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












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About Easter

Easter, Pascha, or Resurrection Day, is the most important religious feast in the Christian liturgical year. It celebrates the resurrection of Jesus, which Christians believe occurred on the third day after his crucifixion some time in the period A.D. 27 to 33.

Many pagan elements have become part of the celebration, and those aspects are often celebrated by many Christians and non-Christians alike.

Easter also refers to the season of the Church year called Eastertide or the Easter Season. Traditionally, the Easter Season lasted for the forty days from Easter Day until Ascension Day, but now officially lasts for the fifty days until Pentecost. The first week of the Easter Season is known as Easter Week or the Octave of Easter.

Easter is termed a movable Christian holy day because it is not fixed in relation to the civil calendar. Easter falls at some point between late March and late April each year (early April to early May in Eastern Christianity), following the cycle of the moon.

Easter is linked to the Jewish Passover, not only for much of its symbolism, but also for its position in the calendar.

Jesus and his disciples before his crucifixion is generally thought of as a Passover meal, based on the chronology in the Gospels.

Some, however, interpret "Passover" in John 18:28 as a single meal and not a sevenday festival. Interpretation of the Gospel of John differs from the Synoptic Gospels by placing Christ's death at the time of the slaughter of the Passover lambs, which would put the Last Supper slightly before Passover, on 14 Nisan of the Bible's Hebrew calendar.

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April Fools' Day

April Fools' Day (sometimes called All Fools' Day) is celebrated every year on April 1 by playing practical jokes and spreading hoaxes.

The jokes and their victims are called April Fools. People playing April Fool jokes expose their prank by shouting April

Some newspapers, magazines, and other published media report fake stories, which are usually explained the next day or below the news section in small letters.

As well as people playing pranks on one another on April Fools' Day, elaborate practical jokes have appeared on radio and TV stations, newspapers, web sites, and have been performed by large corporations.

To give you a sense of how seriously some people take April Fools' Day, here are three of the greatest April Fools' Day hoaxes of all time:

• Swiss Spaghetti Trees — In 1957, the British Broadcasting Company (BBC) news program Panorama announced that Swiss farmers were harvesting a record spaghetti crop thanks to the elimination of the spaghetti weevil.

News footage showed Swiss peasants pulling spaghetti from trees. Thousands of viewers were fooled. The BBC reported receiving many calls inquiring how to grow spaghetti trees!

• "Taco" Liberty Bell — In 1996, Taco Bell announced that it had bought the Liberty Bell to help ease the national deficit. When the company claimed it would be renaming it the Taco Liberty Bell, thousands of citizens were fooled and called to complain.

The company revealed it was a practical joke a few hours later, but not before reporters asked White House press secretary Mike McCurry about the sale. Creating a joke of his own, he responded that the Lincoln Memorial had also been sold and would now be known as the Ford Lincoln Mercury Memorial!

• "Left-Handed" Whopper - In 1998, Burger King ran an advertisement in USA Today announcing its new "Left-Handed Whopper," which was specifically designed for lefthanded Americans by rotating all condiments exactly 180 degrees. Burger King revealed the hoax the next day but claimed that thousands of customers had requested the new sandwich at their restaurants!

Although popular since the 19th century, the day is not a public holiday in any country. Source: Wikipedia and wonderopolis.org ###

Spring is Upon Us!

Like the opening bell in the stock market, the beginning of the spring real estate market ignites a frenzy of buying and selling all across the country.

It's our biggest season of the year, a season that is mutually beneficial for homebuyer and seller alike, with unique advantages and disadvantages for each party's point of view.

Let's look first at what homebuyers need to know in today's market.

The first thing they should understand is that inventory levels are extremely low. Not only in our greater NYC/Bergen County area but - from what I'm reading - nearly everywhere else as well.

The fact is, the biggest challenge most buyers face is just simply finding a home to buy.

I can't say officially if this is true, but it sure feels like there are fewer 'active' listings in our area than there have been at any time in at least the past decade. This shortage is sure to influence how both buyers and sellers operate in the coming weeks of 2017.






















Shamrock 5K Run

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
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Knights Annual Corned Beef Dinner a Success

Rutherford's 60th Birthday Celebration Blood Drive is April 3

The Rutherford Community Blood Bank will celebrate 60 years of saving lives at its 60th Birthday Celebration Blood Drive on Monday, April 3. The donor day will be held at 55 Kip Center on Kip Avenue in Rutherford, NJ from 3 to 8 p.m.

Each donor will receive an official RCBB commemorative mug.

Appointments are not required, but can be made by calling 201-251-3703 or online at https://donor.cbsblood.org/donor/schedules/drive_schedule/41657. A free cholesterol screening will be included.

Community Blood Services of Montvale provides the necessary professional clinical support.

