This much I can honestly say that like all of my "Westervelt Place" stories this one is based on fact. With that having been said here's hoping that you enjoy this one. It's titled A Christmas in Lodi, by the way...Merry Christmas.

It was noon on Christmas Eve in the year 1958. The mas friendly Borough of Lodi, NJ, was alive with the many sights, sounds and colors of this wonderful season.

Everywhere there was the Holy Spirit of Christmas and it glowed on each rosy cheeked face and sparkled in each happy smile.

The cozy main street was busy with last minute shoppers who greeted one another with a heartfelt "Merry Christmas" then hurried on their way.

In the distance could be

heard the angelic voices of the St. Joseph Church choir, whose songs filled the air with messages of goodwill.

The words of one of those songs remains clear in my mind though it's been a life time since last I heard them.

Christmas in Lodi

Look out of your window tonight

And feel the wintry air. Notice the spirit of Christ-

It seems to be everywhere. Listen to the caroler's song Telling of goodwill and joy. Oh what a wonderful time

For each little girl and boy. The streets are so merry As people pass by There's a smile on each face

> And a gleam in each eye The Christmas star glitters What a marvelous sight As we listen for sleigh bells On this heavenly night.

Yes Christmas is finally

So turn to your loved ones

Merry Christmas to you may your wishes come true

On this truly remarkable

Or something like that... Anyway folks, the heavy winter sky had given way to an overnight snowfall that caressed the tree tops and glittered as if God had sprinkled diamond dust over the entire landscape. Oh yes friends, it was Christmas time in Lodi and it was perfect.

The kids from the hill were there running from store to store hoping that some of those toys in the window would find their way under the tree.

Yes folks, I was among them, your Artful Thinker who was taking it all in and cherishing every moment of it. We were a likeable group of kids ...you know in a rascally sort of way.

This was Christmas time so it was wise for a child to keep a low profile at least until one could get a sense of how the gift getting situation was unfolding.

Mischievous though I was, I was never disappointed. There were those tense Christmas mornings when it could have gone either way. It was too late to be on my best behavior so I braced myself for a major let down. It always turned out in my favor...as if I didn't know.

There was 6 inches of snow on the ground, maybe more. It was decided by each of us that a sleigh ride down the mountain of Farnham Avenue would take the edge off of our gift getting anxieties.

Before you could say "Jingle Bells" we were at the top of Arnot Street, sleds in hand headed north toward old man Cottone's dilapidated barn where now stands an apartment complex.

On the way we saw Alfred " Porky " Manzella and John Leto, two kids from Columbus School who lived up there. Porky's house was almost directly across from the "mountain "we were about to sleighride down.

Okay, so it was more like a steep hill, but when you're ten years old everything looks bigger than what it actually is, ergo a "mountain."

We noticed that the two kids from Columbus School were looking downward into a shallow gulley which was located in a vacant lot, of which there were many.

It turned out to be a gray, beat up, one horse open sleigh minus the horse. Where it came from or who owned it remains a mystery till this day.

In those days stuff like that was always winding up in an open field or on the side of a dirt road.

This, however, was quite a find and it was ours. It was like finding that wooden raft down the river...it was there for the taking and by God, we took it... we were taking this big sled! Could you blame us?

We managed, with the help of the three Davis Brothers who were passing by, to get the sled out of the gulley and push it to the top of the hill.

Porky's front yard was filled with Christmas ornaments including a plastic, talking Santa who gave us a hardy "Ho Ho Ho Merry Christmas" as we passed by.

We made it to the top of the hill...the same hill that we slid down on cardboard boxes during the summer months.

It looked much steeper now especially from inside of that big sled. Porky waited at the bottom of the hill in case, by chance, a car drove by...rare, but it was known to happen every now and then.

The three Davis Brothers held the sled in place while the rest of us climbed in.

Me and Johnny Rannou

sat up front while my cousin Anthony and John Leto secured themselves in the back.

