Some as independents. The twists and turns challenge. Everybody watched.



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

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

## Strawberry Moon

The June full moon appears on Saturday, June 3, 2023, at 11:43 a.m. It is called the "Full Strawberry Moon."

June's full Moon—typically the last full Moon of spring or the first of summer—has traditionally been called the Strawberry Moon.

While strawberries certainly are a reddish-pink color and are roundish in shape, the origin of the name "Strawberry Moon" has nothing to do with the Moon's hue or appearance, despite the evocative imagery.

A Moon usually appears reddish when it it's close to the horizon because the light rays must pass through the descent layers of atmosphere.

According to the Farmer's Almanac, this name was universal to every Algonquin tribe. The name reflects the relatively short season for harvesting strawberries that comes each year during June. Other names include the "Full Hot Moon," or in Europe, the "Full Rose Moon."

The Native American Indians of the northern and eastern United States kept track of the seasons by giving a name to each recurring full moon. European settlers followed the custom. ###

The District's Lions Eye-Screening initiative is in conjunction with Lions Clubs International's KidSight USA project, which is a nation-wide program bringing Lions Clubs across the country together to ensure children receive eve screenings and follow-up care when needed. It should be noted that participating Lions use a special SPOT Vision Screener camera to take a picture of the eyes which detects any irregularities. If a concern is indicated, a print-out is provided to the School Nurse to review and to contact parents accordingly. The camera detects Amblyopia (lazy eye) and other eye disorders, and the screening process takes only seconds to do. At no time do Lions do any analysis other than operating the camera and providing the necessary

paperwork to the nurse.

Three Spot Vision Screeners that are used are provided by the Lions District 16N Charitable Foundation. Other Lions Clubs teams that participate in tandem with our Wood-Ridge Lions Team come from Bergenfield, Jersey City, Midland Park, Rutherford, Wallington, West Milford and West New York. The District Screening Teams have screened over 9,000 children during calendar year 2022, from Kindergarten children to high school students.

# FEMA Grant to Support Flood Mitigation Efforts at Boys & Girls Club of Lodi

The Boys & Girls Clubs of Lower Bergen County has been awarded over \$300,000 in grant funds from FEMA, to address much-needed flood mitigation efforts at their Lodi Clubhouse.

The Boys & Girls Club of Lodi has sustained substantial flood damage many times over the years of its existence. The 65,000+ square foot facility, at 460 Passaic Avenue, Lodi, sits on the bank of the Saddle River.

In recent times, the Clubhouse sustained significant damage to both its interior and exterior from Tropical Storm Floyd in 1999, a Nor'easter in 2007, and Hurricane Irene in 2011, resulting in lengthy Club closures, cancellation of programs, and costly repairs.

In 2012, the Club executed a flood mitigation plan, waterproofing areas prone to water penetration, installing a flood panel system on exterior doors, ejector pumps, and an emergency generator, to ensure the pumps work in a power outage.

The organization had to use a combination of insurance proceeds and SBA disaster loans to make the facility repairs and improvements, as they were not eligible for FEMA funding during those events.

Between 2012 and 2020, the Club did not have a true test of its mitigation efforts, as there had not been a major flood since Hurricane Irene, with the exception of multiple instances of parking lot flooding. And so, the building remained dry until 2021.

In 2021, the Remnants of Hurricane Ida wreaked havoc

on the Lodi Clubhouse and the Borough of Lodi as a whole. CEO, Joseph Licata said, "We were completely under water for about 22 hours. The basement which contains the ejector pumps, sump pumps, and our indoor pool's entire filtration system, had water about three feet below the ceiling.

We had inches of water in many areas throughout the first floor, and sustained damage to the outside of the building. Our front fence came down, we lost many interior and exterior contents and equipment, and we had a parking lot full of mud and debris, so cleanup was extensive."

Once the water receded, New Jersey Governor Murphy even made a visit to the Boys & Girls Club of Lodi to survey the damage.

Licata said "The Clubhouse was closed for about three weeks for cleaning and repairs, but without the mitigation efforts put into place in 2012, the inches of water on the first floor would have been feet of water.

Flood insurance proceeds, grants and donations, and FEMA Disaster Relief Funds played a critical role in funding the necessary repairs.

Since we were eligible for FEMA Funds this time, the Club did not have to borrow one cent, as compared to hundreds of thousands for previous disasters, to get the facility reopened for the children."

Mr. Licata said, "One thing was clear from Ida, mitigation does work, and after this first

test, we know the deficits of the current mitigation measures and where improvements can be made."

