Karen then explained that Lindsey has epilepsy. Blaze was trained by Canine Assistants as a seizure response dog and to bark if there is a seizure.

Karen told the students that there was a two year wait list. They went to Georgia where the dogs are trained, and that the dog picks the child. On May 9, 2010, Blaze, who was 18 months at the time, became part of the family. Blaze is now three years old.

She explained that Lindsey and Blaze go everywhere together with few exceptions such as lunch, gym class and recess (which is Blaze's downtime).

Lindsey is a 4th Grader at Jefferson Township School.

Full Worm Moon

According to the Farmer's Almanac, as the temperature begins to warm and the ground begins to thaw, earthworm casts appear, heralding the return of the robins.

Northern tribes also referred to this Moon as the "Full Crow Moon" when the cawing of crows signaled the end of winter; or the "Full Crust Moon," because the snow cover becomes crusted from thawing by day and freezing at night.

Safeguard Your Home

BCUA Collects Household Hazardous Waste

While most people are interested in safeguarding their homes, many dangerous and environmentally unsafe materials gather dust in garages and basements, such as batteries. paints, and insecticides.

Hazardous waste can safely be removed from homes and be recycled or disposed of properly at the Bergen County Utilities Authority (BCUA) Household Hazardous Waste Collections.

BCUA will collect household hazardous waste on Saturday, March 10, 2012, from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., at the BCUA (foot of Empire Boulevard) in Moonachie -- rain or shine. This service is free of charge for Bergen County residents -- ID is required.

A partial list of acceptable materials for collection includes: aerosol cans, antifreeze, batteries, blacktop sealers, disinfectants, fertilizer, fire extinguishers, herbicides, insecticides, mercury switches, paints, pesticides, propane gas cylinders (1 lb. & 20 lb. only), solvents and thinners, used motor oil, varnishes.

A partial list of unacceptable materials includes: unlabeled wastes or containers with unknown contents, regulated medical wastes, radioactive materials and explosives, containers larger than five gallons, compressed cylinders (oxygen or acetylene), pressure treated lumber or railroad ties, computers, electronics and tires.

commence on the second Sunday in March and end on the first Sunday in November.

At 2 a.m., on March 11, 2012, clocks should be set forward one hour ahead of standard time (spring forward).

Daylight Saving Time allows us to use less energy in lighting our homes by taking advantage of the longer and later daylight hours.

Daylight Saving Time was instituted in the United States during World War I in order to save energy for war production

Online calendars can help your computer update automatically. When it's time to spring forward or fall back, many people just change their clocks before going to bed, or reset them in the morning when they wake up, rather than changing the clocks exactly at 2:00 in the morning.

Be careful when changing your clocks before bed, though - some clocks are smart enough to change the time automatically for DST. If you change the time manually, you may end up an hour off. ###

Daylight Saving Time will by taking advantage of the later hours of daylight between April and October.

> During World War II, the federal government again required the states to observe the time change. Between the wars and after World War II, states and communities chose whether or not to observe Daylight Saving Time.

> In 1966, Congress passed the Uniform Time Act which standardized the length of Daylight Saving Time.

> Daylight Saving Time is four weeks longer since 2007 due to the passage of the Energy Policy Act in 2005.

> The Act extended Daylight Saving Time by four weeks from the second Sunday of March to the first Sunday of November, with the hope that it would save 10,000 barrels of oil each day through reduced use of power by businesses during daylight hours.

> Unfortunately, it is exceedingly difficult to determine energy savings from Daylight Saving Time and based on a variety of factors, it is possible that little or no energy is saved by Daylight Saving Time.

> The idea of daylight saving was first conceived by Benjamin Franklin in 1784.

Enforcement Assistance Administration found that crime was consistently less during periods of Daylight Saving Time than during comparable standard time periods. Data showed violent crime down 10 to 13 percent. It is clear that for most crimes where darkness is a factor, such as muggings, there are many more incidents after dusk than before dawn, so light in the evening is most welcome. ###

Beware the Ides of March

Those familiar with history or William Shakespeare's play "Julius Caesar," recognize the reference to March 15, the day of Julius Caesar's assassination in 44 B.C. after declaring himself dictator of Rome for life.

