





Each year, thousands of visitors are awed by the beautiful colors of pink and white. The park first adopted a pink and white hue in 1927, when Caroline Bamburger Fuld donated 2,000 cherry blossom trees to the Essex County Parks system in memory of her late husband.

Branch Brook Park also holds the distinction of being the first county park in the United States opened to the public. It was designed by the famed landscape architectural firm of Olmsted Brothers, a successor to Frederick Law Olmsted, the designer of Central Park in New York City.

At 360 acres, it is the largest developed park in the County. It is featured by a combination of open meadowland and small patches of woodland on gently rolling terrain.

Named for a branch brook that flowed through the valley into the Passaic River, the stream that remains, and much of the surrounding landscape, still retain a natural appearance.

More than 4,000 cherry trees that blossom during April are greater both in variety and number than the famed Washington, DC display—the result of a 1927 gift from the Mrs. Felix Fuld Family. At its height the Cherry Blossom Festival attracts over 10,000 people a day.

Branch Brook Park has been placed on both the New Jersey (1980) and National (1981) Registers of Historic Places. www.essexcountyparks.org ###





















On February 11, 2023, the Carlstadt Fire Department held a Testimonial Dinner at The Graycliff in honor of Ex-Chief Matthew Moran.

Easter, Pascha, or Resurrection Day, is the most important religious feast in the Christian liturgical year. It celebrates the resurrection of Jesus, which Christians believe occurred on the third day after his crucifixion some time in the period A.D. 27 to 33.

Many pagan elements have become part of the celebration, and those aspects are often celebrated by many Christians and non-Christians alike.

Easter also refers to the season of the Church year called Eastertide or the Easter Season. Traditionally, the Easter Season lasted for the forty days from Easter Day until Ascension Day, but now officially lasts for the fifty days until Pentecost. The first week of the Easter Season is known as Easter Week or the Octave of Easter.

Easter is termed a movable Christian holy day because it is not fixed in relation to the civil calendar. Easter falls at some point between late March and late April each year (early April to early May in Eastern Christianity), following the cycle of the moon.

Easter is linked to the Jewish Passover, not only for much of its symbolism, but also for its position in the calendar. The Last Supper shared by Jesus and his disciples before his crucifixion is generally thought of as a Passover meal, based on the chronology in the Gospels.

Some, however, interpret "Passover" in John 18:28 as a single meal and not a sevenday festival. Interpretation of the Gospel of John differs from the Synoptic Gospels by placing Christ's death at the time of the slaughter of the Passover lambs, which would put the Last Supper slightly before Passover, on 14 Nisan of the Bible's Hebrew calendar.



Full Pink Moon

The April full moon will appear on Thursday, April 6, 2023, at 12:37 p.m. It is called the "Full Pink Moon."

According to the "Farmer's Almanac," this name came from the herb, moss pink, or wild ground phlox, which is one of the earliest widespread flowers of the spring.

This year, April's full Moon is the first full Moon of the spring season, which began with the spring equinox on March 20, 2023. This means that April's full Moon is the Paschal Full Moon—an important Moon to those who celebrate Easter, since Easter's date depends on the date of the Paschal Full Moon.

Easter is celebrated on the first Sunday after the Paschal Full Moon (i.e., the first full Moon of spring), which means that it will be celebrated this year on Sunday, April 9 (following the full Moon on April

Other names include the "Full Sprouting Grass Moon," the "Egg Moon," and, among Coastal tribes, the "Full Fish Moon," because this was the time that the shad swam upstream to spawn.

The Native American Indians of the northern and eastern United States kept track of the seasons by giving a name to each recurring full moon. European settlers followed the custom. ###

Filling You In

What is a Dental Emergency?

Injuries to the mouth may include teeth that are knocked out (avulsed), forced out of position and loosened (extruded) or fractured. In addition, lips, gums or cheeks are often cut. Oral injuries are often painful and should be treated by a dentist as soon as possible.

How soon should I see a dentist?

Immediately. Getting to a dentist within 30 minutes can make the difference between saving or losing a tooth.

What should I do when a tooth is knocked out?

Immediately call your dentist for an emergency appointment.

Handle the tooth by the crown, not the root. Touching the root (the part of the tooth below the gum) can damage cells necessary for bone reattachment.

Gently rinse the tooth in water to remove dirt. Do not scrub.

If possible, gently place the

clean tooth in the socket to keep it moist. It is important not to let the tooth dry out.

If it is not possible to store the tooth in the mouth of the injured person, wrap the tooth in a clean cloth or gauze and immerse in milk or saliva.

What should I do when a tooth is pushed out of position?

Attempt to reposition the tooth to its normal alignment using very light finger pressure, but do not force the tooth.

Bite down to keep the tooth from moving.

What should I do when a tooth is fractured?

Rinse mouth with warm water.

Use an ice pack or cold compress to reduce swelling.

Use ibuprofen, not aspirin, for pain.

Immediately get to your dentist, who will determine treatment based on how badly the tooth is broken. Only a dentist can tell how bad the break is.

