Hasbrouck Heights Revaluation Update

The Borough of Hasbrouck Heights is currently going through a revaluation, which was ordered by the Bergen County Board of Taxation.

Appraisal Systems, Inc., of Ridgewood, NJ, will conduct the revaluation process.

The first inspection is at random. If no one is home at this time, the inspector will measure the exterior of the property.

A card will be left for the property owner to call for an appointment for the interior inspection.

It is to your benefit to allow the inspector entry to the property. If entry is not gained, it will be assumed that the basement is finished and the house has been updated.

All properties will be inspected in 2005, but the revaluation will not go into effect until 2006. The tax bill which you receive for 2005 does not apply to the revaluation.

American Legion

James B. Scarr Post 106

Part Three of a series about our American Legion.

The Post Gets to Work

After the organization of Post 106 on September 3, 1919, the next meetings were held at Library Hall, (the Hasbrouck Heights Public Library). It was decided to meet twice a month, the first and third Tuesdays of the month.

In October the Post was asked by the local Red Cross to take over the Red Cross Fund Drive. It was happy to do so.

The News Letter, a local paper, gave us publicity and a petition to add names to the Veterans' Monument and was sent to the Borough Council. This project continued for a couple of years.

On November 21st of 1919, Post 106 sponsored entertainment, a minstrel show, which was very successful. It returned a profit of a few hundred dollars.

A committee to find a home for the Post was appointed and a dedicated fund for that purpose was set up. Finding a home would take a number of years.

A basketball team was formed, plans for a formal din-

ner (\$2.50 per person) were made and the Post continued to advise the Council about names to be added to the monument.

In March of 1920, plans were made to form a baseball team and, as well, a few months later, a rifle team.

The Ladies Auxiliary applied for and received their Charter in the last months of 1920.

Along with the sport competitions of the Post, they also sponsored a night of boxing matches and, with the Auxiliary, held a Barn Dance in November of 1921.

It was decided to hold one of the monthly meetings in conjunction with the Auxiliary in order to help them become established.

It was reported that the Auxiliary had visited the Rest Farm for Disabled Veterans (Chestnut Ridge) in Saddle River Township for Thanksgiving.

It was voted to donate \$1.00 a head for men at the Farm to enable the Auxiliary to give them something for Christmas.

In September of 1922 a motion was made and passed to investigate the possibility of purchasing the old First Reformed Church building (the

New World Montessori School building) as a home for the Post when the new Reformed Church building was finished.

In October of 1923, Mr. Weimer was appointed to continue this inquiry.

In 1923 the Post started to meet at the Municipal Building rather than the Library.

Various entertainments were sponsored and athletic events entered during these years in order to keep the Post in the public's eye.

At the end of December, it was decided to offer the Reformed Church Consistory \$1,000 cash and \$250 in one year and another \$250 in the second year.

In January of 1924 this offer was accepted by the Consistory and in February the first meeting was held in the new American Legion Hall.

The official Opening Meeting and House Warming at the new American Legion Hall was held in March 1924. This was a great day in the history of Post 106.

In early May a minstrel show was presented at Legion Hall and was given again on May 24th at the Chestnut Ridge Veterans Home at the request of the Auxiliary. A lawn party was planned for August.

Over the next few years improvements to the plumbing, electrical system, heating, building and grounds were made.

The Post sponsored boxing matches, fairs, minstrel shows, dances, and other entertainment to support the Post's Home.

It also was deeply involved with various local and county charities particularly those concerning Veterans.

The year 1928 ended, as do these minutes, with the Post happily in its new home. ###

About the Pavers

Engraved brick pavers with Veterans' names were placed in a Memorial Walkway in Veterans Park on Terrace & Passaic late April 2003

About 120 bricks were engraved and integrated into the walkway surrounding the Memorial Stone, and as of December 31, 2004, there are about 200 with more on order.

Bricks are available to all veterans from all services. To participate, it is not necessary for the veteran to be a member of the VFW or American Legion, nor be a deceased veteran. Bricks are 4" x 8" with 13 characters per line with a maximum of 3 lines. Cost \$50 each.

