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

Puppy Bowl Gets Four Players from BC Animal Shelter

Hasbrouck Heights High School Cheerleaders led a Puppy Bowl Pep Rally on Friday, February 1, 2013, at The Bergen County Animal Shelter and Adoption Center in support of Bergen's very own four German Shepherd/pit bull mixes named Cruz, Prince, Tuck and Eli from the Bergen County Animal Shelter.

During the pep rally, they were joined by Bergen County Executive Kathleen Donovan who presented "Super Star" Certificates of Commendation to two of the owners attending this rally, Kathleen Pruta and Kerry Dunn, with appreciation for adopting and welcoming "Puppy Bowl IX Draft Picks" into their home and family.

These four pups appeared on Animal Planet's "Puppy Bowl" on Super Bowl Sunday, February 3, 2013, at 3 p.m. Tuck and Eli made the starting The shelter examined and vaccinated the pups and placed them into foster care until they were old enough to be spayed and micro chipped.

During their stay, four of the six were selected to participate in this annual event.

Luckily for Cruz, Prince, Tuck and Eli, all have found loving homes with families.

This year, the cast of 84 included 63 puppies from 23 shelters and 21 kittens from a New York shelter (*and nine baby hedgehogs*). Casting was done by petfinder.com who contacted the shelter about available dogs.

Puppy Bowl was filmed at a studio in the West Fifties in November. Because of the shelter's proximity, it made it easier to get the dogs to the studio. They filmed 90 hours and edited to two hours.

"The Puppy Bowl" mimics

compete, ten at a time, on a three-by-six yard field, littered with balls and chew toys.

There are no teams and everyone is a running back. Scoring is when a puppy crosses the goal line with a toy - usually unknowingly. There is even a "Most Valuable Pup" award.

Animal Planet's halftime show features a kitten scrimmage, with hedgehog cheerleaders dressed in tutus.

Last year, almost 9 million watched the "Puppy Bowl." For the last eight years, this precursor to the Super Bowl has aired to raise awareness of local animal shelters.

There are many more animals looking for loving forever homes at the Bergen County Animal Shelter and Adoption Center. ###

The Big Fence

Without notice or signage, fencing went up at the Teterboro train stop of the expanded NJ Transit Pascack Valley line, blocking access from Williams Avenue in Hasbrouck Heights.

Citing safety concerns, NJ Transit spent \$100,000 to build a 300 foot-long, eight foot high fence.

By taking this short-cut, commuters were trespassing -- "breaking the law" according to NJ Transit. The only legal and safe way to access the Teterboro train stop is from Green Street.

In addition to crossing a pedestrian unfriendly Route 17, Hasbrouck Heights commuters must now walk (*night and day*) about a mile along hazardous Route 46 and ramps to reach the rail stop.

About Easter

Easter, Pascha, or Resurrection Day, is the most important religious feast in the Christian liturgical year. It celebrates the resurrection of Jesus, which Christians believe occurred on the third day after his crucifixion some time in the period A.D. 27 to 33.

Many pagan elements have become part of the celebration, and those aspects are often celebrated by many Christians and non-Christians alike.

Easter also refers to the season of the Church year called Eastertide or the Easter Season. Traditionally, the Easter Season lasted for the forty days from Easter Day until Ascension Day, but now officially lasts for the fifty days until Pentecost. The first week of the Easter Season is known as Easter Week or the Octave of Easter.

Easter is termed a movable Christian holy day because it is not fixed in relation to the civil calendar. Easter falls at some point between late March and late April each year (*early April to early May in Eastern Christianity*), following the cycle of the moon.

Easter is linked to the Jewish Passover, not only for much

of its symbolism, but also for its position in the calendar.

The Last Supper shared by Jesus and his disciples before his crucifixion is generally thought of as a Passover meal, based on the chronology in the Gospels.

Some, however, interpret "Passover" in John 18:28 as a single meal and not a sevenday festival. Interpretation of the Gospel of John differs from the Synoptic Gospels by placing Christ's death at the time of the slaughter of the Passover lambs, which would put the Last Supper slightly before Passover, on 14 Nisan of the Bible's Hebrew calendar.

