Trained and guided by the U.S., the exiles had expected support from U.S. military aircraft and help from anti-Castro insurgents on the island. Instead, due to a series of mishaps, they had fended for themselves with no support. The failed invasion heightened Cold War tensions between Cuba's political ally, Soviet Russia, and the fledgling administration of President John F. Kennedy. The following year, the Russians brazenly installed nuclear missiles in Cuba resulting in the Cuban Missile Crisis.

## April Fools' Day

April Fools' Day (sometimes called All Fools' Day) is celebrated every year on April 1 by playing practical jokes and spreading hoaxes.

The jokes and their victims are called April Fools. People playing April Fool jokes expose their prank by shouting April Fool.

Some newspapers, magazines, and other published media report fake stories, which are usually explained the next day or below the news section in small letters.

As well as people playing pranks on one another on April Fools' Day, elaborate practical jokes have appeared on radio and TV stations, newspapers, web sites, and have been performed by large corporations.

To give you a sense of how seriously some people take April Fools' Day, here are three of the greatest April Fools' Day hoaxes of all time:

• Swiss Spaghetti Trees — In 1957, the British Broadcasting Company (BBC) news program Panorama announced that Swiss farmers were harvesting a record spaghetti crop thanks to the elimination of the spaghetti weevil.

News footage showed Swiss peasants pulling spaghetti from trees. Thousands of viewers were fooled. The BBC reported receiving many calls inquiring how to grow spaghetti trees!

• "Taco" Liberty Bell — In 1996, Taco Bell announced that it had bought the Liberty Bell to help ease the national deficit. When the company claimed it would be renaming it the Taco Liberty Bell, thousands of citizens were fooled and called to complain.

The company revealed it was a practical joke a few hours later, but not before reporters asked White House press secretary Mike McCurry about the sale. Creating a joke of his own, he responded that the Lincoln Memorial had also been sold and would now be known as the Ford Lincoln Mercury Memorial!

• "Left-Handed" Whopper — In 1998, Burger King ran an advertisement in USA Today announcing its new "Left-Handed Whopper," which was specifically designed for left-handed Americans by rotating all condiments exactly 180 degrees. Burger King revealed the hoax the next day but claimed that thousands of customers had requested the new sandwich at their restaurants!

Although popular since the 19th century, the day is not a public holiday in any country. Source: Wikipedia and wonderopolis.org ###





Easter, Pascha, or Resurrection Day, is the most important religious feast in the Christian liturgical year. It celebrates the resurrection of Jesus, which Christians believe occurred on the third day after his crucifixion some time in the period A.D. 27 to 33.

Many pagan elements have become part of the celebration, and those aspects are often celebrated by many Christians and non-Christians alike.

Easter also refers to the season of the Church year called Eastertide or the Easter Season. Traditionally, the Easter Season lasted for the forty days from Easter Day until Ascension Day, but now officially lasts for the fifty days until Pentecost. The first week of the Easter Season is known as Easter Week or the Octave of Easter.

Easter falls at some point between late March and late April each year (early April to early May in Eastern Christianity), following the cycle of the moon.

Easter is linked to the Jewish Passover, not only for much of its symbolism, but also for its position in the calendar.

The Last Supper shared by Jesus and his disciples before his crucifixion is generally thought of as a Passover meal, based on the chronology in the Gospels.

Some, however, interpret "Passover" in John 18:28 as a single meal and not a sevenday festival. Interpretation of the Gospel of John differs from the Synoptic Gospels by placing Christ's death at the time of the slaughter of the Passover lambs, which would put the Last Supper slightly before Passover, on 14 Nisan of the Bible's Hebrew calendar.



Jr./Sr. HS band students are in Grades 7-12. There is one HS Band class in the school day. The 7 and 8th Grade band students take band for one marking semester a year.



As you know by now every so often I like to wander off the beaten path and tell you about life beyond the hills of Lodi. This is one of those occasions and the topic of the day is music. I told you about that marvelous twin sister musical duo from Austria who are based out of Liverpool England; The Mona Lisa Twins.

I might also have mentioned another musical duo from around here who call themselves Two for the Road. For those of you who don't remember, allow me to refresh your memory. Their names are Artie Maglionico and the King of Karaoke, Jack Sepede. You can catch their act at the Lodi Senior center on May 8th. Admission is free but it will cost you \$ 2.50 to leave. Anyway folks I wanted to tell you about this amazing saxophone player that I heard perform recently and who happens to be living right here in Lodi by the name of Lonnie Youngblood.

Lonnie was born in Augusta, Georgia on August 3, 1941. He has been on the entertainment circuit for 65 years and has played alongside some of the biggest names in the music industry. He played with the King of Soul, James Brown at Yankee Stadium and Madison Square Garden. Lonnie jammed with rock legends Chuck Berry and Jimi Hendrix. "Jimi had a touch that made him unique" recalls Lonnie. "He had a style that was all his own. It was unmistakable."

