

Resident Sisters, teachers, and others, joined in prayer and enthusiastic singing during the half hour program.


Students from the Felician College Child Care Center led everyone in an animated song medley, directed by Sister Mary Joellen Zajac.

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

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

Meet the Aviators Father's Day Treat

On June 16 and 17, 2018, visitors can meet pilots with both commercial airline and military aviation experience when they attend the Open Cockpit Weekend program at the Aviation Hall of Fame and Museum of NJ, located just off Rte. 46, next to Teterboro Airport.

Meet Capt. Bruce Meyer, a Naval Aviator who was carrier qualified, flew several different aircraft, and later in his career became a commercial airline pilot, flying first as a Capt. of the DC-3 and then the Boeing 767 and Airbus-300 with United Airlines.

Meet Lt. Col. Steve Riethof (ret.), U.S. Air Force, with 29 years of service, first as a Radar Intercept Officer in the F-94 aircraft and later command positions in various Norad radar facilities.

On Sunday, you can meet Capt. Janis Blackburn who started her career as a pilot for Princeton Airlines, a small NJ Carrier, then moved on for a long and successful career which included Eastern, Kiwi and Spirit Airlines, flying many different aircraft including the A-300.

Retiring in 2013, she remains very active as a flight instructor and has logged a total of 22,000 piloting hours. She is an active member of the Ninety-Nines women's flight organization.

New for 2018, is the restored cockpit of the Martin 202 passenger plane, including a new instrument panel and new pilot and co-pilot seats to sit in.

On display, are seven aircraft including the completely restored Convair 880 Cockpit, the Cobra and Bell helicopters along with our Airport Rescue and Fire-Fighting Truck. A qualified fire fighter will be on hand to explain and demonstrate the equipment.

Ten qualified Docent volunteers will be present to explain the numerous indoor and outdoor displays and answer questions.

Young people will enjoy many of the hands on displays and also includes a modern day history of the International Space Station (ISS) as well as a pictorial display of all the Astronauts from NJ including Buzz Aldrin, Wally Schirra and Scott and Mark Kelly.

A 10 minute movie about aviation's beginning and long history in NJ is shown in our auditorium.


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




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Heights Street Fair June 3

Mosquito Season is Abuzz

Standing water means you places (puddles, ruts) in yard could be raising mosquitoes!

Many generations of mosquitoes can breed right in your own yard. All mosquitoes need water to complete their life cycle. Mosquitoes also are not known to travel long distances from their water source.

Some mosquitoes lay their eggs in standing water where they hatch in just a day or two. They can do this in water that has been standing for as little as four days.

Other mosquitoes may lay their eggs in old tires, tin cans, or other water-holding containers including bird baths, wading and small swimming pools, ornamental ponds, clogged gutters, flowerpots or the drip plates beneath them, cups, glasses, drink cans, etc.

The eggs may remain unhatched for weeks or even months until they are covered with water!

Yard and home checklist:

- Get rid of old tires, tin cans, buckets, drums, bottles, or any water holding containers
 - Fill in or drain any low

- Keep drains, ditches, and culverts clean of weeds and trash so water will drain
- Cover trash containers to keep out rain water
- Repair leaky pipes and outdoor faucets
- Empty plastic wading pool at least once a week and store it indoors when not in use
- Make sure your backyard pool is properly cared for while on vacation
- Fill in tree rot holes and hollow stumps that hold water with sand or concrete
- Change the water in bird baths and plant pots or drip trays at least once a week
- Keep grass cut short and shrubbery well trimmed around the house so adult mosquitoes will not hide there
- Keep gutters clean and free of debris and leaves.
- · Store boats covered or upside down.

