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

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Bill Introduced to Reduce Helicopter Noise Increasing whirlybird pollution bedeviling urban communities demands federal response to reduce racket

WASHINGTON, DC, June 7, 2023 – U.S. Representatives Bill Pascrell, Jr. (D-NJ-09) and Donald S. Beyer, Jr. (D-VA-08) today introduced the Reduce Helicopter Noise Act to take federal action that would rein in the growing noise of helicopter flights over American communities.

"In urban and suburban communities like ours, the number of complaints about commercial helicopter noise has grown exponentially," said Congressman Pascrell.

"This noise is often more than a mere nuisance but a significant quality-of-life hardship that shakes homes and severely disturbs sleeping patterns. The sound of a whirlybird hovering above your house is no picnic.

As commercial helicopter noise grows in the tristate region and across America, the federal government can and must seek ways to curb the problem. Our legislation would implement well researched recommendations to reduce helicopter noise in New Jersey, New York, and beyond."

The Reduce Excessive Decibels and Unwanted Commotion and Emissions to Heighten Enforcement and Limitation of Intrusive Chopper Operations to Protect Towns and Enhance Residents

from Noise Act (REDUCE HE-LICOPTER Noise Act) is co-led by Reps. Pascrell and Beyer, and sponsored by several Senators and Congressmen.

Studies detailing the negative impacts of aircraft noise, including from helicopters, have found it causes disturbances that can increase community annoyance, disrupt sleep, adversely affect academic performance of children, and even increase the risk for cardiovascular disease.

The Reduce Helicopter Noise Act would direct the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) to establish a helicopter noise complaint information sharing database to receive, collect, and provide access to information regarding helicopter noise complaints.

FAA and helicopter operators would be required to share complaints received to ensure the appropriate actor receive such complaint and requires proper complaints to be addressed.

This approach follows recommendations made by the Government Accountability Office (GAO) for the D.C. area in January 2021. The bill would take the GAOs suggested mechanism and establish it for the whole nation.

Additionally, Pascrell's bill would improve FAA officials' ability to identify the helicopter operators by providing more transparency of the helicopters' ownership structure. Background on these issues has been assessed by the GAO in separate reports in March 2020 and January 2021, respectively.

Since being inundated with North Jersey constituent complaints, Congressman Pascrell has crusaded against helicopter noise over urban and suburban communities.

In September 2022, Pascrell demanded the FAA seek ways to crack down on commercial helicopter noise.

On March 15, 2023, Pascrell joined several tristate congressmembers pushing FAA and National Park Service leaders to address commercial helicopter noise.

On April 18, 2023, Pascrell asked members of the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee to add new measures to the FAA reauthorization bill to address the growing problem of helicopter noise over communities in North Jersey, as well as New York City. 2 Charged in Catalytic **Converter Thefts**

The arrests are the result of a joint investigation by the Bergen County Prosecutor's Office under the direction of Chief Jason Love and the Bergen County Sheriff's Office

During an investigation by the Bergen County Prosecutor's Office Special Investigations Squad and the Bergen County Sheriff's Office, Hernandez and Rosario were identified as suspects.

On Friday, June 23, 2023, detectives from the Bergen County Prosecutor's Office located and arrested Hernandez without incident.

Hernandez was remanded to the Bergen County Jail pending his first appearance in Central Judicial Processing Court in Hackensack, NJ. An arrest warrant was issued for Rosario.

Prosecutor Musella states that the charges are merely accusations and that the defendants are presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt. He thanked the Bergen County Sheriff's Office for its assistance. Source: BCPO. ###







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Dental **Injury Prevention**

Preventing dental injuries and injuries to your mouth by practicing commonsense strategies may go a long way to avoiding many situations. Most tooth injuries are a lifelong injury. Thus, a broken tooth is unable to mend itself and requires dental procedures to restore the mouth to the preinjury form and function.

Common recreational injuries in the summer occur during swimming, diving, trampolines, bicycling, skate boarding, basketball, etc.

For instance, the trampoline injury is common when there are more than one person jumping. As one person comes down they can hit their head / mouth upon the other person

often rising which accentuates the force of the impact. Ouch! During the recreational activities, supervision, adhering to recommended safety protocols, using protective equipment, and good old common sense will create a more pleasurable and safe experience.

As the summer progresses, organized sports begin their training practices. Soccer, football, baseball (fall ball), softball, cheering, basketball. Of course, football is the ultimate contact sport.

However, in my experience, there is one sport which has sent more patients to my office due to a dental injury. Many of The Gazette Newspa**per** readers may unfortunately remember those instances. That sport is baseball and softball.

