## **About Valentine's Day Cards**

While the precise origins and history of Valentine's Day are clouded by legend and lore, the custom of sending valentines is documented and provides a nostalgic look at this popular culture.

Legend purports St. Valentine himself actually sent the first valentine greeting. While in prison, he allegedly fell in love with his jailor's daughter. According to the story, before his death, he wrote her a letter signed, "From your Valentine." This message is still used on modern-day cards.

The oldest known precursor to today's valentines is still in existence today. It was a decorated love letter penned by Charles, Duke of Orleans. It was a romantic missive to his wife when he was imprisoned in the Tower of London during the Middle Ages. It is displayed in the British Museum.

After the Duke of Orleans began the tradition, Valentine's Day card sending took some time to catch on. The occasion began to be celebrated by the masses in earnest in seventeenth century Great Britain. Englishman Samuel Pepys sent the next recorded valentine in 1667. It was made of blue paper, featured a romantic verse and his wife's name in gilded letters.

"By the mid-1600's, people of all social classes were exchanging small tokens of affection on February 14th, like lockets of hair and handwritten love letters."

By the end of the seventeenth century, thanks to improved printing technology, printed cards began to replace written letters.

Most experts believe Americans began exchanging hand-made valentines in the early 1700's. Early American designs were simple, usually highlighted by fine pen and ink workmanship.

The first commercial valentines were printed from copper plates in Europe in the 1800's.

In 1840, mechanical valentines became the rage. By pulling a tab, a figure or object on the card could be moved. Some of these cards had threedimensional pop-out designs.

Esther Howland of Worcester, Mass., was the first American publisher of valentines. In 1849, Howland's elaborate hand-made cards ranged in price from \$5 to \$10, with a few selling for as much as \$35. American Greetings produced its first valentines in the 1930's. Depression Era cards expressed hope that better times were ahead. During World War II, many Valentine's Day cards depicted Uncle Sam and other patriotic motifs. ###

"I definitely support the renovation of Depken Field, and I prefer the turf over grass any day," Joe Colangelo, English teacher. football and baseball coach, said.

"Since Heights is a traditional town, it needs a big upgrade on the sporting field. I really like the plans for the field, the cosmetics and the track. Hopefully, it will not have all the bumps and dents from football and baseball," Colangelo said.

During this current renovation of the field, the company who wins the rights to construct will install turf throughout the whole field, including the football practice field.

"I am excited they are renovating the field because it benefits all sports-- football, baseball, softball, track and field and events such as the Fourth of July fireworks," DS, junior football and baseball player, said. "It will be a lot better for us because it saves money on fixing the field every time because during football, we tear up the field."

The current track will be upgraded as well to an allweather track made of rubber.

be allowed because they will destroy the field surface. The track will have eight lanes in the straightaway and six lanes around the rest of the track.

For baseball season, there will be a strip of turf to cover the track in the outfield from the foul line to centerfield. The field on either sides of the track in the outfield will be flat and at the same level so a baseball will have a true roll instead of an interrupted roll with bumps and holes.

"I can't wait until I'm a senior to play baseball on the new field. The outfield now will be just as good as it was during the football season. In the past it never recovered from the torture it gets from football," JS, junior baseball player, said. "It will be a different type of baseball game for us because the game will move faster. I will like having turf because it will definitely save us from more injuries."

The fans will also benefit from the renovations with the addition of new bleachers.

"New bleachers are necessary. The old ones now are really dangerous, and I don't like the concrete. It is falling apart. Even the black hole will improve with the new bleachers and field," MM, sophomore, said.

When the renovations are done, Depken Field will be handicapped accessible, and all the fans will sit on one side of the field instead of the current arrangement of home side and visitor's side.

# **Teterboro Airport Runway**

Before there is a chill in the air, the Teterboro Airport Maintenance Department is thinking about winter snow and ice removal.

The snow-removal crew at Teterboro Airport provides safe runways with few interruptions of service by maintaining high standards when it comes to snow and ice management.

