## Jersey Devil - Fact or Fiction?

Myths, legends, fables and folktales are stories passed from generation to generation. These stories of fantastic creatures or events, keep popping up despite the persistent absence of physical evidence. Here, in New Jersey, we have our official state demon by default, the Jersey Devil also known as the Leeds Devil.

The presentation was made by Rutgers American Studies professor Angus Kress Gillespie, on October 28, 2018, at the Arnault-Bianchi House in Wood-Ridge. Via a visual presentation, he discussed the Pine Barrens, also known as the Pinelands or, simply the Pines. It is a heavily forested area of coastal plain stretching across more than seven counties of New Jersey. In this area, the people are known as Pines. They live off the land; that is, they fish, hunt and cultivate



their food.

In this area, legend has it that in 1735, a woman known as Mother Leeds, was pregnant with her 13th child. Her husband was a good provider, however, he did not help her with their children. When she became pregnant with an unwanted 13th child she cursed the baby and wished it were

When she did give birth, the child was born healthy and normal, but quickly turned into a monster that killed the midwife and her attendants, then flew up the chimney into the forests of the Pine Barrens. There, he has lurked and terrorized the people ever since. It is said that many residents in that area know of one or more persons who have seen the demon.

Professor Gillespie has been given first-hand accounts by people who have said they've seen the demon, or, know someone who has. As a folklorist, he is unsure and unconvinced of the existence of the Jersey Devil.



Frustrated at the lack of interest in his new toy invention, Charles Pajeau hired several shorter people, dressed them in elf costumes, and had them play with "Tinker Toys" in a display window at a Chicago department store during the Christmas season in 1914. This publicity stunt made the construction toy an instant hit. A year later, over a million sets of Tinker Toys had been sold. ###

Historians have traced some of the current traditions surrounding Father Christmas, or Santa Claus, back to ancient Celtic roots. Father Christmas' elves are the modernization of the "Nature Folk" of the Pagan religions; his reindeer are associated with the "Horned God," which was one of the Pagan deities. ###

Christmas trees are known to have been popular in Germany as far back as the sixteenth century. In England, they became popular after Queen Victoria's husband, Albert, who came from Germany, made a tree part of the celebrations at Windsor Castle. In the United States, the earliest known mention of a Christmas tree is in the diary of a German who settled in Pennsylvania. ###

In 1647, the English Parliament passed a law that made Christmas illegal. Festivities were banned by Puritan leader, Oliver Cromwell, who considered feasting and revelry, on what was supposed to be a holy day, to be immoral. The ban was lifted only when the Puritans lost power in 1660. ###

During the ancient 12-day Christmas celebration, the log burned was called the "Yule Log." Sometimes a piece of the Yule Log would be kept to kindle the fire the following winter, to ensure that the good luck carried on from year to year. The Yule Log custom was handed down from the Druids. ###

Animal Crackers are not really crackers, but cookies that were imported to the United States from England in the late 1800s. Barnum's circuslike boxes were designed with a string handle so that they could be hung on a Christmas tree. ###

More than three billion Christmas cards are sent annually in the United States. ###



## Historically Speaking

#### **Desperate December**

The year 1776 was not a good year for George Washington and the Continental Army. While the year started off on a good note with the British evacuation of Boston, in March, and the Declaration of Independence on July 4th, events soon became one disaster after another. Defeats at Long Island, Kips Bay, White Plains, in New York State, and the long retreat from Fort Lee in New Jersey to Valley Forge, was affecting the Army's morale. It was in a low state.

Ninety percent of the Army had departed or deserted during the march between New York and Valley Forge. Conditions at Valley Forge were horrendous. Most of the rest would soon be leaving the Army with the end of their enlistments on December 31, 1776. Even Washington felt that the war was over. He wrote "I think the game is pretty near up" to his cousin in Virginia.

Washington felt that they must try one last time to gain a victory before the men's enlistments ended. He gambled on a plan to defeat and capture the Hessian garrison at Trenton, New Jersey.

The Hessians were feared German mercenaries employed in the service of the British Army. The garrison consisted of about 1,500 Hessians divided into three regiments. They had six artillery pieces. In overall command was Colonel Johann Rall. Hessian engineers presented plans to fortify Trenton. Rall, who had a low opinion of the Rebels, did not see a need to build any defenses. He was alleged to have said, "If they come, we will meet them with bayonets."