During his career, which is still boiling, Lonnie became close friends with the "Peppermint Twister" himself, Joey Dee of Joey Dee of Joey Dee and the Starlighters fame. Lonnie met Joey Dee while performing at the Peppermint Lounge in NYC. Some of you kids from the hill during the early sixties might remember Joey Dee sitting on his front steps with his band members at his house on Westervelt Place. Yes folks he rented the house near the corner of Contant Avenue and Westervelt Place. As usual if you don't believe me then ask my cousin Anthony.

Now here's something interesting folks. Lonnie actually played at Lodi's own Choo Choo Club. Do any of you remember seeing him there?

Lonnie Youngblood often took his act on the road and aside from performing throughout the USA the Saxophone player extraordinaire made extended visits to Italy, Germany and Japan where he was met with much love and appreciation. "While in Italy we did two shows a day." Recalls Lonnie "My wife, May, who was a dancer, traveled with us. We did 31 cities in 17 days."

Lonnie is still a very active performer and at 77 years old he's not even remotely considering retirement. "I'm not looking at the end of the road." he says "rather what's around the corner and the next oppor-

tunity." You can catch Lonnie's performance at the Stony Hill in Hackensack, Bareli's Supper Club, a NYC night spot called Parnell's on the east side. Also at the Village Grill in Waldwick and the Italian Bistro 202 in Lincoln Park. Lonnie can also be seen at private birthday parties, corporate parties, and funerals. I know something about playing at funerals since those who have heard me perform tell me that I should bury my act.

Lonnie's childhood inspirations include saxophonist Louis Jordan, Billy Holiday and Trumpeter Louis Armstrong. Today Lonnie, a Lodi resident, travels with a band of his own called The Blood Brothers Band featuring key board player Melvin Davis, Drummer Craig Stewart and Guitarist Kelton Cooper.

Lonnie's wife, May, who he married on September 18, 1965, handles the business end of the gigs and is technical assistant and DJ on the senior citizen circuit.

"I got my own horn in 1949", says Lonnie. "My dad finally broke down and bought one for me for \$128. My sister, Georgia Mae, introduced me to a guy by the name of Willy Brown who taught me how to begin. I have been playing ever since."

You didn't know that we had a celebrity living right here in good old Lodi USA, aside from me and Jack Sepede of "Two For the Road" fame of

### Historically Speaking

New Barbadoes to Boroughitis: A History of South Bergen

#### Part 2 of 4

The farmers of the area sold their produce to Hackensack or by boat to Paulus Hook (Jersey City) and New York City. They prospered until the American Revolution. In 1776, this area was under the control of Continental troops. When General Washington's troops withdrew from Fort Lee and New Jersey, they used Polifly Road as far as what is now Hasbrouck Heights. They then turned right toward what is now Wallington and crossed the Passaic River. The British cavalry, in pursuit, missed the turn and went to the end of the road before they could figure out what had transpired. By that time, Washington had the Passaic River bridge destroyed.

Loyalist forces were recruited by the Crown. These men were placed into a Tory militia force. To counter this, New Jersey authorized the raising of local militia companies. One of these companies was the Polifly Company. They constructed a stone fort called Polifly. The exact location appears to be in what is now Hasbrouck Heights. The location given is two hundred feet north of Terhune Avenue (now Passaic Street) on what is now Terrace Avenue. The fort was located on the east side of that street. This is now the location of Park Terrace Garden Apartments.

The fort appears to have changed hands at one time or another. General William Winds reported to General Washington that he captured the fort in a surprise attack. He then blew it up, leaving no stone atop another.

Both sides liberally foraged in the area. Passions ran high, Families were split. Fathers, sons and brothers went to the opposite sides. When the war ended, Loyalists had their lands confiscated and many were forced to relocate to Nova Scotia, Canada.

Lodi Township was created in 1826 by the Legislature, from the southern part of New Barbadoes Township.

The New Jersey State Legislature created Passaic County, in 1838, from parts of Bergen and Essex Counties. Hudson County was formed from the southern parts of Bergen County in 1840. The Township of Union was formed from the southern part of Lodi Town-

These townships would hold a town meeting every February to address any issues that arose. Each township was allowed to elect a member to the Board of Chosen Freeholders of the county. ###

## Veterans Today

In January of 1813 America and Great Britain were at war. This would be the War of 1812 of course. Britain controlled all of Canada at the time and American military minds were looking to take Canada out of the War.

