










Oldest School Picnic in the Country







Artful Thinking

..Goodbye LHS AUGUST

The caption under my year-book photo read "to be great is to sustain a great quarrel. "I know that it's of Shakespearian origin but how and why it found its way underneath my innocent young face remains a mystery to me even as I write this.

I was never a fan of the Bard to begin with so to have that dismal line beneath my name for all eternity doesn't bode well for a future in the hearafter. Will the 1965 year-book staff chisel that line onto my tombstone as well? I certainly hope not!

I don't recall having had a quarrel of any magnitude with other students ...none to speak of anyway.

Early in my freshman year I did have a potential slugfest with a fellow freshman. I say potential because the afterschool meeting beneath the gym window didn't amount to anything much to the dismay of the onlookers.

We circled one another for a while hoping the other guy would get dizzy and go down for the count. Someone in the crowd yelled "are you guys going to fight or do the waltz?"

Just then my cousin Johnny Mags pulled up with one of his friends and, much to my relief, stopped what turned out to be nothing more than a staring contest between two kids who just wanted to go home and watch Rocky and Bullwinkle. The kid and I shook hands and remained good friends for the duration of our stay at LHS.

Oh yea...there was one other mishap that occurred in woodshop between me and a fellow Columbus School alumnus named...well I 'll just call him "the big fellow" ...its safer that way. Any way Mr. Guyer, our shop teacher, had the class, most of which were from the class of 1964, build coffee tables.

It just so happened that me and the big fellow were at the exact same point of construction so much so that you couldn't tell the two coffee tables apart. Big fellow was taking his time at the lathe and wasn't about to get rushed off by the smaller and nonconfrontational me.

At the end of the period the students placed their tables in the back room ...I saw my chance to get even with him and was ready to suffer the consequences once my plan was completed. He put his table on top of mine which played perfectly into my scheme.

When he wasn't looking

I switched tables, remember now that you could not tell them apart. I called him into the room and said "here's what I think of your table." I held a metal ruler and put a tiny nick in the leg, which of course was really mine.

The big fellow, bless his heart, became furious. He grabbed the ruler from my hand and began beating the daylights out of what he thought was the leg of my coffee table.

From the other room I yelled out to him to read the name under the table he was destroying. "Read it and weep," I said to him. Luckily for me, Mr. Guyer stepped in and told him that he'd repair the leg so that it would be as good as new. That didn't stop him from chasing me through the hallway until I ducked into the janitor's office.

I knew that sooner or later I'd have to confront the big fellow and when I finally did, good kid that he was, he saw fit to let me finish the term in one piece...I took my coffee table and went home.

Oddly enough, a lot of my school chums were from the Class of 1964, thanks in part, to my cousin Anthony Maglionico, who was among them.

They were a well-dressed cool looking group of kids with hot combed hair, feather weight shoes, high roll collars, Italian knit shirts and black leather jackets known only to Lodi kids as "lot boy jackets." The name was given to those jackets by the cool teenagers who hung out at Sorbello's Drug Store parking lot which was located on Main street and wore a men's cologne called Canoe.

Canoe was a potent little witches brew the scent of which by the end of the school year, had permeated so deep into the classrooms and hallways of old Lodi High that it can still be detected, albeit slightly, by those who pass through in the early morning hours when the air is still.

Folk lore has it that these kids from the Class of 1964 were never seen carrying a book. My mother said the same thing about me. "Coolness personified," was the phrase used in describing them. All great kids... They made Lodi High School the place to be even if you didn't want to be there. Yea, that was the Class of 64.

I for one was sorry to see them go since it wasn't quite the same without them. They were unique in every way and, like other legends, come along once in a lifetime.

My in-school friends from the Class of 65, which by the

way was another great class, were an assorted bunch. They ranged from the wood shop crowd to the academic elite and a few in between.

The guys I hung out with were my Columbus school pals Mike Ettz, Irwin Stolz, John Leto, Nick Enea and that kid from Westervelt place my good friend, Johnny Rannou. John was by far my dearest friend and we remained close buddies all through high school and beyond. I'll always remember him as being a bright and honest kid who possessed wisdom beyond his years. He was a total individual who didn't let outside forces dictate his way of going and what's more John was able to figure out the batting averages of pro ball players when he was an 11 year old boy... that impressed the heck out of me. In short Rannou was a good friend and was woven deep into the very fabric that was Westervelt Place, as were all of the kids who lived on that tiny section of the block of whom I've been writing about for the last decade or so. Truth is that I never completely let go of those kids and is most likely why I never ventured too far away from that lofty hill.

