






## Earth Day Network an-

nounced the global theme for Earth Day 2013 is "The Face of Climate Change."

Earth Day Network, the group founded by the organizers of the first Earth Day to coordinate the annual day of action that builds and invigorates the environmental movement, said that this theme was chosen because of the need to highlight the mounting impact of climate change on individuals around the world.

"Many people think climate change is a remote problem, but the fact is that it's already impacting real people, animals, and beloved places all over the world, and these Faces of Climate Change are multiplying every day," said Kathleen Rogers, president of Earth Day Network.

"Fortunately, other Faces of Climate Change are also multiplying every day: those stepping up to do something about it.

For Earth Day 2013, we'll bring our generation's biggest environmental challenge down to size - the size of an individual faced with the consequences."

Earth Day 2013 - The Face of Climate Change

Between now and Earth Day, Earth Day Network will collect and display images of people, animals, and places directly affected or threatened by climate change and tell the world their stories.

The organization will mobilize its extensive global network of Earth Day event organizers and other partners to help collect the images. But they're also asking ordinary people to become "climate reporters" and send their pictures and stories that show "The Face of Climate Change."

On and around Earth Day - April 22 - an interactive digital display of all the images will be shown at thousands of events around the world, including next to federal government buildings in countries that produce the most carbon pollution. The display will also be made available online to anyone who wants to view or show it.

The campaign is focusing heavily on social media. Organizers are asking people to tweet using the hashtag #FaceOfClimate, and "climate reporters" can also post photos to Twitter and Instagram using that hashtag for inclusion in the digital display.

2012 was marked by many climate change milestones. Arctic sea-ice cover reached a record low in September, a new high-water mark in a long-term decline.

The United States experi-

enced its hottest year ever; this, after the World Meteorological Organization announced that the first decade of this century was the hottest on record for the entire planet.

Public perception of extreme weather events as "the new normal" grew as unusual superstorms rocked the Caribbean, the Philippines and the northeastern United States; droughts plagued northern Brazil, Russia, China, and two-thirds of the United States; exceptional floods inundated Nigeria, Pakistan, and parts of China; and more.

Meanwhile, international climate change talks stagnated. But glimmers of hope for a political solution began appearing in recent months, perhaps most notably in U.S. President Barack Obama's high-profile promises to tackle climate change during his second term.

Each year, more than one billion people participate in Earth Day-related activities, making it the largest civic observance in the world. On and around April 22, communities across approximately 192 countries voice their concerns for the planet and take action to protect it.

"We'll harness that power to show the world "The Face of Climate Change," said Russell. "And we'll call on our leaders to act boldly together, as we have, on this critical issue."



# Hackensack Riverkeeper's 2013 Eco-Programs

## Full season of fun, educational, active programming is ready to roll

Hackensack Riverkeeper is happy to announce the release of its 2013 Eco-Programs schedule.

Once again the clean water advocacy group is poised to provide thousands of people with an up-close and personal experience of the river, its watershed and wildlife.

Eco-Cruises, Guided Paddles, River Cleanups and Bird-Walks combine hands-on environmental education with public service and fun - and have since 1997.

The 2013 Eco-Program season runs from Earth Day weekend (April 20-21) through the end of October.

"We were very fortunate in that Hurricane Sandy caused us very little damage," said Captain Bill Sheehan. "We hauled and secured our pontoon boats before the storm hit; and our Paddling Center made it through alright. Captain Hugh and I are very anxious to get out on the water and see what changes – if any – there are on the river and in the Meadowlands."

#### **Eco-Programs**

offers four unique and distinct **Eco-Programs**:

• Eco-Cruises This is Hackensack Riverkeeper's signature environmental education program.

Thirty-eight Open Eco-Cruises are scheduled from May 4 through October 13 aboard the pontoon cruisers Edward Abbey and Robert H. Boyle.

Open trips are great for individuals, couples and families and can be had for a donation of \$25 per person for adults / \$10 for kids 4-12.

