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Shifting to Safety and Managing Debt

A recent national study conducted among 2,024 financial decision makers revealed 1 out of 3 decision makers have already or are planning to move their financial instruments to safer havens.



Ambassador Addresses Kiwanis

The Ambassador of Girl Scouts of Northern New Jersey, Aimee McCarthy, was the guest speaker at the February 5, 2009 Hasbrouck Heights/Teterboro Kiwanis Club Meeting. She spoke about "Person First Language," a continuation of her Gold Award project. She

is an intelligent high school senior who has excelled in creative writing.

Her goal as Ambassador is to educate the public that a disability is not the problem. The reality is that people with disabilities constitute our nation's largest minority group. She stressed that the problems are language, attitudes and barriers.

Aimee emphasized that words have the power to inspire, motivate, and uplift people. Words also have the power to hurt, isolate and oppress individuals or entire segments of society.

Many labels used for disabilities in our society have negative connotations or are misleading. Using labels contributes to negative stereotypes and devalues the person they attempt to describe.

One of Aimee's roles as Ambassador is to help reshape our language so that we may refer to people with disabilities and the disability community in a respectful and inclusive manner. In place of saying "the disabled," it is preferable to say "people with a disability."

She also stressed that "people with a disability" can do a lot of things. We should never assume that "we" have to do everything for people with a disability.

It is better to ask if the person with the disability needs your help rather than doing things they are able to do themselves. For example, if a person with a disability drops something on the floor, don't just jump in and pick it up for them; instead, ask if they need your help.

Aimee's presentation was both eye opening and inspiring. She is a young lady who possesses not only determination, self-confidence and energy, but also the intellectual ability to go far. Story and photo by Peter Gallo Jr. ###

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Area Fire Departments Fight House Fire in 8^o Temperatures

On Sunday, January 25, 2009, at 3:57 a.m., the Wood-Ridge Police desk received a call reporting a smoke condition in the area of Fifth and Center Street.

At the same time, Patrolman Robert Jones and Anthony Primano were reporting a heavy smoke condition west of Fourth Street.

The officers responded to the area and located a residential fire on Fifth Street. They observed flames in the basement, reaching the height of the first floor.

The officers ensured that all residents were evacuated, as well as neighboring homes.

It was reported that the homeowner was sleeping in the first floor living room when he heard a loud bang, and then smelled the odor of smoke.

He attempted to enter the basement, but was pushed back by the flames.

He exited the home and broke a basement window attempting to put out the fire with two fire extinguishers that he stored in his garage.

At approximately 4 a.m., Wood-Ridge Fire Department Chief Anthony Gentile arrived on the scene, followed by Assistant Chiefs Thomas Burniston and Paul Clemente. An incident command system was established.

A F.A.S.T. Team from East Rutherford and Moonachie EMS/Rescue Squad was ordered.

A second alarm was requested, with Hasbrouck Heights, Moonachie, Little Ferry and Carlstadt Fire Departments responding.

The third alarm from Lyndhurst, Rutherford and Wallington was stationed at W-R Fire Headquarters.

Engine 905 connected to a hydrant at 5th and Fritsch, and advanced line to the fire scene. (Engine 905 was the water supply hub for all hoses.)

On arrival at the structure, Engine 905 took the first line to the basement. Simultaneously, W-R Ladder took position at the front of the building and raised ladders.

Engine 902 arrived and a team advanced another line to the 2nd floor.

Mutual aid companies arrived. Hasbrouck Heights Ladder Company personnel assisted W-R Ladder.

Other mutual aid companies began to advance lines to the fire, drawing water from Engine 905.

Within a few minutes, there was a full attack of the fire, with all companies engaged -- with a basement team,

first floor team, second floor team, lower roof team, upper roof team, etc.

At approximately 4:30 a.m., conditions forced a recall and accountability. The fire tactics then switched to defensive mode -- fighting the fire from the outside.

When the fire was "darkened down," there was another attempt to fight the fire inside, but the floor was lost and the roof was starting to go down. All teams were recalled and resumed defensive tactics.

The Hasbrouck Heights Ladder Truck was now employed, with a Moonachie Engine providing water supply.