There was a wooded lever next to Rannou that when pulled back served as a brake.

No sooner did the Three Davis brothers let us go when Rannou asked the dreaded question. "How do you steer this thing?" By then, it was already too late. We were going down that hill at an already frantic speed...in fact we were all pretty frantic.

A panic stricken Rannou hit the brakes causing the sled to spin out of control. Before we knew it we were going down that hill backwards and folks let me tell you we were terrified... well not me so much but those other kids? Wow!

Suddenly we hit a bump that for, a second or two, rendered us airborne. When we landed my cousin Anthony was thrown from the sled and hit the ground hard.

He then rolled recklessly downward and actually beat us to the bottom. In the meantime Johnny Leto jumped out and landed in a snow filled ravine. We found out later that it took two firemen and a St. Bernard to get him out.

It was now me and Rannou holding on for dear life as our backward trek down the hill had entered its final phase...which could not have lasted more than 15 seconds... an eternity!

Any way folks...Are you still with me? The sled hit another bump...which might have been my cousin Anthony...as we slid sideways onto the snow covered dirt road.

We hit the curb, straightened out and dashed across Porky's front yard. Porky leaped out of the way and we somehow managed to pick up the talking Santa...don't ask how...I remember looking to my left and there he was.

We crossed Hughes Street at break neck speed, slid over Westminster Place onto someone's yard, destroyed a few ornaments and crashed headlong into an evergreen tree.

The impact caused a mound of snow to fall from the tree and onto the heads of me and Rannou. Just then the talking Santa let out with a garbled "Ho Ho Ho Merry Christmas."

"Yea!" said Rannou as he stuck his head out from under the snow. "Easy for you to say!"

Yes we all lived happily

- Louis Bouillot Perle d'Aurore Rose - Burgundy, France, If you're having trouble buying a sparkling wine that isn't Champagne, Louis Bouillot Perle d'Aurore is a nice choice. A sophisticated Rose made using the Champagne method with a bouquet and palate that features cherry and strawberry notes.
- Gruet Blanc de Noirs Sparkling Wine - New Mexico, US, You would not believe that New Mexico as an excellent wine-making region, but they have won various awards

with this affordable American sparkling wine.

- La Marca Prosecco -Veneto, Italy, The method of producing Italian prosecco makes it less expensive than French Champagne but not in quality. The delicate apple and honeysuckle flavors are sure to please everyone.
- Segura Viudas Cava -Penedes, Spain, Spanish cava is an excellent entree into the world of sparkling wines, especially the Segura Viuda.
- Domaine Chandon Blanc de Noirs - California, Rated 90+ points by major wine reviewing publications. This is a delightful sweet, but doesn't overwhelm the palate like other fruit-forward sparkling wines.

Events and Songs of World War II Recalled

If you are over the age of 77 you lived through one of the bloodiest wars in history... World War II. History tells us the war started when Adolf Hitler's troops invaded Poland in 1939, and dragged on for six deadly years until the final Allied defeat of both Nazi Germany and Japan in 1945.

These war years (1939 to 1945) produced a significant number of popular songs ranging from the patriotic to the sentimental. With this premise, the Traveling Literary Theater incorporated the music of that period with letters from soldiers as well as allied and axis leaders. The program is entitled "Songs and Letters of World War II."

The presentation was sponsored by the Wood-Ridge Historical Society and was presented on October 30, 2016 at the Arnault/Bianchi House in Wood-Ridge. It featured Maggie Worsdale doing the singing and Tom Worsdale and David Sussman reading the letters.

They are members of the Traveling Literary Theater, which was established in 2005.

The goal of the members is to bring classic literature to audiences with characterization readings. They appear in costumes of the period.

It was a moving experience to hear authentic letters written by men who were in combat; reports from their leaders on the progress of the war, and songs that were a key factor in maintaining civilian morale at a high level.

