

# **American Legion**

### James B. Scarr Post 106

Part Two of a series about our American Legion.

### The Post Begins

Francis Joseph Scarr, Jimmie's younger brother, was a senior at Rutgers when the US declared war.

He too was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant on May 17, 1917 and reported to Virginia to serve with the 318th Infantry Regiment, 80th Division

Francis Scarr was commissioned a First Lieutenant in December 1917 and was appointed Aide-de-Campe to major General C. S. Farnsworth, commander of the 37th Division, in May of 1918 and proceeded to France.

Promoted to Captain, August 22, 1918, Joseph Scarr was assigned to command Company D 136th Machine Gun Battalion, 37th Division.

Serving with Company D Captain Scarr fought in the Meuse-Argonne Offensive in late September 1918.

The 37th was moved towards Ypres, Belgium on October 22, 1918.

The Division was part of the Allied offensive to breach the German Lines at Ypres-Lys Belgium. On October 31, 1918 Captain Francis Scarr went over the top in command of Company D. He was wounded in the lower jaw, losing eight teeth.

It was for this bravery in action on this day that Captain Francis Scarr was awarded the French Croix de Guerre.

Captain Francis Scarr returned to the United States in December 1918 and spent some time recovering from his wounds.

After the war, he returned to Hasbrouck Heights.

Minutes from the organization meeting are as follows:

A meeting was held at the Library Hall on the evening of September 3, 1919 for the purpose of organizing a Post of the American Legion.

The meeting was called to order by Mr. D. A. Watt, who after a brief address, introduced Mr. Mulliken, the Field Secretary for Bergen County.

Mr. Mulliken explained the purpose and organization of the Legion.

At the completion of his address a request for a charter was signed by all present.

Mr. Mulliken suggested that temporary officers be chosen, and in line with this suggestion, the following were unanimously elected: Commander - F. J. Scarr, Vice Commander - M. M. Sheedy, Finance Officer - E. C. Ellis and Adjutant - A. E. Browne.

The election of Historian



and Chaplain was deferred until a future meeting.

The question of a suitable name for the Post was discussed at length, and it was finally decided that it would be named after someone who had entered the service for Hasbrouck Heights and who had died in the service.

A ballot was taken to decide after which man the Post should be named and the balloting resulted as follows: J. B. Scarr - 17, R. H. Elias - 6, A. Botsford - 5, and W. V. Capen - 3. The name of the Post was therefor declared to be the James B. Scarr Post.

The Commander an-

nounced the following committees:

Constitution: E. O. West, D.A. Watt, E. H. Schoonmaker and H. B. Pope.

Entertainment: G. G. Ulrich, W. H. Colvin, A. S. Chandless, F. T. Preusch and G. A. Hastings.

Membership: W. J. Keogh, B. E. Aspdin, A. Deurloo and G. Storck.

Publicity: H. G. Weimar, F. R. Coyle, G. F. Schweickert and I. E. Martin.

A vote of thanks was extended to Mr. Mulliken for his able assistance in the formation of the Post. On motion the meeting adjoined to meet on the evening of September 17th, at Library Hall.

Online banking isn't out to change your money habits. It simply uses today's technology to give you the option of bypassing the time-consuming, paper-based aspects of traditional banking in order to manage your finances more quickly and efficiently.

Whether your bank is a traditional brick and mortar institution or a Web-only bank with no brick and mortar branches, online banking lets you connect to your bank through the Internet and do things such as view your accounts, transfer money between accounts, view images of cancelled checks, print copies of those checks and pay bills online.

If you'd like to eliminate paper checks from your life, you'll find that a growing number of companies allow you to make automatic payments through your online banking account.

Getting started is easy! The bank's website will walk you through the steps of registering the bills you want to pay and the accounts you want to use to pay them. You'll only have to enter the information once. You can always make changes and add or subtract bills.

If a monthly bill is for the same amount each month, you might want to schedule a recurring payment. If the amount varies from month to month you can pay the bill each month on a "one time" basis.

