

Easter, Pascha, or Resurrection Day, is the most important religious feast in the Christian liturgical year. It celebrates the resurrection of Jesus, which Christians believe occurred on the third day after his crucifixion some time in the period A.D. 27 to 33.

According to the "Farmer's Almanac," this name came from the herb, moss pink, or wild ground phlox, which is one of the earliest widespread flowers of the spring.

This year, April's full Moon is the first full Moon of the spring season, which began with the spring equinox on March 20, 2022. This means that April's full Moon is the Paschal Full Moon—an important Moon to those who celebrate Easter, since Easter's date depends on the date of the Paschal Full Moon.

Easter is celebrated on the first Sunday after the Paschal Full Moon (i.e., the first full Moon of spring), which means that it will be celebrated this year on Sunday, April 17 (following the full Moon on Saturday, April 16).

Other names include the "Full Sprouting Grass Moon," the "Egg Moon," and, among Coastal tribes, the "Full Fish Moon," because this was the time that the shad swam upstream to spawn.

The Native American Indians of the northern and eastern United States kept track of the seasons by giving a name to each recurring full moon. European settlers followed the custom. ###



About Passover

Passover 2022 will begin in the evening of Friday, April 15 and ends in the evening of Saturday, April 23.

The eight-day festival of Passover is celebrated in the early spring, from the 15th through the 22nd of the Hebrew month of Nissan. Passover (Pesach) commemorates the emancipation of the Israelites from slavery in ancient Egypt. Pesach is observed by avoiding leaven, and highlighted by the Seder meals that include four cups of wine, eating matzah and bitter herbs, and retelling the story of the Exodus.

In Hebrew it is known as Pesach (which means "to pass over"), because God passed over the Jewish homes when killing the Egyptian firstborn on the very first Passover eve.

The Passover Story in a Nutshell

After many decades of slavery to the Egyptian pharaohs, during which time the Israelites were subjected to backbreaking labor and unbearable horrors, God saw the people's distress and sent Moses to Pharaoh with a message: "Send forth My people, so that they may serve Me." But despite numerous warnings, Pharaoh refused to heed God's command. God then sent upon Egypt ten devastating plagues, afflicting them and destroying everything from their livestock to their crops.

At the stroke of midnight of 15 Nissan in the year 2448 from creation (1313 BCE), God visited the last of the ten plagues on the Egyptians, killing all their firstborn. While doing so, God spared the children of Israel, "passing over" their homes—hence the name of the holiday. Pharaoh's resistance was broken, and he virtually chased his former slaves out of the land. The Israelites left in such a hurry, in fact, that the bread they baked as provisions for the way did not have time to rise. Six hundred thousand adult males, plus many more women and children, left Egypt on that day and began the trek to Mount Sinai and their birth as God's chosen people.

The Last Supper shared by Jesus and his disciples before his crucifixion is generally thought of as a Passover meal, based on the chronology in the Gospels.





Pascrell Announces Federal Action to Restore Lower Hackensack River

U.S. Rep. Bill Pascrell, Jr. (D-NJ-09) announced to-day the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has proposed the inclusion of the Lower Hackensack River to the agency's Superfund National Priorities List (NPL).

The NPL includes sites where releases of contamination pose significant human health and environmental risks. Pascrell led his colleagues in a letter requesting this move by the EPA, which will allow the Superfund cleanup process to commence.

"The EPA accepting our request and prioritizing the cleanup of our Lower Hackensack River here in North Jersey is terrific news. I have for years led federal efforts to restore the river from its current contaminated state because our communities, our children, and our environment deserve better," said Rep. Pascrell, a cosponsor of the landmark Green New Deal. "In July of last year, I wrote to my friends at the EPA requesting they include the Lower Hackensack on their National Priorities list so we could swiftly begin the Superfund cleanup process. I have also strongly supported the State of New Jersey's efforts to hold up their end of the bargain in this endeavor. The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act passed by our Democratic Congress delivers once again. I commend EPA Administrator Regan, Regional Administrator Garcia, and the entire Biden

Administration for their focus on environmental issues and their accessibility on local issues like this. Together we will restore the Lower Hackensack River to its former glory."

