






Postcard & Paper Ephemera Show



Still without Lena to lead the way there would not have been any colored Easter eggs... or Easter itself for that matter... not in my house anyway. Same for the rest of the holidays including my birthday...heaven forbid!

My dad, my brother, my dog and I were just along for the ride and enjoying every joy filled moment of it...until it was time to go to Church.

That's when I had to step into those new Tom McCann shoes and squeeze my husky rear end into those pinchy dress

God, how I hated those torturous pants! Not only were they painfully uncomfortable... they made my back side look even bigger than it was.

I went through a chubby stage as a kid and every moment of it was spent in those horrible pants! I dreaded having to look at myself in them. My legs resembled a couple of Virginia hams attached to a Ford station wagon. Worse yet there was always a pretty girl sitting behind me!

"You look fine!" my mother insisted "Now sit down and be quiet.

Sitting down in those sand paper baloney sacks was agonizing, especially when the

Then came the embarrassment that accompanied the standup...sitting down, kneeling, standing up again only to repeat the process again a few minutes later. Each time that I stood up I'd begin the unenviable task of relieving myself of that ferocious itch without being conspicuous... which was nothing short of impossible.

"Stop scratching yourself" my mom whispered. "You're embarrassing me!"

But that's not all I remember about Easter Sunday. Everyone dressed up in a special way...Easter bonnets...new suits. Colorful spring dresses... flowers and chocolate bunnies.

It was all topped off with a wonderful home cooked meal surrounded by some of your favorite people on earth...and some not so favorite. It all centered on Jesus. The only God I ever knew...I only wish that he'd have shown a little mercy on the chubby kid in the pinchy pants.

For some reason I always got sick around Easter time. Maybe it was all the hard boiled eggs. That's when my mom called Dr. Latona.

Whenever I saw that big black caddy pull up in front of my Arnot Street home I knew immediately that trouble in the form of Dr. Latona and his butt searching needle had arrived.

Even Dusty our trusted watchdog hid in the living room under the magazine table when the good doctor showed up.

If I was lucky Dr. Latona... ck bag in hand and a lit cigarette dangling from his lower lip like it was glued there... would pass by our living room door and head up stairs and into the apartment of my two unsuspecting cousins Marie and Kathy.

The Frankenstein monster, Dracula and the Wolf Man combined could not have instilled as much fear and panic into my two cousins as did the sound of those heavy footsteps plodding up those creaky stairs.

If that didn't work out came the hot brick application. Wherever the problem was there went the hot brick wrapped in newspaper...hopefully yesterday's. One day my father walked in and asked my mother how the Yankees made out. "How do I know?" she answered. "I didn't read the brick today!" After the hot brick, the next thing you heard was "call the Doctor!" ###







I Had Medical Coverage ... How come Medicare is charging me a 10 % Penalty?

At least once a month I get a phone call with a frantic individual on the other end that is questioning me on "Why is Medicare charging me a penalty for not having health coverage when I was covered under my employer?" The second question I am asked is "Why do I have to wait until January to get this straightened out?"

Every month, approximately 250,000 Americans turn 65 years of age.

Today, many Baby Boomers are working past 65 to keep active but in most situations it is because of economic uncertainty and the need for money to support themselves.

Depending on your retirement age 65 or 66 you will get Part A (Hospital Coverage) of Medicare free as long as you worked 40 quarters (or a spouse that you are dependent on worked the time) which equates to roughly 10 years of employment.

Part B (Medical Coverage) of Medicare can be waived if you work for an employer that has more than 20 employees thus allowing your company's health plan to be Primary and cover you. If the company has under 20 employees you would need to apply for Part B (pay the monthly premium) and Medicare would be Primary.

Now I decide to retire at age 70

The large corporation that I work for sends me papers to enroll in Cobra. I like my health plan while working because it gave me good coverage plus dental and vision. I decide to go on Cobra for 18 months and I don't sign up for Part B of Medicare.

Section 2 – Signing Up For Medicare Part A & Part B of the 2015 Medicare & You Handbook states ...

You have 8 months to sign up for Part B without a penalty. This period will run whether or not you choose COBRA. If you choose COBRA, don't wait until your COBRA ends to enroll in Part B. If you don't enroll in Part B during the 8 months after the employment ends, you may have to pay a penalty after you enroll for as long as you have Part B.

You won't be able to enroll until the next General Enrollment Period (*January to March*), and you'll have to wait

until July 1 of that year before your coverage begins. This may cause a gap in your health care coverage.

