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

Jim began in the labor movement in 1972 and has held various elected and appointed positions in his local to include





### **Pastor Hegedus Celebrates 20th Anniversary**

He is the one who provides spiritual guidance, confidential counseling, bedside support when illness strikes, premarital counseling, and words of comfort at the passing of loved ones.

His integrity and selfless devotion, along with his knowledge of the Bible and great capacity for preaching and teaching, is admired by all. And to this, Pastor Bill, very humbly, gives God all the glory.

William Hegedus was born in Philadelphia, PA, October 4, 1946. Son of William Bert and Helen Hegedus, he was the firstborn of 5 boys.

No one can imagine being "called into ministry" until it happens. As a 16 year old teen, his Dad "made him" attend a showing of the movie "Red Runs the River," a 1963 Civil War film produced by Bob Jones University (a Christian college). The film traces the influence of General Stonewall Jackson's vigorous faith upon the profane, unbelieving Ewell. When Ewell meets God on the battlefield, he learns that surrender to God brings true victory. "God worked His work that night as I saw my need for God and His love" recalls Pastor Bill. "I was planning to either enter the Coast Guard Academy or pursue a career

William Hegedus cele- in law enforcement, but God had other plans for my life. Once I was saved it seemed I was almost immediately called into the ministry. All my plans now focused on serving God full time."

> Pastor Bill attended Bob Jones University and graduated from Tennessee Temple University with a BA in 1980. He obtained his Master's Degree in May of 1987.

> Pastor met his wife, Diane, at college and later became a parent as well as a Youth Minister. In furthering his ministry, he was a Sunday School teacher, a Youth Pastor, an interim Pastor and a lay Pastor at Fairview Baptist Church in Springfield, Illinois.

> He then served as Bus Ministry Director and Children's Pastor at Temple Baptist Church in Kingsport, TN (1980-81). This Church had 30 buses and over 700 children! In 1982, he started Bible Baptist Church in Kingsport, TN and God grew that Church to 400 people within 7 years.

> It was at the end of 1988, as he was seeking direction from the Lord and asking for a clear path, that he was led by God to a pastorate at yet another Bible Baptist Church, this one in Hasbrouck Heights, NJ. He never thought he'd be back in the northeast. Pulling into the Church parking lot with a U Haul and seven children (in tow), Pastor Bill and Diane easily filled the parsonage.

Over the years, the whole Hegedus Family assisted in one or more ways as the ministry continued to grow. The Church is known for being a great melting pot of ethnicity as well as having an extremely friendly atmosphere. One visit and you are "part of the family." Children are also a very important part of the BBC family as the

Church offers several community-wide events that are well attended... SAC (Summer Adventure Camp) held the second week in July, and The Annual Trunk or Treat Event the last weekend in October. Pastor Bill promotes Sunday Bible Hour between services for all ages as a means of learning and growing in the Christian faith.

BBC encourages missionary support and Pastor Bill has led many mission outreaches over the years, taking Bibles to China, bringing Summer Adventure Camp to St. Lucia, Romania and, in 2007, to W. Ghana, Africa.

He is bringing another team there this summer to minister to approximately 3,000 children.

But the greatest outreach ministry of BBC was started by Pastor Bill 20 years ago this year. Having just celebrated its 20th year, Passion Play Drama Ministries brought "The Jesus Story" to capacity audiences at Felician College for seven nights.

It is the heart's desire of this Pastor to spread the Gospel of The Lord Jesus Christ to as many people as possible. He wants everyone to know that Jesus is the answer to many of life's problems. He is the hope they have been looking for.



to inspect each truck w/snow plows & spreaders, community bus, loaders, SewerVac, wood chipper, roll off truck, etc. Although garbage pick-up is contracted, the DPW has a garbage truck for recycling.

Gennarelli carefully explained the status of each vehicle in terms of purpose, age,

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The Superintendent stated the DPW cooperates and works well with area communities and the Port Authority. He said he looks for opportunities to work together to provide greater efficiency and mutual cost savings. As an example, he cited that the co-op gasoline service located on Concord Street is shared by seven government entities.

As the tour departed the maintenance facility to the back yard, he noted because of the water table, the gasoline storage tanks are above ground. Separating both yards is lower

The expansive adjacent back yard has a very old 5 bay garage, recycling depot, worker rest area, police firing range, police storage area, and a new salt shed.

