

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
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# **Rumble in Heights Under the Lights**

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# **BBQ Grill Safety**

The backyard barbecue is inside, away from children. a summer tradition enjoyed by many area residents. The Moonachie Fire Department urges outdoor chefs to be cautious when cooking outdoors.

Keep a fire extinguisher handy. Grills should not be placed next to your home's wall, underneath porches or overhangs, and never indoors.

Be sure to monitor active grills. Wear protective mitts or gloves while barbecuing.

Do not store gasoline or other flammable substances in the grill's vicinity.

Never move a grill or cover a grill if it is still hot. Always keep curious children away from hot grills. When a gas grill is not in use, remove control knobs and store them

Lighting a charcoal grill requires caution. Use only the appropriate amount of lighter fluid, and NEVER substitute gasoline, kerosene or other flammable liquids for lighter fluid.

Adding starter fluid after the grill fire has been ignited is extremely hazardous as flames may jump out.

Charcoals should be left to burn out in your grill. Do not dispose of charcoals in trash cans or bring them indoors. Soak coals in water to ensure they are out.

Routinely clean ashes from the grill and inspect for holes or loose fittings.

Lighter fluids and "quickstart" charcoal should be stored outside and away from the

Gas grills should be cleaned at least once each season. Spiders often make their homes inside the components, and their webs can block off gas intake and damage your grill.

Use only a gas cylinder designed to store propane and only use a reputable propane supplier to fill it. If a new cylinder is being filled for the first time, tell your supplier so air can be removed.

Most gas grill accidents are caused when propane tanks are hooked up incorrectly. Make sure the cylinder is equipped with an OPD (Over-Pressure Device). When changing propane cylinders, test the connection for leaks with soapy water and tighten as necessary.

Propane gas is odorless. A "rotten egg" odor is put into the

gas so that it's easy to detect if a leak occurs.

If you smell the "rotten egg" odor near or around your propane gas cylinder, immediately contact the Fire Depart-

When not in use, keep the valve tightly closed and plugged with the "POL" lefthanded thread plug. This will seal the propane gas cylinder and help prevent leaks if the service valve is accidentally opened.

Never store propane gas cylinders inside an enclosed structure -- store and use outdoors only.

Handle cylinders gently -- dents, gouges and rust can weaken cylinders.

Always keep cylinders upright and, when transporting, secure it in position. Keep your vehicle well ventilated when

transporting cylinders.

Don't leave cylinder in a vehicle -- sitting in a hot vehicle can cause the safety relief valve to discharge gas!

No propane gas cylinder should be scrapped, destroyed, cut with a torch, punctured or have the service valve removed by the public. Disposal in the municipal solid waste stream is prohibited. ###

# **Summer Safety**

The Wood-Ridge Fire Department offers these summer safety tips regarding hazardous materials.

Store gasoline in safety cans manufactured and labeled for that purpose.

Gasoline should never be stored inside your home because vapors can travel to a flame source and ignite. Gasoline should be stored outside, or in a well ventilated shed.


Don't refuel lawn mowers, trimmers, edgers or other gasoline powered equipment while hot because the fumes may ignite and start a flash fire. Allow the equipment to cool. Use a funnel to prevent spills.

Keep fertilizers and pool chemicals away from gasoline, oil and fuels. Pool chemicals (chlorites) and fertilizers (nitrates) are strong oxidizers and react violently with fuel vapors (hydrocarbons).

Powdered and pellet chlorine should be kept in a cool, dry place. If water enters a chlorine container, it can react and possibly explode.

Never add water to chlorine -- add chlorine to water to prevent a splash or violent reaction. Pesticides should not be accessible to children or pets and should be kept in tightly closed containers in a cool, dry place.

It is important to follow the instructions on the label for use and application. If exposed to pesticides, rinse the affected materials off immediately and seek emergency treatment. Bring the container with you to the medical facility if possible. ###



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

# Pennies for Peace

Whether it's raising thousands of dollars for Fr. Marc Boisvert -- from Hope Village in Haiti (freethekids.org), creative projects such as "Build a House," and "Home Runs for Haiti," sending hundreds of pounds of candy to our soldiers in Iraq for Christmas and Halloween, collecting cleaning supplies for AIDS patients and much, much more.

