather more often in our towns and offices, where we live and work and have our lives. Working together for the well-being of all people gives us the opportunity to join resources, skills and abilities. Ecumenical work does bring together differing goals and unites compassion and concern into a focused opportunity. Interdenominational

clergy and people working together heighten the overall awareness and have the ability to actualize solutions."

Thanks to the efforts of Fr. Joe, the clergy of Hasbrouck Heights have met regularly over the past decades, celebrating life liturgically, and working with people throughout the Borough in caring for one another and in supporting local ministries.

"Our faith is not constrained by the walls of our facilities." Just as Jesus walked through Galilee, Fr. Joe and the people of St. John's have traveled the streets of Hasbrouck Heights: annually celebrating Pentecost in Woodland Park; opening the grounds and facilities of the Church to aid people in developing their own personal lives to become the fullest possible person; yearly walking the Boulevard during the Street Fair, offering prayers, Communion, and God's blessing to anyone who wishes to receive it.

For years, he and the members of St. John's gathered in parades and community celebrations in thanksgiving for the life in this town, offering prayers for those in need and helping to bring confidence in faith.

Fr. Pickard and the people of St. John's formed Care on the Corner in 2003. The not-for-profit organization has served several thousand adults and children in the past nine years. Programs such as Kids on the Corner have focused on teaching cultural and performing arts to children.

English as a Second Language and United States Citizenship preparation classes have helped many people as they sought to make their home in the United States.

Computer Literacy Classes, as well as various seminars on resume preparation and interview skills, have helped people prepare for improved employment options.

As Executive Director, his guiding vision and belief in unlimited possibilities gave many people the hope and confidence that they needed to take the next steps in their own lives.

When participants in Care on the Corner programs learned of Fr. Pickard's planned retirement, they were happy for him but also knew that the community would not be the same without his outgoing personality.

"It has been an exciting time at Care on the Corner under the direction of Fr. Joe. His talent in creating the sets and costumes for the Kids on the Corner program has been outstanding. He will be missed by all – but what he started almost ten years ago, will continue with his blessing," Carol Haefele, COTC Board Chair.

In response to the question: "What will Joe do as he begins retirement?" He mused, "I am going to take some time to breathe deeply." He plans to spend time with his three children and six grandchildren who live in New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Virginia; indulge his creativity through quilting, develop a new expression of ministry; and brushing up on his computer skills, and learn more about social networking.

He plans to eventually move to the East Coast of Florida where according to Fr. Pickard, "no white fluffy stuff exists." ###

Reflections

The Origins of the Easter Egg and Blessing of the Easter Foods

Everyone knows that eggs that have been specially decorated are given out, eaten, or displayed to celebrate Easter—but it seems that there is a controversy among scholars and historians as to whether or not the tradition of Easter eggs originated with Christians or was it a Pagan tradition that was Christianized by the early Church.

Myths coming down to us from long ago show that humanity's relationship with the egg is a very deep-seated one.

"All life comes from an egg" is a very old Latin proverb. Moreover, eggs are laid throughout all corners of the world and there are many ancient myths from nations of every continent that claim that the entire universe was created out of an egg.

Nearly every ancient culture has viewed eggs as an emblem or symbol of life.

Nevertheless, there is no solid evidence that Easter Eggs were originally pagan symbols.

So, how did eggs come to be associated with Easter? We don't know precisely, however, it is interesting to think of the following religious and cultural connections that may be the roots of the Easter egg tradition.

The first is a connection with the Passover Seder. One of the foods eaten during the Seder is a hard-boiled egg dipped in salt water which symbolizes new life born out of the tears (salt water) shed by the Israelite slaves.

Another interesting connection is the ancient Persian practice of painting eggs for Nowrooz—the Persian new year celebration which begins on March 21, the Spring Equinox. This ancient Persian tradition continues to this day in modern-day Iran.

The Christian tradition of Easter eggs, however, probably began as a celebration to the end of the privations of Lent.