Their top priority is to provide safe runways, taxiways and emergency vehicle access.

Since the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey (PA) assumed Teterboro Airport operations in 2000, closures due to winter-related storms have been minimal.

According to Ronald Petrella, AvPorts Airport Maintenance Manager, "This is a testament to the work ethic and teamwork of the snow removal crew, which includes field maintenance personnel operations staff as well as Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) tower personnel."

#### Planning

A snow event is like a military operation. Success depends upon planning.

The primary objective of the plan is to maintain maximum safety at all times on runways, taxiways and other areas of the airport.

Before developing its annual snow plan, the Port Authority Teterboro Airport Maintenance Department critiques the previous season's winter operations, reviews its procedures and prepares for harsh weather.

During the month of September, airport crews order snow-removal equipment parts, broom bristles and plow blades, and they begin to formulate a revised annual winter-operations plan.

Maintenance of snow-removal equipment begins in earnest the third week in September as every vehicle is given a bumper-to-bumper inspection and preventive maintenance. The snow equipment must be operational by October 15th.

The FAA approves the Teterboro Airport Snow & Ice Control Plan -- which is part of the Airport's Annual Certification Inspection and is updated by October 15th. The Airport Manager holds the master plan.

The plan outlines staff responsibilities, snow removal priority listings, runway de-icing procedures, inspection and reporting techniques, communications techniques and equipment inventory.

This plan is also presented to the FBO's & tenants during the Airport Manager's winter operations meeting held in October.

Areas of responsibility: AvPorts airfield operation areas -- runways & taxiways; FBO's & tenants - de-icing aircraft, snow removal for areas within their leasehold; the Port Authority oversees all activities. The Port Authority uses outside contractors for non-aviation areas such as Lindbergh Drive, Fred Wehran Drive, etc.

#### Information

The airport maintains 24hour contacts with several weather services, in addition to its satellite feed of weather updates.

The airport utilizes state-ofthe-art sensors on the runway which provide real time conditions for both runways.

Runways are zoned into touch-down, mid-point and rollout areas. Embedded runway sensors relay conditions and surface temperature to a constantly monitored computer at AvPorts (airport operations.)

In addition, Teterboro Airport uses continuous friction measuring equipment (CFME) and decelerometers to conduct runway friction surveys.

The airport uses two FAA approved Saab testers (CFME)

to perform

these fric-

tion readings.

These special

vehicles have

a 5th wheel sensitive enough to measure painted runway stripes. It is programmed for each runway, measures continuously in a straight line and produces an EKG-type printout for each pass, with the average friction value for each zone being reported to ATCT (air traffic control tower) if under a predetermined reading.

Runway friction surveys are conducted the entire length of the runway, in the same direction as landing aircraft and about 10' off the painted center runway line.

These vehicles report friction values rather than braking actions. There is no correlation between the two and they are not interchangeable.

A friction survey is conducted for the entire length of the runway to determine the average friction value for each zone.

Friction tests are done anytime conditions of the pavement change -- as in the snow removal and de-icing. The friction value determines the frequency of snow removal and treatment.

Also, friction testing is done

How the SARSYS **Friction Tester Works:** The measuring system consists of a measuring wheel which is mechanically geared to one of the rear main wheels of the base car. The gear ratio is such that when moving along the runway the measuring wheel cannot follow the runway surface freely but rolls with a certain, fixed slip ratio. The friction against the runway surface, in combination with the vertical load on the measuring wheel, creates forces on the measuring wheel mechanism and these forces are continuosly measured by the electronic sensor system.



# **Snow and Ice Management**

when pilots report a braking action of "fair."

The presence of snow & ice runway conditions and time of test is reported for the airport through NOTAM (notice to airman) which alerts the aviation community.

A typical report would be as follows: "Friction for Runway 6R, 27, 25, 29 (each zone), compacted snow with patchy ice at zero nine three zero (time)."

During a winter snow/ice event, the airport focuses on communication.

