



# About Easter

Easter, Pascha, or Resurrection Day, is the most important religious feast in the Christian liturgical year. It celebrates the resurrection of Jesus, which Christians believe Jesus and his disciples before occurred on the third day after his crucifixion some time in the period A.D. 27 to 33.

Many pagan elements have become part of the celebration, and those aspects are often celebrated by many Christians and non-Christians alike.

Easter also refers to the season of the Church year called Eastertide or the Easter Season. Traditionally, the Easter Season lasted for the forty days from Easter Day until Ascension Day, but now officially lasts for the fifty days until Pentecost. The first week of the Easter Season is known as Easter Week or the Octave of Easter.

Easter is termed a movable Christian holy day because it is not fixed in relation to the civil calendar. Easter falls at some point between late March and late April each year (early April to early May in Eastern Christianity), following the cycle of the moon.

Easter is linked to the Jewish Passover, not only for much of its symbolism, but also for its position in the calendar.

The Last Supper shared by his crucifixion is generally thought of as a Passover meal, based on the chronology in the Gospels.

Some, however, interpret "Passover" in John 18:28 as a single meal and not a sevenday festival. Interpretation of the Gospel of John differs from the Synoptic Gospels by placing Christ's death at the time of the slaughter of the Passover lambs, which would put the Last Supper slightly before Passover, on 14 Nisan of the Bible's Hebrew calendar.



# Fact Sheet: Global Species Decline

The world is facing a mass extinction of species. All species of mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians, arthropods (insects and arachnids), fish, crustaceans, corals and other cnidarians, and plants have declined, in many cases, severely. Human civilization has had a negative impact on most living things.

- Fact #1 We are amidst the largest period of species extinction in the last 60 million years. Normally, between one and five species will go extinct annually. However, scientists estimate that we are now losing species at 1,000 to 10,000 times the normal rate, with multiple extinctions daily. Multiple species will disappear before we learn about them or the benefits they bring to our planet.
- Fact #2 A new study has suggested that insect populations have decreased by more than 75% in Germany over the last 28 years. This is very alarming: 80% of wild plants rely on bees and other insects for pollination, and 60% of bird species rely on insects for food.
- Fact #3 Habitat destruction, exploitation, and climate change are driving the loss of half of the world's wild animal population.
- Fact #4 Primates, our closest animal relatives, are under extraordinary threat. Close to 60% of the world's 504 primate species are threatened with extinction, and 75% of our primate species are in severe population decline.
- Fact #5 Worldwide, more than 650,000 marine mammals are caught or seriously injured by fishing gear annually.
- Fact #6 In the past 20 years, around 75% of all toothed whale species, such as dolphins, porpoises, and 65% of baleen whale species (humpback, blue), and 65% of pinniped species (sea lions) have been affected through bycatch in fishing operations globally.
  - Fact #7 40% of the

world's bird species are in decline, and 1 in 8 is threatened with global extinction.

- Fact #8 Our big cats, including tigers, leopards, and cheetahs are in critical decline, and many will become extinct in the next decade. The world's cats are exploited for their body parts and skins. China remains the world's largest market for these critically endangered species along with the black rhino and other species.
- Fact #9 Lizard populations are especially vulnerable

to climate change. A recent study projects that if the current decline in lizard populations continues, 40% of all lizard species will be extinct by 2080.

• Fact #10 The American Bison once numbered in the millions and roamed from Alaska to Mexico. They now occupy less than one percent of their original habitat. Their existing habitat is so small and tightly controlled that surviving bison have been compared to herded cattle. Source: www. earthday.org ###

# Veterans Today

Near the town of Summerton, in Clarendon County, South Carolina is an old Indian burial mound. It sits along the Santee River. The River that is named for the small tribe that resided there and the same tribe that built the mound. The mound is said to be 1,000 years old and is used for ceremonies, burials and defense for the tribe when attacked by other Indians. Having the high ground is an advantage in battle whether is comes from nature or manmade makes no difference.

Once settlers from Europe came to America the Santee Indians were pushed out but the mound remained. Like many Indian burial mounds this one is not unusual but years later during the American Revolution the mound would become famous.