The DPW has 12 employees. They maintain 21 miles of road, provide services for 2,300 households to include sewers, recycling, leaf removal, snow removal, Borough trees, as well as maintain all Borough buildings, parks and grounds. This facility has been in operation for about 70 years.

### Airport Runway To Be Rehabilitated

Teterboro Airport expects to award a contract in June 2009 to rehabilitate Runway 6-24. Runway 6-24 is the shorter of TEB's two runways at 6,013 feet. It was last rehabilitated in 1995.

In addition to rehabilitating the pavement, the airport will also be installing a number of additional lighting systems on the runway to enhance safety.

These lighting systems include lighting down the centerline of the runway and touchdown zone lighting. New improved runway edge lighting will also be installed.

This contract will include work in the areas where the two runways intersect. Work in this intersection will require that the airport be closed for a number of extended periods during July and August. At this time, these periods have yet to be finalized. ###

### **Pilots Must Submit Crew/Passenger Info**

All general aviation flights arriving into or departing out of the U.S. require the pilot to electronically submit crew and passenger manifests and other flight information to the CBP at least 60 minutes prior to departure.

This information must be submitted to the CBP using their Electronic Advance Passenger Information System (eAPIS) website or through an authorized third party vendor. This new rule does not apply to domestic flights.

Pilots failing to meet these reporting requirements can be fined \$5,000 for the first violation and \$10,000 for each subsequent violation.

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

# **Riverkeeper Discusses Environment**

On April 27, 2009, Capt. Bill Sheehan, The Hackensack Riverkeeper and Chairman of the Meadowlands Conservation Trust, addressed members and guests of the Wood-Ridge Historical Society.

His talk and slide presentation traced the Hackensack River, its watershed lands and reservoir system from the river's source, Lake Lucille in Rockland County, NY, to Newark Bay. He stressed the need to safeguard our watershed, the most important ecosystem in northern New Jersey. The river and the surrounding land and streams belong to the public, have been protected by law since the 1880's, and must be guarded from infringement by



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industry and private citizens as well.

Capt. Bill outlined water purification through the years. and credited the Hudson River Fishermen's Association in Crotonville, NY for starting "the ball rolling" on keeping water supplies pure. He also expressed his gratitude to Fairleigh Dickinson University, Teaneck Campus, for the support and work site given to the Riverkeeper organization.

The program began with Firefighter Thomas Rubino calling the Department to attention, the presentation of the Honor Guard, and the Pledge of Allegiance.

Chaplain Deacon Vincent De Fedele provided the invocation. Mayor Rose Marie Heck, Fire Commissioner David Gonzalez and Fire Chief Michael Ratkowski made comments.

Fire chiefs from Moonachie, Wallington and Wood-Ridge inspected the Department's equipment -- and they did a thorough job.

Local officials and the public also inspected the equipment and met with the men and women who serve.

The Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department operates with 70 volunteer members, including EMS and Juniors.

The Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department has a Junior Squad for those between 16 and 18 years of age who offer on-scene support, but are not permitted to enter burning buildings.

Every firefighter must receive 25 weeks of basic firefighter training and every EMT receives 22 weeks of basic training.

Many members continue extensive advanced training in the areas of search and rescue, vehicle operation, incident command, hazardous materials, first responder, mass decontamination, etc. The Department conducts training on a regular basis. The Department is contracted to provide fire and ambulance service to the Borough of Teterboro, and has done so for over 60 years. In 2008, they responded to 1,564 ambulance calls and 597 fire calls and other emergencies. Its rolling stock includes two pumpers, 110 ft. ladder, heavy rescue truck, crash/foam truck, two ambulances and three chief SUV's. These assets are owned by the Borough of Hasbrouck Heights, but main-

The Department conducts only one fund raiser a year, with the proceeds providing training, supplies, etc.

The Department is a member of the South Bergen Fire Chiefs Mutual Aid Association which helps to coordinate multi-departmental responses to large-scale incidents. Zone 2 includes Carlstadt, Little Ferry, Moonachie, Wallington and Wood-Ridge. These departments are also all volunteer.

# **Mission of Honor**

On Friday, May 15, 2009, at 10 a.m., a ceremony was held to remove Veteran cremains from the Alesso Funeral Home, Lodi, NJ.

Joseph P. Glass was a decorated World War II Veteran who served in the Army from 1943 to 1945, and George F. Wells served in the Navy from 1941 to 1945. Both were honorably discharged. Neither received a military funeral.

