

commence on the second Sunday in March and end on the first Sunday in November.

At 2 a.m., on March 11, 2018, clocks should be set forward one hour ahead of standard time (spring forward).

Daylight Saving Time allows us to use less energy in lighting our homes by taking advantage of the longer and later daylight hours.

Daylight Saving Time was instituted in the United States during World War I in order to save energy for war production by taking advantage of the later hours of daylight between April and October.

During World War II, the federal government again required the states to observe the time change. Between the wars and after World War II, states and communities chose whether or not to observe Daylight Saving Time.

In 1966, Congress passed the Uniform Time Act which standardized the length of Daylight Saving Time.

Daylight Saving Time is four weeks longer since 2007 due to the passage of the Energy Policy Act in 2005.

The Act extended Daylight Saving Time by four weeks from the second Sunday of March to the first Sunday of November, with the hope that it would save 10,000 barrels of oil each day through reduced use of power by businesses during daylight hours.

Unfortunately, it is exceedingly difficult to determine energy savings from Daylight Saving Time and based on a variety of factors, it is possible that little or no energy is saved by Daylight Saving Time.

The idea of Daylight Sav-

Daylight Saving Time will ing Time was first conceived by Benjamin Franklin in 1784.

> A study by the U.S. Law Enforcement Assistance Administration found that crime was consistently less during periods of Daylight Saving Time than during comparable standard time periods. Data showed violent crime down 10 to 13 percent. It is clear that for most crimes where darkness is a factor, such as muggings, there are many more incidents after dusk than before dawn, so light in the evening is most welcome. ###

Online calendars can help your computer update automatically. When it's time to spring forward or fall back, many people just change their clocks before going to bed, or reset them in the morning when they wake up, rather than changing the clocks exactly at 2:00 in the morning.

Be careful when changing your clocks before bed, though - some clocks are smart enough to change the time automatically for DST. If you change the time manually, you may end up an hour off. ###

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
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
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Welcome Dr. Christina Paparella

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Spring Model Railroad Show

The excitement and "Romance of Railroads," and the enjoyment of building and displaying model trains has kept the Society of Model Engineers going since 1926, making it the oldest model train group in the United States.

The members operate a train museum and two large "Railroad Empires" covering almost 5,000 square feet.

The larger "O" Scale layout is 40 by 70 feet and has almost 20 scale miles of train track, with detailed scenic diorama with realistic track work, roads, interesting structures, bridges and tunnels.

The "HO" Scale layout is approximately 30 by 45 feet. It also, is fully scenic with miles of scale track. Over 50,000 miniature trees have been installed by the members to depict Northern New Jersey.

Many of the models are one of a kind and were handmade by Society members. Trains of all types, passenger, freight, and circus trains, will be operating continuously.

Also on display will be the Society's collection of historic railroad memorabilia signage, railroad lanterns, steam locomotive bells and whistles, railroad photos, etc.

Leprechauns and other creatures of Irish mythology are often associated with "faerie forts" or "faerie rings" — often the sites of ancient (Celtic or pre-Celtic) earthworks or drum-

They usually take the form of old men who enjoy partaking in mischief.

Their trade is that of a cobbler or shoemaker. They are said to be very rich, having many treasure crocks buried.

According to legend, if anyone keeps an eye fixed upon one, he cannot escape, but the moment the eye is withdrawn he vanishes.

In Irish mythology, a in what would be classed as a folk tale: in almost all cases the interest of these stories centers around a human hero.

> Stories about leprechauns are very brief and have local names and scenery attached to them.

In most tales and stories, leprechauns are depicted as harmless creatures who enjoy solitude and live in remote locations, although opinion is

divided as to if they ever enjoy the company of other spirits.

Although rarely seen in social situations, leprechauns are supposedly very well spoken and, if ever spoken to, could make good conversation.

The modern image of the leprechaun is depicted wearing an emerald green frock coat, and bestowed with the knowledge of the location of buried treasure, often in a crock of gold. ###

But in Roman times the expression "Ides of March" did not necessarily evoke a dark mood—it was simply the standard way of saying "March 15."

A Roman saying, "four Ides," (meaning four days before Ides), would be just as clear to other Romans as someone saying March 11.

For ancient Romans, an Ides was merely one of several common calendar terms used to mark monthly lunar events. The Ides simply marked the appearance of the full moon.