"The industrial activities of New Jersey's past have helped build America, but it has also left behind a legacy of contamination that unfairly burdens communities of color," said EPA Regional Administrator Lisa F. Garcia. "By proposing to add the Lower Hackensack River to the National Priorities List, EPA is showing its commitment to overburdened and underserved communities - no project is too big, and America's natural resources are for everyone to enjoy."

"Governor Murphy and I are thrilled that the EPA is taking this next important step toward adding the Lower Hackensack River to the National Priorities List," said New Jersey Commissioner of Environmental Protection Shawn M. LaTourette. "Designating the Lower Hackensack as a federal Superfund site will provide the tools we need to remove decades of contamination that have polluted river sediments and restore the natural resources that have been impaired for far too long. Cleanup of the river presents a remarkable opportunity to help the river reach its full potential as an ecological gem and economic asset in the heart of the state's most densely populated region." ###

The new Center – the organization's third – is located at Van Buskirk Island County Park and is a cooperative venture between Hackensack Riverkeeper and the Bergen County Parks Department.

That same day, the Paddling Centers at Overpeck Park in Teaneck, NJ and Laurel Hill Park in Secaucus, NJ will reopen for the 2022 season.

"We are so very much looking forward to the Grand Opening and for welcoming people of all ages back to the river," said Riverkeeper Captain Bill Sheehan. "Nothing makes me happier than knowing the days are getting longer and we'll soon be launching kayaks, leading River Cleanups - and I'll soon have a moving deck under my feet."

Hackensack Riverkeeper offers a series of seven distinct *Eco-Program opportunities:*

• Eco-Cruises The original Hackensack River environmental education tour. Riverkeeper operates two 30-foot research vessels: the Geraldine Theresa, with Captain Bill Sheehan at the helm; and the Robert H. Boyle II, piloted by Captain Hugh Carola.

Three itineraries are available: Meadowlands Discovery, which explores the wetlands & creeks of the estuary; Boating

Hackensack Riverkeeper through Bergen, a nature/history trip that runs upriver to the center of Hackensack; and Excursion Around the Bay, a maritime history tour to Staten Island and Port Elizabeth. Most Eco-Cruises leave out of Laurel Hill Park in Secaucus, NJ.

Three options are offered:

- Open Eco-Cruises are appropriate for individuals, couples and the general public. Fifty-four Open trips are scheduled from April 30 through October 9. Reservations are made online at www.hackensackriverkeeper.org by clicking links to eventbrite reservation pages. Open Eco-Cruises are not appropriate for large groups.
- Private Eco-Cruises are appropriate for groups of up to 20 persons for any date/ time during the season other than those set aside for Open trips. Group leaders have their choice of itinerary. Group Eco-Cruises can only be arranged by speaking with Program Director Captain Hugh Carola at 201-968-0808 or emailing hugh@hackensackriverkeeper.
- Combination Eco-Cruise Programs, which include a pair of 1.5-hour Meadowlands Discovery trips plus age-appropriate landside environmental education activities, can be arranged for schools, camps and other youth groups of up to 30 persons, depending on age.

- Thirty-six daytime Guided Paddles – focused on either wildlife or sightseeing - will be conducted on most Sundays from May 22 through September 18; at 9 a.m. and Noon.

Guided events are appropriate for individual paddlers as well as couples and small

Initially, the Center will be open weekends, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., beginning on the Grand Opening weekend April 23-24, but may expand operations based on demand. Like Overpeck and Laurel Hill, Van Buskirk will be open through mid-October.

Alaska

America's 49th state ranks high on the list of dream destinations for the traveling public. Scenic beauty abounds in The Last Frontier with numerous national parks and 17 of the 20 tallest mountains in the United States.

Alaska, The Great Land, is North America's premier place for viewing wildlife in its natural habitat.