One letter written by a prisoner of war in a German Concentration Camp describing Christmas Eve was inspiring. Another letter written by a sailor whose ship was sunk gave a vivid account of his ordeal on a life raft. There was also a letter from a soldier who landed in Normandy on D-Day.

In the Forties, people glued their ears to their radio and paid attention to what was being said. The letters being read recalled those days when listening was more then hearing, it was going through the experience in your mind. It was being moved, validating, acknowledging and appreciating what was being said. Story by Peter Gallo Jr. ###





Christmas Decorations

Originally, Christmas decorations were home-made paper flowers, or apples, biscuits, and sweets. The earliest decorations to be bought came from Nuremburg in Germany, a city famous for the manufacture of toys. Lauscha, in Germany, is famous for its glass ornaments. In 1880, America discovered Lauscha. F.W. Woolworth went there and bought a few glass Christmas tree ornaments. Within a day he had sold out, so the next year, he bought more and within a week they, too, had sold.

The year after that, he bought 200,000 Lauscha ornaments. During the First World War, supplies of ornaments from Lauscha ceased, so American manufacturers began to make their own ornaments, developing new techniques that allowed them to turn out as many ornaments in a minute as could be made in a whole day at Lauscha. ###

Lodi Rabies Wood-Ridge **Clinic**

The Borough of Lodi is offering a free Rabies Clinic on January 10, 2017, between the hours of 4:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. The clinic will take place at the Firehouse located at One Graham Lane in Lodi.

All dogs and cats above the age of seven months that reside in the Borough of Lodi are required to be licensed, and have a current Rabies vaccination. To obtain a license the Rabies vaccination may not expire before November 1, 2017.

License renewal begins on January 3, 2017. No licenses will be issued prior to that date. To obtain a license, you must provide proof of Rabies inoculation. You can renew your license the day of the clinic or by sending a self-stamped addressed envelope to Tax Assessor/Health Department, One Memorial Drive, Lodi, NJ 07664.

Please make checks payable to the Borough of Lodi. You must include a copy of the Rabies vaccination and proof of spaying and neutering. (Please no not send originals, for they will not be returned.)

The license and tag will be returned to you. You may also stop in at the Tax Assessor's Office on the 1st floor of the Municipal Building - Room 103, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 2 p.m. to 3 p.m., Monday - Friday. If you are paying by cash, please have exact amount.

License fees: \$8 spayed/ neutered dog or cat: \$11 unspayed/un-neutered dog or in Jeopardy cat. ###

Cold Moon

The December full moon appears on Tuesday, December 13, 2016, at 7:05 p.m. and is called the "Full Cold Moon."

The midwinter full moon has a high trajectory across the sky because it is opposite a low sun. Other names for this moon include "Full Long Night Moon."

The Native American Indians of the northern and eastern United States kept track of the seasons by giving a name to each recurring full moon. European settlers followed the custom. ###

Keep Curbs Free From Leaves

Rake leaves off the top of the curb and fully into the street.

It is advised that providing a drainage space between the leaf pile and the curb will allow a better flow of rain water to storm drains. Keep raked leaves at least 10 feet from storm drains. ###

About Windchill Temperature

The windchill temperature is how cold people and animals feel when outside.

Windchill is based on the rate of heat loss from exposed skin caused by wind and cold.

As the wind increases, it draws heat from the body, driving down skin temperature and eventually the internal body temperature.

Therefore, the wind makes it FEEL much colder. If the temperature is 0 degrees Fahrenheit and the wind is blowing at 15 mph, the windchill is -19 degrees Fahrenheit.

At this windchill temperature, exposed skin can freeze in 30 minutes.

Be even more cautious with children, seniors and persons with compromised health.

The results of NOAA tests showed that relative humidity was an insignificant weather parameter, less than one degree

The only effect windchill has on inanimate objects, such as car radiators and water pipes, is to shorten the amount of time for the object to cool.

The inanimate object will not cool below the actual air temperature.

