Accurately dressed in eighteenth century clothing and playing music on the harpsichord and violin, the Ministers of Apollo performed in Wood-Ridge, on December 8, 2013. Their stage was the parlor of the historic Arnault/ Bianchi House. Their audience consisted of members of the Wood-Ridge Historical Society and their friends.

The duo of Erik Lichack on the harpsichord and Melanie Zanakis on the violin performed music selections that were fashionable in American and British homes in New York City around 1776.

The Ministers of Apollo was founded in 2007. Apollo, according to Greek and Roman mythology, is known as the god of all refined arts, especially music. His consorts, the Muses, were believed to inspire all creativity and kindle the emotions. They gave the impulse to

dance and sing. The name, the Ministers of Apollo, signifies those who are influenced by the Muses and devote themselves to the refined arts.

Mr. Lichack holds a BA in Music Education, with a concentration in harpsichord. He is co-author of the book "Military Music of the American Revolution," which is actively being used by West Point bands.

Miss Zanakis holds a BA in classics, and is currently finishing her BM in violin performance.

She also performs as a soprano and keyboardist. She is a researcher of Neo-Classical culture, rhetoric, and more particularly, hairstyles and cosmetics; replicating authentic powders, pomatums, and fashions for the headdresses of England and America from the 1770s to the 1790s. 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
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Santa Arrives at Teterboro Airport

Filling You In

A Reason To Smile

Replacing missing teeth can radically improve a person's smile and quality of life. Whether you're young, old, or in-between, dentures can help improve the way you look, feel, eat, and speak. It can even help your self-confidence.

What is a denture?

A denture is a custommade removable replacement for missing teeth and adjacent tissues. It is made of acrylic resin, sometimes in combination with various metals. A full or complete denture replaces all of the teeth, while a partial denture fills in the spaces created by missing teeth and prevents other teeth from changing position.

What causes tooth loss?

Patients can become entirely edentulous (without teeth) due to many reasons, the most prevalent being removal because of dental disease (e.g., periodontal disease and tooth decay). Other reasons include tooth developmental defects caused by severe malnutrition, genetic defects, trauma, or drug use.

Who needs a denture?

Both younger patients and older patients can be fitted for dentures.

Candidates for complete dentures have lost most or all of their teeth. A partial denture is suitable for those who have some natural teeth remaining.

Dentures can help patients in a number of ways, including:

- Mastication—chewing ability is improved by replacing edentulous areas with dentures.
- Aesthetics—the presence of teeth provides a natural facial appearance. Wearing a denture to replace missing teeth provides support for the lips and cheeks, correcting the collapsed appearance that occurs after losing teeth.
- Phonetics—replacing missing teeth helps improve pronunciation of syllables and vowels.
- Self-esteem—patients feel better about themselves.

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How do you care for dentures?

A denture is fragile, so it is important to handle it with

Remove and brush the denture daily, preferably with a brush designed specifically for cleaning dentures, using a denture cleanser. Never use harsh, abrasive cleansers, including toothpastes, because they may scratch the surface of the denture, leaving it susceptible to plaque and stains.

Don't sterilize your denture with boiling water because it will cause it to become warped. If you wear a partial denture, be sure to remove it before brushing your natural

Why do I have to clean my dentures?

Keeping your dentures clean is vital for good oral health and overall health. Like natural teeth, dentures attract plaque, become stained, and collect food particles that can cause bad breath or irritate your gums.

Should dentures be worn at night?

If you're new to wearing dentures, your dentist may advise you to wear it almost constantly during the first two weeks—even while you sleep.

Under normal circumstances, however, it is considered best to remove it at night. Removing the denture at night allows the gum tissue to rest and allows normal stimulation and cleansing by the tongue and saliva.

Clean your dentures in cleanser solution, as directed by your dentist. When not in use,

you should soak your dentures in water. Get in the habit of keeping the denture in the same safe and handy place to reduce the likelihood of misplacing it.

How often should I see my dentist?

It is important to continue having regular dental checkups so your dentist can examine your oral tissues for signs of disease or cancer. As you age, your mouth will continue to change. To maintain a proper fit over time, it may be necessary to adjust or possibly remake your denture. Never attempt to adjust a denture yourself. When in doubt, consult your dentist.



