

## **HH Leisure Club Entertained** with Singing and Dancing



## April Fools' Day

April Fools' Day (sometimes called All Fools' Day) is celebrated every year on April 1 by playing practical jokes and spreading hoaxes.

The jokes and their victims are called April Fools. People playing April Fool jokes expose their prank by shouting April

Some newspapers, magazines, and other published media report fake stories, which are usually explained the next day or below the news section in small letters.

As well as people playing pranks on one another on April Fools' Day, elaborate practical jokes have appeared on radio and TV stations, newspapers, web sites, and have been performed by large corporations.

To give you a sense of how seriously some people take April Fools' Day, here are three of the greatest April Fools' Day hoaxes of all time:

• Swiss Spaghetti Trees — In 1957, the British Broadcasting Company (BBC) news program Panorama announced that Swiss farmers were harvesting a record spaghetti crop thanks to the elimination of the spaghetti weevil.

News footage showed Swiss peasants pulling spa-

ghetti from trees. Thousands of viewers were fooled. The BBC reported receiving many calls inquiring how to grow spaghetti trees!

• "Taco" Liberty Bell — In 1996, Taco Bell announced that it had bought the Liberty Bell to help ease the national deficit. When the company claimed it would be renaming it the Taco Liberty Bell, thousands of citizens were fooled and called to complain.

The company revealed it was a practical joke a few hours later, but not before reporters asked White House press secretary Mike McCurry about the sale. Creating a joke of his own, he responded that the Lincoln Memorial had also been sold and would now be known as the Ford Lincoln Mercury Memorial!

• "Left-Handed" Whopper — In 1998, Burger King ran an advertisement in USA Today announcing its new "Left-Handed Whopper," which was specifically designed for lefthanded Americans by rotating all condiments exactly 180 degrees. Burger King revealed the hoax the next day but claimed that thousands of customers had requested the new sandwich at their restaurants!

Although popular since the 19th century, the day is not a public holiday in any country. Source: Wikipedia and wonderopolis.org ###





## **About Passover**

Passover 2020 will begin in the evening of Wednesday, April 8 and ends in the evening of Thursday, April 16.

The eight-day festival of Passover is celebrated in the early spring, from the 15th through the 22nd of the Hebrew month of Nissan. Passover (Pesach) commemorates the emancipation of the Israelites from slavery in ancient Egypt. Pesach is observed by avoiding leaven, and highlighted by the Seder meals that include four cups of wine, eating matzah and bitter herbs, and retelling the story of the Exodus.

In Hebrew it is known as Pesach (which means "to pass over"), because God passed over the Jewish homes when killing the Egyptian firstborn on the very first Passover eve.

### The Passover Story in a Nutshell

After many decades of slavery to the Egyptian pharaohs, during which time the Israelites were subjected to backbreaking labor and unbearable horrors, God saw the people's distress and sent Moses to Pharaoh with a message: "Send forth My people, so that they may serve Me." But despite numerous warnings, Pharaoh refused to heed God's command. God then sent upon Egypt ten devastating plagues, afflicting them and destroying everything from their livestock to their crops.

At the stroke of midnight of 15 Nissan in the year 2448 from creation (1313 BCE), God visited the last of the ten plagues on the Egyptians, killing all their firstborn. While doing so, God spared the children of Israel, "passing over" their homes—hence the name of the holiday. Pharaoh's resistance was broken, and he virtually chased his former slaves out of the land. The Israelites left in such a hurry, in fact, that the bread they baked as provisions for the way did not have time to rise. Six hundred thousand adult males, plus many more women and children, left Egypt on that day and began the trek to Mount Sinai and their birth as God's chosen people.

Easter is linked to the Jewish Passover not only for much of its symbolism but also for its position in the calendar.

The Last Supper shared by Jesus and his disciples before his crucifixion is generally thought of as a Passover meal, based on the chronology in the Gospels.

throughout the state of New Jersey.






















## CC D.A.R.E. Culmination



## **Cherry Blossom Festival Branch Brook Park April 4-19**

New Jersey has more cherry trees than Washington, DC. Every spring, residents and visitors alike can see the largest cherry blossom collection in the United States.

Branch Brook Park, which runs through Belleville and Newark, has more than 2,700 Japanese cherry blossom trees that burst into full bloom during the annual Essex County Cherry Blossom Festival, April 4 to 19, 2020, which features various events.

Each year, thousands of visitors are awed by the beautiful colors of pink and white. The park first adopted a pink and white hue in 1927, when Caroline Bamburger Fuld donated 2,000 cherry blossom trees to the Essex County Parks system in memory of her late husband.

Branch Brook Park also holds the distinction of being the first county park in the United States opened to the public. it was designed by the famed landscape architectural firm of Olmsted Brothers, a successor to Frederick Law Ol-

msted, the designer of Central Park in New York City.

At 360 acres, it is the largest developed park in the County. It is featured by a combination of open meadowland and small patches of woodland on gently rolling terrain.

