GPS Thefts on the Rise

South Bergen Police Departments have formed a regional task force to address the rise in GPS thefts from automobiles.

With GPS devices costing \$100 to over \$1,000, they are now the number one item being stolen from motor vehicles. They are easy to steal and easy to sell on the street or the Internet.

Authorities suggest that GPS thefts are so lucrative that victims often say thieves ignore other valuable items in their cars.

Stolen GPS devices cannot be tracked from a central point. Although they are in constant communication with an array of satellites, they are only receivers. They are rarely recovered (or covered by an insurance deductible).

Wood-Ridge Police Chief Joseph Rutigliano states that although the general strategy and specific tactics of this South Bergen County Police Department Task Force are not available to the public at

this time, but he assures area residents they are aggressively dealing with this matter.

Chief Michael J. Colaneri offers these tips to avoid GPS thefts:

 Removing the GPS from the mount and hiding it is not enough. Crooks have learned that a suction-cup windshield mount usually means an expensive GPS is hidden somewhere in the car. Take down the suction cup mount from the windshield or dash and wipe off the tell-tale smudge with a moist towelette.

Law enforcement officials warn that although you may take the GPS unit with you, leaving a suction cup holder or the smudge on the window is inviting thieves who may break into your car assuming a GPS has been hidden somewhere in the car. Unless the mark is wiped away, a thief is going to bet there is a GPS unit in the car.

• Consider using a friction mount that rests on the dashboard and doesn't leave any revealing ring on the windshield.

• Write down the GPS serial number and register the unit. Etch a marking into the device.

• Use the GPS lock/password feature.

• Don't use your home address as your starting point -use another reference such your nearest street corner or even the police department. If your GPS is stolen, thieves will not know your home address.

Moonachie Police Chief Michael J. McGahn requests the public's help in minimizing these thefts by becoming aware of this problem and using common sense. He urges residents to keep valuables well hidden when leaving their cars in lots and garages, and locking the car.

If you see someone looking suspicious or stealing electronics from your car, do not confront these thieves because they may be dangerous. Report thefts quickly and have the GPS serial number ready. ###

Party Time

It was cold. It was raining. It was 11:30 p.m. on January 18th when most firefighters were under their warm bed covers when the tones were sounded for a fire alarm at Party Rentals on North Street in Teterboro.

Hasbrouck Heights Second Assistant Chief Richard Giarratana was first on the smoky scene and immediately called for a second and third alarm.

Departments responding were: Hackensack, Hasbrouck Heights, Little Ferry, Lodi, Moonachie, Wallington and Wood-Ridge.

After investigating using thermal imaging cameras, the source was determined to be a large "paint room/storage area" in the rear of the building (*near Rt.* 80).

Sprinklers kept the fire isolated to the paint room, but the fire continued to burn inside the racks.

Heights Engine 2, stationed at the rear door, dropped line and connected to a hydrant. A Wood-Ridge Engine connected to another hydrant to support the sprinkler system.

Heights Ladder and Moonachie Tower 805 companies ascended to the roof for venting from the parking lot; Hackensack Ladder from Route 80.

Using six saws and expending nine blades, they cut through three layers of foam and double-tiered steel roof to vent at strategic locations. Lodi Truck Company was on standby at the scene, but their firefighters worked the scene.

Using ladders, the Little Ferry and Wood-Ridge Fire Departments struggled to break through plexiglas windows at the rear of the structure.

Working under air, teams of firefighters used saws to cut through several secured steel doors.

The warehouse bay doors were also opened to help clear the heavy "paint laden" smoke.

Moonachie provided the F.A.S.T. Team. Hackensack Fire Department also responded with their Mass Service Unit (used to refill the firefighters' air tanks).

Because of the paint and other chemicals, Bergen County HAZMAT was on the scene to monitor the water run-off. (*They will also follow up to insure proper clean up.*)



The Command Post was the Heights Rescue Truck located in the parking lot and manned by Heights Fire Chief Michael Ratkowski and South Bergen Zone 2 Coordinator Tony Gentile.

HHFD Chief Ratkowski stated, "The sprinkler system contained the fire enough for the firefighters to extinguish. Without working sprinklers, and quick response by the Department, the building would have had considerable damage."

On standby at Hasbrouck Heights Fire Headquarters were Carlstadt, Maywood and Lyndhurst Fire Departments. The call was ended at 3:00

a.m. and the HHFD returned

to Headquarters. No injuries were reported. As with all commercial fires, it is under investigation. ###

Understanding and Controlling Your Finances: Life Insurance

What is Life Insurance?

