3 Ways to Get a Small-Business Loan

ronment has made it difficult for small businesses to obtain loans. Overall lending plunged 7.5% in the past two years, the largest decline since 1942, according to the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.

However, companies with sound business strategies still can borrow. Options include loans from traditional banks and institutions affiliated with the Small Business Administration, as well as financing from Internet-based lenders.

Bank Loans: The best place to get a small-business loan is still a bank. Banks typically offer the lowest interest rates and many have established reputations as trustworthy lenders.

But today, small businesses must expand their search to find a bank willing to lend. A more persistent approach has better odds of success.

The key to success with banks today is to show past profitability, and to describe a well thought-out plan for future

The rough economic envi- profits. If you aren't making a profit now, you must be able to tell the bank how you will change that in the short term, or you really won't be able to get a loan.

> Remember to start small in your loan requests. The bigger the loan request, the harder it is to get it approved.

> SBA Loans: Another way to find a bank loan is through the Small Business Administration, or SBA. The SBA can direct you to banks that offer loans guaranteed by the agency. This way, you'll have the advantage of approaching banks specifically interested in lending to small businesses.

> Interested businesses should contact the SBA office nearest to them, which can be found on the agency's Web site. Businesses should seek a bank that is an experienced SBA lender.

> Banks granting SBA loans are placing increased emphasis on business plans, cash flow and profit forecasts in deciding whether to lend. The SBA can

also refer businesses to free counseling centers to improve their performance.

Online Opportunities: The internet is another great source for loans. There are several sites where businesses can seek alternative lenders such as individuals and small companies.

Loans made on such sites range from \$10,000 to \$2 million. Interest rates range from 8 percent to 15 percent. While that's generally more than a bank will charge, it's much less than what you'll have to pay on many credit cards.

Companies that use these internet sites usually pay a one-time fee while other sites are free, although their costs are likely to be reflected in



About Leap Year

Who is a Leapling?

A person born on February 29 may be called a "leapling" or a "leaper."

Technically, a leapling will have fewer birthday anniversaries than their age in years.

This phenomenon is exploited when a person claims to be only a quarter of their actual age, by counting their leap-year birthday anniversaries only.

When is the birthday party? If you are born on a Leap Year, do you get your driver's license on February 28 or March 1?

It is an ambiguous question. In common years they usually celebrate their birthdays on February 28 or March 1. In some situations, March 1 is used as the birthday in a non-leap year since it is the day following February 28.

For legal purposes, legal birthdays depend on how local laws count time intervals.

Most states, however, consider March 1st the official day. For instance, the Michigan Vehicle Code states that people born on February 29th "are deemed to have been born on March 1st."

The Civil Code of the Republic of China, since October 10, 1929, implies that the legal birthday of a leapling is February 28 in common years:

Since 1990 non-retroactively, Hong Kong considers the legal birthday of a leapling March 1 in common years.

The chances of having a leap year birthday are 1 in 1,461.

There are about 4 million people in the world who have been born on February 29.

About Leap Year

A leap year is a year containing one extra day in order to keep the calendar year synchronized with the astronomical or seasonal year.

Because seasons and astronomical events do not repeat in a whole number of days, a calendar that had the same number of days in each year would, over time, drift with respect to the event it was supposed to track.

By occasionally inserting an additional day or month into the year, the drift can be corrected. A year that is not a leap

year is called a common year.

Why do we need leap year? The Gregorian calendar, which now serves as the standard calendar for civil use throughout the world, has both common years and leap years. A common year has 365 days and a leap year 366 days, with the extra, or intercalary, day designated as February 29. A leap year occurs every four years to help synchronize the calendar year with the solar year, or the length of time it takes the earth to complete its orbit about the sun, which is about 3651/4 days.

The length of the solar year, however, is slightly less than 365¼ days—by about 11 minutes. To compensate for this discrepancy, the leap year is omitted three times every four hundred years.

In other words, a century year cannot be a leap year unless it is divisible by 400. Thus 1700, 1800, and 1900 were not leap years, but 1600, 2000, and 2400 are leap years.

Leap years facts

- The Gregorian calendar has a 400-year cycle until it repeats the same weekdays for every year–February 29, 2008, is a Friday and February 29, 2408, is a Friday.
- The Gregorian calendar has 97 leap years during those 400 years.
- The longest time between two leap years is eight years. The last time that occurred was between 1896 and 1904. The next time will be between 2096 and 2104.

Special Leap Years

Leap years that share the same day of week for each date repeat only every 28 years between the years 1904 and 2096.

