save up to \$16,500 in a 401(k). For folks over 50, the limit is \$22,000.

If it's not possible to hit the maximum limit, at least you can add to your savings when you get a raise.

Even small savings increases make a huge difference over time. For example, assuming an average annual return of 8 percent a year, a 30-year-old who saves \$3,000 a year for 40 years will amass roughly \$810,000 by age 70¹/₂, when withdrawal of assets must begin. Salting away just \$1,000 more each year results in a nest egg of more than \$1 million.

2. Snag permanent tax breaks

Look for other savings opportunities with tax perks. One of the best is the Roth IRA. People love the Roth because your earnings grow tax-free forever. And unlike other accounts, you never have to take withdrawals, so you can leave them untouched for your heirs. 3. Consider other IRAs

If your income exceeds a

certain amount, you may not be eligible to fund a Roth. This applies to single individuals with incomes in 2009 topping out at \$120,000 and married couples filing a joint return with incomes up to \$176,000.

That doesn't mean you have to give up tax-friendly savings. You may be able to fund a traditional deductible IRA. But if you (or a spouse) are already enrolled in an employer retirement plan, you face income restrictions there too.

A nondeductible IRA lets earnings grow tax-deferred, meaning you won't pay taxes on earnings until they're withdrawn. Bonus: In 2010, you can convert these IRA assets to a Roth IRA, regardless of your income, thanks to new rules. ###

Reflections

The Promise of Grace

"I believe that I will see the goodness of the Lord in the land of the living," Psalm 27 declares.

This statement, attributed to David, is a statement of faith and hope. These words both affirm and point us forward to the steadfast love and grace of God. One of the marvelous qualities of ancient Hebrew is the ambiguity of tense.

Ancient Hebrew does not use past, present and future as English or other languages do. Verbs could be rendered, for example, I have seen, I see or I will see. The ambiguity of the sense of time present in the ancient Hebrew writings mirrors the ambiguity of God's time and the very nature of God's "being."

The written language of the ancient Hebrews is a metaphor for the fluid nature of God's eternal nature—God is not just of one time, but encompasses all time.

Each year, Christians are invited to engage in a pilgrimage, a spiritual journey during Lent.

Stories about leprechauns are very brief and have local names and scenery attached to them.

In most tales and stories, leprechauns are depicted as harmless creatures who enjoy solitude and live in remote locations, although opinion is divided as to if they ever enjoy the company of other spirits.

Although rarely seen in social situations, leprechauns are supposedly very well spoken and, if ever spoken to, could make good conversation.

The modern image of the leprechaun is depicted wearing an emerald green frock coat, and bestowed with the knowledge of the location of buried treasure, often in a crock of gold. ###

Spring Forward March 14

Daylight Saving Time will commence on the second Sunday in March and end on the first Sunday in November.

At 2 a.m., on March 14, 2010, clocks should be set forward one hour ahead of standard time (*spring forward*).

Daylight Saving Time allows us to use less energy in lighting our homes by taking advantage of the longer and later daylight hours.

Daylight Saving Time was instituted in the United States during World War I in order to save energy for war production by taking advantage of the later hours of daylight between April and October.

During World War II, the federal government again required the states to observe the time change. Between the wars and after World War II, states and communities chose whether or not to observe Daylight Saving Time.

In 1966, Congress passed the Uniform Time Act which standardized the length of Daylight Saving Time.

Daylight Saving Time is four weeks longer since 2007 due to the passage of the Energy Policy Act in 2005.

The Act extended Daylight Saving Time by four weeks from the second Sunday of March to the first Sunday of November, with the hope that it would save 10,000 barrels of oil each day through reduced use of power by businesses during daylight hours.

Unfortunately, it is exceedingly difficult to determine energy savings from Daylight Saving Time and based on a variety of factors, it is possible that little or no energy is saved by Daylight Saving Time.

The idea of daylight saving was first conceived by Benja-

min Franklin in 1784.