Assumption School in Wood-Ridge, NJ has long been known for its community service activities.

This year, Assumption School Sixth Graders began learning about Pakistan, a man named Greg Mortenson, and a program called "Pennies for Peace" (penniesforpeace.org).

The program helps build



schools in the mountains of Afghanistan and Pakistan to educate children, especially girls, and since 1994 has built 57 schools. Major donors to the program are school children around the world who collect pennies.

After creating Timelines to display around school and PowerPoint presentations to show the other students, the Sixth Graders began their fundraising by decorating canisters for all the classrooms, reading announcements and updates over the PA system, and speaking to the parishioners at Assumption Church.

During their penny col-

lecting campaign, the school received the unfortunate news that it would be closed by the Archdiocese of Newark on June 30, 2010. At first, the students wondered if they should continue collecting the pennies, but after discussing it with computer teacher, Margaret Sullivan, who was running the "Pennies for Peace" collection, they decided they were powerless to change what was happening to their own school but they had the power to help other children build a school.

So, on Monday, June 14th the pennies were loaded into a wagon and with a police escort the Sixth Graders pulled the wagon down Valley Boulevard in Wood-Ridge to **Kearny Federal Savings Bank** where the pennies and other change were counted.

When they left the bank they had a check for \$550, and a bright spot in their heavy hearts knowing that even though this would be the last community service act to be accomplished by Assumption School, their efforts over the years have helped so many. # Jr. Police Academy Going Strong 10 Years Later

Ten years ago Hasbrouck Heights held its first junior police academy. Recruit Class 1 had fewer than 20 participants.

On July 7th, 2010, Hasbrouck Heights Junior Police Academy Recruit Class 11 graduated nearly 50 students, bringing the total number of participants in the program to just over 400.

The week-long academy, which was run cooperatively with the school system, and at no cost to participants, provided a fun-filled hands-on experience modeled after the training regimen police officers undergo.

The week began with welcoming remarks by Chief Michael Colaneri, but then it was quickly time for the recruits to get to work.

Military-style drill, police

procedures, team building, and special presentations were all on the agenda for the five-anda-half days that would make up the academy. The first lesson the class learned was that work can be fun.

Smiles replaced the looks of stunned shock that crossed the faces of everyone in the class when members of the Lyndhurst Police Department's Special Response Team assaulted the room where the recruits were learning the basics of drill and ceremony.

The smiles remained as the recruits learned how to defend themselves in a self-defense lesson given by the instructors of The Dojo.

A new facet of the academy was a training module, called Eyewitness Mythbusters, given by four graduates of Recruit Class 10. Beyond that presentation, many graduates of previous junior academy classes returned to mentor the current recruits.

Team building was another important area that was addressed. Over the course of the week, the recruits participated in activities that required them to work together in order to accomplish a goal. These activities, such as trying to build a Lego toy while handcuffed to a partner and receiving directions over a walkie-talkie, emphasized communication skills as well as teamwork.

The highlights of the week came as the recruits worked with members of their police department. Detective Sergeant Joseph Rinke instructed the class on a variety of topics ranging from drill and ceremony to restraint and handcuffing techniques. He also vividly showed the power of


the weapons used by police in a firearms demonstration at the department's range, while Detective Alan Baker helped the recruits experience the trials and tribulations of simulated motor vehicle stops.

The class had fun trying to perform simple tasks while wearing Fatal Vision Goggles, which simulate the physical effects of being under the influence of alcohol. Reality quickly set in, however, when they tried to drive a golf cart around a closed course while wearing the goggles.

Recruit Class 11 had the opportunity to learn about other aspects of law enforcement through presentations and demonstrations given by the Bergen County Bomb Squad and K-9 units, the Bergen County Sheriff's Department Bureau of Criminal Investigation (the real-life CSIs), the Port Authority Police, the Bergen

County Law & Public Safety Institute, and the United States Marshals Service.

