Home Equity Loan vs. Line of Credit

Both are sometimes referred to as second mortgages, because they're secured by your property, just like your original (first) mortgage. Home equity loans and lines of credit are usually for a shorter term than first mortgages. The most common type of mortgage runs 30 years, while equity loans typically have a life of 5 to 15 years.

The loan

A home equity loan, sometimes called a term loan, is a one-time lump sum that is paid off over a set amount of time, with a fixed interest rate and the same payments each month. Once you get the money, you cannot borrow further from the loan.

The line

A home equity line of credit (HELOC) works more like a credit card. You are allowed to borrow up to a certain amount for the life of the loan -- a time limit set by the lender. During that time you can withdraw money as you need it. As you pay off the principal, your credit revolves and you can use it again. Let's say you have a \$10,000 line of credit. You borrow \$5,000, but then pay back \$3,000 toward the principal. You now have \$8,000 in available credit. This gives you more flexibility than a fixedrate home equity loan. Credit lines have a variable interest rate that fluctuates over the life of the loan. Payments will vary depending on the interest rate and how much credit you have used. When the life span of a line of credit has expired, everything must be paid off. A lender may or may not allow a renewal.

Lines of credit are accessed by specially issued checks or a credit card. Lenders often require you to take an initial advance when you set up the loan, withdraw a minimum amount each time you dip into it and keep a minimum

Full Wolf Moon

amount outstanding. Financial institutions negotiate a home equity loan just like they do a mortgage: You have to pay off the loan or line of credit when you sell the house.

Which type should you choose?

The answer to this question is seldom black and white. To help you determine which loan best suits your needs, ask yourself:

- When do I need the money?
- For how long do I need the money? Is it for a short-term purpose, or a long-term?
- How long do I need to pay it off?
- How big a monthly payment can I handle?
- Would a line of credit tempt me to use the money carelessly because it works similar to having a charge card or checking account?

Ask your lender:

• How long is the term of

the closed-end loan?

- What is the life span of a line of credit?
- How large a line of credit do I qualify for?
- Is my line of credit renewable when the life of the loan expires?
- What are the interest
- Do I have to use my credit line right away? (If you're opening a credit line for future or emergency needs, you'll want one that doesn't require a minimum draw at closing.)
- Under what circumstances can you freeze, reduce or demand full payment of my loan?
- Can I lease my house during the time of the loan?
- Will you loan to me if my house is on the market (and at what rate)?
- If interest rates go down, how low will my loan go? ###

Shingles --More than just a rash!

Shingles is the result of the herpes zoster or varicella zoster virus becoming reactivated in the body.

While you may think that you haven't had this virus, you probably have under the name of chickenpox. Next you might say that you've never had chickenpox. Well, studies show that over 99% of Americans 40 years of age and older have indeed had chickenpox even though they might not remember it.

Now you're about to say that you're not going to get

shingles because, well, you're just not going to.

Well, my friends, over 1 million people in the United States of America get shingles each year and it occurs more commonly in people 50 years of age or older.

So, all kidding aside, now it's time to learn about the disease and how we can prevent it or at least lessen its effects.

A lot of information circulating around is that all shingles is a rash. It's deeper than that. It may start out with a patch of small red spots that turn into blisters.

However, these blisters become filled with fluid and

can become infected and, more important to know, painful.

The rash usually appears on one side of the body and may also present symptoms of fever, headache, chills, and upset stomach.

The rash, in some cases, can last anywhere from 2 to 4 weeks and, in a lot of cases, the pain subsides as the rash subsides.

Unfortunately, some people experience something called post-herpetic neuralgia. This is severe pain that continues after the rash has cleared and lasts anywhere from months to years.

This is caused by the virus traveling along the nerve roots along that one side of the body, usually starting mid-back going toward the chest and sometimes involving one side of the face and eye.

Now, that you're sitting on the edge of your seats wondering what horrifying fact I'm going to state next, I'll tell you how to prevent or at least lessen the effects a case of shingles could have on you.