Preparing Your Garden

Before digging, test for dampness. Soil should be fairly dry and crumble when rubbed between your fingers. Lift soil in chunks, turn and shatter with spade or pitchfork. Follow fertilizer instructions remembering less is better. Rake surface smooth. ###

"Spring Forward" March 10

Daylight Saving Time will commence on the second Sunday in March and end on the first Sunday in November.

At 2 a.m., on March 10, 2013, clocks should be set forward one hour ahead of standard time (spring forward).

Daylight Saving Time allows us to use less energy in lighting our homes by taking advantage of the longer and later daylight hours.

Daylight Saving Time was instituted in the United States during World War I in order to save energy for war production by taking advantage of the later hours of daylight between April and October.

During World War II, the federal government again required the states to observe the time change. Between the wars and after World War II. states and communities chose whether or not to observe Daylight Saving Time.

In 1966, Congress passed

the Uniform Time Act which standardized the length of Daylight Saving Time.

Daylight Saving Time is four weeks longer since 2007 due to the passage of the Energy Policy Act in 2005.

The Act extended Daylight Saving Time by four weeks from the second Sunday of March to the first Sunday of November, with the hope that it would save 10,000 barrels of oil each day through reduced use of power by businesses during daylight hours.

Unfortunately, it is exceedingly difficult to determine energy savings from Daylight Saving Time and based on a variety of factors, it is possible that little or no energy is saved by Daylight Saving Time.

The idea of daylight saving was first conceived by Benjamin Franklin in 1784.

A study by the U.S. Law Enforcement Assistance Administration found that crime was consistently less during periods of Daylight Saving Time than during comparable standard time periods. Data showed violent crime down 10 to 13 percent. It is clear that for most crimes where darkness is a factor, such as muggings, there are many more incidents after dusk than before dawn, so light in the evening is most welcome. ###

Online calendars can help your computer update automatically. When it's time to spring forward or fall back, many people just change their clocks before going to bed, or reset them in the morning when they wake up, rather than changing the clocks exactly at 2:00 in the morning.

Be careful when changing your clocks before bed, though - some clocks are smart enough to change the time automatically for DST. If you change the time manually, you may end up an hour off. ###

Beware the Ides of March

Those familiar with history or William Shakespeare's play "Julius Caesar," recognize the reference to March 15, the day of Julius Caesar's assassination in 44 B.C. after declaring himself dictator of Rome for life.

"Beware the Ides of March" is the soothsayer's message to Julius Caesar, warning of his death and has forever imbued that date with a sense of foreboding.

After Caesar's untimely exit, superstitious Romans may well have avoided launching a business, marriage or other important venture on a date so cloaked in doom it eventually entered the lexicon as a metaphor for impending

In Irish mythology, a folk tale; in almost all cases the interest of these stories centers around a human hero.

> Stories about leprechauns are very brief and have local names and scenery attached to them.

> > In most tales and stories, leprechauns are depicted as harmless creatures who enjoy solitude and live in remote locations, although opinion is divided as to if they ever enjoy the company of other spirits.

Although rarely seen in social situations, leprechauns are supposedly very well spoken and, if ever spoken to, could make good conversation.

The modern image of the leprechaun is depicted wearing an emerald green frock coat, and bestowed with the knowledge of the location of buried treasure, often in a crock of gold. ###

expression "Ides of March" did not necessarily evoke a dark mood-it was simply the standard way of saying "March 15."

A Roman saying, "four Ides," (meaning four days before Ides), would be just as clear to other Romans as someone saying March 11.

For ancient Romans, an Ides was merely one of several common calendar terms used to mark monthly lunar events. The Ides simply marked the appearance of the full moon.

Each month has an Ides (usually the 15th) and this date wasn't significant in being associated with bad luck or doom. ###

A donation of \$50 will replenish an existing planter with lovely flowers and greens. Your donation of any amount is welcome.

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

Full Worm Moon

The March full moon will appear on Wednesday, March 27, 2013, at 3:59 p.m. It is called the "Full Worm Moon."

According to the Farmer's Almanac, as the temperature begins to warm and the ground begins to thaw, earthworm casts appear, heralding the return of the robins.