- If you must go out, wear long-sleeved shirts, long pants and socks.
- The EPA and CDC advise the use of a mosquito repellant, following the instructions on the label.
- Check with your pediatrician before using a repellant on children.
- Keep windows and doors closed or covered with screens to prevent mosquitoes from entering the house.
- Repair screens on windows, doors, porches, and patios.
- Some mosquito control methods do not do a very good job. For example, bug zappers do not work well to control biting mosquitos since they do not emit carbon dioxide.
- · Various birds and bats will eat mosquitos, but there is little evidence that this cuts down on the number of mosquitos around homes.
- Electronic mosquito repelling devices don't stop mosquitos biting people either. ###

Click It or Ticket is a highpublicity law enforcement effort that gives people more of a reason to buckle up - the increased threat of a traffic ticket.

Most people buckle up for safety. But for some people, it is the threat of the ticket that spurs them to put on a safety belt.

In Click It or Ticket programs, law enforcement agencies are asked to mobilize to focus on safety belt violations and publicize the stepped-up effort through news media and advertising.

It is the two-pronged approach that makes these campaigns powerful: Not only are tickets issued to unbelted motorists, but the surrounding publicity ensures that people know they are more likely to get a ticket.

Click It or Ticket campaigns and similar efforts have increased safety belt use in cities, states and even in an entire region of the country.

In New Jersey, 350 police agencies participated in the May 2017 Click It or Ticket Enforcement Mobilization. New Jersey's seat belt usage rate currently stands at 94.07%, up from 93.35% in 2016 and the highest usage rate that has been recorded. ###

- · Don't refuel lawn mowers, trimmers, edgers or other gasoline powered equipment while hot because the fumes may ignite and start a flash fire. Allow the equipment to cool. Use a funnel to prevent spills.
- Keep fertilizers and pool chemicals away from gasoline, oil and fuels. Pool chemicals (chlorites) and fertilizers (nitrates) are strong oxidizers and react violently with fuel vapors (hydrocarbons).
- Powdered and pellet chlorine should be kept in a cool, dry place. If water enters a chlorine container, it can react

Home Selling with Panache!

When real estate agents talk about 'staging' a house, they're referring to a method of decorating that is designed to showcase the home's best

It's not like plastic surgery which might improve your looks but is expensive and radical. It's just a little makeup.

A little makeup with potentially - big impact! It's an on-the surface solution designed to make your house especially attractive to prospective buyers who could be willing to pay top dollar for your new, fresh 'look'.

And, because not all sellers stage their homes - especially homes in the mid and lower price ranges – you could be at a much bigger advantage if you do.

Staging is entirely optional, but it really ought not to be. Think about it. When you're dealing with such a significant financial transaction, you don't want to be lazy and settle for a lower selling price or longer marketing period than you have to.

Relative to the amount of time and money involved. staging may be one of the most cost effective projects you will ever undertake. Potential buyers these days aren't just looking for a structure to inhabit - they're looking to fulfill their dreams and improve their lifestyles.

As a designer friend of mine put it: "People want it to look like a shelter magazine, or like something they've seen on TV.

Staging is about illusions. It's magical. It's about perfecting the art of creating moods." Staging helps sell those dreams and creates a more emotional purchase that can generate more money for the seller.

Home staging is also advantageous because potential buyers who will often unconsciously overlook work that needs to be done upon moving into the home. And we know that for every problem they see, they'll deduct its cost from their offering price. If they see too many problems, they'll pass altogether.

The home staging concept began to gain traction during the recession when anxious sellers resorted to any means possible to gain a competitive edge.

Back in the day, everybody was talking about curb appeal. Today, the number

one thing we want to focus on when you put your house on the market is 'click appeal'. Your pictures (please consider using a professional photographer) have to be amazing!

Creating the feel of "movein ready" is particularly important these days as buyers - unless they are all-cash buyers – have little extra money to make improvements under the tightened lending standards.

We realtors understand the power of a well presented property. With home prices going up and inventory still low, sellers have, undoubtedly, the upper hand in the current real estate market. 




