It is rarely thought of by the athletes, parents, and coaches to consider using protective mouth guards during play for these sports. It is seen more now than ever in professional baseball where the batters' helmets are equipped with faceguards. Well fitted mouth guards will provide excellent protection while being cost effective. There are some good store bought mouth guards available. However, not all mouth guards are appropriate for every person. For instance, those who wear orthodontic appliances, will require a special type of mouth guard.

I advise anyone who is active either recreationally or in organized sports to consult with their dentist and determine what type of mouth guard is most appropriate for their activity.

Don't let your feet ruin your day at the beach

Millions of Americans hit the beach this summer to enjoy the sun and sand. Here are some safety tips to make sure your day at the beach is nothing but enjoyable.

• Puncture wounds and cuts: Wear shoes to protect your feet from puncture wounds and cuts caused by sea shells, broken glass and other sharp objects. Be especially aware of old planking on the boardwalk.

Don't go in the water if your skin gets cut - bacteria in oceans and lakes can cause serious infection. To avoid complications from a puncture wound, see a podiatrist for

treatment within 24 hours.

· Jellyfish stings: Remember that a jellyfish washed up on the beach can still sting if you step on it. If their tentacles stick to the foot or ankle, remove them, but protect your hands from getting stung too. Vinegar, meat tenderizer or baking soda reduce pain and swelling. Most jellyfish stings heal within days, but if they don't, medical treatment is required.

• Sunburns: Feet get sunburn too. Rare but deadly skin cancers can occur on the foot. Don't forget to apply sunscreen to the tops and bottoms of your feet.

• Burns: Sand, sidewalks and paved surfaces get hot in the summer sun. Wear shoes to protect your soles from getting

burned, especially if you have

frequently leads to arch pain, heel pain, ankle sprains and other injuries. Athletic shoes provide the heel cushioning and arch support that flip-flops lack. If injuries occur, use rest, ice, compression and elevation to ease pain and swelling. Any injury that does not resolve within a few days should be examined by a podiatrist.

• Diabetes risks: The 20 million Americans with diabetes face serious foot safety risks at the beach. The disease causes poor blood circulation and numbness in the feet. A diabetic may not feel pain from a cut, puncture wound or burn.

Any type of skin break on a diabetic foot has the potential to get infected and ulcerate if it isn't noticed right away. Diabetics should always wear shoes to the beach, and remove them regularly to check for foreign objects like sand and shells that can cause sores, ulcers and infections.

It's Official

Over the years, the State of New Jersey has adopted various symbols pertaining to the state. These vary from a coat of arms to a microbe.

The coat of arms appears on the seal of the State of New Jersey. It was adopted by a joint committee of the two houses of the New Jersey Legislature in 1776 (see The Gazette Newspaper, May 2015). The Flag of the State of New Jersey has the coat of arms centered on it.

The official state colors are buff and blue *(Jersey Blue).* General George Washington assigned these colors to delineate the uniforms of troops from New Jersey, during the Revolutionary War.

The state has an official insect. No, it is not the mosquito! It is the honeybee. Governor Brendan Byrne made it official on June 20, 1974.

The horse is the state animal. The horse is depicted on the coat of arms. The Eastern Gold Finch is the official bird. The official dog is the Seeing Eye Dog. The official fish is the Brook Trout. The reptile is the Bog Turtle. The Knobbed Whelk is the official shell. It is better known as "Scungilli."

As we are known as the Garden State, there are a number of floras that have official status. The Violet is the state flower. The Red Oak is the state tree.

In 2004, the Blueberry was made the official fruit. In 1916, Ms. Elizabeth Coleman White developed the nation's first cultivated blueberry. There is a Blueberry Festival every year at Whitesbog, Brown's Mills, Pemberton Township, New Jersey.

Hadrosaurus Foulkii is the state dinosaur. It was larger than an elephant and had the features of both a lizard and a bird. It was discovered by William Foulke at Haddonfield, New Jersey.

The State of New Jersey has two official ships. In Camden, New Jersey is berthed the USS New Jersey, *(BB 62)*. This highly decorated battleship has seen action in three wars, WWII, Korea and Vietnam. It is now a museum and is open to the public.

The other is the Tall Ship, A. J. Meerwald. This is a two masted Delaware Bay Oyster Schooner. Built in 1928, the ship was gaff rigged and used as an oyster dredger. The Meerwald had been restored by the Bayshore Center at Bivalve, New Jersey. The ship has regular cruises from that location.

The Square Dance is the official dance of New Jersey. The state designated this in 1983.

Yes, New Jersey has an official microbe. It is the Streptomyces Griseus. It was discovered in the soil of New Jersey in 1916. In 1942, Rutgers University researcher, Selman Wakman, using the microbe, created Streptomycin. He was awarded the Nobel Prize for Medicine in 1952.