Perhaps the most important thing the students gained from their experience is that they got to see the police in a different light. By working with the officers, they gained an understanding of how and why things are done and developed a sense of trust and understanding that should make them feel more comfortable approaching officers in the future. 


# **HH Little League Picnic**

# Dazzling Effects Light Up the Night



The darkened stadium was still for a moment, before the thunderous, spectacular light show dazzled spectators on Thursday, July 1, 2010, at the Hasbrouck Heights Lions Club-sponsored 26th Annual Fireworks Program.

During the afternoon, the contractor, International Fireworks, set up the displays at the Hasbrouck Heights Minor Little League field.

All pyrotechnics were covered in foil. This prevents sparks from prematurely igniting other shells and cakes.

Fire prevention officials were at the detonation zone to review the mechanics of the display and to insure compliance of fire codes and accepted industry procedures.

The 25 minute pyrotechnic display included about 6,000 shots.

Cakes featured included: Peacock cake with 600 shots in six seconds, 50 shot cake in four seconds, 200 shoot whistle cake in three seconds, etc.

A featured shell was a piggy-back -- one element produced a dazzling burst, with the second exploding report/bang.

During the display the Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department, along with Mutual Aid Departments from Carlstadt FD & EMS, Little Ferry FD, Lodi FD, Moonachie FD & EMS, S. Hackensack EMS, Wallington FD and Wood-Ridge FD, were positioned at strategic locations as a safety precaution.

All shells were detonated within the safety area. The contractor inspected each tube

for unspent rounds.

Mutual Aid fire departments checked the general safety area. Special attention was given the firing zone -- checking for unexploded rounds and watered down smoldering debris.

Fun Time Entertainment provided music, two inflatable amusements and dunk tank which were located on the practice field. ###



























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# Lions, Tigers and Bears, Oh My!

# Wesmont Station Resumes Work in September

After sitting dormant more than a year, construction of the \$400 million Wesmont Station housing and commercial development will restart in September.

Wesmont Station is being developed by three national real estate developers: Somerset Development, Avalon Bay Communities and Centex Homes, a division of Pulte Homes.

Wood-Ridge borough officials have been meeting monthly with Somerset Development/Wesmont Station to review the status of the development project.

Mayor Paul Sarlo and Borough Administrator Christopher Eilert recently met with Ralph Zucker, President of Somerset Development/Wesmont Station.

Mr. Zucker reported that the project has been on hold

due to the severe economic recession. The recession significantly reduced the general public's ability to obtain mortgages, which in turn, made it imprudent to begin building homes in 2009.

Mr. Zucker stated that recent economic data suggests that the housing market is slowly recovering. He anticipates beginning construction in September 2010.

This will enable Wesmont to begin marketing homes in 2011 when the housing market is projected to be fully recovered.

Mayor Sarlo and Mr. Eilert reported that despite the delay in construction, Wesmont has made all the required tax and fee payments to the Borough and has fulfilled all its obligations to the Borough such as financing the renovation of the Donna Ricker Memorial Field.

The project has already received all necessary environmental approvals.

Plans and permit applications have been submitted to the Building Department and the Borough Engineer. New Jersey Transit has approved the train station which is currently being designed and slated for construction in 2011.

The Borough Council recently approved four ordinances to resume its agreement with the developer.

The four ordinances — two for retail and two for residential — accept applications by Wesmont Station for urban renewal.

These were with Avalon Bay regarding financial obligations to Wood-Ridge Borough and for permits for building two, three story luxury rental buildings with parking garages.

The entire site has been environmentally remediated.

The majority of the site has been issued a "no further action (NFA) letter from the NJ DEP. A small portion, which used to be a landfill for a factory, is currently undergoing DEP soil test; but does not impact the project. The area affected is a later part of the project.

All surveying and architectural designs are complete.

The "site work" will begin in September 2010 to prepare for vertical development.

This includes earth work, building roads, installing water, storm and sanitary sewers and other utilities necessary for Phase I. This work should take about three months and be completed by winter.

Once the site work is completed, Avalon Bay Communities will immediately start construction of two, three story luxury rental buildings, near the train station, with the

entrance on Passaic Street.

