





About Father's Day

Father's Day is celebrated worldwide to recognize the contribution that fathers and father figures make to the lives of their children. This day celebrates fatherhood and male parenting.

Although Father's Day is not a federal holiday, many people make a special effort for their fathers or father figures. Father's Day is a relatively modern holiday, so different families have different traditions. These can range from a simple phone call, greeting card, gifts, to large parties honoring all father figures in an extended family. Father figures can include fathers, stepfathers, fathers-in-law, grandfathers, great-grandfathers and even other male relatives.

There are some suggestions that the idea of Father's Day may originate in pagan sun worship. Some branches of paganism see the sun as the father of the universe. The June solstice occurs around the same time of year as Father's Day so some people see a link between the two.

Like most holidays that go way back, the origin is hard to

trace but most people will agree that Sonora Dodd played a big part in starting the holiday.

Sonora Louise Smart Dodd first brought up the idea of a father's day in 1909 to honor her father, William Smart. When Sonora's mother died in childbirth with her sixth child, William was left to raise the newborn and five other children by himself on a farm in Washington State. As an adult, Sonora realized how strong and unselfish her dad had been raising his kids as a single parent.

Sonora wanted Father's Day to be celebrated on the first Sunday in June, because it was close to her dad's birthday. Instead, the first Father's Day celebration took place on June 19, 1910 in Spokane, Washington.

President Woodrow Wilson wished to make the holiday official, speaking at the 1916 celebration in Spokane, but its commercial nature caused Congress to not pass the bill. President Coolidge also made an attempt. It was not until Margaret Chase Smith, a senator from Maine, stated that it was unfair to honor mothers and not fathers in 1957. In 1966, President Lyndon Johnson made the third Sunday of June, Father's Day. It wasn't until 1972 that President Richard Nixon made Father's Day a national holiday - about 60 years after Mother's Day had been made a national holiday. Source: timeanddate.com



"There was no one in front of me but the enemy and no one else behind me except dense woods." One of Donald's war time memories took place on Thanksgiving day while being stuck on a mountain top. "A helicopter passed five feet over our heads and dropped a turkey dinner into our plates Remembers Donald "We didn't care as long as it was hot. To us it was heaven sent." Donald became a member of the Army Reserve. He retired in 1983 after being promoted to the rank of Master Sergeant. Hey Don, I'm sure I speak for the rest of the Artful Thinking family when I say thank you for your service. That goes for all of our Veterans as well. Thanks again. So... What are your plans for Summer 19? It's all ahead of us. The intense heat, oppressive humidity, the constant humming of air conditioners,

Chore Program Helps Seniors

Since 1977, the Chore Volunteer Handyman Service of the Volunteer Center of Bergen County has been helping elderly and/or disabled people, by performing minor household repairs that clients cannot perform themselves.

The Chore Service assists in improving the quality of life of older people who are living independently.

Chore's services include

ing leaky faucets or toilets, replacing broken door locks, installing weather-stripping, changing screens and storms, replacing light bulbs, replacing broken lamps and switches, installing simple electrical fixtures or replacing existing electric outlets and switches.

There are some jobs that are beyond Chore's capacity. Chore cannot service emergencies, and does not do outdoor work, painting, work requiring high ladders, tiling, door or window replacements, heavy lifting, new wiring or appliance repairs, cosmetic repairs or interior decorating. Chore serves Bergen County residents who are at least age sixty (60) or who are permanently disabled of any age. Chore operates three vans which are staffed by 45 volunteers. Crews, comprised of a driver and two to three volunteers, are on the road every business day year round.

Each year, Chore volunteers make approximately 2,000 home visits, complete over 5,000 repairs, and log in over 10,000 hours of service.

Chore volunteers are also needed. A Chore Handyperson volunteer goes on service calls one day a week from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Volunteers enjoy being part of a crew of one or two other volunteers plus a driver. Each crew is assigned 4 to 5

installing grab bars and interior railings, smoke and carbon monoxide detectors; repairservice calls each weekday.

Back-up volunteer handymen and women are also welcome.

Prospective volunteers should be able to perform minor household repairs such as those that able-bodied homeowners must do. Ideally, volunteers will be available on a regular basis so Chore can schedule a regular day with the same crew.

Bridging the Gaps

An empty space, or gap, in your smile may affect your chewing and speaking abilities, as well as your self-confidence. If you're missing one or more teeth, your dentist may recommend a fixed bridge as a treatment option.

What is a bridge?

A fixed bridge is a dental appliance that replaces one or more missing teeth, thus bridging the space between the two adjacent natural teeth or implants. Bridges are made from gold, alloys, porcelain or a combination of these materials.

A traditional fixed bridge consists of a false tooth or teeth fused between two crowns, or caps, that are cemented on the surrounding teeth.

An implant bridge is fastened to two or more implants that are submerged in the bone tissue. Bridges are sometimes called "fixed partial dentures." However, unlike removable partial dentures, bridges cannot be removed by the patient.

Why should I get a bridge?

If you are missing any teeth, the resulting space could cause speech or chewing problems. Missing teeth also can cause your remaining teeth to move out of position. This repositioning can make you more susceptible to tooth decay and gum disease, which can cause further tooth loss. A fixed bridge can replace those missing teeth, correcting your bite, and improving your chewing and speaking abilities. A bridge also can help to maintain the natural shape of your face.

What is the total treatment time?

There are several steps required and several dental visits needed in order for your dentist to create a bridge that meets both your functional and esthetic needs. The total treatment time for a bridge is usually two to four weeks, depending on the type of bridge you receive.

How do I care for a bridge?

The success of a bridge depends on its foundation the abutment teeth or implants — so it's vital for patients with bridges to maintain their oral health. If you have a bridge, it's more important than ever to brush for two minutes, twice a day, and to see your dentist every six months. Your dentist also might recommend that you use floss threaders to reach the spaces between the bridge and the adjacent teeth and gums. With proper care, your fixed bridge should last as long as eight to 10 years or possibly longer. ###