Life insurance is a form of insurance that pays a beneficiary in the event of someone's demise. You purchase a specific death benefit when you purchase the policy. You might buy a \$100,000 life insurance policy, for example. You then assign that \$100,000 benefit to a specific beneficiary, like your spouse. Should you die during the term of the insurance, then your spouse will receive \$100,000. It is as simple as that.

Types of Life Insurance

There are two types of life insurance: 1) Term life insurance, and 2) everything else. Term life insurance is pure, unadulterated life insurance. "Everything else" is term life insurance bonded to some sort of savings component. It is called various things by various companies: "whole life," "universal life," and so on.

Let's say that you would like to buy \$100,000 worth of life insurance. If you bought that as a term policy, you might pay \$15 per month. If you bought it as whole life, you might pay \$100 per month.

Depending on the company selling the policy, you will then be assured that the difference (\$85 per month) will act as an investment that will "pay off the life insurance" and/or pay you a cash value at age 65.

The problem with everything besides term insurance is that the savings part is inefficient. Also, it is only as secure as the company issuing the policy. You would be much better off simply depositing the \$85 in a stock mutual fund each month. You would, over time, make much more money that way.

There is now also a growing "mini-life" industry. This industry tries to attach special purpose life insurance policies to car loans, mortgages, etc. These too are totally inefficient. If you feel that insurance to cover your mortgage is important, then comparison shop a normal term policy of the same value against the policy being offered by the mortgage company. You will be amazed at the price difference. Never buy mini-life policies until you comparison shop.

exactly, would be the beneficiary? There is no one in your life who is dependent on your income. The only reason you might buy life insurance is the same reason you would buy a lottery ticket - you might win. You might, after all, die young. And if you had a life insurance policy and you did die young you could make someone very happy.

Or you might buy a small policy to pay your funeral expenses at death. In that case \$10,000 is all that you would need, and that would be one nice funeral. There are probably better things to do with your money while you are alive.

Let's say that you are a single man or woman living alone in a house with a \$100,000 mortgage. Do you need life insurance? Maybe. The reason you might buy life insurance is to save your parents (or whomever else you have willed the house to) the problem of disposing of your estate. For example, imagine that you die. Your parents (or whomever) inherit the house. Now they want to dispose of the house, but it sits on the market for two years before selling. During that time they are having to pay the mortgage payments, and that might be a hardship. Therefore you might buy a policy to cover the expected payments over (for example) two years, or the entire mortgage.

Let's say that you are a married man or woman living alone in an apartment or a house. Do you need life insurance? If your spouse does not work and you want to provide for your spouse should you die, then yes. If your spouse does work but could

Reception Tips to Hear Wood-Ridge Radio

Wood-Ridge Radio, 1580AM is a low-power radio station that cannot go over a power level of one tenth of a watt. Reception may be difficult in some areas. An auto search on your radio may not find this signal. The following reception tips may assist you.

• Listen on different radios. Radio sensitivity varies greatly amongst manufacturers.

• An external antenna will usually give good results.

• AM radio reception can often be improved by re-positioning your radio.

• Try moving your radio around the phone line or near a wall outlet to see if reception

improves.

• Always keep your receiver away from major appliances. Computers and other domestic devices, especially those with motors or fans, produce their own RF signals which can disrupt regular AM reception.

• Some devices such as microwave ovens can actually improve signal reception. Try locating your radio on or near your microwave.

• Purchase an external AM antenna or a newer and more sensitive AM radio.

not possibly support his or her current lifestyle should you die (for example, could not possibly pay the house payments), then yes. Otherwise, probably not. Having life insurance would be a nice remembrance if you were to die, but it is not essential. What if you have kids and you provide income that they depend on? Then almost certainly, unless you are rich enough to be "self insured," you need life insurance. Yes, yes, yes! You need enough coverage to allow your spouse and children to live a comfortable life in the absence of your

income.

How much life insurance do you need?

To calculate how much life insurance you need, you can use one of two approaches. You could estimate what you will make during the rest of your life and provide that. Simply take your yearly salary and multiply it by the number of years you have left before retirement. Using this approach you would probably buy way too much or too little insurance, depending on how much you make. The other way is to examine all of the expenses that your family will incur should you die, and account for them.

The Bergen County Prosecutor's Office Computer Crimes Unit will be presenting an indepth presentation on Internet Safety, hosted by the Kiwanis Club of Hasbrouck Heights on Thursday, February 7, 2008 at 7:00 p.m. at the Hasbrouck Heights Municipal Complex.