Fortunately, FEMA not only supports rebuilding after a disaster, but also the implementation of preventative measures to limit damages from future flooding.

And so, the Club has been approved to receive just over \$300,000 in FEMA grant funds for flood mitigation.

The funds will be used to install interior and exterior waterproofing, particularly on the exterior wall(s) of the gymnasium, which does not have a basement, where flood waters seeped through the walls and filled the gym with 5 inches of water during Ida.

In addition, a new flood door system will be installed to replace the outdated flood panel system. The flood panel system is very labor intensive and is near impossible to install without a few days' notice and a crew of at least five individuals with a truck to move the panels.

The new flood doors would replace all existing exterior doors on the facility, and with the simple turning of a lock at the top and bottom of each door, the doors make a watertight seal. This new flood door system is crucial, as the Club has been experiencing flash floods that come with short notice. ###

Foot melanoma is the deadliest cancer, but routine foot self-exams can increase early detection and survival.

The next time you clip your toenails, take a closer look at the rest of your feet. An extra 30 seconds could save your life.

Routine self-examinations of the feet are an important way to find skin cancer early, when it is the easiest to cure.

Half of the people who learn they have melanoma of the foot die within five years because the cancer had already spread throughout their body by the time it was diagnosed.

Nearly 60,000 people will learn they have melanoma this year. Approximately 15% of those cases will involve the foot and ankle, and more than 8,100 melanoma patients will die... nearly one death every hour.

If melanoma is detected in its earliest stages, 92% of pa-

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tients are alive after five years.

Unlike many other types of cancer, melanoma strikes people of all age groups, even the young. Caucasians are 10 times more likely to develop melanoma than African Ameri-

However, studies suggest more than half of melanoma cases in African Americans involve the foot, where late diagnosis leads to a higher death rate. Routine foot self-exams increase the likelihood of noticing suspicious moles, freckles or other spots.

We recommend focusing on the three most common areas for foot melanoma: the soles, between the toes, and around or under the toenails. Melanoma can develop anywhere on the body including areas that receive little sun exposure, such as the feet and ankles.

If a mole, freckle or spot starts to change over the course of a month, becomes asymmetrical, changes its border, color, diameter or elevation, contact your doctor immediately. Those are the ABCDEs, or signs, of melanoma.

# Filling You In

#### **Dentures**

About 23 million people are completely edentulous (toothless); 90 percent of people experiencing tooth loss have dentures, and about 15 percent have dentures made each year, according to the American College of Prosthodontists.

What are the types of dentures? People who have lost all or most of their teeth are candidates for complete dentures, which replace all of the teeth.

The following outlines other types of dentures:

· Partial dentures are for people who have some natural teeth remaining; they can fill in the space created by missing teeth and prevent other teeth from changing position.

This type of denture usually consists of replacement teeth attached to a pink plastic base, which is held in place by a metal framework and clasps, or natural-looking connectors called precision attachments.

- Conventional dentures are placed in the mouth after any remaining teeth are removed and the tissue has healed, which may take a few months.
- Immediate dentures are placed in the mouth the same day that the remaining teeth are removed. This means you won't have to go without teeth during the healing period, but your denture may need to be relined or remade after healing is complete.

• Overdentures fit over a small number of remaining teeth or implants after they have been prepared by the dentist. Your dentist will usually try to preserve your remaining natural teeth. Saving these teeth can help preserve your jawbone and provide support for the denture.

How are dentures created? Dentures are made of acrylic resin, sometimes in combination with various metals. The process of getting dentures takes about three to six weeks and consists of several appointments. Your dentist will take impressions and measurements of your jaw and create models to determine the appliance's shape and position.

Your dentures color, shape and fit will be assessed during multiple try-in appointments before the final appliance is cast. After you receive the dentures, your dentist will make adjustments as necessary.

What should I expect from my new dentures? Your dentures may feel awkward and loose for a few weeks as your cheek and tongue muscles learn to keep them in place. Your speech may be temporarily affected, and saliva flow may increase for a short time. It's also normal to experience some minor irritation and soreness. As your mouth becomes accustomed to the dentures, these problems should subside. If they persist, talk with your dentist.

For how long should I wear my dentures? Your dentist will provide you with instructions about how long to wear your dentures and when to remove them.

You may be asked to wear them all the time, including during sleep, for the first several days to identify areas that need adjustment. It is likely your dentist will recommend that you remove your dentures at night.