In Medieval times, during the 40 days of Lent, a strict fast was observed by the Church and eggs were forbidden.

Christians viewed eggs as a symbol of new life, just as a chick might hatch from the egg, which appeared to be lifeless from the outside. Any eggs that were laid during the 40 days of Lent were often boiled or otherwise preserved.

During Easter, the fast was lifted and the consumption of eggs resumed. Eggs were thus a mainstay of Easter meals, and a prized Easter gift for children and servants. This is the most convincing reason for how eggs came to be associated with Easter.

Orthodox Christians in Slavic countries like Poland are known for the development of elaborately decorated eggs and for the practice of presenting their Easter eggs, the first eggs appearing at the table on Easter Day, for thanksgiving and a blessing.

Among the Polish people, along with Easter eggs, a lamb molded out of butter or pastry is also blessed during the Easter service and then given a place of honor on the festive Easter table at home.

Children will hunt for eggs on the lawn and can bring the eggs they find for a blessing.

Easter, Pascha, or Resurrection Day, is the most important religious feast in the Christian liturgical year. It celebrates the resurrection of Jesus, which Christians believe occurred on the third day after his crucifixion some time in the period A.D. 27 to 33.

Many pagan elements have become part of the celebration, and those aspects are often celebrated by many Christians and non-Christians alike.

Easter also refers to the season of the Church year called Eastertide or the Easter Season. Traditionally, the Easter Season lasted for the forty days from Easter Day until Ascension Day, but now officially lasts for the fifty days until Pentecost. The first week of the Easter Season is known as Easter Week or the Octave of Easter.

Easter is termed a movable Christian holy day because it is not fixed in relation to the civil calendar. Easter falls at some point between late March and late April each year (early April to early May in Eastern Christianity), following the cycle of the moon.

Easter is linked to the Jewish Passover, not only for much of its symbolism, but also for its position in the calendar.

The Last Supper shared by Jesus and his disciples before his crucifixion is generally thought of as a Passover meal, based on the chronology in the Gospels.

Some, however, interpret "Passover" in John 18:28 as a single meal and not a sevenday festival. Interpretation of the Gospel of John differs from the Synoptic Gospels by placing Christ's death at the time of the slaughter of the Passover lambs, which would put the Last Supper slightly before Passover, on 14 Nisan of the Bible's Hebrew calendar.

ew Year Celebration Safe























On Tuesday, March 13, 2012, the Wood-Ridge Fire Department and EMS Squad was dispatched to The Fiesta for a "Fire Watch" detail for the Persian "Festival of Fire." This is the ninth year that this event was held at The Fiesta.

The Department reviewed the fire stations located in the parking lot and made necessary spacing adjustments. Firefighters lighted the rows of fires with flares.

Working with the organizers, firefighters established a safe

perimeter and procedures.

At about 8 p.m., just after the salad, and before the main course, participants departed the main banquet hall to the parking lot.

The central focus of the evening was the "Festival of Fire" or Chahar Shanbeh Soori (*literally means* "Eve of Wednesday").

Families lined up outside in the dark to take turns jumping safely over a row of small fires, as a celebration of thanks for the new year.

As they jump over the fire,

they say, "The redness of the fire to my cheeks; the yellow of my skin to the fire," using the warmth of the fire to remove the evils of the past year to start the new year fresh.

Firefighters were strategically located and carefully monitored each jump, watchful that no one was burned (or clothing caught fire). They assisted those who were unsteady.

If fire embers were disturbed, firefighters quickly reset the fire.

At the end of the fire line,

firefighters kept the egress area open and checked that all were safe.

At the conclusion, the Department extinguished the fires with water, dispersed embers with tools, pushed the fire stations into a central area and rechecked that the fires were out.

Over 400 attended this Persian New Year, Nowruz, at The Fiesta. Nowruz is observed on the last Tuesday of winter, just before the Vernal Equinox or first moment of spring.

This Persian Festival pre-

dates Islam and is estimated to be about 2,500 years old.