On April 25, 1957, a meeting of representatives from Church, fraternal, civic and other organizations held at the Ambulance Corps headquarters. It was unanimously voted to set up a blood bank.

The Rutherford Community Blood Bank was founded in 1957. A veritable who's who of Rutherfordians mobilized in response to a call from the Rutherford First Aid Ambulance Corps.

Local organizations contributed five dollars each to a modest operating budget. One newspaper lauded the dedicated townspeople who would soon make available a "vital supply of freshly processed and

top-grade blood for hospitals in the area ...at minimum cost (except for hospital administrative costs) to all bona fide Rutherford citizens."

The first drive, which brought in 136 donations, was held November 25, 1957 at the Elks Club, a location that came to be the organization's unofficial home for many years.

The Club was the place where most drives would be held and the board of directors would meet.

Today, the donor days and meetings are held at 55 Kip Center.

The new relationship underscores the common goals the blood bank shares with other community groups dedicated to the health and well being of area residents.

Anthony Fokker Models and Memorabilia

Sir Stuart Matthews, a Smithsonian National Air and Space Museum Wall of Honor recipient, internationally recognized for his contributions to the aviation industry, presented important Anthony Fokker models and memorabilia to the Aviation Hall of Fame and Museum of New Jersey located at Teteboro Airport.

Mathews ran the North American division of Fokker Aircraft for twenty years selling Fokker commercial jet airliners.

Anthony Fokker's WWI Tri-plane design is famous today thanks to the Red Baron vs. Snoopy cartoon characters. In the 1920s and 30s, Fokker's company, based at Teterboro Airport, was the largest producer of commercial aircraft in the world and the Fokker name, arguably, the most famous in aviation.

The first transcontinental flight, the first flight to the North Pole, the first flight to Hawaii, the first flight across the Pacific, were all flown in Fokker aircraft. His Teterboro built Trimotors set numerous air records and helped develop U.S. airlines.

Today, the Fokker's Teterboro factory site is home to Walmart and Costco, but the history of Fokker's legacy lives on at the Aviation Hall of Fame and Museum of NJ. Sir Stuart Matthews' donations are a valuable contribution to that history. *Photos provided by Bruce Meyer.* ###

afe in Blizzard Conditions











Stella, a major snow event with blizzard conditions, began in the early morning, Tuesday, March 14, 2017. Teterboro Airport activated its snow plan*.

The airport maintains 24-hour contacts with several weather services, in addition to its satellite feed of weather updates.

Based on forecasts (between 18" to 24" of snow), Teterboro Airport maintenance and operations marshalled resources of personnel and equipment.

A briefing for all airport operations, tenants, etc., was conducted on Monday, March 13, 2017, with an update on Tuesday.

They reviewed staff responsibilities, snow removal priorities, runway de-icing procedures, inspection and reporting techniques, communications techniques and equipment inventory.

Areas of responsibility: Av-Ports airfield operation areas -- runways and taxiways; FBOs and tenants -- de-icing aircraft, snow removal for areas within their leasehold. The Port Authority oversees all activities.

Snow Removal

Work crews began operations at approximately 23:00 hours Monday night as the snow began to fall.

As the storm intensified into blizzard conditions Tuesday morning, Runway 1-19 was abandoned, and crews focused on keeping Runway 6-24 operational, because it has an ILS (instrument landing system).

In-bound aircraft would land and de-iced aircraft would depart until the runway needed to be cleared again. If a runway has more than 1/2" of snow or visibility is less than 200 feet, it is closed.

As the weather deteriorated, TEB Operations would coordinate the closing of the airport with the FAA Tower, FBOs and issue NOTAM (notice to airmen).

Once the runway was closed, crews began snow clearing operations with four multi-function vehicles working in formation in the direction aircraft take off and land. (The largest multifunction vehicle is 68' 7" in length, has a 30' plow on the front, a 22' rotating broom with steel brushes in the middle, and a blower on the back.) Each 150' wide runway takes about six passes depending on the rate of snowfall. Plows with 28-foot blades worked the runway with the multi-function units.

A high speed snow blower (8 feet wide, 34 feet long) can go up to 45 mph, works in close support of the multi-function units.

At the same time, taxiways and emergency routes are cleared with 12 foot plows.

The airport's snow plows have special poly edges on the bottom portion of the plow blades that are strong enough to remove snow, but are pliable enough to contour around and not damage in-pavement lights on runways and taxiways.

The sequence takes under an hour to clear a runway and corresponding taxiways and is ongoing during the event.

De-icing

As runway clearing operations are being completed, a deicing truck sprays liquid de-icer on the runways, and taxiways.

One 4,000 gallon truck with a 70 foot boom sprays the center of the runway 12 minutes per runway at 7.7 mph. The de-icer then flows to the edges along the grooves in the runway. A second 1,500 gallon truck sprays the taxiways.