One of the buildings will have 29,000 sq. ft. of retail space on the frst floor.

The train station is a separate project to be done by NJ Transit. Currently, it is in the design phase and construction will start next year.

The goal is for both the residential/retail structures and the train station to be completed in 2012. ###

# Simple Energy Saving Tips

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• Program your thermostat to work around your family's summer schedule—set it a few degrees higher (such as 78 degrees) when no one is home, so your cooling system isn't cooling an empty house. With proper use, programmable thermostats can save you about \$180 a year in energy costs.

• Check your HVAC system's air filter every month. If the filter looks dirty, change it, but change the filter at least every three months. A dirty filter will slow air flow and make the system work harder to keep you cool, wasting energy.


• Run your ceiling fan to create a cool breeze. If you raise your thermostat by only two degrees and use your ceiling fan, you can lower cooling costs by up to 14 percent. Remember that ceiling fans cool you, not the room, so when you leave the room make sure to turn off the fan.

• Pull the curtains and shades closed before you leave your home to keep the sun's rays from overheating the interior of your home. If you can, move container trees and plants in front of sun-exposed windows to serve as shade.

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




























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# Wetdown in Little Ferry

# Chore Program Helps Seniors and Disabled Persons

Since 1977, the Chore Volunteer Handyman Service of the Volunteer Center of Bergen County has been helping elderly and/or disabled people, by performing minor household repairs that clients cannot perform themselves.

The Chore Service assists in improving the quality of life of older people who are living independently.

Chore's services include installing grab bars and railings, smoke and carbon monoxide detectors; repairing leaky faucets or toilets, replacing broken door locks, installing weather-stripping, changing screens and storms, replacing light bulbs, fixing broken lamps and switches, installing simple electrical fixtures or replacing existing electric outlets and switches.

There are some jobs that are beyond Chore's capacity. Chore cannot service emergencies, and does not do outdoor work, painting, work requiring high ladders, tiling, door or window replacements, heavy

# County Refunds Overpayment to Towns

Bergen County will begin refunding municipalities, which represents the reduction of Open Space Tax collected by Bergen County for 2010.

On June 2, 2010 the County lowered the open space tax rate from one cent to a quarter cent per \$100 of assessed valuation. This rate reduction created an overpayment for the municipalities since they were previously billed their 2010 estimated open space tax based on the 2009 rate of one cent.

These refunds will result in a lower open space tax rate for individual property owners.

The refund amounts per town are as follows: Carlstadt- \$61,980.19; East Rutherford-\$47,675.53; Hasbrouck Heights-\$49,094.71; Little Ferry-\$35,149.45; Lodi-\$65,478.44; Moonachie-\$21,743.35; South Hackensack-\$19,087.56; Teterboro-\$11,613.86 and Wood-Ridge-\$35,313.80. ###

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

## Fish Oil or Snake Oil

For quite some time, people have been clamoring on the many benefits of fish oil, or more correctly, the Omega-3 fatty acids found within fish oil. There are two types of Omega-3 found in fish oil, docosahexaenoic and eicosapentaenoic acid (DHA and EPA respectively).

If for whatever reason fish isn't on your menu, Omega-3 can also be found in various nuts and vegetable oils (walnuts, canola, and soybean) in the form of Alpha-Linolenic Acid (ALA). However, ALA needs to be first converted to DHA then to EPA for your body to utilize it, so in a sense it's less efficient.

There have been multiple studies which suggest that ingesting the recommended amount of DHA/EPA (650-900mg/day) has been shown to help lower triglycerides, increase brain function, reduce the risk of heart attack and stroke, and, in the latest study, perhaps help prevent breast cancer.

Although it's important to note that more isn't exactly better. Too much fish oil may thin your blood out (especially if you are already on blood thinners like Warfarin). Not to mention that also certain heavy metals may present in dietary fish and to a lesser degree, supplements.

A study, just published in Cancer Epidemiology, Biomarkers & Prevention, took a look at 35,016 postmenopausal women with no history of breast cancer. They were given a 24

page questionnaire regarding their use of supplements and their lifestyle.