Many individuals think the Part B rule starts when CO-BRA ends in 18 months. They are not aware that the Special Enrollment Period begins the month they lose their company benefits or employment ends and go on COBRA. They now go to enroll in Part B and are shocked to find out that they are penalized 10 percent each year or 12 month period, they could have had Part B, but didn't. The penalty goes all the way back to the day you turned 65 or the day Part A began.

When working past 65 you must go online or contact Social Security for the CMS-L564 and CMS-40B forms then take them to your employer to answer questions verifying you worked for them past your 65th birthday and that you had health coverage.

In the scenario above a 70 year old gentleman could pay a penalty of an additional \$52.50 added onto the regular \$104.90 Part B deduction for not having the Part B coverage for 5 years. This penalty along with the Part D (Prescription Drug) penalty of 1% will stay with you for life.

My advice is always have Part B in place when leaving your job or losing your company benefits. ###

How Can Gum Disease Affect My Cardiovascular Health?

Researchers are finding possible links between periodontal (gum) infections and other diseases throughout the body.

Current studies suggest that there may be a link between gum disease and cardiovascular disease.

In fact, some research suggests that gum disease may be a serious risk factor for heart disease like high blood pressure (hypertension), smoking, high cholesterol, gender and age. Studies suggest that people who have gum disease seem to be at a higher risk for heart attacks, although no one is certain how this relationship works.

Your oral health affects your overall health, but studies that will find exactly why these problems are linked are still underway.

The current theory is that bacteria present in infected gums can come loose and move throughout the body.

The same bacteria that cause gum disease and irritate your gums might travel to your arteries. Researchers are unsure what causes the bacteria to become mobile, but it has been suggested that bacteria can be dislodged and enter the bloodstream during tasks as simple as brushing, flossing or even chewing.

Research shows that your risk of developing cardiovascular disease varies according to the severity of gum infection. The worse the infection, the more likely the bacteria are to become blood-borne.

Infected gums bleed, making it easier for bacteria to enter your bloodstream. If bacteria become dislodged, the bacteria can enter through cuts or sores in your mouth and can travel to other parts of the body through your bloodstream.

If bacteria reach the arteries, they can irritate them in the same way that they irritate gum tissue.

This could cause arterial plaque to accumulate, which can cause hardening of the arteries and decreased or blocked blood flow.

Compromised blood flow to your heart can cause a heart attack. Also, arterial plaque can come loose and travel to other parts of the body. If a blockage occurs in the brain, it can cause a stroke.

Keep your mouth healthy! Gum disease is a serious gum infection that should always be taken seriously. Although gum disease can often show few or no symptoms at all, watch for gums that are red and irritated or bleed easily. There are many new treatments available to control and help reverse gum disease.

Remember, gum disease is caused by plaque buildup. Brush and floss regularly to remove plaque that you can't see below the gumline, and remember to schedule regular checkups.

If you remove the plaque, you minimize the chance for getting gum disease. If you have any questions about your oral health, ask your dentist.





Veterans Today

How important is leadership?

At some point in everyone's life, they will lead something, whether in sports, work, military, or what have you. It is the inevitable process of life. The young must become leaders as the old pass on.

The fabric of our society is woven by good strong American leadership. Everything in life is led by someone. So you can be assured that leadership is important. Life depends on someone taking charge. Great things happen when there is good leadership.

On the other hand, disaster awaits those that have no leader. This April marks the 150th anniversary of two sides of the same coin, the perfect example of leadership, one team with a leader and one with none.

By March of 1865 the Civil War had turned to the favor of the Union forces.

Robert E. Lee's Army of Northern Virginia was holding a defensive position from Richmond to Petersburg, Virginia. He was lacking supplies of every sort and especially new recruits. The army under his command and the existence of the Confederate States of America hung in the balance.

At this point he had teenagers and old men in his line. After four years of war the South had no more men.

Now the students of this era will note that basically

all hope for the Confederates is lost. Still and all the war continued.

Union General Ulysses Grant was looking to end the war as soon as possible. He knew Lee needed supplies. He ordered General Phil Sheridan to attack the Petersburg line near Fords Depot and take possession of the Southside

If Sheridan was successful, the supply line to Lee's army would be cut off. Sheridan marched his Command to attack the railroad by way of a road junction known as Five Forks. It's called Five Forks because five roads meet at this

Confederate General Lee did not underestimate this move. He knew the importance of the rail line. He ordered Major General George Pickett to protect the road at Five Forks at all hazard.