How is the windchill cal-

The windchill temperature is calculated using the following formula:

Windchill ($^{\circ}F$) = 35.74 $+ 0.6215T - 35.75(V^{0.16}) +$ 0.4275T(V^0.16)





Dealing with Dental Emergencies

Dental emergencies can happen at any time. You and your children risk breaking teeth or injuring your mouth while eating, playing, exercising, and participating in other seemingly harmless activities.

Oral injuries often are painful and should be treated by a dentist as soon as possible. Learn more about what to do in case of a dental emergency.

• What are dental emergencies and how can I help my children avoid them?

Dental emergencies occur when the tooth breaks, cracks, becomes loosened, or is knocked out completely. Emergencies also include crowns coming off teeth or injuries to mouth tissue. You can help your children avoid dental emergencies by taking simple precautions, including making sure they wear mouthguards during sports activities and avoid foods that could crack or break the teeth.

• What should I do if my child's tooth is knocked out?

Your child's tooth will have the best chance of surviving dental trauma if you see your dentist within one hour of any emergency—so call immediately for an appointment. Handle the tooth by the crown (the top), not by the root (the pointed part on the bottom); touching the root could damage cells that are necessary to reattach the tooth to the bone.

Gently rinse the tooth in water to remove dirt, but do not scrub it. Place the clean tooth in your child's mouth between the cheek and gum to keep it moist. It is important not to let the tooth dry out, so if your child can't keep it in his or her mouth, wrap it in a clean cloth or gauze and immerse it in milk or the child's own saliva until you get to your dentist's office.

If your child has a baby tooth knocked out, the tooth should not be replanted. However, your child should visit the dentist immediately to ensure no broken pieces of the tooth remain.

HOUSE CALLS

• What should I do if my child's tooth is pushed out of position?

Call your dentist right away for an emergency appointment. In the meantime, attempt to reposition your child's tooth to its normal alignment using light finger pressure—but don't force it.

• What should I do if my child's tooth is chipped or fractured?

There are different types of tooth fractures. Chipped teeth are minor fractures. Moderate fractures involve damage to the enamel, tissue, and/or pulp. A severely fractured tooth usually has been traumatized to the point that it cannot be recovered.

If your child fractures a tooth, rinse his or her mouth with warm water and use an ice pack or cold compress to reduce swelling.

Contact your dentist immediately. He or she can smooth minor tooth fractures with a sandpaper disc, but some fractures may require restorative procedures. If you can find the broken tooth fragment, bring it with you to the dentist.

• What should I do if tissue in my child's mouth is injured?

If your child experiences a tear, cut, puncture wound, or laceration on his or her cheek, lips, or tongue, immediately clean the wound with warm water. Bleeding from a tongue laceration can be reduced by pulling the tongue forward and using gauze to place pressure on the wound.

Visit an oral surgeon for emergency care as soon as possible, or go to the emergency room if you cannot see an oral surgeon right away.

About the Flu

How Flu Spreads

People with flu can spread it to others up to about 6 feet away. Most experts think that flu viruses are spread mainly by droplets made when people with flu cough, sneeze or talk.

These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby or possibly be inhaled into the lungs. Less often, a person might also get flu by touching a surface or object that has flu virus on it and then touching their own mouth or nose.

To avoid this, people should wash their hands often with soap and water. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand rub. Linens, eating utensils, and dishes belonging to those who are sick should not be shared without washing thoroughly first. Eating utensils can be washed either in a dishwasher or by hand with water and soap and do not need to be cleaned separately.

The Flu Is Contagious

Most healthy adults may be able to infect others beginning 1 day before symptoms develop and up to 5 to 7 days after becoming sick.

Children may pass the virus for longer than 7 days. Symptoms start 1 to 4 days after the virus enters the body.

That means that you may be able to pass on the flu to someone else before you know you are sick, as well as while you are sick. Some persons can be infected with the flu virus but have no symptoms. During this time, those persons may still spread the virus to others.

What Should I Do If I Get Sick?

