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
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
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"Keep Wood-Ridge Beautiful" Celebrating its 20th Year!

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

Artful Thinking

Happy 4th of July. This month I'm giving a Military Salute to another Korean War Veteran, Wallington resident, Bill Selis. Bill was born in Mamouth, PA on the 17th of January, 1929. His family moved to Nutley, NJ in 1940. He attended Nutley High School and was a member of the graduating Class of 1947.

Shortly after separating from the classroom, Bill entered the work force as a printer for The Alfred Alan Watts Company. His career as a printer was short lived, however, when in 1951 he found himself at Camp Chafee, in Portsmouth, AR. Suffering the rigors of basic training as a member of the U.S. Army, he spent the next seven months training new recruits in the Artillery Division. His rank was Private First Class.

In 1952, Private Selis was sent to Korea, where he joined the ranks of the 17th Artillery "Persuaders" 8th Army. Bill served in Korea for 9 long months as a gunner on the 8 inch Howitzer. During that time he was promoted to Chief of Section.

In the early going, Bill, who was still in the rookie phase of his service, was situated 3 miles from the enemy line of resistance. His more experienced fellow soldiers told him that if he managed to stay alive for the first 2 weeks the chances were good that he'd make it home in one piece. According to Bill, a couple of Chinese tanks began firing in the direction of their tent. All the soldiers, except for Bill who was sound asleep, ran for the safety of the nearby bunker. Someone then asked, "Where's the new guy?" Realizing that Bill was in harm's way a few concerned soldiers ran into the tent under enemy fire and carried the still sleeping private into the bunker.

"When I woke up I realized that I had dirt all over me from the rats that were kicking down mounds of dirt from above," remembers Bill, "For the first few seconds I thought I was dead. From then on I made sure that I was among the first to enter that bunker."

Bill was discharged from Military service in 1953. His rank upon leaving was that of Corporal. Shortly afterwards he married his sweetheart, Dorothy Donatelli, of Garfield, NJ. The couple then moved to Wallington. By then Bill became employed by the Deluxe Printing Company located in Clifton, NJ. He retired in 1988. The couple has two children, three grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Thank you Bill and to all Veterans past, present and forever. I'll be writing more about our Veterans in upcoming issues, so stay tuned.

For all of you readers who have been asking me how the Lodi High School tribute song was originated, you'll be glad to know that I finally have a solid answer for you.

A few years ago I had a chance meeting with Mrs. Ann Carnevali Nicosia, a 1942 graduate of LHS. So as to make sure that her information was spot on Ann went as far as to call her older brother Ralph, who had moved to Chicago during WWII. Ralph graduated LHS in 1936 and based on the information that was relayed to his sister this is how Lodi High School acquired its song.

In the winter of 1935, a year after LHS opened its doors, both teachers and students assembled in the auditorium to listen to a guest speaker from Cornell University of Ithaca, New York.

Unfortunately, his name remains unknown, however, according to Ralph, he was a professor on a recruiting tour of area schools. As the story goes, Thomas Jefferson High School reminded the professor of Cornell. Not only was Cornell situated on a lofty hill, it also overlooked a river.

The professor was so taken by the likeness of the two schools that he was compelled to turn over Cornell's anthem to Lodi's new High School. Save for the name of the river few if any words have been changed.

The melody is note for note to that of Cornell University. Students of the sacred Orange and Blue have been singing it ever since. I'm going to give everyone a minute or two to sing a couple of verses. Do you remember the words? Of course you do. I'll wait for you in the next paragraph.

Oh, thanks for reminding me. Speaking of the "Orange and Blue" Ralph gave his sister, Ann, some insight as to the birth of those legendary colors. Influenced by the Hasbrouck Heights school colors of orange and black, the Lodi football Rams of 1936 wanted those

same colors for their own.

That's not hard to understand since many Lodi students, having no High School as yet, attended Hasbrouck Heights High. At a school meeting a teacher, name unknown, made the following observation "Why would you want the colors orange and black? You football players are always black and blue after a game anyway. So why not those colors?"

With that having been said a student then jumped up and shouted "Orange and Blue!"

The student body gave it a vote and with the final okay from Principal Marinus Gallanti, the LHS School colors of orange and blue were born and raised. Even today, as you read this, those sacred colors are worn with much pride and compassion by all who have passed through the halls and classrooms of Lodi High School.

"Near the Saddle River waters On a lofty Hill Stands our noble alma mater Praised in glory still."

Fort Polify Dedicated

While I was researching a story on the history of South Bergen, for The Gazette Newspaper, I came across two vague references to a Fort Polifly. The indication was that it was aside Polifly Road, one or two miles below Hackensack. Hasbrouck Heights was then known as Polifly. Unlike the names Hackensack and Moonachie, which are from the American Indian Lenape language, Polifly is from a dialect known as Jersey Dutch. This was spoken in this area from the 1600s until the beginning of the twentieth century. Polifly is translated as "meadow over or above the swamp."