George Washington Slept Here

This fall the Corpus Christi Community Theatre celebrates its 9th season with a Kaufman and Hart comedy, "George Washington Slept Here."

The show is set in 1940 as Newton Fuller, NYC family man, embarks on finding his piece of land in Nature's Paradise, Bucks County, PA.

The old farmhouse he buys comes with not only Japanese beetles and locusts, but no running water, a leaking roof, no road to access the house, an intolerable neighbor and enough "projects" to put them in bankruptcy.

The show holds great challenges for the theatrical group, for even though it is a one set show, the set begins as an old rundown farmhouse and must be transformed into a beautiful showcase home.

Along with this, there are three rainstorms in the show in which real water effects will be introduced.

By the end of the show the set must be "destroyed" incor-

porating the necessary plot twist in the story. It is laughter and fun from beginning to end and a lot of work for the crew involved.

Director Bob Shindle says, "It is my intention to not only get every laugh out of the script with the great characters these authors have written, but to duly impress our audiences with a fantastic set with great special effects."

Each show holds its challenges and this one is up there with some of the more difficult shows the group has chosen to produce.

The Ins and Outs of Debit Cards

that card in your wallet that lets you withdraw cash from an ATM and make purchases without using credit?

The answer is a debit card. But if you said a check card or an enhanced ATM card or even an express checking card you could be right as well. Different banks call debit cards different things.

How They Work - Let's start at square one. When you pay with a debit card, the payment is pulled directly from your bank account. With a debit card there's no pay later option, you pay now.

Some debit cards require a personal identification number (PIN). Others simply require a customer's signature.

A PIN-based or direct debit card removes a purchase price from your checking account almost immediately. These kinds of debit cards are accepted at gas stations, supermarkets and stores such as Wal-Mart, Walgreen's and Target.

A signature-based or deferred debit card has a Visa or MasterCard logo. These cards are accepted anywhere Visa and MasterCard are accepted. Just hand the clerk your card and sign a sales slip and you're done. The purchase amount will be removed from your bank account in two or three days.

Some banks offer both types of debit cards. Other banks place both kinds of debit functions on the same card. Let's say your debit card lets you pay by PIN or by signature. When you swipe your card through at the checkout line, you'll be asked if you want to pay by debit or credit. If you hit "debit," you'll need to input your PIN number. If you hit "credit," you'll need to sign the sales slip.

Watch Out for Fees -Some banks charge debit card

Quick. What do you call customers monthly fees. Other banks charge fees on each debit card transaction. Fees vary from bank to bank and from checking account to checking account within the same bank.

> World travelers should also take note. Some banks have started charging fees when customers use debit cards outside the United States.

> PIN is the Best Protection - Some consumer experts urge people to choose PINbased, direct debit cards only. With a PIN-based debit card you have to know the PIN number to make a purchase. With a signature-based debit card, anyone could pick up the card and use it. That's why it's a good idea to get a debit card that can only be used with a PIN number. It may limit the number of places you can use it. But that's the tradeoff you make for extra security.

> Don't know what kind of debit card you have? Call your bank and ask. ###



"Hot Tips" From Heights Fire Dept. EMS

The Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department EMS (also serving Teterboro) offers these suggestions regarding summer heat:

What You Can Do to Protect Yourself

The best defense is prevention. You can follow these prevention tips to protect yourself from heat-related stress:

Drink cool, non-alcoholic, non-caffeinated, low sugar beverages. (If your doctor generally limits the amount of fluid you drink or has you on water pills, ask him how much you should drink when the weather is hot). Also, avoid extremely cold liquids because they can cause cramps.

Rest.

Wear lightweight clothing. Take a cool shower or bath. or move to an air-conditioned place. (If you don't have air conditioning, consider visiting an air-conditioned shopping mall or public library to cool off).

Electric fans may provide comfort, but when the temperature is in the high 90's, fans will not prevent heat-related illness.

If possible, remain indoors in the heat of the day.