"Beware the Ides of March" is the soothsayer's message to Julius Caesar, warning of his death and has forever imbued that date with a sense of foreboding.

After Caesar's untimely exit, superstitious Romans may well have avoided launching a business, marriage or other important venture on a date so cloaked in doom it eventually entered the lexicon as a metaphor for impending catastrophe.

But in Roman times the expression "Ides of March" did not necessarily evoke a dark mood-it was simply the standard way of saying "March 15."

A Roman saying, "four Ides," (meaning four days before Ides), would be just as clear to other Romans as someone saying March 11.

For ancient Romans, an Ides was merely one of several common calendar terms used to mark monthly lunar events.

About St. Patrick

Saint Patrick was not actually Irish. Historical sources report that he was born around 373 A.D. in either Scotland (*near the town of Dumbarton*) or in Roman Britain (the Romans left Britain in 410 A.D.).

His real name is believed to be Maewyn Succat (*he took* on Patrick, or Patricus, after he became a priest).

He was kidnapped at the age of 16 by pirates and sold into slavery in Ireland. During his 6-year captivity (*he worked as a shepherd*), he began to have religious visions, and found strength in his faith.

He finally escaped (after voices in one of his visions told him where he could find a getaway ship) and went to France, where he became a priest (and later a bishop).

When he was about 60 years old, St. Patrick traveled to Ireland to spread the Christian word. It's said that Patrick had an unusually winning personality and that helped him win converts.

He used the shamrock, which resembles a three-leafed clover, as a metaphor to explain the concept of the Trinity (*father, son, Holy Spirit*).

Legend has it that Saint Patrick drove all the snakes out of Ireland. They all went into the sea and drowned. The snake was a revered pagan symbol, and perhaps this was a figurative tale alluding to the fact that he drove paganism out of Ireland. ###



Leprechaun -- a creature in Irish mythology.

In Irish mythology, a leprechaun (Modern Irish: leipreachán) is a type of male faerie said to inhabit the island of Ireland.

Leprechauns and other creatures of Irish mythology are often associated with "faerie forts" or "faerie rings" often the sites of ancient (*Celtic or pre-Celtic*) earthworks or drumlins.

They usually take the form of old men who enjoy partaking in mischief.

Their trade is that of a cobbler or shoemaker. They are said to be very rich, having many treasure crocks buried.

According to legend, if anyone keeps an eye fixed upon one, he cannot escape, but the moment the eye is withdrawn he vanishes.

Leprechauns rarely appear in what would be classed as a folk tale; in almost all cases the interest of these stories centers around a human hero.

Stories about leprechauns are very brief and have local names and scenery attached to them.

In most tales and stories, leprechauns are depicted as harmless creatures who enjoy solitude and live in remote locations, although opinion is divided as to if they ever enjoy the company of other spirits.

Although rarely seen in social situations, leprechauns are supposedly very well spoken and, if ever spoken to, could make good conversation.

The modern image of the leprechaun is depicted wearing an emerald green frock coat, and bestowed with the knowledge of the location of buried treasure, often in a crock of gold. ###







Prior to the service, a video was played that summarized the conflict.

Commander Marshall then provided his remarks:

"Thirty nine years ago today, January 27, 1973, The Paris Peace Accord was signed. This accord ended further U.S. involvement in the Vietnam War.

The Peace accord didn't end the War. Then again, most people don't even know when it began.

Here is a brief history of the war. The conflict would be fought in Vietnam, Laos, and Cambodia from November 1955 to the fall of Saigon in April 1975.

It would be fought between

a three stage bombing mission of North Vietnam. Operation Flaming Dart, Operation Rolling Thunder and Operation Arc Light commenced. This campaign would last for three years and was designed to destroy the infrastructure of North Vietnam and lift the morale of the South Vietnamese.

From 1965 to 1968, Rolling Thunder would drop a million tons of rockets, missiles and bombs on North Vietnam.