Named for a branch brook that flowed through the valley into the Passaic River, the stream that remains, and much of the surrounding landscape, still retain a natural appearance.

More than 4,000 cherry trees that blossom during April are greater both in variety and number than the famed Washington, DC display—the result of a 1927 gift from the Mrs. Felix Fuld Family. At its height the Cherry Blossom Festival attracts over 10,000 people a day.

The weeklong festival includes the (postponed-check website) Cherry Blossom Challenge Bike Race (an official NJBA event), the Cherry Blossom 10k Fun Run (a USATF-sanctioned race), a free 1-mile fun run, the Essex County Family Day with free kid-friendly activities, and Bloomfest, featuring Japanese cultural demonstrations, live music, a crafter's marketplace, food and more.

## Filling You In

## What Is Infection Control?

Infection control is a set of recommended safety precautions that dentists implement to protect their patients and staff in the office. Strict infection control is required to prevent the spread of disease, since many dental procedures involve direct contact with blood and saliva.

Improved infection-control procedures with heightened awareness of the dangers of infection mean that the instruments and supplies your dentist uses in your mouth are either heat-sterilized or they are disposable items intended for one-time use.

## Do all dentists practice infection control?

In 1986, less than 30 percent of dentists wore gloves, masks or gowns. Today, these infection-control tools are required in all dental practices.

To fight the spread of diseases, such as corona virus, human immunodeficiency virus (HIV), hepatitis B, syphilis and herpes viruses, your dentist has strict procedures and may use a variety of measures to ensure that instruments used during dental procedures are sterile.

As an extra precaution, many dentists and their staff are vaccinated for hepatitis B, to prevent them from potentially passing it on to patients. Sterilizing dental instruments, a process that destroys all forms of microbial life, is also an important part of infection control in a dental office.

## How else does my dentist protect me?

When you first sit in the dental chair, chances are the first thing you'll see is your dentist washing his or her hands. Hands are washed at the start of the day, before putting on and taking off gloves and after touching any potentially contaminated surface.

Your dentist may use a variety of protective items that are used once and then thrown away, including gloves, masks, paper drapes, suction/water tube tips and needles. Dentists

and their assistants can use different kinds of protective gloves.

Latex or vinyl gloves are used for patient examinations and procedures and are worn whenever skin could be in contact with body fluids. Between patients, the gloves are thrown away, the hands washed and a new set of gloves is used to treat the next patient.

For cleaning and sterilizing instruments, heavy rubber utility gloves are used. If you are allergic to rubber or latex, your dentist can wear nitrile gloves, which do not contain any latex rubber proteins.

## What are universal precautions?

Universal precautions, used for every patient, are safety procedures established by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the American Dental Association (ADA). These precautions require all dental staff involved in patient care to use appropriate protective wear, such as gloves, masks and eyewear. For more information on CDC Infection Control guidelines, please visit www.cdc.gov.

## Do dentists sterilize the handpiece (drill) and other instruments after each patient?

Dentists sterilize handpieces and other instruments between patients to prevent the transmission of diseases. Dental offices follow and monitor specific heat-sterilization procedures, which are outlined by the CDC and the ADA.

Most dental instruments are sterilized in special machines; it takes much more than just soap and water to make sure instruments are free of

Recommended sterilization methods include placing these tools into an autoclave (steam under pressure), a dry-heat oven or chemical vapor (commonly called a chemiclave). Typically, this equipment is kept in the office, away from a patient's view. Ask your dentist to show you how and where instruments are sterilized.

## How are other objects sterilized?

Before you enter the examination room, all surfaces, such as the dental chair, drawer handles and countertops are disinfected. To sterilize equipment that can't be moved, such as X-ray units and countertops, disinfectant is applied after each patient to ensure a germfree environment.

Some offices may drape this equipment with protective covers, which are replaced after each patient. Disposable sharp items, such as needles, that cannot be sterilized are disposed of in puncture-resistant biohazard containers. Anything contaminated with blood or saliva is disposed of in special containers with safety lids.

Ask your dentist for additional information on how he or she is keeping you safe from germs and infectious diseases.



## Real Estate Insight

### **Today's Real Estate Battleground**

Would-be homeowners, we feel your pain!!! Insane prices, zero inventory, ruthless bidding wars and constant, heart-wrenching uncertainty. Generally speaking, buying a home can be stressful in the best of circumstances. But now - with the anxiety of multiple, competing offers - it often feels like a nightmare baseball game: nail-biting, teeth-gnashing, losing-in-the-bottom-of-the-ninth. Still, some people succeed in winning bidding wars, even up against big odds. Here's how we realtors advised some of them to do it...