New Jersey has the distinction of being the only state with an official demon. This is the "Jersey Devil" *(see The Gazette Newspaper, September 2022).* It was accorded this "Honor" in 1939.

Sadly, New Jersey is the only state, of the fifty states, without a state song. In 1942, a strong contender was "The Jersey Bounce." It hit the number one spot for four weeks and was recorded by many artists. A number of Eighth Air Force bombers were named "The Jersey Bounce" by their crews. New Jersey native, Lt. Col. Donald Pierini, named all three P-51 fighters, that he flew, "Jersey Bounce." Maybe New Jersey artists like Bruce Springsteen or Jon Bon Jovi can be encouraged to write the song? ###

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Let's Go Traveling! By Rick Ardis

August 2023

Our nation's capital city, Washington, D.C., is an excellent choice for a family vacation. Close to New Jersey, it is easily accessible by Amtrak, short flights, or a quick car trip on Interstate 95. The city and surrounding areas provide a myriad of sights and experiences.

Washington D.C.

The United States Congress chose the site of the new capital of our new nation in 1790. The first Congressional meetings were held there in 1800 after meeting previously in New York and Philadelphia.

Prior to the end of the Revolutionary War, Princeton, Trenton, Baltimore, Lancaster, and York, PA had served as de facto capitals of our fledgling nation.

So that the city would be independent of local control, a location straddling the Potomac River was chosen with Maryland ceding land on the east bank including the port of Georgetown, and Virginia relinquishing territory including its city of Alexandria and what is now Arlington.

The federal district was a square with sides of approximately ten miles each turned 45 degrees to appear as a diamond.

In 1846 the federal government returned to Virginia the portion of the federal land which lay west of the river.

George Washington appointed Pierre L'Enfant to design an appropriate plan for government buildings at the selected location. L'Enfant's plan was much more grandiose.

The Capitol Building occupies a spot atop the highest hill in the central part of the city. Streets were laid out in a north/south and east/west grid pattern.

Grand avenues named after the states were situated at angles. The intersection of the avenues and grid created parks, squares, and circles which provide airy open space. From the Capitol west to the riverbank is the National Mall and Reflecting Pool. Many people regard Washington, D.C. as one of the most impressive capital cities.

The area along the National Mall is bounded by Constitution and Independence Avenues and is the location of most sights of interest to the visitor.

The Smithsonian Institution is the largest complex of museums, education, and research centers in the world.

Among the popular exhibits are the American History Museum, Air and Space Museum, African American Museum, American Indian Museum, and Natural History Museum. Other units are focused on art. These include the National Gallery of Art, the Freer Gallery of Art, and the Hirshhorn Art Museum. Each of these exhibits offer free admission, although some require advanced reservations for timed entry.

The Smithsonian also operates the nearby National Zoological Park in Washington's Rock Creek Park. The zoo is open year-round with free admission and unique events.

Due to space constraints at the Air and Space Museum, the Smithsonian opened the Udvar-Hazy Center at Washington **Dulles** International Airport west of D.C. in Fairfax, Virginia. In this expanded space, new and larger exhibits could be displayed. These include a Space Shuttle, a Concorde SST, and other commercial, military, and private aircraft. There are no admission fees, but there are charges for simulators, and movies in the IMAX Theater on an 86-foot-wide.

Many other free attractions abound in and around the city. The US Capitol Building, White House, and Supreme Court offer tours. The Library of Congress, National Archives (featuring the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution), Postal Museum, United States Holocaust Museum, and United States Mint also offer tours.

The Washington Monument, Lincoln Memorial, Jefferson Memorial, and memorials and monuments to casualties of American wars are open-air and easily accessible. One of the most popular sights to witness is the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier across the Potomac in Arlington National Cemetery.

In addition to the numerous free options, there are other activities and sights with a charge. The area is home to teams in each of the major sports, plus other leagues, and collegiate competition. Theater and concert offerings are like any other large American city. However, the most prominent area attraction is George Washington's home at Mount Vernon.

Washington is a very walkable city, with excellent public transportation for longer distances. Additionally, options for trolley and double-decker bus tours provide narrated highlights of the city.

As with any large city, Washington provides endless culinary options. While exploring the D.C.'s many neighborhoods, a visitor can find food to satisfy any taste. Italian, French, Steakhouse, Vietnamese, Ethiopian, and other ethnic eateries thrive throughout the city. Seafood options are plentiful on Maine Avenue along the river. Connecticut Avenue is home to many restaurants, from fast food to high end, and many different cuisines. Ben's Chili Bowl is a staple on U Street serving unique half-smokes, chili dogs, and milkshakes.