- Minor fracture: Minor fractures can be smoothed by your dentist or simply left alone. Another option is to restore the tooth with a composite restoration. In either case, treat the tooth with care for several days.
- Moderate fracture: Moderate fractures include damage to the enamel, dentin and/ or pulp (nerve and other live tissues). If the pulp is not permanently damaged, the tooth

may be restored with a full permanent crown. If damage to the pulp does occur, further dental treatment will be required.

• Severe fracture: Severe fractures often mean a traumatized tooth with slim chance of recovery.

What should I do when tissue is injured?

Injuries to the inside of the mouth include tears, puncture wounds and lacerations to the cheek, lips or tongue. The wound should be cleaned right away with warm water, and see your dentist as soon as possible or the injured person may be taken to a hospital emergency room for the necessary care.

Bleeding from a tongue laceration can be reduced by pulling the tongue forward and using gauze to place pressure on the wound.

How do I know if a piece of tooth is natural tooth structure or a dental restorative material?

It may be difficult to determine if the broken tooth is a natural tooth fracture or filling material. Many restorative dental materials are highly esthetic and may be indistinguishable from a natural tooth to the layperson. See your dentist as soon as possible for evaluation.

What can I do to be prepared?

- Pack an emergency dental-care kit, including:
- Dentist's phone numbers (home and office)
 - Handkerchief
 - Gauze
 - Small container with lid
- Ibuprofen (Not aspirin. Aspirin is an anticoagulant, which may cause excessive bleeding in a dental emergency.)

Runners: Fit feet finish faster

Both long-distance runners and casual joggers can improve their performance by keeping their feet in top condition and taking steps to control foot problems common in runners.

The human foot is a biological masterpiece that amazingly endures the stresses of daily activity. For runners, the feet are more vulnerable to injury than any other part of the body, and these athletes should be on the alert for signs of foot problems that can slow them down if not treated promptly.

The most common complaint from runners is heel pain. This condition, also called plantar fasciitis, is frequently caused by inflammation of the ligament that holds up the arch.

In athletes, heel pain can result from faulty mechanics and over pronation in which pressure is unequally applied to the inside of the foot. It also can be caused by wearing running shoes that are worn out or too soft

At the first sign of heel pain, I recommend runners do stretching exercises, wear sturdier shoes and use arch supports. In some cases, icing and anti-inflammatory drugs, such as ibuprofen, are helpful. Should heel pain continue, custom orthotics, injections and physical therapy might be required. Surgery normally isn't considered unless heel pain persists for more than a year and conservative treatment has failed to bring relief.

Neuromas and tendonitis are other common foot problems that affect runners. A neuroma is a pinched nerve between the toes that can cause pain, numbness and a burning sensation in the ball of the foot.

Narrow or overly flexible

shoes often are the cause and padding, orthotics or injections usually are effective. Sometimes surgery is the answer if pain between the toes continues for more than six months.

There are several forms of tendonitis that affect the Achilles and other areas, and all are treated with rest, icing, stretching and anti-inflammatory medications, and sometimes with orthotics and physical therapy. Over-zealous training usually causes tendonitis, especially among beginners who try to do too much too soon.

A common myth among athletes is that it's not possible to walk or run if a bone in the foot is fractured. I often hear surprised patients say 'It can't be broken, I can walk on it,

That's dead wrong, especially with stress fractures when pain and swelling might not occur for a few days. If pain and swelling continues after following the RICE procedure for three or four days, you should see a foot and ankle surgeon for an x-ray and proper diagnosis.

Blisters, corns and calluses: Never pop blisters unless they are larger than a quarter or are painful or swollen. Use a sterile instrument to lance the corner, leave the top as a biological dressing, wash, apply antibiotic ointment, and cover with a Band-Aid. Corns and calluses are caused by repeated friction, and should be treated by aseptically trimming the dead skin and eliminating the underlying cause.

Other frequent patrons include Eddie Brigati of the Rascals, Joey Dee of the Starlighters, Jerry only of the Misfits and, of course, me and my cousin Anthony of late. By the way, check out this photo with this column. That's me, Benson and two customers. Where is Anthony you ask? He



took the photo.

Cardy's, to my knowledge, is among the few places left that continues to offer ice cream sodas and a seat at the counter to enjoy them.

It might be difficult to find an empty bar stool since most of them are occupied by boxes of candy bars and chewing gum, much to a kid's delight.

"We don't get as many children lately" said Benson. "Most of them stay home on their computers. We do however, get kids from nearby Hasbrouck Heights and surrounding towns."

Cardy's, like Curioni's Pizza on Liberty Street, remains a monument of the past, a living monument that gives me comfort in knowing that they still exist.

Yes folks that's how I felt on my recent trip to Cardy's Sugar Bowl.

I guess the past is the future in disguise after all. If you don't believe me, then by all means ask my cousin Anthony. He walked in with me!

Historically Speaking

The Fighting Pforte

The Carlstadt Fire Department was founded in 1872. They predate many of the local departments that were formed around 1896. At that time, they were called the Fire District of Lodi Township. Their area of responsibility included the north end of Rutherford to the southern part of Hasbrouck Heights and all of the land in between.