A study by the U.S. Law Enforcement Assistance Administration found that crime was consistently less during periods of Daylight Saving Time than during comparable standard time periods. Data showed violent crime down 10 to 13 percent. It is clear that for most crimes where darkness is a factor, such as muggings, there are many more incidents after dusk than before dawn, so light in the evening is most welcome. ###

Beware the Ides of March

Those familiar with history or William Shakespeare's play "Julius Caesar," recognize the reference to March 15, the day of Julius Caesar's assassination in 44 B.C. after declaring himself dictator of Rome for life.

"Beware the Ides of March" is the soothsayer's message to Julius Caesar, warning of his death and has forever imbued that date with a sense of foreboding.

After Caesar's untimely exit, superstitious Romans may well have avoided launching a business, marriage or other important venture on a date so cloaked in doom it eventually entered the lexicon as a metaphor for impending catastrophe.

But in Roman times the expression "Ides of March" did not necessarily evoke a dark mood—it was simply the standard way of saying "March 15."

A Roman saying, "four Ides," (meaning four days before Ides), would be just as clear to other Romans as someone saying March 11.

For ancient Romans, an Ides was merely one of several common calendar terms used to mark monthly lunar events. The Ides simply marked the appearance of the full moon.

Each month has an Ides (*usually the 15th*) and this date wasn't significant in being associated with bad luck or doom. ###

Northern tribes also referred to this Moon as the "Full Crow Moon" when the cawing of crows signaled the end of winter; or the "Full Crust Moon," because the snow cover becomes crusted from thawing by day and freezing at night. The "Full Sap Moon" marks the time of tapping maple trees in another variation. To settlers, it was also known as the "Lenten Moon" and was considered the last full moon of winter. The Native American Indians of the northern and eastern United States kept track of the seasons by giving a name to each recurring full moon. European settlers followed the custom. ###

SUV Strikes Construction Power Boom On Dark Stretch of Boulevard

Safeguard Your Home

BCUA Collects Household Hazardous Waste

While most people are interested in safeguarding their homes, many dangerous and environmentally unsafe materials gather dust in garages and basements, such as batteries, paints, and insecticides.

Hazardous waste can safely be removed from homes and be recycled or disposed of properly at the Bergen County Utilities Authority (BCUA) Household Hazardous Waste Collections.

BCUA will collect household hazardous waste on Saturday, March 13, 2010, from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., at the BCUA (foot of Empire Boulevard) in Moonachie -- rain or shine. This service is free of charge for Bergen County residents -- ID is required.

A partial list of acceptable materials for collection includes: aerosol cans, antifreeze, batteries, blacktop sealers, disinfectants, fertilizer, fire extinguishers, herbicides, insecticides, mercury switches, paints, pesticides, propane gas cylinders (1 lb. & 20 lb. only), solvents and thinners, used motor oil, varnishes.

A partial list of unacceptable materials includes: unlabeled wastes or containers with unknown contents, regulated medical wastes, radioactive materials and explosives, containers larger than five gallons, compressed cylinders (oxygen or acetylene), pressure treated lumber or railroad ties, computers, electronics and tires.

National Poison Prevention Week

Hasbrouck Heights Public Safety officials remind area residents to observe National Poison Prevention Week. March 14-20, 2010, which is designated to highlight the dangers of poisonings and how to prevent them.

Most poisonings occur when parents or caregivers are home, but not paying attention.

The most dangerous potential poisons are medicines, cleaning products, antifreeze, windshield wiper fluid, pesticides, furniture polish, gasoline, kerosene and lamp oil.

• Store medicine, cleaners, paints/varnishes and pesticides in their original packaging in locked cabinets or containers, out of sight and reach of children.

• Install a safety latch - that locks when you close the door - on child-accessible cabinets containing harmful products. • Purchase and keep all medicines in containers with safety caps. Discard unused medication.