Liquid potassium acetate and solid sodium acetate is used as a protective coating for the runway and prevents ice and snow from bonding to the surface.

For this snow event, solid sodium acetate (because of the ice coverage) was used to penetrate the ice that bonded to the surface.

(Note: Rock salt is not used as it is corrosive. Regular sand is not used. If required, a special aviation grade sand is used.

The Teterboro Airport uses only the safest available noncorrosive materials regulated by the FAA.)

Runway Testing

A SARSYS continuous measuring friction tester (CFME) started at the south end of the field (about five minutes after the de-icer was applied and took effect) to measure the traction of the runways and taxiways.

Programmed for the entire length of each runway, the FAA-approved friction tester is a modified SAAB car with a "5th" measuring wheel mechanically geared to one of the car's rear wheels. The gear ratio is such that when moving along the runway, it rolls with a certain, fixed slip ratio.

Data from the CFME is used to track trends in changing runway conditions.

The airport utilizes state-ofthe-art sensors embedded in both runways which relay conditions and surface temperature to a constantly monitored computer at the airport's operations desk.

As the friction test was in progress, FBOs were notified for departing aircraft to begin de-icing procedures.

Once the runway was secured, aircraft resumed takeoffs and landings.

As the blizzard intensified, this sequence of events -- runway closing, snow removal, de-icing, runway testing and re-opening the runway -- was repeated several times during this snow event.

When the visibility decreased to 200 feet, the airport was closed, but crews continued the snow removal, de-icing and runway testing procedure.

Although the storm subsided about midnight, crews worked continuously until 16:30 hours Wednesday after opening both runways.

Under sunny skies on Thursday, crews groomed runway and taxiway edges, while backlog of delayed flights and departures resumed.

Summary

About 10.4" inches of a mix of snow, ice pellets, sleet and rain fell at Teterboro Airport during this event to include significant ice coverage.

A crew of 15 airport maintenance and 18 airport operations personnel handled the equipment and coordination for this snow event.

At Teterboro Airport, the access and fire department roads, in conjunction with the runways, receive first priority for snow removal, followed by appropriate taxiways and holding aprons.

Teterboro Airport has two active runways: 6-24 (6,013 feet) and 1-19 (7,000 feet), with seven ramps and 4.2 miles of taxiways. ###

*Teterboro Airport's snow plan is re-examined each September and revised based on experiences during the previous winter season, physical modifications or temporary closures of airside areas, and tenant and other operational changes. The FAA approves the Teterboro Airport Snow & Ice Control Plan -- which is part of the Airport's Annual Certification Inspection. ###








Music Lasts a Lifetime

Jr./Sr. HS band students are in Grades 7-12. There is one HS Band class in the school day. The 7 and 8th Grade band students take band for one marking period a year.



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

In Light of Trump's Travel Restrictions: Get a Passport

While President Trump's Executive Order restricting travel from certain countries is in a state of flux, Bergen County Clerk John S. Hogan is reminding his constituents of the importance of obtaining a U.S. Passport.

Clerk Hogan points out that a valid U.S. Passport is essential to legally keeping families together.

He noted that "for Bergen County parents whose children are born in the United States, no matter the parents' immigration status, it is extremely important for the children to obtain a U.S. Passport so as new re-entry restrictions are implemented by President Trump, their U.S. born children will have their rights protected by being able to produce a valid U. S. Passport.

An additional benefit for the children is if their parents are unable to re-enter the U.S., due to travel restrictions, the children will have the legal protection of holding a U.S. Passport to stay abroad with their parents."

The Bergen County Clerk further notes that for those who choose not to travel, passports are also a great form of identification.

The Office of the Bergen County Clerk (One Bergen County Plaza, Hackensack) is open for processing of passport applications on weekdays (Monday to Friday) from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.), with extended hours on Mondays until 6 p.m. and the second Saturday of every month from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

The Wednesday of that week became known as National Secretaries Day (April 26). As the organization gained international recognition, the events became known as Professional Secretaries Week and Professional Secretaries Day.

In 2000, IAAP announced that names of the week and the day were changed to Administrative Professionals Week and Administrative Professionals Day, to keep pace with changing job titles and expanding responsibilities of the modern administrative workforce.

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Veterans Today

Seems as though some men you meet don't get along with anyone. No matter what is happening, some just do what they wish. Always in constant conflict with the world. Never yielding, never compromising, never giving in, it can be a useful trait if it wasn't so aggravating. Here is the story of one such man. His name was John Paul. No, not the Pope.

John Paul was born in Scotland 1747. Like many boys of his time and age, work would come while very young.

At the age of 13 he took a job on a ship and set sail out of Whitehaven, England. Sailing can be a rough life but many take to it well. He sailed and worked on many ships over the next few years.

Like thousands of other young men you would never have heard of him except John Paul wasn't your average boy.