Six years later, the results were in. Out of the 35,016 in the study, only 880 cases of breast cancer were reported.

The study showed a possible 32% reduced risk of breast cancer associated with the use of fish oil supplements. However, the researchers warn that no conclusions should be drawn about the relationship between Omega-3 and breast cancer. Basically, it's too early to tell.

Several other studies are in the works, but it will be quite some time before those results are made public. For now, it appears Omega-3 may provide some benefits. But, as always, check with your doctor or pharmacist on what's best for you.

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# "Hot" Summer Tips

Check regularly on: infants and young children, people 65 or older and those who are physically ill, especially with heart disease or high blood pressure. The Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department EMS (also serving Teterboro) offers these First Aid tips:

# **Outdoors**

Wear lightweight clothing. Limit your outdoor activity to morning and evening hours. Do not engage in strenuous activities. If possible, try to remain indoors during the heat of the day.

Protect yourself from the sun by wearing a widebrimmed hat (also keeps you cooler) and sunglasses and by putting on sunscreen of SPF 15 or higher (the most effective products say "broad spectrum" or "UVA/UVB protection" on their labels).

# Sunburn

Sunburn should be avoided because it damages the skin. Although the discomfort is usually minor and healing often occurs in about a week, a more severe sunburn may require medical attention.

Symptoms of sunburn are well known: the skin becomes red, painful, and abnormally warm after sun exposure.

#### **Sunburn First Aid**

Avoid repeated sun exposure. Apply cold compresses or immerse the sunburned area in cool water. Apply moisturizing lotion to affected areas. Do not use salve, butter or ointment. Do not break blisters.

#### **Heat Rash**

Heat rash is a skin irritation caused by excessive sweating during hot, humid weather. It can occur at any age but is most common in young children.

Heat rash looks like a red cluster of pimples or small blisters. It is more likely to occur on the neck and upper chest, in the groin, under the breasts, and in elbow creases.

#### **Heat Rash First Aid**

Keep the affected area dry. Dusting powder may be used to increase comfort but avoid using ointments or creams as they keep the skin warm and moist and may make the condition worse. ###

# Foreclosures = 31% of Sales

The following information appeared in a Bloomberg News article by Dan Levy on 6/30/2010.

"Online foreclosure marketplace Realty Trac reported today that homes in foreclosure accounted for 31% of the residential sales in the first quarter of 2010. The average sales price of these properties was nearly 27% below the average sales price of properties not in foreclosure.

Realty Trac expects foreclosure discounts to stay between 25% and 30% as lenders steadily release foreclosures. The average price of foreclosed properties is \$171,971.

Overall, foreclosures are down 14 percent in the first quarter compared to the 4th quarter of 2009. They are down 33% from the peak during the 1st quarter of 2009."

The vast number of foreclosures out there – and our area has definitely not been spared – presents a big problem for those people who want to sell their homes.

Legitimate home sellers are forced to compete with all the foreclosed homes on the

A casual survey will usually find that many people believe the phrase is in reference to the conspicuous laziness of domesticated dogs (who are in danger of overheating with too much exercise) during the hottest days of the summer.

When speaking of "Dog Days" there seems to be a connotation of lying or "dogging" around, or being "dog tired" on these hot and humid days. Although these meanings have nothing to do with the original source of the phrase, they may have been attached to the phrase in recent years due to common usage or misunderstanding of the origin of the phrase.

In recent years, the phrase "Dog Days" or "Dog Days of Summer" have also found new meanings. The term has frequently been used in reference to the American stock market(s). Typically, summer is a very slow time for the stock market, and additionally, poorly performing stocks with little future potential are frequently known as "dogs."

Today, "Dog Days" occur during the period between July 3 and August 11. Although it is certainly the warmest period of the summer, the heat is not due to the added radiation from a far-away star, regardless of its brightness. The heat of summer is a direct result of the earth's tilt. ###







# Korea Remembered

Commander, VFW Memorial Post 4591, first published July 2003

This month we will celebrate the 50th anniversary of the end of the Korean War. Well, maybe not quite a celebration.