There is a vaccine called Zostavax that has shown to reduce the risk of shingles by 51% and also lessen the risk of post-herpetic neuralgia due to the shingles by 67%.

This vaccine does not treat shingles or the post-herpetic neuralgia associated with shingles. This vaccine is most effective in people age 60-69 but may offer some protection in older people.

If you've had shingles, you can get the vaccine because it will help with preventing a

reoccurrence and/or the postherpetic neuralgic pain.

Tooth Erosion: How acid reflux disease damages teeth.

First reported more than 200 years ago, dental erosion still continues to be a major concern for dentists and consumers. Twenty decades ago, studies reported dental erosion occurred because of industrial hazards, specifically when workers were exposed to acidic aerosols.

In recent years, everyday foods and drinks such as lemons, pickles, sodas and sugary, starchy goods have been associated with tooth erosion. People now also need to be aware of another danger that causes permanent and severe loss of tooth structure, acid reflux-induced erosion, a condition that occurs when stomach contents reflux into the mouth.

Because stomach acid has an extremely low pH of 2.0, it has the potential to cause significant chemical erosion. Certain foods, beverages and habits are known to cause acid reflux and as a preventive measure, individuals should be aware of the products they consume. Spicy, fatty, fried foods, citric fruits and beverages and dairy products can lead to acid reflux

In addition to taking the steps necessary to establish a healthier eating lifestyle, it's important to make your dentist aware of any medical conditions and medical history in general. Treating reflux-induced erosion without treating and preventing the medical condition that causes the erosion may only lead to more severe problems for your oral health in the future.

If acid reflux-induced erosion is diagnosed:

- Avoid eating acidic foods and foods that can cause acid reflux (tomatoes, citric fruits, spicy and fried foods, fatty meats, dairy, chocolate and caffeine are all culprits).
- Avoid brushing for 60 minutes after reflux episodes
- Rinse mouth with water after reflux episodes.
- Take a sugar-free antacid and let it dissolve in the mouth
- Chew xylitol gum or other sugarless gums, lozenges or candies.

Reverse Mortgages: Fantastic Deal or Pure Fantasy?

The market for reverse mortgages is poised for expansion as the baby boomer generation retires.

Lenders are aggressively marketing reverse mortgages, tapping celebrities, Hollywood actors and former US Senator Fred Thompson as spokespeople, and holding seminars at senior centers to sell the loans.

In this current struggling economy, older homeowners are turning to reverse mortgages as a way to pull money out of their homes, with the loan not coming due until the borrower dies.

The opportunity for older Americans to tap into home equity sounds like a great idea but consumer advocates say seniors should only use reverse mortgages as a last resort because the fees - origination fees, closing costs and compounding interest on loan principal – can be high and the loans could impact eligibility for government assistance programs such as Medicaid.

Also, if borrowers deplete home equity they could have a harder time finding long term care and - sadly - won't have much to pass on to the kids, the grandkids.

Indeed, a reverse mortgage can sometimes drain the equity in a home (especially in today's market of declining real estate value) and leave heirs with little or nothing. (In the case of debt

- when the amount of money owed is more than the amount borrowed - it gets transferred to the owner's estate.)

For these and other reasons (scam artists abound here!), reverse mortgages are never really a desirable option.

If the only wealth you have is your home equity, it might just be time to sell your home.

Face facts: if you're finding yourself in a situation of need, can you really afford to retire?

It may be wiser to take on a part-time job for some extra income and consider moving into a smaller house or into a nice apartment, because as you get older, you won't be able to keep the house up and too much of your life will be invested in one piece of property.

My advice: stay away from reverse mortgages; they're not the answer.

A box truck traveling south on Hackensack Street, struck the vehicle and careened into a utility pole.


There were two adults and a child in a car seat in the vehicle. The passenger and child left the vehicle without assistance.