A few minutes later, the Lyndhurst Ladder was brought to 6th Street and fought the fire from the rear. (A Rochelle Park Ladder was then stationed at *W-R Fire Headquarters.*)

The defensive attack lasted about 20 minutes and the main body of the fire was knocked down.

Teams now entered the structure to take down spot fires and began overhaul. The fire was considered under control about 5:30 a.m., and active fire fighting concluded at about 6:30 a.m.

The home was declared uninhabitable, with the residents staying with relatives.

Minor injuries were reported and treated at the scene. Injuries were mainly due to the extreme weather conditions.

According to Chief Gentile, "The 80 temperatures made fire fighting brutal. Ice formed on the equipment and had to be thawed.

The W-R DPW was called in to hand-salt the icy work area, and the heated town bus was used for firefighter rehab. The W-R Ladies Auxiliary assisted with warm beverages."

After the fire was extinguished, an investigation was conducted by W-R Fire Official A. Damian Cauceglia and W-R Police Detective Sergeant John Korin.

It was determined that the cause of the fire was accidental combustion of materials stored around the boiler, and ignited by the boiler pilot.

The residents operated a non-profit animal shelter, "Father Nature's Ferret Rescue." About 30 ferrets caged in the basement were killed. The homeowner arranged for a private contractor to remove the dead ferrets. Photos by Dennis Kronyak. ###

Life Saving, Meritorious Service and Professionalism Recognized During Wood-Ridge PBA Dinner

Wood-Ridge PBA Local 313 held a Valor Awards Ceremony at The Fiesta. The program is held about every five years and recognizes life saving, meritorious service and professionalism.

Master of Ceremonies for the evening was Sgt. Thomas Faivre (ret.). Faivre began the Wood-Ridge PBA Valor Awards program about 25 years ago.

Four members of the Police Pipes and Drums of Bergen County opened the program. Following the Pledge of Allegiance, PBA President Officer Jeffrey Geisler spoke.

The Honors Presented:

Life Saving: w/professional Staff, by personal medical knowledge, the officer prevents the loss of human life. w/Gold Star, while confronted with a dangerous situation, by rescue the officer prevents the loss of human life.

Honorable Service: A highly unusual accomplishment under a hazardous condition, or confrontation where the use of extraordinary judgement prevents serious injury or death to a third party.

Meritorious Service: A commendable performance in the line of duty. An unusual performance which prevents an action, criminal in nature, or leads to the protection of a third party or property. An outstanding investigation showing initiative and accomplishment.

Letter of Commendation: For the performance of duty in a credible manner, bringing acclaim to himself, and the police profession.

Recipients of these Honors were:

 November 3, 2003, Thomas Battaglia (Meritorious) and Matthew Mueller (*Letter*): Mueller identified and attempted to pull over a stolen vehicle which fled on Route 17 North in excess of 100 mph. The suspect ran Mueller off the road causing him to crash into a railroad

On January 24, 2009, the crossing. Battaglia located the 12 to 15 other Wood-Ridge suspect vehicle, which crashed, with the suspects running on foot in a heavily wooded area along the train tracks. While other police agencies set up a perimeter, Battaglia came upon a thick brush area, located one of the suspects and after a brief struggle apprehended the suspect. The second suspect was apprehended a few moments later.

- December 1, 2003, Joseph Biamonte (Meritorious): Biamonte was flagged down by a male stating his vehicle was being stolen. Biamonte blocked the vehicle with his cruiser, drew his service revolver and ordered the suspect to exit. The suspect rammed the vehicle in front of him, the officer was able to grab and subdue the suspect. The suspect was a career criminal with a lengthy history of burglary and theft.
- December 19, 2003, Joseph Rutigliano Jr. (Meritorious): On patrol, Rutigliano identified and attempted to stop a stolen vehicle which fled to Springfield Avenue, Hasbrouck Heights. The driver slowed down, jumped from the moving vehicle as it crashed into a telephone pole and ran. Two suspects in the rear seat were ordered out of the car at gunpoint, with one suspect struggling before apprehension. The driver was arrested later that evening.
- May 6, 2004, Jeffrey Geisler and Joseph Rutigliano, Jr. (Meritorious): Geisler spotted a male jump off the roof of Davis Drug Store and chased him through several backyards. After a scuffle, Geisler/Rutigliano subdued the suspect who admitted breaking in to steal prescription drugs. At the drug store roof, they found a large amount of burglary tools and several different disguises.
- July 3, 2005, Matthew Mueller (Meritorious) and Jason Montecalvo (Letter): Report of a car break-in, and with witness ID, led to arrest of two suspects, who gave up the third. They admitted to breaking into