When the snow-removal crew is in action, the FAA tower communicates directly with the operations snow-removal leader on the airport's private radio channel.

By making communications one-on-one: FAA to operations leader, ensures accurate communications so runways can be cleared safely and swiftly.

#### **Snow Removal**

At Teterboro Airport, the access and fire department roads, in conjunction with the runways, receive first priority for snow removal, followed by

appropriate taxiways and holding aprons.

Teterboro Airport has two active runways 6-24 (6,000 feet) and 1-19 (7,000 feet), with seven ramps and 4.2 miles of taxiways.

Generally, the two runways allow crews to close a runway without having too much crossing traffic.

This lets crews concentrate on the runway at hand with minimal interruptions.

During a snow event, Runway 6 becomes the primary runway and used for landings because of the ILS (instrument landing system) and Newark Airport's traffic patterns.

It takes 45 minutes to clear a runway and corresponding ramps.

A runway can't have over 1/2" of snow or it is closed.

Brooms with blowers are used only if there is less than 1/2" of dry snow or a dusting.

Four giant plows (24' and 28'), working in formation, handle the runway and smaller plows clear taxiways -- with both activities happening at the same time.

Plows have special poly blades that remove snow only, not ice, with the main concern to protect runway lights.

Teterboro's arsenal includes three snow blowers to remove snow when it is over two feet.

Teterboro maintenance crews also remove snow from the ILS antenna sites and the arrestor beds.

If needed, sand, liquid deicer or sodium acetate is applied before the runway is reopened.

This entire process, which starts on the runways and works its way in to the taxiways and, ultimately, the FBO gates, gives the pilots the safest conditions possible on the ground.

#### **Ice Treatment**

Constant communications with the weather service allows the airport snow-removal crew to be prepared if and when an ice storm hits.

When a severe ice storm is predicted for the New York area. that is a signal to prepare Teterboro's two de-icing trucks.

One 4,000 gallon truck has a 75' boom for runways and a second 1,500 gallon truck sprays the taxiways.

They spray liquid potassium acetate on runways and taxiwavs.

This is done when the sensors indicate the runway surface temperature has reached 35°F or colder.

The liquid potassium acetate is a protective coating for the runway and prevents ice and snow from bonding to the surface.

It is a process that crews must repeat throughout the day if it is raining and freezing rain is still in the forecast.

Preventive measures with freezing rain and ice are imperative, because ice is a bigger threat to an airport than any snowfall.

After the snow and ice are treated, the friction vehicles again test the runways and advise the tower who announces the current friction value.

It is up to each pilot to decide whether this value is sufficient for landing and take off.

#### Environment

The Port Authority uses only the safest available non-

corrosive materials regulated by the FAA.

Rock salt is not used as it is corrosive. Regular sand is not used. A special aviation grade sand is used.

When the snow and ice melt, the water goes into the soil, the overflow goes into the storm water system, then into the soon to be completed \$6 million Teterboro Pump Station (paid for by Port Authority).

#### **Resources**

Mr. Petrella emphasized, "Our most important resource is our knowledgeable, experienced, hard-working eight man crew.

When a snow event is imminent, our crew is pre-positioned on-site or at local hotels.

It's 'all hands on deck,' with everyone working 12-hour shifts until the snow/ice event is over.

#### Awards

Teterboro Airport earned the Balchen/Post Award for Excellence in the Performance of Airport Snow and Ice Control in 1996. ###

When I go home, I'm too tired. Any suggestions would be great.

Dear Mirna,

Thank you for writing! I am glad you shared your concerns about fitting in some exercise during your day. I'm sure you are not the only one out there with time factors. I can suggest to you the following:

Perhaps you can take that 10 minute "coffee" break and put some steps into your day.

Stair climbing is an excellent cardiovascular exercise. You can use the stairs instead of the elevator.

Park away from your office so you must walk to the building. Try a stroll around the parking lot for 10 minutes. Do this 2 times/day and you have your 20 minutes! This can help rejuvenate those muscles yearning for movement.