The presentation entitled "Staying Safe in Cyberspace – Internet Safety for Parents," is a comprehensive examination of today's Internet and the dangers that lurk inside chat rooms, instant messages, email and blogs.

This presentation is an integral function of the Bergen County Prosecutor's Office Computer Crimes Unit.

Through education and outreach to the community, the Computer Crimes Unit hopes to raise parents' awareness of online predators and the dangerous content that is only a mouse-click away from their child's grasp.

Through their dynamic, intriguing and eye-opening presentation, complete with vivid graphics and streaming video clips, the Computer Crimes Detectives hope to educate parents about the seedier side of the Internet.

The goals of this presentation are to discuss the basic functions of the Internet, to highlight current Internet trends and to illustrate the associated risks facing children of all ages. After what will be a shocking display of dangers associated with online communication, they will turn to preventative measures and effective solutions to protect children, many of whom know more about computers than the average parent.

"The explosion of the Internet has proven to be most influential with the youngest of generations, namely our children," said Bergen County Prosecutor John Molinelli.

He continued, "Protecting them on the World Wide Web, a truly unregulated atmosphere, is a tremendous task that needs to begin at home, where children are indeed most vulnerable."

Prosecutor Molinelli and Acting Chief Joseph Macellaro urge all parents and guardians to attend this Internet safety presentation.

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Expanded Train Service at

NJ Transit has expanded the Pascack Valley train schedule to include bi-directional, off-peak and weekend service on October 28, 2007, adding 121 trains per week with 15 trains on each weekday and 23 Saturday and Sunday -- more than doubling weekly service.

The bi-directional expansion has restored weekend service, unavailable since 1940.

Previously, the 31 mile line, owned by NJ Transit and used by 3,850 commuters (*boarding*) from both states, ran only rush hour service with Hoboken bound service in the morning and Spring Valley bound service in the evening.

This expanded service is due to the installation of three new passing sidings on a single track, allowing trains to operate in both directions. A siding was constructed in Hasbrouck Heights.

The additional service has been anticipated since 2000, but was pushed back to support and coincide with the opening of the \$450 million Secaucus Junction transfer station, and delayed further when nine northern NJ communities sued to prevent the sidings from being built in Oradell and Montvale, with concerns that it would attract more freight trains. Construction began in the spring of 2005. In addition to adding passing siding to provide bi-directional flow, initiatives alleviating existing constraints on the line included removing freight traffic interference on the passenger main track and upgrades to the signal system. NJ Transit estimated project cost for the passing sidings at \$19 million. This passing track project will enable NJ Transit to provide rail service to a new elevated station in an existing

parking lot between the new Giants Stadium, Xanadu and the Racetrack via a 12,300 foot, \$182 million rail spur that will connect to the Pascack Valley Line.

The Pascack Valley Line plans to offer a one-seat, nontransfer ride to the new Midtown Manhattan station when NJ Transit and the Port Authority open their new rail tunnel. The \$7 billion project, known as "Access to the Region's Core," is scheduled to be completed in 2016.

Train Stations

The Wood-Ridge Train Station is the first stop north from Secaucus Junction and is located at Park Place East. There is a building with waiting area and rest rooms. Limited parking by permit is \$120 per quarter. Train service is available seven days.

From Wood-Ridge, the station is accessible with a walkway along Moonachie Avenue eastbound, which crosses over Rt. 17 and the railroad tracks and down a set of stairs. From lot, across Rt. 17 North, down a short block and across the railroad tracks.

The Rt. 17 upgrade at Williams Avenue will not address this situation.

According to a poll conducted by www.hasbrouckheights.com, 87% of those responding liked the notion of a railroad station in Hasbrouck Heights, but this dangerous, unfriendly Rt. 17 crossing has limited the appeal of taking the train.

There are plans for a new Teterboro Train Station, if the Honeywell property is redeveloped.

In 2007, the average weekday boarding ridership for Wood-Ridge was 241 passengers and for Teterboro was 76 passengers. NJ Transit expects a 5% ridership increase in 2008.

The first Hoboken bound train (1600) departs Teterboro at 5:49 a.m. with a one way ticket \$5 and monthly pass \$135; Wood-Ridge is at 5:53 a.m. with a one way ticket \$4.25 and monthly pass \$125.

The last outbound Hoboken train (1601) departs at 12:43 a.m. and arrives at Wood-Ridge at 1:03 a.m. and Teterboro 1:08 a.m.