The holiday is believed to have been invented by Zoroaster. The Zoroastrian custom, which has no religious significance, celebrates Persian culture.

A larger celebration of the new year, or Nowruz, will be held April 15, 2012 at the Persian Day Parade along Madison Avenue in New York City. For more information go to www. nypp.org. ###





Shot Heard Around the World

April 19 marks a special date in American history. On this date in 1775, a small group of militia stood on the Lexington Green in Massachusetts. Led by Captain John Parker, they awaited the arrival of the British Army marching west to take the military stores in Concord. When they arrived, Captain Parker called out to his troops. "Don't fire unless fired upon but if they mean to have a war, let it begin here."

The British ordered them to disperse and a shot was fired. No one knows who fired it but it became the shot "heard around the world."

The British returned fire and charged in with bayonets. The Militia was soon routed, the first battle of the American Revolution lasted only minutes but 10 Americans were wounded and 8 were killed.

The Lexington Green is quiet now. Those killed there 237 years ago rest there still. Buried beneath a Monument that reminds all that see it, that here lie 8 American Soldiers that were the first to die for our Liberty. ###

About Loyalty Day

According to the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Loyalty Day originally began as "Americanization Day" in 1921 as a counter to the Communists' May 1 celebration of the Russian Revolution.

On May 1, 1930, 10,000 VFW members staged a rally at New York's Union Square to promote patriotism. Through a resolution adopted in 1949, May 1st evolved into Loyalty Day.

Observances began in 1950 on April 28 and climaxed May 1 when more than five million people across the nation held rallies. In New York City, more than 100,000 people rallied for America

America. In 1958, Congress enacted Public Law 529 proclaiming Loyalty Day a permanent fixture on the nation's calendar. Following the passage of this law, President Dwight D. Eisenhower proclaimed May 1, 1959 the first official observance of Loyalty Day. Loyalty Day is celebrated with parades and ceremonies in several U.S. communities, although many people in the United States remain unaware of it. Although a legal holiday, it is not a federal holiday, and is not commonly observed. ###

The Train is "The Way to Go" to The Big Apple

New York City is the place of work for thousands of Bergen County residents. Residents of Hasbrouck Heights, Wood-Ridge, Carlstadt, East Rutherford, and Moonachie are often faced with the burden of sitting on New Jersey Transit's buses every morning and evening, going to and from the Big Apple.

I've taken the bus to New York to work with the cruise ships. There have been days where I had to run the length of ten blocks to meet my sign-in time. Let me share some valuable advice with you.

The train is way faster than the Broadway ticket lines at Times Square. Theater goers, the train is way faster to get you into New York in time for that eight o'clock curtain.

The Bergen County and Pascack Valley train lines are minutes away.

Instead of waiting for a bus that might be stuck in traffic, or waiting for a bus that you might have missed, just head down to the Teterboro or Wood-Ridge station. If you live in East Rutherford, Rutherford is your point of origin. If you're driving to the station, make sure you have a commuter's permit in your window. Your better option is to drive to Garfield's Plauderville station on Outwater Lane. The free lot is located on the east side of the station.

New Jersey Transit's train stations have ticket vending machines. They operate 24-7, and accept both cash and major credit cards. The adult round-trip cost to New York's Penn Station from Teterboro, Wood-Ridge, and Plauderville are as follows: Teterboro/Wood-Ridge: \$12.50, Rutherford: \$10.50, Plauderville: \$13.50.

Children and senior citizens get a good deal when they travel to New York. All NJ Transit train fares for children and senior citizens are one-way. The fares are as follows: Teterboro/Wood-Ridge: \$2.75, Rutherford: \$2.25, Plauderville: \$3.

Traveling to New York City is very easy. When your train arrives at Secaucus Junction, proceed upstairs to the Northeast Corridor Line. Hold on to your train ticket. You will need it to go through the turnstile in the upstairs concourse.

The track assignments for New York bound trains are subject to change, so double check the information board before proceeding to the platform.

