Certificates were presented to all students by the Mayor and Council.



Sgt. Joseph Rinke provided concluding remarks.



## Wood-Ridge Kindergarten Registration



## **Groundhog Day 2013** Saturday, February 2

Thousands of years ago, when animalism and nature worship were prevalent, people in Germany believed that the badger had the power to make weather predictions relating to winter and spring according to superstition.

They studied the badger to know when to plant their crops. By the time the first German immigrants settled in Pennsylvania, they probably understood that this was not true, but the tradition continued.

There were not many badgers in Pennsylvania so the groundhog (also known as the woodchuck) was substituted.

According to folklore, if it is cloudy when a groundhog emerges from its burrow on this day, then spring will come early; if it is sunny, the groundhog will supposedly see its shadow and retreat back into its burrow, and the winter weather will continue for six more weeks.

Although some states have adopted their own groundhogs, the official groundhog is Punxsutawney Phil. It is said that Punxsutawney Phil (the groundhog) was named after King Phillip.

Punxsutawney held its first Groundhog Day in the United States in the 1800s. The first official trek to Gobbler's Knob near, Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania, was made on February 2, 1887.

The town has attracted thousands of visitors over the years to experience various Groundhog Day events and activities on February 2.

Modern customs of the holiday involve celebrations where early morning festivals are held to watch the groundhog emerging from its burrow.

Movies, advertisements, cartoons and other media have portrayed the legendary role of the groundhog in popular culture.

The term "Groundhog Day" is a phrase that is sometimes used to express if the same events or actions occur repetitively for a period of time.

Groundhog Day, already a widely recognized and popular tradition, received widespread attention as a result of the 1993 film "Groundhog Day." ###

#### **Organize Documents**

The documents homebuyers must produce to be considered for a home mortgage, are those which authenticate their income and taxes. 

# Jersey Strong: The Beginning of the Comeback

On Monday, January 7, 2013, with a banner announcement stating: "Destroyed by Sandy, rebuilt by friends and family," **Bazzarelli's Restaurant and Pizzeria** held their grand re-opening.

They were closed since October 29, after suffering extensive flood damage as a result of Superstorm Sandy.

The family estimates the damages to the restaurant have been around \$300,000. They received no large-scale aid: They had no flood insurance. They say they were turned down for assistance from FEMA (which has given most of its storm aid to residences) and are still waiting to hear from the U.S. Small Business Administration. They say they had to pay at least \$200,000 out of pocket for renovations.

Attending the celebration were: United States Senator Robert Menendez, Lt. Governor Kim Guadagno, NJ Senator Paul Sarlo, Bergen County Executive Kathleen Donovan, Moonachie Mayor Dennis Vaccaro, Moonachie Police Chief Michael McGuire, along with many family, friends and well wishers.

Owned by Aldo Bazzarelli, the 42-year-old restaurant was able to open ahead of schedule thanks to support from local businesses and Bazzarelli's own employees, who responded quickly to help the restaurant recover.

"Bazzarelli's was determined to reopen its doors despite the devastating damage the restaurant suffered during the worst storm in New Jersey's history," said Lt. Governor Guadagno.

"For Moonachie, Little Ferry and other area towns, losing Bazzarelli's, which has been an active part of the community since opening in 1971, would have been a real blow.

Today's reopening is a testament to the resiliency and strength of Bazzarelli's as well as how New Jerseyans came together to help a respected and cherished local business in its time of need."

"Some people say we've forgotten Little Ferry and Moonachie," Guadagno told the crowd gathered outside the restaurant. "Let me tell you — you are the victory story of the day, and we are never going to forget what happened up here in Little Ferry and Moonachie, we are never going to forget how we need to support them every day."

Bazzarelli's didn't think it would be able to reopen so soon, but the restaurant was able to get back on its feet thanks to the help and generosity of other local businesses and Bazzarelli's own employees.

"That goes to show you what kind of roots they have in Moonachie," said Mayor Dennis Vaccaro, who says the landmark restaurant is "my second kitchen" and notes the Bazzarellis' generosity to many local groups. "All those people have reached out to help them rebuild, because they are a part of this community."

All the result of four decades of donating to local fund-

raisers, treating employees like part of the family, and simply offering customers good food and a warm greeting.

"We worked about every day and received from some wonderful donations," said Denise Bazzarelli, Aldo's daughter.

"M. Teixeira Soapstone of Hackensack donated new counter tops, our bar, baseboard, shelves, and bathroom and installed everything before their paying customers. Our paint was donated by Palmar ACE Hardware in River Edge. They also arranged to have a designer come in to help us make the best color selections.