Once you have registered the accounts you wish to pay online, the next step is to schedule payments. Your creditors receive your online payment in one of two ways: electronic payment or check. If the company is set up to accept electronic payments, your payment is automatically debited from your account and deposited electronically into their account. If the company can't accept electronic payments, your bank issues a check based on your online payment instructions.

Most bill payment sites include a payment activity page that lists all of your payments and their status — scheduled, pending or processed.

### Fireworks are Illegal in NJ

While people want to display their patriotism more than ever this 4th of July, the Hasbrouck Heights Police Department reminds residents and visitors that all fireworks including Chinese firecrackers, Roman candles, M80's, cherry bombs, salutes, M100's, etc., are illegal to possess, use or sell.

Sparklers, which can reach temperatures above 1,200 degrees Fahrenheit, can cause serious burns or set clothing on

Only paper and plastic caps, like those for toy guns, are allowed in New Jersey.

The HHPD stated that residents should leave fireworks displays to professionals who have a municipal permit and insurance as well as experience in handling these dangerous devices.

The Hasbrouck Heights Police Department noted that the vast majority of illegal fireworks are brought into New Jersey by adults and, as a result of such irresponsible actions, a disproportionate number of children suffer injuries.

In an effort to prevent injuries and property damage, state and local authorities have stepped up enforcement activities during the summer "fireworks season" confiscating illegal fireworks wherever found.

In any given year, the State Police confiscate between 500 and 1,000 cases of illegal fireworks or approximately six to eight tons of illegal explosives.

Possession of illegal fireworks is a disorderly person offense and is punishable by a fine of up to \$1,000 and/or up to 30 days in jail.

Possession with intent to sell is a Fourth Degree crime, punishable by fine of up to \$10,000 and/or up to 18 months in jail. ###

### Summer Safety

Fire Department offers these summer safety tips regarding hazardous materials.

Store gasoline in safety cans manufactured and labeled for that purpose.

Gasoline should never be stored inside your home because vapors can travel to a flame source and ignite. Gasoline should be stored outside, or in a well ventilated shed.

Don't refuel lawn mowers, trimmers, edgers or other gasoline powered equipment while hot because the fumes may ignite and start a flash fire. Allow the equipment to cool. Use a funnel to prevent spills.

Keep fertilizers and pool chemicals away from gasoline, oil and fuels. Pool chemicals (chlorites) and fertilizers (nitrates) are strong oxidizers and react violently with fuel vapors (hydrocarbons).

Powdered and pellet chlorine should be kept in a cool, dry place. If water enters a chlorine container, it can react and possibly explode.

Never add water to chlorine -- add chlorine to water to prevent a splash or violent reaction. Pesticides should not be accessible to children or pets and should be kept in tightly closed containers in a cool, dry place.

It is important to follow the instructions on the label for use and application. If exposed to pesticides, rinse the affected materials off immediately and seek emergency treatment. Bring the container with you to the medical facility if possible.

# Summer Pet Care

Oradell Veterinary Group offers these summer pet care tips:

During warm weather, the inside of your car can reach 120° in a matter of minutes, even if you're parked in the shade. Dogs and cats can't perspire and can only dispel heat by panting and through the pads of their feet. Pets who are left in hot cars even briefly can suffer from heat exhaustion, heat stroke, brain damage, and can even die. Play it safe by leaving your pet cool and refreshed at home while you're on the road.

If you see a pet in a car alone during the hot summer months (May through September), alert the management of the store where the car is parked. If the owner does not return promptly, call local animal control or the police department immediately.

Plant food, fertilizer, and insecticides can be fatal if your pet ingests them.

Make sure your pet is always wearing a collar and identification tag.

Check with your veterinarian to see if your pets should be taking heartworm prevention medication. Heartworm disease, which is transmitted by mosquitoes, can be fatal in both dogs and cats. Use only flea and tick treatments recommended by your veterinarian. Some over-the-counter flea and tick products can be toxic, even when used according to instructions.

Prevent free access to pools and always supervise a pet in a pool.

Provide plenty of water and shade for your pets so they can stay cool.

