### American Legion Decorates Graves

The Joseph M. Lane Post 136, American Legion in Lodi, NJ, continues the annual tradition of placing American flags on graves of all Veterans who were honorably discharged from the United States Military for Memorial Day.

"We decorate the graves at St. Nicholas Cemetery, Lodi Cemetery and St. Francis De Sales Cemetery," said Post Commander Dan Wesch.

Post members, helped by members of Squadron 136 of the Sons of the American Legion, placed over three thousand flags this year.

"Each year, as more and more of World War II and Korean War Veterans pass on to that great spirit army and our active membership grows older, our mission becomes more tedious, but not less an honor as we recognize those who served this great country," explained Wesch.

Sadly, Commander Wesch reported that all the records and books -- some of which dated back more than sixty years -listing the location of most of

the local Veterans' graves, were destroyed in a fire that ravaged Post 136's home.

"Since we no longer have the charts and locator books, our work has become more difficult as we must check each grave for some kind of Veteran identification, marker or a previously placed flag from last year."

Wesch urged, if family members who have deceased Veterans buried in local cemeteries whose graves remain undecorated, to contact him at 973-614-0100 leaving a message of the Veteran's name, cemetery, and grave number so that a flag may be placed to recognize the individual's service.

The grave decoration effort is directed from the Post's temporary headquarters located on the Post property at 41 Union Street.

The Post 136 was chartered May 21, 1921.

Grave Decoration is a tradition which dates back to 1919 when the American Legion was formed.

#### Prior to that, Civil War Vets' graves were decorated by members of the Grand Army of the Republic.

The flags throughout Bergen County are provided free of charge to Veteran Groups by the Bergen County Board of Chosen Freeholders. Story by Vincent C. Martorano. ###

### Buckle Up

The Hasbrouck Heights Police Department reminds residents of New Jersey's Safety Belt Law.

Safety belts improve your chances of surviving a crash by 60%. Most crashes occur within 25 miles of home and at speeds of under 40 miles per hour.

NJ Law requires that all front seat occupants of a passenger vehicle must wear a safety belt system.

The driver is responsible for any passenger under the age of 18. Front seat passengers 18 and over are responsible for themselves.

The penalty for an unbelted front seat occupant is \$20.

The exemptions to this law include: those riding in a passenger auto manufactured before July 1, 1966 and those with physical or medical reasons verified in writing by a licensed physician. ###

### **Codey Signs Legislation** at Teterboro Airport

On May 3, 2007, Acting Governor Richard J. Codey signed legislation allowing the Port Authority to designate one airport in each state for expansion.

The bill mirrors legislation passed in New York in 1967; however, because of the bi-state nature of the Port Authority, enabling legislation had to be passed by both state legislatures.

The NJ signing of A-3948/S25 will allow the PA to purchase the lease of Stewart Airport, which will then be expanded in an effort to ease the burden of excessive air traffic on the region's airports.

The legislation authorizes

the Port Authority to select two sites outside the Authority's current jurisdiction for expansion and gives each Governor the authority to approve that selection in their respective state.

Previously, the Port Authority had only been empowered to operate within an existing "port district" that extends for 25 miles in all directions from Liberty Island in New York Harbor.

The law authorized the PANYNJ to take two additional established air terminals outside the bi-state agency's jurisdiction border -- one in New York, one in New Jersey, as respectively designated by

the Governor of each state.

The law does not change the boundaries of the port district, but allows exceptions for the operations of Stewart Airport in New York and an additional air facility in New Jersey.

In New York, the Port Authority board has authorized the purchase of the lease for Stewart Airport, which is located in Newburgh, New York, about 30 miles from the Bergen County line. The Port Authority is now authorized to purchase the remaining 93 years of the Stewart International Airport lease from the National Express Corporation. The estimated cost of the lease purchase is \$78.5 million.

Once completed, the Port Authority will be given operational control of the airport,

which the agency expects to assume by October 2007.

According to the Port Authority, under its current configuration, Stewart International

Airport could accommodate 1.5 million passengers annually.

The airport is situated on 2,400 acres of land and is equipped with two large runways capable of handling major jet service similar to Newark, LaGuardia or JFK international airports. It can handle aircraft ranging in size from a C-150 to A-340, B-747.

Stewart currently has one terminal and seven gates. The main terminal was redesigned in 1998. Carriers currently affiliated include American Airlines American Eagle, AirTran Airways, Delta Connection, JetBlue Airways, Northwest Airlines, US Airways Express.

The Port Authority has said it expects to be able to increase passenger service and volume to the airport through careful planning and expansion.