• Never refer to medicine as "candy" or another appealing name.

• Check the label each time you give a child medicine to ensure proper dosage.

• Never place poisonous products in food or drink containers.

• Maintain working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

Treatment: If your child is unconscious, not breathing, or having convulsions or seizures due to poison, contact or ingestion, call 911. If your child has come in contact with poison, and has mild or no symptoms, call your poison control center at 1-800-222-1222. ###

Police Chief Warns of Scams

Moonachie Police Chief Michael Maguire reminds residents that as spring approaches, residents should be aware of warm weather scams.

Questionable people usually prey upon senior citizens and people living alone, because they would rather deal with a lone decision maker.

With no one to confer with, it makes it easier for them to weave their web of deception.

The Chief said, "They prey on senior citizens because they have the time, they're home, and they're mellow in their older age. They try to see the good in everybody."

People should be suspicious of unsolicited work offers. "The day of door-to-door salesmen is over," Chief Maguire said. they do roofing, and when passing by they noticed that the roof is badly damaged.

They explain how the home is being damaged even before leaks become visible.

They use high pressure, aggressive tactics and convince the homeowner that the roof needs immediate attention.

They ask for cash and say they will need to get some supplies and be right back. That's the last you will see them or your money.

Always remember to use common sense and think about it for a minute. How can these strangers show up and tell you about a serious problem that you are unaware of? In another variation of this scam, workers will begin a home repair job such as repaving a driveway, take the deposit, and never return to finish the work. The bogus contractor will begin the job and tell the resident that the damage was worse than originally estimated, so he or she will have to pay more money.

ing the bathroom. While one of them has the attention of the homeowner, one of the other men or women will quickly search for cash and valuables to steal.

Never let any of these people in your home under any circumstances.

Chief Maguire said, "Most people are inherently good. Most businesses are legitimate and provide good services at fair prices. However, the consumer should be suspicious of any cold call or visit to your door without an appointment.

Anyone coming to your door should be able to identify themselves with proper I.D., company uniform or commercial vehicle (*it is required to be lettered with the name and base town of the company*).

Most importantly, do not be pressured by anyone. Follow your instincts; if you are uneasy, lock your door and call a neighbor or the police."

If senior citizens ever suspect a problem, the most important thing to do is call the police at 201-641-9100.

"If they feel that they have been scammed, there's a good chance that they're not the first one and we need to know about it," Chief Maguire said. "The more reports we have, the better chance we have of catching them." ###

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Crossing Guard Killed on Duty: Community Pays Tribute

Joseph Dotterman, a 73 year old Crossing Guard was fatally struck on January 20, 2010, while helping a pedestrian cross Mehrhof Road at Washington Avenue in Little Ferry.

Dotterman was wearing a safety vest and holding up a stop sign, as he helped a 70 year old man cross Mehrhof. Dotterman, a guard for five years, worked this post for three years.

A van heading west on Washington came to a stop at Mehrhof Road, made a left turn, striking Dotterman and knocking over the man he was crossing.

Dotterman suffered head injuries and broken bones, and died Saturday at HUMC.

The man he was crossing had minor injuries, including an injured wrist.

It was reported that the van driver, traveling at a slow speed, was blinded by the afternoon sun and didn't see the pedestrians. There were no skid marks. The driver was not charged, according to Little Ferry Police Chief Ralph Verdi.

Verdi praised Dotterman, "He's out there 15 minutes early, stays a couple of minutes late, and always with a smile on his face." School Superintendent Frank Scarafile said at the time of the accident, he would have been getting off his shift.

Dotterman's funeral procession, which included municipal vehicles, passed under a giant 15" x 30' American Flag draped from Little Ferry and Moonachie Tower fire trucks, past the Little Ferry Schools, where the children he protected as well as a dozen crossing guards, municipal workers and firefighters silently lined Liberty Street as a tribute.