While sailing on the HMS John his life changed quickly. The Captain and First mate died of yellow fever and that left John Paul in charge. He commanded the ship and brought it back safely to port.

The owners were grateful and made him Captain of the ship. This gave him 10 percent of the cargo's worth when delivered and sold, a big step up for young John Paul.

As bad luck would have it, John disciplined a carpenter on the next voyage by flogging him. Flogging was a common practice of the time but this flogging was severe and the

reputation stuck to John Paul.

He was arrested but soon made bail. Paul didn't wait around for the trial. He left town and took command of the

made bail. Paul didn't wait around for the trial. He left town and took command of the Betsy. Death followed him. He got into a fight with a mutineer and killed him with a sword. Once again he didn't stick around for the Admiral's Court. He decided to change his life and head to Fredericksburg, Virginia where his brother lived in the year 1773.

With the outbreak of the Revolution in 1775, John Paul left Virginia for Philadelphia to offer his services to the Congress.

Not long after his arrival he decided to change his name to escape a few scrapes with the law. You may have already guessed his new name by now.

He knew Richard Henry Lee in the Congress and that put John Paul Jones, as he now would be known, in a spot to be named 1st Lieutenant of the USS Alfred. The Alfred sailed down the Delaware River.

John Paul Jones had the honor of hoisting up the first U.S. Ensign over a naval vessel. Jones soon took command of the USS Providence. On this ship he captured 16 prizes of war from the British during a six week voyage off the coast of Nova Scotia, an incredible score for a young captain.

Jones again bangs heads with authority. He fights with his Commanding Officer, Commodore Hopkins. Soon he is given command of a smaller vessel, the USS Ranger. The smaller vessel is considered a downgrade. The Ranger is a Corvette. Carrying all its cannons on the main deck she is fast.

Jones, annoyed with his commander, doesn't blink.

On November 1, 1///, the Ranger leaves Boston on a mission to aid the American cause in France. Jones and the crew spend quite a while on this port visit. Landing at Brest, it is said

that he and Benjamin Franklin became lifelong friends while visiting France.

Jones on this visit brought the news of General Burgoyne surrendering his entire Army at Saratoga.

On February 14, 1778 the USS Ranger flying the American Flag was saluted by the French. This was the first official recognition of American Independence from a foreign nation. On April 10, 1778 the Ranger sailed out of Brest, France for the west coast of Britain

The Ranger caused havoc on merchant shipping in the Irish Sea, Jones wanted to do more. He convinced his crew to go along with a plan to destroy Whitehaven.

In the early days of the Navy, the crew in many cases would not try something that didn't offer them anything in return. The winds weren't with the Ranger and the plan was put behind them.

They captured a boat with some sailors in it that reported the HMS Drake was anchored of Carrickfergus, Ireland. A night attack was agreed upon.

The Ranger was to approach the Drake and drop the bow anchor to stop the Ranger alongside the Drake, but the sailor responsible for dropping the anchor misjudged the timing and the ship was out of place. Jones in his memoirs said this man was drunk, either way the plan failed and he had to cut the anchor loose and run.

The winds changed again, favorable for the Ranger. The Ranger crossed the Irish Sea and made preparations to attack Whitehaven.

On the night of April 22, 1778 the Ranger anchored 2 miles off the coast. Two boats were lowered into the water. John Paul Jones commanded one boat, the other was under the command of Lieutenant Wallingford. Wallingford was a Marine, and the two boats had 30 men in total.

The approach to Whitehaven was slow and they did not reach landfall till almost daybreak on the 23rd.

Jones and his men quickly attacked a fort in Whitehaven. It was important to spike the cannons to ensure their escape.

At the same time Wallingford and his men would set fires on the ships in port there. There were several hundred ships in port. Had a large fire ensued it would have burned the entire town down to the ground.

Jones and his men climbed the wall of the fort by standing on the shoulders the crew. A human ladder if you will. The guards were huddled in a small guardhouse due to the weather being cold. They were captured and taken prisoner. Jones and his men spiked the cannons that they could. Jones had success so far. He sent the rest of his men to burn the ships.

Wallingford and his men needed a light. Yes, a light. They couldn't burn anything without a fire so they stopped at the first place they found. It just happened to be a pub. Probably the worst place to put a sailor. Jones said they delayed in getting a light probably more from drinking than anything else.

Wallingford and his men left the pub and found a light in a house. They went along the pier and threw incendiaries into the hull of the Thompson. They lit several more ships on fire, but oddly enough one of Jones' crew went door to door telling people the ships were on fire. He didn't want anyone to get killed so he warned the people.

The town now alarmed, put into service their fire engines. Yes, their fire engines. The English had horse drawn carriages for the purpose of fighting fires. The idea of having these apparently came about from London burning to the ground a century before. Jones and his crew left the beach for the Ranger, but the people quickly put the fires out. The Ranger picked up the small boats and left. The plan failed due to a loud mouth crewman.