You see, somewhere along history's trail, the conflict in Korea got lost, sandwiched between the successful conclusion of World War II and the unpopular and lengthy conflict in Viet Nam.

In fact, the characterization of Korea as a "War" has often been the extent of discussion amongst history enthusiasts, arguing whether it was a Police Action, a Conflict or an Armed Occupation.

I would like to share with you some statistics, unknown to most, concerning the Korean

by Dan Vecchio, Past War (June 25, 1950-July 27, 1953). At the time of the war 1,789,000 troops were in service. Peak strength in country was 325,270 troops.

> There were 33,741 combat related deaths (36,576 total deaths). In one battle, Pusan Perimeter (8/4/50-9/16/50), 3603 combat fatalities. The deadliest day was Nov. 30, 1950 when 799 American troops were KIA. The deadliest week was Nov. 26-Dec. 2, 1950 when 3567 troops were KIA. In the month of Nov. 1950, 3627 troops were KIA. 103,284 were wounded in battle. 7140 POW's (4418 returned; 2701 died in captivity; 21 refused repatriation). There were 131 Medal of Honor recipients.

> Even these statistics do not fully depict the dreadful conditions and the overwhelming odds these warriors had to contend with. In spite of all

this adversity, they succeeded in their mission, albeit at a high price, of ensuring South Korea's independence and freedom, to this very day.

Our country never afforded them a hero's welcome when they returned. In fact, the only celebration was within the family unit of the returning Veteran.

There was no dancing in the street or ticker-tape parades. To quote a Korean War Vet, a Staff Sergeant of the USMC FMF, "But it was rough to come home to silence in 1952." Where you been, Chris? In Korea. Oh, oh, that place... better go get a job." Semper Fidelis."

Instead, their claim to fame has been their association with the conflict often referred to as the "Forgotten War."

History books barely mention their contribution to worldwide stability, often relegating any reference to a mere foot-

Congress may not have issued a Declaration of War against North Korea and their Chinese ally, but it was a War in every other aspect. The sheer number of lives lost, demand that it be called a War. The men and women, who left the comfort of their homes and families, demand that it be called a War. Magazine, June/July 2003

We, who know the sacrifices that these "lovers of freedom" made, are forever grateful and demand it be called a War. You, who enjoy peace and freedom, must demand it be called a War.

And together, we will vow - to never, ever again, refer to it as "Forgotten."

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



# Heat Wave Will Calm Down, Then Re-energize

During the month of June, our temperatures here in the Teterboro, Hasbrouck Heights, Moonachie and Wood-Ridge area have averaged 3 ½ degrees above normal with above normal days with 90 plus daytime high temperatures.

For July, so far, we have been running 5 ½ degrees above normal. Although good news for the electric companies, bad news for the rest of us! Poolside or Oceanside "THE" place to be.

As this article "hits the streets," there is good news for you heat haters (most of us).

We now have a pattern change, albeit temporary, as of today (Monday-July 26), cooler and drier air is moving in behind a healthy cold front. Monday, Tuesday and part of Wednesday look OK with temperatures still rather warm, but not oppressively hot.

However, the heat will be turned back on later Wednesday into the rest of the week, through Thursday, Friday and next weekend with temperatures in the 93 to 98 degree range with some spots touching the century mark (100 degrees).

The typical scattered sum-

mer-time thunderstorms that build during the heat of the afternoon will likely be with us Thursday into at least Saturday but no prolonged rain is expected.

In fact, if you have vacation this week, you are looking good!

As far as the rest of the summer is concerned, I am forecasting it to average above normal for most of the rest of July and part of August. However, a pattern change will make for more comfortable air by the latter part of August and early September.

Our hurricane season so far has been a dud, which goes against the National Hurricane Center's forecast of a "very active hurricane season." Don't get me wrong, we will have a normal to somewhat active hurricane season mainly in the Gulf of Mexico states, Texas to Florida, with slight chance of an east coast system affecting us in August, September or early October.

To get back to the National Hurricane Center, they do a fantastic job in short term hurricane forecasting, but long range is a "tough business,"

like with all weather forecasting.

Personally, I cannot wait for our first snowfall!
