

Holiday Candle Safety Tips

Wood-Ridge Fire Chief Anthony Gentile stated, "On average, a candle fire in the home is reported to a U.S. fire department every 34 minutes."

More than half of all candle fires start when items that can burn, such as furniture, mattresses, bedding, curtains, or decorations, are too close to the candle. The risk of a fatal candle fire appears higher when candles are used for light.

Chief Gentile offered these candle safety tips:

- Consider using batteryoperated flameless candles which can look, smell, and feel like real candles.
- Use sturdy, safe candle-holders.
- Protect candle flames with glass chimneys or containers.
- Keep candles at least 12 inches from anything that can burn.
- Never leave a burning candle unattended.
- Put candles out when you leave a room.
- Avoid using candles in bedrooms and sleeping areas.
- Keep children and pets away from burning candles.
 Be careful not to splat-
- Be careful not to splatter wax when putting out a candle.
- Never use a candle when oxygen is present.
- Always use a flashlight, not a candle, for emergency lighting.
- Keep matches and lighters up high, out of reach of children, preferably in a locked cabinet. ###



I'm Dreaming of a White Christmas...

As a little boy growing up in Lodi, amongst the best things in life to me was a good snow storm and... Christmas! To put the two together was a dream!

A dream not often made into reality. When you look at the statistics, we have not had too many white Christmases, even years ago, despite what you may "remember."

Many say when we were kids, we had more white Christmases, but I beg to differ. Now, how do you define a white Christmas you ask. Does it mean: snow actually "falling" on Christmas Day or does it merely mean if you have snow on the ground that it's a white Christmas. I think it's more

But as far as actually having snow "falling" on Christmas Day, here are the facts: Since 1950, we have had 6 Christmases with snow actually falling and accumulating. The years were (since 1950), 1962: 1," 1966: 1," 1969: 3," 1975: 1," 1976: 1" and just 6 years ago, in 2002, we had a whopping 5 ½" on Christmas Day!

Now, as far as technically having a white Christmas from ...say some left over snow on the ground from previous days preceding Christmas Day... well, that's a stat this guy is too busy to research ... but I will tell you this, it's a heck of a lot more than just 6 Christmases. Probably around 15 or 20 "snow on the ground-white Christmases" since 1950.

This brings us to the question, will we have a white Christmas this year?

Tough question to answer as longer range forecasting for an individual day is still a tough nut to crack, that is a forecast beyond, say... day 10.

Anyway, in my meteorological opinion, it will remain colder than normal well into a chunk of December. As you know, it's been colder than normal in Hasbrouck Heights and Teterboro since the middle of November and we have already had a few snow events.

Given the type of weath-

er pattern we are in, I think THIS Christmas holds a better chance of either having snow on the ground or, perhaps the "magical snow actually falling" on Christmas Day.

Now that I am not a kid anymore, and it's my business to forecast, especially during storms, I am not quite sure if I want snow to fall on Christmas, because that means more "work" for me. But, hey, now that I think of it, I am still a kid at heart, so... LET IT SNOW, LET IT SNOW, LET IT SNOW!

Fire Chief Offers Safety Tips for Christmas Trees

Hasbrouck Heights Fire Chief Michael Ratkowski stated that, "Almost half (48%) of home Christmas tree fires are caused by some type of electrical failure or malfunction. Twenty-seven percent of Christmas tree fires result from a heat source placed too close to the tree.

Two-thirds of home Christmas tree fires are reported in December and 19% are reported in January."

Chief Ratkowski offered these tips regarding Christmas tree safety:

- When decorating your tree, always use lights listed by a testing laboratory. Some lights are designed only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both. Larger tree lights should also have some type of reflector rather than a bare bulb.
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions on how to use tree lights. Any string of lights with worn, frayed or broken cords or loose bulb connections should not be used. Connect no more than three strands of push-in bulbs and a maximum of 50 bulbs for screw-in bulbs.

- Always unplug Christmas tree lights before leaving home or going to bed.
- Bring outdoor electrical lights inside after the holidays to prevent hazards and extend their life.
- Never use lit candles to decorate a tree, and make sure any lit candles in the room are placed well away from tree branches.
- Try to keep live trees as moist as possible by giving them plenty of water daily. Do not purchase a tree that is dry or dropping needles. Check for fresh, green needles. And place your tree in a sturdy tree stand designed not to tip over.
- Children are fascinated with Christmas trees. Keep a watchful eye on them when around the tree and do not let them play with the wiring or lights. Store matches and lighters up high, out of reach, preferably in a locked cabinet.
- Make sure the tree is at least three feet (one meter) away from any heat source, such as fireplaces and radiators. Try to position the tree near an outlet so that cords are not running long distances. Do not place the tree where it may block exits.
- Safely dispose of the tree when it begins dropping needles. Dried-out trees are highly flammable and should not be left in a house or garage, or placed against the house.