Curriculum Expo at RLC

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Revolutionary War Re-Enactor Makes Presentation to Troop 17

Mr. Edward Glidden, a member of the 3rd NJ Regiment re-enactors group, met with Scouts of Troop 17, Hasbrouck Heights, on May 3, 2018. Mr. Glidden is also a state officer of The Sons of the American Revolution. The SAR is made up of direct descendants of those who fought for our independence. The Scouts were preparing for a camping trip to Valley Forge, in Pennsylvania.

Mr. Glidden explained that there were two types of troops during the war. The first were state militia companies. These were local part-time soldiers who were tasked to protect their communities and be available to support the regular army. These troops did not wear regular uniforms but often wore hunting coats and carried any firearm that they possessed.

The second type were the regular soldiers of the Continental Army. They were grouped by the states where they were raised. The 3rd Regiment was part of the New Jersey Brigade of the Continental Line. These men wore regular uniforms. They were issued firearms that were the same type for each regiment. This could be either a British Brown Bess or a French Charleville musket. Mr. Glidden displayed and explained the differences of each of the firearms that were used. This included Penn-



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sylvania rifles, Brown Bess and Charleville muskets.

Mr. Glidden explained that the commands to fire, as a group, often skipped the command "AIM." The chances of hitting a target at eighty yards were about one in ten with a smooth bore musket.

The Scouts had a chance to ask questions and inspect the various pieces of equipment of a soldier. Mr. Glidden then gave each Scout a copy of American





Local Seniors Visit Branson

Fifteen seniors from Hasbrouck Heights, joined twenty-six seniors from other parts of Bergen County and New York to take a nine-day Senior Tour to Branson, Missouri. The Senior Citizens Club of Maywood sponsored the trip. The group visited six states, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Missouri.

During the round trip they stopped at the Gateway Arch, Anheuser-Busch Brewery and the River City Casino in St. Louis, the Fantastic Caverns in Springfield, Missouri and the Indianapolis Motor Speedway and its Museum in Indianapolis, Indiana.

The Gateway Arch is the nation's tallest monument, reaching 630 feet. Eight tram cars (pods), which can hold five seated people, took the seniors to the top in about four minutes. Once at the top in

the observation area, looking east is the Mississippi River and the Illinois Communities and west, the city of St. Louis, which includes a great view of Busch Stadium, home of the St. Louis Cardinals Major League Baseball Team.

The Anheuser-Busch Brewery tour included a brief history of the Brewery, a visit to observe the Clydesdales, free beer at the end of the tour.

The Fantastic Caverns were created by an ancient underground river, which carved the path for the only ridethrough cave. The temperature is a warm 60 degrees. While riding through the mile-long cave, you can experience the magnitude and stillness of the caverns.

The Indianapolis Motor Speedway is the home of the Indy 500. The event takes place on the last Sunday in May. The seniors took a 90-minute tour, including one lap around the IMS oval and then visited the museum to see the world's most important collection of racecars and motor racing memorabilia.

Lodi AARP Hears about Substance Abuse

Joanne Wendolowski, Public Health Nurse Supervisor at Hackensack Meridian Health Hackensack University Medical Center, addressed the members of the Lodi AARP on April 17, 2018. The topic was "Substance Abuse." She stated that you would imagine that the elderly would have the least problem with these issues, however, new data shows the number of seniors with drug and alcohol problems are on the rise. She also stated that it is not uncommon to develop an addiction later in life, but the health effects of substance abuse for those over the age of 65 can be more dangerous than in younger users. A majority of the seniors, because of legitimate medical issues, become dependent on prescription drugs. They may increase their dose against medical advice in order to seek greater relief from their condition. They



may even take other medication recommended by their friends to relieve pain, anxiety, depression or insomnia. This is drug misuse.

Likewise, more than a third of alcohol drinkers 60 years old and older drink amounts of alcohol that are potentially harmful in combination with a certain disease they have or medications they are taking.