If you get sick with flu-like symptoms, you should stay home and avoid contact with other people except to get medical care. Most people with the flu have mild illness and do not need medical care or antiviral drugs. However, some people are more likely to get flu complications and they should talk to a health care provider about whether they need to be examined if they get flu symptoms. Source: www.cdc.gov ###

- Also, give your home that lived-in look to repel potential burglars by having a friend collect your mail, setting lights on timers and not leaving details of your trip on the answering machine.
- Don't leave valuables in your car. Pack all items, especially brightly wrapped packages, in the trunk. If afraid of squashed bows, wait until you arrive to wrap the gifts.
- One tip for packing lighter is to ship your gifts to your destination ahead of time. Allow at least two to three weeks for your package to arrive, for the holidays are hectic times for courier services like UPS and Federal Express.

- Once on the road, drive carefully, patiently and stifle road rage. Indicate lane changes and give everyone plenty of room. Be forgiving when

someone drives recklessly.

- Don't text or use your cell phone when driving.
 - Obey speed limits.
 - Don't tailgate. Be patient.
- Stay alert and minimize distractions.
- Avoid sudden stops and starts. Slow down when driving on snowy or icy roads where stopping distances are much longer. Leave more distance between your vehicle and the one ahead.
- Overall, try to make driving fun, and view it as part of the holiday, not as a chore. If traveling with children, get everyone involved by singing or reminiscing about favorite past holidays. The ride will be over before you know it, and you'll actually look forward to the drive back home. ###

The Jerseymen at Gettysburg

Part 5 of 7

The 11th NJ Vol. Inf. was assigned to the 1st Brigade, 2nd Division, III Corps. The regiment was commanded by Col. Robert McAllister. They would incur the highest casualty rate of all New Jersey regiments at Gettysburg.

On July 2, the regiment was posted on the right flank of the III Corps, north of the Peach Orchard, facing west, along the Emmitsburg Road. At first, they were only bothered by occasional artillery fire. Col. McAllister ordered his men to lie down.

However, Confederate General Barkdale's Mississippi Brigade had slammed into the area around the Peach Orchard and broke the line there.

General Carr, commanding the 1st Brigade, ordered the 11th to swing to their left and anchor a new line facing south to meet this attack.

As they were facing south, they were now hit by Wilcox's Alabama Brigade on their right. Major Philip Kearny (nephew of General Kearny) remarked to the regimental adjutant, 1st Lieutenant John Schoonover, "I tell you we are going to have a fight." Just at the time, Major Kearny received a wound that would prove mortal.

Lt. Schoonover went to report to Col. McAllister that the Major was down, only to find that the Colonel was badly wounded.

Schoonover went to Captain Luther Martin and informed him he was now in command. Captain Martin was soon hit and died.

Captain Dorastus Logan took command. He was wounded. Captain Andrew Ackerman was next. But he was killed at the side of Schoonover.

The regiment had lost all these commanders in about ten to twelve minutes. Lt. Schoonover was now in command.

The regiments to their left had all drifted to the rear. They were now ordered to retreat back to Cemetery Ridge. Schoonover would lead them in an epic fighting withdrawal. Schoonover was struck by a piece of shell. The wound was slight and he stayed in command.

To steady the men, he ordered Color Corporal Thomas Johnson, the third color bearer, as two others had already had gone down, to plant The Colors twenty paces in front.

The regiment gave ground slowly, bleeding men as they went. Schoonover discovered that Johnson had not retreated with the regiment. Schoonover ran to Johnson and ordered him back.

About this time, Schoonover received a second wound. This forced him to go to the rear. As they were now leaderless, it appeared that the men would break and run.

However, Captain William Lloyd, bleeding from a wound, came up to lead the men back to Cemetery Ridge.

They were not finished yet. General Carr ordered a counterattack on the advancing Confederates.

This attack was successful and drove them back until darkness ended the fight. Captain Samuel Sleeper now took command. He was the sixth that day.