Pets need exercise even when it is hot, but extra care needs to be taken with older dogs, short-nosed dogs, and those with thick coats. On very hot days, limit exercise to early morning or evening hours. Keep in mind that asphalt gets very hot and can burn your pet's paws.

Pets can get sunburned too, and your pet may require sunscreen on his or her nose and ear tips. Pets with light-colored noses or light-colored fur on their ears are particularly vulnerable to sunburn and skin cancer.

Your pet can suffer from heat exhaustion and heat stroke. These conditions are

The Hasbrouck Heights very serious signs of heat stress, which could include heavy panting, glazed eyes, a rapid pulse, unsteadiness, a staggering gait, vomiting, or a deep red or purple tongue.

If your pet does become overheated, you need to immediately lower his body temperature. Move your pet into the shade and apply cool (not cold) water over his body to gradually lower his core body temperature. Apply cold towels or ice packs to your pet's head, neck, and chest only. Let your pet drink small amounts of water or lick ice cubes. Most important, get him to a veterinarian immediately. ###

In 1912, he saw Teddy Roosevelt in Hackensack.


In 1918, when he was 13 years old, he worked

### **Heights Police On The Run**

On June 3, 2005, about 9:30 a.m., the Hasbrouck Heights Police Department accepted the "Special Olympics" torch from the Lodi Police.

Several members of the HHPD carried the "Torch" to a brief ceremony held at Shop-Rite, then proceeded up Williams and along The Boulevard past the Circle.

The torch was then presented to the Wood-Ridge Police Department near the border. The HHPD run was about 2.4 miles.

The HHPD was part of the hundreds of NJ police officers in 18 separate legs as part of the 22nd Annual Torch Run.

Every police department in New Jersey participated.

The runs concluded at Rutgers Stadium at 7:00 p.m. that evening.

Last year \$1.6 million was raised for state athletes with

mental retardation and 100% of all the funds raised goes to the Special Olympics

Because of this fund-raising Law Enforcement Torch Run, New Jersey is one of the few states where Special Olympic athletes do not have to pay to participate.

The games opened Friday night at The College of New Jersey in Ewing, and continued through Sunday. About 2,500 athletes were expected to compete in eight sports.

The HHPD generated the second largest contribution in the state for the Special Olympics of about \$25,000 -- from combined efforts including school children fundraisers, beefsteak dinner, donations, etc.

This Torch Run has become the largest fundraiser and public awareness for Special Olympics in the world, raising over \$14 million dollars. ####

# **BBQ Grill Safety**

The backyard barbecue is a summer tradition enjoyed by many Hasbrouck Heights residents. The Fire Department urges outdoor chefs to be cautious when cooking outdoors.

Keep a fire extinguisher handy. Grills should not be placed next to your home's wall, underneath porches or overhangs, and never indoors.

Be sure to monitor active grills. Wear protective mitts or gloves while barbecuing.

Do not store gasoline or other flammable substances in the grill's vicinity.

Never move a grill or cover a grill if it is still hot. Always keep curious children away from hot grills. When a gas grill is not in use, remove control knobs and store them inside, away from children.

Lighting a charcoal grill requires caution. Use only the appropriate amount of lighter fluid, and NEVER substitute gasoline, kerosene or other flammable liquids for lighter fluid.

Adding starter fluid after the grill fire has been ignited is extremely hazardous as flames may jump out.

Charcoals should be left to burn out in your grill. Do not dispose of charcoals in trash cans or bring them indoors. Soak coals in water to ensure they are out.

Routinely clean ashes from the grill and inspect for holes or loose fittings.

Lighter fluids and "quickstart" charcoal should be stored outside and away from the home.

Gas grills should be cleaned at least once each season. Spiders often make their homes inside the components, and their webs can block off gas intake and damage your grill.

Use only a gas cylinder designed to store propane and only use a reputable propane supplier to fill it. If a new cylinder is being filled for the first

The backyard barbecue is time, tell your supplier so air can immer tradition enjoyed by be removed.

Most gas grill accidents are caused when propane tanks are hooked up incorrectly. Make sure the cylinder is equipped with an OPD (Over-Pressure Device). When changing propane cylinders, test the connection for leaks with soapy water and tighten as necessary.

