Hackensack Riverkeeper is pleased to announce its 2016 Eco-Program schedule.

The clean water advocacy group is poised to provide thousands of people with an enjoyable & educational experience

of the river, its watershed and wildlife. Riverkeeper's Eco-Cruises, Guided Paddles, boat rentals, River Cleanups, Bird-Walks and indoor presentations combine environmental education with public service and fun.

The new season begins Earth Day Weekend (April 23-24) with the re-opening of the organization's Paddling Center at Laurel Hill Park in Secaucus and Overpeck Park Kayak Center in Teaneck. The Eco-Program season runs through the end of October.

Hackensack Riverkeeper offers a series of eight distinct Eco-Program opportunities:

- **Eco-Cruises.** Hackensack Riverkeeper's signature environmental education programs. Forty open Eco-Cruises are scheduled from May 1 through October 15.

Full Pink Moon

The April full moon will appear on Friday, April 22, 2016, at 1:24 a.m. It is called the "Full Pink Moon."

According to the "Farmer's Almanac," this name came from the herb, moss pink, or wild ground phlox, which is one of the earliest widespread flowers of the spring.

Other names include the "Full Sprouting Grass Moon," the "Egg Moon," and, among Coastal tribes, the "Full Fish Moon," because this was the time that the shad swam upstream to spawn.

The Native American Indians of the northern and eastern United States kept track of the seasons by giving a name to each recurring full moon. European settlers followed the custom. ###

EPA Finalizes Passaic River Cleanup

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency finalized a plan to remove 3.5 million cubic yards of toxic sediment from the lower eight miles of the Passaic River in New Jersey, followed by capping that entire stretch of river bottom.

The sediment in the Passaic River is severely contaminated with dioxin, PCBs, heavy metals, pesticides and other contaminants from more than a century of industrial activity.

The lower eight miles of the Passaic is the most heavily contaminated section of the river. Ninety percent of the volume of contaminated sediments in the river are in the lower eight miles.

The 3.5 million cubic yards of contaminated sediment will be removed by dredging the river bottom, bank-to-bank, from Newark Bay to the Belleville/Newark border. The cleanup is estimated to cost \$1.38 billion. *Source: Elias Rodriguez, EPA.* ###







On March 2, 2016, STEM community advisor Bill Helphingstine brought Pierrepont's STEM Club to the the Vex IQ Bank Shot Robotics Competition at South Hackensack Memorial School.

Pierrepont students faced off against twelve other school districts in a variety of team challenges. The Pierrepont team had the distinct accomplishment of winning all divisions and brought home a trophy for the overall win and two individual category plaques.

Challenges included a teamwork challenge whereby two robots work together to complete a task; a robot skills challenge whereby one robot scores points moving a series of balls up a ramp and over to a goal area under driver control; and a programming skills challenge whereby a robot scores as many points as possible autonomously.

Artful Thinking

Lodi's Micheline "Micky" Satkowski was born Micheline Leroy Monge in Henin Lietard, France on September 29, 1926.

She grew up in the safe surroundings of her parents, Louis and Emilie, along with her two older brothers, Pierre and Claude.

In the spring of 1938, Micheline's father, a successful insurance salesman, was transferred to the city of Bethune which is located just below the Belgium border.

"My father took over for a man who was retiring," said Micky. "He saw it as a chance to prosper in a large city."

No sooner did Micky, (a nickname she was given as a teenager), now an 11 year old, settle into her new environs, when the Germans invaded Austria and were continuing north into Czechoslovakia.

Louis, a Veteran of WW1, was immediately called back into active duty. Suddenly Micky's world of flower gardens and rosy faced dolls was in danger of being shattered by a monster whose thirst for death and destruction was yet to be fully realized. "Hitler then made a promise not to invade other countries." Recalls Micky "with that my father was discharged from the Army."

Less than a year later, Adolf Hitler and his Nazi war machine had marched into Poland. On September 3, 1939 France and England had no recourse but to declare war on Germany. Micky's childhood was giving way to the experience of war.

Louis was called back into the military. "Luckily my father was again discharged in the spring of 1940," recalls Micky "In May of that year the Nazi's invaded Belgium, Luxembourg, the Netherlands and finally France."