The British Army in the South during March of 1781 was in a bad state. General Cornwallis needed reinforcements and supplies.

How did this come about after so many British victories? To start with the Loyalists never turned out in the number the British had hoped for and although winning battles the Army shrinks in size with killed and wounded during the campaigns.

American General Danial Morgan had defeated Lt. Col Banatre Tarleton at the battle of Cowpens in January of 1781 and had taken many prisoners. Cornwallis wanted the prisoners back for use in his army and he took a gamble to try and get them back.

He burnt his supply wagons to make his army faster on the march so he can catch up to and defeat General Daniel Morgan's Division. Morgan moved quickly and took his troops and prisoners over the Dan River and Cornwallis lost the race and his gamble for he wasted all the supplies.

In March of 1781 General Cornwallis defeated General Nathanial Greene's Army at the battle of Guilford Court House. Although it was a tactical victory for the British Army Cornwallis lost many men in killed and wounded.

He decides to move his Army into Virginia along the Coast to meet up with the British Navy and get the needed troops and supplies. He leaves Lord Rawdon to deal with the rebel Army in South Carolina. He believed Rawdon had sufficient number of troops to hold the Colony.

Lord Francis Rawdon was in charge of the British outposts in South Carolina. He had several thousand troops but he had a large area to cover. The British had taken Charleston, South Carolina earlier in the War and with Rawdon in Camden the Santee River became a major supply route for the British.

To protect it Rawdon sends Colonel John Watson down River to build a fort. He picks as you might have guessed our old Santee Indian Burial mound. It was already as some had said, 40 feet high and gave a good view of the river. He built a fort on top of the ancient mound, now named after him Fort Watson.

The fort would be tested in February of 1781. General Thomas Sumter had captured 20 wagon loads of supplies intended for Lord Rawdon and his troops in Camden.

Sumter wanted the supplies floated down river to American forces but a traitor had diverted the boats to Fort Watson. Sumter ordered a frontal assault on the fort to recapture the supplies but he had not realized that the British reinforced the fort with 400 Soldiers. The assault was a disaster for the Americans losing many killed and wounded. The fort had proven its worth to the British.

Now that April had come and Cornwallis and his British Army were gone General Nathaniel Greene decided to bring the Southern American Army back into South Carolina to remove the British outposts.

He moved his troops into position to attack Camden and Rawdon. On April 15, 1781 he sent Colonel Henry Lee and his dragoons to reinforce General

Francis Marion to attack Fort Watson. Marion was happy to receive the Dragoons and Colonel Lee but his horsemen were not going to take Fort Watson by a charge of Horse. Marion and Lee didn't have any cannon among them.

So, they cannot knock down any of the fortifications built on top by the British. After the disaster of Sumter's attack there wasn't going to be any frontal assault by infantry either. This was going to be a siege.

Marion and his men cut off the water supply to the Fort. With no water the Fort would have to surrender when the water ran out but to counter this move one author said that the British dug a well.

Doing research on this I must admit I was stunned. Yes, I sat there thinking who would dig a well through 40 feet of a 1,000 year old burial mound and drink that water? It didn't seem plausible that they would do that.

I was thinking wow that's hardcore. I must give it to the British Troops defending this Fort because I don't think I would have had a glass of that. I would have dumped it out and asked for terms of surrender.

Luckily, kind reader, I have Colonel Henry Lee's memoirs. He stated that the British had dug a trench to the River and protected it with abatis. This cleared things for me. They didn't dig down they dug out. The British reestablished drinkable water. Some other plan must be devised if the Americans were to take the fort.

What to do next? Marion and Lee consulted their officers on what to do. Waiting to starve them out could take months. How to end the siege and take the fort as quick as possible? One of Marion's Officers by the name of Major Maham had the answer.

Once the plan was agreed upon troops were sent out to collect axes and cutting tools from the locals. Soon the woods all around the Fort were alive with noise of trees being cut and chopped. No doubt the British in the fort wondered what they were doing. Probably like you are now

On the night of April 22 the American troops took from the woods the logs that had been cut and built a tower with a completed floor at the top next to the fort.