Propane gas is odorless. A "rotten egg" odor is put into the gas so that it's easy to detect if a leak occurs.

If you smell the "rotten egg" odor near or around your propane gas cylinder immediately contact the Fire Department.

When not in use, keep the valve tightly closed and plugged with the "POL" left handed thread plug. This will seal the propane gas cylinder and help prevent leaks if the service valve is accidentally opened.

Never store propane gas cylinders inside an enclosed structure -- store and use outdoors only.

Handle cylinders gently -dents, gouges and rust can weaken cylinders.

Always keep cylinders upright and, when transporting, secure it in position. Keep your vehicle well ventilated when transporting cylinders.

Don't leave cylinder in a vehicle -- sitting in a hot vehicle can cause the safety relief valve to discharge gas!

No propane gas cylinder should be scrapped, destroyed, cut with a torch, punctured or have the service valve removed by the public.

Disposal in the municipal solid waste stream is prohibited. Hasbrouck Heights no longer accepts propane cylinders for disposal and/or recycling. ####


They left their bus as a announcement, "Let the Games ed team. A team ready for Begin!"

### Need Help with Medicare Prescription Drug Costs?

Conchita Parker, from the Tax Collector's Office, announced that if you are a Medicare beneficiary with limited income and resources, you may be able to get extra help paying for prescription drugs.

From June through August 2005, Medicare beneficiaries who may be eligible for extra help will be mailed an application for help with Medicare prescription Drug Plan Costs (Form SSA-1020).

Ms. Parker recommends completing and returning it as soon as possible.

If you do not receive an application in the mail, or do not want to wait, you can get one by calling Social Security at 1-800-772-1213 beginning July 1, or you can apply on-line at www.socialsecurity.gov.

> The food was nourishing and plentiful - vegetable platters, cold cuts and rolls, wrap sandwiches, and all varieties of chips.


> Soda, coffee and tea were also available.





# Elks 50th Anniversary

The origins of the Hasbrouck Heights Elks can be traced to the very first lodge which was established in New York City, by fifteen men known as the "Jolly Corks."

Fifteen members of the original Pioneer Hall, which is now called The Pioneer Club, were founding fathers of the Hasbrouck Heights Elks. Some of the charter officers installed in 1955 were: Exalted Ruler, Dr. Anthony R. Mancari, Esteemed Leading Knight, A. Henry Alberich, Esteemed Loyal Knight, Frank M. Santimauro, Esquire, Kenneth V. Cantoli and Justice of the Suburdinate Forum, William R. Postman.

Fifty years ago, in December 1955, the property between Baldwin Avenue and Route 46 was purchased to build the Hasbrouck Heights Elks B.P.O. Lodge No. 1962.

The Elks Lodge No. 1962 celebrated its 50th anniversary of dedication and service to our community and nation.

Two years after purchasing property, the building was completed with a formal dedication of the Lodge in May of

The latest addition to the Lodge took place several years ago with the purchase of two tall bronze Elk statues -- costing \$9,000 each -- that enhance the entrance to the Lodge. It may be the only Elks Lodge with two Elks statues adorning a lodge.

Many residents remember the Elks' coin containers that were seen in the late 1950's around Hasbrouck Heights. These containers helped the New Jersey Boystown in Kearny buy beds and furniture. The Hasbrouck Heights Elks were honored for their achievements.

Lodge activities have included: a dinner dance was held last year to help a young resident, Joseph Bonelli, who was

paralyzed in a tragic backyard swimming pool accident.

The B.P.O. Elks Lodge No. 1962 donated bullet proof vests to the Hasbrouck Heights Police Department and donated a beautiful table and chairs to the Hasbrouck Heights Free Public Library.

The Elks march during the Memorial Day Parade as well as support Camp Moore for disabled children, Christmas parties for orphans, student awards, Eagle Scout Scholarships, provide wheelchairs, canes, beds and crutches to those in our town who are in need, sponsor Little League and football programs, etc.