Three distinct Eco-Cruise itineraries are offered: Meadowlands Discovery, which explores the wetlands and creeks of the river's estuary; Boating through Bergen, which runs upriver to the center of Hackensack and the museum ship USS Ling; and Excursion Around the Bay, a maritime history tour to Staten Island and back past the port facilities of Newark and Elizabeth.

• Charter Eco-Cruises Hackensack Riverkeeper can be arranged for groups of up to 26 people for any available date/time May 1 through October 28.

# **NJ Transit Meets With Commuters About Fence at Teterboro Train Stop**

As a safety measure, NJ Transit constructed a 300-foot fence at the Teterboro train stop on the Hasbrouck Heights side of the tracks, to keep people from crossing the tracks.

Commuters were told that the transit agency's safety department recommended installing the fence after train engineers reported a few "near misses" at the station. There was a fatality at this station in 1989.

However, it has caused a number of hardships for Heights commuters who walk to and from the stop as well as those who depart busses at Route 17 and cross over the tracks to work in Teterboro.

Mayor Rose Heck reached out to NJ Transit alerting them to the situation and invited NJ Transit representatives to a Borough meeting for a "listening session."

In council chambers on February 26, 2013, John Leon, senior director of government and community relations for NJ Transit, heard Heights rail customers' frustrations regarding their fenced off access to the Teterboro stop.

A number of residents came forward:

Lino Brescia, who started a movement with petition against NJ Transit for fencing off access, began the session by summarizing many of the commuters' concerns.

He said the so-called safety measure actually puts him and other commuters in more danger as the only access to the stop by foot is by walking along Route 46 which has no sidewalks.

He added that the odds that one could get hit by a car are higher than the odds someone will get hit by a train by crossing the tracks at that rail stop. He added, "I'm your customer ... I just want to take the train."

Jeff Ross wanted to know about this decision. He asked what it would cost for a pedestrian crossing, flashing light, gate, secondary barriers, what are the alternatives, etc.

He wanted the rationale for the fence and that it seemed like a heavy hand. He said that he asked NJ Transit about this for over a month with no response.

The fence is not conducive for commuters, they want easy access to the station.

n crossing the tracks. Perhaps the fence is a good way to safely funnel commuttransit agency's safety deers to a pedestrian crossing.

When asked who built the fence, Leon stated the work was done by NJ Transit, not contracted out.

Another resident questioned, "Why should Hasbrouck Heights commuters not have access to this stop which is just a stone's throw away" from their homes. He cited that convenient access to the rail stop is important to the community, and the lack of that convenient access to NYC could bring down property value.

Another commuter stated that the train stop was his reason for moving into Hasbrouck Heights. The train was an easy commute, but now that access been cut off, he is thinking of moving.

It was generally agreed that the train is 96.9% reliable and a nicer, quicker commute.

Most felt that the bus was unreliable due to traffic whims, longer commute and crowded.

Another resident commented, "It used to take 45 minutes from door to door, from her house to her job," now she takes the bus, extending her commute to New York to more than an hour.

For Dan Powers, who once was able to walk two blocks from his home to the Teterboro train stop, the lack of access to this train stop means giving up quality time with his children in the morning in order to leave early enough to try to get a parking space at the Wood-Ridge train stop.

Another commuter stated, in Hackensack, this same train line runs thru Essex Street where people continuously walk and drive over rails, there is no fence. Further down the rail, Hackensack High School sits parallel to non-fenced rails, safety concern? Children taking shortcuts home, crossing tracks, hanging out near buzzing trains.

There was a comment

about the pedestrian traffic at Franklin Avenue -- without incidents.

Regarding parking, a speaker said Teterboro has 27 spaces for which there is a long waiting list and which seem to be used by NJ Transit employees. Cost is \$480 per year.

They noted that Wood-Ridge has 100 spaces, Hackensack has 200 spaces, Oradell has free parking and Emerson has 400 spaces.

Lack of parking keeps residents from easily accessing the Teterboro stop, something which John Leon, said he would look into as a possible way of resolving the issue.

The obvious question was it parking or access? The consensus among attending commuters was more about convenient walking access than parking.

The mayor pointed to other options NJ Transit could take to expand that station including purchasing the empty gas station which borders the tracks.