Use your stove and oven less to maintain a cooler temperature in your home.

Avoid hot foods and heavy meals as they add heat to your body.

Do not engage in strenuous activities.

Check regularly on: infants and young children, people 65 or older, people with mental illness and those who are physically ill, especially with heart disease or high blood pressure.

If you must be out in the heat:

Limit your outdoor activity to morning and evening hours.

Cut down on exercise. If you must exercise, drink two to four glasses of cool fluids each hour. A sports beverage can replace the salt and minerals you lose in sweat. Warning: If you are on a low-salt diet, talk with your doctor before drinking a sports beverage.

Try to rest often in shady

Protect yourself from the sun by wearing a wide-brimmed hat (also keeps you cooler) and sunglasses and by putting on sunscreen of SPF 15 or higher (the most effective products say "broad spectrum" or "UVA/UVB protection" on their labels).

Senior Care

Visit adults at risk at least twice a day and closely watch them for signs of heat exhaustion or heat stroke.

People 65 years and older are more prone to heat stress than younger people for several reasons:

Older adults do not adjust as well as young people to sudden changes in temperature.

They are more likely to have a chronic medical condition that upsets normal body responses to heat.

They are more likely to take prescription medicines that impair the body's ability to regulate its temperature or that inhibit perspiration.

Heat-related Illness Heat Stroke

Heat stroke is the most serious heat-related illness. It occurs when the body becomes strenuous activity. If you have unable to control its temperature: the body's temperature rises rapidly, the body loses its ability to sweat, and it is unable to cool down.

Body temperatures rise to 106 ° F or higher within 10 to 15 minutes. Heat stroke can cause death or permanent disability if emergency treatment is not provided.

Signs and Symptoms of Heat Stroke

Warning signs vary but may include the following: An extremely high body temperature (above 103°F); red, hot, and dry skin (no sweating); rapid, strong pulse, throbbing headache, dizziness, nausea, confusion, etc.

Heat Exhaustion

Heat exhaustion is a milder form of heat-related illness that can develop after several days of exposure to high temperatures and inadequate or unbalanced replacement of fluids.

Warning signs and symptoms of heat exhaustion: heavy sweating, paleness, muscle cramps, tiredness, weakness, dizziness, headache, nausea or vomiting, fainting, skin may be cool and moist; pulse rate: fast and weak; breathing: fast and shallow.

Heat Cramps

Heat cramps usually affect people who sweat a lot during strenuous activity. This sweating depletes the body's salt and moisture. The low salt level in the muscles causes painful cramps. Heat cramps may also be a symptom of heat exhaus-

Heat cramps are muscle pains or spasms—usually in the abdomen, arms, or legs—that may occur in association with heart problems or are on a lowsodium diet, get medical attention for heat cramps.

Sunburn

Sunburn should be avoided because it damages the skin. Although the discomfort is usually minor and healing often occurs in about a week, a more severe sunburn may require medical attention.

Symptoms of sunburn are well known: the skin becomes red, painful, and abnormally warm after sun exposure.

Heat Rash

Heat rash is a skin irritation caused by excessive sweating during hot, humid weather. It can occur at any age but is most common in young children.

Heat rash looks like a red cluster of pimples or small blisters. It is more likely to occur on the neck and upper chest, in the groin, under the breasts, and in elbow creases.

Heat Stress First Aid

If you see any signs of severe heat stress, you may be dealing with a life-threatening emergency. Have someone call for immediate medical assistance while you begin cooling the affected person. Do the following:

Get the person to a shady

Cool the person rapidly, using whatever methods you can. For example, immerse the person in a tub of cool water; place the person in a cool shower; spray the person with cool water from a garden hose; sponge the person with cool water; or if the humidity is low, wrap the person in a cool, wet sheet and fan him or her vigorously.

Monitor body temperature

and continue cooling efforts until the body temperature drops to 101°-102°F.

Do not give the person alcohol to drink.

Sometimes a victim's muscles will begin to twitch uncontrollably as a result of heat stroke. If this happens, keep the victim from injuring himself, but do not place any object in the mouth and do not give fluids. If there is vomiting, make sure the airway remains open by turning the victim on his or her side.