Our staff called in soon after the storm and came down to help clean up. This is when cell phones weren't working and gas was in short supply. It was so amazing how many people come out to help you and how many people are there for you in times like this."

"It just shows the indomitable spirit of this family and, by virtue of that, of New Jerseyans," said Senator Menendez. "But Mr. and Mrs. Bazzarelli had to go through a lifetime of savings and encumber debt.

In reference to the supplemental emergency appropriations bill: "...to pass it as quickly as possible so we can look a

terrible storm in the eye and say you can't beat us here in New Jersey."

"Throughout the state, we've seen countless examples of neighbors, friends and strangers helping each other," continued the Lt. Governor. "Hurricane Sandy caused great destruction and pain for thousands of New Jerseyans, but it has also brought out wonderful examples of caring and compassion. Long after the damage from Hurricane Sandy has been repaired, what people will remember is how New Jerseyans came to the aid of their neighbors in a time of great need."



# Stepping Up to the Plate...

The Lodi American Legion Post 136 has worked more than seven years to recover from a fire that destroyed their building on December 14, 2005.

They were under insured and held many fund raisers and secured loans to get the money to rebuild.

The Post (located at 41 Union Street, Lodi,) has since made extensive efforts to rebuild which have been long, hard and expensive.

Their new building was nearly completed; however, one of the most frustrating difficulties they were facing was the completion of their fire sprinkler system.

A dispute with a contractor left the Post with an unfinished and inadequate sprinkler system, they said.

The contractor that they hired did not fulfill his contract upon receiving final payment.

Without a fire sprinkler system, the Post wasn't able to get a certificate of occupancy -- further halting their dreams of re-establishing their home.

Members from the New Jersey Fire Sprinkler Advisory Board (NJFSAB) and Sprinkler Fitters Local 696 Union jumped into action once they learned of the injustice taking place against the Legion.

They rallied and secured materials and volunteers to properly install the sprinkler system according to approved fire codes and regulations.

The partially installed "wet" system was dismantled and a completely new "dry" system was installed. (No water in the pipes. When sensors are activated at the control panel, water then goes through the system.)

The installation was performed free of charge to the Legion with labor and materials donated by NJFSAB members.

Many contractors and union members also wanted to help because they themselves are Veterans, noted David Kurasz, executive director of the New Jersey Fire Sprinkler Advisory Board.

Work has been under way, Bellew said. The job will take another few weeks to complete, because workers are waiting to get special-order sprinkler heads to finish the project, he

Kurasz valued the labor and supplies for the fire-prevention system at about \$30,000 to \$40,000. He said between eight to ten companies donated supplies, with the bulk coming from American Atlantic.

## Veterans Today

These days of winter and the past couple of months have been hard on our communities.

Many people are struggling with trying to put their homes back together and continuing the endless fights with insurance companies and contractors trying to make things right again.

Then when all hope seems lost you find yourself staring outside and you are wondering what to do next? How will you find the strength to continue? I'm not Dr. Phil, but I do know Americans have been there before. Let me give you an example.

In the summer of 1778 Detroit and the surrounding area was in the control of Colonel Henry Hamilton. He was in the service of the British Army and had orders to have his Indian allies help control the area and prevent the Americans from taking it.

Two years earlier the Declaration of Independence was voted on and approved by Congress. In it was a charge against the King of England that stated that the King had "excited domestic insurrections amongst us and has endeavored to bring inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian savages, whose known rule of warfare, is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes, and conditions."

That's a serious charge written by Thomas Jefferson and no doubt he had Colonel Hamilton on his mind when he wrote it. That would be because Colonel Henry Hamilton had used the American Indians as allies and he apparently had been paying them for every American scalp they could get on the frontier.

In those days a scalp proved that the Indian warrior killed an American but it didn't always prove whether it was a man, woman and in some cases child.

So entire families were killed on the frontier and Colo-

nel Hamilton received the nickname of the "hair buyer general."

These were the days of the Revolutionary War. These were difficult times and all hope seemed lost. Then Thomas Jefferson received a visit from George Rogers Clark.

Clark had been on the frontier working as a surveyor for Virginia. His diary is full of friends and people he knew that had been victims of Colonel Hamilton's hair buying. He mentions people disappearing in the woods and later found to have been cut up and scalped.

