

Home Equity Loans vs. Lines of Credit

There are two types of years. home equity debt: home equity loans and home equity lines of credit, also known as HELOCs. Both are sometimes referred to as second mortgages, because they are secured by your property, just like the original, or primary, mortgage.

Home equity loans and lines of credit usually are repaid in a shorter period than first mortgages. Most commonly, mortgages are set up to be repaid over 30 years. Equity loans and lines of credit often have a repayment period of 15 years, although it might be as short as five and as long as 30

Full Wolf Moon

The January full moon will appear on Saturday, January 30, 2010, at 06:19. It is called the "Full Wolf Moon."

According to the "Farmer's Almanac," amid the cold and deep snows of mid-winter, the wolf packs howled hungrily outside Indian villages. Sometimes it was referred to as the "Old Moon," or the "Full Snow Moon," but most tribes applied that name to the next moon.

The Native American Indians of northern and eastern United States kept track of the seasons by giving a name to each recurring full Moon. European settlers followed the custom. ###

A home equity loan is a one-time lump sum that is paid off over a set amount of time, with a fixed interest rate and the same payments each month. Once you get the money, you cannot borrow further from the loan.

A home equity line of credit, or HELOC, works more like a credit card because it has a revolving balance. A HELOC allows you to borrow up to a certain amount for the life of the loan -- a time limit set by the lender. During that time, you can withdraw money as you need it. As you pay off the principal, you can use the credit again, like a credit card.

A HELOC gives you more flexibility than a fixed-rate home equity loan. It also is possible to remain in debt with a home equity loan, paying only interest and not paying down principal.

A line of credit has a variable interest rate that fluctuates

over the life of the loan. Payments vary depending on the interest rate, the amount owed and whether the credit line is in the draw period or the repayment period.

During the equity line's draw period, you can borrow against it and the minimum monthly payments cover only the interest, although you can elect to pay principal.

During the repayment period, you can't add new debt and must repay the balance over the remaining life of the loan.

A line of credit is accessed by check, credit card or electronic transfer ordered by phone. Lenders often require you to take an initial advance when you set up the loan, withdraw a minimum amount each time you dip into it and keep a minimum amount outstand-

With either a home equity loan or a line of credit, you have to pay off the balance when you sell the house. ###



Moonachie has also been the home, for many years, of the Hackensack Valley Fliers Model Airplane Club located at the end of Empire Boulevard. You can always hear the model planes flying and it's a favorite place to stop and watch them.

In the 1950s, this same area was part of the Blauvelt Estate, which was one of the largest pheasant hunting preserves in the country.

People would travel from all over the country to hunt pheasant on the estate, which was privately stocked with birds. You might still be able to spot a pheasant in the meadows along State Street or near the end of Empire Boulevard if you were lucky.

The meadowlands, along the eastern side of the Losen Slote Creek, is home to a nature trail that was constructed recently by the Hackensack Meadowlands Development Commission.

Although there presently is no entrance from Moonachie, one can be found at the end of Mehrhof Road in Little Ferry. Nature lovers and environmentalists will enjoy a walk through an area that remains relatively undisturbed from the development that has erased much of the natural environment of the area.

The trailer parks that began in Moonachie have also changed over the years. There are only two parks now, and no longer can you rent a space to stay for an overnight visit.

The parks are now communities within themselves, and the overnight trailers have been replaced with mobile homes.

Rodgers Trailer Park is now Vanguard Associates and Metropolitan Trailer Court is Metropolitan Associates. The Moonachie Trailer Park, located on the north side of Moonachie Avenue, became a victim of the Port Authority expansion back in the 50s.

As the 20th century has come to a close, Moonachie looks forward with promise and pessimism to the changes that are awaiting us just over the horizon.

It was way back in 1949 that the Port Authority stepped in and took away almost one half of the property in Moonachie and began its master plan to convert a small local airport into a much larger regional airport. About 15 years later, the airport saw another major change when, in the early 1960s, the first commercial jet aircraft landed at Teterboro.

Teterboro's take-offs and landings far exceed most major commercial airports in the country. Every major world personality, including the President of the United States, has at one time or another used the services of Teterboro Airport.

Unfortunately, for the local area residents, with the commercial jets, came excessive noise and pollution from the planes. Corporate jets are getting larger and more prevalent, private aircraft that once were the heart of Teterboro Airport are virtually non-existent, having moved to smaller, outlying private airports to avoid the traffic and the high cost of operating out of Teterboro.

Changes around us continue to shape our future, but the town will continue on as it has for the past 90 years as a small, local community where friends and neighbors are, in many cases, related and are always an important part of the community.

The dirt roads, the cedar forests and the brickyards are gone and have been replaced by paved roads, large commercial buildings and a busy jetport.

Down the road from Moonachie lies a major sports complex and promises a new giant shopping mall. No one can predict what other changes will change the face of our small town, but we know it can never remain the same or go back to what it once was.

We can only continue to work towards making Moonachie a nice place to live and to raise a family. ###

Where Do The Wise Find God?

The simple yet profound mystery of the Christmas through Epiphany season is often grasped through stories.