Seniors are advised to let their physician know the names of all prescription drugs and over the counter drugs they are taking. They should not take medication prescribed for other people just because they have had success with it. They should read the labels and follow their directions. They are reminded not to drink alcohol in excess or when they take their medication. *Photo and story provided by Marie and Peter Gallo Jr.* ###

Restoring Smiles with Dental Implants

If you lose or break a tooth, a dental implant may be the best option for restoring your smile. Read on to learn more about dental implants and whether they are right for you.

What is a dental implant?

A dental implant is a post, usually made of titanium, that serves as a substitute for a natural tooth's root. The implant is placed in the jawbone so that it may fuse with the natural bone to become a sturdy foundation for are placement tooth.

Implants can be used to replace individual teeth or to support a bridge or denture containing multiple teeth.

Who can receive implants? Dental implants can be provided to most patients who are missing teeth due to decay, disease, injury or other medical conditions. You also may be a candidate for a dental implant if you can't wear dentures or find them uncomfortable, or if you don't want to sacrifice existing tooth structure to support a dental bridge.

Since surgery is required, implant patients must be in good general health with healthy gums and adequate jaw bone structure.

If an implant site lacks the adequate structure, a dentist may be able to perform procedures to improve it.

Implants are not for everyone, however. Conditions such as bruxism, diabetes or leukemia may interfere with healing after implant surgery. This also is the case for patients taking bisphosphonates for osteoporosis.

Additionally, patients who drink alcohol or use tobacco may not be good candidates for implants. Talk with your

general dentist to find out whether dental implants are right for you.

How does implant placement work? First, your dentist will perform surgery to place the implant in your jaw. Next, the surrounding bone will heal via a process called osseointegration, during which the bone grows around the implant to hold it firmly in place.

Finally, your dentist will complete the implant placement process by placing on the post an artificial tooth, or crown, which resembles your natural teeth

How long does implant placement take? Once the implant placement surgery is completed usually in an hour or two, the healing process begins, and this can take as long as six months. Additionally, the fitting of the permanent replacement tooth is usually accomplished in one to three weeks. Your dentist may provide you with a temporary replacement to help you eat and speak normally until the permanent replacement is ready. If your bone structure is strong enough, however, your dentist may be able to place the implant and replacement tooth in one visit.

What can I expect after the procedure? Most patients will adjust to implants immediately. Somepeople may feel slight discomfort or notice differences in their chewing or speech, but these symptoms are usuallytemporary.

How should I care for my implant? A major reason some implants fail is poor hygiene. It's important to brush implants at least twice a day, as well as to floss. Additionally, as many as four dental cleanings per yearmay be necessary to maintain gum health. ###

Congratulations are in order for Ed and Fran Di Bartolo of Lodi who recently celebrated 70 years of marital bliss. The couple tied the knot on March 18, 1948, and have been living the dream ever since.

Lavallette was a quaint little town that came to life every summer and attracted tourists from all over the New York, New Jersey area as well Philadelphia. Some of my most treasured childhood memories date back to those glorious days spent with my family and relatives at the "Jersey Shore."

The shore town of Lavallette, NJ, played a significant part in my childhood since it exposed me to life outside of Lodi. There among the sand dunes and beach umbrellas, I was testing the waters, (salt water that is) of new friendships and new adventures.

By the late 50's kids were arriving in Lavallette from all over the tri-state area, some as far away as Brooklyn USA.

At the time Brooklyn, NY, sounded like a faraway place and a kid like me was prone to asking these sojourners "How long did it take you to get here?"

Of course an 8 year old child doesn't measure time by the hours on a watch rather by how many times he or she asks "are we there yet?" If by the third attempt an overheated mother (cars didn't have air conditioners yet) reached angrily into the back seat, a kid knew that it was going to be a

I remember Lavallette having a main street as quaint and as friendly as my home town of Lodi, NJ. The strip was only about four blocks long and was lined with stores and shops every sandal clopping step of the way.