He wanted to receive funding from Virginia to take the frontier settlements of Detroit, Kaskaskia, Cahokia and Vincennes. The Virginia Legislature agreed and he was commissioned a Lt. Colonel of the Virginia Militia and sent on his way.

He gathered almost 200 frontiersmen for his quest. The American Indians called them Long Knives apparently because some of them carried swords.

They began their trek up the Tennessee River till they reached an old French fort called Massaic.

There they decided to leave the river and travel the 120 miles by land to Kaskaskia to prevent them from being seen.

This was no easy task for the terrain was all woods streams and rivers.

When they reached Kaskaskia they prepared for a battle but found that the people there were of French origin and didn't care about England and the war with her Colonies.

They wanted to be left alone. Lt. Colonel Clark promised them no hostility as long as they take an oath to Virginia and the new United States. They certainly wanted no trouble so they joyfully did.

Clark sent detachments 30 miles north up the Mississippi River to capture Cahokia and another detachment to capture Vincennes. The people in those places did the same as the people in Kaskaskia. So Clark managed to take all the little outposts without firing a shot. The only one left was Detroit.

His enemy, Colonel Hamilton knew he had trouble. He was in Detroit and knew that the outposts being captured was a problem because it would not be too long before Clark came to attack Detroit.

He didn't wait for Clark. He moved his 500 man force with another 300 Indian Warriors south in the month of December and retook Vincennes. This

was no easy feat considering the movement was made in the winter time.

Inside Vincennes is a fort called Fort Sackville. Inside this fort is where Hamilton and his men took their refuge for the winter. Clark was at Kaskaskia preparing for a siege he knew would come if he stayed there till spring.

Most armies in the 18th century didn't campaign in the winter due to the cold and lack of available food. Clark was a fighter and sitting and waiting for his enemy to surround him and destroy him was something he just wasn't going to do. So against all military protocol he planned to attack.

February 1779, Colonel George Rogers Clark and 170 of his Long Knives marched out of Kaskaskia to cross four rivers and marsh land, travel over 240 miles to attack a fort that had them out numbered 4 to 1 in the middle of winter.

Most of the Long Knives thought they would never live to see the spring. Most folks would say it is impossible. Most military men would tell you it doesn't stand a chance of success. Most folks don't know George Rogers Clark.

Crossing over the mud and dirt through marshlands for many days, they kept going until they reached the Wabash River. They built canoes to cross their supplies.

The men say in their memoirs they felt superior to other men. Without fear Clark jumped into the river begging his men to follow and they did. Then they found a spot to spend the night on dry ground and they stayed the night there.

Everyone was wet, tired, cold and hungry. The next morning his scouts reported that they had to cross 8 more miles in freezing water to reach Vincennes.

The men began to lose heart. They began grumbling and complaining.

Colonel Clark stared out at the river. All hope seemed lost. How will he find the strength to continue? What should he do next? We now know he chose to be an American.

Without a word to his men, Clark dips both of his hands into the Wabash River, pours gunpowder on his hands and blackens his face. He then yells out a war cry and plunges into the shoulder deep river.

His men were shocked and surprised. Then they followed him. Amazingly enough they reached Vincennes. He quickly occupied the town and received supplies and ammo from the people.

He had his men march back and forth with different flags to make Hamilton believe there were more men in the field than Clark really had. His men began shooting the British soldiers manning the cannons. British losses began to mount.

Clark and the Long Knives captured some American Indians coming to the aid of Hamilton. In Clark's memoirs he states he wanted to show the Indians in the Fort that Hamilton could not protect them. So he had his prisoners sit across the dirt road from the fort and he tomahawked the prisoners to death. It had the desired effect on Hamilton. He surrendered Fort Sackville to Colonel Clark.

Hamilton and his men were sent to Virginia as prisoners of war. The area of Ohio, Indiana and Illinois was now in the hands of the United States.

George Rogers Clark and his Long Knives achieved the impossible. It was nothing less than a military journey and campaign unmatched in history.

Most people would never know him or his Long Knives. Lost in time never to be mentioned or remembered. Military expedition was a family trait. His little brother was William Clark from the Lewis and Clark Expedition of 1804. Well, that's life and death on the frontier.

Happy Valentine's Day to all the Ladies.

Spring is on the way. ###

## It Is Well With My Soul

of the Christian Church, "It is Well with My Soul," was penned by Horatio G. Spafford after the loss of his children in a shipwreck in the Atlantic Ocean in 1873.

## I experienced the normal human emotions that accompany such loss.

experienced "Sandy," the di-

saster with such a pretty name!