One such story, written by John Donne, a famous writer in 17th Century England, concerns a man in search for God.

The hero of the story believes that God lives on top of a mountain on the other side of the world, so he sets out to find and climb the mountain. After a long and difficult journey, he finds the mountain. It is much higher and more challenging than he expected, but if he intends to find God, he must continue. After studying the mountain, he decides the best route is on the east side. The next morning he begins His ascent.

At the same time, God, who indeed lives on the top of the mountain, decides He wants to show His love for His people by leaving the mountaintop and living among His people as one of them. After studying all four sides of the mountain, God decides that the best route is the west side. The next morning God begins his descent.

Thus it happens that God descends the west side at the same time the hero ascends the east side of the mountain. And so God and the man miss each other as they journey on opposite sides of the mountain.

When the man reaches the top of the mountain, he finds it empty. He is deeply disappointed. His mind is filled with conflicting thoughts: "God

does not live here after all..? Does God exist?.. Or if He does exist, where does He live?... Does it matter if I stay on the mountaintop alone or return to home?"

John Donne ends his story here, not telling us what the man decides. This parable is meant for the people of his time who were in search, but never finding Him. Like the man in John Donne's story, they become discouraged and conclude that God does not exist. At this point, John Donne's story and the great message of the Epiphany merge.

The feast of Epiphany celebrates the wise men, called Magi, coming from the East to honor Jesus. These men were instructors of Persian kings and the most learned of their time. Their search for the birth of the great king did not lead them to a mountaintop, but rather to a tiny village of poor people.

It is here where John Donne's story helps us to better understand the important lesson of the Epiphany season: God has truly come down from heaven to live among his people and He reveals Himself to ordinary people.

Christ the King expressed this same lesson in Matthew's gospel: "I was hungry ... thirsty ... homeless ... ill ... in prison and you cared for me. What you did do for one of these least ones, you did for me."

If we are to find God in our own world today, we must learn from the Magi and the wise men and women throughout the ages. God is not normally found on lofty mountaintops but rather in ordinary life.

He is not normally found among the great and the powerful but rather among the lowly and the powerless.

This poem sums up in practical terms the message of this season:

"When the song of the angels is stilled,

When the star in the sky is gone,

When the kings and princes are home,

When the shepherds are back with the flocks.

The work of Christmas

To feed the hungry,
To release the prisoners,
To rebuild the nations.

To bring peace among brothers.

To make music with the hearts." Author unknown ###



"The Day That Galvanized Us As a Nation"

A Remembrance Service was held at the USS Ling New Jersey Naval Museum, December 6, 2009, at 1 p.m. -- the 68th Anniversary of the Attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941.

Pharmacist Corner

Germs -- Beware!!!

The Center for Disease Control has published guidelines to prevent the spread of the flu and other bacterial & viral infections that run rampant this winter season.

The best prevention is to follow these guidelines while going about our daily routines and activities: wash your hands frequently and use hand sanitizer; also avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth.

Finally, cover your mouth and nose with your arm (NOT your hands) when coughing or sneezing. These are the new laws of infection prevention.

Some additional ways to cut down the spread of infectious germs may seem like common sense and a little old-fashioned, but they really

do the trick. Putting on a fresh shirt and washing your hands before meals can really lend a helping hand.

Think about it...your shirt has been with you all day long, catching the various sneezes and coughs from all those you've passed and encountered, not to mention the allergens from heating units, smog, car exhaust and pet dander.

Another helpful tidbit is to avoid reusing tissues. Remember to sanitize your hands after handling money to buy your fast food lunch, using the ATM, leaving the doctor's office and countless other places you've been on your daily travels. These places have more germs than you can imagine!

If someone in your home does become sick, don't give up on the germ war. This will only cause the problem to intensify.

Have the sick person use their own towel. Wipe down door, refrigerator and sink handles, telephones and computer keyboards with disinfectant spray or wipes.

Some of the most common household items are breeding grounds for those infection carrying little critters.

Believe it or not, one of the first things you see when you enter a home is a subway hub for bacteria...Your Welcome mat! You wipe your feet on it before you walk through the door, your pets stand on it after their "business" and countless more of Mother Nature's creatures scamper across it.

Studies have shown that decreasing the amount of sugar intake also aids in keeping your body less susceptible to bacterial or viral infection. In addition to that, keep your nose moist with an item like saline nasal mist or a humidifier. This has been known to prevent infection as well. Continue fighting the germ war by giving them the old one-two punch! Use preventative measures both inside and outside your body.

Reality in Real Estate

Too often in the world of real estate home sellers are led down a path that looks "oh so rosy" but is absolutely counterproductive to the business of getting the home sold.

I'm speaking of listing agents who will overprice a property, building up the seller's hopes and eventually putting the home seller in the plight of having to chase the

Some brokers believe it's OK to price a home high, figuring it's the one sure way to get the listing (hey, you can reduce the price later). I totally disagree with this philosophy. With all the information available to homebuyers these days - at virtually the click of a mouse away – it astonishes me that professional Realtors would put their clients through this game.