- Be Early and Be Ready You need to be alerted to new listings as soon as they appear and available to check them out post haste - with checkbook in hand!
- Have a Lender and Loan Ready to Go - Demonstrating that you can make good on the deal means more than producing a simple, generic pre-approval letter. Have your lender at the ready to issue an approval letter for the property in question. Give the lender all they'll need for a pre-approval, and select the loan you want ahead of time. When the time comes, your lender should be able to produce a pre-approval letter that is specific to the situation at hand. That will help you to stand out.
- Proof of Funds You should have proof of funds ready to go before making any offers. At the absolute minimum, be willing to put down at least 20 percent on any home that you consider, and remember that many buyers will offer a lot more than that. Ideally, you should be able to show that you can cover the difference in the event that the appraisal falls through.
- Give Your Very Best Offer the First Time – People used to start with a lower of-

fer and to increase it later, in the event that it might be beat out by another bidder. This is unthinkable in our current real estate market, as so many additional offers may flood in that you won't get a chance to make another offer. Therefore, put forth your absolute best offer first, or you run the risk of being out of consideration right from the start.

- Reduce or Eliminate Contingencies - This one can backfire, so proceed with caution. In this type of climate, buyers who are willing to forego some of the usual contingencies may have a leg up on the competition. If you have enough cash to cover the difference, consider waiving the appraisal contingency. However, be very careful about waiving escape contingencies for the mortgage or home inspection.
- Offer a High Earnest Money Deposit - More and more buyers are attempting this one. Consider offering a larger than usual earnest money deposit to demonstrate your commitment to buying the home. Remember, though, that you can lose the deposit if

you're not careful and diligent about deadlines.

- Offer to Help the Sellers **However You Can -** Find ways to sweeten the deal to make your offer stand out. After all, not all sellers are purely motivated by financial gain. Some just want a smooth, easy time. A good technique is to state in your offer letter, "will settle on sellers' schedule," so they know that they can schedule closing to suit their needs. You could also offer to let them rent the house after it sells for free for one month or take other steps to accommodate their situation.
- Consider Using an Escalation Clause - This is an addendum to a purchase offer that authorizes the buyer's agent to offer a specific amount above the best offer that the sellers receive. Without having to consult you, then, your realtor can counter the best offer with one for a specific amount that you agree upon beforehand.

Lastly, and this isn't easy: try not to fall overly in love with any one home you might want to buy in this crazy market. Because, otherwise, sadly, you're apt to get your heart broken again and again.

## Historically Speaking

### The Double Whammy of 1999 Part 5 of 5 Parts, The Journey Home

Because of the fire, both the police and fire departments were now homeless. A solution had to be found to temporarily house these departments. Bergen County sent their mobile command center trailer. This would house the Hasbrouck Heights Police Desk. Four trailers were set up in the Franklin Gym basketball court on December 18, to house the entire police department.

William Kundert, of Kundert Volvo, offered his garage facility, then located at 380 Terrace Avenue, for use of the Borough. It was deemed that the Heights Fire Department would temporarily use this location.

As the Kundert garage facility was only a temporary solution, Fire Chief Vincent Monahan would have many meetings with the Mayor and Borough officials to map out a plan.

Engineers, hired by the Borough, stated that the west bay of the old Borough Hall was safe for the use of the fire department. Ladder Truck 617 and Engine 615 would be housed here.

The Borough contracted for two Butler buildings (temporary steel framed structures covered with a plastic fabric). The two ambulances, 603 and 604, were housed in one building, with Engine 616 and Rescue 614 in the other. The move-in was accomplished during October of 2000.

Arthur Knobloch would begin his two-year term as Chief of the Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department on January 1, 2001. He and Police Chief Michael Colaneri would provide input for the proposed new public safety building.

The Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department Annual Inspection would be held at the Masonic Hall for the next three years.

The plan for the new building first called for the demolition of the old Borough Hall in its entirety. A new location had to be found for the fire department. A site located across from the new Borough Hall on Central Avenue (now the location of the parking lot and playground), was chosen.

Construction at that location was started on July 10, 2002 and the entire department moved in on September 3, 2002. This temporary building was jokingly referred to as the "Hershey Kiss" due to the shape and color of the building. The annual fire department inspections of 2003 and 2004 were held here.

Construction of the new public safety building was begun on March 13, 2003. The Hasbrouck Heights Masons held a dedication of the cornerstone on November 13, 2003.

The fire department aspect of the building would be overseen by Chief Robert Thomasey. Chief Thomasey was elected chief and served for the years 2003-2004. He and Chief Colaneri would inspect the construction of the new building on a regular basis.

Mayor Ronald Jones, the Borough Council, Administration and the general public attended the Hasbrouck Heights Public Safety Building dedication on October 2, 2004. All were given tours of the building. The Fire and Police Departments were finally back "HOME" again.

Lessons learned from these two devastating events were taken to heart. There are now multiple redundancies in command and communication systems. The two buildings were built to the latest construction codes.

I wish to thank current and former members of both the Hasbrouck Heights Police and Fire Departments, current and former members of the Borough Administration, members of the community, Mutual Aid fire departments and Fritz Rethage for your input and support in preparing this history of those two horrific events, of twenty years ago, that has shown the resiliency of our community. ###


















## **Rutherford Police Department Hosts Officer for a Day**