To aid in this endeavor, control of the Great Lakes would be needed. January of this year is significant because that is when the new Secretary of War John Armstrong would take over his new position. Armstrong felt that by taking the town of Kingston, on the North side of Lake Ontario, it would cut off the British forts in western Canada and it would give control of Lake Ontario to

It would also take away a Royal Naval Dockyard on the Great Lakes from Britain. He came up with a plan to have 7,000 soldiers link up with Commodore Isaac Chauncey at Sackett's Harbor, New York on the South side of Lake Ontario and sail to Kingston and attack it. He wanted the attack to come before the St. Lawrence River thawed so that the British would not be able to reinforce the town.

Major General Henry Dearborn and Chauncey met with the Secretary of War in Albany, NY. They agreed with the plan but new intelligence called for a change. Lieutenant General Sir George Prevost had traveled to Kingston to visit upper Canada because the commanding officer there took ill.

Prevost was the Governor General of Canada and his appearance there made Dearborn and Chauncey think an attack on Sackett's Harbor was imminent. They felt that the Governor General had reinforced Kingston and they came to the conclusion that Kingston had around 6,000 men and they would now need to reinforce Sackett's Harbor.

In reality the Major General and the Commodore were mistaken. Prevost brought troops but only a couple of hundred. Even after deserters from Canada reported that Kingston had around 2,100 men they would not be moved to think otherwise.

They reported to Armstrong that Sackett's Harbor would need troops for defense. That means instead of 7,000 men on the attack only 1,700 would be used for Chauncey's attempt.

Not only that, since only 1,700 could be used they requested to attack the town of York because it was less defended then Kingston. Armstrong relented to the change. He wanted Kingston but would settle for York. If anything, taking York would be a boost in sorely needed morale.

Chauncey's squadron of 14 ships and landing craft sailed out of Sackett's Harbor and crossed Lake Ontario. On April 26, 1813, the squadron made its appearance off of York. Major General Dearborn, overall commander of the troops, stayed on the U.S.S. Madison while Brigadier General Zebulon Pike took command of the landing force.

Early on the morning of April 27, 1813, the first wave of American troops landed west of the town. Chauncey's ships fired grapeshot into the woods and surrounding area to push back any resistance. British Major General Sheaffe could not know exactly where the Americans would land. He had only four companies to defend the town

He also had about 300 Canadian militia and 40 to 50 Mississaugas and Ojibwa Indians, but not many. When the 1st American Rifle Regiment hit the shore there were only a few Indians in opposition. Quickly outflanked they fell back into the woods.

Sheaffe ordered the Glengarry Light Infantry to support the Indians and push the American landing force back but they were misdirected and got lost in the woods. Some of the Canadian Militia was taken north onto today's Dundas Street to prevent American troops from

outflanking the town.

All this fumbling while three more American Regiments hit the beach. Brigadier General Pike was now ashore. Sheaffe and his position were in trouble.

History has always shown that when the British Army was in trouble the commanders rely on the Grenadiers to save the day. Here was no different. Sheaffe ordered the Grenadiers of the 8th Regiment of foot to charge the Americans and drive them back. Pike ordered his troops to advance by platoons.

In support of the American advance Pike's troops had two 6 pound cannons. The Grenadiers launched their assault, brave and gallant as it was, it was no use. Pike's troops outnumbered them and shot them down. Taking heavy casualties the Grenadiers had no choice. They fell back to what was called the western battery.

The western battery was a position where cannons were placed to defend the town. The cannons there were older pieces but they could still fire. While preparing the battery for defense in these few brief swift moments the British were moving ammunition and gunpowder to the guns.

One of the chests exploded and killed 20 of the British troops. This took the wind out of the defenders sails. At the same time Chauncey's Ships pounded the fort and the towns other battery, known as the Government House battery, with his ships 32 and 24 pound cannon

Pike and his troops advanced to the fort walls and halted. What he didn't know was that Sheaffe had already decided that the town and fort were all lost.

He ordered the fort's magazine destroyed and the bridge over the River Don burnt. This would slow down any American force sent to chase them down. He took his regular troops and left the town.

The militia in the town was abandoned by Sheaffe. Pike was questioning a captured Sergeant as to how many troops defended the fort when the magazine exploded with a thundering noise that could be heard in Fort George. Trees, earth and rock and parts of the fort were thrown into the air. Pike and his prisoner were crushed by the debris. Pike's

troops were furious over his death. Negotiations for the surrender of the town had at this time begun and the Americans were furious that the magazine was detonated killing their commander.

Colonel William Chewett commanding the Canadian Militia was now in charge of the town and it was left up to him to discuss terms of surrender to the American forces. Chewett and U.S Colonel Mitchell had agreed to the terms and they awaited ratification from Major General Dearborn and Commodore Chauncey. Dearborn took his time signing but he eventually did.