As far as my career at Lodi High goes... it's like this folks. I said this on more than one occasion that if you really want to go deeper into the heart of LHS in the mid-sixties you would have to ask the students who were in my 2nd period History class. These kids and members of their circle ran the show from day one. Many of them came from Washington School and sort of "hit the ground running" when they became freshmen and didn't stop until the day they graduated.

I was far removed, that is I removed myself, from their day to day activities and did all I could to stay out of their way, lest I be asked to do something worthwhile. In truth, I'm sorry that I never got to know them better at the time, instead of admiring them from afar which is what I did. Who knows if I took the initiative to sort of rub elbows with some of them I'd have a lot more to tell you about. So, I can't complain to myself about not being popular since no one ever made the big time by hanging out in the boiler room during pep assemblies.

To say that I was a virtual unknown would not be an accurate description of my social status at LHS. Like I said in a previous column I did have a brother and a few cousins who sort of paved the way for me so that the name Maglionico had already made its mark in the LHS book of who's who. They knew me by name only which was fine with me since I wasn't looking for anything beyond that.

It wasn't until February of 1964, my junior year that things began to change.

It was a Sunday evening in my Arnot Street home as me and my family members, along with my aunt Louise and uncle Jimmy, gathered around the television set waiting for a group from Liverpool England who called themselves the Beatles to make their American debut on the Ed Sullivan show.

Beatlemania had found its way into Lodi, New Jersey and was about to crash through the TV set and into my living room. As they sang a tune called "I Want to Hold your Hand" my aunt Louise mentioned, quite casually I might add, that I looked like the left handed one. That's how she identified him since we still didn't know their names. "That one looks like Arthur." She said pointing to Paul McCartney. That's as far as the conversation went.

The Beatles took their bows in front of an audience of hysterical teenage girls and left the stage. We went into the kitchen for coffee and cake, my aunt and uncle went home, and that's about all I remember. I'd like to say that I went into my bedroom and did my homework but the truth doesn't stretch that far.

Suffice to say that it was business as usual. The Beatles came and went just like any other Sunday. Monday had a different story to tell.

That morning I entered LHS by way of the boiler room, as always, and made my way out into the basement hallway heading for the stairwell.

As I walked I noticed a few underclassmen girls entering the hallway from the down staircase which was a good 25 feet behind me. That's when I heard it! "There he is... "Paul the Beatle" I turned around and was met with a series of harmonic screams that scared the heck out of me and broke me into a fast trot toward the stairs. Just then the Gym teacher Mr.Satkowski, burst out of the gymnasium door. "Maglionico" he shouted, " what's going on here?"

I pointed in the direction of the girls and replied as I ran up the stairs "Ask them!" That was only the beginning folks.

Overnight I had arrived from complete obscurity to what was chaotic popularity.

The Friday before I was enjoying life in the haziness of the boiler room where only the rumor of my existence was known. Now I was a freaking Beatle getting chased by a bunch of hysterical girls.

Getting from class to class was all but impossible without causing uproar. For me it was a nightmare since I was still self-conscious about my looks which I always thought were

sub-par. Now I was the main focus of attention with nowhere to hide from the onslaught of Beatlemania.

Instead of trying to capitalize on my new found popularity I was driven deeper into the shadows sneaking around like a thief in the night. I remember getting home from school, looking into my bedroom mirror exclaiming "I am not a Beatle!"

From the second floor I heard my cousin Marie, Class of 67, shouting back "Yes you are."

By my senior year the Beatle thing had died down and I was once again enjoying life as a "just getting by" student trying to eke out enough grade points to graduate with the rest of my class.

One good thing came from that fast fleeting rush of popularity. It helped to come out of my shell and experience the fun and the friendships that come with being a student at old Lodi High. I even managed to find myself a steady girlfriend which, needless to say, enhanced my teen years considerably.