Each month has an Ides (usually the 15th) and this date wasn't significant in being associated with bad luck or doom. ###

About Easter

Easter, Pascha, or Resurrection Day, is the most important religious feast in the Christian liturgical year. It celebrates the resurrection of Jesus, which Christians believe occurred on the third day after his crucifixion some time in the period A.D. 27 to 33.

Many pagan elements have become part of the celebration, and those aspects are often celebrated by many Christians and non-Christians alike.

Easter also refers to the season of the Church year called Eastertide or the Easter Season. Traditionally, the Easter Season lasted for the forty days from Easter Day until Ascension Day, but now officially lasts for the fifty days until Pentecost. The first week of the Easter Season is known as Easter Week or the Octave of Easter.

Easter is termed a movable Christian holy day because it is not fixed in relation to the civil calendar. Easter falls at some point between late March and late April each year (early April to early May in Eastern Christianity), following the cycle of the moon.

Easter is linked to the Jewish Passover, not only for much of its symbolism, but also for its position in the calendar.

The Last Supper shared by Jesus and his disciples before his crucifixion is generally

thought of as a Passover meal, based on the chronology in the Gospels.

Some, however, interpret "Passover" in John 18:28 as a single meal and not a sevenday festival. Interpretation of the Gospel of John differs from the Synoptic Gospels by placing Christ's death at the time of the slaughter of the Passover lambs, which would put the Last Supper slightly before Passover, on 14 Nisan of the Bible's Hebrew calendar.

Congrats go out to lifelong Lodi resident and citizen extraordinaire Mr. Frank Corso Jr. He recently celebrated his 70th anniversary as an active member of the Lodi Fire Department Mr. Corso joined their ranks on February 10, 1948 and has been responding to the call ever since. Contrary to popular beliefs, Frank Corso was not at the Chicago fire of 1871. You'll have to ask Mr. Corso about that when you see him. Make sure you ask him from across the street with your car running. No kidding Frank, the Borough of Lodi thanks you for all of those years of dedicated service to your community.

Hey folks I've got some "fun facts" about our town that you are sure to find interesting. The Borough of Lodi became incorporated in the year 1894.

Lodi nurtured no less than 431 students all under the watchful eye of Mayor Daniel Cook.

Did you know that in 1897 our Borough introduced its first and only Trolley car service? No you didn't! Okay then who was Mayor at the time? I'll give you a hint...they named a street after him. If you said George Mercer you are correct and you probably have the same list of facts that I'm looking at which automatically disqualifies you from taking this quiz.

Okay what other dates do I have for you? In 1900 the First Reformed Church was built on Main Street. Can any of you tell me who the Reverend was at that time? Okay folks I'll give you another hint. They named a street after him as well. No it wasn't Burns Avenue! I'm pretty sure that street was named after the legendary, cigar smoking comedian, George Burns. The correct answer is Rev. Isaac Contant.

Here's an interesting bit of information that you may or may not find interesting. Remember the United Piece Dye Works? If you said yes then you're the oldest person in the USA which in that case I'm not telling anything you don't already know. The UPDW was the largest dye works of its kind in the USA. The only larger one was located in France. The Lodi mega factory was established in 1903 when it merged with Boettger and Alexander piece dye works.

Here we go again with another trick question. Who was mayor at the time of merger? Okay here's another hint ... They named De Vries Park after him. Still stumped? Okay his first name was Daniel. Yes ... Mayor Daniel De Vries! Gee what gave it away? Are you bored with this yet? Okay take a break and I'll meet you in the next paragraph.

By now you should be experiencing your second wind so let's get on with it shall we? In the year 1904 Lodi boasted it's very own full time police department. Part time law enforcement wasn't cutting it

any longer since most of the Law breaker were on a full time basis minus a half hour for lunch and two 10 minute breaks. Chief was Thomas Davis. Lodi's police department has been protecting our community ever since and we cannot thank them enough.

Let's see what I have here that will keep you from leaving the room. Wait! Don't leave yet Lodi people. By now I've lost 95% of my out of town readers and at this point you're all I've got left. Here's something that Frank Corso Jr. might recall. In 1908, after fire destroyed stores on Main and Nicholson Streets...you remember Nicholson Street don't you baby boomers? The home of everyone's favorite haunt, the place famous for it's out of this world Hamburger and frosty mug of beer...if you were of age of course. I'm talking about the bar across the street from Puggies Luncheonette where the sign on the window read "Ladies Invited." You guessed it Rudolfo's Bar. You couldn't pass through without passing out...again if you were of age of course. Anyway, I forgot what I was talking about, Oh yea. March 8, 1908 marked the incorporation of Fire Engine Co. No.1 as well as the Nicholson Street Fire Co. on April 18th. Mayor at the time was Ellsworth Dawson.