This was the only attack on English soil during the Revolution. It didn't do the damage Jones wanted but it sent waves of fear through the English people.

The Ranger's next move was to kidnap the Earl of Selkirk, who lived on a St. Mary's Isle. Jones wanted to use him for ransom to exchange him for some American prisoners being held by the British. Making landfall on the Isle, the Earl could not be found. Taking silver for the crews' trouble Jones left. He set the Ranger on a course back to Ireland.

On April 24, 1778, the Ranger challenged HMS Drake in combat. The Drake struggled against an opposing wind and tide, but when they met up an hour long battle ensued.

The British Captain George Burdon and 4 of his crew were killed along with 20 wounded. The Drake surrendered to the Ranger and was taken as a prize of war

This was the first and most complete of victories the new American Navy had in the Revolution over the British Navy. Jones put Lieutenant Simpson in charge of the Drake.

In port, Jones quarreled with Simpson and filed for a court-martial. John Adams would intervene on Simpson's behalf and the matter disappeared.

In 1779 Captain John Paul Jones took command of the Bonhomme Richard. She carried 42 guns and on August 14, 1779 she was sailing around Scotland into the North Sea. With her was the USS Alliance and other ships in our new Navy.

Jones argued with the Captain of the Alliance and accused him of insubordination.

Fear ran through the sea coast towns as news of Jones' approach spread like wild fire. On September 23, 1779 sails were sighted from a convoy.

The convoy consisted of merchant ships from Britain, sailing under the protection of the 22 gun Countess of Scarborough and the HMS Serapis.

Jones moved the Bonhomme Richard as close as he could to the Serapis. Serapis carried 50 guns and Jones didn't think he could win exchanging shots with the Serapis.

Jones rammed his ship into the Serapis and his crew used grappling hooks to lash them together.

The Captain asked Jones for his surrender. Jones replied "I have not yet begun to fight!"

Cannons roared and thundered as the two ships exchanged shots. Marines in the rigging shot down British sailors. The USS Alliance poured in a broadside which did as much damage to the Richard as it did the Serapis.

The Countess fell off from this battle and engaged another American ship. The Alliance sailed to her and the Countess, heavily damaged, surrendered.

The Alliance swung around and headed for the contest between Serapis and the Richard.

The Bonhomme Richard was burning and sinking. The British tried to board the ship, but were driven back.

Jones was asked again if he would surrender, but Jones said "I am determined to make you strike." A grenade was thrown into the Serapis' lower gun deck causing a great explosion.

Jones' Marines and Midshipmen cut down their counter parts on the British ship.

Again the Alliance fired a broadside into the combatants. Serapis, badly damaged, and now outnumbered surrendered to Jones.

Jones and his crew transferred to the Serapis and the Bonhomme Richard sank beneath the waves. Jones' indomitable spirit pulled victory out of a defeat.

He seemed to be a person not easy to get along with. He fought with many that he worked with.

To the British he was a pirate. To America he was a hero. His spirit of not giving up, his unbeatable will to win, made him victorious over our enemies. To his countrymen he is the Father of the U.S. Navy, John Paul Jones. ###

Hackensack Riverkeeper Hackensack Riverkeeper, Waterkeeper Alliance Respond to Trump Administration Attack on Clean Water Act

Responding to the unprecedented move by the Administration to strip Clean Water Act protection from wetlands and waterways across America, and redefine Waters of the United States (WOTUS), Waterkeepers are united in their opposition. Trump's latest Executive Order, "Restoring the Rule of Law, Federalism and Economic Growth by reviewing the 'Waters of the United States' Rule," directs all federal agencies to ignore the WOTUS rule as finalized in May 2015 by the Army Corps of Engineers and the Environmental Protection Agency.

"In reading the text of the order, it is abundantly clear to me that the President is ignoring Congress' original intent when it passed the Clean Water Act. Former Congressman James Oberstar once told me in no uncertain terms that he and his colleagues – both Democrats and Republicans - intended that all our nation's waters be protected," said Hackensack Riverkeeper Captain Bill Sheehan. "Without question the administration is violating the spirit of the law and disregarding a decade's worth of work to clarify and make manifest its historic significance.

The Executive Order also directs agencies to begin deconstructing the Clean Water Act based on the 2006 opinion written by the late Justice Antonin Scalia in Rapanos v. United States. In that case the Supreme Court was called upon to rule on the Act's "navigable waters" clause and determine the extent of federal wetlands jurisdiction.

In an unusual 4-1-4 split decision, the majority held that the law only applied to waterways connected by direct surface flow for at least part of the year.

Justice Anthony Kennedy, although siding with the court's conservatives, wrote a separate opinion setting forth that a "significant nexus" or "biological connection" between waterways alone would qualify them for federal jurisdiction and Clean Water Act protections.