If emergency medical personnel are delayed, call the hospital emergency room for further instructions.

Sunburn First Aid

Avoid repeated sun exposure. Apply cold compresses or immerse the sunburned area in cool water. Apply moisturizing lotion to affected areas. Do not use salve, butter or ointment. Do not break blisters.

Heat Rash First Aid

Keep the affected area dry. Dusting powder may be used to increase comfort but avoid using ointments or creams as they keep the skin warm and moist and may make the condition worse. ###

Need Help with **Medicare Prescription Drug** Costs?

Conchita Parker, from the Tax Collector's Office, announced that if you are a Medicare beneficiary with limited income and resources, you may be able to get extra help paying for prescription drugs.

From June through August 2005, Medicare beneficiaries who may be eligible for extra help will be mailed an application for help with Medicare prescription Drug Plan Costs (Form SSA-1020).

Ms. Parker recommends completing and returning it as soon as possible.

If you do not receive an application in the mail, or do not want to wait, you can get one by calling Social Security at 1-800-772-1213 or you can apply on-line www.socialsecurity.gov

Students John Marc Dagaard, 8; Arom Kim, 9; Brittany Gudanowski, 8; Julie Sheridan, 10; Vincent Castiglione, 13; Valentina Glavan, 12; Brian, Whaley 12; Cayla Teehan, 14; John Cassella, 18; and Daniel Beekman, 18 have been preparing for this day for the past four years.

It's been a long, difficult journey for them all and they have proven, just by being present at this event, that they possess the determination and the will to achieve their goals.

They were all trying to become what a lot of people could only wish to accomplish.

During these four years of training, Mr. Lee, a former US national Tae Kwon Do team captain, has seen so much positive change in his students as they develop both mentally and physically.

Mr. Lee recalls Julie Sheridan when she first started practicing Tae Kwon Do; how it was considered a good class if she didn't trip and fall at least three times.

They even have a special corner of the school named after her, where she left a permanent imprint. "Julie's Corner" has since been covered with mats just in case she might want to revisit.

Julie took her bumps and bruises well, and persevered in her Tae Kwon Do training by overcoming her challenges to become a great athlete.

This past April Julie won the gold medal in the New Jersey State Tae Kwon Do Championship for the 3rd consecutive year.

The art of Tae Kwon Do was originally developed in ancient Korea for the purpose of self-defense. However, the students quickly learned, as they got more advanced in their training, Tae Kwon Do is not only a method to protect yourself against aggressors but is also a way of life.

I have also developed respect for authority and for my teachers at school."

Becoming a black belt in Tae Kwon Do is a wonderful accomplishment not many people get to experience.

However, it does come with great responsibility; a responsibility that has been passed down from generation to generation for more then two thousand years.

They will now become ambassadors of this art and must use their skills, both physical and mental, wisely. Tae Kwon Do was created to spread peace and harmony throughout the world:

To help people who cannot help themselves. To teach people to live by the five tenets of Tae Kwon Do which are. courtesy, integrity, perseverance, self-control, and the indomitable spirit. The new black belts must live by these codes

My camera's memory card is full ... What do I do now?

One of our readers, Rosemarie C., met me on the Boulevard one day and said one of her problems is how the heck to get the images from her digital camera to her computer.

This is an important question for a few reasons.

- 1. Once your digital camera's memory card is full, it needs to be "emptied" so you can take more pictures. In the past, you just put in another roll of film.
- 2. Your photo memories are very valuable. In the past, you had the negatives. With digital cameras, the image files are the negatives. I believe they need to be "archived" for posterity.
- 3. If you would like to view the images on your computer, or email them to a friend, or have your images printed, you need to understand how to "move" the files around.

When your digital camera's memory card is full, it can be replaced with another card. It's not a bad idea to have more than one card anyway.