It was anything but a party especially if you had to make an important call only to pick up the receiver and have it tied up by two housewives talking about a recipe over a cup of coffee. "We know you're listening" they used to tell me as I eaves dropped "we can hear you breathing!"

Back then, by the time you finished dialing the number you had forgotten why you made the call. No sooner did you reach your party when someone was telling you to hurry up and get off the line.

Yes folks there were, in fact, remote phones in those days...we called them "phone booths."

Artful Thinking family member Angelo Salvato has his own version of "back then."

To Angelo it was when he first discovered the Borough of Lodi back in 1954, after marrying a local girl by the name of Norma Perini of Washington

Angelo, who was born in New York City in 1927, moved to New Jersey in 1936. After serving in the military at the end of WWII he married Miss Perini who he had met at a Passaic YMCA dance. They were married at the St. Joseph Church in September of 1953 and moved to James Place in Lodi in the spring of 1955.

Norma was a product of the Lodi school system and graduated from LHS in 1944 as class valedictorian. She became an office worker at Lodi's United Piece Dye Works and later as an executive secretary at Teterboro Aeronautics.

Angelo went to work for ITT as an electronic technician where he remained a worker in good standing for 40 years.

Angelo recalls Lodi's "old" Main Street upon which many of his memories were built.

He can still see the American Theater, Mayor Joseph when telephones were plugged Luna, Durcee's Bakery and of course the now legendary Modern Bakery where folks came from surrounding towns to buy a few dozen of those fresh baked, still warm rolls.

That was Angelo's "back

then" and he is first to admit that although some of the changes have been overwhelming he has enjoyed every one

The next time you happen to be driving down Farnham Avenue, picture it being a dirt road surrounded by hills and vacant barns with no more than a house or two along the way.

Somewhere up in those rolling hills my cousin Anthony Maglionico and I, along with the rest of the kids from Westervelt Place, used to camp out, roast potatoes and drink water out of WWII canteens.

The potatoes probably came from Albano's grocery store on the corner of Arnot Street and Westervelt Place compliments of their son Rocco who was one potato short of getting his "you know what" roasted if his Mother found out. How's that for a "back then"

Now this is going to sound a bit farfetched but it's true.

When I was a kid growing up on the Lodi hill, better known "back then" as Nanny Goat Hill, an old man used to pick up discarded kitchen appliances, car parts, copper tubing and glass bottles with a horse drawn reinforced wooden cart.

I'm not kidding folks, the horse had to be at least 17 hands high and had hooves the size of tennis rackets.

My Father called it a "work horse "since it was reduced to pulling all that reusable junk up and down the steep hills of Lodi.

This one particular day the horse, as it clippity clopped past my house, threw one of its shoes.

The old man climbed down from the cart picked up the large metal shoe and handed it to me. "Keep it" he said "It will bring you good luck."

Here I am sixty years later with that same horse shoe in my possession still waiting for the good luck to arrive.

Well I guess living long enough to actually write about it in this column could be considered "good luck."

In that case I'd better end this column now before my luck runs out! ###

Real Estate 101, Part 1

With the New Year just beginning and things, admittedly, a bit slow around here in frosty Bergen County, let's take time and review a few real estate basics, the benefits of home ownership.

Let's start with the advantages of "Owning a Home vs. Renting." Two things to consider here...

1. Steady Payments: One of the first differences to realize when considering owning versus renting is what happens to your payments over time?

Most bank mortgages have four parts included in their payments: principal, interest, taxes and insurance.

This is referred to as PITI. The largest portion of the payment is the principal and interest, or "PI."

If you buy a home with a fixed rate mortgage, then your PI payments will stay the same for 30 years.

The only change will be for insurance and taxes each year, but the major portion of your payment stays constant.

If you compare that to renting, most landlords raise

their rents every year with the rate of inflation. Consistency in your payment from year to year gives you stability in your family budget and the ability to plan as well as protection against inflation and higher interest rates.

2. Tax Savings. Even though there have been discussions lately in Congress about how they want to get rid of this benefit. Currently home owners still get to take advantage of this huge benefit of deducting the interest portion of our mortgage payments from our taxes.

Most renters I talk to are really unaware of this significant benefit.