And just as many others,

At first, I was in shock and denial that this was really happening. All my personal possessions downstairs gone; the lower level of the Church flooded out. I automatically prayed calling on my God to help and protect me and all to whom this was happening. Looking back I realized at first

I was just feeling numb. Like many, it seemed overwhelming at first to face the things that needed to be done. I just wanted things to return to as they were before "Sandy." It has been described by someone as "wanting a microwave solution to a crock-pot situation." Let's get things back to normal AND PLEASE GOD DO IT NOW!!

Yes, I am no stranger to our normal human emotions. I experience them all during times of severe trial and loss; shock, denial, anxiety, depression, etc.

So what makes the difference for me and many others as followers of Jesus Christ? I have learned that emotions are not bad of themselves. God created me with a full range of emotions, both for good times and bad times.

It's what I do with them that make the difference. If I let emotions control my life I will experience a roller-coaster existence, an up and down experience based on life's situations.

The word of God, the Bible, teaches me to rely on what God tells me, not what my emotions say to me. I learned a long time ago, as written in the second epistle of Timothy, that "God did not give us a spirit of fear, but a spirit of power, of love and of self-discipline."

That means we have the power to not let our emotions cause us to live in fear and that we have the ability to keep things in perspective.

We are able through God's grace to see what we have, not what we have lost. We may have lost material possessions, but we have our lives. We may have lost material possessions but we still have our families, friends, our faith, our God.

As I daily put into practice God's word, "give thanks in all circumstances" (I Thessalo-

nians 5:18), I begin to see more and more to be thankful for and I honestly cannot remember all that I lost.

Jesus said it best in the Sermon on the Mount in the Gospel of Matthew and these words are my anchor in life's struggles -"Therefore I tell you, do not be anxious about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, nor about your body, what you will put on. Is not life more than food and the body more than clothing?

Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they?

And which of you by being anxious can add a single hour to his span of life?

And why are you anxious about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which today is alive and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you, O you of little faith?

Therefore do not be anxious, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' For the Gentiles seek after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them all. But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you.

Therefore do not be anxious about tomorrow, for tomorrow will be anxious for itself. Sufficient for the day is its own trouble."

I have learned for myself, and so teach and proclaim to others, that in the realities of life no matter what we may face God is good. He answers prayer based on faith in His goodness not on the state of our emotions. And so whatever 2013 may bring I will continue to believe in and rely on the goodness of God.

Like Spafford, I can declare, "it is well with my soul."



# Filling You In

#### **Brushing Basics**

Knowing how to brush your teeth is an important skill that children should learn at an early age. However, some children - and even adults - aren't always doing what they should when brushing their teeth. Be sure that your kids - and you are brushing the right way.

#### Should parents help children brush their teeth?

Yes! Children, especially young ones, are not able to brush their teeth properly and need assistance from their parents or caregivers. Always help children brush their teeth and hold the toothbrush for them.

The best way for them to learn how to brush properly is for their parents, siblings, and other family members to brush with them. Making brushing a fun "event" for kids can make it part of their daily routine and will help them to continue brushing properly as they grow

#### How long should we brush?

Remember your 2s: 2 minutes 2 times a day. Everyone in your family should be brushing their teeth for at least 2 minutes every time they brush - and they should be brushing their teeth twice per day. There are easy ways to make brushing fun and ensure that your children are brushing for at least 2 minutes. Turn a song on for them to listen to while they brush. Most songs on the radio are at least two minutes longsometimes longer.

Adults should use these tips, too, since many think they're brushing long enough, but most actually spend less than 1 minute brushing!

#### When should I brush?

It's always best to get food particles off teeth right away, because brushing stops sugary snacks from turning into damaging acids and catches starchy

foods like potato chips before they tum into cavity-causing sugar. But children don't always have time to brush their teeth at school after they eat lunch or have a snack. At the very least, make sure your family brushes their teeth with fluoride toothpaste in the morning and before going to bed.

By doing so, you will be helping them take the right steps to protect their teeth and gums.

#### What is the best technique for brushing?

Dentists generally tell patients to use specific brushing techniques to ensure that they are cleaning their teeth and gums properly.

Here are some easy tips to model for your children, so they learn good brushing

- One effective, easy-toremember technique involves using a circular or elliptical motion to brush a couple of teeth at a time, gradually covering the entire mouth.
- Place a toothbrush beside your teeth at a 45-degree angle and gently brush teeth in an elliptical motion. Brush the outside of the teeth, inside of the teeth, your tongue, the chewing surfaces of your teeth, and in between teeth.