Let me give you an example of what I am referring to. This is an account of an actual listing that started out with a discount broker and evolved with zero success for the seller.

7/1/2008 – property listed for \$529,000.

8/16/2008 – price reduced to \$479,000.

11/6/2008 – price reduced to \$424,000.

1/30/2009 - listing expired. 2/14/2009 – property is

relisted at \$389,000. 8/14/2009 – listing expires again.

8/15/2009 – property is relisted, this time to a reasonably priced \$339,000.

9/18/2009 – seller withdraws listing from the MLS 33 days into a 6 month listing contract.

9/22/2009 - seller relists the property with a different agency for \$359,000.

Can you see what I mean about chasing the market? This seller was led down the primrose path at the outset and then, once they reached a reasonable list price of \$339,000, chose to change agencies after 33 days into the third listing period, raising the price by \$20,000.

Needless to say, the home is still sitting on the market.

How much money has this seller lost in nearly 16 months of a declining market? Not to mention at least 16 months of payments and taxes on a property they obviously want to sell!

Real estate is local and values as well as markets differ all across the country. However, one thing is constant: if your home is overpriced, not only will it not sell but it will not appraise (which brings up a totally different set of issues).

The truth about value – it may or may not be what you want to hear – can sometimes be evasive but it cannot be denied!

Fire Destroys Washington Place Home

On the evening of December 11, 2009, several 911 calls were made to dispatch reporting a fire on Washington Place, near Terrace Avenue.

At 21:32, the Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department was dispatched to a working fire consuming the front porch, with heavy smoke throughout the structure.

Coincidently, while driving by, off-duty Detective Sergeant Joseph Rinke noticed the fire, and putting himself at risk, alerted the occupants and escorted them out the rear door. Rinke suffered minor smoke inhalation and was transported to HUMC.

First Assistant Chief Kevin Todd, first on the scene within three minutes of the alarm, confirmed a working fire that was engulfing the porch and traveling to the second and third floors.

Fire Chief Michael Ratkowski arrived moments later, assumed overall command and Todd assumed operations.

A F.A.S.T. Team and Engine Company from Carlstadt and a Tower Ladder from Little Ferry were immediately called to the scene and arrived moments later.

Wallington Engine Company and Lodi Tower Ladder arrived at the scene with manpower. (Extra manpower needed due to the 27° temperature.)

A 3rd alarm stood by at HHFD Headquarters.

Heights Engine 2 approached from Burton Avenue, connected to a hydrant with a 5" supply line, advanced to

the front of the structure and a team began an interior attack with two 2" hand lines -- one on the porch and on the first

Ex-Chief Tony Greco coordinated field communications from the Rescue Truck.

Heights Ladder entered the structure and started to open up interior walls and ceilings on the first floor.

Due to the heavy volume of fire, Engine 1 connects a 5" supply line at Terrace Avenue and approaches.

Two 2-inch hand lines were stretched to the second floor.

Little Ferry Tower set up for a roof vent. Manpower from Little Ferry Ladder assisted Heights Ladder in putting up ground ladders.

Manpower from Carlstadt Engine 701 assisted with opening up walls and ceilings on the second floor.

About four 2" hand lines were actively attacking the blaze inside.

After the initial porch fire was extinguished, firefighters did an aggressive interior attack. The fire was rapidly spreading through the walls and extended to all three floors due to the balloon frame construction.

Because of the wind and extreme heat, firefighters used hand lines to protect the exposures of the adjoining homes and investigated the interiors with thermal imaging cameras.

Due to heavy fire conditions and ceiling collapses on the second and third floors, Chief Ratkowski sounded the

evacuation tones and began an exterior attack.

Firefighters went into a master stream attack from both Heights Ladder and Little Ferry Tower positioned on Washington Place.

After the heavy fire was knocked down, firefighters went in for another interior attack, and overhauled any remaining hot spots.

Engine companies from Lodi and Moonachie that were standing by at HQ were called to the scene for manpower.

At about 22:45, a fire officer complained of dizziness and chest discomfort and was transported to HUMC.

Due to icy conditions, the HH DPW was called in to salt the area about midnight.

The fire was under control about midnight and firefighters fought persistent hot spots on the first and second floors.

The front porch collapsed at 01:00 with no injuries. Mutual aid companies were released.

Heights returned to HQ at about 01:30 and spent about 45 minutes repacking hoses, cleaning tools and refilling air tanks. Although released from the scene, Moonachie FD assisted. Also, the Moonachie EMS Squad stayed at HQ and checked out every firefighter.

The 100+ year old home sustained significant damage and was declared uninhabitable. Public Service shut off all utilities.

About 75 volunteer firefighters from Carlstadt, East Rutherford, Garfield, Little Ferry, Lodi and Moonachie, Wallington and Box 54 assisted the HHFD.

About 25 EMS from Carlstadt, Heights, Lodi and Moonachie worked the scene. South Bergen Zone 2 Coordinator Mark Tomko coordinated mutual aid support.

Hackensack Mask Service Unit provided air tank refills.

The cause of the fire is under investigation by Heights fire officials, but not considered suspicious. Smoke detectors were operational. ###