The 11th took 275 men into the fight. Their losses were severe. Their monument, on the battlefield lists the following: killed 31, wounded 109, missing 12, for a total of 152. Of the missing, six are supposed to have been killed. This would amount to about 55.6% casualties. The noted Gettysburg scholar and author, Harry W. Pfanz, wrote "They did New Jersey proud that day!" *Provided by Civil War Enthusiast Jim Halloran.* ###



Veterans Today

Off the coast of Brazil, Captain Henry Lambert of the British Navy was in command of HMS Java. His duty currently was to escort the new Governor of India to Bombay, Lt. Gen. Thomas Hislop, to his new station. Another ship with the Java was the William also on the way to Bombay with supplies and other officials.

This was December 29, 1812. America was at war with England at the time, certainly off the coast of Brazil, far from American waters, nothing could go wrong.

The early morning lull changed completely when the lookout cried out that there is a sail on the horizon. Lambert, an old salt, gave his orders. He sent the HMS William back into the port in Brazil and then ordered the crew to clear the deck. His crew scrambled to comply with his orders and the Java steered for the distant sail on the horizon.

Captain William Bainbridge took command of the USS Constitution. On December 13, 1812 the Constitution left Boston to hunt British ships.

His ship and the USS Hornet patrolled together till the Hornet was sent on a diplomatic mission on December 2. Alone now, the Constitution

continued her mission. On December 29, 1812, his crew was laying around on deck, bored no doubt with the endless hours at sea. This would change when the lookout cried out "Sail Ho."

Not knowing who the distant sail belonged to, Bainbridge ordered the crew to clear the deck. His crew, awake now, scrambled to their battle stations as the Marines climbed the rigging with their muskets.

The Constitution carried 30 cannons that could fire 24 pound cannon ball, 20 that could shoot 32 pounders and 2 that shot 24 pounders. One of America's newest frigates, she was state of the art in her day.

The Java was also heavily armed. She carried 28 cannons that can fire 18 pound cannon balls, 2 cannons could shoot 12 pounders and 18 cannons that could fire 32 pound cannon balls. She also had 1 cannon that shot 24 pound cannon balls, lighter that the Constitution the British frigate had the advantage of speed.

Bainbridge held his ship in a "stand to" position. It's a challenge to the other ship. He can see signal flags from the unknown ship sailing toward the Constitution. They were not American signals so he could not read them. The Java flew no national ensign from her mast. Bainbridge wanted to know who the ship belonged to.

He ordered signal flags flown to ask the ship to identify herself. Lambert could not read the American signal flags, so both ships remained a mystery to each other.

Captain William Bainbridge waited for the Java to get closer and with a quick order Old Glory rode to the top of the mizzen mast.

He ordered one cannon to shoot across the bow, an unmistakable message to the other vessel to identify themselves. It was followed by a full broadside from the Constitution.

Lambert could see the frigate challenging him. Once the single cannon fired then the full broadside he ordered the Union Jack up the mizzen mast and the cloak was removed.

Both vessels now could see that they were enemies and they sailed to one another for combat. Long range cannon duel soon erupted between the ships. Spirited and steady.

The Java's first broadside volley was effective and deadly. The Constitution's crew had many wounded and killed. As the ships drew closer, Bainbridge ordered grape used. Grape was small iron balls fired out of the cannons to tear up crew and sail alike.

They were within musket range and the Marines rained the Java with musket balls from the rigging.

The Java was faster and tried to cross in front of the Constitution so that it could fire down the length of the ship without the Constitution being able to return the fire.

Picture the letter T, the vertical line of the T being the Constitution and the horizontal line of the T the Java. This is the most advantageous of positions for sailing vessels to attack. Bainbridge knew this and steered the Constitution away from the Java to that the ships were parallel with one another.

This was not easy for the Constitution to do because the wheel for steering was shot off.