How should I care for my dentures? Dentures should be brushed every day to remove food particles and plaque and to prevent staining. After rinsing the appliance, gently brush all of the surfaces using a soft-bristle toothbrush and nonabrasive denture cleaner (not toothpaste). When you're not wearing your dentures, keep them in a safe place, and soak them in water to keep them from losing their shape. If you use a denture adhesive, make sure to follow all of the product's usage instructions carefully. Before inserting your dentures, brush your gums, tongue and the roof of your mouth with a soft-bristled brush to stimulate tissue circulation and remove plaque.

In addition to maintaining good oral hygiene, you should continue to see your dentist for follow-up appointments and regular checkups. If you encounter any problems with your dentures' fit, or they become damaged, contact your dentist.

85 year old Sal Yuppa, lifelong resident of the Borough of Lodi, remembers a time when doors went unlocked, automobiles were scarce and made their way over dirt roads and open fields.

"I grew up on Avenue A with my brothers Carmine and Frank Jr." recalls Sal. My parents, Frank and Lena, made sure that there was always food on the table and clothes on our back."

Sal, a 1955 graduate of Lodi High School, remembers hanging out at Charles Luncheonette with his pals Duke Scimeca, George Ciliberto, and Frank Muscarella. "I enjoyed high school," said Sal, "Didn't learn too much, but we had a lot of fun."

Among the street games that Sal enjoyed as a child was Kick the Can, Basketball and stick ball. "It was mostly bikes," said Sal. "We were always painting our bikes a different color. Everything was second hand. We used to take them apart and put them back together since new bikes were too expensive."

Sal also recalls going to the National Oval (now the Inspection Station) to watch people fly model airplanes. "As kids we used to go to Pete's Deli on Avenue C to buy potatoes," recalls Sal, "5 lbs of spuds for 25 cents. We chipped in a nickel each and roasted them in the curb in front of my house. We only used salt, since butter was too expensive."

Back in Sal's day the area around what is now the MV Inspection Station was all woods and streams, Sal and his friends spent the after school hours hunting in there for squirrels and rabbits. "My Mom used to clean them and cook them in sauce," recalls Sal. "We also used to catch catfish in the Saddle River by the Black Bridge on Outwater Lane. During the warm weather we'd swim in that same river.

Behind Panama's there was a beach where people could rent a row boat and spend the day picnicking with the family. There was also Tucci's Pool where we could swim if we had the money."

On Avenue A, Sal's uncle, Charles Lascari, kept a horse named Georgie, which he showed at community gatherings and parades. Sal remembers riding around town in the horse driven cart driven by his uncle. "After the war we'd clean out the stable," recalls Sal, "He'd pay us with WWII candy bars."

On Ave E and Main Street stood a popular haunt for area residents named Al's Bowlo Drum, which later became Phil's Auto Parts owned and operated by the Mobilio Family.

Sal and his friends worked there as pin setters for \$3 a night, which was quite a tidy sum for that day and age, especially for a youngster. "Gasoline was \$1.99 cents a gallon," recalls Sal, "We'd chip in 25 cents each for gas and drive around all night long."

According to Sal Yuppa, everyone got along famously during his childhood. "Neighborhoods were safe," said Sal, "People looked out for one another and spent many a hot and sultry summer night on one another's front porch since there were no air conditioners."

As kids, during those hot summer months, Sal and his friends used to walk the railroad tracks into Hackensack toward Cogers Farm on Rt. 17. "For a nickel you drank all the apple cider you wanted," said Sal, "It was worth the trip." Sal Yuppa retired as a driver for Yellow Freight in 1997 after a 25 year hitch.

Folks I'm sure that those of you beyond the Lodi border can find a fragment or two in the Sal Yuppa story that you can relate to regarding your town's history.

The towns were closely connected in the early days so many of us share the same memories.

I grew up in 50s and 60s when the winds of change were blowing over the landscape and many of the places that Sal described were giving way to progress.

I was lucky to catch a glimpse of "Old Lodi" before it gave way to those radical changes. For myself and the kids that I grew up with, it was a time of transition. A time of letting go of those open fields, abandoned barns, dirt roads, quiet streets and cozy neighborhoods that were safe since everyone took part in keeping it that way.

But every generation is witness to their own changes. Change and growth is the law of the universe. The cosmos tells us that nothing stays the same and in order to thrive you have to move forward and become part and parcel of that change either that or be left behind. I don't want to suffer that fate and neither do you am I right folks? The only thing that hasn't changed over the course of my life time is my hairdo. To me that's pretty comforting.

My dad was bald by the time I was born. In fact, I never knew Vito with hair which is why I plaster mine down with mousse. Not even hurricane force winds can stand up to that stuff. If my hair does blow off it's going in one piece. I can always chase it down the road and re-mousse it.