The images can be moved off the card using software that you received when you bought your camera. Most digital cameras have software for this purpose packaged with the camera. The software usually allows you to view and organize your images on your computer. In this case, the camera is either directly connected to your computer using a cable that you got with your camera, or you can use a "card reader." These are inexpensive and today are very easy to use. Most devices are "plug and play" right now.

Digital image files are the same as any other file you are used to working with and moving around in your computer. If you are running Windows XP, moving files from your camera is very simple.

Since the digital files are "the negatives," I believe it's a good idea to create an original "back up" copy of your images. Hard drives crash or become unstable. We have all experienced this at one time or another. That is why you need a "hard copy." Again, copying the images and burning them to a CD or DVD is very easy to do.

Another reason to move the images to a disc is to share

You could mail a CD with the images to a friend, and they can use those images on their computer. You may wish to bring certain files to a photo lab to have them printed. Usually you don't want all the pictures printed, so you have the ability to just put the images you want prints from on a CD and give the disc to a photo lab for printing.

If you enjoy manipulating images in an editing software, it's a good idea to have a back up copy of the original, in case you make an error, or accidentally delete an image.

Once you are absolutely sure you have safely copied the images and burned them to a CD or DVD, only then should you delete the images from your camera's memory card. The way I do this is I copy (not move) the files from my memory cards to my computer's hard drive. I burn them to a CD or DVD and then I verify the disc has all the images and I can view them from the disc.

Since I'm photographing weddings, I make more than one copy of the disc for safety. Once I am absolutely sure I have correctly archived the files, I delete the images from my memory cards, so they may be reused.

Summer Safety

The Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department offers these summer safety tips regarding hazardous materials.

Store gasoline in safety cans manufactured and labeled for that purpose.

Gasoline should never be stored inside your home because

vapors can travel to a flame source and ignite. Gasoline should be stored outside, or in a well ventilated shed.

Don't refuel lawn mowers, trimmers, edgers or other gasoline powered equipment while hot because the fumes may ignite and start a flash fire. Allow the equipment to cool. Use a funnel to prevent spills.

Keep fertilizers and pool chemicals away from gasoline, oil and fuels. Pool chemicals (chlorites) and fertilizers (nitrates) are strong oxidizers and react violently with fuel vapors (hydrocarbons).

Powdered and pellet chlorine should be kept in a cool, dry

place. If water enters a chlorine container, it can react and possibly explode.

Never add water to chlorine -- add chlorine to water to prevent a splash or violent reaction. Pesticides should not be accessible to children or pets and should be kept in tightly closed containers in a cool, dry place.

It is important to follow the instructions on the label for use and application. If exposed to pesticides, rinse the affected materials off immediately and seek emergency treatment. Bring the container with you to the medical facility if possible.



Robert and Richard Corriston Reunite in Optimum Online Commercial

Recently, Hasbrouck Heights resident, Bob Corriston, starred in an Optimum Online commercial promoting the benefits of using the online service.

Bob told the story about finding his brother after almost forty years.

This could have been just another story, but Bob's story is different. It's about a family torn apart by tragedy, apathy and time. In the end, placing a value on faith was one man's journey to finding his family.

Bob Corriston and his wife, Mary Margaret, have lived in Hasbrouck Heights for almost twenty-five years.

They are the parents of Christine and the late Douglas, who, at the time of his death, attended Hasbrouck Heights High School.

Bob currently works in sales and his wife is employed at a local bank. Their daughter, Christine, is a graduate of Lycoming College Williamsport, PA and is a school teacher in North Carolina, where she, her husband, Rocco, and Bella, their dog, now reside.

Bob's story starts when he was fifteen. Bob was born and raised in Newark, NJ with his older sister, Joan and his younger brother, Richard.

For the most part, Bob admits that they had the typical 50's childhood growing up in Newark. They had a very tight family. In 1954, the family moved to Kearny.

In February of 1955, his sister got married and moved out of the house. At the end of March of that same year, his mother died of a massive heart attack at age 44. It was a huge blow to the family.

Bob's world turned upside down three months later when his father brought home the soon-to-be stepmother along with her daughter, mother and brother.