"The exact definition of what constitutes waters protected by the Clean Water Act was painstakingly determined

between 2006 and 2015 under the two previous Presidential administrations," explained Sheehan. "This latest travesty from the Trump White House seeks to cut the legs out from underneath every clean water victory over the past fifty years. We cannot – and we will not allow that to happen."

Continuing the administration's dangerous march toward the destruction of federal clean air and water protections, today President Trump signed an executive order directing EPA Administrator Scott Pruitt, **Attorney General Jeff Sessions** and others to take a series of actions, long sought by industry, that will allow uncontrolled discharges of toxic pollution into our nation's waters.

The administrative action seeks to limit which waterways are protected against pollution and destruction under the law and contradicts the intent of the 1972 Clean Water Act.

As Oklahoma's Attorney General, Pruitt and others joined with industry advocates to protect corporate interests instead of our nation's waters.

With this executive order, it is clear that the Trump administration intends to continue this industry-friendly strategy by dismantling the federal government's ability to enforce basic clean water protections and control pollution, and stripping essential human health and water quality protections from rivers, streams, lakes, and wetlands that have been in place for more than 40 years.

"President Trump's action today endangers all who depend on clean water, which is every single person and business in the country," said Waterkeeper Alliance Executive Director Marc Yaggi. "We all know that public health and our economy suffer when polluters discharge untreated sewage and industrial waste into any of our nation's waters, including wetlands, streams, lakes, and rivers. We also know that pollution flows downstream and poisons larger waterways used for drinking water, fishing, and recreation.

This is why Congress passed the Clean Water Act more than 40 years ago — Waterkeeper Alliance will fight every effort to destroy these longstanding clean water protections."

- Remove winter mulches
- Clean up the garden/weed
- Have soil tests run
- Improve soil with organic matter and pre-plant incorporation of fertilizer
 - Rake & aerate lawn
 - Apply lime if needed
- Reset perennials that have frost-heaved
- Start vegetables and flowers from seed
- Sow seeds outdoors of hardy annuals, such as poppies and cornflower
- Plant sweet peas and garden peas on St. Patrick's Day, if soil is workable
- Plant cold-tolerant vegetables such as onions and peas (mid to late month)

- Look for and remove cedar apple rust galls on Eastern red cedar
- Plant or transplant trees and shrubs when soil is workable
- Fertilize trees and shrubs (late)
- Prune trees, shrubs that do not flower in spring (unless renovation pruning)
- Clean out all of your birdhouses now, so that they will be ready when the birds return.
- Repair any fencing, arbors, or trelliswork that is weak or has broken over the winter.
- Check the plants under the eaves of the house and under tall evergreens to see that they have sufficient moisture.

Good Friday / Tenebrae

This Good Friday come experience the last hours of Jesus Christ's life as it is presented in a dramatically told story called a Tenebrae service recreating his betrayal, abandonment and agony of the events leading to his

The word *Tenebrae* is Latin for "shadows" or "darkness." It can also be translated as "night" or "death." The Tenebrae service is an ancient tradition in Christian history. The purpose of this service was to remember the somber events that occurred in Jesus' life from the exuberant entrance into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday through the night of Jesus' burial on Good Friday. Communion is often included in a Tenebrae service, as well.

The most distinctive aspect of the service is the use of a Tenebrae "hearse," a holder for several lit candles. The flames of these candles are extinguished one by one as Scripture readings are shared to tell the story of Jesus' Passion. This gradual descent into gloom is a representation of Jesus' increasing sorrow as the events of Passion Week unfolded. After the last verse is read, the last candle is put out, and the room is plunged into darkness.

A loud noise may be sounded in the blackness, such as the violent closing of a book, to represent the closing of Christ's tomb. At this point, another lit candle, which has been hidden from view, is put at the top of the hearse, symbolizing Christ's resurrection. The service ends, and the participants are traditionally expected to leave in contemplative silence.

life. The liturgy will include the reading of St. John's Passion accompanied by Bach chorales performed by a quartet.

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Filling You In

A Sore Subject

Mouth sores—they can be painful and irritating when you eat certain foods, when you bump them with your tongue or teeth, or even when you try to smile.

They can be caused by ill-fitting dentures, braces, the sharp edge of a broken tooth, bacteria, a fungal or viral infection, or they can be a symptom of a disease or disorder.

What are mouth sores?

Mouth sores are swollen spots or sores in your mouth, on your lips, on your tongue, or on the skin surrounding your mouth. There are several types of mouth sores, including:

• Canker sores. Canker sores are small, white areas of swelling or soreness that are surrounded by redness. Canker sores are not contagious. The cause of canker sores is uncertain, but some research suggests that immune system deficiencies, bacteria, or viruses might be the culprits.