The two ships fired and volleyed in a whirlwind of black powder smoke, musket balls, grape and cannon balls. Splinters from the wood struck by these balls were like

shrapnel as men fell wounded or dead.

Lambert again tried to cross the T for advantage, but Bainbridge again steered the ship away again. Now both ships were sailing east. The Constitution came in close to the Java and brought down a heavy fire on the enemy ship.

The Java's bowsprit and jib-boom was ripped off. The Constitution managed to send a devastating volley into the stern of the Java.

The Java answered with her port cannons and the ships maneuvered for position. They came abreast of one another.

The Constitution poured grape into the Java and with the men in the rigging firing their muskets the British ship lost many men, especially on the forecastle.

Lambert could see his rigging was in tatters. The battle had cannon, grape, and musketry but now he wanted to bring the battle to the sword.

He ordered his men to prepare to board. He also tried to get his ship as close as he could to the Constitution to give his men a chance to cross over to the other ship.

His marines and sailors waited in the gangways and on the forecastle to receive the order to board the Constitution and fight it out hand to hand.

It was not to be though. The fire from the American ship was so heavy, that the main mast on the Java was cut and came crashing down along with the foremast. It also cut up his boarding party.

What was left of the Java's bowsprit got caught in the Constitutions mizzen mast. After a while it came free and the two ships separated with the remaining piece of the bowsprit passing over the Constitution's stern.

Maneuvering his ship again Bainbridge was able to fire a starboard side broadside into the Java then swing the ship about and fired the port side cannons into her.

The part of the main mast that fell on the Java now hung over her side. Now every time they fired the cannons on the starboard side of the Java, it set the rigging of this mast on fire.

The Java struggled to be

able to move with so much damage to her rigging. Captain Lambert was shot with a musket ball and command fell to his First Lieutenant Henry Chad. Lambert was carried below.

Bainbridge was also wounded twice but he refused to go below till the battle was decided. He received two wounds in the leg and would survive.

Lambert' chest wound would prove fatal. The Constitution pulled away to repair some damage to her rigging, but also Bainbridge believed the Java had struck her colors. The Java's flag had been torn down when the masts had been shot away.

First Lieutenant Henry Chad, now in command of the Java took stock in what was left. The ship could no longer maneuver. Most of the cannons could not be manned because most of the crew was wounded or dead.

She put out another flag showing that she was still in the fight, but when the Constitution approached and challenged again for battle. Chad, after a meeting with the officers that could still stand, decided to surrender. The HMS Java struck her colors. The battle was over.

The British lost 48 dead and 102 wounded.

The Constitution lost 12 men dead and 22 wounded.

The Java and her crew were captured. The men became prisoners of war but what of the Java? It would have been great to get her into a port and have her repaired and used in the American Navy but there was no way to move it.

Captain Bainbridge mulled it over and he decided that there was no saving it. So, to prevent it from falling into enemy hands again, on January 1, 1813 the Java was set on fire and sank. Captain Bainbridge, in his report, commended the Captain and crew of the gallant Java. Only surrendering when there was no other way to fight.

This was the last of the one on one frigate battles of the War.

The Constitution would fight another battle in the War of 1812. That one is against two ships at once. The British tried but they couldn't defeat her. She would survive the War and remain undefeated in combat.

Now, long past her prime she is a museum now. Hard to imagine what it must have been like in those old sea battles.

Known as Old Ironsides because cannon balls used to bounce off her oak sides, she remains the oldest ship in the U.S. Navy still in commission.

Kathy's presentation included viewing the DVD, "In the Footprints of Francis and the Sultan: A Model for Peacemaking." The presentation focused on the too-little known 13th century Middle East peace initiative that occurred between Francis of Assisi and Sultan Malek-al-Kamil.

This unlikely encounter between the mendicant friar of Assisi and the leader of the Muslim forces of the Levant contains a significant message. Their efforts on behalf of peace speak a wisdom of how to negotiate interreligious misunderstanding and hostility, and other difficult encounters between conflicting peoples.