Their remains were never recovered by their families when they died in 1993 and 1994, respectively.

More than one hundred Veterans, many with American Flags, formed a ring at the entrance.

The program began with a call to attention. The Veterans' remains in service urns, were walked through the Vietnam Veterans Chapter 800 Honor Guard and placed in a deuce and a half military vehicle, followed by the placement of folded American Flags.

Speakers included Vietnam Vet and co-chair of NJ's Mission of Honor, Francis Carrasco, Herb Worthington, Viet Nam Veterans of America State Council President, Bergen County Executive Dennis McNerney, with Pastor Steve Janke, Community Baptist Church, in Garfield, delivering the eulogy.

A mile-long procession down the NJ Turnpike was led by NJ State Police, Bergen County Sheriff's Office and Lodi Police Department, and about 130 motorcyclists from all over New Jersey, led by the Patriot Guard Riders, escorted the Veterans to the Brigadier General William C. Doyle Veterans Cemetery in Arneytown/Wrightstown, NJ (a state military cemetery). Over 300 people joined a ceremony with full military honors; internment took place at 1:30 p.m. At the cemetery, each abandoned Veteran was given a separate ceremony, consisting of a prayer by Chaplain Jerry Skorch of the Vietnam Veterans of America, a 21-gun salute and Taps played by a lone bugler.

Honor guards from the Army and Navy folded their respective Veteran's flag. Assemblyman Jack Connor accepted the flag and medals issued to Glass, and retired Col. Stephen G. Able, NJ Deputy Commissioner of Veterans Affairs, received Wells' flag on behalf of the state. At the end of both services, a bagpiper played Amazing Grace.

This memorial event was led by New Jersey Mission of Honor for Cremains of American Veterans (*www.njsmissionofhonor.org*).

Glass and Wells were the first Veterans in New Jersey to be identified, retrieved and interred in this program.

The Mission of Honor is an organization representing various Veterans and non-profit groups whose mission is to identify and collect orphaned, abandoned or forgotten Veteran cremated remains.

Inspired by the nationwide campaign known as the "Missing in America Project," Vietnam Veterans of America Roman P. Niedzwiedz (South Jersey Chapter 899) and Francis Carrasco (North Jersey Chapter 800) initiated this program about two years ago.

They shepherded legislation to change the law whereby the Veterans organizations can claim abandoned Veterans remains (once a year has passed since their death and the fu-



neral home has not been able to reach the next of kin), and provide a military funeral.

The law (2613A) passed by the Legislature last year, wassigned by Governor Corzine early this year. Although the law goes into effect July 5, 2009, Alesso Funeral Home volunteered both remains early to the Mission of Honor. The law restricts burials be handled only by Brigadier General William C. Doyle State Veteran's Cemetery (www.state.nj.us/ military/veterans/doyle.html).

The Mission of Honor is a state-wide effort to inter the orphaned and abandoned Veteran cremains. This task is executed through the combined efforts of members of The New Jersey State Council of Vietnam Veterans of America and other Veteran organizations.

The Veterans Administration and NJ Department of Military and Veterans Affairs will assist in identifying the orphaned and abandoned cremains.

The Mission expects that it will take years to research every hospital, funeral home, crematorium, senior home, Veteran home and institution in New Jersey. The remains are stored in cans or boxes with little or no identification that they are Veterans.


The Mission has established a protocol with the NJ State Funeral Directors Association to insure correct national, state and local laws are followed in the identification, claiming process and proper interment procedures have been followed.

They have a volunteer staff of over 135, mostly Veterans, and rely on donations to cover the costs (*the military branch* of service urn is \$25 and the American Flag is \$45).







# Heights Troop 17 Camps at Gettysburg

At about 8:30 a.m., on Friday, April 17, 2009, seventeen Scouts, leaders and parents left Hasbrouck Heights on a three and a half hour trip to the Gettysburg National Military Park in Pennsylvania. Every year, the National Park Service, which is in charge of the Park, holds a lottery for the use of the limited sites in McMillan Woods campground located on Seminary Ridge in the Park.

This year Troop Seventeen was lucky to be chosen. McMillan Woods was under Confederate control for the three days of the battle and was used as a staging area for the climactic end of the battle called "Pickett's Charge."