In response, the North Vietnamese targeted the U.S. Air Force bases and, after several attacks, 3,500 U.S. Marines were deployed on March 8, 1965 to help guard the bases. This would ultimately escalate the ground war in Vietnam. In January of 1968 after moving his forces into Khe Sanh in Quang Tri Province, General Westmoreland, Commanding General of all U.S. forces in Vietnam was surprised by a large scale ground assault during the Lunar New Year. Known as Tet, the Lunar New Year holiday was normally accompanied by a traditional truce. In 1968 though, the Communist forces of the North Vietnamese army attacked over 100 cities as well as the U.S. Embassy in

at Huê it would be house to house and street by street. In some of the fiercest fighting of the war the Marines would repel the attack and keep the City of Huê under U.S. control.

Khe Sanh would be under siege during the offensive but with supplies coming in from the air, U.S forces were able to hold out and force the enemy back.

The Tet Offensive would cost the enemy thousands of troops and the North Vietnamese army would never launch another attack on that scale again.

After Tet, President Nixon began the process of removing troops from Vietnam and starting the process of Vietnamization, that is, to turn over the defense of South Vietnam to the South Vietnamese.

The war would continue even as troop strength would be reduced. This process would be



lose 58, 220 Service men in the war. Their names are forever enshrined on the Vietnam Wall Memorial in Washington, DC.

After their service, many Vietnam Veterans would struggle with events that transpired from the war.

Many of the people at home didn't agree with the war. They were angry with the policy of the Government and blamed the Soldiers instead of thanking the troops for their service.

This misguided group subjected troops returning home to insults and protests.

To make matters worse, many of the Veterans had to deal with injuries -- physical and mental -- not only from battle wounds but also from chemicals used to cut back the plant life around the perimeter of bases.

The most famous was Agent Orange. This chemical has pro-



have been repatriated to the United States. There are still 1,700 still unaccounted for from the War.

The Vietnam Veteran did not settle for the old world nicknames for troops that have been mentally affected from war. Shell shock, battle fatigue was replaced by what many Veterans suffer from all wars, post traumatic stress syndrome.

Through the efforts of the Vietnam Veteran, this condition has been recognized and treatment is now available.

We here today thank the Vietnam Veteran for his service to our nation.

He is the one that didn't tear up his draft card, he wasn't one of the 125,000 that ran across the Canadian border, he didn't get a deferment. When our nation called him he went and did his duty. For that we are forever

North Vietnam and its communist allies and South Vietnam and her American allies. America viewed involvement in the war as a way to prevent a communist takeover of South Vietnam as part of their wider strategy of containment.

American military advisors arrived in what was then French Indochina beginning in 1950. The advisors would remain until the end of the war. U.S. involvement escalated in the early 1960's with troop levels tripling in 1961 and again in 1962.

The War would escalate even further for the U.S. on March 2, 1965 when the Marine barracks at Pleiku was attacked.

In response, The National Security Council recommended

Originally surprised by the attack, American and South Vietnamese forces would counter attack and decimate the North Vietnamese Army and the Viet Cong at Huê City during the Tet offensive, would enter into the annals of Marine Corps history.

Saigon.

Vietnam was known for its dense jungles with booby traps and ambushes by Viet Cong but tested by the NVA's Easter of-fensive in 1972.

The attack pressed the South Vietnamese forces but was driven back by U.S. airpower.

Operation Linebacker 2 would halt the attack but it became clear that South Vietnam would not survive without U.S. airplanes.

Despite this, the last U.S. ground forces were removed in August. The Paris Peace Accord would be signed in January of 1973.

The South Vietnamese would fight on, but ultimately they were over taken and Saigon would fall in April of 1975.

In the end it is estimated that 1 to 3 million Vietnamese would lose their lives. America would duced many side effects damaging to the Veterans' health. Diabetes, heart disease and many forms of cancer are some of the ailments attributed to exposure to Agent Orange.