The Authority plans to expand the airport's capacity with the goal of reducing congestion in the airspace surrounding the region's three major airports and Teterboro. Officials stated that Stewart does not use the same airspace.

The area's elected officials praised this move as a means to solve Teterboro Airport's quality of life problems with its neighbors.

According to William R. DeCota, Port Authority Aviation Director, "It is going to be a nice, mid-sized airport that caters to the needs of the mid-Hudson Valley. I don't foresee in our lifetime that it's going to be a major airport."

He stated that commercial and private traffic would grow as the Authority and the airport users invest in Stewart.

The airport was established in 1930. In 1942 it was dedicated as the "Wings of West Point." The airfield became Stewart Air Force Base in 1948 and deactivated in 1970.

No site in New Jersey has been designated for expansion at this point, but during this press conference, Acting Governor Codey brought up the possibility of Atlantic City International Airport which accommodated about 745,000 passengers in 2006. ###

The guards will be wearing their uniforms and will have Borough identification. They will be conducting the census between the hours of 4:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m., Monday thru Friday. Remember, if in doubt, call the Health Department or the Hasbrouck Heights Police Department immediately.

Failure to license your dog is a violation of Borough Code and you will be subject to a summons, court appearance and fine. ###

### **Propane Safety**

Propane gas is odorless. A "rotten egg" odor is put into the gas so that it's easy to detect if a leak occurs.

If you smell the "rotten egg" odor near or around your propane gas cylinder immediately contact the Fire Department.

When not in use, keep the valve tightly closed and plugged with the "POL" left handed thread plug. This will seal the propane gas cylinder and help prevent leaks if the service valve is accidentally

Never store propane gas cylinders inside an enclosed structure -- store and use outdoors only. ###







### HHFD Annual Inspection

The Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department conducted its Annual Inspection at 7:00 p.m. on Saturday, May 12, 2007.

Department personnel were in full dress uniform. The equipment and new headquarters were presented for inspection and Department personnel were available to answer any questions.

The event was attended by local officials, as well as Fire Chiefs from mutual aid towns.

Department Secretary, Thomas Rubino, began the program with the presentation of the Honor Guard, and the Pledge of Allegiance. Chaplain, Fr. Joseph Pickard, provided the invocation.

Mayor Ronald R. Jones, Fire Commissioner Carol Skiba and Fire Chief Angelo Roccamo made comments.

Local officials, area fire chiefs and the public then inspected the equipment and met with the men and women who serve in The Department.

This was the third inspection in the new facility since "The Big Fire" in 1999. Interim inspections had been conducted at the Masonic Lodge and the temporary headquarters on Central Avenue.

responded to 1,350 ambulance ceive 20 weeks of basic firecalls and 575 fire calls. fighter training and every EMT

The Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department operates with 58 members, including EMS and Juniors. Its rolling stock includes two pumpers, 110 ft. ladder, heavy rescue truck, crash/foam truck, two ambulances and three chief SUV's.

These assets are owned by the Borough of Hasbrouck Heights, but maintained by the volunteers.

The Department conducts only one fund raiser a year, with the proceeds providing training, supplies, etc.

Every firefighter must re-

ceive 20 weeks of basic firefighter training and every EMT receives 22 weeks of basic training.

Many members continue extensive advanced training in the areas of search and rescue, vehicle operation, incident command, hazardous materials, first responder, mass decontamination, etc. The Department conducts continuing training on a regular basis.

The Department is contracted to provide fire and ambulance service to the Borough of Teterboro, and has done so for over 50 years.

The Department is a mem-

ber of the South Bergen Chiefs Mutual Aid Association which helps to coordinate multi-department responses to largescale incidents. Zone 2 includes Carlstadt, Little Ferry, Moonachie, Wallington and Wood-Ridge. These departments are also all volunteer.

The Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department also has a Junior Squad for those between 16 and 18 years of age. They offer on-scene support, but are not permitted to enter burning buildings.



### Moving A Piece of Heights History

About 50 years ago, a member or two of James B. Scarr Post 106 climbed into a truck and drove to Fort Monmouth, NJ.

There they presented a re-

quest to the supply depot for a 57mm Anti-Tank Gun that was to be permanently displayed in front of the Post home.

The Depot people selected one of the many stored there and proceeded to demilitarize

They poured a bag of cement down the barrel, welded the elevating mechanism and removed the firing pin.

They also graciously waived the \$75.00 fee for doing this and loaded it onto our truck.

When our members returned to Hasbrouck Heights, the Gun was placed on its prepared concrete pad. For the next 50 years, it guarded the Post home.

Unfortunately, circumstances have forced the sale of that property and the fate of the Gun was questionable.