vehicles that night, as well as dozens of surrounding area car break-ins.

- July 14, 2005, Michael O'Donnell (Meritorious): Spotting a stolen motor vehicle, O'Donnell pursued, traveled through eight towns to Paterson. The suspect rammed a Paterson Police cruiser, ran and attempted to climb a chain link fence when O'Donnell grabbed the suspect, forced him to the ground and handcuffed him.
- August 7, 2006, William Wolfsohn and John Korin (Meritorious), Joseph Rutigliano Jr. (Letter): After investigation, Wolfsohn/Korin were arresting a suspect dealing in prescription drugs departing a SUV. The driver attempted to run over a Task Force officer. Wolfsohn/Korin pursued with driver going off the road, stopped and fled on foot towards Rt. 17. Wolfsohn ran, tackled and handcuffed the
- August 23, 2007, Joseph Rutigliano Jr. (Letter): While on traffic control, arrested suspect impersonating a responding firefighter (and convicted arsonist) on August 23rd. At a working fire in South Hackensack on August 28th, Rutigliano recalled it was suspect's work address, identified him at the scene which after investigation, led to the suspect charges with several unsolved arsons in the area.
- March 27, 2008, David Marchitelli (Meritorious) and Daniel Sansevere (Letter): Initial traffic stop on Route 17 by Marchitelli, who conducted a field sobriety test and arrested driver. The female passenger, with an active warrant from East Orange, was arrested. Vehicle search found substance believed to be crack cocaine and a 9mm handgun used several years earlier in an unsolved homicide in Newark, NJ.

•May 3, 2008, Anthony Primiano (Meritorious), Daniel Sansevere, John Korin, Jason Montecalvo, David Marchitelli, Joseph Rutigliano Jr., Michael

O'Donnell, Matthew Mueller (Letter): Initial traffic stop on Hackensack Street by Primiano. Marijuana present led to drug arrest. Quick police work led to arrest of the drug dealer within hours and seizing one half pound of marijuana, two small bags of cocaine, \$13,000 cash and two vehicles. Suspected dealer was wanted in Florida.

- December 27, 2004, Thomas Battaglia and Jason Montecalvo (Life Saving w/ Professional Staff): At Valley Bagel, Battaglia and Montecalvo found a female victim laying on floor gasping for air, stopped breathing and had no pulse. They began CPR, used defibrillator to regain pulse and continued rescue efforts until the W-R Emergency Squad
- November 24, 2006, Matthew Mueller and Joseph Rutigliano Jr. (Life Saving w/Gold Star): A frightened nine year old autistic child was stuck on the roof of home. Mueller climbed a ladder to the roof and sat next to the boy. Unable to get the child's attention, Mueller asked him for a hug and the child did without hesitation. Mueller was able to walk across the roof with the child and hand him off to Rutigliano at the top of the ladder.
- February 8, 2008, Matthew Mueller and Dominick Munofo, (Life Saving w/Professional Staff): Mueller and Munofo found an unconscious and unresponsive victim on the kitchen floor, began CPR, used defibrillator several times to regain weak pulse. They continued rescue efforts until the W-R Emergency Squad arrived.

October 20, 2008, Robert Jones and Jason Montecalvo (Life Saving): Located in a bedroom was an unconscious and not breathing victim, Jones and Montecalvo began CPR, used defibrillator once to regain pulse. They continued rescue efforts until the W-R Emergency Squad arrived.

• July 18, 2006, Robert

Jones (Honorable Service): With a tree and wires down blocking the steps to the porch and an electrical fire on the side of the house, blocking access to the side entrance, Jones rescued the three occupants trapped on the porch by having two jump. He caught them and escorted them to safety. A senior had to be helped over the porch and carried to the ground.