One of my favorite restaurants is Martin's Tavern on Wisconsin Avenue in the Georgetown neighborhood. The menu features comfort foods in a compact dining room. (One of the booths is where JFK proposed to Jacqueline Bouvier). I also enjoy The Old Ebbit Grill near the White House. Founded in 1856, it is Washington's oldest saloon and noted for crab cakes and ovsters. I first visited Washington, D.C. as a Cub Scout and have returned to the city quite often. During each visit I have found something new to experience whether traveling for business or solely vacation. Every American should take the opportunity travel to the nation's capital at least once.###



Thoughts on Back-to-School

Earlier this year, a nice young couple decided to sell their condo in Jersey City and move to one of the towns down here in our desirable south central Bergen County area. The main reason they moved? Their son Robbie, age 5, starts school this week.

It's a typical realtor story but it highlights the quality of our local school districts which, I can tell from long experience, accounts immeasurably for the allure and value others put on residential real estate around here.

"We definitely moved here for the schools," Robbie's mom told us. "We wanted our kids to be with other children whose parents had as much involvement with education.

The people here have similar backgrounds to ours. Those are the types of people you want to become friends with, whose kids you want your kids to become friends with."

All over the country, parents are preparing this week to send their children back to school, spending hundreds of dollars on books, clothes and groceries for brown bag lunches. And, for many families, another key back-to-school purchase is... a new home!

Online giant. Trulia, conducted a survey that compared the ratio of families with children aged 5 to 9 versus families with children aged 0 to 4.

The results, unsurprisingly, showed that the most attractive communities for families with school-aged kids are traditional suburbs like those around here, where many of us grew up.

The communities that are the least attractive to parents with school-age children (the districts with the lowest ratios of 5-to-9 year olds and 0-to-4 year olds) tended to be denselypopulated areas that are popular with young professionals and students, yet have high real estate prices. Notable among them is Hoboken, which has only 39 children of elementary school age for every 100 preschool-aged children. year olds.

A fair number of people in this age group may originate in the centers of cities but, we note, a substantial outflow of them as their kids approach school age. It would appear that, setting their own interests aside, these more mature, responsible couples think more now along the lines of what's in the best interests of their kids.

(Our own son, Martin, father of two, made a similar decision last year when he and his wife gave up their hipster lifestyle in Williamsburg, Brooklyn and transitioned to the more staid environment of Beacon, NY.)

The fact is, though, that buying in a community with a good school district can benefit you even if you don't have kids.

Realtor.com did a survey recently which showed that school district boundaries impact the buying decision for more than 60 percent of home buyers.

Schools have always been closely tied to real estate sales but, more than ever, education is often seen as a factor that is even more important than price, commute time and nearby amenities. It means high resale value.

We're fortunate to have that *(and more!)*, right here in our local area. Just last year, the Hasbrouck Heights School District was acclaimed 84th best school district in New Jersey according to the 2022 Niche Rankings, a research & rating standard.



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Sturgeon Moon Plus a Blue Moon

This year, August has two full moons—and, they are both supermoons!

The full Sturgeon Moon reaches its peak on Tuesday, August 1, 2023, at 2:33 a.m. with a second Blue Sturgeon Supermoon peaking on Wednesday, August 30, 2023, 9:37 p.m. This supermoon will be the biggest and the closest full Moon we see all year!

For more than half a century, whenever two full Moons appeared in a single month (which happens on average every 2 1/2 to 3 years), the second has been christened a "Blue Moon." (In our lexicon, we describe an unusual event as happening "Once in a Blue Moon.")

According to "The Farmer's Almanac," the fishing tribes are given credit for the naming of this moon, since sturgeon, a large fish of the Great Lakes and Lake Champlain and other major bodies of water, were most readily caught during August. The lake sturgeon has a greenish-grey color and a pointed snout with two pairs of whisker-like tactile organs dangling near the mouth. It is sometimes called a "living fossil," as it belongs to a family of fish that has existed for more than 135 million years.

Lake sturgeons are extremely long-lived. The males can reach 55 years, while females can live up to 150 years! And they can grow to be enormous. They are the American continent's largest fish and can grow to over 2 meters long (6 feet) and weigh around 90 kilos (200 pounds).

Lake sturgeons do not only live in lakes; they also live in rivers, but not in the ocean.

This monster fish used to be a major part of the ecosystems in North America's Great Lakes, Hudson Bay, and in the Mississippi River, and they were once found all the way from Canada to Alabama.

Today, the lake sturgeon has become one of the rarest

fish in North America because of intense overfishing in the 19th century, pollution, and damage to their habitat and breeding grounds due to agriculture and lumbering.