The year 2008 was a leap year. If you look at a 2008 calendar, you will see that February has five Fridays—the month begins and ends on a Friday. February comprised five Fridays in 1980 as well, and the next occurrence will be in 2036. February 29, the leap day, has been associated with age-old traditions, superstitions and folklore

These specially sized masks will enable firefighters or EMTs to deliver oxygen to pets in need and in some cases save their lives.

PA Installs 2nd Arrestor Bed at TEB



The second EMAS (Engineered Material Arresting Systems), known as an arrestor bed, was installed at the south end of Teterboro Airport's 7,200 foot runway 1-19, facing Moonachie Avenue and Redneck Avenue.

Prior to installation, Redneck Avenue had to be relocated. See related story.

The 160' x 350' arrestor bed is set on a 3' gravel and asphalt pad, similar to a typical road bed.

The arrestor bed slopes from 5" up to 17". The actual work began in September 2011 and was completed by December 31, 2011.

Work was done during the day to be sensitive to noise abatement, and to also allow for the repaying of Runway 1-19.

The project was supervised by Port Authority engineers. Blocks were supplied by ESCO.

The cost to install the second arrestor bed was \$8,245,000 and partially funded by the FAA.

Because there is a 1,000

over-run area, Runway 1-19 will not have an EMASat the north end..

A third arrestor bed is scheduled for installation at Runway 6-24 south end in 2012-2013.

Concurrent Work

- The dirt berm along Moonachie Avenue that was removed and replaced with a "Green Wall" (a structured block system with plantings, 800 feet long, 12 feet deep at the base and six to 12 feet high).
- East Riser Ditch at Redneck and Moonachie Avenues was rehabilitated to include boxed culverts through which the water flows under the

EMAS.

This included creating several flood retention areas. To minimize creating a "goose attraction," stakes with wires and yellow flags were installed.

(The wetlands space at the EMAS was mitigated in conjunction with the Redneck Avenue project.)

- Runway 1-19 was repaved, to include new lighting systems. (Note that in 2009, Runway 6-24 was repaved and new lights were installed. Neither runway was lengthened, only rehabilitated.)
- Two recessed fire hydrants were installed between the EMAS and end of the runway. ###



About EMAS Arrestor Bed Technology

EMAS arrestor beds are installed on the runway overrun/set-back to decelerate an aircraft in an emergency.

They are lightweight precast concrete blocks that consist of crushable cellular cement material. Resistance provided by the crushed material decelerates the aircraft.

Each arrestor bed configuration is custom engineered in length, depth and strength to provide optimum performance for the aircraft mix used at the airport.

EMAS arrestor blocks are set on an asphalt bed (similar to a typical road) which is graded for drainage.

The arrestor bed technology, known as the Engineered Material Arresting System (EMAS), was pioneered by the Port Authority and the Federal Aviation Administration, and has proven effective at John F. Kennedy International Airport, where the world's first EMAS was installed in 1996.

Then Port Authority Executive Director, Kenneth J.

Ringler Jr., said, "The technology has proven effective in bringing aircraft to a safe and complete stop. It could be compared to driving a vehicle into gradually deepening snow."

The blocks are light enough to crush under a jet's landing gear, but heavy enough to slow or stop a jet. The beds can withstand the weight of rescue trucks responding to an accident.

A factory installed jet blast resistant block protection system is applied to raw blocks to enhance durability and to protect against the effects of aircraft jet blasts.

Maintenance

Weekly drive-by inspections, as well as a monthly walk of the bed, are recommended.

Normal maintenance consists of maintaining the protective surface coating -- painting and caulking as needed.

Proper maintenance protects the underlying arrestor bed blocks from the environment, keeping excessive moisture out and prolonging the life of the system. Repainting the entire bed may be required every three to five years.

Snow is not expected to have any substantial effect on performance. Excessive build up that may obscure approach lights or affect the ILS may be handled with a snow blower.

Vehicular traffic should be avoided. Site preparation includes paving around the perimeter to allow vehicles to drive around the bed for inspections and maintenance. Maintenance personnel can walk on the bed without damaging the surface. ###

Teterboro Airport EMAS History

In February 2005, twenty people were injured when a 20ton corporate jet aborted takeoff on Runway 6, crossed Route 46 about 300 feet and crashed into Strawberry Warehouse at the corner of Huyler Street and Route 46.

About eight months later, the Port Authority Board of Commissioners authorized the installation of an arrestor bed at the end of Runway 6 at Teterboro, near Route 46.