That June, amid the distant sounds of war, Louis and his loved ones fled to a cousin's home located in the coastal village of Campigneulles Les' Grandes. Micky, now 13 years old, had just been released from the hospital where she was treated for a ruptured appendix. "If that wasn't enough. "Said Micky, "we had to leave our dog Poupette behind."

It was during that time when Micky saw her first German soldier. "We just froze in our tracks," sighed Micky as she relived the encounter.

"They drove by on a motorcycle with a side car as we played in the yard. They stopped, gave us a long expressionless stare, and then drove away."

A few weeks later, sensing

that it was safe to return home, Louis gathered his family and made his way back to Bethune. They approached the house with caution not knowing what or who might be lying in wait.

Once inside they noticed a machine gun, still smoking, on the table the barrel of which was facing the back window. The walls, riddled with bullet holes, gave evidence of the battle that ensued a few hours earlier. "All of the windows were gone." Said Micky "The Germans used them to cross muddy streams."

Suddenly from out of the hallway, wagging her tail in delight, crept the family dog Poupette. Micky ran to the side of her black and white Terrier only to find a litter of lifeless puppies huddled together in the corner of the room.

Unable to fend for themselves the ill-fated pups succumbed to the hostile conditions. Poupette managed to stay alive by eating the fat that was left to congeal in a frying pan. "I saw her teeth marks in the fat." Recalls Micky, "She had managed to beat the odds and her barking, no doubt, kept the looters away."

It became a vow of Micky's mother to keep the dog and to share with her the families lessening food supply. "Families couldn't feed themselves let alone their pets." said Micky. "Life as I once knew it did not exist any longer." Poupette remained with the family for the duration of the war and then some.

In October of 1940, Micky's 21 year old brother Pierre, a high school teacher, was taken prisoner by the Nazi's and was forced to work repairing railroad tracks.

Knowing that his family had no clue as to his whereabouts Pierre wrote his name, address and location on a small piece of paper.

By a stroke of good fortune a fellow countryman noticed the paper fall from Pierre's hand. Later, in the shadow of twilight, the Frenchman retrieved the note and returned it to the Leroy Monge family.

At last Louis and his wife Emilie knew that their son Pierre was alive and well. Until then they were experiencing a living nightmare. "My father went to where my brother was" said Micky. "He made sure that Pierre saw him just to let him know that the family was aware of his location."

Three months later, on Christmas Eve, 1940, Pierre was released from the Nazi work camp and was allowed to

return to the awaiting embrace of his family.

Meanwhile, the war in Europe had intensified and so too the horrors of Nazi occupation. "Our house was at the end of the street," said Micky, "The German soldiers used to park in our drive way and glare at us. How intimidating they were."

By mid-1940, Allied planes began dropping leaflets of hope to the French people below who were being held against their will in the Nazi death grip.

German soldiers perched themselves high in the Church tower overlooking the town square. They served as an ominous reminder that anyone caught reading those flyers would be dealt with harshly. "You could hear the soldiers climbing up the tower during our Mass." Remembers Micky, "This went on from 1940 to 1944 and you didn't know how or when it would end."

Micky and her friends defied the Nazi threat and read those flyers even at the risk of being caught. "It is better to live in the glimmer of hope," said Micky, "than to die slowly in the darkness of despair."

By the fall of 1942, 20 year old Claude, the youngest of Micky's brothers, was ordered by the Germans, as were most young Frenchmen, to work in one of their war factories.

This was a dangerous job since most of these factories were being bombed by American and British war planes.

Rather than risk being killed for the Nazi cause Claude joined the French underground. "I was 15 years old by then "recalls Micky "My family trusted me with the secret of my brother's plight. Had it slipped out my brother Claude would have been executed."

It wasn't until August of 1944 after the Allied forces landed in Normandy that Claude was reunited with his family. Those were anxious times for the Leroy Monge family.

Overhead was the constant threat of bombing raids of the American made Flying Fortress which was able to unleash its deadly cargo from 30,000 feet.

One had to always listen for the sounds of the Allied planes in search of German installations. "If you were frying food," said Micky, "someone had to be outside listening for the planes. We were trapped between British and German aircraft and I saw many pilots on both sides parachuting to safety or to their deaths."