Advent Waiting in a Quickaholic Society

Quickaholics are the fastest growing population in our culture. There are fast food restaurants, express lanes, express mail, and jiffy markets. You may even purchase a video entitled, "Discover Yourself in Less Than Thirty Minutes."

Disney World is sensitive that people do not want to wait, so one of their priorities is to keep the lines moving. They loop and twist and snake as they make their way to a particular attraction. It takes the participants the same amount of time to reach their destination but they do not have to wait and face their discontent.

I would like to think I am not part of this growing group but it is not true. I know the maneuvering that is going on inside of me to select the quickest line at the bank or the supermarket, only to find out I picked the slower one. At times I may be under a time constraint, but most of the time I wonder what is underneath the rushing.

There certainly is nothing unhealthy about saving time and being more efficient, but it goes over the line when we are moving faster and faster to avoid our lives. The quick and easy become addictive when we run to avoid our inner condition – our problems, our pain, and our potential.

The Advent season of waiting is a time to challenge that part of ourselves. God's relationship with his people has been consistently one of teaching them to wait. Noah waited for the flood waters to recede: Sarah waited in barrenness for a child; the Israelites waited in Egypt and then forty years







The Ups & Downs of **Real Estate**

As everybody knows, the real estate market is cyclical. We, who are in the business nearly 30 years, have seen and survived several housing downturns. In the late 70s and early 80s, mortgage rates were "off the charts," approaching, at one point, close to 20% (!), putting financing beyond the reach of most home buyers. The housing market was hit again in the 80s thru the early 90s when hundreds of savings & loans collapsed. And once again in the late 90s: the aftermath of the dot-com crash, provoking then, as now, another economic crisis...

Today's market decline is unique inasmuch as prices are low and -contrary to past downturns -- interest rates (by historical comparison) are also low. The problem, I think, is largely psychological: buyers are scared to commit; they are sitting by the sidelines, waiting

for the proverbial "bottom."

In this very competitive marketplace, two key elements are crucial to a quick sale and an alleviation of the current housing back-log: Pricing (derived from data, according to fully adjusted comparable recent sales) and Marketing (the importance of evaluating a real estate agency on its track record & means to deliver). And, in a declining market, time is of the essence. No room for error!




Library Book & Bake Sale

Veterans' Salute

Centuries of American Veterans Remembered

November 11, 2008

Wing and a Prayer"

The Army Air Forces Historical Association, an interactive, living history museum dedicated to honoring World War II aviators, performed a special theatrical presentation of "A Wing and a Prayer" on Sunday, November 9 at the Campbell-Christie House in River Edge. The event, in conjunction with the Bergen County Historical Society, was part of its Veterans Day Salute called "USO Victory Canteen."

AAFHA members, many of them Army Air Force Veterans and dressed in period uniforms, provided visitors a chance to roll back the hands of time and experience life during the war years. A display of aviation artifacts also provided visitors with a hands-on connection to Veterans.

"A Wing and a Prayer" is a theatrical performance that, according to its author, aviation author Al Parisi of Wyckoff, incorporates a number of elements that brings audience members up close and personal with the experiences of World War II airmen. It is a compilation of vignettes taken from interviews conducted with Veterans as well as published historical anecdotes and era songs, all poignant and stirring.

"Over the years, whether they were first-hand accounts or just pieces that I'd read that touched me deeply, the bits and pieces that make up 'Wing and a Prayer' come from those deep-rooted emotions of Veterans that are born in times of war," said Parisi. "And those experiences are just as true today for those serving overseas



in Afghanistan and Iraq as they were for those fighting in Europe and the Pacific Theater," he adds.

They range from fliers' recollections of fear and dread to the Andrews Sisters' tale of the war's end and jubilation.

And there is a series of letters home from one young airman to his mother, masking the danger and focusing on easing her fears for her son's safety.

"The Donovan letters, from a 21-year old B-17 bomber pilot," says Parisi, "are particularly touching and poignant because "there's this young man responsible for the lives of 10 men, in the midst of the worst of the air war, and his letters are like those of a boy writing home from summer camp, longing for his loved ones that he misses dearly, and not letting on that, for him, death can be on the doorstep."