Northern tribes also referred to this Moon as the "Full Crow Moon" when the cawing of crows signaled the end of winter; or the "Full Crust Moon," because the snow cover becomes crusted from thawing by day and freezing at night.

The "Full Sap Moon" marks the time of tapping maple trees in another variation. To settlers, it was also known as the "Lenten Moon" and was considered the last full moon of winter.

The Native American Indians of the northern and eastern United States kept track of the seasons by giving a name to each recurring full moon. European settlers followed the custom. ###

- Remove winter mulches
- Clean up the garden/weed
- Have soil tests run

• Improve soil with organic matter and pre-plant incorporation of fertilizer

- Rake & aerate lawn
- Apply lime if needed

• Reset perennials that have frost-heaved

• Start vegetables and flowers from seed

• Sow seeds outdoors of hardy annuals, such as poppies and cornflower

• Plant sweet peas and garden peas on St. Patrick's Day, if soil is workable

• Plant cold-tolerant vegetables such as onions and peas (mid to late month)

• Look for and remove cedar apple rust galls on Eastern red cedar

• Plant or transplant trees and shrubs when soil is workable

• Fertilize trees and shrubs (late)

• Prune trees, shrubs that do not flower in spring (unless *renovation pruning*)

· Clean out all of your birdhouses now, so that they will be ready when the birds return.

• Repair any fencing, arbors, or trelliswork that is weak or has broken over the winter.

• Check the plants under the eaves of the house and under tall evergreens to see that they have sufficient moisture. ###

BCUA Collects Household Hazardous Waste

While most people are interested in safeguarding their homes, many dangerous and environmentally unsafe materials gather dust in garages and basements, such as batteries, paints, and insecticides.

Hazardous waste can safely be removed from homes and be recycled or disposed of properly at the Bergen County Utilities Authority (BCUA) Household Hazardous Waste Collections.

BCUA will collect household hazardous waste on Saturday, March 9, 2013, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., at the BCUA (foot of Empire Boulevard) in Moonachie -- rain or shine. This service is free of charge for Bergen County residents -- ID is required.

A partial list of acceptable materials for collection includes: aerosol cans, antifreeze, batteries, blacktop sealers, disinfectants, fertilizer, fire extinguishers, herbicides, insecticides, mercury switches, paints, pesticides, propane gas cylinders (1 lb. & 20 lb. only), solvents and thinners, used motor oil. varnishes.

A partial list of unacceptable materials includes: unlabeled wastes or containers with unknown contents, regulated medical wastes, radioactive materials and explosives, containers larger than five gallons, compressed cylinders (oxygen or acetylene), pressure treated lumber or railroad ties, computers, electronics and tires.

The most dangerous potential poisons are medicines, cleaning products, antifreeze, windshield wiper fluid, pesticides, furniture polish, gasoline, kerosene and lamp oil.

• Store medicine, cleaners, paints/varnishes and pesticides in their original packaging in locked cabinets or containers, out of sight and reach of children.

• Install a safety latch - that locks when you close the door - on child-accessible cabinets

medication.

• Never refer to medicine as "candy" or another appealing name.

• Check the label each time you give a child medicine to ensure proper dosage.

• Never place poisonous products in food or drink containers.

• Maintain working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

Treatment: If your child is unconscious, not breathing, or having convulsions or seizures due to poison, contact or ingestion, call 911. If your child has come in contact with poison, and has mild or no symptoms, call your poison control center at 1-800-222-1222. ###

Reality Check: Now What?

A 91 year old widow with medical problems, sits in a chair and stares at the home where she and her husband had lived and raised a family since 1946. The first floor walls are stripped bare. There is no heat or hot water. There is no kitchen or bathroom. There are no possessions. Just shock.

In a home that never flooded before, Sandy's visit delivered over three feet of water on the first floor.

In the darkness four months ago, at 1 a.m., rescuers took her and her daughter to the emergency shelter at Teterboro Detention Center, then moved them to the shelter in Mahawh. They slept on cots for 12 days.