The war as Micheline remembers it was a time of overwhelming anxieties, sacrifice beyond human comprehension and inconceivable risk taking.

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was food, clothing, and medical supplies and yes...wine...it all went toward the German war effort."

If it didn't grow in France or could not be purchased on the black market you did without it," said Micky "We'd have to barter for goods...a bushel of fruit for a pint of milk." The British broadcasting company (BBC) had a free French station which was highly frowned upon by Nazi brass.

Listening to allied forces sending messages of hope and of faith could easily have ended in disaster. "We listened and we prayed," said Micky, "after the broadcast we had to turn the dial to another station in case a German soldier came in. We didn't want him to suspect anything that could bring us harm."

By June 6, 1944,"D-Day" the bombardments had become more frequent and with deadly intent.

The Nazi's, as well as the French, thought that the Allied Forces were taking the short passage across the English channel from the south east of England to Pas de Calais only a few miles away from Micky's home town of Bethune.

Realizing that the full impact of the invasion was taking place to the south in Normandy, most of the German troops were immediately sent in that direction. Suddenly, according to Micky, the once larger than life German soldiers had turned sheepish in demeanor. "They were afraid of dying just like us," said Micky.

Finally on August 14, 1944 English speaking Canadian troops entered the city of Bethune. From the center of town could be heard the joyous sounds of liberation.

"Until then sniper fire kept us from getting to the center of town," remembers Micky.

"Now the entire town was able to join in the celebration." On the morning of August 15, the Canadian troops were camped out in the center square enjoying a breakfast of fried eggs and tomatoes.

Where once the citizens of Bethune were afraid to go was now sacred landscape upon which all were free to walk.

"I will never experience a joy like that again," admits Micheline. "We brought a soldier home for dinner and in return he gave us a few bars of Life-buoy soap. It was the first time in 4 years that we were able to wash with real soap. All the good stuff went to the German Army. The German citizens suffered just like we did."

Soon, recalls Micky, prisoners of war and members of the French underground, including brother, Claude, who she hadn't seen for two years, were returning home. "For my family," said Micky, "it was joy without a shadow."

In October of 1944, Micky now 18 years old, left for Lille, France where she enrolled in a local college. Forced to return home due to a respiratory illness Micky remained in her mother's care until March of the following year.

Once back in Lille, Micky found employment as an interpreter for the American Red Cross. "I learned how to speak English as a child," said Micky. "I'm glad I did."

It was then that Micheline Leroy Monge met her soul mate...Lodi resident Corporal Henry Satkowski U.S. Airforce.

"We met on May 19, 1945," recalls Micky "he wanted to take me out the same day but I insisted that we be chaperoned."

Henry, smitten by this 18 year old beauty, talked a friend of his into coming along for their first date. What began as a chance meeting between two people who were drawn together by war was now a budding romance.

Blossom though it did 3 months later the American Red Cross bid the whole of France and WWII adieu. Micky and Henry had to go their separate ways...but not for long.

On September 11, 1945 the love sick Corporal, pulled up in front of Micheline's home in an Army truck. Emilie met him at the front door with her arms folded and her foot tapping repeatedly on the top step.

"He assured my mother that nothing happened between us in Lille," recalls Micky. "He was telling the truth of course." From there Henry departed for Germany. The two kept in touch until 1946 when Henry was shipped back to U.S. soil and his home town of Lodi, New Jersey.

"He wanted to get married before he went home" said Micky "but my mother disapproved." Convincing her mother that Henry was a man of honor and integrity, Micheline said goodbye to her family and friends in Bethune, France and on March 1, 1947 made her first footprints on the fertile soil of the United States of America.

Micky remembers it as follows: "Late in February, I went to Paris with my father. We called TWA, but because of a heavy snow storm the airport had been shut down. My father had to return home leaving me alone in Paris for 4 days.

Money, food, and coupons had run out, so she had to find shelter in a warm subway. On Thursday she got to the station and boarded a shuttle bus to the airport only to find that she had been bumped until the following day.

Finally 24 long hours later she arrived at New York's La Guardia airport, called Henry and his brother, Casmir, to pick her up.

They arrived 2 hours later and found her standing next to a beautifully dressed war bride who was on her way to Kansas City.