The streets were so clean that a kid seldom if ever wore shoes. There wasn't a shred of debris to be found anywhere. Borough workers for that lovely little shore town were out in force, each morning, at daybreak making sure that the beaches and streets were squeaky clean. I'm sure that it's still a daily practice even though the town has grown by leaps and bounds since the '50s and '60s. Located at the center of town, across from the Lavallette theatre, was a small supermarket where recent arrivals could stock up on enough supplies to at least get them through the first few days of their vacation.

Such, however, was not the case with my family. To us the Jersey Shore was uncharted

territory and we weren't taking any chances. After all, what if there were no stores there? Then what?! How would we survive?

With those questions plaguing every one's mind, the caravan of cars and pickup trucks left the safe and familiar surroundings of Lodi with enough food to sustain General Patton's 3rd Army for a month and we were only going away for a week.

If our worst nightmare had come true and the town of Lavallette ran out of food, we had enough to stock the shelves of that supermarket for the entire summer.

Meanwhile, up on the beach, fathers and their kids were having fun getting battered by waves as they collapsed onto the shore with thunderous impact. There I was, clinging with a death grip to my father's neck while the waves smacked him into submission.

My poor father, God bless him, had no recourse but to step back from those breakers only to have a few more tons of water crash down upon his bald little head. Some fun huh folks?

It is no wonder then, that my parents, Vito and Lena, saw fit to cart me over to the calm and tranquil Bay. True, often times you'd leave the water with a crab attached to your big toe but at least there were no waves coming at you like runaway freight trains.

On our first few visits to Lavallette, we rented a pink bungalow which was situated about a mile from the ocean. Each morning, the entire Pesenti Family, there had to be at least fifteen of us, would pack up everything we owned, chairs, beach umbrellas, baby carriages, cribs, food stuffs, valuables of various shapes and sizes, a change of clothes, books, magazines, and enough suntan lotion to baste a bull elephant.

It took all morning to prepare, close to an hour to carry all that stuff to the beach, and another 45 minutes to get situated. An hour later someone would complain that they had enough sun and the entire family would break camp and make that long, arduous journey back to the pink bungalow. At least it was downhill.

That was Lavallette the way I remember it as a child. Do you have similar memories? I'm sure that you do. See you here next month. In the meantime have an Artie Mags summer. On second thought have a better one!

New Barbadoes to Boroughitis: A History of South Bergen

Part 4 of 4

The New Jersey Legislature, in 1894, passed two bills that would bring about what would be called "Boroughitis." The first act stated that a new borough could elect a person to the county Board of Chosen Freeholders. The second placed all schools in a township in to one school district. The dissatisfied communities jumped on this to gain representation on the board or keep control of their schools. These are the major reasons that there are now seventy municipalities in Bergen County.

Community after community voted to secede from their townships. East Rutherford. March 28, 1894, Carlstadt, June 24, 1894, Hasbrouck Heights, August 2, 1894, Little Ferry, September 18, 1894, Wood-Ridge, December 6, 1894, Lodi, December 22, 1894, and Wallington, January 2, 1895. The Borough of Rutherford had been formed on September 21, 1881 and therefore predated the "Boroughitis" mania.

Some of those town hall meetings, to vote on borough status, were spirited to the point of fisticuffs. The Borough of Wood-Ridge drew their boundary lines to exclude an antiborough "Pumpkin Duster" homestead. Then the day after they had gained borough status, they annexed that farm.

Things began to spiral out of control. At one point, the Bergen County Board of Chosen Freeholders numbered twenty-four members. The New Jersey Legislature stepped in and passed an act limiting the number of any freeholder board to nine. Still later, in 1896, they stopped the formation of new boroughs; giving themselves the only right to create any new boroughs. The Legislature did create the Borough of Moonachie on April 11, 1910 and the Borough of Teterboro on March 26, 1917.