All service on this line is diesel, using GP40PH-2d built in 1968 for the Central Railroad of NJ or modern Alstom PL42ACs. Comet I/I-B cars are used along with Metro-North's modern Comet V Alstom cars.

Moonachie, there is a short roadway off Moonachie Avenue leading to the station.

The Teterboro Station is the second stop north from Secaucus Junction located on Rt. 46 and Green Street, Teterboro *(near the Honeywell entrance).* There is no building except for an open transit shelter. Limited parking by permit is \$120 per quarter. Service is Monday through Friday. Weekend and holiday service is limited to one late night train.

The station is at the base of Williams Avenue. It is accessible from the *(former)* Hasbrouck Heights Shop-Rite parking lot across Rt. 17 south, across the entrance to Rt. 46 East, Bendix Diner parking (named for the Pascack Valley region it passes through) is a commuter rail line operated by the Hoboken Division of NJ Transit. The line runs north from Hoboken through Bergen County into Rockland, terminating at Spring Valley. It is 31 miles, six of which are in Rockland County.

The line was originally chartered as the Hackensack and New York Railroad in 1856. It later became the New Jersey and New York Railroad, which was bought by the Erie Railroad in 1896. The New Jersey and New York Railroad continued to exist as an Erie subsidiary until the 1960 merger that created the Erie Lackawanna Railroad. ###

According to DOT officials, the expected Rt. 17/Williams Avenue improvements will not include better/safer access to the train station -- a pedestrian overpass is too expensive and a sidewalk too difficult because of wetlands issues. Route 17 and Franklin Avenue

As part of the NJ DOT \$12 million widening/reconfiguring at four intersections, construction of auxiliary lanes, modifying shoulders, ramps and new traffic signal equipment on Route 17 (from Williams Avenue in Hasbrouck Heights to Meadow Road in Rutherford), a new traffic signal was installed at the Franklin Avenue railroad crossing. (A DOT map of this location: www.hasbrouck-heights.com/ images/2006/general/franklin. pdf).

DOT installed a device that turns the light red when trains approach to prevent cars from backing up onto the tracks on the Teterboro side where Franklin Avenue becomes Malcolm Avenue.

The preemptive device triggers a sensor that interrupts the normal sequence of traffic lights to allow a train to pass. As as result, the Franklin-Malcolm lights on either side of Route 17 automatically turn red. Traffic backs up Malcolm, but those approaching from the Hasbrouck Heights side of the highway get stuck in the northbound Franklin Avenue jughandle, creating a bottleneck. HHPD has met with the DOT several times to adjust the timing, but have a long way to go. According to NJ Transit, the rail crossing at Franklin-Malcolm has produced nine car-train accidents since 2000 (near-misses were not reported). ###



A Glimpse of Our History ...



The Railroad was a fundamental contributor to the growth of Hasbrouck Heights.

Up to September 1875, a bible school held sessions in the railroad depot at the foot of Ravine Avenue. The building was subsequently moved to south of the Franklin Avenue Station and used as a freight depot.

The name Corona was changed about 1890 to Hasbrouck Heights. The name Hasbrouck Heights was chosen to honor J. D. Hasbrouck, then General Manager of the New Jersey and New York Railroad. In 1909, Hasbrouck Heights had 2 stations on the New Jersey and New York Railroad (*Erie System*). ###

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Are Cholesterol Drugs Still Beneficial?

Statins, such as Lipitor, are the best-selling medicines in history. They are used by more than 13 million Americans and an additional 12 million patients around the world, producing \$27.8 billion in sales in 2006.

We are bombarded with the message from doctors, companies, and the media that high levels of bad cholesterol are the ticket to an early grave and must be brought down, so taking statins are the most effective in reducing those levels and therefore allowing us to live longer.

The drugs are thought to be so essential that official government guidelines state that approximately 40 million Americans should be taking them.

And who hasn't seen or read the ads with the artificial heart inventor and Lipitor user, Dr. Robert Jarvik. The ad states that "Lipitor reduces the risk of heart attack by 36%...in patients with multiple risk factors for heart disease."

So how can anyone question the benefits of these drugs?

First, new research is causing doubts as to how necessary it is to drive down cholesterol levels; especially the research that was recently revealed by Merck and Schering-Plough which studied the effects of Vytorin and Zetia. Cholesterol levels were definitely reduced, but even with two years of treatment, the reductions brought no health benefit.