For those wishing to visit, a cruise is often the first thing which comes to mind. An Inside Passage or Gulf of Alaska cruise offers the beauty of Coastal Alaska. The Inside Passage cruises are normally round-trip from Seattle or Vancouver. The Gulf of Alaska cruises are one-way between Vancouver and either Seward or Whittier in South Central Alaska. Typical ports on either of these cruises include Ketchikan, Juneau, Sitka, Skagway, and glaciers. While beautiful and exciting, ocean voyages only scratch the surface of what The Sourdough State has to offer.

Venturing beyond the sea trip to other regions of America's largest state, a traveler will find many unique and exciting opportunities. Land extensions can be added to most cruises, but vacationers may also plan a journey that does not include an ocean-going vessel.

Anchorage, the state's largest city, can be used as a base for day trips to locations within the region.

The city is also the hub for the Alaska Railroad. The railroad stretches from Seward in the south to Fairbanks in the heart of the state. Sites along the way include the picturesque village of Talkeetna with panoramic views of Denali (formerly Mount McKinley). Further north on the line is a stop for the Denali National Park entrance. Vacation packages are available that include hotel stays in your choice of stops along the route.

With mountains and numerous trails within the city limits of Anchorage, hiking and biking are major activities.

Not far from downtown, the Lake Hood Seaplane Base is the world's busiest floatplane operation. From there, flightseeing options abound year-round. In wintertime the floats can be replaced with skis. There are also helicopter tours from several locations in the area.

Even fishing can be experienced right in the downtown area on Ship Creek. A local shop can provide everything needed, from license to gear. Serious anglers can find also numerous locations on nearby rivers.

In addition, cultural activities are also not lacking in Anchorage. The Alaska Native Heritage Center offers an insight into the state's 11 major cultural native groups. The Anchorage Museum is a treasure trove of Alaskan history, including 600 items from the Smithsonian Institution on permanent loan. Art galleries and places to purchase native handicrafts abound, including the unique knife known as the ULU

Alaska is not just a summer destination. I was recently a guest of Visit Anchorage on an educational trip during the city's winter festival.

The "Fur Rendezvous" is highlighted by the ceremonial start of The Iditarod Sled Dog Race. The 1,000-mile race from Anchorage to Nome is known as "The Last Great Race." Following the race's start, I joined 1,000 other participants in "The Running of the Reindeer." This four-block run down the city's Fourth Avenue with approximately 25 reindeer is a colorful, fun event.

Additional winter fun can be had snowshoeing in the surrounding mountains, dogsledding through the woods, and chasing the elusive Northern Lights. (Due to changing atmospheric conditions, the Aurora Borealis is not always easy to view.) Another highlight of the trip was my first helicopter flight and landing on the Knik Glacier. While I did not venture on to the slopes, I also visited the nearby Alyeska Resort in Girdwood. This resort offers skiers and snowboarders challenging slopes along with deluxe amenities.

A popular misconception is that culinary options in the state are limited to salmon and crab legs. The local flavor is much more varied and innovative. During the festival you may even purchase a reindeer hotdog from a street vendor. I was fortunate enough to experience several notable dining establishments, some betrayed by their strip-mall location.

When planning an Alaska trip, remember it is not just a one style of travel destination. There are luxury cruises, expedition sailings, escorted tours, or self-drive trips by car or motorhome. Accommodations range from luxury hotels and lodges to moderate chain hotels and remote cabins.

Historically Speaking

By Accident

You probably never heard of Dr. Roy Joseph Plunkett. Yet, Dr. Plunkett has affected almost every aspect of our daily lives. Dr. Plunkett is credited with the discovery of polytetrafluoroethylene (PTFE), aka "TEFLON."

Dr. Plunkett was employed by the DuPont Company's Jackson Laboratory at Deepwater, New Jersey. He was working on a project to develop variations of the refrigerant Freon. One of his experiments did not go as planned. Dr. Plunkett later explained how this came about.