The Battle of York was now over. The U.S. Army and Navy reported to have 55 killed and 265 wounded. Sheaffe reported for the British that he had 59 dead 34 wounded 10 captured and 7 missing. They also lost York and the dockyard along with the sloop of war HMS Sir Isaac Brock and the Duke of Gloucester.

The American troops lost all discipline when their commander was killed. Over the next 3 days they looted and burnt the town. Taking anything of value, troops went home to home causing mayhem and destruction.

They burnt the Legislative Building and they even took the Parliamentary mace to Washington. A Parliamentary mace is a ceremonial piece carried by the Sargent of Arms into government meetings to show the king's authority.

Taking York denied the British of some supplies and the dockyard but it didn't have a great strategic effect on the War. Sheaffe was reprimanded and lost his command for abandoning the town and militia. Highly criticized by the British, the American Secretary of War however, noted that he did save his regular troops to fight another day.

Later in the war when the British burnt Washington D.C. and wrecked Buffalo, N.Y., they would cite that it was retaliation for the destruction of York, the Capital of Upper Canada. The old town of York is the site of the city of Toronto today. Long gone are the guns and cannon fire of the War of 1812 but there is one thing that actually returned. In 1934 President Roosevelt sent back to Canada the Parliamentary mace taken in 1813 as a goodwill gesture. ###

#### Rutherford **Blood Screening** April 20

On Friday, April 20, 2018, the Rutherford Health Department will sponsor a Mult-Phasic Blood Screening Program for residents 18 or older. Appointments are required and can be made by calling the Public Health Nurses at 201-460-3020 between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. Monday-Friday.Walk-in appointments will also be taken during the same tome period.

The main objective of the program is to detect any abnormalities in the blood. The screening will check for approximately thirty (30) different items, including cholesterol, triglycerides and glucose.

There will be a nominal fee of \$21 which will cover the cost of laboratory analysis. For an additional fee, the following tests can be added: T4/TSH (two thyroid tests), Vitamin D level, Hemoglobin A1-C, blood Type, PSA, and C-reactive protein. Please call the office for the price of each additional test.

The exact cash amount, check or money order made payable to the Rutherford Health Department. This program should only be used as a screening device and not as a self-diagnostic tool or in the place of an examination by a licensed medical doctor.

A copy of the results will be mailed to the participants and their doctor. Those participants with tests results outside the normal range will be required to follow up with their licensed medical doctor. ###

## Filling You In

#### **Avoiding Allergic** Reactions in the **Dental Office**

Itchy, swollen eyes, sneezing and a runny nose may sound like a case of seasonal allergies, but for many, these are the allergy symptoms they experience each time they visit the dentist.

What is an allergic reaction? Allergies are sensitivities to a substance called an allergen that makes contact with the skin or is inhaled into the lungs, swallowed or injected. Some allergic reactions are mild, while others can be severe and life-threatening.

Who experiences allergic reactions? Allergic reactions often occur more frequently in people who have a family history of allergies. Substances that don't bother some people can trigger allergic reactions in others. It's important to discuss any allergies in your family history, or any known allergies that you have, with your dentist prior to your visit.

What might cause an allergic reaction in the dental office? Dental amalgam components. Dental amalgam is used to fill cavities caused by tooth decay. The metals in dental amalgams - silver, copper or tin — may bring about oral lesions or other contact reactions.

Latex. Latex can be found in many medical or dental supplies and devices, such as masks, gloves and syringes.

goods made from synthetic latex, natural rubber latex is derived from a milky substance found in rubber trees. If you are allergic to latex, ask your dentist if he or she has latexsafe products.

Local anesthetic. Local anesthetics numb your mouth and gums during dental treatments. Although allergic reactions to local anesthetics are rare, they can occur.

What are the symptoms of an allergic reaction? In addition to itchy, swollen eyes, a runny nose and sneezing, the development of hives, dermatitis (skin rash) and asthma also are common allergic reactions.

The most severe allergic reaction is the potentially fatal condition known as anaphylactic shock, which is characterized by generalized flushing of the skin, hives, mouth and throat swelling, difficulty in swallowing or speaking, changes in heart rate, abdominal pain, nausea and vomiting, anxiety, a sudden feeling of weakness (due to a drop in blood pressure) and unconsciousness.

What should I do if I have allergies or experience an allergic reaction? Talk to your dentist and the dental staff, and make sure that the information is included in your patient chart. If you have had severe allergic reactions, you should consider carrying an epinephrine kit (EpiPen®) and using a medic alert bracelet that clearly states your allergy. You also may want to carry a letter of explanation from your physician.

If you have allergic symptoms after a dental procedure, consult with your dentist and physician immediately. If you experience a severe allergic reaction after a dental procedure, go immediately to the hospital emergency room.