There are plenty of digital displays showing what trains are departing on all of the tracks at a given time. In the morning, the waiting time is very short. You never have to wait more than ten minutes for the next train.

Finally, your connecting train arrives. Step aboard, and your next station stop is New York-Penn Station. Penn Station is approximately twelve minutes away. Your train will plunge into the tunnel under the Hudson River. Upon arrival at Penn Station, there are plenty of signs showing you to the subways, Long Island Railroad trains, Amtrak's departure area, Madison Square Garden, and all street exits.

Aside from New York Penn Station, Hoboken is your other option. Rather than changing trains in Secaucus, stay on board and continue to Hoboken Terminal. Hoboken Terminal is the beginning and ending point of the Pascack, Bergen County, and Main lines. The fares to Hoboken Terminal are fairly reasonable. The adult round-trip fares are as follows:

• Teterboro/Wood-Ridge: \$9.40, Rutherford: \$8.00, Plauderville: \$10.50

The children and senior citizen fares are as follows:

• Teterboro/Wood-Ridge: \$2.25, Rutherford: \$1.75, Plauderville: \$2.25

Upon arrival in Hoboken, the signs for the PATH station are clearly marked. The one way fare to 33rd Street-Manhattan is \$2. Children age five and under ride FREE. If you have an MTA Metro Card, PATH honors them. The approximate ride time to 33rd Street is twenty minutes. If shopping is your favorite activity in New York, the Manhattan Mall is located right off the PATH exit. One block north of the 33rd Street PATH exit is the famous Macy's department store.

NJ Transit provides plenty of deals for all passengers going into New York for dinner and Broadway shows. For complete details, visit NJTransit. com and click on "Deals And Discounts."

The entertainment, dining, and recreation choices are endless. Whether you feel like going to a fine steakhouse, taking a Circle Line tour, or going in to catch the Knicks, Rangers, or even a concert at Madison Square Garden, the train is "the way to go."

Just catch that train and you are off to the Big Apple in no time. You can set your watch to them! New Jersey Transit's trains are not just "the way to go," they take you the "core" of it all. Story by David Kriso. ####

What is Identity Theft?

Identity theft occurs when thieves use your personal information (Social Security number, driver's license or credit card number) to gain access to money, credit, goods or services in your name.

Since your name is used for these activities, companies come to you seeking repayment of the money or goods that were illegally obtained. While legally you do not owe anything, it can often be difficult to prove this and it can take months and even years to get everything straightened out, costing you a huge amount of time and resources.

How does identity theft happen?

Identity thieves can get access to your personal information in many different ways including:

- · Stealing mail
- Copying down or taking pictures of your information in a retail transaction
- Data breaches at companies that have your information
 - Stolen wallets or purses
- Documents thrown in the trash by you or a business that has your information (dumpster diving)
 - Computer viruses
 - Phishing
- Intercepting data from insecure networks or sites
 - Overhearing or hacking

into phone conversations

- Pretexting, meaning use false pretenses to get your personal information from companies that have it (financial institutions, utilities, etc.).
- Changing your address through a change of address form in order to divert billing statements from your home to an address the thief controls.

Here's what you can do to stop these crimes before they happen:

- 1. Do not give out financial information such as checking and credit card numbers, or your Social Security Number, unless you know the person or organization.
- 2. Report lost or stolen checks immediately. Your bank will block payment on them.
- 3. Notify your banker of suspicious phone inquiries such

as those asking for account information to "verify a statement" or "award a prize."

- 4. Closely guard your ATM Personal Identification Number and ATM receipts.
- 5. Shred any financial solicitations and bank statements before disposing of them.
- 6. Put outgoing mail into a secure, official Postal Service collection box.
- 7. If regular bills fail to reach you, call the company to find out why.
- 8. If your bills include questionable items, don't ignore them. Instead, investigate immediately to head off any possible fraud.
- 9. Periodically contact the major credit reporting companies to review your file and make certain the information is correct. ###





Apollo 16 was the fifth mission to land men on the moon and return them to Earth. It was also the second flight of the Lunar Roving Vehicle. Apollo 16 landed in a highlands area, a region not yet explored on the Moon. Astronauts collected samples, took photographs and conducted experiments that included the first use of an ultraviolet camera/spectrograph on the Moon.