Then, the exact location of the fort was found in a Passaic County Historical Publication, dated September 1, 1931, entitled "Passaic's Victory Day." This was by William W. Scott, City Historian of Passaic. Mr. Scott gave the location as about 200 feet north of Terhune Avenue (now Passaic Avenue), on Terrace Avenue in Hasbrouck Heights.

After the article was published in The Gazette, giving the location, Fritz Rethage, Editor, expressed to me that feedback from readers was that the fort should be marked and memorialized in some way. At an unrelated event in town, I approached Mayor Jack De Lorenzo on this matter. He requested that I supply him with the information that I had.

Around this time, I had a conversation with a good friend, Robert C. Meyer. He is the President of the New Jersey Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. I asked him, "What is the best way to pursue this?" He also requested all the facts that I had.


The Mayor contacted me about a further discussion on this matter. Rob Meyer also contacted me. He expressed an interest in memorializing this historical site through the Society. The Society offered to supply a metal sign to mark the location.

I relayed this to the Mayor. He said that the Borough would be happy to coordinate with the Society on this subject. The wording of the sign was approved by both the Borough and the Society. The intent was to have the dedication on Memorial Day, 2019.

As the day approached, the sign company kept saying it was coming soon. As a backup, just in case, Rob Meyer had a laminated plastic sign prepared. The metal sign arrived in Heights, at my address,

around 10 a.m. on the Friday before Memorial Day. By 10:30 a.m. it was in the hands of the Hasbrouck Heights DPW. The Memorial Day event went off as planned.

The fort was built at a time of turbulent strife. While the American Civil War is often described as brother against brother, the Revolutionary War was fathers against sons, uncles, cousins and neighbor against neighbor. Divisions ran deep in each community of Bergen County. So much so, that the British recruited their 4th Battalion of the New Jersey Royal Volunteers from Bergen County. They would go down in history as the infamous "Green Coats." They were called this because of their uniform color.

The Green Coats, as the war progressed, were based in Hoboken and carried out terror and revenge raids in the county. To counter this, the State of New Jersey formed local militia companies. The Polifly Company was one. The community united for common cause and built a small fort called Polifly. The fort controlled movement on Polifly Road. The road was laid out in 1707. It was the equivalent of Route 17 in its day.

During the war, what is now Bergen County, was called

the Neutral Ground. It was anything but. The British had outposts in Hoboken and Paulus Hook, Jersey City. The Americans had regular outposts just over the New Jersey-New York line. From 1775 to 1783, there were 96 engagements ranging from the Baylor Massacre, the burning of Hackensack Courthouse, capture and recapture of Fort Polifly to the defeat of a Loyalist raiding party in Moonachie. Kidnappings were common to both sides. To feed both armies, foraging raids were regularly carried out in the area.

The State of New Jersey passed an act to confiscate all property of known Loyalists. Wives, children and elderly family members of Loyalists were forced to flee to New York with only what they could carry. There was really no neutrality. When the war ended, Loyalists were given two options. Buy back their homesteads or accept a land grant in Canada. Most went to Canada.

What is the relevance of Fort Polifly today? Besides being an event in the War of Independence and our becoming this great nation, it stands as a symbol of a community coming together for the common good. Whether you're a multi-generational resident or moved here last week, this our legacy. ###

Reliance on Loved Ones

Quicken Loans & Wells Fargo have formidable competition these days. I read recently that 'The Bank of Mom and Dad' is now the country's seventh largest home lender.

A study from Legal & General Group states that parents lent their kids a total of \$47 billion last year, helping them to buy 1.2 million homes. That's one in five parents who helped fund the purchase of \$317 billion worth of housing.

Forty-three percent of those who received the help were under 35. Without the gift from the Bank of Mom and Dad, these young adults say they would have had to delay their home purchase for years/indefinitely.

"For many, perhaps most, young adults, buying a house without help is an increasingly unattainable goal," writes Nigel Wilson, chief executive at Legal & General.

A number of economic reasons - student loan debt, stagnant wages, sky-high rents, the extreme cost of day care, etc. - make it no surprise that more and more millennials are

turning to ma & pa to help fund their future. And, for the most part, if they're able to, parents seem to be fine with fronting some money. But Wilson calls it a worrisome trend that so many young adults are relying on help from family to buy a home.

As realtors, we see it every day: homeownership is out of reach for many young people – and those who don't have family members to turn to are often out of luck. I'm reminded of someone I met last year, a young lab technician who was hoping to purchase a condominium.

She didn't use family money when she started searching but she had that option; it made, she said, the search a whole lot less stressful.

Just knowing that, if there were issue with closing costs, she would be covered, that if something unforeseen occurred she would be able to manage it; it made for tremendous peace of mind. In the end, she found her dream condo in Lodi and didn't have to turn to family/ friends for financial help in buying it. It felt good, she said, to have accomplished it all on her own.