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Lincoln Visits Wood-Ridge

He was known as the "Illinois Rail Splitter," "Honest Abe," the "Great Emancipator" and some even called him "Father Abraham." We know him as the 16th President of the United States, Abraham Lincoln.

He stated that he had only visited New Jersey twice in his lifetime, once to Jersey City and another time to visit Trenton. He also regretfully remembered that in the elections held in 1860 and 1864, New Jersey's popular vote went to his opponents.

Lincoln discussed his childhood, his parents, his wife and his children. He was born in Kentucky, where his grandfather, Abraham Lincoln, was killed by the Indians. His family moved to Indiana after his mother's death, where his father remarried. He later moved to Illinois.

He discussed working on a farm, splitting rails for fences and keeping store in New Salem. He also chatted about his involvement as a captain in the Black Hawk War; his eight years in the Illinois legislature; and how he rode the circuit of courts for many years.



Lincoln talked at length about his wife, Mary Todd, and his four boys; his debates with Stephen Douglas; and the national reputation he gained from these debates which, he attributed to his election as President.

The Wood-Ridge Historical Society scheduled this program which was offered though the Horizons Speakers Bureau of the New Jersey Council for the Humanities, state partner of the National Endowment for the Humanities.

The Historical Society is an active group of Wood-Ridge residents who realize the value of the past and its importance to the future. 

lows us to use less energy in lighting our homes by taking advantage of the longer and later daylight hours.

Daylight-Saving Time was instituted in the United States during World War I in order to save energy for war production by taking advantage of the later hours of daylight between April and October.

During World War II, the federal government again required the states to observe the time change. Between the wars and after World War II, states and communities chose whether or not to observe Daylight-Saving Time.

In 1966, Congress passed the Uniform Time Act which standardized the length of Daylight-Saving Time.

The idea of daylight saving was first conceived by Benjamin Franklin in 1784.

A study by the U.S. Law Enforcement Assistance Administration found that crime was consistently less during periods of Daylight-Saving Time than during comparable standard time periods. Data showed violent crime down 10 to 13 percent. It is clear that for most crimes where darkness is a factor, such as muggings, there are many more incidents after dusk than before dawn, so light in the evening is most welcome.

Full Worm Moon

According to the Farmer's Almanac, as the temperature begins to warm and the ground begins to thaw, earthworm casts appear, heralding the return of the robins.

Northern tribes also referred to this Moon as the "Full Crow Moon" when the cawing of crows signaled the end of winter; or the "Full Crust Moon," because the snow cover becomes crusted from thawing by day and freezing at night.

The "Full Sap Moon" marks the time of tapping maple trees in another variation. To settlers, it was also known as the "Lenten Moon" and was considered the last full moon of winter.

The Native American Indians of the northern and eastern United States kept track of the seasons by giving a name to each recurring full moon. European settlers followed the custom. ###











































Heights Teen Crowned Miss Teen America






















Corpus Christi Students Participate in Lenten Season; **Prepare for Terra Nova Testing**

Police Chief Warns of Scams

Little Ferry Police Chief Ralph C. Verdi reminds residents that as spring approaches, residents should be aware of warm weather scams.

Questionable people usually prey upon senior citizens and people living alone, because they would rather deal with a lone decision maker.

With no one to confer with, it makes it easier for them to weave their web of deception.

The Chief said, "They prey on senior citizens because they have the time, they're home, and they're mellow in their older age. They try to see the good in everybody."

People should be suspicious of unsolicited work offers. "The day of door-to-door salesmen is over," Chief Verdi said

"If you've got somebody going door to door for house repairs, the chance is good that it's some kind of scam."

They say they are doing the house down the street and offer a discount.

Sometimes they will try to scare their prospects by bringing up dangerous situations that must be corrected immediately. But most often, nothing is wrong or just a minor repair would be needed.

One of the more common scams is to knock on the door and tell the homeowner that they do roofing, and when passing by they noticed that the roof is badly damaged.