Bob continued that life was no longer pleasant at home. "After three months, I couldn't take it anymore and told my father so. He told me if I didn't like it to get out.

I was fifteen years old with no money and nowhere to go. So I walked out the door with the clothes on my back and a dime in my pocket." He did not have many relatives to help at that point except an aunt, so he decided to seek her help.

He started the long walk from Kearny to Nutley where his aunt lived. Because he did not have enough money to cover the cost of the two buses

needed to get to Nutley, he walked part of the way.

When he arrived at his aunt's door and explained what happened, his Aunt Geri and Uncle Leo, who had no children of their own, immediately took

A few days later they drove him to Kearny to pick up the rest of his belongings. To Bob's dismay, he found the locks changed and his few worldly possessions thrown in a pile down the basement. After that, Bob had no contact with his father again.

In the beginning, while living at his aunt's house, he found life different from Kearny and his own family.

While sleeping on the couch in their living room he could hear the nightclub on the ground floor of the building gear up for another long evening.

"That took some getting used to," he commented. On one of those evenings, his uncle suffered a brain aneurysm. "He died the next day," Bob said sadly. That left him alone with his aunt.

Bob ended up leaving school for awhile to help support the household, but eventually returned to Nutley High School.

He played football his senior year and in 1959 graduated from Nutley High School in the same graduating class as Martha Stewart.

At the time of his graduahe barely had contact with his sister and no contact with his brother, who was six years younger than him.

Between 1961 and 1963 he was in the service and was stationed in Germany for a year. "I finally started to enjoy my life. I hung around the base, traveled to some exciting places and worked. It was a very satisfying time," Bob said.

After his discharge he returned to New Jersey, started working and enjoyed many summers at the Jersey shore.

While enjoying a beach rental at the Jersey shore with friends, he met his future wife on the beach. They were married in 1969.

Bob and his wife concentrated on working and raising a family of their own. Life was moving along well for the established family until 1991.

Their son, Douglas, came down with what was thought to be the flu the week before Thanksgiving. Two weeks later he was rushed to the hospital and was diagnosed with acute lymphoblastic leukemia. Nineteen hours later his family was

mourning his death. His death shattered the family.

It was a hard time for the family, but what got them through was the outpouring of support from their friends, family, community and fellow classmates of Douglas at Hasbrouck Heights High School.

"We had a lot of people to comfort us," Bob said. "Rows of kids walked to the church after class to pay their respects and the school lowered the flag to half mast."

Two years after their son's death, Bob and Mary Margaret were asked by the Newark Archdiocese Family Life Center to start a support group for parents grieving the loss of a

The group is now called "HOPE" (Helping Other Parents Endure). They are also involved in raising money for the cure of leukemia. Every year, since its inception, they have had a team, "Doug's Team," walking in the national "Light the Night Walk."

A tree now stands on the grounds of the high school alongside a bench dedicated to Douglas's memory.

One month after Douglas died, Bob's sister died unexpectedly. With two major losses in his family, Bob was determined now more than ever to reconnect with his brother.

He resumed his search of many years and with his computer and the newly installed Optimum program, it was much

easier than ever before. His search took him across the country. He found the name Richard Corriston in Colorado.

When he called Richard, it was the first conversation that the brothers had in years. With the use of frequent flier miles, Bob went across country to meet his brother.

He was met in the baggage area by his brother and his wife, Billie. Needless to say, it was a tearful reunion.

While in Colorado, the brothers decided they wanted to find some way to help people like themselves. "We wanted to give people who had given up on life, hope," Bob

When Bob got back to New Jersey, he wrote a letter to Optimum Online with his story and fifteen months later got a call from the marketing department that they wanted to film a commercial.

"We receive no residuals when the commercial is shown. Just having my brother and sister-in-law flown in was more than enough compensation."

They filmed for twelve hours what could have been considered a documentary.

They shot in Newark, where their old house had been knocked down, in Kearny at their old apartment and in Hasbrouck Heights at Bob's home.

They ended the commercial at the grave of their parents, where the brothers made peace with their father. ###