But wait! It was all coming to an end and I wasn't ready for that to happen. I was fresh out of the boiler room ready to embrace the day with a heartfelt "Cheers, Cheers for Old Lodi High."

I was just getting started and now they were telling me that it was time to go. I had finally purchased a pair of feather weight shoes, a black leather "lot boy jacket" that my folks bought me after 2 years of my relentless hounding, and my hair after wrestling with it since 5th Grade, was actually looking good...thanks to a shot of hair spray and much time spent in front of the mirror. Before I knew it I was walking out the side door of LHS and headed home for the last time.

Four years gone in a flash ...it was all over! The fun, the friendships, the kids in woodshop and study hall, the girls, the rah rahs and the teachers... as I walked home I agonized over the fact that they were all gone now...and so, by the way, were the kids from Westervelt Place



The Borough Clerk serves as custodian of the municipal seal, affixing it to all papers and documents according to law and also serves as secretary to the Rent Leveling Board and Ethical Standards Board when meetings are required.

In summary, the Borough Clerk serves as the secretary to the Mayor and Council, secretary to the Municipal Corporation, chief administration official of all elections, custodian of public records and chief administrative officer of licenses and permits. 


W-R Lions Complete Another Great Year

Cancelled Stamps Wanted

Thirteen years ago, in 2004, the Kiwanis Club of Hasbrouck Heights started a project collecting cancelled stamps. They came upon a letter from a Sister Ann Mary, a retired Carmelite Sister who was collecting stamps and selling them to dealers.

The money helped children at St. Benedict's Day Nursery and Infant Hospital of Georgetown, St. Vincent of the West Indies. She collected stamps until 2008. In 2008, the AARP Chapter 418 took this project as one of their own. Kiwanis Club has since disbanded.

In August of 2008, the AARP Chapter 418 found another organization that was collecting stamps. After a phone call to them (Ulseth Lodge Sons of Norway NLC) in Calumet, MI, they decided to send the cancelled stamps to them.

The Lodge collects and sends the stamps to a facility where they are sorted and packaged to sell to collectors and dealers. The proceeds are donated to the Norwegian Health System to aid physically and mentally challenged children and youth.

In June 2015, the AARP Chapter 418 disbanded. The Leisure Club of Hasbrouck Heights then took over the project. If you would like to help the Leisure Club of Hasbrouck Heights in collecting cancelled stamps, please trim the stamps to 1/4 inch around the stamps.

Old envelopes and postcards are also being collected. If envelopes, postcards etc., are more than 40 years old, please do not cut off the stamps, but save the whole envelope/ postcard. People have always found interest in big trials. The Salem Witch trials, the Lindbergh Baby case, The Manson trial, the O.J. Simpson trial, the most recent was the Bill Cosby trial. These are just a few that people found fascinating.

Is the defendant guilty or innocent? All are at the edge of their seats waiting for the decision. Was the trial fair or was it a kangaroo court with a lynch mob? The Civil War had a trial like today's media circuses. Only they used newspapers and not TV to follow what happened next.

Hans Caspar Wirtz was born in Sweden in 1824. He had attended school and wanted to become a doctor, but his family ran out of money and he became a merchant in Zuric.

By 1845 he had a wife and

2 children. He borrowed money that he could not pay back, so he received a four year jail term. The court commuted his prison time and instead gave him a 12 year forcible emigration. He first went to work in Russia that didn't go so well so he came to America. Alone now because his wife refused to move, sought and was granted a divorce.

He started working in Massachusetts, but moved to Louisiana in 1854. He married again to a widow with 2 kids. She gave birth to a new baby and that was how Hans found himself before the Civil War.

There is nothing odd or exciting here but Henry as he was now known wasn't finished.

The Civil War started in 1861 and old Henry threw his hat in with the Rebels and joined the 4th Louisiana Infantry.

Wirtz was wounded at the Battle of Seven Pines and lost the use of his right arm. For his bravery in combat he was promoted to Captain.

Captain Wirtz was assigned to the staff of General John Winder because his injury

left him limited. Winder was in charge of prisoners and all POW's were under his department.

So Captain Wirtz served in Alabama and then Richmond, Virginia guarding prisoners. When the Confederate Government established a new camp for Union prisoners in February of 1864, command of this new camp fell to Captain Henry Wirtz. It was to be called Camp Sumter and it was to be located in Southern Georgia.