A change in federal law passed last year requires all commercial airports without a 1,000 foot buffer at the end of their runways to install arrestor beds.

The bed near Route 46 is designed to stop planes traveling between 57 mph and 80

First TEB Installation

The 170-foot-wide, 251-foot-long arrestor bed at the end of the 6,015 foot Runway 6 at Teterboro Airport, near Route 46 was installed

in October 2006 at a cost of \$8.5 million dollars. The FAA covered \$7.5 million of the cost.

Site preparation was completed in September 2006. Construction began on the evening of October 14 and took about two weeks to complete.

Blocks were installed using forklifts and placed tightly together on a chalked grid.

The blocks are stacked at the foot of the runway and gradually sloped up starting at 4-1/2" and ending at 18." The sides are stepped to facilitate ARFF vehicle access and passenger egress.

Once positioned, the block joints were caulked/taped and additional coats of water-resistant paint were applied to seal the bed and prevent weather damage.

The Port Authority contracted for the site preparation, ESCO provided the blocks and a contractor installed the blocks. The Port Authority supervised the installation.

The space used for this

arrestor bed was mitigated wetlands (an equal space used will be restored to wetlands).

Replaceable Panel **System Allows** for Quick Repairs

On the evening of Wednesday, October 25, 2006, a Challenger jet taxiing to a terminal, made a wrong turn onto the arrestor bed. About 15 panels were destroyed.

Damaged panels were removed with a front-end loader and discarded. New, pre-cast blocks were then installed and finish coats applied.

Repairs for this incident cost approximately \$15,000. Repair costs are normally paid for by the insurance of the party responsible for inflicting damage to the EMAS system.

Second Incident

On Friday, October 1, 2010, at 1:45 p.m., a Gulfstream 4 landed on Runway 6, over-ran the end of the runway and went 112 feet into the EMAS (Engineered Material Arresting System).

The aircraft was slowed to a stop by the EMAS. Seven passengers and three crew members exited the aircraft door safely onto the EMAS. There were no injuries. There was minor damage to the air-

The incident crushed the EMAS materials into a powder. Damaged panels were removed with a front end loader that scooped up the debris to get rid of the loose materials.

The EMAS manufacturer came up over the weekend to assess the damage and determined that approximately 112 blocks needed to be replaced.

New, pre-cast blocks were then installed, block joints were caulked/taped and a waterresistant finish coat was applied to seal the bed and prevent water damage. The repair was completed within two weeks at a cost of under \$350,000. ###

Preparation Work: Relocate Redneck

The installation of this arrestor bed project required relocating 1,200 feet of Redneck Avenue 300 feet to the east.

The scope of the initial project began in October 2005 and design work started in 2006. Once the drawings were fine tuned, and all permits set, the bid process began. The contract to relocate Redneck Avenue was awarded on November 13, 2009. The basic contract was \$10 to 11 million dollars and partially funded by

In addition to the grading and prep work of the new Redneck Avenue, the movement of the road site work included:

• The relocation of a 36" gas main on old Redneck to under new Redneck Avenue.

gas main to the south side of Moonachie Avenue.

• The relocation of a 138 KV PSE&G transmission line and a 13KV PSE&G distribution line.

- Verizon communication lines.
 - United Water line.
- New traffic signals were installed at new Redneck Avenue and Moonachie Avenue.

With completion of the new roadway, old Redneck was taken out and replaced with grass.

New fencing was installed along new Redneck Avenue, incorporating The Instrument Landing System (ILS) which was installed in 1998-99.

This roadway realignment

• The relocation of a 12" project required a completely new drainage system; not moving East Riser Ditch, just modifying it.

> This project affected only the East Riser Ditch section now under old Redneck Avenue.

> The overall project included rehabilitation of East Riser Ditch, installation of culverts under the arrestor bed, developing flood retention, installing a green wall to replace the berm which was removed, etc.

> The relocation of Redneck Avenue, utility work and Riser Ditch rehabilitation was completed in December 2010.

> Once the Redneck Avenue project was completed, work began on the construction of the second arrestor bed. ###

Filling You In

Oral Cancer

How common and how serious is oral cancer?

Oral cancer, the sixth most common cancer, accounts for about 3.6 percent of all cancers diagnosed. The majority of oral cancers occur in people older than 45 years, with men being twice as likely as women to develop the disease.

The most frequent oral cancer sites are the tongue, the floor of the mouth, soft palate, lips, and gums. If not diagnosed and treated in its early stages, oral cancer can spread leading to pain, loss of function, disfigurement and even death.

Your dentist can perform a thorough screening for oral cancer.