Despite all the hardships, the Vietnam Veteran has had to endure, they have still prevailed to lead the Community in every aspect, from policeman to scientist, from sports star to Senator. Vietnam Veterans have led the way.

They demanded a full accounting of the POW/MIAs, not only for the Vietnam War, but for all Foreign Wars America has been in.

Through their efforts to date, over 700 Americans that were missing in action in Vietnam grateful.

Honored guests, comrades, sisters and friends, the members of District 2 Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States, are assembled here to remember comrades who served our country during the Vietnam War.







Baby Bottle Tooth Decay

What's baby bottle tooth decay? Baby bottle tooth decay is caused by the frequent and long-term exposure of a child's teeth to liquids containing sugars. Among these liquids are milk, formula, fruit juice, sodas, and other sweetened drinks.

The sugars in these liquids pool around the infant's teeth and gums, feeding the bacteria that cause plaque. Every time a child consumes a sugary liquid, acid attacks the teeth and gums. After numerous attacks, tooth decay can begin.

The condition also is associated with breast-fed infants who have prolonged feeding habits or with children whose pacifiers are frequently dipped in honey, sugar or syrup. The sweet fluid left in the mouth increases the chances of cavities while the infant is sleeping.

How can I prevent baby bottle tooth decay? Never allow children to fall asleep with

a bottle containing milk, formula, juice or other sweetened liquids. Clean and massage the baby's gums to help establish healthy teeth and to aid in teething, Wrap a moistened gauze square around the finger and gently massage the gums and gingival tissue. This should be done once a day.

Plaque removal activities should begin upon eruption of the first baby tooth.


When brushing a child's teeth, use a soft toothbrush and pea-shaped amount of fluoride toothpaste. Parents should first bring their child to the dentist when the child is between six and 12 months old.

Will changes in my child's diet help prevent baby bottle tooth decay? Preventing baby bottle tooth decay involves changes in a child's diet. A series of small changes over a period of time is usually easier, and eventually leads to better oral health.

To incorporate these changes:

• Gradually dilute the bottle contents with water over a period of 2-3 weeks.

• Once that period is over, if you give a child a bottle, fill it with water or give the child a clean pacifier recommended by a dentist. The only safe liquid to



• Decrease consumption of sugar, especially between meals.

• Children should be weaned from the bottle as soon as they can drink from a cup, but the bottle should not be taken away too soon, since the sucking motion aids in the development of facial muscles, as well as the tongue.

Why should I be worried about baby bottle tooth decay? Giving an infant a sugary drink at nap or nighttime is harmful because during sleep, the flow of saliva decreases, allowing the sugary liquids to linger on the child's teeth for an extended period of time.

If left untreated, pain and infection can result. Severely decayed teeth may need to be extracted.

If teeth are infected or lost too early due to baby bottle tooth decay, your child may develop poor eating habits, speech problems, crooked teeth and damaged adult teeth.

Healthy baby teeth will usually result in healthy permanent teeth.

An individual retirement account is an excellent resource for growing your retirement portfolio. You enjoy the benefits of compounding growth and tax savings. But with nearly a dozen varieties of IRAs available it can get a bit confusing. Understanding these terms will give you an investing head start.

• AGI (Adjusted Gross Income) - Used to calculate federal income tax, AGI includes all the income you received over the course of the year such as wages, interest, dividends and capital gains minus things such as business expenses, contributions to a qualified IRA, moving expenses, alimony and capital losses.

• Contribution - IRA contributions are limited to \$5,000 a year for those younger than 50 and \$6,000 a year for those 50 and older. Contributions are classified as either tax deductible or nondeductible.

• Deductible/nondeductible - Contributions to a traditional IRA are tax deductible if you are not covered by your employer's retirement plan. Even if you do participate in a company pension or 401(k) plan, you still may be able to deduct contributions to a traditional IRA depending upon your income and filing status. Contributions to a Roth IRA are not deductible.