The Scouts had two objectives for this trip. The first was to earn "The Gettysburg Historic Trails Award." To earn this award they had to visit the new visitor center and museum, take various hikes in the Park, Cemetery, and the town of Gettysburg. They were required to answer questions that were in the trail guide booklet. These questions and the movie that is shown in the new visitor center helped the Scouts to understand the Battle of Gettysburg.

The new visitor center also has the "Battle of Gettysburg" cyclorama. The in-the-roundview painting was completed in 1884. This 377 foot painting has now been enhanced with sound and light. The museum has a very extensive display of all aspects of the battle.


The second was to learn about and see the locations where New Jersey soldiers took part in this battle. There were 4,505 officers and men in two gun batteries, twelve infantry regiments and one cavalry regiment from New Jersey present during the battle.

Of the two batteries, Battery B, 1st N.J. Artillery, on July 2, 1863, fired over 1,300 rounds, more than any other battery in one day, during the war. The other battery, Battery A, helped to defeat "Pickett's Charge." Confederate infantry came within ten yards of the battery.

The 12th N.J. Infantry also helped to defeat this charge. They captured two Confederate battle flags and many prisoners. During the cavalry battle, a trooper of the 1st N.J. Cavalry inflicted two saber wounds on Confederate Cavalry General Wade Hampton, forcing him out of the battle. There were many more acts of valor by Jerseymen too numerous to list.

The Scouts visited the graves of New Jersey's dead, from the battle, in the Cemetery. This was also the location of President Lincoln's famous Gettysburg Address speech.

All who attended this trip came away with a deeper sense of American history and pride in being from New Jersey. *Story and photos provided by Jim Halloran.* ###



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
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# **Origins of Pandemic & Seasonal Flu**

Hopefully by the time this man to human then a possible article gets printed, swine flu has been well contained and well managed and will have served as a wake up call for what a global pandemic could entail.

Governments and scientists on a global scale need to have a quick and decisive plan for containment, treatment, and future developments; but before we can move forward, we need to look at the past for clues as to why the influenza virus has been a difficult enemy to defeat.

In nature, the flu virus is found in wild aquatic birds such as ducks and shore birds.

It has persisted in these birds for millions of years and typically does not affect them; however, the virus frequently mutates and can jump from wild birds to domesticated ducks and then to chickens. The next stop in this chain is usually pigs.

This is where it gets interesting, in that pigs can be infected with influenza from both birds and humans, but it is very unlikely for pigs to infect humans.

Since the mid 20th century there have only been 50 documented transmissions from a pig to a human and even more atypical for that human to infect another human.

In a setting such as a farm where chickens, humans, and pigs live in close proximity, pigs can act as a reservoir where a multiple viral infection in a pig could cause mixing of the two virus' genetic information causing a mutation.

That in turn could lead to a virus that can be transmitted from pig to human and then hu-

global pandemic flu, which could have been possible with the Mexican swine flu.

It's important to know where new seasonal flu viruses come from and how they circulate globally. Seasonal flu is what occurs every year and is different from the feared pandemic flu.

On average there are 600 million cases of flu worldwide every year and about 500,000 of those will die. A pandemic flu could possibly be more devastating.

In a study that investigated seasonal flu outbreaks in great detail from 2002-2007, the researchers were able to determine that influenza viruses come from east and southeast Asia and it is a new virus each and every year.

The other interesting finding was that the virus doesn't persist in any one particular city or country in Asia, but the virus circulates continuously in Asia by passing from country to country, from epidemic to epidemic like runners passing unfortunately never ends.

So you may be thinking how does the flu start in a relatively warm climate if the flu is a winter time disease. Influenza in tropical countries, particularly east and south east Asia, tends to occur during the rainy season.

The variability in the timing of winter relative to the timing of rainy seasons in different parts of the world results in epidemics at different times of the year.

There are countries in Asia right next to each other that have flu epidemics where one is during our summer and the other is during our winter.

That is why viruses circulate continuously in Asia and

a baton in a relay race, which then they are showered out into the rest of the world by travelers.

> Viruses leave Asia all of the time and if it is winter in that region, an epidemic occurs, but surprisingly the viruses then die.

> Basically, regions outside of Asia are evolutionary dead ends. When viruses go to Europe and North America then South America they do not go back to Asia.

> New viruses appear in Asia about 6 to 9 months before they appear in Europe, North America, Africa, and Australia, and then appear in South America 6 months after a North American epidemic, because Asia and South America are not well connected by travel.