Also, you should teach your children about improper brushing. Specifically, teach them that they should not use a back and forth motion and show them the proper way to brush! Using a back and forth motion causes the gum surface to recede or can expose the root surface or make the root surface tender. Be sure to ask your dentist or hygienist if you or your family members have any questions.

Also, note that no matter what tooth brush you use, it will not get in between your teeth. Flossing in between your teeth once per day is very important to remove plaque from these surfaces.

If children learn at an early age the proper way to brush, when they should brush, and for how long, they will be protecting their oral health for the rest of their lives. Modeling these brushing techniques for your children and family members will help them-and you-to understand the importance of oral health. Ref Academy of General Dentistry, 2012.

# **About** the Flu

#### **How Flu Spreads**

People with flu can spread it to others up to about 6 feet away. Most experts think that flu viruses are spread mainly by droplets made when people with flu cough, sneeze or talk.

These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby or possibly be inhaled into the lungs. Less often, a person might also get flu by touching a surface or object that has flu virus on it and then touching their own mouth or nose.

To avoid this, people should wash their hands often with soap and water. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand rub. Linens, eating utensils, and dishes belonging to those who are sick should not be shared without washing thoroughly first. Eating utensils can be washed either in a dishwasher or by hand with water and soap and do not need to be cleaned separately.

#### The Flu Is Contagious

Most healthy adults may be able to infect others beginning 1 day before symptoms develop and up to 5 to 7 days after becoming sick.

Children may pass the virus for longer than 7 days. Symptoms start 1 to 4 days after the virus enters the body.

That means that you may be able to pass on the flu to someone else before you know you are sick, as well as while you are sick. Some persons can be infected with the flu virus but have no symptoms. During this time, those persons may still spread the virus to others.

#### What Should I Do If I Get Sick?

If you get sick with flu-like symptoms, you should stay home and avoid contact with other people except to get medical care. Most people with the flu have mild illness and do not need medical care or antiviral drugs. However, some people are more likely to get flu complications and they should talk to a health care provider about whether they need to be examined if they get flu symptoms. Source: www.cdc.gov ###



# AARP Members Learn About Alzheimer's

Ms. Elaine M. Winter was the guest at the January 11, 2013 meeting of the Central Bergen Chapter 418, AARP. She is the Associate Director of the Greater New Jersey Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association.

Ms. Winter's remarks were concerning Alzheimer's. She emphasized that it is a disease of the brain. It destroys brain cells, causing problems with memory, thinking and behavior. It is the most common form of dementia. It is the sixth leading cause of death in the United States.

Symptoms usually develop slowly and get worse over time, becoming severe enough to interfere with daily tasks.

It is not a normal part of aging, although the greatest known risk factor is increasing age, and the majority of people with Alzheimer's are 65 and older.

But Alzheimer's is not just a disease of old age. Up to five percent of people with the disease have early onset Alzheimer's (also known as younger-onset), which often appears when someone is in their 30s, 40s or 50s.

Ms. Winter's presentation centered around the warning

signs of the disease; the causes of the disease; how it affects the brain; diagnosing it; treatment and prevention; the impact on people living with Alzheimer's; the impact on caregivers and the impact on society.

#### **Valentine Wishes** and Pitfalls

With Valentine's Day approaching, you would think I'd be focusing on issues that entwine love and real estate; head over heels with the home of your dreams sort of stuff.

Well, no. This season I'm playing Grinch-cupid. Let's talk instead about....REJEC-

Rejected home purchase offers, that is. Hey, face it, rejected offers cause buyers a lot of disappointment and heartache! (Believe me, we Realtors feel their pain.) A seller doesn't have to tear the buyer's proposal in half for it to feel like their hearts have been ripped out. But why? Why do many home purchase offers face rejection? Here are the top reasons...

#### Offer Rejection Reason #1:

Offer Price Too Low. Sellers expect a fair price for their home. Don't be surprised that

sometimes the emotional attachment to one's home reflects itself in the asking price.

If a buyer's offer is too far below the seller's conception of a fair price, they may take it as an insult.

But, if you are intent on submitting a low home purchase offer, you may avoid rejection by submitting a substantial earnest money deposit.

Something above 2% of the sales price should, hopefully, impress the seller that you are a serious buyer.

However, don't try to win the seller over with an emotional supplication. It doesn't matter how much you love the house if you cannot afford what the seller is asking for. If your income disqualifies you from paying list price, you should be aiming your offers at a lower price range property.