They explain how the home is being damaged even before leaks become visible.

They use high pressure, aggressive tactics and convince the homeowner that the roof needs immediate attention.

They ask for cash and say they will need to get some supplies and be right back. That's the last you will see them or your money.

Always remember to use common sense and think about it for a minute. How can these strangers show up and tell you about a serious problem that you are unaware of?

In another variation of this scam, workers will begin a home repair job such as repaving a driveway, take the deposit, and never return to finish the work.

The bogus contractor will begin the job and tell the resident that the damage was worse than originally estimated, so he or she will have to pay more money.

The best way to avoid becoming a victim of a home repair scam is not to allow people to do repairs unsolicited.

On some occasions, scammers have been known to work in tandem, gaining access into the home on the pretense of using the bathroom. While one of them has the attention of the homeowner, one of the other men or women will quickly search for cash and valuables

Never let any of these people in your home under any circumstances.

Chief Verdi said, "Most people are inherently good.

Most businesses are legitimate and provide good services at fair prices.

However, the consumer should be suspicious of any cold call or visit to your door without an appointment.

Anyone coming to your door should be able to identify themselves with proper I.D., company uniform or commercial vehicle (it is required to be lettered with the name and base town of the company).

Most importantly, do not be pressured by anyone. Follow your instincts; if you are uneasy, lock your door and call a neighbor or the police."

If senior citizens ever suspect a problem, the most important thing to do is call the police at 201-641-2770.

"If they feel that they have been scammed, there's a good chance that they're not the first one and we need to know about it," Chief Verdi said. "The more reports we have, the better chance we have of catching them." ###

Bailout for the **Real Estate Industry?**

Just recently, the US Senate unanimously passed a bipartisan amendment to the Economic Stimulus bill that should help home sales by creating a \$15,000 tax credit to buyers who purchase a home in the next 12 months.

Specifically, the Isakson-Liberman amendment would provide a direct tax credit of \$15,000 or 10% of the purchase price, whichever is less. Purchases must be made within one year of the legislation's enactment and the tax credit would not have to be repaid.

The amendment would allow taxpayers to claim the

credit on their 2008 income tax return. It seeks also to prevent misuse by only allowing purchases of a principal residence and by recapturing the credit if the home is sold within 2 years of purchase. The amendment would supersede, on date of enactment, the current tax credit of \$7,500.

While the fine details of the Stimulus Bill are still being detailed, this amendment represents a tremendous step forward towards helping to stabilize housing markets locally and around the country.

Nurse's Station **Spring Fever**

March is the time to forget about the cold and ice and flu and prepare for a more common infection.

It's that time of the year again; outside, the sun is shimmering, flowers are blooming, the temperature is perfect, and the outside is calling your name. You guessed it, you probably have spring fever.

Like cabin fever, spring fever can strike without warning and spread quickly.

If you're already feeling restless from being cooped up in an office or classroom, you could be feeling the onset of spring fever.

Symptoms include lack of focus on work, the urge to spend as much time as possible outside and lots of gazing out the window. Your eyes start searching for anything green.

That is usually followed by an interest in spotting birds, butterflies and crabgrass.

Some scientists think spring fever is more than just a colloquialism – they think it's a constellation of symptoms brought about by hormonal changes in the body.

In winter, the body secretes high levels of melatonin, a hormone that governs sleepwake cycles. Come spring, the increasing amount of daylight is registered by light-sensitive tissue in the eye, which signals the brain to stop secreting so much melatonin. As the hormone's levels drop off, greater wakefulness results.

On the other hand, levels of another chemical, serotonin, rise in spring. This mood-elevating neurotransmitter may be at the root of the giddiness, energy boost and enthusiasm that characterize spring fever.

Anthropologists have suggested that spring fever may have developed over the course of human evolution. They point out that early humans often spent winter in a state of nearhibernation.

Then, when spring arrived, they would enter an active period of intense hunting and gathering.

That theory may be attractive; it doesn't quite explain the state of the early American colonists come spring.

Historians think the colonists coined the term "spring fever" to refer to the weakness, fatigue and irritability many felt after a long winter without fresh fruits or vegetables. (The colonists' symptoms were that of scurvy.)