This tower was possible because the troops of the day were familiar with building log cabins and it was also noted by the officers that like the Americans, the British had no cannon either. It was going to be a battle of rifles.

When the sun came up on the 23rd the tower that was about 10 feet higher than the fort gave the riflemen on top an advantage only held by the British up until that time.

Colonel Lee tells us what happened next. "A party of riflemen, being ready, took post in the Maham tower the moment it was completed; and a detachment of musketry, under cover of the riflemen, moved to make a lodgment in the enemy's ditch, supported by the Legion infantry with fixed bayonets.

Such was the effect of the fire from the riflemen, having thorough command of every part of the fort, from the relative supereminence of the tower, that every attempt to resist the lodgment was crushed, The commandant, finding every resource cut off, hung out the with flag." Fort Watson was now ours and all inside were taken prisoner. A great American victory brought about by an inventive and thoughtful Major Maham.


Fort Watson can be visited today. The old fort was ripped down by Marion's troops but the mound remains. It has a staircase to climb to the top. You too can see the scenic view of the Santee River as the British and American Revolutionary Soldiers had once viewed it so long ago. Happy Easter. ###

April 10, 1942 - During World War II in the Pacific, the Bataan Death March began as American and Filipino prisoners were forced on a six-day march from an airfield on Bataan to a camp near Cabanatuan.

Some 76,000 Allied POWs including 12,000 Americans were forced to walk 60 miles under a blazing sun without food or water to the POW camp, resulting in over 5,000 American deaths. ###

For those of you who came out to see the "Blues Project" perform at The Lodi Library on Saturday, February 23, 2019, band members Joe "Joey Bart" Bartoloni, Jack "King of Karaoke" Sepede and yours truly send out a heartfelt thanks for allowing us to entertain you. Hope you had fun. We sure did.

Hey, speaking of The Lodi Library (you saw that coming did you not?) its doors opened to the community on October 21, 1924. A fellow by the name of Marinas Griep, and Garfield Librarian Miss Irene Kennedy, were on the scene to officially begin the activities. Vincent C. Focarino, had the honors of taking out The Library's first book. How's that bit of trivia for all of you Lodi history buffs? Wait there's more! The facility was located in the Red Cross room in the original Municipal Building. Can any of you tell me where that might have been? No really! I haven't the slightest idea.

Anyway dear reader, when first The Library became available to the public there were on hand one thousand books. That number, according to Mr. Griep, was expected to rise. He wasn't kidding either. As of this writing Library Director Karyn Gost, approximates the number of books at 70k. Of course the rest as they say is History.

Alright folks let's see... what else can I throw at you? Again I hope you "out of towners" haven't turned the page yet after all this is your column as well and quite frankly, I can't afford to lose you.

Stay with me Moonachie, Hasbrouck Heights, Wallington, Little Ferry, Wood-Ridge and the rest of you. Sooner or later you might stumble onto something of interest. Thank

you very much. On Thursday, February 21, 1928, a place called Mc Graths Hotel, which was located on the corner of Main and Union Streets, was raised by a demolition company called "House Wreckers" and was duly replaced by a filling station. The property was purchased by the Good Gulf Company for \$36k.

Before that purchase the hotel was better known as The Lodi Inn and was run by Councilman Joseph Yosco. The hotel, at the time, was the oldest and the most frequented "Hostelries" in Bergen County. It was built in 1865 and was owned by a gent named Stephen Dagen.

By the late 1860s the hotel was acquired by James Hughes by way of a mortgage foreclosure. After his death in 1890, his daughter Mary Jane took over and subsequently sold the Inn to McGrath. Is everybody still with me? Come on Carlstadt grin and bear it I know you've got it in you.

Across the street from the Inn was a saloon owned by Patrick Galvin. In 1860 the building was raided by the same team of house wreckers. The timber was used to build a dwelling at 71 Union Street. Is that building still standing? Again I have no idea. Maybe someone from Hasbrouck Heights could pass that way on their way to Shop Rite.

Anyway...on the foundation of the former Saloon was built Lodi's first drug store. It was owned by Doctor R Soper, and is said to have been visited by towns as far away as Rutherford and, on occasion, East Rutherford. I'm trying to fit everybody in. Did I leave anyone out? Oh yea...Teterboro and South Hackensack. Aren't you glad you hung in there?