Here's a side bar. On February 13, 1911, thanks to the urging of Mayor Adrian Zandee, Lodi turned on its very own water service which came in handy since they now had a fire department. Goodbye bucket brigade hello fire hydrants. Not long afterwards the kitchen sink was invented.

Finally, yes there is a God, in the year 1934 our beloved Lodi High School was built. The Orange and Blue Ram is poised high atop the Harrison Avenue water tower forever reminding us of how far we have come as individuals and how far we have come as a healthy and prosperous community.

Can anyone tell me who the Mayor was in 1934? I'd better tell you since there were no streets or housing developments named after him. Mayor Michael "Packey" Cavallo. By the way if you're your thinking of riding that Trolley car up Arnot Street forget it. The service was discontinued in 1924.

New Barbadoes to Boroughitis: A History of South Bergen

Part 1 of 4

Shortly after Britain annexed New Netherlands from the Dutch, Governor Carteret of the Colony of East Jersey, granted a tract of land to Captain John Berry. The land grant extended from Newark Bay, north, to the New York border and encompassed all the land between the Hackensack River west to the Saddle River. Captain Berry named this New Barbadoes, after the Caribbean island where he once lived. Captain Berry set about selling tracts of land in his holdings to wealthy Dutch families from what had been New Netherlands.

Some of these families were the Van Winkles and Brinkerhofs of what is now Rutherford; the Kips and Terhunes of Polifly and Outwaters of what is now Moonachie. The majority of the inhabitants, of what would become Bergen County, were Dutch farmers until the middle 1800s.

The English created a system of county government in the colony. They were familiar with this form of government in England. New Barbadoes was made part of Essex County. Originally, Bergen was only the land between the Hudson and Hackensack Rivers. The name Bergen is a matter of conjecture. It has been stated that it is named after Bergen, Norway or the town of Bergen in the Netherlands. A third opinion is that it was named after Hans Hansen Bergen, an early settler in New Netherlands.

In 1675, the Province of East Jersey designated this area as the County of Bergen. The colonial General Assembly created, in January 1709, new boundaries that greatly enlarged Bergen County. This area included what is now Hudson and Passaic Counties and part of Essex County. Hackensack was named as the county seat.

New Barbadoes became a township in 1710 and existed until 1921. In 1716, the Township of Saddle River was created from a part of New Barbadoes Township. Lodi Township was formed in 1721 from the southern part of New Barbadoes. The land from Newark Bay up to around Hackensack was called New Barbadoes Neck.

Polifly Road was laid out. in 1707, from Hackensack south to about the southern end of what is now Rutherford. This was the first road in the area and still exists today under the names Polifly Road, Terrace Avenue and Hackensack Street. The road ran through an area called Polifly Heights. This would later become the Boroughs of Hasbrouck Heights and Wood-Ridge. The name Polifly appears to be Dutch for "meadow atop a swamp." The farms prospered until the American Revolution. 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Veterans Today

President Trump has for many people been controversial. Just mention his name and you will get a reaction. They don't like this or they don't like that. If they voted for him they say he's doing a good job. That is the way of politics. Not just for our current President but all of them that came before.

If someone voted for someone, then they can do no wrong. If your candidate lost, then you will be bitter with the winner. This President has been under attack since he won the election. I never have seen this before. I would bet most of the old folks have not either. My meaning here is simply this.

My father told me long ago that when you vote for someone and that person wins, never, never rub it in anyone's face. A bad winner is just as annoying as a sore loser. If your candidate loses don't complain. Don't cry about it. Your job as a citizen is to support the winner. It used to be the way of America. Keep quiet and don't offend your neighbor's politics. That

doesn't happen anymore.

People scream on Face-book and the internet to impeach Trump. Throw him out. Get rid of him. I believe everyone at this point has heard this all before, so this March we will go over impeachment and what it's about. To do so we will go over the first impeachment of a President, no, not Bill, further back. If you're thinking Nixon, wrong again. He was never impeached. We must go to the year 1868 and President Andrew Johnson.

Andrew Johnson was born in North Carolina. He was working for a tailor in his youth but he decided to run away and he ran to Tennessee. He was a great "stump" speaker in his early years and by speaking well in speeches he soon won election to the House of Representatives and then the Senate.