Education IRA - In 2001, these plans were renamed the Coverdell Education Savings Account in honor of the late U.S. Sen. Paul Coverdell. There are contribution limits for taxpayers based on the contributor's Modified Adjusted Gross Income. The money contributed to a Coverdell account doesn't count against the \$5,000 (\$6,000 if 50 and older) annual total individuals may contribute to their combined individual IRAs. The earnings and withdrawals from a Coverdell account are tax-free, but you can't deduct the contributions from your earned \$5,000 in that year (i.e., you can't contribute with unearned money). The investment grows tax-free until it's withdrawn, usually after age 59¹/₂. Money withdrawn before age 591/2 will usually get a 10% penalty, but there are some exceptions.


• MAGI (Modified Adjusted Gross Income) - For the purpose of determining your contribution limit some people use their AGI increased by certain exclusions from your income. Examples of exclusions to income include foreign-earned income and housing costs of U.S. citizens or residents living abroad and income from sources within Puerto Rico, Guam or American Samoa.

• Required minimum distribution - Generally, a traditional IRA owner must begin taking money out of the account by April 1 of the year after he or she turns 70¹/₂. The amount is a minimum distribution determined by the account holder's age and life expectancy. The IRS has established simplified tables that a traditional IRA owner can use to figure the required distribution. If required payments are not made on time, the IRS will collect a 50% excise tax. Roth IRAs aren't subject to minimum distribution requirements until after the Roth owner dies.

• Rollover - This is the term used when moving funds from one tax-deferred retirement plan to another. The rollover process is a two-step process whereby the IRA funds are paid or distributed to the IRA holder and then redeposited or reinvested into another IRA plan.

• Roth IRA - The most notable thing about a Roth is withdrawals are tax-free if the account has been open for at least five years and you're at least 591/2 when you start to withdraw money. Contributions to a Roth are not tax deductible. The Roth is named





As sure as we are about day way or get discouraged.

following night, so we religious people who find solace in faith based practices that help us put our lives into perspective, allow us to change a negative direction in our lives for one which is more positive.

Our Jewish brothers and sisters celebrate their new year with Roshashana and Yom Kippur, a day of atonement.

Our Muslim brothers and sisters celebrate a month of fasting called Ramadan.

We Christians celebrate Lent, a time of prayer, fasting and perhaps doing additional works of charity, in preparation for Holy Week and Easter.

As Christians we begin our Lent by signing ourselves with ashes to remind us that 'we are dust and to dust we shall return."

Those Christians who use ashes as a reminder of this spiritual Lenten journey bear the outward sign of of a desire to change the heart, to make it more sensitive to the presence of the Divine.

If we are deliberate about this journey, making time for God to reveal Himself to us can give us the chance to cleanse ourselves of what is dead and refocus within us our life's purpose and revitalize our commitment to serve God and our neighbor. 

Sheen receives word that his son dies in attempting to do the pilgrimage. Sheen returns to Europe to claim his son's body. Once there Sheen decides to take up his son's journey placing some of the son's ashes by each stop along the journey.

Sheen meets a woman and two younger men who join him in the pilgrimage. Each member of the group learns about themselves and each other's shortcomings. They learn acceptance and they learn to give and receive forgiveness.

Along the way a teenager from a gypsy family steals Sheen's son's ashes from his knapsack. This violation of his beloved son's ashes sends him into a tailspin.

Soon, word of theft reaches the father of the teen who demands his son return the ashes and make amends. He tells Sheen that he must continue



This film becomes an allegory for our Lenten journey that begins with the ashes with which many of us will mark ourselves on February 22 and continue for 40 days until we celebrate in liturgy the journey of Christ on the back of a beast of burden into the City of David, Jerusalem.

It is there that the political forces of power, greed, selfishness, fear of change and sin call for the taking of an innocent life in the person of Jesus Christ.

We who follow in Jesus' footsteps as His disciples today watch through the eyes of faith many of the same forces would take innocent lives in the world today whether because of political oppression, greed, power or sheer blindness to the cries of those in need.