The widow came down with pneumonia, spent 7 days in a hospital, 32 days in rehab and 5 more days at the hospital -- her caretaker daughter stayed at her side. Both of them have since moved in with relatives in Little Ferry.

mated to be about 125 years old and was originally heated with a stove. There is no foundation, only a crawl space. A utility room is at ground level.

Samaritan's Purse and Operation 195 gutted the first floor.

Contractors estimated that \$65,000 is needed for home repairs. Even using their life savings will not be enough.

According to her daughter, FEMA gave the maximum of \$31,900 for reconstruction, possessions, new furnace and housing. They may receive additional mitigation funds to raise the furnace.

The insurance adjuster gave them \$400 for the food lost during the power outage. Nothing else.

Apparently, there is no other help from any government agency, or anyone else.

Now they were told to raise their home eight feet or face \$31,000 annually for flood in-

Little Ferry CERT in Action

On Saturday, October 27, 2012, with Hurricane Sandy on the horizon, Little Ferry CERT volunteers (*Community Emergency Response Team*) held a meeting at Borough Hall to discuss opening the shelter at St. Margaret's, and preparing for the usual storm related activities. They also assisted emergency management personnel with the distribution of sand bags (*three per resident*).

On Sunday, CERT volunteers prepared the St. Margaret Church gym as a shelter by setting up cots.

On Monday, they opened up the shelter by 10 a.m. and were placed on standby. At about 6 p.m., they started cooking for about 15 people.

With Sandy's hurricane force winds, the expected power outages began at about 7 p.m. Power at the shelter went off, then back on, and then they lost complete power at about 10 p.m. At this time the shelter started to get evacuees from the lost power. CERT volunteers signed them in and helped them get comfortable. The Little Ferry Fire Department set up lights, so the shelter was still operational at this point.

The usual areas of Little Ferry began to flood from the rain, and evacuees were brought to the shelter by the town bus and first aid squad.

At about 10:30 p.m., the CERT team coordinator, Craig Hartless, watched as unexpected water was coming fast up on Chamberlain Avenue. He knew that this was not the usual storm event, especially considering the small amount of rain. Craig was concerned about mass hysteria if the evacuees saw this. His concern was to keep everyone calm during this growing uncertainty.

About three inches of water was now at the shelter door. Due to the scope of the event, CERT decided to abandon the St. Margaret's shelter and transfer operations to Borough Hall. Using the town bus, they relocated about 30 evacuees and 15 CERT Volunteers. At shelters, concern is for security and medical support. Five volunteers remained at the shelter. While waiting for the bus to return, a family of four arrived. Cold water was now about knee deep outside the shelter. Lighting was by Fire Department generator and was still operational. Craig was in constant communication with the Little Ferry Police Department with radio and cell phone. Due to the extraordinary event, there was too much radio chatter and the cell phone worked better. Then the cell

phones failed.

The rising water started to come through the cracks in the doors. They used floor carpets, runners and stuff to slow water from coming in the gym door.

Every time they looked out the window into the darkness it got worse. That fateful night, the issue was fear and the uncertainty of not knowng how deep the water would get. It was fast becoming an OMG moment. To avoid panic they kept evacuees away from seeing the rapid rising water. There was a lot of anxiety, crying and shock with evacuees as CERT volunteers consoled them.

Although CERT volunteers still did not know the scope of the event (no one did at this time), they began to realize that their own homes and possessions were also being destroyed, but they continued their efforts.

The bus picked up a recent surgery victim on the return trip to the shelter and arrived to complete the evacuation. By the time the bus arrived, there was about 4 feet of water against the door. It took three people to open the door. There was a rush of very cold water. CERT turned off the generator, shut everything down and abandoned the shelter.

At Borough Hall there was at least 3 inches of water in the lobby, but no flood water in council chambers or police operations. Due to the continuing uncertainty of Sandy's wrath, CERT had to abandon the Borough Hall shelter which had over 100 evacuees. The town bus, CERT members, EMS and BC Sheriffs Department moved them to Teterboro's Bergen County Vocational School, which was set up as a regional shelter at about 4 a.m.