Its location in the Deep South would deter escape attempts because it would be a lot of distance to cover to make it to Union lines.

Originally it was to take up to 16 ½ acres of land and wooden barracks were to be built, but the wooden barracks were never done because the prisoners were never thought to remain there long do to the prisoner exchange that allowed prisoners of equal rank to be swapped out with the North. It was located near the railroad depot of Anderson, Georgia. So, the Union prisoners just called it Andersonville.

It was basically a large rectangular stockade. There was a deadline in between the prisoners' space and the stockade wall. Any prisoner stepping over the dead line was considered to be attempting to escape and would be shot.

Wirtz also was said to have grape shot loaded in cannons and had them at the ready to fire to stop large groups of prisoners from gathering together. It was located near the woods but no fires were allowed.

Once opened the prison camp was quickly overcrowded. Everyone living in tents, their water came from a creek that was also used for washing and for their sewage, you don't have to be the Survivor man Les Stroud to see that this wasn't going to end well.

The Confederates were low on food. That meant that their prisoners had even less. Malnutrition soon was weakening prisoners. Disease ran rampant in the camp. Dysentery, malaria, diarrhea, dropsy, consumption, scurvy, bronchitis, pneumonia and eruptive fevers are some of the diseases that ran through Andersonville. Thousands died from sickness.

To his credit Wirtz asked the Confederate Government for supplies and more aid. This request was denied. The dying of the prisoners continued.

At one point in August 1864, Andersonville held 32,000 prisoners, way too many prisoners for the camp.

The prisoners were now dying at a rate of 3,000 a month. Prisoner exchange stopped by order of General Grant of the Union Army because it benefitted the Confederates more so

than the Union. It was bad for the prisoners at Andersonville because that meant you were not going anywhere until the war was over. Wirtz again asked for help, this time from the Union.

He sent 5 prisoners with a petition to the Northern Government to send ships to take the prisoners out of there. This petition went nowhere. No ships would be sent. With the South losing the war now by early 1865 there was no food or medical supplies or medicine for the prisoners.

Roughly 45,000 prisoners were held in Camp Sumter in its 14 month existence. 13,000 died in captivity. When the war ended in April 1865 the people of the North were shocked by the images and stories from Andersonville.

Photography, new for the time, brought pictures of starved men, sick men, torn down not to much more than skeletons to the populace. The people as you can imagine were enraged.

In May of 1865, Major Henry Wirtz (take note that he was promoted for his service), was arrested by the 4th U.S. Cavalry.

The Federal Government put Major Henry on trial for conspiring to impair the lives of Union prisoners of war. On August 23, 1865 the Wirtz trial began.

The newspapers went crazy. Everyone wanted the latest news on the Wirtz trial. He was charged with beating and kicking prisoners. Thirteen acts of personal cruelty, also of murder by use of a revolver.

He was charged with locking prisoners in small stockades. He was charged with using dogs on escaped prisoners and of ordering his guards to shoot prisoners with their muskets. He was charged with supplying bad water and of not housing the prisoners properly and exposing them to the elements

People could not get enough of this trial. Was he innocent? Was he guilty? Everyone had an opinion. 160 witnesses were heard from. 145 said they did not witness Wirtz killing anyone, but there were 12 that said they witnessed personal cruelty by Wirtz.

There was also the witness known as Felix de la Baume. This witness identified a prisoner personally executed by Wirtz. His story was perfect. He delivered a great oration on what happened. Many details were put forth.

This testimony would be trouble for Wirtz. After the trial it was said that Felix de la Baume was actually Felix Osser who was a deserter from the 7th New York Volunteer Regiment. At the time it was

sensational news.

Wirtz put in a defense. He said there was no food to be given the prisoners. There wasn't enough food because they were losing the war. The medicine could not get into the South because of the blockade. When he requested aid it was refused. It didn't work. In November of 1865 Wirtz was found guilty and sentenced to death. Apparently a deal was offered to Wirtz. If he would testify against President Jefferson Davis. The sentence would be annulled. Wirtz stated Davis was never at the camp and he would not do that. So no deal was made.