Smoking, stress, trauma, allergies, certain types of foods (chocolate, caffeine, or acidic foods), or vitamin deficiencies also may make you more susceptible to canker sores. Canker sores usually heal within one week, but they can recur. And, while there is no cure for canker sores, over-the-counter topical ointments or gels that provide temporary pain relief are available.

Antimicrobial mouth rinses also may help to relieve pain.

• Cold sores. Often, people confuse canker sores with cold sores (also called fever blisters). Cold sores are groups of often-painful blisters filled with fluid that appear around the lips and sometimes under the nose. A person usually experiences his or her first cold sore infection in childhood. Once a person has had a cold sore, the virus stays in the body and can become active throughout the person's life

Cold sores are extremely contagious and usually are caused by herpes simplex virus. Infection may be brought on by decreased immune response, lack of sleep, stress, or trauma. Cold sore blisters usually heal within seven to 10 days.

While there is no cure for cold sores, non-prescription topical anesthetics for temporary pain relief are available. Your dentist or physician also might prescribe an antiviral drug to reduce the infection.

• Leukoplakia. Leukoplakia appears on the inner cheeks, gums, or tongue and

often appears as a thick, whitecolored patch. It is associated with smoking or smokeless tobaccouse

Other causes can include poorly fitting dentures, broken teeth, and cheek chewing. It is extremely important to report any signs of leukoplakia to your dentist or physician because an estimated 5 percent of cases of leukoplakia lead to cancer.

Leukoplakia usually dissipates after the behavior causing the leukoplakia is ceased (stopping smoking or removing ill-fitting dentures, for example). Your dentist will check your healing progress every few months depending on the type, area of your mouth, and size of the affected area.

• Candidiasis. Candidiasis is a fungal infection that also is called oral thrush. Candidiasis appears as yellow-white or red patches in your mouth. Oral thrush is most common in newborns or in people whose immune systems are not functioning properly. People who have dry mouth or who are taking antibiotics also may be susceptible. It is found in people who wear dentures, as well.

Candidiasis may form at the corners of the mouth with poor-fitting dentures. In these individuals, outbreaks of oral thrush can be prevented by cleaning the dentures and by removing them at night, if recommended by their dentist. If antibiotics cause the condition, your physician may consider reducing the dosage or changing the treatment.

For those with dry mouth, saliva substitutes are available. Antifungal medications also are available.

• Oral cancer. Oral cancer often starts as a tiny white or red spot or sore. Sometimes oral cancer presents itself as a sore that bleeds easily or does not heal. Or, it can be a lump or a thick or rough spot. It can affect any area of the mouth, including the lips, gums, tongue, and hard or soft palate. If you have pain, tenderness, or numbness anywhere in the mouth or on the lips that does not go away after a week, talk to your dentist.

Oral cancer most often affects people who use tobacco.

If you use tobacco, talk to your dentist or physician about tobacco cessation treatment plans. Also, your dentist can check your mouth (and probably does) for oral cancer very easily and quickly during your routine cleaning and exam. Ask your dentist if he or she performs oral cancer screen-

ings to be sure.

Should I be concerned?

Mouth sores are common and rarely cause complications. Most go away in about a week, but it's important to monitor any mouth sores you develop. If you are concerned, or if the sore doesn't seem to be healing, contact your dentist or other medical professional for an examination.

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Artful Thinking

Hello friends. Here's hoping that the month of April has put a "spring "in your step.

Oh, by the way, for all of you Columbus School grads who plan to attend the 100 year birthday bash on April 28, 2017, feel free to bring along some old photos and memorabilia to share with your classmates. If any of you happen to have a photo of the graduating class of 1935 by all means take it with you. My 96 year old Aunt Josephine Daleo Maglionico is pictured among them and would love to see it and so would her children.

The town of Lodi has recently lost one of its favorite sons...The ever popular and much loved entertainer extraordinaire, Ronald E. Giles.

Since his passing in late December of 2016 there is a noticeable void in the universal scheme of things that will never be filled...he was that kind of person...one of a kind.

Ron grew up in the Borough of Lodi during the fifties and sixties. It was a time of transition for Lodi. Dirt roads were being smothered in macadam and open fields were fast giving way to the demands of progress.

The young people clung with a death grip to the town they had come to know and love.

In doing so they created a bond amongst themselves that



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was evident at Ron's memorial service ... They're from Lodi... say no more.

Ron was an integral part of that Lodi family whose roots dig deep into the sacred ground that is Lodi, New Jersey. Ronnie, as he has come to be known over the years, was born on November 13,1947. His parents, Henry and Dolores, were married in the summer of 1939. They took up residence at 24 Long Valley Road in Lodi during the winter of 1954. Henry became employed at the Bergen Sign Company where he retired from in 1970. Ron and siblings Neilla, Jennifer, Gilbert and Bruce were raised in Lodi.

Ronnie attended Washington School. He graduated in June of 1961.