Washington's initial plan was to have 5,500 men cross the Delaware River at three places, on Christmas night, and launch a coordinated pre-dawn attack on Trenton. The weather would play havoc with his plans.

As Washington's men arrived at the river, it started to rain. The temperature began to drop. The rain turned to sleet and then to snow. Colonel John Glover's regiment of Gloucester fishermen handled the boats during the crossing. It was after three a.m. before Washington got his 2,400 men, horses and guns across the river. His other two forces could not affect a crossing of the river because of the weather. The password the troops would use was "Victory or Death."

The nine-mile march south, to Trenton, began around four

a.m. The weather would be a great hardship on Washington's troops. His ill clad troops suffered greatly. The only fatalities that the Americans had during the entire battle were two soldiers that died from hypothermia during the march.

The weather also worked to the advantage of the Americans. Colonel Rall had been warned that the Rebels may try an attack on his command, He felt that they would not attempt it in weather like this. His outposts were sheltered indoors by the fire.

Washington's troops arrived at eight a.m., about one mile from Trenton. The Americans hit two of the Hessian outposts. The Hessians fell back toward Trenton. The Americans pushed into the town. They arrived at the apex of King and Queen Streets, now Warren and Broad Streets. Here General Knox set up his artillery. The Hessian regiments were trying to form at the other end of King and Queen Streets.

Knox's artillery played havoc on the Hessians. American artillery was also fired from across the Delaware River into the Hessian positions. American riflemen took out the men attempting to man the Hessian artillery. They were hit on three sides and their retreat route to Princeton was cut by Washington's forces. The artillery was firing Grapeshot. A number of iron balls were expelled with each discharge, like a shotgun.

The Hessians fell back to a field outside of the town. Here they regrouped. Colonel Rall led a counterattack. Washington seeing the Hessians advancing, deployed his men to meet this. They were hit with a devastating crossfire. The attack stalled. Hessians broke ranks and began to scatter. Colonel Rall was mortally wounded. With the Americans closing in on them, the Hessians quickly surrendered.

American losses, aside from the two who died from hypothermia, were five wounded. Hessian losses were twenty-two dead and a total of eight hundred ninety-six captured. This included eighty-three wounded.

Washington's desperate December gamble saved the American Revolution. ###

#### Your Fire Chiefs Offer These Christmas Tree Safety Tips

- · Any string of lights with worn, frayed or broken cords or loose bulb connections should not be used. Connect no more than three strands of push-in bulbs and a maximum of 50 bulbs for screw-in bulbs. Never connect more than one extension cord together.
- Always unplug Christmas tree lights before leaving home or going to bed.
- Never use lit candles to decorate a tree, and make sure any lit candles in the room are placed away from tree branches.
- If using a live tree, be sure it is fresh (it isn't already loosing needles) and has a new, clean cut on the bottom of the trunk before putting up.
- Keep live trees away from heat sources. Hydrate your tree. Check the water level daily. Cut one inch off the trunk to help absorb water. Leave the tree outside until ready to decorate.
- If using an artificial tree, be sure its label reads "Fire Resistant." While this doesn't mean it can't catch fire, it does mean it should resist burning and should extinguish quickly.



## **Cancelled Stamps** Wanted

Fourteen years ago, in 2004, the Kiwanis Club of Hasbrouck Heights started a project collecting cancelled stamps. They came upon a letter from a Sister Ann Mary, a retired Carmelite Sister who was collecting stamps and selling them to dealers.

The money helped children at St. Benedict's Day Nursery and Infant Hospital of Georgetown, St. Vincent of the West Indies. She collected stamps until 2008. In 2008, the AARP Chapter 418 took this project as one of their own. Kiwanis Club has since disbanded.

In August of 2008, the AARP Chapter 418 found another organization that was collecting stamps. After a phone call to them (Ulseth Lodge Sons of Norway NLC) in Calumet, MI, they decided to send the cancelled stamps to them.


The Lodge collects and sends the stamps to a facility where they are sorted and packaged to sell to collectors and dealers. The proceeds are donated to the Norwegian Health System to aid physically and mentally challenged children and youth.