Several members of the Borough council agreed that something needs to be done to improve rail access to the Borough.

The session concluded with Mr. Leon thanking the commuters for their comments.

As this was a listening session, he couldn't address all the commuters' problems and didn't have answers for all their questions.

Regarding the fence installation, "We know that it's not a perfect solution," he said.

As for future access to the Teterboro stop, Leon pledged that all the commuters' input will be taken seriously and considered towards some kind of resolve. He would report back to the officials in Newark to possibly find some kind of solution.





# First Moonachie Free Lunch—One More Month in Berry Creek Café

Easter is the time of year when we celebrate resurrection, and resurrection is indeed beginning to be felt at First Presbyterian Church of Moonachie.

Like so many of you, we suffered catastrophic destruction in Hurricane Sandy, when our community room and our much-used kitchen were inundated.

But the generosity and community spirit of so many of our neighbors have made it possible for us to continue many of our ministries, and we will be expanding our outreach soon.

We had to cancel our "First Saturday Free Lunch" in November—there were so many other priorities that we couldn't even begin to think about it.

But Pete Mazzo of Berry Creek Café offered us a space to host our annual Thanksgiving meal for the community, and since then he has provided space, support, and extra food for the program every month.

We literally could not have done it without him!

When an older couple in the community went through a month of hard times, he arranged to deliver meals for three weeks to them—First Presbyterian was ready to pay the bill, but he asked us to consider it as a part of his contribution to the relief effort.

We will be serving the free lunch at Berry Creek on April 6, 2013, from 11:30-12:30; we have high hopes that we will be able to return to our own space the first week in May.

There have been generous private donors in the community, and many people have worked tirelessly on the rebuilding and refurbishing of the community center.

John Huettemann gave much time and labor and love to overseeing the remediation and rebuilding that was necessary, and continues to work on our new kitchen.

Steve West, a member in Lyndhurst, gave generously of his time and company services so that we could put in French drains and ceramic tile on the floors.

Sherwin-Williams sponsored a corporate work day to repaint the areas; Habitat for Humanity donated new tables and Bergen County Center for Volunteers has donated chairs.

Beginning on March 18, there will be a drop-in center staffed by volunteers in the community room on Tuesday-Friday from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m,. and on Saturdays from 9 a.m.-2 p.m.

If you need additional assistance with your home or your paperwork, or just need someone to talk to about what's happened and about where to go for help, there will be people available to talk to.

On March 23, from 10 a.m.-noon, we hosted a Resource Fair for the community, with representation from most of the county agencies involved in the recovery effort. And we will be hosting training events, seminars, and other opportunities to gather as a community as we are able.

On Easter Sunday, of course, we will celebrate resurrection with worship at 7 a.m. followed by breakfast, and at 11 a.m. as is our custom. Everyone is welcome to join us at every occasion.

Thank you to all who have made this recovery possible, and helped us to remember that even in dark times, resurrection is just around the corner. ###

# **Drop-in Recovery Information Center Opens at First Presbyterian Church**

Before the storm, the Moonachie First Presbyterian Church basement, lower level, served as a community center.

Sandy destroyed the floors, bookshelves, filing cabinets and appliances.

The floors were replaced with ceramic tiles. Kitchen cabinets are waiting to be installed, and donated chairs and folding tables are in cardboard boxes waiting for their proper place.

"This is the first big room that is being restored in Moonachie. That's one of the reasons why this is so important and one of the reasons why we pushed to get the remediation and rebuilding done here as fast as we could," Pastor Rev. Kimberly Chastain said.

On March 7, 2013, Americorp. volunteers prepped the Moonachie First Presbyterian Church basement for painting.

On March 8, 2013, about 21 Sherwin Williams employees, using about 25 gallons of paint, painted the Church community room, kitchen, bathrooms and hallways.

On March 18, 2013, the finished facility was turned into a volunteer work station that will serve as the Recovery Information Center for residents in Moonachie and Little Ferry who are still rebuilding their storm-damaged homes and businesses.