The Apollo 16 space vehicle was launched from the Kennedy Space Center on April 16, 1972. The crew members were John W. Young, Commander, Thomas K. Mattingly II, Command Module Pilot, and Charles M. Duke, Jr., Lunar Module Pilot.

Total lunar surface activities lasted 20 hours 14 minutes and 95 kilograms of samples were collected. These rocks represented samples of the ancient lunar highlands. The total distance traveled in the LRV was 26.7 kilometers.

The command module was viewed on television. Total time for the Apollo 16 mission was 265 hours, 51 minutes and 5 seconds. ###

Warren Buffett and **Single-Family Homes:** Buy, Baby, Buy!

The National Association of Realtors reported recently that pending home sales rose by 8.2% last month. And while we may not be out of the woods yet, as we get further into 2012 it's clear that real estate market - nationally and locally - is definitely turning around.

I can personally state that home sales in Hasbrouck Heights and Wood-Ridge for January and February this year were uncharacteristically.... awesome!

Why the upswing? The official unemployment rate dropped to 8.6 percent, even as the labor participation rate dropped to about 62 percent.

But, according to the experts, the better news is that the U-6 – the broadest measure of unemployment - fell below 16 percent for the first time since the Great Recession started.

Another boost to the housing market is that mortgage interest rates remain around 4 percent for a 30-year fixed-rate mortgage.

If you're willing to look at a 15-year mortgage, you can find one for about 3.25 percent. Some lenders are now offering 10-year loans at 3% or less.

These interest rates, bouncing around at a historic low level, will save home buyers hundreds or thousands of dollars per year. Indeed, low rates are a huge driving factor of the ultimate cost of purchasing a home.

The total expense of a \$200,000, 30-year fixed rate mortgage at 4 percent mortgage rate is \$144,000. At 10 percent, which was the prevalent rate in 1990, the interest expense comes to \$432,000!

These facts aren't lost on Warren Buffett who, of course, is famous for only investing in assets that he believes are undervalued. His real estate forecast for 2012 and beyond is extremely rosy.

In an interview with CNBC earlier this month, Buffett said single-family homes, along with stocks, are cheap and attractive investments. By contrast, investments in Treasury bills, gold or simply keeping money in cash are not as attractive.

The Oracle of Omaha said if he had a way to buy "a couple hundred thousand single-family homes" and easily manage them, he would "load up on them" and "take mortgages out at very, very low rates." However, managing "a couple hundred thousand single-family homes" would be, he admitted an impossibly gigantic logistical task.

This line of reasoning probably holds true for many brilliant investment minds who choose not to bother with buying single-family homes – even though they are undervalued - when buying and owning stocks is as easy as a few keystrokes and mouse clicks on a computer.

"Because of the absence of

many of these big institutional investors in the U.S. residential real estate market, it is less competitive than the stock market," Buffett said.

When institutional investors of size do enter the residential real estate market, they usually go for apartment buildings, which leaves the single-family homes segment even less competitive that the general residential real estate market.

When asked if a young individual investor should buy stocks or his first single-family home, Buffett recommended buying a single-family home with a 30-year mortgage. "It's a terrific deal," he said. "It's a leveraged way of owning a very cheap asset now and I think that's probably as an attractive an investment as you can make now."

We agree! With home prices still well off the peak prices of 2007 and interest rates at an all time low, there has never been a better time to invest in Real Estate!

Filling You In

Composite Resins

What is a composite resin? (white filling)

A composite resin is a tooth colored plastic mixture filled with glass (silicon dioxide).

Introduced in the 1960s, dental composites were confined to the front teeth because they were not strong enough to withstand the pressure and wear generated by the back teeth.