On the morning of April 6, 1938, his assistant placed a small gas cylinder, that they had filled the day before, into an apparatus for testing. When the cylinder was opened, no gas came out.

At first it was felt that the cylinder was faulty and the gas had leaked out. They were about to discard it. However, a check showed that the cylinder had not lost any weight. Upon cutting open the cylinder, it was found to have a white waxy substance inside. Intrigued by this compound, Dr. Plunkett investigated its properties.

He found that it had a high resistance to corrosion, low surface friction, high heat resistance and was an electrical insulator.

It was first used by the US Government as a lubricant and in the Manhattan Project (*A-Bomb*) during WW II. In 1954, a French company came out with the first non-stick pan called Tefal.

There are 20 acres of Teflon applied to the dome roof of the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome Stadium. When the Statue of Liberty was restored, Teflon was used between the copper skin and the stainless-steel frame. The thread seal tape, used in plumbing, is Teflon.

NASA has used Teflon in rocket motors, spacesuits and other applications. Gore-Tex clothing has a thin layer of Teflon inside to make it waterproof. Teflon has numerous uses in the medical field, including a bypass for stenotic arteries. It is used in dental floss

It is used in laser printers and some 3D printers. Another use is to keep insects inside an enclosure, as they cannot climb on it. Teflon is the only known substance that a Gecko lizard cannot climb up.

Teflon, the light bulb, the transistor and the popular shipping insert, bubble wrap, are among a long list of inventions that were all created in New Jersey. ###.

Another Big Fat Epidemic!

Wire fraud is a criminal act and involves a scheme to defraud a victim of money or property. We wrote about this particular scam some years ago but it deserves a new warning refresher today.

Indeed, the real estate industry continues to be an ever-increasing target of wire transfer fraud given the large amounts of money involved in each transaction. The FBI dubs this scheme "Business Email Compromise" - an operation so common it racked up a whopping \$1.8 billion in losses across 2020.

Scams in the industry have jumped more than 1,000% since 2015, and real estate is now one of the top victims of malware attacks in the country.

But, sadly, only 12-15% of all wire fraud incidents are even reported. As Diane Tomb, CEO of the American Land and Title Association, puts it, "The problem is actually much larger. It's a national epidemic."

It's much more common than you think! The COVID pandemic has created opportunities for these thieves to target real estate transactions even more aggressively. Hackers are preying on any relaxed online security of those working from

home and capitalizing on the increase in remote communication.

You may be asking yourself: If this problem is so prevalent then why can't the industry just fix it and eliminate the risk?

The challenge is that there is no simple solution to the issue of wire fraud. This is partly due to the increased sophistication of wire fraud perpetrators, but also to the multiple vulnerabilities that exist through the various participants in a real estate transaction.

The typical wire fraud scheme involves the perpetrator hacking into one of the emails of a participant in the transaction (buyer, seller, Realtor, lender or title company). Once the perpetrator accesses one of these email accounts they can then monitor the email correspondence and identify the right times to request that the buyer to wire funds to a fraudulent account - usually days before the scheduled closing.

The perpetrators "spoof" an email address by an indistinguishable period or letter. Then, what appears to be a legitimate request to wire funds from the title company is in fact initiated from the perpetrator to a fraudulent account that will almost instantly be sent

overseas and untraceable.

In some instances, if the fraudulent transfer is identified quickly, the customer's bank and the FBI may be able to intervene to stop the transfer. In most cases, however, the transfer is not identified in time and the money is gone for good.

Imagine: you've worked hard to save up enough money to buy your first home, but just as you're about to close on the house, thieves swoop in - seemingly from nowhere - and whisk away the cash you've set aside for closing. It's a nightmare scenario that has become, tragically, reality for many home buyers across the country. So what can you do to protect yourself against wire fraud?

There are myriad ways you can protect yourself from scammers. This article, obviously, is not an instructional on cyber security [I'm certainly no expert!]; its aim is merely to alert the public of this very serious danger. The safest protection, though, is probably the most low-tech solution – just pick up the phone and call to verify. Even this has risks, but if you receive a request to wire funds, use the phone and call a number that you know is true to verbally confirm that you are wiring to the correct account.