The River Edge performance, he said, was particularly meaningful for him because his 21 year old son, Chris Parisi, who just graduated from the renowned Lee Strasberg Theatre School in Manhattan, took on the Donovan role.

"He brought great insight

to the role, because it's a young man, his age, with the weight of the world on his shoulders trying to shelter his loved ones from the war, like countless others are doing today, only with e-mails and cell phone calls from the battle zone," said Parisi.

Why the performance? "Because we read about sacrifices and casualty figures each and every day about the war, and unless we put a face to them, we will never learn that war exacts a far deeper toll than any of us can ever imagine," says Parisi. ###

The participants waited with great anticipation throughout the evening as the judges wove their way through the various projects built and de-




liberated.



Fitness Tips

Take The Pressure Off Getting Fit

Instead of pressuring yourself into losing 50 pounds in two months, make it your goal to drop one pound a week. All it takes are small changes in your daily lifestyle. To shed a pound a week, burn 3,500 extra calories. Try the following three steps:

Record your normal weekly exercise – look at everything from walking to participating in sports to exercising in the gym. This is your starting point. You need to burn an additional 3,500 calories on top of your normal weekly exercise.

Record your normal weekly food intake - calculate the total number of calories you eat in an average day. You should work at slowly decreasing that number.

Remember, we are going for a 3,500 calorie deficit each week – this can be done by

a combination of increased calorie exertion (exercise) as well as a decrease in calories consumed (eating less).

Chart the difference - now you know your starting point for both calorie exertion and calorie intake.

Take every opportunity to exert more calories by increasing your physical activity, and to decrease your calorie consumption by eating fewer calories and by making healthier selections.

Record your progress in a notebook and refer back to it often. You will be surprised how encouraging it is to see your progress written down on paper.

Remember, if you burn up 500 calories a day you will drop a pound in a week.

Here are some practical ways to lose calories:

• Drink regular soda pop? Drink water or seltzer (160 calories lost)

• Eat a snack from a vending machine? Enjoy an apple (180 calories lost)

• Hit the snooze button in the AM? Jog for 30 minutes before work (150 calories lost)

Weight loss doesn't have to be elusive. Make small changes each and every day toward a healthier, fitter you. ###





All Contractors Must Register With the DCA

New Jersey's Contractor's Registration Act (Act) became effective in December 2005. The Act is broadly conceived and liberally interpreted in favor of the consumer.

To an unsuspecting home improvement contractor, even a technical violation can produce financial ruin.

Some of the work covered by the Act includes driveways, sidewalks, pools, patios, landscaping, fences, porches, windows, doors, kitchens, bathrooms, fire and security protection devices, HVAC, water systems, roofing and siding, carpeting, etc. Exceptions to the Act include people who work on their own properties.

Companies that work in the home-improvement industry must register with the DCA (Registration Responsibility) and maintain general liability insurance in the minimum amount of \$500,000 per occurrence.

By the terms of the Act every person or company who makes, sells or advertises home improvements must file an application with the DCA and

register annually thereafter.

In most cases, a Contractor will be able to complete the registration application and disclosure statement without much difficulty.

In those instances, however, where the information requested may have a negative influence on an application for registration, the Contractor applicant should engage an attorney to help with the process.

In either case, the applicant must be truthful, because a breach of this responsibility can cause a revocation or suspension of the H.I. Contractor's registration, a criminal prosecution, or liability under the

TEB "Pledge To The Community" Update

At Teterboro Airport on October 28, 2008, the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey, Congressman Steve Rothman and officials representing the aviation industry, provided an update marking the two-year anniversary of the "Pledge to the Community" that was announced on October 4, 2006.

Those five pledges were:

- 1. Reducing Stage II (the noisiest jets) operations.
- 2. Reducing non-essential nighttime operations from 11 p.m. to 6 a.m.
- 3. Keeping large aircraft (100,000 lb. weight limit) from operating at Teterboro.
- 4. Making safety improve-
- 5. Enhancing and refining security procedures.

Speakers during the hourlong press conference included:

Port Authority Deputy Executive Director Susan Bass Levin and Port Authority Chairman Anthony Coscia expressing concerns about the quality of life in the area communities and working together with the industry group. NetJets President James Christiansen expressed NetJets' cooperation in the program.

TEB Working Group Co-Chair James K. Coyne stated they are looking for new ideas and applying creative problemsolving solutions.