Or at lunch, eat a lite meal and perhaps walk then. Even if you do this 3 out of the 5 days a week, you will feel much better. Start with a couple of days a week as a commitment to yourself and see how it goes.

In your office chair, you

can try to de-stress by doing

the following flexiblility exercises.

a. Slowly roll your head around, breathing easily.

b. Shrug and roll your shoulders forward, then backwards.

c. Extend your arms shoulder height and circle them forward and backwards.

d. Sit tall and squeeze abdominal muscles and then release.

e. Sit and extend your legs at the knees lifting them up and down.

f. Like a rag-doll, roll your chin towards your chest and stretch your arms downward towards floor and feet. Hold stretch. Slowly roll back up with a curved back till you are sitting straight and tall again.

g. Remember to breathe and relax thru these easy chair exercises.

h. Don't forget to consult your doctor before starting any exercise program.

During the 2007 Reorganization Meeting on January 1, 2007, Angelo Roccamo was sworn in as the new Fire Chief of the Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department for the first year of his two-year term. The Fire Department also serves the Borough of Teterboro.

Chief Roccamo will oversee a volunteer department of 54 men and women who operate two engine companies, ladder company, rescue company and ambulance squad.

In 2006, the Department responded to 575 fire and emergency calls and 1,350 ambulance calls.

During a fire emergency, the Fire Department performs

many activities simultaneously under the Fire Chief's command - equipment is deployed, rescue teams search the home/business, hoses are connected, activated and brought in to attack the fire from the inside, ladder companies vent as needed, and search for victims and fire. ###

## **Meet The New Fire Chief**

An interview with Chief Angelo Roccamo by Justin Watrel

On January 1, 2007, the Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department swore in its 57th Fire Chief, Angelo Roccamo, a 25year veteran of the Department, who previously served as First Assistant Chief.

Chief Roccamo is the son of Joseph and Theresa Roccamo of Hasbrouck Heights, who have lived in town for over 40 years.

Originally born in South Philadelphia, home of his father, Chief Roccamo moved to New Jersey to be closer to his mother's relatives.

"My mother is from Italy and as her family moved to the States they settled in the New York area, so we moved from Philly to be closer to her family. We found a two-family house in Hasbrouck Heights that my parents liked. My brother, Peter, and I moved in when I was in the Third Grade." old. We had a plumber come to the house to do some work and he started a fire on the roof. We had to get out of the house fast. I got all excited when the fire truck pulled up to the house. I don't know what made my mother more upset, the fact that we had a fire at the house or the fact that I got excited that there was a fire truck outside our house."

"When I got older I wanted to become a cop, but my mom was dead set against it. I wanted a job where I could get involved in the community, so at 21, I became a firefighter," Chief Roccamo explained.

"It was the same with my job as well. I started off in the printing business and really wasn't happy with what I was doing. I took a job with the Hasbrouck Heights DPW and I enjoyed it much more. I wanted something where I could meet the community I and Captain of the Hook & Ladder, Department Treasurer, Fire Inspector and Second Assistant Chief, First Assistant Chief and now Chief of the Department.

When asked what the most challenging part of his current job is, Chief Roccamo remarked, "Keeping up with the paperwork. People don't know how much we have in the Department. Also, there are many phone calls and involved meetings that we have to attend. We have a budget and have to figure out how best to use our resources and see what equipment is needed. We have to determine what is the most important thing for the Department. The most important thing I feel is making sure that all members are safe. When we go out on a call, I want to be sure that everyone comes back from that call safely."

Some of the goals the new Chief has for the Department are keeping morale up and unifying the Department.

"The community has to understand that this is a volunteer department. The economy has done a number on all volunteer departments. People are working two jobs and don't have the time to volunteer like they used to. The time factor is something people can't fit into their lives. Our members have to be available 24/7 and during all holidays. We have to stop what we're doing in our lives and help members of our community and the surrounding towns as well."

"The Department faces the challenge of retaining members and recruiting new ones.