Many of you may call to mind the Nuremburg trial of 1946. An American prosecutor brought forth into evidence the soldiers handbook the German military used in training. It stated that soldiers were not to mistreat prisoners. They were to be given fair treatment. Therefore, any military person on trial at Nuremburg was already guilty if they had anything to do with the concentration camps. So the prosecutors could go right up the chain of command to convict.

The Confederates had no handbook. In fact the upper chain of command didn't even tour the camp. So General Lee and President Davis could not go on trial for Andersonville.

Confederate General Nathan Bedford Forrest never went to trial for the Fort Pillow Massacre where Northern troops were executed. General George Picket never went on trial for hanging Union troops who were born in the South. He called them traitors to the South. Even though he never resigned his commission from the U.S. Army and he himself took up arms against the U.S. essentially guilty of the same charge of treason he used to hang the Union men. Picket moved to Canada after the war.

Spies were executed along with guerrillas for actions they took against the U.S., but Wirtz is the only Confederate Officer to receive a sentence of death for war crimes.

On November 10, 1865, at the sight of the present day Supreme Court, Wirtz went to the gallows. The rope around his neck, he fell through the trap door. The fall was supposed to break his neck, but it failed to do so and he choked to death.

Some say the case was a miscarriage of justice because he was a victim of the circumstances. Others say he got what was coming. It's long forgotten now but it was big news at the time. People are still entertained by a big trial. ###

Dog Days of Summer

Everyone talks about "the Dog Days of Summer," but few know what the expression means. Some say it signifies the hottest, most sultry days "not fit for a dog."

The Old Farmer's Almanac lists the traditional timing of the "Dog Days" as the 40 days beginning July 3 and ending August 11, coinciding with the ancient heliacal (at sunrise) rising of the Dog Star, Sirius.

They named this period of time, from 20 days before the conjunction to 20 days after, "Dog Days" after the dog star.

The term "Dog Days" was used by the Greeks, as well as the ancient Romans after Sirius, the brightest star in the heavens besides the Sun.

The ancients believed that Sirius was so bright that it actually produced enough heat to help warm the earth. During the summer months, Sirius rises and sets in conjunction with the sun and the ancients believed that Sirius added to the heat produced by the summer sun. And that's how the phrase "The Dog Days of Summer" originated.

A casual survey will usually find that many people believe the phrase is in reference to the conspicuous laziness of domesticated dogs (who are in danger of overheating with too much exercise) during the hottest days of the summer.

When speaking of "Dog Days" there seems to be a connotation of lying or "dogging" around, or being "dog tired" on these hot and humid days. Although these meanings have nothing to do with the original source of the phrase, they may have been attached to the phrase in recent years due to common usage or misunderstanding of the origin of the phrase.

In recent years, the phrase "Dog Days" or "Dog Days of Summer" have also found

You're Self-Employed -Can You Get a Mortgage?

Your office might be a desk in the corner of the bedroom, a co-working space around here in downtown Bergen County, or just the front seat of your pickup truck.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics reports there are 15 million self-employed workers in America living the dream, being their own boss. And that number's growing fast. According to Forbes, the number of self-employed individuals is foreseen to be around 50% by 2020!

As more and more people adopt these unconventional, flexible work arrangements, we realtors have received an uptick in requests for information about qualifying for a mortgage as a self-employed worker. Let's see how lenders evaluate contract or 'gig' work...

For years, W-2s were used as the primary measure for mortgage lending income verification. This in combination with a traditional credit check, were the two main factors in determining whether a mortgage loan was approved in conventional standards. With this new economy on the rise,

Remember, banks are looking at your ability to repay the loan. When you submit a 1099 to the bank as proof of income, this doesn't give it the complete picture of your net income the way a W-2 does.

With a 1099, you're allowed to offset income on your taxes by deducting legitimate unreimbursed business expenses – car repairs, gas and insurance, home office space, supplies, equipment, or expenses related directly to your work.

Additionally, banks consider independent contractor income as less stable than employment income, since the former works on a contract/project basis as opposed to showing up to work at the same location every day.

But, though it may be a little harder for you to get a mortgage loan than for someone who works at a big company, it's far from impossible.