"This is a drop-in site where residents can work oneon-one with case workers, attorneys and representatives from non-profit organizations that are assisting with the recovery," said Tess Tomasi, the storm recovery project manager for the Volunteer Center of Bergen County. The center will be staffed from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. daily.

## Carlstadt OEM Sandy Report

Late October 2012, the East Coast got hit with Superstorm Sandy.

Days before the storm, Carlstadt Office of Emergency Management got together with Mayor William Roseman and all department heads to go over the emergency plans in preparation for the storm.

All departments had their plans in place and would be ready to go at a minute's notice.

OEM let all departments know we had additional resources available.

Office of Emergency Management sent a reverse 911 call to all registered residents with details of the storm and what to be prepared for.

During the storm updates were sent by Reverse 911 calls.

The night Sandy hit Carlstadt, the power started going out throughout the town.

Hernan Lopez & I started getting calls for help from families with medical needs.

We responded immediately and helped the families by placing them in nearby hotels, supplied generators and gas to residents with life support machines.

We also opened a shelter. We had the shelter in place for the whole time Carlstadt residents were without power, about 72 hours. The shelter was managed by John Wejsa with help from Hernan Lopez and the Carlstadt CERT Team.

The shelter had a warm bed, hot and cold food, snacks,

breakfast and drinks for all. The shelter had a TV to keep everyone informed on the storm at all times.

The CERT members made it fun by talking and playing games with the residents to keep their mind off the storm. We had an EMT on site, to help anyone if needed, by checking vital statistics. We placed a notice on the community bulletin board on Hackensack Street, telling about the shelter. A room was open for cell phones and computers to be charged.

Hernan Lopez and I went on the road periodically checking out all and any needs of residents or departments.

When the Hackensack River and Berry Creek overflowed their banks, the water came up so fast. The Fire Department and Police Department had to evacuate all the workers in the industrial area of Carlstadt. The OEM supplied warm food and drinks for all the first responders.

The power outage caused gas stations to be closed with no gas available. Major gas suppliers could not fill tankers because of no power to pump gas into the tankers.

A local supplier helped the emergency services with gas during this emergency by hand filling all emergency vehicles with gas. Some fuel was given to a few residents to keep generators running for life support machines only.

Carlstadt's entire emergency services performed at the highest standards at all times during the Sandy Emergency, to keep all residents safe and informed at all times. ###

## Little Ferry Hook & Ladder Company Restored



On Wednesday, February 27, 2013, a day before the company celebrated its 92nd birthday, The Little Ferry Hook & Ladder Company No. 1 held a ribbon cutting ceremony at their newly renovated facility.

Heralded as a rebirth for the company, these firefighters joined the massive rescue operation in the hours after the Hackensack flooded.

Along with others in the Borough these firefighters are credited with responding to about 400 calls during and after the storm while many of their own homes sat underwater.

The Main Street landmark built in 1921, sustained damage when its first floor was inundated with 41 inches of floodwater during Superstorm Sandy.

The firefighters gutted the

first floor of their "home." Gone are the waterlogged furniture, warped wood paneling and silt-covered floors that were left behind after the floodwater had subsided.

The Borough of Little Ferry and The Little Ferry Volunteer Fire Department also pitched in to make the renovations possible.

Inspired by the firefighters' story, Rebuilding Together Bergen County, a local chapter of the national nonprofit, heard stories of the firefighters' heroism as they looked for rebuilding projects in the weeks after the storm, Gretchen Viggiano, the group's director, said.

Over the past two months, they brought together many volunteers, some were local firefighters, and rebuilt the interior of the Little Ferry Hook & Ladder Co. No. 1, which involved electrical work, framing, tile, sheetrock/painting, kitchen installation, and replacing two bathrooms.

The group started work on the building back in December.

Rebuilding Together Bergen County, whose mission is to preserve affordable home ownership and revitalize neighborhoods by providing free home repairs for low-income homeowners and for community buildings, brought in volunteers to help the firefighters rip out mold- and water-damaged materials and walls.

With the possibility that the firehouse could flood again: The meeting room had been completely refinished, with precautions that will ensure any

same kind of damage.