The Pastor of the Evangelische Kirche, now the Presbyterian Church, offered the use of the Church bell as a fire alarm. The fire chief was given a key to the church so that he could raise the alarm.

The Carlstadt Firehouse, then located on Madison Street, was destroyed with much of the equipment, in a fire, in April, 1881. A replacement pumper was purchased with the insurance money.

The pumper was acquired from the Hudson, NY Fire Department, in 1881. It was built in 1865, by the James P. Smith Company of New York. This was a handpumper and had to be pulled by the members of the Department.

To put the pumper into operation, it took a crew of forty men. These firefighters had to pull the pumper, by hand, to the scene of the fire. They then had to man the foldout pump handles. There are two

2 ½ inch hose connections. The pumper was refilled by a bucket brigade. Men who worked the pump handles, had to be relieved after ten or fifteen minutes. These were the major reasons for the forty-man crew. The pumper was in service until 1920.

After its retirement, the pumper was stored in Firefighter Bill Pforte's garage. Bill kept good care of the unit. In 1978, a committee was formed to restore the pumper. The unit was completely disassembled in 1980 and over the next twelve years, every part was restored, repaired or replaced. No detail was overlooked. The wooden wheels were sent to Amish craftsmen to be repaired.

The unit was ready in 1992. It was felt that it should be given a fitting name. In honor of Bill Pforte and the fact that

it needed a forty-man crew, it was named "THE FIGHTING PFORTE."

On July 11, 1992, it was invited to take part in a parade in Hudson, NY. Members of the Carlstadt Fire Department pulled "THE FIGHTING PFORTE" through the town that the pumper originally protected. At the conclusion of the parade, it was placed in its original bay at the Hudson Fire Department firehouse. This signified a return from an alarm.

The pumper was then returned to Carlstadt. It now resides in the Carlstadt Fire Department Museum.

This museum is in one of the bays in the main firehouse. There is a large collection of fire department memorabilia on display. For additional information, contact the Carlstadt Volunteer Fire Department.

I wish to thank Firefighter Larry Lang, a thirty-year veteran of the Department and president of the Relief Association. Firefighter Lang was kind enough to allow me access to the unit and explained the history of the pumper.

"THE FIGHTING PFORTE" is a symbol of the pride and dedication of the members of the Carlstadt Volunteer Fire Department to the community of Carlstadt. ###

Guided Vacations, formerly known as Escorted Tours, are seeing a resurgence in popularity. The travel style is often derisively referred to as Bus Tours.

Over the last few decades, these journeys have become more refined. However, the Panorama trips quickly visiting numerous countries in an 18 day whirlwind was hilariously parodied in the 1969 film, If "It's Tuesday, This Must Be Belgium."

The travel genre dates back centuries to the days of educational tours of Europe from the mid-1600's through mid-1800's.

During this time, male students from wealthy English families would tour the great cities of Europe. The advent of widespread rail and steamship travel beginning in the late 1800's ushered in the era mass tourism which began with companies such as Thomas Cook & Son.

The advent of the Grand Tour saw travelers of both sexes visit the Classical Cities of Europe in style for weeks or months at a time. This was the beginning of the modern tourism industry.

Following World War II, the motorcoach tour business expanded to allow more middle-class travelers to experience the sights of the Old

Originally, most of the tours visited many countries on a hurried pace. Over the years tour companies began to create itineraries focusing on

smaller regions, one country, or limited areas of one nation. This development allowed for more in-depth exploration rather than just the highlights.

There are many advantages of the Guided Vacation. The foremost benefit of a tour is cost effectiveness. Travelers are sharing transportation, hotel accommodations, guides, and activities with economies of scale.

A tour manager accompanies vacationers overseeing all arrangements for worry-free travel. When visiting important sights, the tour company purchases all tickets in advance eliminating the need to stand in long lines.

As a result of Covid, it has become routine for places of interest to require tickets with timed entry making planning essential. Travelers often find the camaraderie of a Guided Vacation a beneficial feature of the trip.

These include Italy specialists Central Holidays of Moonachie and Perillo Tours of Woodcliff Lake, along with Ireland-focused CIE Tours of Morristown. International firms, Globus and Trafalgar, have offerings to worldwide destinations.

There are options for globetrotters with different budgets and travel styles. Budget tour companies may fill every seat on a motorcoach and have hotels with locations outside the city center.

First class options will usually find lodgings in central locations, fewer passengers on the coach, and include some meals. Premium choices are similar to first class, but will include more features with few optional extras. Deluxe vacations will frequently include in the base price nearly all tour choices and most meals.

There are several enticing options that have also been developed. Small group tour itineraries with 18 to 25 people that allow travelers to get off the beaten path are a growing trend. There are also journeys that are done by bicycle or walking, others are adventure-focused, for young adults, or for families.

While a Guided Vacation may not be a traveler's initial choice, it can often be the best option especially for the firsttime visitor to an unfamiliar destination.