There used to be a time when people graduating from college could hold a reasonable expectation of home ownership. Since the bottom fell out of the housing market in 2008, though, home prices have been steadily increasing to a point where this expectation has become unrealistic. According to the US Census Bureau, home

ownership rates for all age groups were lower in 2018 than in 2006, the year before the Great Recession; householders between 35 and 44 years of age showed 10 percentage points lower in 2018 than in 2006.

Obviously, the down payment is the biggest hurdle to a home purchase. Many renters who would be able to meet monthly mortgage payments can't qualify for a mortgage because they're unable to save the 20 percent or so of a home's sale price.

The median existing home sells for over \$300,000 in our South Bergen area; that means having to have on hand around \$60,000 to secure a conventional mortgage...

Some programs allow first-time or lower-income home-buyers to put down a smaller payment, but (as I've read elsewhere) with nearly 60 percent of Americans unable to cover even a \$1,000 emergency expense, it's clear that any sort of down payment is out of reach for many people.

In that sense, generous parents are meeting a real need, the Legal & General report concludes. But is this state of affairs economically/socially sustainable? "The Bank of Mom and Dad enables the transfer of assets to the younger generation, but that only works if you have money to start with. What you end up getting is this increasing inequality across generations," writes John Godfrey, director of affairs at Legal & General. "It makes it that much harder for people to be self-made and successful."

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Filling You In

Dental Injuries

Dental injuries can occur any time but are most common when participating in sports or other recreational activities. Not all dental injuries are the same and are very likely treated differently. This guide is meant to be informative and give examples of several types of injuries. In all cases, it is important to contact you dentist as soon as possible. Also, if there are other injuries in addition to the mouth, be sure to seek appropriate medical attention for those injuries. Not all hospitals have dentists on staff and therefore may not be able to help with the dental injuries. If your dentist is unavailable, Hackensack UMC has dental residents on call 24/7.

Avulsion is a term used for the injury when a tooth or teeth are completely forced out of the tooth socket (knocked out). When a tooth is avulsed, there is a 30-minute window of opportunity tore-implant a tooth into its socket, so get to a dentist immediately. The chance ofsuccessful re-implantation is reduced significantly after half an hour. In the meantime:

- Do not attempt to sterilize or brush the tooth, and do nothandle it by the root. If there is debris on the tooth, gently rinseit with water.
- If the patient is alert, re-implant the tooth. Then stabilize it and control bleeding by biting down on a towel or handkerchief.
- If unable to re-implant the tooth, transport it in saline, milk or saline-soaked gauze. If the patient is alert, the tooth may be placed in the side of the cheek.
- Tooth Fracture is when a tooth is cracked or broken into two or more pieces. If a tooth or teeth become fractured you may follow these suggestions:
- If the tooth is broken in Heights, NJ. 201-288-4447, half, find and save the broken www.DrJeffreyMason.com piece. Transport it to the dentist using the same techniques used foran avulsion.
 - Bite down on a towel or

handkerchief to stabilize the tooth and control bleeding.

- If extreme pain is present, prevent the injured tooth from coming in contact with air, liquid or other teeth.
- Tooth luxation is a term used to describe the displacement of a tooth out or away from it's natural position. If a tooth is luxated, the patient needs to See a dentist as soon as possible. There are three types of luxation, and each requires a slightly different technique:
- (1) **Extruded Tooth** an upper tooth that hangs down or a lower tooth that extends up from the gums.

Emergency care:

- * Use your finger to firmly reposition the tooth in its socket. Bite down gently on a handkerchief or towel to stabilize the tooth.
- * See a dentist immediately.
- (2) Lateral Displacement a tooth that is pushed back or pulled forward.

Emergency care:

- * Use your finger to reposition the tooth in its socket; if it is painful, skip this step.
- * Bite down gently on a handkerchief or towel to stabilize the tooth.
 - *See a dentist immediately.
- (3) Intruded Tooth a tooth that has been pushed up or down into the gums. The tooth will look short.

Emergency care:

- * Do NOT attempt to reposition the tooth.
- * Do nothing to treat the injury yourself.
- * Get to a dentist imme-

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





On June 7, 2019, the 36th Annual Special Olympics Torch Run passed through our area. One of the 26 legs leading to The College of NJ in Ewing, was the "Torch" passing from Lodi to Hasbrouck Heights, to Wood-Ridge to Carlstadt, to East Rutherford to Rutherford Police Departments. Over the next two days, athletes competed in aquatics, bocce, gymnastics, power lifting, softball, tennis, and track and field, where officers continue to volunteer their time by awarding medals to the triumphant athletes.

Last year, 2018, the Law Enforcement Torch Run (LETR) for Special Olympics NJ raised more than \$4.1 million dollars.

Hasbrouck Heights "high fived" school children along The Boulevard, then met up with the Wood-Ridge Police Department. W-R Police were joined by students under an American Flag provided by the W-R Fire Department.

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