What of the townships? New Barbadoes was dissolved into the City of Hackensack in 1921. The three pieces of Lodi Township, that no borough wanted, were formed into the Township of South Hackensack on November 10, 1935.

From time to time the State has recommended consolidation in view of saving taxpayer money, but "Home Rule" advocates have won out. ###

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Veterans Today

The Sauk and the Fox lived in the Indiana territory. They had meetings with Governor William Henry Harrison, a future president, and a deal was struck in 1804. The Sauk and the Fox tribes agreed to sell the land east of the Mississippi River for \$1,000 a year and for goods and supplies.

It became known as the Treaty of St. Louis. The U.S. Senate ratified the treaty in January of 1805. The Indians could remain on the land as long as the U.S. Government controlled it but once it was sold to a private owner the Sauk and Fox must leave, as the treaty stated. Everything went for a while as settlers began to move into the newly purchased land in Illinois.

There was friction between Indians and settlers over the lead mines which the Fox controlled during the War of 1812. The Fox repeatedly drove off miners looking to take over their mines. All in all no major fights erupted.

Now, we move forward in

time to the year 1828. Thomas Forsyth, who was the agent in charge of the Sauk and Fox affairs, informed the chiefs that it was now time to prepare to move. They told him they never sold the land to the government. They denied ever making the deal. Apparently a deal is a deal until there is no deal. This would be a problem. William Clark, the famous explorer and the superintendent of Indian Affairs, reminded them of the Treaty of 1804 and added further pressure.

In the spring of 1829 Keokuk, a Sauk chief, told the people to prepare to move because the Sauk could not resist the U.S. Government or win a war but another chief known as Black Hawk refused to recognize the treaty and said the deal was fraud. Keokuk told him he did not have the approval of the council to make war and he would not be supported if he did so. Keokuk took the tribe west of the Mississippi River in 1829 but Black Hawk and his new followers went back to their old villages in the winters of 1830

and 1831. Black Hawk said we can do so until the land is sold. Just like the treaty states.

Black Hawk and his followers, which was said to be several hundred, took the opinion that he won't be removed until forced to do so. His crossing back over the river after the tribe had left was viewed as an invasion. The state militia was called out. Black Hawk looked for help. He went to the Kickapoo and the Winnebago tribes. There he met White Cloud, who was considered a prophet among the Winnebago. White Cloud would be an ally to Black Hawk in the near future.

Never the less the commanding officer of the militia met with the Sauk and Fox and told them none of them may come east of the river again. Black Hawk signed an agreement stating that Keokuk and the council were to be obeyed and he was not allowed to visit friendly British posts in Canada. Black Hawk was embarrassed and mortified.

Black Hawk wasn't going to submit to Keokuk or the council. He expected Keokuk to fight for the land. Black Hawk resented the tribal leadership. He did have those in the tribe that agreed with him. The Sauk and Fox needed food and supplies by the spring of 1832. So despite the agreement he signed Black Hawk with White Cloud took 1,000 Sauk, Fox and Winnebago over the Mississippi River to get the squash, beans and corn from their old farm lands.

A young Indian named Napope met up with Black Hawk and White Cloud with the claim that the British would help him with guns, ammo and powder. Also the other tribes in the region would help him. With all this in mind Black Hawk, at the age of 65, decided that he could take back ancestral land.

Black Hawk's entry into Illinois caused a great alarm. The militia was called out to defend the state. One of the militia men was 23 year old Abraham Lincoln, a future president. The Army also sent in troops to help. Black Hawk, his warriors and women and kids, went to White Cloud's village. There he was told that he and his people cannot stay. Also there would be no British help from Canada. He then went to the Potawatomi for food and supplies. Again he was told no and sent away. Black Hawk

Black Hawk's war was over before it started. Peace was his only option.