Metal, not wooden studs, were placed into the walls, and the cement boards that lay behind the tiles are up to four feet high.

AmeriCorps members assisted with painting, and volunteers from a host of organizations put it back together.

Electricians from IBEW Local 164 donated their time to rewire the building, raising the electrical wiring up to four feet to prevent damage.

A new kitchen, featuring appliances from Sears, was designed and installed by Ulrich. Inc., which donated their professional services.

With the exception of a decade-old Vulcan stove, the kitchen appliances are all new, including cabinets, faucets, granite countertops, a flat screen television and a stainless steel refrigerator that was rolled in during the ceremony.



## Reflections

#### Do You Want to Be Healed?

"When Jesus saw him lying there and knew that he had already been there a long time, he said to him, "Do you want to be healed?" (John 5:6)

For many generations people have debated whether it is God's will to heal.

When in the midst of trials, sicknesses, or challenges, people therefore pray, "Lord, let thy will be done."

The problem is they often don't know what God's will is, and therefore cannot come into full agreement with Him to accomplish it.

In John 5:6 Jesus met a crippled man at the pool of Bethesda located in Jerusalem. Literally translated, Bethesda means "house of mercy," and Jerusalem is the city God intended His glory to dwell.

Put this together and we have a picture of a sick man sitting at the place of mercy in the midst of the city of glory!

It's during this divine meeting we witness the exact opposite of our questioning experience.

Man doesn't ask God if He wants him healed, but rather

God asks man if he wants to be healed!

God knew His own will! It was to heal this crippled man! He wanted the crippled man to be in full agreement with Him! What a picture!

Now Jesus the Healer, arrives at the place of mercy in the city of glory! For the crippled man, the result was not a process, but a provision! He was healed and Jesus was glorified!

If you have been questioning whether or not God wants to heal you, come to know God's will! He desires to bring healing at the place of mercy (the cross), to you, the place for God's intended glory. (see 1 Corinthians 3:16;6:19)

Have faith in God's desire to glorify Himself in You!

He is health, He is strength, and He is life! Sickness is pain, weakness, and death! God is only glorified by things that are of His glory, and God and sickness are nothing alike!

God desires for you to receive your healing! No longer debate God's promise, receive it! ###


> Deacon Frank Materia of Our Lady of Assumption Church, Wood-Ridge, offered an invocation and thanked the



#### **Hose Off The Deck**

With a garden hose and strong (preferably long handled) brush, use the strongest spray setting on the nozzle to break up dirt on the surface. Follow this with the brush to loosen any stubborn soil. This works especially well with two

people, who can take turns hosing and scrubbing. To remove tree sap from wood decks, apply mineral spirits with an old rag, rub and wash off with dishwashing liquid and water (1 teaspoon of dishwashing liquid to 1 quart of hot water). Rinse well. ###

## Filling You In

#### The Facts of Life

Due to advances in medicine and an increase in prolonged life expectancy, the number of older people will continue to increase worldwide.

It is essential that all older adults practice and maintain good oral hygiene due to the high correlation between oral health and general health.

## How should I care for my teeth as I get older?

Maintaining good oral health is not only vital to your systemic health—it can keep you smiling well into retirement.

Brushing at least twice a day with fluoridated toothpaste and a soft-bristle brush is as important as ever.

Flossing is very important, too—it helps to remove plaque from between teeth and below the gumline that your toothbrush cannot reach.

# Am I more prone to certain oral conditions as I age?

As you age, you may be more likely to develop gingivitis. Gingivitis is caused by the bacteria found in plaque that attack the gums.

Symptoms of gingivitis include red, swollen gums and bleeding when you brush. If you have these symptoms, see a dentist.

Gingivitis can lead to periodontal disease if problems persist. In the worst cases, bacteria form in pockets between the teeth and gums, weakening the bone and causing the gums to recede, pulling back from teeth. This can lead to tooth loss if left untreated.

As you age, changes in salivary flow and content may further lead to gingivitis, as well as cavities.

Because approximately 80 percent of all American adults suffer from some form of gingivitis, it's important to see your dentist twice a year for regular cleanings and checkups.