Since then, composites have been significantly improved and can be successfully placed in the back teeth as well. Composites are not only used to restore decayed areas, but are also used for cosmetic improvements of the smile by changing the color of the teeth or reshaping disfigured teeth.

How is a composite placed?

Following preparation, the dentist places the composite in layers, using a light specialized to harden each layer. When the process is finished, the dentist will shape the composite to fit the tooth. The dentist then polishes the composite to prevent staining and early wear.

How long does it take to place a composite?

It takes the dentist about 10-20 minutes longer to place a composite than a silver filling.

Placement time depends on the size and location of the cavity - the larger the size, the longer it will take.

What is the cost?

Places vary, but composites average about one-and-a-half to two times the price of a silver filling. Most dental insurance plans cover the cost of the composite up to the price of a silver filling, with the patient paying the difference. As composites

continue to improve, insurance companies are more likely to increase their coverage of composites.

What are the advantages of composites?

Esthetics is the main advantage, since dentists can blend shades to create a color nearly identical to that of the actual tooth. Composites bond to the tooth to support the remaining tooth structure, which helps to prevent breakage and insulate the tooth from excessive temperature changes.

What are the disadvantages?

After receiving a composite, a patient may experience post-operative sensitivity. Also, the shade of the composite can change slightly if the patient drinks tea, coffee or other staining foods. The dentist can put a clear plastic coating over the composite to prevent the color from changing if a patient is particularly concerned about tooth color.

Composites tend to wear out sooner than silver fillings in larger cavities, although they hold up as well in small cavities.

How long will a composite last?

Studies have shown that composites last 7-10 years, which is comparable to silver fillings except in very large restorations which silver lasts longer than composites.

Nurse's Station Spring Fever

It's that time of the year again; the sun is shimmering, flowers are blooming, the temperature is perfect. The outside is calling your name. If you're already feeling restless from being cooped up in an office or classroom, you could be feeling the onset of spring fever.

Symptoms include lack of focus on work, the urge to spend as much time as possible outside and lots of gazing out the window. Your eyes start searching for anything green.

That is usually followed by an interest in spotting birds, butterflies and crabgrass.

Some scientists think spring fever is more than just a colloquialism – they think it's a constellation of symptoms brought about by hormonal changes in the body.

In winter, the body secretes high levels of melatonin, a hormone that governs sleep-wake cycles. Come spring, the increasing amount of daylight is registered by light-sensitive tissue in the eye, which signals the brain to stop secreting so much melatonin. As the hormone's levels drop off, greater wakefulness results.

On the other hand, levels of another chemical, serotonin, rise in spring. This moodelevating neurotransmitter may be at the root of the giddiness, energy boost and enthusiasm that characterize spring fever.

Anthropologists have suggested that spring fever may have developed over the course of human evolution. They point out that early humans often

spent winter in a state of near-hibernation.

Then, when spring arrived, they would enter an active period of intense hunting and gathering.

That theory doesn't quite explain the state of the early American colonists come spring.

Historians think the colonists coined the term "spring fever" to refer to the weakness, fatigue and irritability many felt after a long winter without fresh fruits or vegetables. (The colonists' symptoms were that of scurvy.)

Such etymology suggests that the term spring fever is a remnant of times past that's been co-opted to mean something different today.

But there's no doubt that the body's internal chemistry and susceptibility to illness changes with the seasons.

On the plus side, spring is also the season in which people

bid a temporary farewell to flu, seasonal affective disorder and heart attacks, all of which peak in winter.

Many of spring's effects on the human mind and body are seemingly contradictory. Hormones do a partial job of explaining the seasonal epidemic of impulsive, giddy and amorous behaviors observed as the memory of winter fades, but much about the season's influence remains mysterious.

Poets have been writing about the phenomenon for years, but now scientists can explain the symptoms of spring fever with evidence about our brain's chemical reactions to the light, warmth, and scents of the spring season.

Just as decreased sunlight can put people into a depression during the winter, (called Seasonal Affective Disorder - SAD), the increased sunlight with springtime leads to more release of serotonin, making us happier.