She had on a coat and bobby socks and Casmir, thinking that I was the one dressed in furs and nylons, congratulated Henry on having such great taste in women.

Henry laughed as he informed his brother that indeed she was the girl in the bobby socks. Boy was Casmir let down. Yes folks, Casmir might have been let down, but Henry was the happiest guy in Lodi.

The couple married on March 19, 1947, and moved to Washington Street in Lodi in 1952.

Henry was employed by the U.S. Post Office until succumbing to cancer in 1990.

Micky worked at Josephine's Dress Shop in Lodi until the late 50s, when she went to work as a bookkeeper for a Maywood banking firm. After a short stint as a substitute teacher, Micky became employed at The Lodi Library as Senior Assistant in the Children's section where she retired in 1988. Micky also worked as an ESL teacher from 1988 to 1998.

Today, the 89 year old French born war bride is an active member of the St. Francis De Sales Church on Union Street in Lodi.

Her brothers, Pierre and Claude, are deceased. Her mother Emilie died in 1982 at the age of 93. Louis, her father died in 1984 at the age of 85. Poupette lived a full and protected life until 1949.

"I HATE WAR AS ANY-ONE DOES" said Micky "But the irony is that had it not been for U.S. involvement in WWII, I'd have never met my husband and would never have moved to America."

Reality TV has taken over prime-time viewing hours, and two formats have taken over reality TV: Singing competition and Real Estate.

No two reality TV formats have more shows based on their concepts.

Last month we looked at the "reality" of real estate as it appears in the sparkling world of the rich and glamorous.

This month, we're going to consider the practical side of real estate as portrayed in many of today's TV Home Renovation Shows.

Some of the top real estate shows out there - "This Old House," "Flip that House," "Moving Up," "Property Brothers," etc. – feature nice, normal people, realistic homes and the real restrictions of...The

Budget.

On the surface, they seem pretty legit but are they? I mean, we've all seen home renovation shows where the nice young couple buys a decrepit home with a kitchen so ugly that even 1960 wouldn't take it back.

In 30 or 60 minutes, that ugly house becomes a veritable dream home, with every detail perfect, down to the color-coordinated stand mixer and coffee maker in the new gorgeous kitchen. Reality?

Angie Hicks, founder of AngiesList.com which provides referrals and reviews of contractors says. "We live in a world of home improvement as entertainment. A lot of steps get left out in that entertainment because obviously it would be kind of boring."

Steps that are usually left out include the homeowners' research before they decide what renovations to make, drawing up plans with architects, consulting engineers on structural issues, getting estimates from multiple contractors and then choosing one and getting permits from local building officials, all of which can add months to a project.

But, though real estate on reality TV might not be completely 100% truthful, that doesn't mean it isn't useful.

"This Old House" made its debut in 1979, hosted by Bob Vila who had a degree in journalism and his own building company.

It has seen changes over the years but the format has remained largely the same, focus-

ing on renovating one house the entire season. It is a perennial favorite among Angie's List members, one of whom stated: "Some of the new shows play up the fake drama a little too much. "This Old House" is straight forward and low key."

The fact is there's no better place to reinvent oneself than in the home. "Martha Stewart Living" cultivated that territory 20 years ago. People watch these shows to utilize the ideas that get talked about.

It's what's called "take-away value" and in order to achieve it, the better shows have to incorporate the three "I"s: Ideas, Inspiration and Information.

Their content enables people to actually get off the couch and work themselves or to, at least, make smarter choices when hiring help. They have a better idea of what to ask, what the process entails and how much it ought to cost.

Here are a few things you see on home renovation shows that I would point out as either reality or fantasy...

Home renovation projects include unexpected and often expensive setbacks. Reality. Life is not quite as precisely scripted as you see on TV.

Things happen that you can't foresee and that fact of the matter is that renovations often go over budget. Setting aside a contingency fund is a smart move.

Contractors show up on time and work into the night to get the job done. Fantasy. Your contractor is likely juggling your renovation with several other projects and you may not be his first priority.

The stress of a major home renovation can bring homeowners to tears. Reality. Many are overcome with emotion as they struggle to make decisions, cope with setbacks and live with chaos.

Adding the right furniture and accessories can make your home look like a magazine cover story. Reality. These things don't come with the renovation job but if you're willing to do some shopping and spend some extra time, you can make your home look just as nice.