Such etymology suggests that the term spring fever is a remnant of times past that's been co-opted to mean something different today.

But there's no doubt that the body's internal chemistry and susceptibility to illness changes with the seasons.

On the plus side, spring is also the season in which people bid a temporary farewell to flu, seasonal affective disorder and heart attacks, all of which peak in winter.

Many of spring's effects on the human mind and body are seemingly contradictory. Hormones do a partial job of explaining the seasonal epidemic of impulsive, giddy and amorous behaviors observed as the memory of winter fades, but much about the season's influences remains mysterious.

Poets have been writing

March Birthstone Aquamarine or **Bloodstone** (Heliotrope)

about the phenomenon for years, but now scientists can explain the symptoms of spring fever with evidence about our brain's chemical reactions to the light, warmth, and scents of the spring season.

Just as decreased sunlight can put people into a depression during the winter, (called Seasonal Affective Disorder - SAD), the increased sunlight with springtime leads to more release of serotonin, making us happier.

The ingredients of warmer weather, and the flowery aromas of the season, give us a greater desire to socialize and even, perhaps, fall in love.

This was not only a comparison of the fashions but also of the lives of these ladies.


The Victorian Era is the time when Queen Victoria reigned over England; the time being the latter part of the 19th century and the beginning of the 20th century.

so that they could achieve a very small waist. The average waist was eighteen inches. No Victorian woman would go out without her hat and gloves.

the clothing that was used during her presentation and also discussed the various fabrics used to make outfits.

Home Care Discussed at Leisure Club

FAITH MATTERS: Resurrection Faith

My oldest niece is all grown nothing was expected. up now, but she was only three years old when I went to visit her one Easter.

She took me for a walk through the neighborhoods, and showed me all the different houses: "the Smiths live over there...that's the Stevensons' yard... the Engelbrights live there and they don't have any

"They don't have any dog?" I asked.

"Nope, " she said, "the dog died."

"Oh, that's too bad," I said.

"Oh, it's okay," she assured me, "he'll be back in a couple

...Auntie was a bit slow, and it took a few more backand forth conversation for me to realize that the tiny child had taken her Sunday School lesson about the Resurrection and applied its life lesson quite literally, as children do, to a real-life situation.

I think of that conversation every year, as Easter approaches and I try once again to understand for myself, and interpret for others, what Resurrection means.

Most of us, I suppose, if we think about it, believe in some hazy way that Jesus rose from the tomb, as my niece believed that the dog would return from the dead.

And we think of it as a once-for-all event that happened two thousand years ago, a nice occasion for a celebration.

But while I do believe that Resurrection happened THEN, that Jesus left the tomb and ap peared to the witnesses, I also believe that if the Christian faith is to be alive, and Christians are to have anything to say to our world in the twentyfirst century, we must see and believe and proclaim that Resurrection happens NOW: every time love is shared, every time forgiveness happens, every time newness breaks out where



National Poison Prevention Week

Safety officials remind area residents to observe National Poison Prevention Week, March 15-21, 2009, which is designated to highlight the dangers of poisonings and how to prevent them.

Most poisonings occur when parents or caregivers are home, but not paying attention.

The most dangerous potential poisons are medicines, cleaning products, antifreeze, windshield wiper fluid, pesticides, furniture polish, gasoline, kerosene and lamp oil.

- Store medicine, cleaners, paints/varnishes and pesticides in their original packaging in locked cabinets or containers, out of sight and reach of children.
- Install a safety latch that locks when you close the door - on child-accessible cabinets containing harmful products. Purchase and keep all medicines in containers with safety caps. Discard unused medica-
- Never refer to medicine as "candy" or another appealing name.
 - Check the label each time

you give a child medicine to

- Never place poisonous products in food or drink containers.
- Maintain working smoke and carbon monoxide detec-

Treatment: If your child is unconscious, not breathing, or having convulsions or seizures due to poison contact or ingestion, call 911. If your child has come in contact with poison, and has mild or no symptoms, call your poison control center at 1-800-222-1222. ###

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
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Hasbrouck Heights Polling Places Changed for 2009