If regular oral care is too difficult for you (see below), your dentist can provide alternatives to aid in brushing and flossing.

## What if arthritis makes brushing too difficult?

Certain dental products are designed to make dental care less painful for people who have arthritis.

It is sometimes recommended that people with arthritis try securing their toothbrush to a wider object, such as a ruler, to ease arthritic hand pain while brushing.

Electric toothbrushes also can help by doing some of the work for you. Ask your dentist for other suggestions.

## What are the signs of oral cancer?

Oral cancer is one of the most common cancers, with roughly 35,000 new cases reported annually in the United States.

Oral cancer most often occurs in people who are older than age 40. Oral cancer can form in any part of the mouth or throat.

If not diagnosed and treated in its early stages, oral cancer can spread, leading to chronic pain, loss of function, irreparable facial and oral disfigurement following surgery, and even death.

Oral cancer has one of the lowest five-year survival rates of all cancers; this is primarily due to late diagnosis.

See a dentist immediately if you notice any of the following: red or white patches on your gums or tongue, a sore that fails to heal within two weeks, bleeding in your mouth, loose teeth, problems or pain swallowing, a lump in your neck.

Your dentist should perform a head and neck exam to screen for oral cancer during routine checkups.

## What can I do about dry mouth?

As you age, you may develop dry mouth. Dry mouth (xerostomia) happens when salivary glands fail to work due to disease, certain medications, or cancer treatment.

The condition can make it hard to eat, swallow, taste, and speak. Drinking lots of water and avoiding sweets, tobacco, alcohol, and caffeine are some ways to fight dry mouth.

Your dentist also can prescribe medications to ease the symptoms of severe dry mouth.

#### What else can I do to maintain good oral health?

Studies have shown that maintaining a healthy mouth may keep your body healthier and help you to avoid diabetes, heart disease, and stroke.

Older patients who are planning to enter a nursing home should inquire about onsite dental care.

People who do not have teeth still need to visit the dentist regularly, since many aspects of oral health, such as adjusting dentures and oral cancer screenings, can be handled during routine dental visits. The best way to achieve good oral health is to visit your dentist at least twice a year.



## Veterans Today

On May 3, 2013, at 6:30 p.m., the Ladies Auxiliary of V.F.W. Post 809 will hold their annual Spring Tricky Tray Auction. The cost will be \$10. The address is 100 Main Street, Little Ferry, NJ. So come on out and help the Ladies with their fund raiser. There will be cake and coffee as well.

#### The Red Baron

On 14 April 1917, in the skies over Lens, Belgium, Lt. William Russell was flying on patrol. He and five other planes of his squadron saw a German plane and immediately moved in to attack. He fired some rounds at the plane and they quickly realized the plane was not alone.

A German plane was soon on his tail and he could not shake his pursuer. His plane was soon riddled with bullets. He was forced to crash land behind enemy lines and wasquickly taken prisoner. It was his lucky day. He didn't know it at the time, but the plane that shot him down was being flown by Germany's Ace of Aces, Manfred Von Richthofen.

History and legend have another name for him, The Red Baron. I say Lt. Russell was lucky because he survived. Most pilots that found Von Richthofen behind them did not.

Airplanes in warfare were in their infancy at this time. They were used to scout enemy positions and drop grenades, small bombs and machine gun enemy troops. The Allies and the Germans both did this and when the two sides met in the air the fighter pilot was born.

Born on May 2, 1892, Manfred Von Richthofen was called a Freiherr because he was born into nobility. Freiherr is a hereditary title and means Free Lord in English but can also translate to the word Baron.

He tended to paint his plane red to distinguish his plane from those of the other pilots he led. Good military leaders lead from the front. In the skies over the Western Front in World War it was no different. Von Richthofen led his men into combat in the air and the Allies soon noted the Pilot in the Red Plane.

He had many nicknames but the Red Baron is the one that stuck. He was credited with his 44th aerial victory when Lt. Russell went down.