In June 2015, the AARP Chapter 418 disbanded. The Leisure Club of Hasbrouck Heights then took over the project. If you would like to help the Leisure Club of Hasbrouck Heights in collecting cancelled stamps, please trim the stamps to 1/4 inch around the stamps.

#### **Suggestions for** Safe Holiday Travel

- Before leaving, be sure to secure your house. Lock all doors and windows, and don't forget to set the alarm.

## About the Flu

#### **How Flu Spreads**

People with flu can spread it to others up to about 6 feet away. Most experts think that flu viruses are spread mainly by droplets made when people with flu cough, sneeze or talk.

These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby or possibly be inhaled into the lungs. Less often, a person might also get flu by touching a surface or object that has flu virus on it and then touching their own mouth or nose.

To avoid this, people should wash their hands often with soap and water. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand rub. Linens, eating utensils, and dishes belonging to those who are sick should not be shared without washing thoroughly first. Eating utensils can be washed either in a dishwasher or by hand with water and soap and do not need to be cleaned separately.

#### The Flu Is Contagious

Most healthy adults may

be able to infect others beginning 1 day before symptoms develop and up to 5 to 7 days after becoming sick.

Children may pass the virus for longer than 7 days. Symptoms start 1 to 4 days after the virus enters the body.

That means that you may be able to pass on the flu to someone else before you know you are sick, as well as while you are sick. Some persons can be infected with the flu virus but have no symptoms. During this time, those persons may still spread the virus to others.

#### What Should I Do If I Get Sick?

If you get sick with flu-like symptoms, you should stay home and avoid contact with other people except to get medical care. Most people with the flu have mild illness and do not need medical care or antiviral drugs. However, some people are more likely to get flu complications and they should talk to a health care provider about whether they need to be examined if they get flu symptoms. Source: www.cdc.gov ###

## Veterans Today By Thomas Marshall

Army Staff Sgt. Karl R. Loesche, of Monroeville, New Jersey was stationed in the Philippines before World War

He was assigned to the 3rd Pursuit Squadron, 24th Pursuit Group when the Japanese attacked the Philippine islands. Intense fighting continued until the surrender of Bataan on April 9, 1942.

Filipino service members were taken prisoner and many had to endure the horrors of the Bataan Death March as they marched to the POW camp in Cabanatuan on the Island of Luzon. Loesche was among these prisoners. More than 2,500 men would perish in this camp during the war. Based on the records kept in the camp, Staff Sgt. Loesche died on November 16, 1942. He was buried with the others that died at the camp Cemetery.

After the war, the remains at the camp cemetery were exhumed and the Graves Reg-

istration Service began the difficult task of trying to identify all the remains. There was no DNA data bank at the time and most uniform markings and dog tags were missing. Analyzing the skeletons and taking notes was about all that could be done to help identify the dead. With no other course to take, many of them were given numbers and buried as Thousands of U.S. and unknown in the American Cemetery in Manila. One set of remains was given the number

> Years later, in 2016 based on the historical and scientific analysis, X-882 was disinterred from the Manila American Cemetery and sent to the lab in Hawaii. On September 13, 2018, using anthropological analysis and mitochondrial DNA, they were able to determine that X-882 was Staff Sgt. Karl R. Loesche. Loesche was only 22 years old at the time of his death. He will be buried in Elmer, New Jersey. ###

# **Senior Snow Shoveling Safety**

gests that seniors (over the age of 50) should take special precautions to avoid snow shoveling hazards.

Snow shoveling is one of the most dangerous activities senior citizens can attempt. With back injuries, shoulder dislocation and heart attacks -- on average 1,200 people a year die as a result of shoveling snow.

Shoveling snow is physical activity and comparable to lifting weights fast and with many repetitions.

As with any exercise, begin with a 5-10 minute warm-up. Try walking or marching in place as a way of using slow, gentle exercise to increase blood flow and flexibility to the muscles and joints that will be used.

It will increase the heart rate slowly and avoid the equivalent strain of going from standing still to a full out run.

Add arm movements and stretches for back, chest and shoulder muscles to help warm up the upper body and avoid muscle tears or dislocation.

• Dress right. Wear layers. Cover your head, face and hands when outside for prolonged periods of time.

If you become overheated, take a break from shoveling.