General Pickett moved his Division to defend the crossroads. He ran into Sheridan's forces on March 31, 1865. After a brief engagement he ordered his command to dig in at the Five Forks. They used logs and dirt to build a rough defensive position.

General Phil Sheridan was a Cavalry Officer. He realized he would need more men than just his horsemen to take the position. He asked for reinforcements and General Grant gave him Major General Gouverneur Warren's Fifth Corps.

Now with Infantry support

Sheridan made a move and attack. He decided to press the Confederate position with the cavalry and keep them occupied while the infantry moved to attack the left flank.

With cavalry on one side and infantry on the other, he hoped that the Confederates will not be able to sustain the assault and fall back. He planned to attack the next day, on April 1, 1865.

Now as dawn broke and General Sheridan got ready for the battle, an odd turn of events happened on the other side. General George Pickett was invited to a "Shad Bake." Now if you didn't know already, a shad is a fish and someone he knew caught some large shad and invited the General to the bake to enjoy some fresh fish. He accepted the offer and on the morning of April 1 went two miles behind the lines and attended the bake along Hatchers Run.

Why the General in immediate command would do this is strange. We know he could not have known an attack was coming that day, but given the circumstances there was reason to believe he would be attacked. He was ordered to protect the roads at all cost. By going two miles away he basically removed himself from command and left the Confederates with no one in charge.

Sheridan moved his troops to attack. He wanted Brigadier General Samuel Crawford to lead his division on an attack on the Confederate left flank.

He wanted Brigadier General Romeyn Ayres to lead his division on Crawford's left side and engage the Rebel Army protecting Crawford's left.

He kept Brigadier General Charles Griffin's Division in reserve to aid the infantry where needed. He then ordered General George Armstrong Custer to take his Cavalry and press the Confederate right flank to hold them in their position till the Infantry can flank the

As battles go, things soon went wrong. Crawford's men missed the Confederate left flank and by the time they realized their mistake they were receiving enfilading fire from the rebels in the earthworks. Ayres' Division hit the rebel line and the battle was mass confusion do to Crawford missing his target.

Griffin held his troops in reserve and decided not to add to the confusion and held his place. Custer, as always, was in the front of his troops and rode head on into battle and engaged the rebel right flank as was planned.

General Warren was trying to fix the problem with Crawford's Division and get them back to the proper position but was getting nowhere. His messengers were not getting through and he was losing control of the battle. Here is where good leadership comes in.

General Sheridan was irritated with the results so far. He rode to Warren's position and took personal charge of the situation.

Riding at the head of Warren's troops he went to Crawford's position and directed them to the proper position. Finally in the right spot, Sheridan personally led the charge that collapsed the Confederate left flank.

As the left of the line fell back from the oncoming Union Army, the Rebel right fell apart as Custer caved it in with his Michigan Wolverines. Pickett's troops began to retreat all across the line. Nearly 3,000 Confederates were killed, wounded or taken prisoner.

All this was happening and Pickett was two miles away eating shad.

His first hint that there was a problem was when he saw Union Troops on the other side of Hatchers' Run.

He jumped on his horse and rode to where the battle was and what he found was rebels running in the opposite direction. He ordered a Captain to take his men and open a spot so he could get to the Five Forks. This did no more than get the Captain and some of his men killed. When the Captain went down mortally wounded, Pickett rode off.

The Southside Railroad was taken by Union forces and General Lee sent a message to Confederate President Jefferson Davis. Davis was at Mass when the courier rode up.

The note from Lee stated that he could no longer defend Richmond or the Petersburg line. Lee took his small army on the road to Appomattox.

Within a week the Army of Northern Virginia would surrender and the war was basically over at that point.

Sheridan showed what good leadership is all about. He ran into a problem and personally fixed it.

He was there to make the necessary changes that would give his men the best possible chance of victory.

Pickett, on the other hand was nowhere to be found. He couldn't change anything. When his men needed leadership the most, he let them

No matter what you do in life, if you take a leadership role, never forget that those under you expect you to lead. You sure don't want to become the next April fool. ###

Spring! Upside and Downside

It's spring, the real estate prime buying season - eager homebuyers emerging from winter hibernation to look for their dream homes!

It's also - for those of you unaware of these things - termite swarming season. Winged termites are also emerging and legions of them are out in search of new places to establish their colonies.