#### **Offer Rejection** Reason #2:

Buyer Does Not Meet Seller's Specific Needs. It's always recommended when making the offer that the Selling Agent call the Listing Agent beforehand to find out if the seller has any specific requirements or hot buttons to be dealt with.

If so, they should be written into the offer. Some of

these issues may include a larger earnest money deposit, a longer closing date or specific financing terms. The seller may not want to comply with the buyer's demands.

This may happen if, according to a home inspection, the property needs repairs. Sometimes you can negotiate with the seller about lowering the initial asking price or receiving a credit to take care of repairs. On the other hand, it's possible you may need to buy "as is" in your agreement in order to avoid rejection.

#### Offer Rejection Reason #3:

Selling Agent Is A Jerk. In order to find out what the seller's terms are, your agent needs to be in contact with the listing agent. If a selling agent annoys the listing agent, especially during a multiple offer situation, it reflects poorly on that agent's buyers.

Beware of any agent who displays bad character traits such as raising their voice, making demands and ultimatums, or demeans the listing agent in outright or subtle ways, etc. Don't let any agent sabotage your chances for finding true love & happiness.... or, at least, its equivalent in real estate.

# 3 Alarm Fire in Rutherford Business District

Rutherford firefighters responded to a fire at Ames Avenue at about 8:44 p.m. on January 4, 2013.

First arriving companies found heavy smoke and fire showing in the front windows.

The inital attack was delayed due to electrical arcing in the rear of the building and PSE&G was called.

A second alarm was transmitted, the tower ladder was set up, lines were stretched and the building vented. A third alarm was sounded for additional resources and coverage.

Crews began conducting exterior operations while gaining entry into adjacent buildings to prevent extensions.

Heavy smoke pushed from all parts of the structure before flames broke through the roof.

The fire was in the ceiling voids, with the collapsed portions of the cockloft preventing suppression. It took an hour for most of the roof to burn off.

It was decided to pull the front facade down so water streams could hit the fire. Once down, crews were able to quickly knock down the remaining fire.

It appeared that the fire began at the iconic Ames Barber Shop and spread to the recently opened nail salon.

Firefighters attempted to keep the fire from spreading to stores exposed on Park Avenue near Poppie's Florist and Bank of America.

The fire was placed under control in about an hour and 45 minutes, with the last company leaving the scene at round 3:50 a.m. Firefighters from East Rutherford, Lyndhurst, Wallington, North Arlington, Nutley, Secaucus, Wood-Ridge and East Newark were all on scene to aid Borough firefighters. East Rutherford and North Arlington provided ladder trucks, as Rutherford's had currently been out of commission due to a mechanical failure.

A Rutherford firefighter suffered a minor foot injury and an East Rutherford EMS squad member sustained a hand injury. The Bergen County Arson Squad is investigating. *Photos by Dennis Kronyak Sr.* ###





# New Year's Eve Fire Displaces Heights Families

At about 2:53 a.m., on December 31, 2012, the Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department responded to a call at a Harrison Avenue home.

Upon arrival, the Department found heavy fire on the upper stories of a two-family home.

Fire Chief Richard Giarratana assumed command and First Assistant Fire Chief Pat Hayes assigned operations.

HH Engine 616 connected to the hydrant at Harrison and Terrace, and WR 905 connected to the hydrant at Summit and Harrison. Heights raised its ladder.

The attack began by stretching two 1 3/4" lines into

the front door, and a third line around back -- with water on the fire by 3:02 a.m.

Although upon arrival, the HH Police reported that there were no occupants in the structure, HHFD sent in a search and rescue team with the initial attack.

Firefighters were making progress, but the attic was out of control and firefighters withdrew to a defensive attack.

Using the deck gun on Engine 2, they knocked down the heavy fire and crews returned to put out the fire.

Time from arrival to knock down was 14 minutes. The fire, to include checking for extensions, was under control in 1 hour and 15 minutes.

Mutual aid response included: Wood-Ridge pumper, Moonachie FD and EMS, Wallington FAST Team and pumper, Little Ferry ladder and Lodi ladder. Also Hackensack Mass Service Unit was present to fill air packs.

The HH DPW was notified to respond for ice conditions on the roadway near the fire scene.

Two families were displaced: four adults and two dogs made it out of the house okay.

No injuries were reported. The cause of the fire is still under investigation. *Damien Danis Photos.* ###






















## Wood-Ridge Fire Department 2013 Installation Dinner