Little Ferry flags were at half-mast, purple and black bunting hung from Borough Hall where the official sign stated, "Rest in Peace Crossing Guard Joe Dotterman." At the accident scene, many balloons, flowers and cards were placed on a nearby utility pole and street sign post. ###

With a major snow event with blizzard conditions predicted for Wednesday, February 10, 2010, Teterboro Airport activated its snow plan*.

The airport maintains 24hour contacts with several weather services, in addition to its satellite feed of weather updates.

Based on forecasts (*between* 12" to 18" of snow), Teterboro Airport maintenance and operations marshalled resources of personnel and equipment.

A briefing for all airport operations, tenants, etc., was conducted on Monday, February 8, 2010, with an update on Tuesday.

They reviewed staff responsibilities, snow removal priorities, runway de-icing procedures, inspection and reporting techniques, communications techniques and equipment

Areas of responsibility: Av-Ports airfield operation areas -- runways and taxiways; FBOs and tenants -- de-icing aircraft, snow removal for areas within their leasehold. The Port Authority oversees all activities.

Snow Removal

Work crews began operations at approximately 22:00 hours Tuesday night as the snow began to fall.

As the storm intensified into blizzard conditions Wednesday morning, Runway 1-19 was abandoned, and crews focused on keeping Runway 6-24 operational, because it has an ILS (*instrument landing system*).

In-bound aircraft would land and de-iced aircraft would depart until the runway needed to be cleared again. If a runway has more than 1/2" of snow or

visibility is less than 200 feet, it is closed.

As the weather deteriorated, TEB Operations would coordinate the closing of the airport with the FAA Tower, FBOs and issue NOTAM (*notice to airmen*).

Once the runway was closed, crews began snow clearing operations with two VAMMAS working in formation in the direction aircraft take off and land. (VAMMAS is a multifunction vehicle 68' 7" in length, has a 30' plow on the front, a 22' rotating broom with steel brushes in the middle, and a blower on the back.) Each 150' wide runway takes about six passes depending on the rate of snowfall. Plows with 28-foot blades worked the runway with the VAMMAS units.

At the same time, taxiways and emergency routes are cleared with 24' plows.

The airport's snow plows have special poly edges on the bottom portion of the plow blades that are strong enough to remove snow, but are pliable enough to contour around and not damage in-pavement lights on runways and taxiways.

It took under an hour to clear a runway and corresponding taxiways.

De-icing

As runway clearing operations are being completed, a deicing truck sprays liquid de-icer on the runways, and taxiways.

One 4,000 gallon truck with a 70 foot boom sprays the center of the runway 12 minutes per runway at 7.7 mph. The de-icer then flows to the edges along the grooves in the runway. A second 1,500 gallon truck sprays the taxiways.

For this snow event, liquid potassium acetate was used. It is a protective coating for the runway and prevents ice and snow from bonding to the surface.

(Note: Rock salt is not used as it is corrosive. Regular sand is not used. If required, a special aviation grade sand is used.

The Teterboro Airport uses only the safest available noncorrosive materials regulated by the FAA.)

Runway Testing

A SARSYS continuous measuring friction tester (CFME) started at the south end of the field (about five minutes after the de-icer was applied and took effect) to measure the traction of the runways and taxiways.

Programmed for the entire length of each runway, the FAA-approved friction tester is a modified SAAB car with a "5th" measuring wheel mechanically geared to one of the car's rear wheels. The gear ratio is such that when moving along the runway, it rolls with a certain, fixed slip ratio.

The CFME tester reports friction values which are forwarded to the ATCT *(air traffic control tower)* who relays readings to pilots.

The airport utilizes state-ofthe-art sensors embedded in both runways which relay conditions and surface temperature to a constantly monitored computer at the airport's operations desk.

As the friction test was in progress, FBOs were notified for departing aircraft to begin de-icing procedures.

Once the runway was secured, aircraft resumed takeoffs and landings.