Hearing that the militia was only 10 miles away, Black Hawk sent some representatives under a flag of truce to talk peace. The militiamen didn't speak Sauk and took them prisoner. They then attacked Black Hawk's camp. This attack was a failure for the militia. They were quickly driven back and soon broke and ran. It was forever called the Battle of Stillman's Run. named for the commander of the militia at the battle, Isaiah Stillman. The militia had 12 dead and Black Hawk's warriors suffered a few dead as well. Black Hawk's war had begun, despite the fact he was looking for peace now.

Black Hawk moved his band north into Wisconsin to obtain food. With no help from other tribes he could not make any moves militarily that would really benefit his hopes of getting his old land back. There were small fights and clashes across southern Wisconsin and northern Illinois. On May 20, 1832. At Indian Creek, Illinois, Potawatomi warriors attacked a settlement and killed and scalped 15 settlers. Some Kickapoo warriors attacked a settlement on June 14, they however were caught and killed and scalped by soldiers.

Black Hawk and his warriors attacked forts in northern Illinois. June 24th he attacked a stockade on the Apple River and took food and supplies. He set up an ambush but the militia discovered him and Black Hawk was soon on the run.

Colonel Zachary Taylor, a future president, led 400 mounted troops and 2,000 militia from Illinois in search of Black Hawk's camp. On July 18th they found the trail of Black Hawk and his band. They discovered old and sick Sauk and Fox people. Those that were not already dead were quickly killed. Black Hawk and his band were trying to get across the Wisconsin River about 20 miles north of Madison, Wisconsin. Gen. James Henry and his troops caught up with Black Hawk's rear guard.

Black Hawk had about 500 warriors when he came east. The number that faced General Henry was unknown. In the rain the warriors there fought Henry's troops not really to win. They fought to give the women and children and the rest time to cross the Wisconsin River. Black Hawk and Napope with their warriors were in the ravine.

The militia had the high ground. They fought all day till both sides were exhausted. Nighttime brought an end to the

Battle of Wisconsin Heights as it is now known. Black Hawk was successful in that the band made it across the river but he suffered the loss of around 70 dead warriors. Seeing that all was hopeless the Potawatomi and Winnebagos that were with him now deserted and went home.

On August 1, 1832 Black Hawk and his band of about 500 now reached the Mississippi River. His people scrambled to make rafts and as they did so the Gunboat Warrior came down the River. The soldiers on the gunboat opened fire and after a two hour fight the gunboat left to refuel. Black Hawk sustained twenty four more dead warriors. Black Hawk felt that safety could be found north but no one was listening to him now. He and about 40 warriors left the group before nightfall.

On August 2, the gunboat came back. Also soldiers found the band on the eastern side of the Mississippi and the battle was renewed on land. The Warrior fired into the Indians as warriors engaged the troops for their survival. After eight hours of fighting the Battle of Bad Axe was over. The estimated Indian dead was as high as 400.

Sioux Indians friendly to the U.S. Government helped round up the stragglers of Black Hawk's band. Black Hawk stayed on the run but all was hopeless by then. He surrendered to Indian agents in Wisconsin on August 27th. Black Hawk's War was over. Black Hawk had nothing when it started. Not enough warriors, not enough food and not enough support. So Black Hawk's uprising burns out in one summer.

Most folks have no clue on whom or what Black Hawk's War was. From what I see the memory of it comes from books on Abraham Lincoln. Most of the books mention his role in the militia in Black Hawk's war. Black Hawk did write an autobiography which became a best seller after his release from prison but today to most people Black Hawk is a helicopter.

His name is kept alive in an unlikely place however. During World War 1 Major Fredrick McLaughlin was in the 86th Infantry Division made up of mostly Illinois men. He was in the 333 machine gun battalion. They were nicknamed the Black Hawks. He inherited a coffee business from his father and on the side he purchased the rights to the NHL expansion team in Chicago. He named the new team after the nickname of his old outfit. So there you have it kids. The Chicago Blackhawks are born. One word not two like Black Hawk. After a brief illness Chief Black Hawk died in Southern Utah on October 3, 1838. ###