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Veterans Today

New Jersey is known as the crossroads of the Revolution. It sits in between Philadelphia and New York, so not surprisingly, many battles and skirmishes took place here.

New Jersey had a high population of Loyalists and they fought against their former neighbors. Neighbor murdered neighbor and settled old scores. Loyalists and Patriots alike took part in the local savagery that took place here. It was a rough time in New Jersey.

By October 1780, General Cornwallis surrendered his army to General Washington at Yorktown, Virginia. In school you are told that for the most part this is the end of the war.

The actual official end would not come until the Treaty of Paris of 1783. That would be two years and 11 months after Yorktown. That would be just enough time for the nation's first international incident.

Take a guess which state was involved? Ok, I didn't make it hard but you're right. New Jersey. It wouldn't be New Jersey if something crazy didn't happen.

Philip White was a Loyalist that lived in New Jersey. He was a co-owner of a ship and this ship was used by the British during the war. There was nothing unusual about that.

He conducted many operations in New Jersey on behalf of the British. By 1782 he was trying to move Loyalist refugees out of Monmouth County. As the story goes, he killed several men in a gun battle. He was captured and according to Loyalists was blindfolded and had his hands cut off and died.

The Patriots claimed he was captured and while being escorted to prison he recognized a man who was the father of someone he killed and fearing reprisal, tried to flee through a swamp and was shot. Whichever story you choose to believe, it's all the same to Philip. He was dead in Monmouth County.

So, here today you may say, so what? One dead man out of thousands that have died of injuries, disease and battle, why does this matter? Well it didn't end there.

Captain Richard Lippincott, from Shrewsbury, New Jersey, was also a Loyalist. He was serving with his Loyalist Volunteers when they attacked a blockhouse guarding Toms River, NJ. Toms River was a launching point for many privateers to attack British vessels.

As it turned out the Patriots were forced to surrender and the men on guard were taken

to New York City and placed on one of the famous prison ships. There is nothing surprising here. This was a common practice during the war, but this is New Jersey, we aren't done yet.

One of the prisoners taken in Toms River that day was Captain Joshua Huddy, a local born Patriot. A story had circulated among the local Loyalists that some man by the name of Edward died while a prisoner of Captain Huddy. The story may not have been true, but the Loyalists believed Huddy was responsible.

The Board of Associated Loyalists of New York authorized Captain Lippincott to take two prisoners back to Sandy Hook, NJ, and exchange them. He was also authorized by this Board to hang Captain Huddy for the death of Captain White.

Lippincott was pleased to oblige because he was a distant relative of Captain White. Lippincott took all three to NJ, exchanged two and hanged Captain Joshua Huddy from a tree on April 12, 1782. Over his hanging corpse a sign read "up goes Huddy for Captain White." He reported back to the Board in New York that he exchanged two and exchanged Huddy for White.

His funeral was attended by over 400 people and complaints of executing prisoners reached the ears of General George Washington. Washington was irate that Huddy was executed and he soon wrote to the Commanding General of British forces in America, Sir Guy Carlton.

Washington demanded that those responsible be turned over for trial in an American court. Sir Guy sidestepped the affair and said he had no control over civilian matters. The Board was under civilian control outside his jurisdiction.

Washington, not believing this nonsense, ordered five British Captains that were taken as Prisoners of War to draw straws. The Captain with the short straw would be hanged. He told Sir Guy if he turned over the responsible parties the Captain would be spared. Straws were drawn. The short one went to 20 year old, Captain Charles Asgill. Sir Guy Carlton needed to buy some time. He ordered a court martial of Captain Lippincott over his actions on April 12. This trial took time. Time Asgill needed, so that letters and communication can cross the Atlantic.

Carlton knew there was a policy in the British Army of

not exchanging prisoners to be hanged. Carlton could not exchange Lippincott for Asgill because Lippincott would face the gallows. The same policy saved Benedict Arnold when he turned traitor in 1780. Major John Andre was hanged as a spy because Arnold could not be exchanged for him, a trade which Washington wanted, but could not be done.

Captain Charles Asgill's mother soon found out her son won the New Jersey Lottery. In a panic she wrote everyone, among them King George the Third, King Louis of France and his Queen Marie Antoinette.