A report published by the TEB Working Group outlined their 2007 efforts. Highlights include:

Getting The Word Out

1. An outreach effort to the aviation community explaining the program. This included attending major industry conventions, handing out over 8,000 Pledges to the Community brochures and more than 3,000 Teterboro Airport Quiet Flying Pilot Handbooks, briefing nearly 400 flight crews and departments on Teterboro's noise abatement procedures as well as setting up a Speakers Bureau. (To arrange for a speaker, call 201-807-4020.)

Additionally, NetJets, TEB's largest single operator of aircraft, sent letters to 6,200 fractional owners informing them of the voluntary nighttime curfew.

Noise Levels and Complaints Fall

2. Stage II operations declined 24%, from 6,121 in 2006 to 4,652 in 2007. Nighttime operations declined 6.6%, from 14,833 in 2006 to 13,858 in 2007. Aircraft movement declined 2.8% from 187,300 in 2006 to 182,101 in 2007. Noise complaints dropped 22% from 894 in 2006 to 696 in 2007.

In 2007, the Teterboro noise monitor system recorded average day/night noise levels below 50 decibels in Hasbrouck Heights and below 55dB in Moonachie and Hackensack. Carlstadt recorded 57dB.

Prior to September 2001, system-wide readings ranged between 51-61dB; the range is now 48-58dB.

The "three strikes and you're out" rule -- in 2007, four aircraft were banned, 92 first-violations and 11 second violations with warning letters sent to 56 operators.

Safety & Security a #1 Priority

3. Teterboro Airport has made major strides in increasing security measures, adding new safety programs and developing initiatives to keep operations, employees and passengers as safe and secure

were installed on Runways 24 and 19 and Runway Identifier lights installed on Runway 1.

EMAS (arrestor beds) were completed for Runway 6. (See The Gazette Newspaper, November 2006, page 28.) Construction for EMAS installation at the south end of Runway 1/19 is in the permit process.

A Safety Management System is being developed. All FBO's and charter operators have signed on and airport management is incorporating the program into existing FAA safety programs that are required as part of the airport certification program.

Work progressed on the Perimeter Intrusion Detection System. Infrastructure installation continues and will be followed by the installation of sensors and cameras. New fencing was installed in the northeast section of the airport.

The FAA held a Runway Safety Action Team meeting focusing on runway incursions and the need for accurate communication with airport controllers. TEB finished the FAA fiscal year with five runway incursions vehicle-pedestrian deviations for FY-07, down from nine deviations in FY-06, a 44% reduction.

4. With a grant from the National Air Transportation Association, TEB will be implementing a NATA Safety 1st initiative to develop a template for an online training course on FAA standards.

The goal of the training is to convey to pilots and flight crews operating into and out of the airport the local knowledge in an online program. For TEB, this includes its crowded location and numerous movements; pilot serial views both during the day and at night; the nature of the airport, including the fact that it is noise and emissionsensitive; and best practices for ground operations.

Rothman's Comments

The concluding speaker was Congressman Steve Rothman who thanked the Group for their efforts and congratulated them on their accomplish-

He stated that, "Significant progress has been made since 2006 but there is still much more work to be done. Teterboro Airport has been a noisy and somewhat bothersome neighbor for decades but it is also a neighbor that employs 1,137 people, creates 15,554 other jobs and generates \$1.8 billion in annual economic activity in the region. This is a neighbor we want to keep,

as long as we can figure out how best to live next to each other."

Rothman was pleased that there was progress in four of the five pledge areas:

- Stage II flights are down
- Significant safety and security improvements have been made or are in the planning stages.
- The ban of 100,000 pound aircraft has been preserved.
- Overall number of flights has declined 9% to the lowest level since 2001.

Rothman expressed disappointment with lack of progress being made in two important

"When the Working Group announced these pledges two years ago, it had just over 50% of the operators at Teterboro voluntarily agreeing to abide by these pledges and it set a goal of having 90% signed up by the end of 2007. Unfortunately, they have fallen well short of that goal since just over 60% of the operators have signed up so far."

Additionally, Rothman expressed disappointment with the 16% reduction in overnight flights at the airport stating, "Nothing is more intrusive to the people living near the airport than having a low-flying, loud aircraft over their home in the middle of the night. We must work toward banning those flights completely...'

Officials had hoped to raise the compliance rate to 90% by the end of 2007 as aircraft operators learn about the rules. FBO's would not refuse service for jets arriving after 11:00 p.m., but would let them know about the curfews for the future.

There are no penalties for violating the curfew or operating the loud jets. No legislation has been enacted to enforce the ban and nighttime curfew.