Redneck Avenue Moved

Traffic on Redneck Avenue Port Authority. changed lanes on December 10, 2010.

The Port Authority funded the relocation of about 1,200 feet of Redneck Avenue 300 feet to the east -- from south of the ball fields to a new intersection constructed on Moonachie Avenue.

In addition to the grading and prep work of the new Redneck Avenue, the movement of the road sitework included:

- The relocation of a 36" gas main on old Redneck to under new Redneck Avenue.
- The relocation of a 12" gas main to the south side of Moonachie Avenue.
- The relocation of a 138 KV PSE&G transmission line and a 13KV PSE&G distribution line.
- Verizon communication lines.
 - United Water line.

New traffic signals were installed at new Redneck Avenue and Moonachie Avenue. Installation was overseen by Bergen County, paid for by the

The intersection was improved with a new left turn lane from new Redneck Avenue onto Moonachie Avenue.

With completion of the new roadway, old Redneck will be taken out and replaced with grass.

New fencing will be installed along new Redneck Avenue, so that the The Instrument Landing System (ILS) which was installed in 1998-99, will be located within the airport perimeter.

The scope of the initial project began in October 2005 and design work started in 2006. Once the drawings were fine tuned, and all permits set, the bid process began. The contract to relocate Redneck Avenue was awarded on November 13, 2009. The basic contract was \$10 to \$11 million dollars.

This roadway realignment project required a completely new drainage system; not moving East Riser Ditch, just modifying it.

This project affected only the East Riser Ditch section now under old Redneck Avenue. These drainage improvements are not affected by

At the early stages of grading Redneck Avenue, interlocking steel sheeting was installed to keep the roadway stable, avoid erosion and roadway movement towards East Riser Ditch (about 50 yards parallel to the roadway).

These steel barriers included holes for drainage of detained water to East Riser Ditch.

The roadway sub-surface included a detention system between the old and new roads. It temporary collects and holds excess water for a natural dispersion.

The movement of Redneck Avenue completes a segment of the overall project which includes additional drainage improvements, building a green wall, etc.

All this was in an effort to improve the runway safety area at the runway south end and make room for an EMAS (Engineered Material Arresting System).

And I remember most especially the great promise of the gospel of John, "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has never overcome it." (John 1:14) ###

Holy Trinity Lutheran Church Celebrates its 90th Year

Part 1

A History by Charles Austin

When a small group of Hasbrouck Heights Lutherans met on July 18, 1920 to begin what would become Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, the nation was edging into one of the most troublesome and turbulent decades of its history.

The country was still flush with the optimism created by the end of the Great War. But as the year began, Prohibition, that great and ultimately catastrophic "social experiment" had become the law of the land.

President Woodrow Wilson was failing in his attempt to get the United States behind the League of Nations. Adolph Hitler presented his National Socialist program to a rally in Munich.

Post-war global conflicts had an impact within the United States sometimes leading to widespread fear of foreigners.

Federal raids earlier in 1920 had rounded up 4,000 suspected communists and anarchists. Many were held without trial and over 500 were deported.

On September 16 of that year, an explosives-laden horse cart crashed into lunchtime crowds on Wall Street, killing 38 people and injuring 143 others. No one was ever convicted of the crime, which was eventually attributed to anarchists opposed to U.S. capitalism.


Those gathered in what was a Baptist chapel on the corner of Hamilton and Burton Avenues probably saw what was going on around them as a further reason to seek God's guidance and protection.

By September of 1920, just after that Wall Street bombing and a month after the nation's first commercial radio station went on the air, the Rev. Carl Zinsmeister arrived to be pastor of Holy Trinity, and the congregation was officially organized on Reformation Day - October 31. A total of 57 people signed the charter and the congregation's constitution, written in elegant cursive script in the first parish registry.

There were probably earlier baptisms, but the first one recorded was Arthur Charles Ward, made a child of God on March 12, 1922.

When the Rev. Otto Becker came to Holy Trinity, the parish was yoked with Grace Lutheran Church in River Edge.