Recognition of others' deeds is an important and relevant theme of the Elks Lodge. This month there are two dinner dances; the first is to honor Dominick Annuzzi for his past two terms as Exalted Ruler, and the second is for our own Linda Brandle for being named Elk of the Year.

Exalted Ruler Joseph Marchese expressed his gratitude to his members for the fine work they are doing. He also reiterated a pledge the B.P.O. Elks Lodge No.1962 of Hasbrouck Heights has made: 'As long as there is a veteran in our hospitals, they will never be forgotten."

# **Real Estate** Revaluation Required

In 1983, I spent my first summer in the USA before proceeding to Rome for my Licentiate in Theological studies.

The first impression I got was how the Americans proudly displayed their flags everywhere.

I spent July 4th in Liberty Park with some American friends and we discussed how specially blessed we were to be here in the "land of the free."

I felt sad to comment that there were some protesters there who were burning the American flag.

My friends told me: "Father this is a free country... You are free to wave your flag or burn it."I did not agree about the flag-burning issue. I told him that your right to wave the flag or burn it was won for you by the soldiers who suffered and died protecting your freedom.

So instead of burning it, it must be shown respect and love for what it symbolizes.

Last May 30, I joined the Memorial Day Parade and led

the Invocation. Afterwards, a veteran gave a short talk that really struck me and drove home the message I have been keeping in my mind... He said:

It is the soldier, not the reporter who gave us freedom of

It is the soldier, not the lawyer who has given us the right to a fair trial.

It is the soldier, not the politician who has given us the right to vote.

It is the soldier, who salutes the flag, who serves the country under the flag, and whose coffin is draped by the flag, because the soldier chose to defend the flag.

Now the soldier asked. "with this freedom, can't we at least protect our flag?" Freedom is not free...

That morning I want back to the rectory happy and inspired to continue my apostolate to the Veterans in Paramus where I celebrate Mass with the Knights of Columbus.

I am not yet an American citizen but I owe them my freedom knowing that American soldiers liberated the Philippines and gave it independence that year before I was Born!!! ###



### **Holmes Celebrates 40th**



# Contemporary Club Works With "Rebuilding Together"

The Hasbrouck Heights Contemporary Club was looking for a project to really help the community.

At a meeting in the Fall 2004 a video on General Federation of Women's Clubs and their projects showed a club working on a project with an organization called Christmas in April.

A little research brought the club to the Bergen County Chapter of "Rebuilding Together."

The website notes that its roots can be traced to the 1970's when a Texas oil and gas scout began recruiting Sunday school students and friends to fix up homes in his town.

That led to Christmas in April, which became "Rebuilding Together." A National Building Day was established on the last Saturday of April.

Bergen County's chapter was founded in 1998 and its volunteers have repaired more than 60 homes and community centers.

This year in Bergen County, volunteers were working on 14 homes or apartments from Northvale to Carlstadt.

The weather on Saturday, April 30th, did not cooperate. It poured most of the day so the volunteers really did get down and dirty.

Hasbrouck Heights had one major project that was done with approximately 27 volunteers from World Savings Bank and some members of the Chapter who serve as captains and coordinators as well as getting right down and doing the dirty work

On the large site on Division Avenue, a wooden backyard fence was rebuilt, the workers landscaped the front and back yard making stone walkways, replaced the railings, fixed the porch and entrance way, and cleaned out the basement and waterproofed it.

The Contemporary Club did the smaller project of restoring flowers to the ground gardens of a Burr Place resident whose husband once had gardens in levels up the cliff.

The resident hopes that sometime in the future the cliff gardens can be restored.

"Rebuilding Together" is partnered with Corporate Sponsors who believe that helping someone in need is a priority.

When asked why you would volunteer year after year to work on someone else's house, a young volunteer said, "at the end of the day you turn around and look at what was accomplished and you just feel so good."

It was a real feeling of "Wow" when they were leaving their site. Each person asked said they were looking forward to volunteering again next year. They were just hoping it wouldn't be so rainy. ###

The second concert is slated for July 21 and features "Boote" with music from the 50's to the 90's. This concert is sponsored by Otterstedt Insurance Agency.