Among Ron's childhood friends were Bob Rastocky, Danny Capose, Dolores Warchol, Sharon Mc Alpine, Barbara Weber and Rudy Loria.

Back then grammar school games, led by Gym Teacher Mr. Dellabadia, were dodge ball and a game called "bombardment" which according to Ron was dodge ball on steroids.

In the late 50s, Ron became a member of Lodi's first junior league football program which was created by the Ram's Bleacher Club.

Ronnie played for the E. W. Piece Dye Works, which was owned by John Bruno and coached by Mike Cottone and Tom Maggaro.

Teamates included Charles Tumminelli, Bill Masopust and Eddie Schiro. Ron once stated that he was the smallest kid on the team. One thing about Ronnie Giles he may have been on the short side physically, but when he entered a room he was larger than life. Though I was taller that Giles I always felt short when I stood next to him. He came at you from all directions until you felt completely outnumbered...Wherever you turned there he was...remarkable...that was our friend Ron.

Growing up in Lodi during those early years meant,

for most kids, hanging out at the now legendary and much remembered Main Street. Ronnie's haunts were Riggi's Hot Dogs on the corner of First and Passaic Streets and Humphreys Pizza located near Hunter Street. Tony's pool room, on Autumn Street, was the gambling mecca of the main drag. Not that anyone actually saw money change hands...it did of course, but like I said, nobody saw it.

Ronnie once told me that Tony's was the misspent part of his youth. Everyone who was cool, among them the "Lot Boys" who called Sorbello's parking lot their home, hung out there.

Tony's was owned and operated by Tony "da da" De Franco. Among its most celebrated visitors were Victor Lascari and another Lodi legend named Charlie Bomba.

Ronnie once joked that if he hung out there enough he'd become an Italian, despite as he put it, his red hair and freckles.

In the fall of 1961, Ronnie Giles entered the cavernous halls of Lodi High School. The freshed face kid from Washington School was overwhelmed by the size and magnitude of it...as were all of us at the time.

Ron, at an interview I did with him back in 09, recalled the time when he threw his hat into the high school political arena and ran for Freshman Class President. Ron received one vote and it was his.

"I learned about politics at an early age," joked Ron.

School Principal at the time was Mr. Frank Gaciofano, Vice Principal was Mr. Pasquale Maggese. They were two gents whose offices were to be avoided, if possible, at all costs.

Ron recalled to me that he seemed to gravitate there like a moth to a street light. "They told me that if I applied myself I'd be an honor student." He said "I was having too much fun doing visual and verbal humor." Ron always admitted that he loved being the center of attention and you know something folks, we his audience, loved him for it.

Ron's instant claim to fame at LHS was his Tarzan calls

during pep rallies and study halls.

The latter earned him legendary status as well as a seat in Mr. Maggese's office. Ron's LHS friends were Daniel Capozzi, Mike Ettz, who in 1967 was killed in action in the jungles of Vietnam, Tom Biegel, Frank Solimando, Richie Kwak, Austin Hawxhurst, Joe Weber, Al Norieka and, I'm proud to say, yours truly.

In October of 65, Ronnie enlisted in the Army. He served in Vietnam from April 66 to April 67. He was a member of the Infantry, Armored Personnel Carrier Driver, Ammo, Radio Man and Tunnel Rat with "A" Troop Cavalry 25th Infantry Division.

After his discharge in 1968, Ron pursued a career in the acting profession.

In the early 80s he reenlisted. This time around he served with the New Jersey and Idaho National Guard.

Ron transferred into the regular Army in 1996. In 2003, Ron served his country in Kuwait and Iraq.

He retired in November of 2007 at the rank of Sergeant First Class. Ron sang at many patriotic events in his uniform.

Ron left behind two grown children and two grandchil-

dren. He is remembered for his Saturday morning visits at Curioni's Pizza on Liberty Street with fellow Lodi resident James "Jimmy" Horvath.

Ronnie is a lifetime member of the Cavalry Association, VFW, Disabled American Veterans, Vietnam Veterans of America, Lodi Moose, Episcopal Actors Guild, Screen Actors Guild, The American Federation of TV and Radio and The Lodi Library.

For Ronald Eaton Giles his hero was his dad, Henry, whose name appears on the wall of the Museum of the American Indian in Washington, D. C.

Among his film credits are: The Taking of Pelham 1-2-3, What Happens In Vegas with Cameron Diaz, Ashton Kutcher and Dennis Farina. Ron also appeared in the 1968 production of Nuke 'em High plus leads and supporting roles in over 30 independent films nationwide.

Ron once told me that he wouldn't change a minute of his life in Lodi. "I can't imagine growing up anywhere else," he said. I'll tell you folks that growing up in Lodi with our pal Ronnie Giles was a happy and memorable experience. My life is better because he was a part of it. ###