As the blizzard intensified, this sequence of events -- runway closing, snow removal, de-icing, runway testing and re-opening the runway -- was repeated several times during this snow event.

When the visibility decreased to 200 feet, the airport was closed, but crews continued the snow removal, de-icing and runway testing procedure.

Although the storm subsided about midnight, crews worked continuously until 04:00 hours Thursday after opening both runways.

Under sunny skies on Thursday, crews groomed runway and taxiway edges, while backlog of delayed flights and departures resumed.

Summary

About 15 3/4" inches of measurable snow fell at Teterboro Airport during this event.

A crew of 8 airport maintenance and 13 airport operations personnel handled the equipment and coordination for this snow event.

At Teterboro Airport, the access and fire department roads, in conjunction with the runways, receive first priority for snow removal, followed by appropriate taxiways and holding aprons.

Teterboro Airport has two active runways: 6-24 (6,013 feet) and 1-19 (7,000 feet), with seven ramps and 4.2 miles of taxiways.

Tax Credit: Not Just for First Time Home Buyers!

We've been hearing a lot about the First Time Home Buyer's \$8,000 tax credit lately. But many current homeowners are unaware that there is a tax credit that benefits them as well.

The Worker, Homeownership and Business Assistance Act of 2009, which went into effect on November 6, 2009, established a tax credit of up to \$6,500 for qualified move-up/ repeat home buyers.

Here are the basics you need to know:

• You qualify if you've owned and resided in your current home for five consecutive out of the past eight years.

• If married, both spouses must qualify as long-time residents, with at least five years of principal residency for each.

· Your adjusted household income cannot exceed \$125,000 if filing individually and \$225,000 if married and filing jointly.

• The new home being purchased must be a primary residence.

• Repeat home buyers do not have to purchase a home that is more expensive than their previous home to qualify for the tax credit.

• The tax credit is equal to 10 percent of the home's purchase price up to a maximum of \$6,500; purchases of homes priced above \$800,000 are not eligible for the tax credit.

What you don't know can hurt you

What you don't know could hurt you

How much thought do you put into what you eat?

Your physique is largely a result of what you eat, so the foods that you put into your body should be carefully selected.

It all starts with reading nutritional labels. The nutritional content and ingredient list will give you everything you need to know about the quality of the food item.

I've outlined 5 ingredients that should raise a red flag when you turn over that package and find them listed:

• High Fructose Corn Syrup (HFCS) is a man-made sugar, derived predominantly from genetically modified corn. The sweet concoction has been shown to promote binges, and wreaks havoc on your blood sugar levels, promoting fat storage.

The introduction of HFCS into our food supply directly paralleled a 47% spike in Type 2 Diabetes cases as well as an 80% increase in obesity. Food manufacturers use HFCS in many mainstream products, including the following:

Sauces (including ketchup)

Yogurt **Energy Bars**

Soft Drinks / Fruit Juices Processed baked goods

Cereals Crackers Ice Cream Salad Dressing Most packaged snack foods

• Hydrogenated and partially hydrogenated fats have undergone extensive processing that the chemical structure has changed.

Check each food label for the word 'hydrogenated' and avoid it diligently. Cutting out hydrogenated fats is a simple set towards looking and feeling your best.

• Aspartame is an artificial sweetener that was denied 8 times by the FDA before being approved in 1973.

MIT neuroscientist, Richard Wurtman, researched the effects of aspartame and concluded that it promotes cravings for foods high in calories and carbohydrates. Though aspartame is calorie-free it still causes insulin to be released, which job is to stow away sugar - when this sugar is not available, the result is often hypoglycemia and severe hunger. Not exactly a recipe for weight loss.

• White sugar comes from the juice of a sugar cane plant that has undergone an intensive refining process. In this process, all of the enzymes, fiber, vitamins and minerals are destroyed, rendering it nutritionally void. White sugar is also extremely high in calories, which your body loves to store away in fat cells.