By the 1980s the drug store was purchased by Michael Azelino, who eventually did some house wrecking of his own and put up a two story dwelling. All of that went on at 71 Union Street.

Well that's gonna do it for this month folks. I look forward to meeting you here again next month in the meantime have a Happy Easter.

keep dumping plastic in the oceans, we'll have more plastic than fish floating around.

TREX makes boards out of these bags, which are used to make decks and outdoor furniture. It takes approximately 2,250 bags to make one 2x6 board that is 16 feet long.

The Rotarians are being assisted with this project by the Wallington Lions, led by King Lion Marie Doody, the Scherrer brothers, Nito, a Freshman and Neven, a Junior at Bergen Tech, and their grandparents Diana and Dave Caracozza of Wallington.


# TCJWL District Wrestling

# Filling You In

#### A Sore Subject

Mouth sores—they can be painful and irritating when you eat certain foods, when you bump them with your tongue or teeth, or even when you try to smile.

They can be caused by ill-fitting dentures, braces, the sharp edge of a broken tooth, bacteria, a fungal or viral infection, or they can be a symptom of a disease or disorder.

#### What are mouth sores?

Mouth sores are swollen spots or sores in your mouth, on your lips, on your tongue, or on the skin surrounding your mouth. There are several types of mouth sores, including:

• Canker sores. Canker sores are small, white areas of swelling or soreness that are surrounded by redness. Canker sores are not contagious. The cause of canker sores is uncertain, but some research suggests that immune system deficiencies, bacteria, or viruses might be the culprits.

Smoking, stress, trauma, allergies, certain types of foods (chocolate, caffeine, or acidic foods), or vitamin deficiencies also may make you more susceptible to canker sores. Canker sores usually heal within one week, but they can recur. And, while there is no cure for canker sores, over-the-counter topical ointments or gels that provide temporary pain relief are available.

Antimicrobial mouth rinses also may help to relieve pain.

• Cold sores. Often, people confuse canker sores with cold sores (also called fever blisters). Cold sores are groups of oftenpainful blisters filled with fluid that appear around the lips and sometimes under the nose. A person usually experiences his or her first cold sore infection in childhood. Once a person has had a cold sore, the virus stays in the body and can become active throughout the person's

Cold sores are extremely contagious and usually are caused by herpes simplex virus. Infection may be brought on by decreased immune response, lack of sleep, stress, or trauma. Cold sore blisters usually heal within seven to 10 days.

While there is no cure for cold sores, non-prescription topical anesthetics for temporary pain relief are available. Your dentist or physician also might prescribe an antiviral drug to reduce the infection.

• Leukoplakia. Leukoplakia appears on the inner cheeks, gums, or tongue and often appears as a thick, white-colored patch. It is associated with smoking or smokeless tobacco use.

Other causes can include poorly fitting dentures, broken teeth, and cheek chewing. It is extremely important to report any signs of leukoplakia to your dentist or physician because an estimated 5 percent of cases of leukoplakia lead to cancer.

Leukoplakia usually dissipates after the behavior causing the leukoplakia is ceased (stopping smoking or removing ill-fitting dentures, for example). Your dentist will check your healing progress every few months depending on the type, area of your mouth, and size of the affected area.

• Candidiasis. Candidiasis is a fungal infection that also is called oral thrush. Candidiasis appears as yellow-white or red patches in your mouth. Oral thrush is most common in newborns or in people whose immune systems are not functioning properly. People who have dry mouth or who are taking antibiotics also may be susceptible. It is found in people who wear dentures, as well

Candidiasis may form at the corners of the mouth with poor-fitting dentures. In these individuals, outbreaks of oral thrush can be prevented by cleaning the dentures and by removing them at night, if recommended by their dentist. If antibiotics cause the condition, your physician may consider reducing the dosage or changing the treatment.

For those with dry mouth, saliva substitutes are available. Antifungal medications also are available.

