Home Equity Loans vs. Lines of Credit

home equity debt: home equity loans and home equity lines of credit, also known as HELOCs. Both are sometimes referred to as second mortgages, because they are secured by your property, just like the original, or primary, mortgage.

Home equity loans and lines of credit usually are repaid in a shorter period than first mortgages. Most commonly, mortgages are set up to be repaid over 30 years. Equity loans and lines of credit often have a repayment period of 15 years, although it might be as short as five and as long as 30

> A home equity line of credit, or HELOC, works more like a credit card because it has a revolving balance. A HELOC allows you to borrow up to a certain amount for the life of the loan -- a time limit set by the lender. During that time, you can withdraw money as you need it. As you pay off the principal, you can use the credit again, like a credit card.

A HELOC gives you more flexibility than a fixed-rate home equity loan. It also is possible to remain in debt with a home equity loan, paying only interest and not paying down principal.

A line of credit has a variable interest rate that fluctuates over the life of the loan. Payments vary depending on the interest rate, the amount owed and whether the credit line is in the draw period or the repayment period.

During the equity line's draw period, you can borrow against it and the minimum monthly payments cover only the interest, although you can elect to pay principal.

During the repayment period, you can't add new debt and must repay the balance over the remaining life of the loan.

A line of credit is accessed by check, credit card or electronic transfer ordered by phone. Lenders often require you to take an initial advance when you set up the loan, withdraw a minimum amount each time you dip into it and keep a minimum amount outstand-

With either a home equity loan or a line of credit, you have to pay off the balance when you sell the house. ###


Society Reflects on Dutch Legend

In the 17th century, the Dutch settlers in New York brought with them the inspiration of the American version of the Santa Claus figure by reinventing their Sinter Klaas traditions. Sinter Klaas was viewed as the Dutch old man who brought presents, candy and sweets to the kids in a December 5th parade. The name Santa Claus supposedly is derived from the older Dutch "Sinter Klaas."

This information along with how Sinter Klaas, Bishop Nicholas, Saint Nicholas and Santa Claus had their historical beginnings and legends, were part of a program sponsored by the Wood-Ridge Historical Society on December 7, 2008.

Mr. Kevin Wright, a Past President of both the Hudson and Bergen County Historical Societies spoke at length on how the present image of Santa Claus developed. He reviewed the contributions to the legend made by the Brothers Grimm fairy tales, Washington Irving's writings and Clement Clarke Moore's poem, "A Visit from Saint Nicholas." He also discussed how the Santa Claus image was further enhanced by illustrator Thomas Nast.

Returning strikers were Maggie Filja, Grace De-Quinzio, Angelica Leventhal, and Zairah Ahmed. Taylor Barth was a significant addition to the offense.

The season opened on September 7, with a road game against a highly rated Ridgewood Maroons team. The tightly fought defensive battle ended in a 1-1 tie. Maggie Filja scored on a penalty kick for the Aviators. The second game, also on the road, was against a young group from the Ridgefield Royal Strikers. Angelica Leventhal and Taylor Barth each tallied two goals, with Maggie Filja scoring again in the 5-0 shutout. The girls played their home opener against the Vikings of Demarest and came away with a 3-1 victory. The fourth week of the schedule took the girls to Monroe-Woodbury. The skilled passing and aggressive play of the midfield, set up a number of breakaways for the strikers, who took advantage of many of those opportunities; the defense was stingy, giving up a mere 7 goals in 10 games with 4 shutouts; and the 29 goals scored by the offense scored were the most in the team's history.



Three Eagles Have Landed in Heights



The Colors were retired. "God Bless America" was led by Wayne Behr and joined by all. Light refreshments were served in the Museum.





Flu Season Information

Good Health Habits

Good health habits are an important way to help prevent the flu.

- · Avoid close contact with people who are sick. When you are sick, keep your distance from others to protect them from getting sick too.
- If possible, stay home from work, school, and errands when you are sick. You will help prevent others from catching your illness.
- · Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or sneezing. It may prevent those around you from getting
- Washing your hands often will help protect you from
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. Germs are often spread when a person touches something that is contaminated with germs and then touches his or her eyes, nose, or mouth.

How Flu Spreads

Flu viruses spread in respiratory droplets caused by coughing and sneezing.

They usually spread from person to person, though sometimes people become infected by touching something with flu viruses on it and then touching their mouth or nose.

Most healthy adults may be

velop and up to five days after becoming sick.

That means that you can pass on the flu to someone else before you know you are sick, as well as while you are sick.

Influenza Viruses

Influenza, also known as the flu, is a contagious disease that is caused by the influenza

It attacks the respiratory tract in humans (nose, throat, and lungs). The flu is different from a cold.

Influenza usually comes on suddenly and may include these symptoms: fever, headache, tiredness (can be extreme), dry cough, sore throat, nasal congestion and body aches.

These symptoms are usually referred to as "flu-like symptoms."

Anyone can get the flu (even healthy people), and serious problems from influenza can happen at any age.

People age 65 years and older, people of any age with chronic medical conditions, and very young children are more likely to get complications from influenza.

Pneumonia, bronchitis, and sinus and ear infections are three examples of complications from flu.

The flu can make chronic

may experience asthma attacks while they have the flu, and people with chronic congestive heart failure may have worsening of this condition triggered by the flu.

The Flu Season

In the northern hemisphere, winter is the time for flu. In the United States, the flu season can range from November through March, and even past March in some years.

During the past 21 flu seasons, months with the heaviest flu activity (peak months) occurred in December in four years, January in five years, February in nine years, and March in three years.

What You Should Do If You Get the Flu

Rest, drink plenty of liquids, avoid using alcohol and tobacco and take medication to relieve the symptoms of flu.

Influenza is caused by a virus, so antibiotics (like penicillin) don't work to cure it.

The best way to prevent the flu is to get an influenza vaccine (flu shot) each fall, before flu season.

Never give aspirin to children or teenagers who have flu-like symptoms - and particularly fever – without first speaking to your doctor.

Giving aspirin to children and teenagers who have influenza can cause a rare but serious illness called Reye's Syndrome.

Children or teenagers with the flu should get plenty of rest, drink lots of liquids, and take medicines that contain no aspirin to relieve symptoms.

The Myth of the "Stomach Flu"

Many people use the term "stomach flu" to describe illnesses with nausea, vomiting, or diarrhea.

These symptoms can be caused by many different viruses, bacteria, or even para-

While vomiting, diarrhea, and being nauseous or "sick to your stomach" can sometimes be related to the flu – particularly in children - these problems are rarely the main symptoms of influenza.

The flu is a respiratory disease and not a stomach or intestinal disease.

Ouestions & Answers

Can herbal, homeopathic or other folk remedies protect against the flu? There is no scientific evidence that any herbal, homeopathic or other folk remedies have any benefit against influenza.

How long can human influenza viruses remain viable on inanimate items (such as books and doorknobs)? Studies have shown that human influenza viruses generally can survive on surfaces between two and eight hours.

What kills influenza virus? Influenza virus is destroyed by heat (167-212°F [75-100°C]). In addition, several chemical germicides, including chlorine, hydrogen peroxide, detergents (soap), iodophors (iodine-based antiseptics), and alcohols are effective against influenza viruses if used in proper concentration for sufficient length

For example, wipes or gels with alcohol in them can be used to clean hands. The gels should be rubbed until they are


raffled off.





2009 Dog Licenses