A lot of people don't know it, but these critters cause billions of dollars in property damage every year. They primarily feed on wood, but also damage paper, books, insulation and even swimming pool liners and filtration systems. Termites can injure living trees and shrubs, but more often are a secondary invader of woody plants already in decline.

quickly drop to the ground where they shed their wings, pair off with a mate, and attempt to begin new colonies in the soil.

Inside your house they seldom survive long. You can easily remove them with a vacuum. But their mere presence indicates that your place is infested.

More often, though, there will be no visible indication of termite presence. That's because they're cryptic little creatures - infestations can go undetected for years, with them hidden behind walls, floor coverings, insulation and other obstructions.

Termite feeding and damage can even progress undetected in wood that's exposed because the outer surface is typically left intact. It usually requires, therefore, the trained eye of a licensed pest professional to detect an infestation of wood-destroying organisms (known in the trade as WDOs). A WDO inspection is different from a simple structural inspection.

Buyers may assume that the person who does the prepurchase home inspection will look for termites while assessing the condition of the home's physical structure and systems. While some inspectors might spot signs of termite damage, others will not.

Buyers should, therefore, be sure to have their prospective home inspected by a licensed pest professional.

The inspection will last about an hour, and the specialist will probe the home from top to bottom to look for telltale signs of termite damage.

After the inspection is over, the specialist will report to the buyers what he or she has found, and an estimate of how much it might cost to remediate any termite damage he or she has discovered.

Termite detection, remediation and control are not do-it-yourself tasks. If an inspector finds signs of a termite infestation and damage, you'll need professionals to remedy the problem.

Buyers who discover problems before the sale are better able to negotiate with the seller to take care of the problem.

The sale can't be finalized until the damage is addressed because lenders will refuse to grant a mortgage on a home with unresolved termite issues.

If the termite inspection shows your new home is pestfree, congratulations! You're one of the luckier ones - exterminators find some damage, usually very minor, in 7 of every 10 homes they inspect in Bergen County. And even after the sale is closed it's a good idea to protect your home by having it inspected every 2 or 3 years.

That way you'll be sure to avoid any potentially embarrassing problems in the spring: like (God forbid!) swatting winged termites over the Easter/Passover dinner table...






ERFD Duplex Fire



Smoky Sonic Morning

On February 23, 2015, at about 7:57 a.m., a Sonic Drive-in employee turned on the fryers causing a grease fire. The employee flagged down a passing HHPD officer to report a fire.

The Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department responded to a heavy smoke condition, but no visible fire. Route 17 North was closed for a little under an hour. Southbound lanes remained open. A second alarm was called, with about 30 firefighters from Little Ferry, Lodi, Moonachie, Wallington and Wood-Ridge Fire Departments responding.

It was reported that there

was a fire in the kitchen's hot oil system that spread to the walls and ventilation system.

Boulevard Fire Draws Mutual Aid

Three families, totaling 12 people and their pets, from second floor apartments were displaced, with first floor businesses Hasbrouck Heights Pizzeria and R-Tist Hair Salon, shuttered due to a fire reported about 1:07 p.m. on March 12, 2015.

Henry's Deli, H & L Printing and other businesses and apartments along that commercial business strip were spared.

It was reported that a Heights Pizzeria employee, spotted smoke near a back door of a hallway between the pizzeria and salon and sounded the alarm. They used a fire extinguisher, but couldn't put it out.

Heights Engine 2 was first

on the scene, dropping and charging a 5" line to a hydrant on Central Avenue, and feeding several two-inch attack lines.

Moonachie Tower 805 was positioned at the Exxon service station and worked the roof. Lodi Tower T-1 worked the roof from Central Avenue side of the building.

Firefighters overhauled the back of the building and second floor apartments extensively, to reveal any fire extensions in the ceilings and walls.

It appeared that the fire originated in the rear of the hair salon and went up the walls and roof as well as traveled within the tin ceilings.

Second, third and later, a fourth alarm was called to draw Fire Departments from Carlstadt, East Rutherford, Little Ferry, Lodi, Moonachie, Rochelle Park, Wood-Ridge and Wallington. Heights and Moonachie EMS and PSE&G were on the scene.

The fire was under control within an hour, but firefighters stayed on the scene several hours to check for extensions and overhaul.

Hasbrouck Heights Borough Hall building was not affected. No injuries were reported. The fire is under investigation but not deemed suspicious. ###
















Avalon Blaze Quickly Snuffed

The corner of a trash conparking garage and the structure appeared to be the source of fire at Avalon at Wesmont Station in Wood-Ridge on March 19, 2015.

Firefighters got ahead of Residents returned within two hours. No residents were displaced.