"It's rough when everyone has to stop what they are doing and make the call. The problem with manpower is becoming a challenge that we are facing in the future.

the financial burden. It's rough all the way around.

"In the end though, I know the community cares about us and we are very grateful to them for their continuing support.

"It's not my Department, it's our Department. In the generation before I got on, the Fire Department had a full roster and people had to wait to get on the Department.

"Today we are trying to work with the youth squads and getting more teenagers involved in our Juniors Program (*See* **The Gazette**, *October* 2006). This way they get more hands-on training to see if they really want to pursue firefighting as a career."

Some of the memorable things that the Chief remembers from his own experiences with the Department are answering past ambulance calls.

"It really is self-satisfying when you save another person's life. I have had several saves throughout my career and that is a good feeling. You get someone's heart working again and it is the greatest feeling you can have.

"On fire calls it's putting that fire out. You really have to sneak around and find the fire before it finds you first."

When asked about his own experiences on 9/11 and his contributions on that tragic day, the Chief explained, "I was home that day. When I saw what was going on in New York, we stood by at the firehouse.

"Our ambulance was called first and went to the staging area in Jersey City to await victims. We sent our engine (615) next and we got as far as the GWB and then awaited instructions.

"Myself, now ex-Chief Joe Taylor and firefighters Pat Hayes and Bob Pietz (*See* **The Gazette**, *September* 2006) were sent to Overpeck Park, where we stood by in our bunker gear for six hours awaiting instructions. We were released later that day. "Later, several members of the Department went over to help with the recovery."

"I, myself, didn't go over. I was still so angry that something like this happened in the USA. I knew that they had enough help. I just didn't want to see what I saw on TV."

In February 2005, during the time that he was First Assistant Chief, Angelo was in command of the aircraft incident at the Strawbwerry clothing warehouse in Teterboro.

"Looking toward the future for my next two years as Chief, I want to continue improving the morale in the Department and working with the members.

"I want to get younger people in the community involved with our Juniors program and train the next generation of firefighters.

"There is no better feeling than knowing that you saved someone's life or prevented a fire from getting out of control and saving people's property. You've then done something not everyone can do.

"I also want to work with the town in finding ways for us to be more efficient in the Department; also, looking into new equipment to better serve the community."

The Chief stated, "We want to utilize our members the best way possible and have the equipment to back that up.

"Our goal at the Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department is to protect and serve our community the best way we know how and keep everyone safe.

"I'll try to be at as many meetings as I can and get to know as many members of the community as possible.

"Lastly, we want to thank everyone in the community for their constant support. Everything they do for us is greatly appreciated."

Best of luck to Chief Roccamo in his next two years as Chief and the best of luck to First Assistant Chief Michael Ratkowski and to Second Assistant Chief Kevin Todd. ###

Chief Roccamo attended Lincoln School, Franklin School and is a Hasbrouck Heights High School Alumnus '77. He is the father of Angelo Jr. and Alyssa and stepfather to Matthew and Miranda.

"My wife Renee and I met at the Meadowlands Sports Complex years ago and we just hit it off. We've been lucky that our kids are similar in ages, so we have a really nice blended family."

When asked how he became interested in the fire service, Chief Roccamo told this story: "I was about five years was serving."

He now works as a machine operator for our town's DPW.

"What I like about the jobs I hold in town is that I can get out and meet members of our community. I like the fact that I can be there when I am needed and feel that I am making a contribution to the town. I've met many longtime members of the community, who in all my years living here, I had never met before."

In the time that Chief Roccamo has served in the Fire Department, he has held many positions.

He has been Lieutenant and Mechanic of the Ambulance, Mechanic, Lieutenant "Sometimes I don't think people have a clue what goes into being a firefighter. We have schooling, intense training and drills to keep up all our members with new developments that are happening in the industry.

"Our job is to look out for everyone. We encourage our members to take as many classes as they can. The day you stop learning is the day you should not be a firefighter. There is always more to learn."