Meanwhile, Little Ferry Fire Department continued doing search and rescue throughout the night, taking evacuees first to Borough Hall, then to the Teterboro shelter.

unopened Bergen County Juvenile Detention Center on North Street in Teterboro. From the Detention Center, evacuees went to Bergen Community College until the power went out, then evacuees were moved to the Law and Public Safety Complex at Mahwah on Thursday. For displaced Moonachie and Little Ferry residents, this constant moving was very disruptive, adding to their anxiety. (Some were in shelters for 2-3 weeks.) Some CERT Volunteers did visit the shelters to console evacuees.

Craig Hartless now shifted positions to Little Ferry OEM deputy coordinator. On Tuesday, he went to a 6 a.m. State Police briefing at the Technical School. At morning light, it was apparent that 80% of Little Ferry was flooded. Water levels were more than the storm of 1992. Although the water level was stabilized, it was not withdrawing. BC OEM put additional resources on standby. Joining the ongoing rescue efforts, the National Guard started evacuations immediately after briefing.

On Tuesday morning, mutual aid Water Search and Rescue teams began going door to door to make sure everyone was safe. In Little Ferry, work was done in neighborhoods, under direction of Fire Chief Floyd Novak Jr.

The water started going down on late Tuesday after-

relief center. Also assisting were about 60 volunteers from other area groups -- teachers, students, etc., and unaffected residents. By Saturday they started receiving donations of food, clothing, blankets, etc.

The scope of the disaster was incomprehensible. Flood waters destroyed cars, homes, possessions. Residents were in a state of shock. The CERT shelter distributed food, clothing, etc., to assist in the immediate recovery. Some just asked for food to get through the day. One man just wanted a pair of socks.

The CERT disaster relief center was open until Friday November 9, 2012. Donations were then used to restock St. Margaret's pantry, then re-donated to various organizations. Operations were concluded. team organization, and disaster medical operations.

Using the training learned in the classroom and during exercises, CERT members can assist others in their neighborhood or workplace following an event when professional responders are not immediately available to help. CERT members also are encouraged to support emergency response agencies by taking a more active role in emergency preparedness projects in their community.

In Little Ferry, Craig Hartless and John Schwedhelm have completed the CERT Instructors/Trainers course, so training is done in house.

The Little Ferry CERT team started in 2005, has about 50 members and volunteers about 1,000 hours per year. To maintain unit preparedness, they participate in Little Ferry community activities such as Family Fun Day, Fenton 5K Run, LFPD Night Out, Holiday Tree Lighting, Easter Egg Hunt, etc. They are starting a CART program (Community Animal Response Team) to deal with animals during disasters. The event was too overwhelming. CERT volunteers could not go on, and suspended their operations. During down time, CERT volunteers returned to their homes and families to re-organize themselves. As with many others, they also lost their homes, cars, possessions and their families were equally distressed. In their training, they are told that "your family and property are your priority before volunteering."

FYI: In order to reopen Teterboro Vocational School for education, evacuees were then transferred to the yet noon. There was still no power, although Little Ferry Borough Hall was under limited generator power and finally got power on Wednesday.

Both Little Ferry schools were affected by the flood water. Because of the damage, they were not suitable as shelters.

On Wednesday, CERT regrouped and went back to St. Margaret's to begin recovery operations. Contracted cleaners from LF BOE chipped in the clean up, where the water and mud went across the gym floor. With about 10 to 15 CERT volunteers, CERT became operational again and set up a food pantry and disaster CERT works under OEM under Homeland Security. CERT is made up of community volunteers. They go through an 8 week training program (20 hours of training). Training for disaster preparedness, disaster medical (mass casualty triage,) fire suppression, disaster psychology, terrorism awareness, etc.

The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Program educates people about disaster preparedness for hazards that may impact their area and trains them in basic disaster response skills, such as fire safety, light search and rescue,







Reflections

The Origins of the Easter Egg and Blessing of the Easter Foods

Everyone knows that eggs that have been specially decorated are given out, eaten, or displayed to celebrate Easter—but it seems that there is a controversy among scholars and historians as to whether or not the tradition of Easter eggs originated with Christians or was it a Pagan tradition that was Christianized by the early Church.