See, when you rent, you are paying a mortgage payment... your landlord's. This mortgage payment includes a principal portion that pays down the balance of the loan every month, but it also includes an interest portion which pays the bank for the right to use the money.

Congress knows that there are many benefits not only to individual families, but to the national economy to increasing home ownership.

So, many years ago, the U.S. government decided that

as an incentive to get more people to buy a home, they would give all home owners the ability to deduct the interest portion of the mortgage payment from their taxes.

This can be the difference from being able to itemize your taxes and taking the standard deduction.

Because of the way mortgage payments are calculated, the majority of the interest is paid up front, so the first 5-10 years you live in a home most of the payment you make can be deducted from your regular income.

This is like giving yourself a raise of a couple to maybe several thousands of dollars a year, just by switching from paying your landlord's mortgage to paying your own mortgage.

If you buy a home, you can go to your employer today and ask to change your deductions that they take out of your paycheck and immediately put more money in your pocket every month...starting right

Steady payments and Tax Savings are pretty good reasons to own a home but they pale to what we will see in my next few articles. Stick around!

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Veterans Today

"Don't fire till you see the whites of their eyes."

During the Revolution, General Nathaniel Greene had been appointed Commanding General of the Southern Army.

One of the first things he did when he took Command was to send a letter to Daniel Morgan. Morgan was a General earlier in the War. He was a Veteran of the French and Indian War. He drove wagons for General Edward Braddock in the Campaign that led to Braddock's defeat in 1755.

During the Revolution, he fought in Quebec and at Saratoga and gave great service to the cause, but due to ill health, and a disagreement with Congress he retired in the summer of 1779.

Morgan was a hard driving, hard fighting, tough leader. Greene wanted him back. To our great luck, Morgan accepted General Greene's request and showed up in camp at Hillsboro, North Carolina. Morgan had no money, so he brought along a horse to sell to pay for his traveling expenses. He was poor in money, but, rich in the spirit of Liberty.

General Greene had many problems. The Army was short of clothes and food. The land had been stripped bare from the recent campaign. As always, they needed more men to recruit before they could fight General Cornwallis' Army.

Greene separated his small army in two. This is a dangerous move but, he had little choice. It would be easier to feed them if they were not altogether. On December 20, 1780, he sent General Morgan, with four regiments of infantry and one company of rifles, along with Colonel William Washington's Calvary, to Fort Ninety Six. They can take forage along the way, boost the morale of the troops and take the fort if possible.

In Camden, South Carolina General Cornwallis was recovering from a fever. Sick as he was, he recognized an opportunity when he saw one.

He sent the Seventh Royal Fusiliers, the 71st Highlanders, the 17th light Dragoons, and the British Legion along with two three pound cannons, about 750 men in all, under the Command of Lt. Col. Banastre Tarleton, to defeat Morgan.

Tarleton was no stranger

to the Americans. He had a reputation of being brave in battle. He was a fast riding, hard charging and swift to attack Commander.

He also had a reputation of executing prisoners after they surrendered. His men were reported to have bayonetted wounded men on the ground after the battle of the Waxhaws.

Morgan moved south and crossed over the Broad River in South Carolina. Messengers came to camp reporting Tarleton's approach. Here, Morgan paused.

He selected a piece of open ground next to the Pacolet River and the Broad River and prepared to fight. This piece of land was used for the cattle to graze and was called the Cowpens by the locals. He knew the Militia had a habit of running.

He made the controversial decision of putting the Broad River in behind them. He risked complete destruction with no place to retreat.

On the night of January 16, 1781 Morgan went to each camp and told them the Militia would be in the front line. He told them to fire three times and fall back behind the main line.

All night he encouraged his men. He told them he would "crack a whip over Ben Tarleton in the morn, as sure as they lived." "Hold your head up boys." "Three fires and you will be free." "The day would be ours." Telling them, "God helps those that help themselves." The men took heart and prepared for battle.

Early on the morning of January 17, 1781, Morgan's pickets and scouts were driven in by Tarleton's approach.

General Dan Morgan never blinked, didn't waver, and true to his spirit woke his men with a thunderous shout. "Up boys... Benny's coming".

He placed Maryland and Delaware Continental troops on his main line. With them on the left were Virginia and Georgia Militia. Virginia Continentals anchored the right of his main line.