He didn't start his military career with airplanes. He was first with the Cavalry on the Eastern Front but the times had changed and planes did many of the Recon missions the Cavalry used to do. So he found it boring and requested a transfer to the Air Service. He was a quick student and learned to be a pilot under the tutelage of Oswald Boelcke, an Ace and Commander of Jasta 2. Jasta is short for Jagdstaffeln or hunting section. Basically a group of fighter planes sent to seek and destroy enemy planes.

#### The Blue Max

Around Boelcke's neck hung the Pour le Merite. This award was Germany's top award for Valor and every young fighter pilot wanted to win it. Von Richthofen certainly wanted one as well.

The Pour le Merite is a Blue Maltese Cross with gold Eagles or Oak Leaves. The name is French because it was created by Fredrick the Great of Prussia and he spoke French. Pour le Merite translates to For Merit in English. During the time of World War I, the Germans never changed it. So it was commonly called the Blue Max.

Von Richthofen shot down two planes in his young aviation career, but they could not be confirmed because one crashed on the enemy side of the front and the other was not witnessed.

He didn't get credit for them. He didn't get his first confirmed kill until 17 September 1916 when he attacked a British plane. He got behind it and fired a burst into the engine and it stopped running. The plane glided to the ground and the British machine gunner stationed behind the pilot kept shooting. Von Richthofen killed him with a quick burst and he landed nearby and checked the pilot. He was alive but died before medics could get to him.

The Baron kept meticulous records of all the planes he took down. Serial numbers of planes, names of pilots and observers when possible. The weather conditions and place and time of the combat were recorded in his reports. The more information he could collect the better. The more flights he took the better he got. He shot down more planes and had a total of 10 kills by November 1916.

One of his more impressive battles took place on November 23, 1916 when he met Major Lanoe Hawker in aerial combat. Hawker was England's first Ace. Hawker had two planes besides his own when the battle took place. Von Richthofen had two planes with him as well. The dog fight was frantic. The two English planes with Hawker were driven off.

They did manage to shoot a German plane down, but

Hawker was left by himself in a duel with Von Richthofen at 3,000 meters above the Western Front. Hawkers and the Baron circled and jockeyed for position. Hawker realized he was alone with the enemy so he made a dash for his side of the front lines.

It was a mistake. Von Richthofen followed and fired hundreds of rounds at him. One went through Hawkers' head. This Victory was a tremendous morale boost to the German Army. The German High Command now noticed Von Richthofen.

On January 4, 1917, he shot down his 16th kill and was awarded the Pour le Merite. All this didn't come easy. The dog fights were swift, terrible and deadly. He didn't win them all.

On March 6, 1917 his squadron was in a tremendous dog fight east of Lens. He made a mistake when he attacked a plane and didn't look behind him. An enemy plane fired on him and took out his engine.

He said petrol leaked out and he glided to the ground and landed. Incredibly he survived and that afternoon flew again and shot down his 24th airplane.

He kept adding to his total. On July 2, 1917, he shot down his 57th plane. It was an incredible amount in any war. Von Richthofen escaped death again after he got too close to an enemy plane and was shot in the head. He was momentarily paralyzed and his plane plummeted to the ground. He recovered quick enough to land it and he survived again.

By the time April 1918 came around, he had 74 Aerial Combat Victories. On the 20th of April he shot down his 80th plane. On the 21st of April his luck ran out. He found himself and his squadron in combat again and chased a plane too far and too low over enemy territory.

Soldiers on the ground fired on the Red Tri Plane as it chased the Allied plane. A RAF pilot, Roy Brown, turned his plane to help the Allied plane.

In pursuit, Brown also fired on the Red Baron. Manfred Von Richthofen was shot in the chest and he crash landed his plane. He quickly died from the wound. No one can say for certain if he was shot from the ground or from the air, but the results are the same. The Red Baron was no more.

His plane was torn to pieces by souvenir hunters so it was not able to be examined to determine who fired the fatal shot. The Allies gave him a Military funeral and buried him with honor. On November 11, 1918 after four years of war, Germany would surrender ending World War I.

This April marks 95 years

after he was shot down. From what I can tell, he was a brave and honorable warrior for his country. Equally brave and honorable were the Canadian and English Airmen he fought.