#### **Third Time Lucky**

Marc Chavannes and Alfred Fielding, of Hawthorne, New Jersey, had an idea for textured wallpaper. In 1957, they tried to bind two shower curtains to form air pockets.

They invented a machine to bond the plastic to paper. However, the paper did not stick. The idea of bubble wall-paper did not become a fashion fad. While this was a failure, they did receive the first of several patents on the process.

The two inventors formed the Sealed Air Corporation. The next idea was to develop the product as greenhouse insulation.

It was found that this was not a very good insulator, then, in October 1959, IBM announced the new 1401 Computer. Fredrick W. Bowers, a sales person of Sealed Air, pitched the idea to IBM, that the wrap would protect the 1401 during shipment. The rest is history.

The company produces, each year, enough "Bubble Wrap" to circle around the equator ten times.

They now market a version that is inflated by the customer. This was an idea that Alfred Fielding was interested in producing before he died. The customer inflates the wrap with a machine that they rent from Sealed Air.

The advantages of this product are that it stores flat and the customer can tailor the bubbles and air pressure to fit the need. However, you can no longer pop the bubble! Bubble

Wrap now only accounts for about 10% of the company's income. The majority of the company sales is in food packaging.

The honor of popping the first bubble goes to Howard Fielding, son of Alfred. He was five years old at the time. Each January, there is a "National Bubble Wrap Appreciation Day."

From 2007 to 2010, the Sealed Air Corporation held a competition for young inventors. Winners presented uses as diverse as flying kites, a two and a half foot model of the Empire State Building and a covering for an artificial limb.

A TV episode of the Myth Busters, tested whether a person could fall from thirty feet, wrapped in Bubble Wrap and survive? The answer is no!

A bride wore a Bubble Wrap wedding dress and actress, Farah Fawcett, did a photo shoot clad only in Bubble Wrap for a men's magazine.

One proposed use was a poor man's burglar alarm. Put the Bubble Wrap behind the door, on the floor. The would-be burglar will pop the bubbles, alerting you. One company issues a six-foot strip to its employees. They can pop the bubbles as a stress relief during the work day. What can you do with it?

Another great invention made in New Jersey. ###

#### Rail Update June 2023

Over the past two years since I last wrote about rail travel, there have been many changes and enhancements.

On a local level, the most notable of these is the expansion of New York's Pennsylvania Station across Eighth Avenue into the James A. Farley Building. This edifice, formerly New York's main post office, features a Corinthian Colonnade and was designed by McKim, Mead & White, the same firm as the original Penn Station.

This new addition carries the moniker of Moynihan Train Hall in honor of the late New York Senator, Daniel Patrick Moynihan.

Amtrak has moved its base of operations into this space with a bright, airy atrium reminiscent of the legendary former transit hub which was displaced by the building of Madison Square Garden.

As we recover from the ravages of the pandemic, Amtrak has been returning suspended services, as well as increasing frequency on its routes.

The legendary California Zephyr to San Francisco, Southwest Chief to Los Angeles, and Empire Builder to Seattle & Portland are now at daily operations.

Most recently, the famed Adirondak reintroduced service from New York to Montreal. The scenic route parallels the Hudson River and Lake

Champlain on its way North. This is Amtrak's final transborder route to be restarted. The Cascades to Vancouver and The Maple Leaf to Niagara Falls and Toronto are the other international trains.

Later this year, Amtrak will introduce a new fleet of Acela equipment on the Northeast Corridor between Boston and Washington. These high-speed trains will increase capacity by 25% on the popular route, be more energy-efficient, slightly faster, and offer increased rider comfort. Long-term plans by the national passenger railroad include service on routes stopped decades ago. If fully realized, there will be thirtynine additional routes and up to 160 destinations currently lacking inter-city rail service joining the network.

Tour companies that offer guided vacations across North America have itineraries that include rail options along with motorcoach transportation. There are even getaways that include one or more sightseeing trips on trains with historic steam engines or streamliner cars from the 1940s and 1950s.

In a promising sign, new rail service was introduced just four years ago in South Florida. The Brightline has proved extremely popular in the Miami-Fort Lauderdale-West Palm Beach corridor. Very shortly, this privately-owned high-speed service will extend its reach to Orlando International Airport.

Eventually, there will be up to sixteen round-trip trains

per day between Orlando and Miami. Eight of these are expected to be non-stop service, with the others stopping at West Palm Beach, Boca Raton, Fort Lauderdale, Aventura, and downtown Miami.