Refined sugar has been linked to a weakened immune system, hyperactivity, ADD, mental and emotional disorders, dental cavities, hypoglycemia, enlargement of the liver and kidneys, and an imbalance of neurotransmitters in the brain. All that and it leads to weight gain.

• White flour comes from natural whole wheat that has been stripped of nutrients, vitamins and minerals. This results in a nutritionally void product that is packed with calories that release quickly into your system, creating a spike in blood sugar. As you know, this promotes fat storage. You don't need that.

Once you cut these 5 items out of your diet, you'll be pleased with the results. Expect to lose weight, to have more energy and to feel better than you have in a long time.

If you're serious about looking and feeling your best through purifying your diet, then focus on eating real food items. Real foods include lean meats, vegetables, whole grains, fruits, nuts and seeds.

Remember, while nutrition is vitally important for weight loss, true results are achieved through a combination of both nutrition and challenging, progressive exercise.

The goal of Poison Prevention Week is to help reduce illnesses, injuries, deaths from poisons, in order to help build safer communities, and reduce unnecessary health care costs for everyone. In light of this important topic, I thought it might be helpful to re-visit the importance of understanding our responsibilities in helping to prevent such occurrences.

But the definition of a poison is any product that can harm someone if used in the wrong way, by the wrong person or in the wrong amount. Children are actually the most likely group to be poisoned. More than one million American children under the age of five are exposed each year to the potential poisons that are

When we think of household poisons some obvious ones come to mind. First are those poisons that are "physically" kept within the house When many people think such as cleaning products,

drain cleaners and furniture polish or laundry detergents, such as bleach. Then we have the "garage-stored" poisons such as weed killer, fertilizer or automobile supplies such as gasoline or antifreeze. Most of us are aware of the dangers of these poisons but still seem to be lax with securing the proper storage of these items. Some steps worth mentioning that can help prevent exposure to these poisons are:

• Store cleaning products in a separate cabinet/drawer that is child proof.

• Keep potential poisons in their original containers; never use food containers such as cups or bottles to store household chemicals.

• Never mix household chemicals together – mixing cleaners could cause poisonous gasses.

• Discard old or expired household cleaners.

• Make sure your home has carbon monoxide detectors and that they are periodically tested, especially during the winter months when furnaces are in use.

When using household cleaners remember the simple Before, While and After rule:

Before using a cleaning product, read the instructions on the bottle carefully.

While using the product, Never leave it alone. A child may find it.

After using the product, put it back in a locked cabinet ensuring that the container is tightly closed.

In addition to the obvious poisons it is important to address the "not so obvious" ones that exist within our homes. Most view medications as something we take to help us "feel better" when we are ill. When something helps us "feel better "we associate it with being a "good" thing. As a Pharmacist, I believe it is extremely important to remember the above definition of a poison and emphasize that even a "good" thing such as safe medications can be poisonous if used in the wrong way, in the wrong amount or by the wrong person.

There are steps that every patient can take to help ensure their safety when it comes to the use of medications.

• When visiting your doctor always inform him of all medications that you are taking including those prescribed by any another doctors that you may be seeing. This will help your doctor to decide what medications to give and hopefully prevent any drug interactions.

• Speak with your doctor or pharmacist before taking any natural or herbal supplements. These products can adversely affect the prescription medications you are taking.

• Some medications are dangerous when mixed with alcohol; consult your doctor or pharmacist before consuming.

• Never share medications with someone else – what might work for you may be harmful to someone else.

• When possible - use the same pharmacy to fill your prescriptions or purchase your over the counter medications. The pharmacist will then have a complete picture of all the medications you are on and can help prevent any drug interactions or duplication of therapies.

• Do not call children's medicine "candy." Many of these products are made to taste good, which is why children will believe you.

I encourage that we all use Poison Prevention Week as a reminder to assess whether we are doing our part in helping to protect our families and ourselves from the potential hazards that exist within our every day lives.