Myths coming down to us from long ago show that humanity's relationship with the egg is a very deep-seated one.

"All life comes from an egg" is a very old Latin proverb. Moreover, eggs are laid throughout all corners of the world and there are many ancient myths from nations of every continent that claim that the entire universe was created out of an egg.

Nearly every ancient culture has viewed eggs as an emblem or symbol of life.

Nevertheless, there is no solid evidence that Easter Eggs were originally pagan symbols.

So, how did eggs come to be associated with Easter?



We don't know precisely, however, it is interesting to think of the following religious and cultural connections that may be the roots of the Easter egg tradition.

The first is a connection with the Passover Seder. One of the foods eaten during the Seder is a hard-boiled egg dipped in salt water which symbolizes new life born out of the tears (*salt water*) shed by the Israelite slaves.

Another interesting connection is the ancient Persian practice of painting eggs for Nowrooz—the Persian new year celebration which begins on March 20, the Spring Equinox. This ancient Persian tradition continues to this day in modern-day Iran.

The Christian tradition of Easter eggs, however, probably began as a celebration to the end of the privations of Lent.

In Medieval times, during the 40 days of Lent, a strict fast was observed by the Church and eggs were forbidden.

Christians viewed eggs as a symbol of new life, just as a chick might hatch from the egg, which appeared to be lifeless from the outside. Any eggs that were laid during the 40 days of Lent were often boiled During Easter, the fast was lifted and the consumption of eggs resumed. Eggs were thus a mainstay of Easter meals, and a prized Easter gift for children and servants. This is the most convincing reason for how eggs came to be associated

or otherwise preserved.

with Easter. Orthodox Christians in Slavic countries like Poland are known for the development of elaborately decorated eggs and for the practice of presenting their Easter eggs, the first eggs appearing at the table on Easter Day, for thanksgiving and a blessing.

Among the Polish people, along with Easter eggs, a lamb molded out of butter or pastry is also blessed during the Easter service and then given a place of honor on the festive Easter table at home.

This year, Holy Trinity Lutheran Church at 92 Burton Avenue in Hasbrouck Heights will join our Orthodox sisters and brothers in this meaningful tradition of blessing the Easter eggs that will nourish us and adorn our Easter tables in our homes.

So, bring your Easter eggs on Easter Day, March 31, at 11 a.m., for a blessing. And, we invite you to bring the children at 10:15 a.m. Easter morning and join us for an Easter Egg Hunt and a continental breakfast.

Children will hunt for eggs on the lawn and can bring the eggs they find for a blessing.

It's Almost Time for Spring Cleaning

There's a foot of snow outside now; the result of yesterday's "Blizzard of '13" (*don't you just love the TV hype!?*)

The Mouth and Heart Connection

Cardiovascular disease is a class of disease that affects the heart and/or blood vessels.

It is estimated that more than 80 million people in the United States have one or more forms of cardiovascular disease; these forms include high blood pressure, coronary heart disease (*acute heart attack and angina pectoris*), stroke, and heart failure.

Studies have shown that there is a link between cardiovascular disease and periodontal (gum) disease, the chronic inflammation and infection of the gums and surrounding tissue. Forms of gum disease, such as gingivitis (gum inflammation) and periodontitis (bone loss), can be indicators for cardiovascular problems, which is why it is important for individuals at risk for cardiovascular disease to visit a dentist on a regular basis, practice good oral hygiene, and keep their dentist informed of any oral and overall health issues.

How are periodontal disease and cardiovascular disease connected?

It has been suggested that the inflammatory proteins and bacteria associated with gum disease enter a person's bloodstream and can cause various effects on the cardiovascular system.

A study published in the February 2005 issue of "Circulation" examined the presence of the bacteria known to cause periodontitis and the thickening of the blood vessel wall typically seen in heart disease.

After examining samples from more than 650 participants, the investigators concluded that the presence of the same bacteria known to cause periodontitis was associated with an increased level of blood

What can I do to keep my gums and heart healthy?

Practicing proper oral hygiene is essential to maintaining healthy gums.

This includes flossing regularly, brushing twice a day with antibacterial toothpaste, and visiting a dentist at least every six months.