In the hectic bustle of our current real estate market, when you're handling multiple stressors at once, it's easy to let your guard down. These criminals know you trust the professionals in the real estate transaction, and they exploit that trust to steal from you. So, be wary. If you aren't vigilant, you might quickly become a victim.

Tooth Decay

What is Tooth Decay?

Tooth decay, also known as caries or cavities, is an oral disease that affects many people. Unlike other diseases, however, caries is not life-threatening and is highly preventable, though it affects most people to some degree during their lifetime.

Natural bacteria live in your mouth and form plaque. The plaque interacts with deposits left on your teeth from

sugary and starchy foods and produces acids. These acids damage tooth enamel over time by dissolving, or demineralizing enamel, which weakens the teeth and leads to tooth decay.

Foods containing carbohydrates (starches and sugars), such as soda pop, candy, ice cream, milk, and cake, and even some fruits, vegetables, and juices, may contribute to tooth decay.

• How Are Cavities Prevented? The acids formed by

plaque can be counteracted simply by saliva in your mouth, which acts as a buffer and remineralizing agent. Dentists often recommend chewing sugarless gum to stimulate your flow of saliva.

However, though it is the body's natural defense against cavities, saliva alone is not sufficient to combat tooth decay.

The best way to prevent cavities is to brush and floss regularly. To rebuild the early damage caused by plaque bacteria, we use fluoride, a natural substance that helps to remineralize the tooth structure. Fluoride is added to toothpaste to fight cavities. The most common source of fluoride is in the water we drink. Fluoride is added to most community water supplies and to many bottled and canned beverages.

If you are at medium-to high-risk for cavities, your dentist may recommend special high-concentration fluoride gels, mouthrinses or dietary fluoride supplements. Your dentist may also use professional strength anti-cavity varnish, or sealants thin, plastic coatings that provide an extra barrier against food and debris.

· Who Is at Risk for Cavities? Because we all carry bacteria in our mouths, everyone is at risk for cavities. Those with a diet high in carbohydrates and sugary foods and those who live in communities without fluoridated water are

And because the area around a restored portion of a tooth is a good breeding ground for bacteria, those with a lot of fillings have a higher chance of developing tooth decay. Children and senior citizens are the two groups at highest risk

Prevent Cavities

1. Cut down on sweets and between-meal snacks. Remember, it's these sugary

and starchy treats that put your teeth at extra risk. Some research says certain foods, such as peanuts or sugar-free chewing gum, may be "friendly" to teeth. Eating these foods along with or after foods that contain carbohydrates may help to counter the effects of acids produced by bacteria. Drinking plenty of water can help wash away food particles.

2. Brush after every meal and floss daily. Cavities most often begin in hard-to-clean areas between teeth and in the fissures and pits the edges in the tooth crown and gaps between

Hold the toothbrush at a 45-degree angle and brush inside, outside and between your teeth and on the top of your tongue.

Be sure the bristles are firm, not bent, and replace the toothbrush after a few weeks to safeguard against reinfecting your mouth with old bacteria than can collect on the brush. Only buy toothpastes and rinses that contain fluoride (antiseptic rinses also help remove plaque) and that bear the


American Dental Association seal on the package. Children under age 6 should only use a small pea-sized dab of toothpaste on the brush and should spit out as much as possible, because a child's developing teeth are sensitive to higher fluoride levels.

Finally, because caries is a transmittable disease, toothbrushes should never be shared, especially with your children.

3. See your dentist at least every six months for checkups and professional cleanings. Because cavities can be difficult to detect, a thorough dental examination is very important. If you get a painful toothache, if your teeth are very sensitive to hot or cold foods or if you notice signs of decay like white spots, tooth discolorations or cavities, make an appointment right away.

The first National Autism Awareness Month was declared by the Autism Society in April 1970.