You need to know, essentially, 3 things: a) what kinds of documentation you'll need to show a lender, b) what pitfalls to avoid that would cause you to be denied a loan and c) what to do to make yourself more attractive to lenders.

• Documentation. Obviously, you're going to need to have good credit and low a debt-to-income ratio. You're also going to need to give bank and brokerage account statements to your lender as well as proof of any other assets you own.

This can be problematic to some self-employed borrow-

ers. But all or many of these challenges can be overcome in the way you present yourself to the bank. Most importantly, don't leave the loan processor any room to make incorrect assumptions. Provide everything he or she will need in order to come to the right conclusion about your income stability and contract status.

• Pitfalls to Avoid. Most often, the self-employed are denied for loans because they haven't been self-employed long enough or they don't show enough income. To offset that, certain expenses can be added back to overall income in order to calculate a better net.

Involving a good CPA can help. He can combine and summarize income statements and add perhaps letters to explain any unusual expenses or variations in income; adjustments that will hopefully swing the decision in your favor.

• Becoming More 'Lender-Attractive'. In addition to making sure you have the required paperwork for the bank, there are a few additional things you can do to boost your chances of getting a mortgage loan.

First, it helps to have a lot of cash on hand. Because the irregular income of self-employed people can make banks nervous, you'll want to show them that you can make the mortgage payments even without that income coming in.

Or you might want to consider getting a co-signer and using a lender who specializes in working with the self-employed. Consult your trusted realtor for help in this area. ###

Could Dental Implants help me?

If you lose or break a tooth, a dental implant may be the best option for restoring your smile. Learn more about dental implants and whether they are right for you.

What is a dental implant?

A dental implant is a post, usually made of titanium, which serves as a substitute for a natural tooth's root.

The implant is placed in the jawbone so that it may fuse with the natural bone to become a sturdy foundation for a replacement tooth. Implants can be used to replace individual teeth or to support a bridge or denture containing multiple teeth.

Who can receive implants?

Dental implants can be provided to most patients who are missing teeth due to decay, disease, injury, or other medical conditions. You also may be a candidate for a dental implant if you can't wear dentures or find them uncomfortable, or if you don't want to sacrifice existing tooth structure to support a dental bridge.

Since surgery is required, implant patients must be in good general health, with healthy gums and adequate bone structure. If an implant site lacks the adequate structure, a dentist may be able to perform procedures to improve it

Implants are not for everyone. Chronic conditions like bruxism, diabetes, or leukemia may interfere with healing after implant surgery, so the success rate decreases for patients with these conditions. This also is the case for patients taking bisphosphonates for osteoporosis

Additionally, those who drink alcohol or use tobacco may not be good candidates for implants. Your dentist will take into consideration your medical and dental history when deciding if implants are right for you.

Yield to Pedestrians

How does implant placement work?

First, your dentist will perform surgery to place the implant in the jaw. Next, the surrounding bone will heal via a process called osseointegration; the bone grows around the implant to hold it firmly in place. Finally, your dentist will complete the process by placing on the post an artificial tooth, or crown, that resembles your natural teeth.

How long does implant placement take?

Once the implant placement surgery is completed—usually in an hour or two—the healing process begins, and that can take as long as six months. Additionally, the fitting of the permanent replacement tooth is usually accomplished in one to three weeks.

Your dentist may provide you with a temporary replacement to help you eat and speak normally until the permanent replacement is ready. If your bone structure is strong enough, however, your dentist may be able to place the implant and replacement tooth in one visit.

What can I expect after the procedure?

Most patients will adjust to implants immediately. Some people may feel slight discomfort or notice differences in their chewing or speech, but these symptoms are usually temporary.

How do I care for my implant?

Although an implant's success rate depends on its purpose and location in the mouth—as well as the patient's overall health—a major reason some implants fail is poor hygiene.

It's important to brush implants at least twice a day, as well as to floss in between them. Additionally, as many as four dental cleanings per year may be necessary to maintain gum health. Your dentist will give you specific instructions on caring for your implants. Talk to your general dentist to find out whether dental implants are right for you.



Please yield to blue light responders as if they were heading to an emergency involving your own family.


It could give them the extra time to save a life or stop a fire before it's out of control. For a fire or rescue, a quick response is always important!