Second, Pfizer's own Lipitor ad has an asterisk next to the 36% where the smaller print states, "In a large clinical study, 3% of patients taking a sugar pill or placebo had a heart attack compared to 2% of patients taking Lipitor." So to spare one person a heart attack,

100 people had to take Lipitor for more than three years. The other 99 got no measurable benefit.

Also, don't forget that the trials included selected patients with multiple risk factors, which included high blood pressure or smoking.

Pfizer has not challenged another key assertion that the drugs do not reduce deaths or serious illness in those without heart disease.

If we knew for sure that a medicine was completely safe and inexpensive, then its widespread use would be a no-brainer.

But an estimated 10-15% of statin users suffer side effects, such as muscle pain, cognitive impairments, and sexual dysfunction. Also, don't forget that while taking statins, additional blood tests are required. So adding up the price of the drugs and the costs of these tests leads to a large expenditure of America's finite health care dollars.

So what would work better?

Switching to a Mediterranean diet or eating more fish, exercising more, weight reduc-

tion, and not smoking have all had similar results on heart attack reduction in comparison to statins with less cost than statins and a greater benefit to quality of life.

Don't get me wrong, statins are good drugs overall that are just pushed too far. The drug business is, after all, a business where sales and shareholder value must be increased.

The problem statin manufacturers face is that these drugs are most effective in a smaller subgroup -- those who already have heart disease, which is not as blockbuster a market as the current market -- anyone with high LDL levels.

So companies have an incentive to market their drugs to a wider group of people, even if the benefits are much smaller.

Cholesterol is just one of the risk factors for heart disease, but something else has to happen before people get heart disease.

Patients with heart disease have cholesterol levels that are not much higher than those without heart disease.

Spaniards have LDL levels similar to Americans, but less than half the rate of heart disease. The Swiss have even

heghenorthelesterol levels, but their rates of heart disease are also lower. Australian Aborigines have low cholesterol levels but high rates of heart disease.

Statins might be better prescribed based on a patient's risk of heart disease, not on their LDL levels. The higher the risk, the better these drugs seem to work.

In the future, genetic testing will show which patients have the genetic variation that predicts who will benefit from statin therapy the most.

Early predictions say that 40% of the population does not have this genetic variation and therefore will not benefit from statin therapy.

Until then, even though I would hate to agree, our health care system most often runs on what makes money and not the actual data. Please do your own research and do not make any changes without talking to your doctor first.

As with men, women's most common heart attack symptom is chest pain or discomfort.

But women are somewhat more likely than men to experience some of the other common symptoms, particularly shortness of breath, nausea/vomiting, and back or jaw pain.

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tack Warning Signs: Some heart attacks are sudden and intense --- the "movie heart attack," where no one doubts what's happening.

But most heart attacks start slowly, with mild pain or discomfort.

Often people affected aren't sure what's wrong and wait too long before getting help. Here are signs that can mean a heart attack is happening:

Chest discomfort. Most heart attacks involve discomfort in the center of the chest that lasts more than a few minutes, or that goes away and comes back. It can feel like uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain.

diseases are very familiar to older citizens.

While often referred to as if it were a single disease, arthritis is actually a term used for a group of more than 100 medical conditions that collectively affect nearly 46 million adults and 300,000 children in America alone. On the other hand, although osteoporosis affects millions in America, it is likely to affect women four times more than men.

Briefly, arthritis affects the musculoskeletal system and specifically the joints - where two or more bones meet. Osteoporosis is a disease in which bones become fragile and are more likely to break.

Just Arrived

On January 15, 2008, Lodi residents received their brand new, 2007 Pierce Velocity 100' Rear Mount Platform Tower Ladder Truck. Cost was \$995,000, financed through bonds.

The unit features a 100' steel ladder, 8-man cab, stateof-the-art control panel, rear mounted camera for the driver, Cat motor, holds 300 gallons of water, and a bucket that can carry 1,000 pounds. The truck is 47 feet and weighs 82,000 lbs. The package also includes new SCBA (*air packs*), ground ladders and new radios.

It will also carry the "Jaws of Life" and be used as a reserve rescue.

The process began with a six member truck committee 18 months ago. The Department

will train with the Truck and outfit it, expecting it to be fully operational by February 15th.

Termed "Truck 1," it replaces a 1987 Simon-Duplex LT1 100' ladder that will be put up for auction. It was replaced due to age, use and the high cost of maintenance.

A wetdown is scheduled for June 28, 2008.

The Lodi Fire Department operates with 92 active volunteers, working from three firehouses. ###