Pandemic viruses, like the swine flu, do not follow these seasonal rules, and to make things even more puzzling, if a pandemic virus reaches Asia it replaces all of the seasonal viruses that came before and then it becomes the next seasonal flu virus.

So for those that questioned why their flu shot didn't work, I hope this article shed some light on why it is so difficult to develop a vaccine against the flu, which is another interesting topic all together.


# Ervolino Entertains The Leisure Club

### Surprised by The Word

I once knew a man who informed me that he kept coming to Church in the hope of being surprised. Listen, in the midst of a service, even preachers can be surprised by the word they hear. It happened to me recently. Listening to the reading from the First Letter of John on the Second Sunday of Easter, I found myself somewhat surprised that in the midst of this continuing seasonal celebration of Easter we heard a text in which the apostle proclaimed the Christian message as this: "God is light and in him there is no darkness at all" (1 John 1:5). It wasn't that I hadn't read the lesson beforehand! It was a feeling that caught me just in that moment — a sense that this was a strange and wonderful way to speak the Easter gospel.

Or, the more I thought about it, perhaps not so strange, but nevertheless still quite wonderful. After all, the Vigil of Easter begins with a new fire struck as a remembrance of creation and resurrection, and the Paschal candle is lit as Christians proclaim and pray, "The light of Christ, rising in glory, dispel the darkness of our hearts and minds." Indeed, the imagery of darkness and light pervades that service.

I also began to think of a poem written by my friend Cyril Dwiggins who recently died. My friend, I was astonished to learn at his funeral service, had written poetry most of his life. I knew many things about Cyril, including his love for both philosophy and the Gospel of John and the Johannine tradition. I even knew that he wrote poetry occasionally. Once he had shared a poem about a time that he had almost died in a rip tide off the coast of El Salvador. In that instance, he had treated the moment with a restrained sense of levity in the face of death, imagining himself as flotsam and jetsam in the sea. It turns out that he had written poetry on a regular basis for many years! Cyril's remarkable poem, "Anthony's Cave," was printed in his funeral bulletin. The title, of course, refers to St. Anthony of Egypt, an early desert father, whose longing for God led him to dwell in the

solitude of a cave. The poem begins by contrasting Socrates' famous image of men in a cave, "chained to seeing/shadows for reality," with St. Anthony who

... chained himself to the Real,

found freedom in the chains,

and light against all shadows.

The poem ends with a reference to a later Church father, Augustine, who talked about the restlessness of the heart

that feels

the tugging on it of the truly Real,

the heart-emptiness hungering after God —

how all of us are empty, dark as caves,

waiting for Light to fill us up.

The late Brother Roger of Taizé once echoed that Augustinian thought as he reflected on the life of contemporary people, with all our yearnings after light, but confused about what that might be for us. He wrote, "From the depths of the human condition a secret aspiration rises up. Caught up in the anonymous rhythms of schedules and timetables, men and women of today are implicitly thirsting for the one essential reality: an inner life, signs of the invisible." Instead of a cohesiveness of life, Brother Roger observed that "in a technological society, there is a clear separation between prayer and work. When inner life and human solidarity appear to be in competition with one another, as if people had to choose between them, that opposition tears apart the very depths of the soul."

To walk in the light, says the apostle who writes First John, means to be in fellowship with God and with one another. If Easter means anything for Christians, it means that we have been brought into fellowship with Christ and with each other. That fellowship in Christ, says Brother Roger, finds a clear expression in the inclusive common prayer of the Christian community—"a worship service involving all the generations from little children to elderly persons."

Such common prayer, Brother Roger suggests, "is a serene force at work within human beings, stirring them up, transforming them, never allowing them to close their eyes in the face of evil, of wars, of all that threatens the weak of this world. From it we draw the energy to wage other struggles-to enable our loved ones to survive, to transform the human condition, to make the earth a fit place to live."

Paradoxically there is that dark that is intensest light. We who are dark as caves, waiting for Light, yet who feel the tugging of the truly Real, can only rejoice at the Easter message that the One who is light is there in the dark of our lives, transforming them. "Let not my doubts and my darkness speak to me," we sang, perhaps not so surprisingly, using the words of a Taizé song at the ecumenical service on Good Friday noon at Holy Trinity Church. "Lord Jesus Christ, your light shines within us./Let my heart always welcome your love." ###







It is up to his family to raise the \$6,600 needed to cover his expenses in Switzerland.