A healthy diet and regular exercise can help improve both your cardiovascular health and your overall health.

What do my physician and dentist need to know?

It is important to keep all medical professionals up-todate on your oral and overall health issues. Inform your physician if you have been diagnosed with a form of periodontal disease or are experiencing any issues with gum inflammation.

Likewise, inform your dentist if you have been diagnosed with any form of cardiovascular disease, have experienced any cardiovascular problems, or have a family history of cardiovascular disease.

What other risk factors are associated with cardiovascular disease?

Individuals who are most at risk for cardiovascular disease include those over age 65, African-Americans, Hispanics, and males.

While these particular factors cannot be changed, there are some risk factors that you can change through lifestyle management and/or medical treatment to reduce your risk for cardiovascular disease.

These risk factors include smoking, high cholesterol, high blood pressure, physical inactivity, obesity, excessive alcohol consumption, and stress.

During the business portion of the meeting, President Peter Gallo discussed the future programs and activities planned for the next two months.



Recently the President signed into law the "Burn Pit Registry Act."

This Act was designed to register all those Veterans from the Iraq and Afghanistan Campaigns that worked with burn pits.

Burn pits were used to burn trash and other items and apparently made many Veterans sick with lung problems, brain damage and asthma.

This Registry will allow the VA system to keep track of all those that may have been exposed to the toxic fumes of the burn pits. Those on the Registry will receive updated information on the study of the effects of the burn pits. This will allow the VA to treat all those affected much faster.

I was recently asked about the human waste that is and was being burned at military camps in the war zones and if this is also part of the Burn Pit Registry.

For anyone that doesn't know, human waste is burned at the latrines in Afghanistan and I know human waste was burned in Iraq and Vietnam. It is the only way to keep the camps sanitized when there is no plumbing.

The Senate news release didn't say whether or not this was included with the Burn Pit Registry. There could be Veterans out there that stirred and burned the waste, and may have developed breathing problems from the fumes, but I do not see it listed, so I don't think it is part of this Act at this time. Contact your local VA office and ask about the Registry. This Act of Congress is new but it should be up and running shortly.

Boston Massacre

Private Hugh White didn't draw latrine duty on the evening of March 5, 1770. He was given the task to stand watch at the Customs House on King Street in Boston. That's the life of a private, all the miserable jobs the higher ranks don't want, soon fall to the privates.

daily basis between the citizens and the King's Troops.

Edward Garrick was an apprentice to a wigmaker.

He and a friend walked by Private White and complained to him that a British Officer didn't pay for his haircut on a visit he made. Why White even entertained the argument is not clear.

He was a private and there is no way he could answer Garrick for the actions or bills of an Officer. He was on watch at the Customs House and He should have left it at that. But you don't make history being quiet. He soon got into heated words with young Edward and knocked him out with a swing from his musket.

Garrick's friend now was screaming at White and a crowd was building up. Private White was now hopelessly outnumbered.

His only friend was his Brown Bess musket. He loaded it. The Americans were now throwing pieces of shells, snowballs, and rocks. Things were quickly getting out of hand.

Captain Preston was told by a messenger that his private on watch was facing a mob. Preston ordered a Non-commissioned Officer and six privates from the 29th Regiment to aid White and take him out of there. Preston and his squad forced their way in between Private White and the hostile crowd. The crowd was getting larger and more snowballs and rocks filled the air.

There was a story about this night in which a man in a red cloak was urging the crowd on and sending more people to the scene at the Custom House. His identity is a mystery and will forever remain so. His actions threw gas on a fire because he escalated the tension between soldier and citizen.

The yelling and screaming was deafening. Some in the crowd now had sticks and Private Hugh Montgomery was struck by one of these sticks and was knocked to the ground. He got up and after picking up his musket he fired into the crowd. Soon the other men of the squad fired at the crowd.

Eleven citizens were hit. Three were dead where they lie and two more would die a short time later.

The crowd moved back onto side streets while Captain Preston called out the rest of the 29th Regiment to guard the Customs House and regain control.