What causes oral cancer?

Scientists aren't sure of the exact cause of oral cancer. However, the carcinogens in tobacco products, alcohol and certain foods, as well as excessive exposure to the sun have been found to increase your risk. Genetics may also be a factor.

What are the warning signs to look out for?

Red, white, or discolored lesions, patches or lumps in or around the mouth are typically painless in the early stages. Malignant cancer spreads and destroys healthy oral tissue and may become painful. Oral cancer may be very difficult to self diagnose so routine dental exams are recommended.

How does a dentist screen for oral cancer?

During an examination,

your dentist will feel for lumps or irregular tissue changes in your neck, head, cheeks and oral cavity. Also, he will examine for sores or discolored tissues.

How is oral cancer treated?

If your dentist suspects oral cancer, a biopsy may be indicated to confirm diagnosis.

Surgery to remove the tumor, chemotherapy and radiation are some of the possible treatments for the cancer.

Because oral cancer is often not diagnosed early, the prognosis can be less than good. Prevention measures should be encouraged. Avoiding smoking, other tobacco products, and excessive alcohol use will help prevent cancer tumors. Also, a healthy diet of fruits and vegetables may safeguard against oral cancer. Be sure to ask your dentist to perform an oral cancer examination at your next visit.

Foreclosure rate down --Have we turned the corner?

We read recently where foreclosure filings and repossessions fell last year to their lowest level since 2007.

According to Realty Trac, the online marketer of foreclosed properties, total filings, including default notices and bank repossessions were down 33% for 2011 to 2.7 million (1.9 of which entered the process).

One in every 69 homes last year received a foreclosure filing and 804,000 homes were repossessed – compared to 1.05 million homes that were repossessed during the foreclosure crisis peak in 2010, according the website.

Foreclosures have plagued many communities putting downward pressure on overall home prices.

In the past five years, more than 4 million homes have been lost to foreclosure.

NorthJersey.com reported that around 1,200 Bergen County properties and 983 Passaic County properties had foreclosure filings last year.

That's a radical 73% plunge from 2010's figures: 4,558 filing in Bergen and 4,275 in Passaic.

So, is the worst finally over for the housing market?

Not yet, it appears. Banks took more time to process foreclosures last year, which, analysts note, explains some of the declines. In fact, the average process time for a foreclosure rose to 348 days in the fourth quarter, up from 305 days one year prior.

[Blazingly fast compared to the pace in this state: foreclosures in New Jersey - according to RealtyTrac, took an average 964 days, or more than 2 ½ years! That's second only to New York where the process averages 1,019 days (!!).]

Early in 2011, many forecasters were predicting a wave of foreclosures due to resetting adjustable-rate mortgages, but low mortgage rates helped many borrowers refinance into more affordable loans, said RealtyTrac CEO Brandon Moore.

The government helped as well through efforts like the Home Affordable Refinance Program (HARP) which made refinancing easier for borrowers who owe more on their mortgage than their homes are worth.

The listing firm anticipates that 2012's foreclosure rate will be higher that last year's but will remain below the peak in

That might not mean much to the 1.9 million property owners nationwide and the 17,460 here in New Jersey who received foreclosure filings in 2011. But it can still be seen as a sign that maybe – finally! - things are getting better....(?)

Bergen County Police to Patrol Teterboro

Bergen County Executive Kathleen A. Donovan signed an executive order directing the Bergen County Police Department (BCPD) to provide patrol and ancillary police services at the request of the Borough of Teterboro. This Inter-local agreement will save the taxpayers of Teterboro over \$175,000 per year.

The Bergen County Police already have a significant presence in the Borough of Teterboro through the Bergen County Animal Shelter, the Teterboro Vocational School and the opening of the Bergen County Juvenile Detention Center. The Bergen County Police currently patrol Route 46 in the Borough of Teterboro and the BCPD Bomb Squad currently provides protective security measures for dignitaries arriving and departing Teterboro Airport. "This is a logical progression for the County Police to expand their presence in Teterboro," said Donovan.

Teterboro Municipal Manager Nicholas Saros said, "There is already a Bergen County Police presence. This is the perfect interlocal agreement, a true-win-win for the county and Teterboro. We are looking forward to a great working relationship."

The Borough of Teterboro ratified this agreement at their December 28, 2011 meeting. The County of Bergen will be providing these services to Teterboro for \$100,000 per year. The contract went into effect beginning January 1, 2012

Teterboro also renewed its contract for Moonachie Police coverage for 3 years, with the first year at \$301,000. ###