He is remembered more now for fighting Snoopy in the Peanuts cartoons. Make no mistake about it the Red Baron's count of 80 confirmed airplanes shot down along with 123 men have never been matched. He is truly the world's Ace of Aces.

For a complete list of his military career and battles I recommend a book titled "Under the Guns of the Red Baron" written by three authors working together. The book is fascinating and well written. It contains all the men he fought and how the battles went.

America has her Aces too. In World War II we had Major Richard Bong, who shot down 40 Japanese planes in the Pacific. He currently holds the highest total for Americans. Major Thomas McGuire of New Jersey shot down 38 Japanese planes. McGuire Air Force Base is named in his honor. Both of our Airmen received the Congressional Medal of Honor. ###

It was through the efforts of the VFW that [in 1958] Loyalty Day was officially established by Congress as the 1st of May each year.

The VFW made this effort to provide one day each year for Americans to display publicly the patriotism and loyalty that they have for their country.

Patriotism, service and loyalty are but overt displays of belief in the principles, ideals and institutions of government of a

Wood-Ridge VFW Post country. And, such beliefs are 6 Commander Joseph Ce-the basis of a nation's strength.

The VFW is a caring organization and we are ever ready to stand up and speak out because we remember the commitment, hardships and sacrifices of those who served this nation with honor and we recognize that it is our sacred duty to see that the rest of the country remembers.

Loyalty Day has become a tradition with the VFW. With the passage of Public Law 85-0529 on July 18, 1958, the VFW won a long, hard battle to have this day approved by the United States Congress.

Veterans of Foreign Wars Posts and Ladies Auxiliaries across the country celebrate this Loyalty Day as the keynote of their All Americanism program. They emphasize the birth of the U.S., as a free and independent nation. Public programs include parades, flag ceremonies and other patriotic activities participated in, and witnessed by, millions of youth groups, schools, colleges, Churches, organizations and individuals.

This year marks the 55th anniversary of Loyalty Day. N.J. State Senator and Mayor of Wood-Ridge, Paul Sarlo, will be the guest speaker.

## WRFD Fire Watch Detail for Persian Festival of Fire

On Tuesday, March 19, 2013, the Wood-Ridge Fire Department and EMS Squad was dispatched to The Fiesta for a "Fire Watch" detail for the Persian "Festival of Fire." This is the 10th year that this event was held at the **Fiesta**.

The Department reviewed the fire stations located in the parking lot and made necessary spacing adjustments. Firefighters lighted the rows of fires with flares.

Working with the organizers, firefighters established a safe perimeter and procedures.

At about 7:30 p.m., just before the main course, participants departed the main banquet hall to the parking lot.

The central focus of the evening was the "Festival of Fire" or Chahar Shanbeh Soori (literally means "Eve of Wednesday").

Families lined up outside in the dark to take turns jumping safely over a row of small fires, as a celebration of thanks for the new year.

As they jump over the fire,

they say, "The redness of the fire to my cheeks; the yellow of my skin to the fire," using the warmth of the fire to remove the evils of the past year to start the new year fresh.

Firefighters were strategically located and carefully monitored each jump, watchful that no one was burned (or clothing caught fire). They assisted those who were unsteady.

If fire embers were disturbed, firefighters quickly reset the fire.

At the end of the fire line,

firefighters kept the egress area open and checked that all were safe.

At the conclusion, the Department extinguished the fires with water, dispersed embers with tools, pushed the fire stations into a central area and rechecked that the fires were out.

Over 400 attended this Persian New Year, Nowruz, at the Fiesta. Nowruz is observed on the last Tuesday of winter, just before the Vernal Equinox or first moment of spring.

This Persian Festival pre-

dates Islam and is estimated to be about 2,500 years old.

The holiday is believed to have been invented by Zoroaster. The Zoroastrian custom, which has no religious significance, celebrates Persian culture.

A larger celebration will be held April 14, 2013 at the Persian Day Parade 10th Anniversary along Madison Avenue in New York City. For more information go to www.nypp. org. ###