- Use waterproof boots to protect your feet from the cold as well as keep them dry. Wear non-skid boots to guard against falls on slick snow or hidden ice.
- Depending on how wet the snow is, a shovel full of snow can weigh up to 15 pounds! A smaller shovel means lighter

- Stay hydrated. Keep a water bottle handy and take a few sips after every 15 minutes.
- Shovel every time the snow fall is about 2 inches. This makes shoveling more manageable.
- Go inside after 20-30 minutes and start again. This will be the same as a 30 minute vigorous workout.
- Lift with the legs, not the back. Be sure knees are bending and straightening to lift the shovel instead of leaning forward and straightening back up with the back.
- Push the snow. It's easier than lifting and throwing the

- · Avoid caffeine and nicotine. Caffeine and nicotine act as stimulants by increasing the heart rate and constricting blood vessels, which puts more strain on the heart.
- Never shovel alone. Let someone know that you will be shoveling. If you get into trouble, someone can call for

## Real Estate Insight

By Mary Ellen Courtney



#### What's the Outlook for Real Estate in 2019?

We're now into the final weeks of 2018, which means a lot of home buyers are starting to look ahead to next year. And many of them share the same questions: What will the real estate market be like in 2019? Will home prices keep rising, level off, or drop next year? Will it be a buyers' market or continue as a sellers' market in 2019?

Tight supply and strong demand have boosted home prices here in Bergen Country and in housing markets across the country. Mortgage rates rose steadily during the first part of 2018 and then leveled off during the early summer.

We're now in the waning days of 2018. What's over the horizon? While no one can predict future housing conditions with complete accuracy, we can make a few educated guesses based on local and national data. Here's a couple for you to mull over.

• Home Prices Will Continue to Rise.

Given the current supplyand-demand situation, it appears likely that home prices in most US cities will continue to rise throughout 2019. This is not news to us realtors; it's

more the continuation of an ongoing trend than a new development. The economists at Zillow say that the median home value for the state of New Jersey rose to around \$313,000 as of June, 2018. That marked an increase of 9.2% from the same month a year earlier.

Looking forward, Zillow's economists forecast that New Jersey's median home value will rise to around 7.6% over the next 12 months. Their prediction was actually offered in June 2018, so it extends into early summer of 2019. Their outlook for our state is slightly higher than the national forecast, suggesting that New Jersey can expect some healthy home-price gains over the coming months.

• The Market Will Still Favor Sellers Over Buyers.

Inventory shortages affected many housing markets in New Jersey and across the country during 2017 and 2018. And this will likely continue, to some extent, in 2019 as well. Limited supply is the key reason for the last mentioned prediction: an imbalanced supply-and-demand picture will continue to put pressure on home prices in 2019.

As of Spring 2018, housing markets across New Jersey varied quite a bit in terms of supply-and-demand situations. Some cities and towns were fairly balanced, with enough inventory to satisfy demand. Other markets – particularly those we've experienced in our Bergen County towns - were

much more constrained.

 Mortgage Rates Could Surpass 5% for a 30-year Loan.

Simply put, mortgage rates are higher than they were at the start of this year and experts are predicting they'll climb even higher by the end of 2018.

Retrospectively, the average rate for a 30-year fixed mortgage hovered below 4% for much of 2017. Then, at the start of 2018, it began a steady upward climb that lasted for 3 months. By July, 2018 the average 30-year mortgage rate was 4.52%. That was an increase of 57 basis points (0.57%) from the first week of January.

In June 2018, the Mortgage Brokers Association (MBA) updated its long-range forecast. They predicted that average 30-year mortgage rates would rise to 4.9% by the fourth quarter of 2018. Well, as of this date in mid-November, it's already fluctuating around 4.85%. MBA and other forecasters predict it will continue to inch upward in 2019 as well.

What might the real estate market do in 2019? Well, assuming that rate hikes actually happen, we could see a decline in home purchases in the months ahead. But we don't expect it to have a major impact on home sales.

Let's look on the bright side: the economy is strong, employment is high and there's still steady demand for homes here in our local towns as well as in most housing markets across the country. Any modest rise in mortgage rates when/if it comes – isn't likely to do much to dampen it.


















## **CFD Responds to AC Fire**