Travelers embarking on cruises at the Port of Miami will find complimentary shuttle service to their pier. Each of the stations along the route feature comfortable lounges and markets. Onboard service includes drinks and snacks. Free Wi-Fi is available both in the stations and onboard the trains.

Currently under construction is a state-funded high-speed rail system in California. Like Florida, it will be introduced in sections, with initial operation between Bakersfield and Merced in the Central Valley beginning in 2029. Shortly after, service to San Francisco and Los Angeles will follow with extensions to Sacramento and San Diego eventually completing the system.

Canada's much-heralded Rocky Mountaineer recently introduced service in Colorado which has proven extremely popular. The route between the Mile-High City of Denver and Moab, Utah takes travelers through canyons of red rock areas that cannot be accessed by road. The company plans to enhance the guest experience with upgraded rail cars. Unconfirmed rumors allude a to second United States route in the near future.

Unthinkable in the past, competition has come to European routes. Rail travel is becoming easier and faster with private, as well as national rail companies offering competing trans-border services.

Countries in Eastern Europe where modern service was non-existent in the past, are quickly adopting updated technologies to catch up with the west. Low-cost lines (like the airlines) supply more options for travelers on a budget.

Currently, there are trains that approach 200 mph in regular service including the TGV in France, AVE in Spain, and Frecciarossa in Italy. Each year more cities are connected by high-speed lines.

Passage by rail is a wonderful way to enhance your journey. With scenery right outside your window, you have the feeling of being part of the destination. Travel by train is an eye-opening alternative to being buckled into an airplane seat at 30,000 feet.

## Home Buying. Hopeless?

When Sam and Barbara Mazza moved from Sussex County to East Rutherford they expected they would be renters for a year or two at the most.

The couple began house hunting in late 2020 hoping to put down roots as they started a family. Two and a half years later, they have seen over 50 homes and made offers on several. Each time, the couple lost to an all-cash buyer, often people from the city looking to escape the pandemic and mounting crime.

Sam and Barbara have excellent qualifications but they can't pay all cash. And the months and months of disappointments have taken a toll. "When I hear of new listings, I don't get excited anymore," Barbara says. "I feel burned out. Sometimes I feel numb to the whole process because it's just the same old story over and over again. It feels like things are stagnant and there's no light at the end of the tunnel."

We in the industry feel it just as acutely. Would-be buyers and their real estate agents – even some on the seller's side – feel a sense of deep fatigue with what is today, inarguably, a merciless housing market.

Buyers keep searching but many have lost their enthusiasm, wondering whether this particular slice of the American dream might forever remain out of reach.

And, even if they do succeed, will it require painful sacrifices or settling for much less than what they had ideally imagined. "We've come to the realization that the home we buy isn't going to be 'perfect'." Barbara says. "And that's hard for us to wrap our heads around."

Stories like Barbara and Sam's are common today for frustrated buyers. Realtor.com wrote recently about things becoming so challenging that even sellers are struggling. Rather than being a buyer's market or a seller's market, experts there characterize today's phenomenon as "nobody's market."

Research at Realtor.com shows that new listings are lower than a year ago, by 13% according to last month's data. That's probably because many homeowners who would be selling, would, in turn have to buy something else. Few

people today want to be in that position.

Joan Sentipal, our seasoned Terrie O'Connor agent trying to help the Mazza Family find their home, has another couple who are so frustrated with the process that the husband refuses to look at another home. "He can't handle the disappointment," she says. Like the Mazza Family, this couple has been outbid on multiple homes. "It's exhausting and buyers start to take it personally: 'Why are we always being rejected?' Everyone is feeling the same frustration, everyone from first-timers all the way up."

And, conversely, where many would-be buyers are worn out after many attempts at a purchase, a lot of homeowners are fatigued just deciding whether or not to sell their home. Many are kicking themselves for not taking advantage of the stronger market conditions – higher prices, lower mortgage rates - that were prevalent last year. A number of those who bought homes on the assumption that they'd be able to work from home indefinitely are now returning to the office. These owners might want to move again but don't have enough equity built up to make a sale worth it.

So what happens next for homebuyers and sellers? With everybody burned out, is it possible that things could some way get better?

That will depend on a lot of different factors: mortgage rates, inflation and the economy in general. But, at least seasonally, we're in the midst of the spring upswing. Frustration aside, many buyers have renewed their resolve and are eager to get back out there hunting.

Our agent Joan, for one, has hope for Sam & Barbara and other buyers. "I may not have seen conditions like this before but that doesn't mean I've lost my optimism. I know that at the end of the day, we're going to find them the house they want," she says. "We just have to be patient and continue working hard."