May we use the time of this Lenten journey to quiet and cleanse our own selves so that we might be open to the healing of Christ or to allow the God to whom we pray and with whom we journey bring us to a new heart and new life. ###



Surrogate Judge Dressler Addresses AARP Members

Bergen County Surrogate Court Judge Mike Dressler was the guest speaker at the Central Bergen Chapter 418, AARP meeting on February 10, 2012. Surrogate means "one who speaks for another." The Surrogate Judge is the only judge in New Jersey that must be elected by the people.

Surrogate Dressler was elected to this position in 1996 and began his 5-year term on January 1, 1997. He was reelected in 2001, again in 2006 and recently in 2011.

Surrogate Dressler's duties include the probating of wills, appointing of estate administrators, supervising the appointment of guardians and administering adoptions.

He has established and expanded programs that directly assist those involved with Surrogate Court issues. Judge Dressler created the first Guardianship Monitoring Program in Bergen County.

The Guardianship Program, utilizing volunteers recruited with the help of the AARP, monitors the work of the Court appointed guardians making sure they care for the frail and elderly as they promised they would.



Judge Dressler also spearheaded the creation of the Surrogate Court's Satellite Office Program in which the services of the Surrogate Court are brought directly to municipalities.

Anyone can make an appointment to meet with a Surrogate's Court representative at any of the following Satellite Office locations: Cresskill, Emerson, Fair Lawn, Fort Lee, Norwood, Park Ridge, Ridgewood, River Vale, Rutherford, and Wallington.

Utilizing municipal offices, senior centers and libraries in those towns, Surrogate Court

employees are able to bring services such as probating of wills and administering estates to those who cannot make the trip to the Surrogate Court in Hackensack.

These innovative and helpful programs are operated and maintained at no additional taxpayer cost. After his presentation, Judge Dressler answered all questions directed to him by the AARP members.

To demonstrate that the duties and the responsibilities of the Surrogate Court Judge extend beyond the walls of his office, Judge Dressler has embarked on an unprecedented speaking tour covering every town in Bergen County addressing senior groups and service organizations informing people about the importance of wills, administering of estates, guardianship of minors, adoptions, living wills and estate planning.

This was borne out by noted New Jersey appraiser, Jeffrey Otteau, who wrote about the dangers of sellers who 'test the market' with a high price. In a declining market, they usually end up with a lower price than those who

The statistical proof showed that in a market where a home that was listed for \$599,900 (FMV) and which sold for \$599,000 (almost full listed price within 30 days), a comparable house that was overpriced at \$634,900 actually sold for \$585,000 months later when the market had declined

When a home first goes into the MLS and is advertised at that price, the seller has an opportunity to reach a small percentage of buyers who may be interested, who can afford it

and who are ready to do so now. Put off by the price, they will look elsewhere. And (sadly), it's a proven fact that buyers rarely come back to look at the same house again even after the price has been reduced. As a practical matter, a seller has one shot at each buyer.

And for those sellers who say: "I'm in no hurry to sell. If it doesn't sell, I can hang on to it until prices go back up.', I say: don't waste your time and effort. Hoping you get lucky and find an uninformed buyer who will pay more than your home's true FMV is pretty much a pipe dream these days. If you want more (and are optimistic & patient), then you're better off waiting until prices actually do appreciate to your desired level. But if you sincerely want to sell now, my best advice is, don't overprice. In this slow market, you can lose a lot of money by the time you end up being compelled to sell for less.

The most dangerous potential poisons are medicines, cleaning products, antifreeze, windshield wiper fluid, pesticides, furniture polish, gasoline, kerosene and lamp oil.

• Store medicine, cleaners, paints/varnishes and pesticides in their original packaging in locked cabinets or containers, out of sight and reach of medication. • Never refer to medicine as "candy" or another appealing name.

• Check the label each time you give a child medicine to ensure proper dosage.

• Never place poisonous products in food or drink containers.

• Maintain working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

Treatment: If your child is unconscious, not breathing, or having convulsions or seizures due to poison, contact or ingestion, call 911. If your child has come in contact with poison, and has mild or no symptoms, call your poison control center at 1-800-222-1222. ###






Wet MVA with Minor Injuries