However, when the Borough of Hasbrouck Heights heard that it might be available, they asked if they might have it.

The Post said "yes, but the Army still held title to it."

After a few months of negotiating, (the letter file is almost 3/4" thick), the Army agreed to give possession to the Borough.

The morning of Monday, April 30, 2007, a crew from the DPW, equipped with their large bucket loader and a bunch of chains, carefully picked up the 2,743 cannon and moved it to Veterans Park.

It sits on a concrete slab, facing north towards Terrace Avenue.


Post 106 wishes to thank the Borough for taking the Gun, and the DPW for preparing the concrete pad in Veterans Park and so very carefully moving it.

### Decade by Decade Review

#### The First Decade --

The first decade of league play was dominated, in large part, by the Farmers and the Eagles who, more often than not, finished first or second respectively.

The historical research has confirmed that the Farmers won not only the first championship, in 1956, but also in 1958, 1962 and 1963. The Eagles were champs in 1957 and 1966. The Bombers won the 1961 championship.

The Farmers, who were formed from the nucleus of a hardball club, repeatedly finished amongst the top two teams during the league's first fifteen years and, in fact, were usually among the top four teams right through the early nineties, when their franchise temporarily discontinued play.

Other teams active during the embryonic stages of the organization included the Jesters, Pioneer Club, Swim Club, V.F.W., Fire Department and the first Sportsmen franchise.

### The Second Decade -

Some excellent Pioneer Club teams set the standard in the early and middle part of the League's second decade.

Research has confirmed that while the Wood-Ridge national Bank team won the championship in 1970, the Pioneers were crowned champions, at least twice, in 1971 and 1972.

The latter part of this pe-

riod saw the emergence of the Club 80 dynasty. The Club 80 teams were crowned champs in 1974, 1975, 1977, 1978, 1979, 1980, 1981 and 1983.

#### **The Third Decade**

This period saw the continued dominance of Club 80 and the rise of the Boys as Club 80's chief rivals.

Although the Boys did emerge as a consistent championship contender, it was the old Lovey's team that brought the "changing of the guard." In 1984 and 1985, that Lovey's team, which was made up of players who graduated high school in the late seventies, took over as reigning champions having defeated Manny's and Mike's Vagabond (Boys) two games out of three in respective championship series.

Other teams of note during this period included P. Chimento's, Sal's Exxon (later Reggie's and the Wood-Ridge Inn), Michael's Liquor (later Main Auto Supply and now the Wood-Ridge Inn), AFCO Cycle, Pioneer Club (later Samson Caterers and now the Sportsmen) and, of course, the Farmers who won the playoff championship in 1978.

Of all the aforementioned squads, the team that always had fun, win or lose, was P. Chimento's.

Led by players such as Jim Skinner, John Hart, John Sodermann, Alan Marchanian, Bob Calderone, Rich Mason, Steve Tracey and John Krommenhoek, the joyful exuberance they displayed was unrivaled both on the field and especially during their post game festivities.

The third decade was also marked by many controversies

In reaction to charges of fa-

voritism displayed by umpires who were local residents, the league engaged the services of ASA umpires who were non-residents and, therefore, perceived to be unbiased.

The by-laws were modified to include strict residency requirements and players who desired to change teams were now required to declare their "free agency" in writing no later than December 31 of the previous calendar year.

In 1986, a black cloud was cast over the league.

For the first time the playoffs were not concluded and a playoff champion was not crowned on the field.

The 1986 championship series, which pitted the Boys against Lovey's, stalled after one game over scheduling conflicts and inclement weather.

Despite the league commissioner's best efforts and the threat of judicial intervention, these hurdles could not be overcome and the two teams could not be brought together to complete the series.

It was not until many months after the season that the Boys were declared champions by forfeit.

### The Fourth Decade

In 1987, Villagio's, a/k/a "Asia," vaulted to the pedestal of champions.

The Villagio's team was made up from the nucleus of the old Lovey's team and free agents who had departed the Boys and Samson Caterers franchises.

From 1988 to 1997, the Boys, (now also known as Lovey's) defeated all comers in the championship series. The old Wood-Ridge Inn (led by Mark Little) and Main Auto Supply (now the Wood-Ridge Inn and led by Marv Levy—

strike that—John Corbliss) together challenged the Boys and fell short on several occasions.

The "new" Crow's Nest and the Sportsmen were also unable to wrestle the title from the perennial champion, Boys.

Other participating teams during this period included Pioneer Club, Carpenters, Juniors a/k/a Orioles, Nuziale Chiropractic and a combined Police and Fire Department team known as "Guns & Hoses."