Letters began pouring into Washington's Headquarters. Our nation's first international incident was underway. Washington no doubt wanted to spare Asgill, just like he never wanted to hang John Andre. Andre received a court martial for hiding his uniform while trying to make contact with the traitor, Benedict Arnold.

He was found guilty of being a spy and his sentence was death. Asgill on the other hand committed no crime. Washington just wanted Lippincott to face American justice.

Disgusted with the whole matter Washington took all the letters and sent them to Congress and asked for a ruling.

At this time, the court martial of Lippincott concluded and found him innocent on the grounds that he was carrying out the order of the Board of Loyalists. Sir Guy Carlton who claimed no jurisdiction over the Civilian Board of Loyalists had them disbanded. It would seem Sir Guy had more control than he liked to admit.

The Congress of the United States reviewed the matter and declared that since Captain Charles Asgill surrendered at Yorktown he was under the protection of the Articles of Capitulation agreed upon and signed there and could not be subjected to the gallows.

Congress ordered General Washington to release the prisoner and send him back to England. Washington did so and Asgill went back to England in December 1782.

Asgill remained in the Army. He rose to the rank of General and was also given the title of 2nd Baronet upon the

death of his father. He saw duty in Ireland where he helped put down a rebellion there in 1798. He died on July 23, 1823.

Lippincott survived the war but could not stay in New Jersey. He, like many Loyalists after the war, went to Canada to restart life again. Apparently, Toronto was where he resided until his death in 1826.

Joshua Huddy was buried in a Church yard. Long gone is the crowd of mourners whose cries for vengeance reached all the way to the Court of King Louis and George the Third.

The tree on which he was hanged was still standing as late as 1867. I don't know if it still does. Today in Toms River there is a place called Huddy Park. It's named after the local patriot who gave his life in the cause of liberty. It's a place to relax and enjoy a beautiful day. A spot to reflect on a long ago April when the park's namesake was executed for a crime he didn't commit. An execution that shook the courts of kings. ###

Mouthguards

To avoid injuries to your mouth while you're playing sports, talk to your dentist about getting an athletic mouthguard made just for you.

What is a mouthguard?

A mouthguard is a flexible appliance that is worn during athletic and recreational activities to prevent injuries to your mouth and face, such as split lips, broken teeth, and jaw fractures.

When should I wear a mouthguard?

It is advisable to wear a mouthguard any time there is a strong chance of your head making contact with other participants or hard surfaces. Mouthguards should be worn when participating in activities such as basketball, softball, football, wrestling, soccer, lacrosse, rugby, hockey, martial arts, and skateboarding.

What are the different types of mouthguards?

There are several types of mouthguards, including the following:

- Stock mouthguards: The least expensive option is a ready made stock item, which offers the least protection since little can be done to adjust its fit. This type of mouthguard—which is available over-the-counter—requires the user to close his or her jaw to hold it in place; as a result, it may interfere with speech and breathing. It also may lead to soreness of the jaw muscles. A stock mouthguard is not considered an acceptable device for facial protection.

- Mouth-formed mouthguards: There are two types of mouth-formed mouthguards, both of which are available over-the-counter. The first is a shell-liner mouthguard, which is made from an acrylic material that is poured into an outer shell, where it forms a lining. When placed in an athlete's mouth, the lining material molds to the teeth and is allowed to set.

- Custom-made mouth-

guards: When it comes to injury prevention, a custom-made mouthguard is your best option.

This type of mouthguard, which is made by your dentist, offers the best protection, fit, and comfort level because it is made from a model of your teeth.

How should I care for my mouthguard?

To keep your mouthguard in good condition, follow these steps:

- After each use, brush your mouthguard with a toothbrush and cool (not hot) water.
 - Keep your mouthguard in a well-ventilated plastic storage box when you're not using it. Your dentist will provide you with a case.
 - Don't leave your mouthguard in direct sunlight or in a hot car; heat can melt the device, altering the way it fits in your mouth—resulting in less protection.
 - Bring your mouthguard with you when you see your dentist for your regular check-ups. Your dentist can give it a thorough cleaning and check its structure and fit.
 - Call your dentist if you have any concerns about your mouthguard.




Fire Watch Detail