He put North and South Carolina Militia along with Virginia Militia in front of the main line, then 150 skirmishers about 150 yards in front of the second line. Each line was about 150 yards apart.

His Calvary was placed in the rear to be used wherever they would be needed.

It was bitterly cold that morning as Lt. Col. Banastre Tarleton moved onto the battle-field and put his troops in one line with the two cannons in the center.

He kept the 71st as a reserve and put Dragoons on each of his flanks.

Tarleton was used to fighting Militia that ran away, so he sent his line forward even when not everyone was ready.

His field pieces fired from the center. These did little damage to the Americans. As the British line moved closer, Morgan rode among the troops saying, "don't fire till you see the whites of their eyes."

The Americans fired first with a few shots then the entire line fired. The British troops with disciplined precision fired as one solid unit. The skirmishers as planned moved into the Militia's line.

The shooting on the front lasted till the British charged with the bayonets. Andrew Pickens, who was in charge of the Militia, moved his front line Militia, as planned to the left side of the Continental line. Before they could get there, the British Dragoons charged them slashing with sabers and knocking men down with their horses

Col. William Washington seeing this charged with his own Calvary.

Witnesses reported an unbelievable violent clash of horses and sabers. Men fell from their horses, shot, stabbed and wounded. The British Dragoons not able to withstand the counter attack were driven from the field with Washington's men in pursuit.

Morgan's main line was now engaged all along the front, shooting from one end of the line to the other. Morgan rode along the line screaming to his men, "one more fire boys and the day is ours. Old Morgan has never been beaten."

Tarleton, seeing his Dragoons in flight sent in his reserve, on the field of battle marched the 71st Highlanders.

Lt. Col. John Edgar Howard seeing the 71st moving onto the field ordered the Virginia Continentals to change their front so they don't get outflanked. The order was misunderstood and the Virginian troops began to retreat.

General Morgan rode up and asked what was happening and Howard told him all was under control, the men misunderstood. Morgan rode to a point he wanted them to be and they formed the new front line.

This maneuver was seen by the British and they assumed the Americans were retreating. So they charged forward.

When they came over the small hill they found not retreating troops but troops in an orderly battle line. The Virginians fired a devastating volley and British troops dropped all

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around.

Lt. Col. Howard seeing this ordered a bayonet charge. The Continentals surged forward with a shout and the British retreated in disorder.

Howard called to Captain Ewing to take the guns. Ewing and his men fought in hand-to-hand combat with the gun crews. The cannons were taken. In a display of magnificent heroism, not one of the British gun crews ran from the field. All fifty men fell at the side of their guns.

Science takes over. A body in motion wants to stay in motion. Once the British began to retreat Tarleton could not stop them. Those that were not captured ran down the road whence they came. Tarleton soon followed.

Gen. Dan Morgan had beaten the hated Tarleton. The battle of Cowpens cost the British 110 dead, 702 prisoners, two three pound cannon, 35 wagons and baggage, and large quantities of ammunition. The Americans had 12 men killed and 60 wounded.

Gen. Dan Morgan didn't take Fort Ninety Six, but he did one better. Lord Charles Cornwallis lost men and material he could not replace.

This battle helped put Lord Charles and his army on the road to Yorktown. This January on the 17th, take time to remember General Daniel Morgan and his men. They showed the best in the American fighting spirit, on a cold winter's day, in a back country piece of land, known as the Cowpens. ###

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Over 150 attended the Remembrance Service held at the USS Ling New Jersey Naval Museum on December 1, 2013, at 1 p.m. -- the 72nd Anniversary of the Attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941.

Several Veterans groups, Army Air Forces Historical Association and civilians were there to honor the memory of the 2,402 Americans lost, 1,282 injured, five of eight battleships that were sunk or sinking with the rest damaged, several other ships and Hawaii-based combat planes that were knocked out by the Japanese "sneak attack."

The memorial program began with Tom Conlon, USSVI National Secretary, calling the program to order.

There was the Presentation of The Colors. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Brianna Conlon and Tommy Vinacco. Bagpiper Steve Eltringham played, followed by the Invocation by Leslie Altschuler, Commander, USSV1 NJ-North Base. Remarks were made by Bergen County Executive Kathleen Donovan and Freeholder Maura DeNicola.