The ingredients of warmer weather, and the flowery aromas of the season, give us a greater desire to socialize and even, perhaps, fall in love. ###

Police Chief Warns of Scams

Hasbrouck Heights Police Chief Michael Colaneri reminds residents that as warm weather approaches, residents should be aware of scams.

Questionable people usually prey upon senior citizens and people living alone, because they would rather deal with a lone decision maker.

With no one to confer with, it makes it easier for them to weave their web of deception.

The Chief said, "They prey on senior citizens because they have the time, they're home, and they're mellow in their older age. They try to see the good in everybody."

People should be suspicious of unsolicited work offers. "The day of door-to-door salesmen is over," Chief Colaneri said.

"If you've got somebody going door to door for house repairs, the chance is good that it's some kind of scam."

They say they are doing the house down the street and offer a discount.

Sometimes they will try to scare their prospects by bringing up dangerous situations that must be corrected immediately. But most often, nothing is wrong or just a minor repair would be needed.

One of the more common scams is to knock on the door and tell the homeowner that they do roofing, and when passing by they noticed that the roof is badly damaged.

They explain how the home is being damaged even before leaks become visible.

They use high pressure, aggressive tactics and convince the homeowner that the roof needs immediate attention.

They ask for cash and say they will need to get some supplies and be right back. That's the last time you will see them or your money.

Always remember to use common sense and think about it for a minute. How can these strangers show up and tell you about a serious problem that you are unaware of?

In another variation of this scam, workers will begin a home repair job such as repaving a driveway, take the deposit, and never return to finish the work.

The bogus contractor will begin the job and tell the resident that the damage was worse than originally estimated, so he or she will have to pay more

The best way to avoid becoming a victim of a home repair scam is not to allow people to do repairs unsolicited.

On some occasions, scammers have been known to work in tandem, gaining access into the home on the pretense of using the bathroom.

While one of them has the attention of the homeowner, one of the other men or women will quickly search for cash and valuables to steal.

Never let any of these people in your home under any circumstances.

Chief Colaneri said, "Most people are inherently good. Most businesses are legitimate and provide good services at fair prices.

However, the consumer should be suspicious of any cold call or visit to your door without an appointment.

Anyone coming to your door should be able to identify themselves with proper I.D., company uniform or commercial vehicle (it is required to be lettered with the name and base town of the company).

Most importantly, do not be pressured by anyone. Follow your instincts; if you are uneasy, lock your door and call a neighbor or the police."

If senior citizens ever suspect a problem, the most important thing to do is call the police at 201-288-1000.

"If they feel that they have been scammed, there's a good chance that they're not the first one and we need to know about it," Chief Colaneri said. "The more reports we have, the better chance we have of catching them." ###

Wood-Ridge Mayor and Council authorized the purchase of a 100-foot rear mount ladder truck costing \$845,639.62.

The rear mount fully finished ladder truck features a 2,000 GPM pump, generator, tools, various ladders, etc.

The new truck will continue its 903 designation and the Department will rededicate the original bell. The 40 foot truck will retain the traditional red and white color scheme.

The Department will salvage the radios and the eight new Scott packs recently acquired from an AFG grant.

The new ladder truck is being constructed to order by Sutphen Corporation, based on the needs determined by the Wood-Ridge Fire Department specification committee which began in June 2011.

This committee will follow the progress of the truck

On February 28, 2012, The to insure that specifications are met. It takes about eight months to manufacture and delivery is expected at the end of the year.

> The new truck is replacing the 25 year old truck that was beyond repair. The insurance company condemned it last year, taking it out of service and gave the Borough \$78,500 for scrap purposes. Those funds were used towards the down payment of the new truck.

> The life expectancy of a typical ladder truck is 25 years and it was due for replacement.

> The Wood-Ridge Fire Department did temporarily use the Bergen County truck, and is currently relying on Mutual Aid (neighboring)towns for ladder truck support.

> Officials expressed concern about the response delay to a scene from neighboring communities and emphasized the need for a replacement. ###