Lt. Governor Hutchinson told the crowd he would have an inquiry into the matter. On the following morning Captain Preston and his squad, along with Private White were placed under arrest for the crime of murder.

Now the soldiers needed a lawyer and there were plenty of sympathetic Loyalist lawyers in Boston at the time. They just couldn't find any that would take the case.

To defend British soldiers for shooting unarmed civilians would have been bad for business and more likely their health.

The Loyalist apparently, knew all about the Sons of Liberty and declined the unspoken challenge.

A letter went to a lawyer who was known as a Patriot to the American cause asking him to take the case.

His name was John Adams. Yes, that John Adams, our second President of the United States. He was a lover of Liberty and Freedom but he also felt a strong duty for Justice. Even for British soldiers. He took the case.

Captain Preston was put on trial first. The whole case was centered around the question of did he or did he not order his men to fire the muskets.

He said he did not give the order to fire and no credible witness came forward to say he did. So the jury acquitted him of the charge of murder.

The soldiers' case was much more difficult. If Captain Preston did not give the order to fire then the soldiers did on their own accord.

This was a problem Adams had to go through. He gathered every witness that could describe the actions of the crowd. He proved through eyewitness testimony that the crowd was dangerous and had assaulted the soldiers on the night of March 5th.

The key witness in the case was Patrick Carr's doctor. Patrick Carr was one of the men that was killed on that night but, lived long enough to tell his doctor that he forgives the soldiers because they were just defending themselves. The jury believed him.

Adams was successful and six of the soldiers were acquitted and spared the gallows. Private Hugh Montgomery and Private Mathew Kilroy were convicted of murder because they fired directly into the crowd and the jury figured that they could have restrained from shooting. Montgomery also fired first and without orders.

You can't do that in the British Army. They then pleaded "Right of Clergy" and had their punishment of death reduced to a branding on the hand and sent back to England.

The English called it the "Incident on King Street." The Americans called it a massacre and used it for great propaganda for the American cause. We now call it the "Boston Massacre."

It is the main reason we have the Third Amendment to the Constitution. "No soldier shall, in a time of peace, be quartered in any house, without the consent of the owner, or in a time of war, but in a manner prescribed by law."

If you think this Amendment is outdated that would be because no one put two regiments in your town and then have your house used for quarters. There is a reason for everything in the Constitution.

It was a crazy night that left many questions. Why was John Adams not attacked or had his house burned down by the Sons of Liberty? Everyone in town wanted to hang the soldiers.

I have always felt that the answer is Samuel Adams. He was John Adams' cousin and he was heavily involved with the Sons of Liberty.

No doubt he put the word out that John was not to be harmed. I am also willing to bet that if you look in Samuel Adams' closet, deep in the back you would probably find a red cloak. He didn't want to share his house with the King's troops either. ###

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East Rutherford Fatal Blaze

A fast-moving fire killed a 77-year-old resident and injured two firefighters. A woman who also lived in the house escaped unharmed.

There was heavy fire on







the first floor of the three-story multi-family home on High Street in East Rutherford when firefighters arrived at about 11:15 a.m. on January 29, 2013.

A second-alarm was quickly transmitted for mutual aid fire companies and a Firefighter Assist and Search Team (FAST).

Firefighters located a resident in a first-floor bedroom, and removed him from the building where firefighters and police officers performed CPR.

He was transported to Hackensack University Medical Center where he was pronounced D.O.A.

Fire quickly rose to the upper floors and broke through the roof.

"Hoarder" conditions inside the building impeded firefighting operations.

All members were ordered out of the structure and a defensive operation was established.

The roof collapsed. The cold weather froze a fire hydrant forcing firefighters to call in a second water source.

Carlstadt Firefighter Richard Bartlett was setting up a secondary water supply when he was hit by a hose ring after a vehicle drove over the five-inch

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supply hose.

He suffered a broken collarbone and shattered bones in his elbow and wrist area. He was in surgery for five hours.


An East Rutherford firefighter suffered minor injuries and was released from the hospital.

Fire officials declared the fire under control around 2 o'clock.

About 75 firefighters from Carlstadt, Moonachie, Wallington, East Rutherford and Lyndhurst responded to the scene.