#### The Fifth Decade

The standard of excellence that the Lovey's (Boys) softball club had established in the late eighties and most of the nineties withstood worthy challenges exerted by several fine squads.

However, it was not until 1998 that their ten year reign as champions came to an abrupt halt.

In the first round of the playoffs that year the Wood-Ridge Inn team, led by John Corbliss, sent the Boys home for Thanksgiving without a championship trophy for the first time since 1988.

The historic accomplishment of Corbliss' team was followed by them coming up short to the Crow's Nest in the 1998 championship series.

The Crow's Nest, led by Dennis Dinallo Jr., would again be crowned champions in 2000.

Dinallo's squad was initially assembled in 1995 and brought together top talent from various other already existing teams.

The sole purpose of forming this conglomeration was to unseat the Boys and they soon became nicknamed the "Dream Team."

Although Corbliss beat them to the punch, the two championships won by the "Dream Team" would be the only ones not won by the Boys from 1988 through 2002.

The 2003 and 2004 seasons saw the M&M Sportsmen, led by Tommy Mason, claim back to back championships.

A new generation of Boys emerged in 2005 and 2006, also winning back to back championships.

Last year's deciding championship series game was punctuated by a walk off, grand slam home run belted by Boys' veteran Patrick "Snake" Mason.


Today, the long tradition of spirited competition among the local lads of the Hasbrouck Heights Men's Softball League lives on. In many cases, young men continue rivalries established three generations ago by their grandfathers.

Our weather has varied quite a bit here in the Hasbrouck Heights-Teterboro area so far this Spring.

We have had variable weather, ranging from the torrential downpours of April 14 and 15 which caused record flooding... to tranquil weather with "perfect temperatures and low humidity" on most other days!

The month of April has averaged near or below normal, temperature-wise (cooler than normal). Rainfall during the month was near or above normal.

Looking ahead now for the next several weeks on into the early part of Summer, it will continue to be "variable" here with some wide swings in temperature.

Look for a major warm up

The Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department responded to continuous calls Sunday, April 14th, Monday, April 15th and early Tuesday, April 16th in Hasbrouck Heights and Teter-

The range of calls included a retaining wall collapsing on a home on Passaic Avenue, to rescuing people in cars, and lots of electrical shorts, furnace and basement fires. On one call, the gas fire floated on top of the water in the flooded basement.

On Sunday night, The Department also assisted Lodi Fire Department, whose headquarters was flooded under two feet of water. (Department members reported watching telephone poles drift by).

Hasbrouck Heights Ladder Company assisted Lodi in evacuating a nearby apartment building, as well as flood related calls.

The HHFD crash truck, with Rob Knobloch, Bob Pietz and Joe Taylor, responded to three Lodi rescues between 10:00 p.m. and 3:00 a.m.

The first attempt was a Center Street home, but the crash truck retreated when the 6 foot high water reached the windshield.

The second rescue was pulling out a woman trapped in a car in four feet of water on Terrace Avenue (Lodi). She was taken to safety and released to the Lodi PD.

The third rescue was a baby and family trapped in a car in the National Liquidators /Home Depot parking lot. They were taken to safety and released to the Lodi PD.

These national agencies are working in affiliation at the local level with the Salvation Army, United Way and Catholic Charities. ###

The name reflects the relatively short season for harvesting strawberries that comes each year during June. Other names include the "Full Hot Moon," or in Europe, the "Full Rose Moon."

The Native American Indians of the northern and eastern United States kept track of the seasons by giving a name to each recurring full moon. European settlers followed the custom. ###

### Blue Moon

The phrase, "once in a blue moon" has come to mean "every now and then" or "rarely."

The modern definition of a "Blue Moon" is the second full moon in a calendar month. The second June full moon will appear on Saturday, June 30, 2007, at 13:50. The average span between two moons is 29.5 days.

The last "Blue Moon" occurred July 31, 2004. The next "Blue Moon" will be December 2009.

The rare phenomenon of two blue moons occurring in the same year happens approximately once every 19 years. 1999 was the last time a blue moon appeared twice, in January and March. ###

# AARP Discussed Eldercare Services

He stressed the fact that 45% of all American citizens over 65 will require some sort of care. Eighteen million Americans over 65 are in a care facility. The average cost of care at a nursing home is \$80,000 a year and the average stay is more than 3 years.

Mr. Blundetto reviewed government entitlements. He discussed what Medicare pays for those who qualify. Medicare pays up to the first 100 days of care. They pay nothing if you stay beyond 100 days. He discussed the dangers of transferring your assets into your children's names and stated that the government has a five year look back on your assets. 