Soon Holy Trinity had purchased the building from the Baptists, another step on the road to independence. That came in March of 1925, when Holy Trinity completed major



renovations to the building and rededicated the Church. Two years later, under the pastoral leadership of the Rev. Charles Schmidling, who had also been jointly serving in Hasbrouck Heights and Grace Lutheran in River Edge, the congregation became self-supporting.

Wall Street crashed in 1929 and the nation plunged into the darkness of the Depression. In 1930, as Mahatma Ghandi began protesting British rule in India and Ellen Church became the first airline stewardess serving passengers on a flight from Oakland, California, to Chicago, the Rev. Alfred Weber was serving Holy Trinity.

By 1940 Holy Trinity grew to nearly 500 baptized members and a house was purchased for a parsonage. By that time, more than 100 baptisms had been celebrated at the Hasbrouck Heights Church since those 52 people had first worshipped 20 years earlier.

Parish records suggest some "lean times" during World War II. Pastor William Behrens had arrived in 1942 and, as American soldiers were returning from the war, the congregation paid off its mortgage and began installing stained glass windows. These windows, depicting Bible stories, can still be seen in the sanctuary today.

The congregation had an impact on the broader Church during the post-war years. Pastor Behrens and Holy Trinity member Alfred Kiefer were involved in the formation of the New Jersey Synod, United Lutheran Church in America. The ULCA later merged with other Lutheran denominations to become the Lutheran Church in America, and another merger in 1987 created today's Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

By 1952, hundreds of weddings, confirmations and other celebrations had taken place at Holy Trinity. Pastors had preached nearly 2,000 sermons and members had given tens of thousands of dollars and untold hours of time to Christ's mission in Hasbrouck Heights and around the world. Pastor Herman Meiburg began his ministry at Holy Trinity in 1952 and would remain for the next 31 years.

The decades of the 1950s and 1960s were years of growth. A new parsonage was built in 1961. An education wing was added in 1962 and, in 1963, the old Church was razed as the congregation built a new sanctuary and fellowship hall. The mortgages were probably the standard 25-year contracts, but Holy Trinity paid them all off in 1968 largely through a gift from a donor who was a nonmember of Holy Trinity but a good friend to Pastor Meiburg and to the congregation.

Those years also brought struggle to the nation. School desegregation troubled many communities. Growing concern over U.S. military power and the war in Vietnam sent demonstrators into the streets.

During those years, Lutherans in the United States sought greater unity.



Day of Infamy Remembered

About 250 people attended the Remembrance Service held at the USS Ling New Jersey Naval Museum, December 5, 2010, at 1 p.m. -- the 69th Anniversary of the Attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941.

Several Veterans' groups, Army Air Forces Historical Association, Sea Cadets and civilians were there to honor the memory of the 2,402 Americans lost, 1,282 injured, five of eight battleships that were sunk or sinking with the rest damaged, several other ships and Hawaii-based combat planes that were knocked out by the Japanese "sneak attack."

The memorial program began with Tom Conlon calling the program to order. There was the Presentation of The Colors by several groups followed by the Pledge of Allegiance led by Brianna Conlon.

Veterans Awards were presented by Ms. Patricia O'Rourke, Director, Retail Service Center, Tiffany and Co., who presented the first award to a Pearl Harbor survivor. Every Veteran present also received this gift from Tiffany & Co., -- a signed, crystal American Flag paperweight presented in their signature blue box -- alovely remembance to treasure.

It was a solemn moment when Basil Kio read the names of the "WWII Boats on Eternal Patrol," with Ray Marshall "tolling the bell."

WWII SubVets, SEA Cadets and Boy and Cub Scouts stationed a wreath beneath the flagpole. There was a rifle salute by Gooney Bird Detachment, Marine Corps League.

Ken Odgers, Bugler, B.A.A., played Taps. Chester Skrocki, Chaplain, WWII Sub-Vets, gave the Benediction.