The aim of this month is educate the public about autism. Autism is a complex mental condition and developmental disability, characterized by difficulties in the way a person communicates and interacts with other people.

The Autism Society of America also run a year long campaign through their 1 Power 4 Autism initiative, in which people are encouraged to hold events to raise awareness and support for those affected by autism.

April Fools' Day

April Fools' Day (sometimes called All Fools' Day) is celebrated every year on April 1 by playing practical jokes and spreading hoaxes.

The jokes and their victims are called April Fools. People playing April Fool jokes expose their prank by shouting April Fool.

Some newspapers, magazines, and other published media report fake stories, which are usually explained the next day or below the news section in small letters.

As well as people playing pranks on one another on April Fools' Day, elaborate practical jokes have appeared on radio and TV stations, newspapers, web sites, and have been performed by large corporations.

To give you a sense of how seriously some people take April Fools' Day, here are three of the greatest April Fools' Day hoaxes of all time:

• Swiss Spaghetti Trees
— In 1957, the British Broadcasting Company (BBC) news
program Panorama announced
that Swiss farmers were harvesting a record spaghetti crop
thanks to the elimination of the
spaghetti weevil.

News footage showed Swiss peasants pulling spaghetti from trees. Thousands of viewers were fooled. The BBC reported receiving many calls inquiring how to grow spaghetti trees!

• "Taco" Liberty Bell — In 1996, Taco Bell announced that it had bought the Liberty Bell to help ease the national deficit. When the company claimed it would be renaming it the Taco Liberty Bell, thousands of citizens were fooled and called to complain.

The company revealed it was a practical joke a few hours later, but not before reporters asked White House press secretary Mike McCurry about the sale. Creating a joke of his own, he responded that the Lincoln Memorial had also been sold and would now be known as the Ford Lincoln Mercury Memorial!

• "Left-Handed" Whopper — In 1998, Burger King ran an advertisement in USA Today announcing its new "Left-Handed Whopper," which was specifically designed for left-handed Americans by rotating all condiments exactly 180 degrees. Burger King revealed the hoax the next day but claimed that thousands of customers had requested the new sandwich at their restaurants!

These changes reflected the evolving nature, qualifications and responsibilities of the members of the organization.

IAAP now has an international orientation and continues to provide education and training and set standards of excellence recognized by the business community on a global perspective.

The organization's vision is "to inspire and equip all administrative professionals to attain excellence."

The first National Secretaries Week was organized in 1952, in conjunction with the United States Department of Commerce and various office supply and equipment manufacturers.

The Wednesday of that week became known as National Secretaries Day. As the organization gained international recognition, the events became known as Professional Secretaries Week and Professional Secretaries Day.

In 2000, IAAP announced that names of the week and the day were changed to Administrative Professionals Week and Administrative Professionals Day, to keep pace with changing job titles and expanding responsibilities of the modern administrative workforce.



Persian New Year Stand By

On Tuesday, March 15, 2022, the Wood-Ridge Fire Department and EMS Squad were dispatched to The Fiesta for a "Fire Watch" detail for the Persian "Festival of Fire."

The Department reviewed the fire stations located in the parking lot and made necessary spacing adjustments. Firefighters lighted the rows of fires with flares.

The central focus of the evening was the "Festival of Fire" or Chahar Shanbeh Soori (literally means "Eve of Wednesday").

Families lined up outside in the dark to take turns jumping safely over a row of small fires, as a celebration of thanks for the new year. As they jump over the fire, they say, "The redness of the fire to my cheeks; the yellow of my skin to the fire," using the warmth of the fire to remove the evils of the past year to start the new year fresh.

Firefighters were strategically located and carefully monitored each jump, watchful that no one was burned *(or clothing caught fire)*. They assisted those who were unsteady.

This Persian Festival predates Islam and is estimated to be about 2,500 years old.

The holiday is believed to have been invented by Zoroaster. The Zoroastrian custom, which has no religious significance, celebrates Persian culture. ###