• Oral cancer. Oral cancer often starts as a tiny white or red spot or sore. Sometimes oral cancer presents itself as a sore that bleeds easily or does not heal. Or, it can be a lump or a thick or rough spot. It can affect any area of the mouth, in-

cluding the lips, gums, tongue, and hard or soft palate. If you have pain, tenderness, or numbness anywhere in the mouth or on the lips that does not go away after a week, talk to your dentist.

Oral cancer most often affects people who use tobacco.

If you use tobacco, talk to your dentist or physician about tobacco cessation treatment plans. Also, your dentist can check your mouth (and probably does) for oral cancer very easily and quickly during your routine cleaning and exam. Ask your dentist if he or she performs oral cancer screenings to be sure.

#### Should I be concerned?

Mouth sores are common and rarely cause complications. Most go away in about a week, but it's important to monitor any mouth sores you develop. If you are concerned, or if the sore doesn't seem to be healing, contact your dentist or other medical professional for an examination.

#### **Homeownership Benefits** - A Refresher

Home is where the heart is, but homeownership can sometimes feel like the money-sucking black-hole of all finances. The roof leaks, the pipes burst, the wiring fails... the problems go on and on. No matter how much time, effort and money you put into the property, things keep breaking - making it clear that homeownership comes with a lot of pain and responsibility. But it also holds lots of rewards and those who buy in to the housing market (a major pillar of the American Dream!) will often see terrific financial benefits.

To help you [especially YOU, first-time homebuyers] decide if owning a home makes the most sense I'm going to list some of the main reasons people choose homeownership over renting.

First of all, It's A Good Investment. The recent recession threw a wrench into the idea that home ownership always builds wealth over time. But the fact remains that owning a home is one of the fundamental means of accumulating wealth as we age. As a homeowner, your housing payment is an investment, unlike renters who see no return on that monthly expense. Each monthly payment contributes to the principal.

Look at it this way: Putting money into home ownership versus a rental is akin to the difference between putting money into an investment account versus a no-interest checking

account, with the latter being only as valuable as it is in the moment while the former increases over time.

Second of all, You Enjoy Significant Tax Deductions. Tax breaks are by far one of the biggest incentives of homeownership. Most notable is the deduction for the interest and property tax portion (modified somewhat last year) of your mortgage which is particularly useful for off-setting the initial financial blow that comes with purchasing your property. That's because, in the first years of owning your home, you're mostly just paying off the interest on your mortgage, as opposed to the principal. The first year you buy your home you are also able to write off any mortgage points (also called origination fees) on your loan – no matter whether they are paid by you or the seller - which can lead to pretty considerable savings depending on how many points you claimed [origination fees of 1 percent or more are common]. And if you ever decide to refinance your home after building sufficient equity in it, you also have the option of taking out a home equity line of credit, which is, itself, tax deductible.

Third, You're Amassing Equity. Every single month that you pay your mortgage you own just a bit more of your home. This is a big benefit over renting, where you're paying comparable monthly fees without any comparable stakes. The equity in your home builds in two ways and often concurrently: 1) equity builds as the value of your home increases, and 2) equity builds as you pay off more of your loan. These two factors mean that after the first couple of years (when, again, you're mostly just paying mortgage interest), every month you pay money toward your loan you are building up your financial resources for the future. It's why some people refer to mortgage payments as "forced savings" because, in a

sense, you are being compelled to save - and that's a good

Fourth: Positive Perks. Home ownership has other financial benefits that may come in handy for you someday. For example, a mortgage is considered "good debt," and as such, it is likely to increase your credit score, provided you always make your payments on time. It also proves your creditworthiness for other things you may want to consider, like a business loan or new line of credit. It can even lower your monthly car insurance pay-

So, although there will always be some disadvantages associated with owning a home, there are big financial benefits available solely to homeowners. Why throw away all that money on rent? You gotta to live someplace; why not pay off your own property instead of your landlord's...?! ###


# **Chief Cervasio Honored**




# Moonachie PD Moves

















On Wednesday, February 27, 2019, the Moonachie Police Department moved into their new headquarters in the newly constructed Municipal Building at 70 Moonachie Road.

The key element of the move was the set-up and transfer of Police communications. Furniture and files were also moved that day.

The new facility includes locker rooms for men and