When the Civil War broke out in 1861 he stayed loyal to the United States and didn't vacate Tennessee's Senate Chair even though the State succeeded. In 1864 the Republican Party nominated him for Vice President even though he was a Southern Democrat. Lincoln won a second term and his Vice President was now from the opposite party. This would not happen today.

Lincoln's assassination propels Johnson into the White House. Andrew Johnson was an honest man, but in politics enemies are easily found. He was a Democrat and the Congress was mostly Republican.

When the Civil War ended he began to reconstruct the southern states as he saw fit to do. To Congress's irritation, he pardoned all who took the Oath of Allegiance. The Congress had their ideas about reconstruction, so immediately there was friction.

Congress refused to seat any Representatives or Senators from the former Confederacy. The Congress tried to pass Legislation on the former slaves and Johnson vetoed the measure. They then overrode his veto and passed it anyway.

They passed the Tenure of Office Act in 1867. This Act of Congress stated that an office holder appointed by the President cannot be removed or dismissed without the approval of the Senate. This Act was immediately vetoed by Johnson but they overrode this veto as well.

The Republican Congress passed the Civil Rights Act of 1866 which gave all the freed slaves the right to citizenship. They passed the 14th amendment to the Constitution which forbade anyone to deprive anyone of life, liberty, or property, without the due process of law.

So, as you see the Republican held Congress was moving along and banging heads with Johnson. The Congress, in March of 1867, wanted to put all of the southern states back under military law. Johnson didn't want to do that and he was the Commander-in-Chief. Congress knew this and they also knew that Johnson was in control of the military which would be the mechanism of their style of reconstruction.

The Republican held Congress passed the "Tenure of Office Act" as stated before and here is why. The Secretary of War was Edwin Stanton. Stanton was a leftover from Lincoln's term and he agreed with the Congress. He was one of the Republicans. Johnson wanted to fire him and replace

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him. The Act of Congress prevented his removal from office while the Congress was not in session. It's the Legislative Branch stepping on the Executive Branch.

Johnson had no other way to fight the legality of this act but through the Supreme Court. If a case were made in the Supreme Court that it was one branch of government stepping on the authority of another the Supreme Court could declare the law null and void, but first he had to get it before the Supreme Court. How do you do that? Well, that was simple. He fired Stanton. Congress went into an uproar. How can he do that? We have a law? The President has violated his office by breaking the law.

To impeach someone on the Federal level the House of Representatives votes to impeach. They accuse the person of violating the law. Then the actual trial happens in the Senate. The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court presides over the Senate trial. The Constitution states you need a high crime or misdemeanor to impeach. The House of Representatives accused Johnson of violating the Tenure of Office Act. So, on February 24, 1868 they brought up the articles of impeachment which were an 11 count indictment of violating this law and they voted 126 to 47 to impeach. Johnson was now officially impeached. The President was allowed to carry out his duties the same as before because he was innocent until proven guilty.

On March 13,1868 President Andrew Johnson's impeachment trial before the Senate began. Chief Justice Salmon P. Chase assumed control over the trial. The Senate would need 3/4ths of the Senate to vote for conviction not a majority vote like a bill.

Normally the Vice President would be a tie breaker, but there was no Vice President. Johnson took Lincoln's place and a new Vice President had not yet been selected. Since 3/4ths of a vote was required a tie breaker is not needed but what if the Senate convicts Johnson? Who would take his place if Johnson was tossed out? The Senate voted in a pro temp Vice President. Senator Benjamin Wade of Ohio was now the Vice President. If Johnson was convicted Benjamin Wade would be the new President.

On the first day Johnson's defense team asked for 40 days to assemble a defense. They were voted down and received 10 days to do so. On March 23rd his defense argued that since not all the Senators from the states were not present then the trial should be adjourned. That was voted down too. Af-

ter more arguing, the trial was moved to March 30th. When the 30th came around Benjamin Butler, for the prosecution, began a 3 hour long argument on how the President violated the Tenure of Office Act. Johnson's defense team argued that since Edwin Stanton was an appointment from Lincoln's first term of 1860, he would have needed to be reappointed in 1864. This did not happen so to remove Stanton was not illegal.

Johnson's team also pointed out the fact that the House had passed the Office of Tenure Act but the Senate amended it. That means that it had to go back to committee to hash out what the Senate and House differed on the Bill. He brought forth minutes of the meeting to prove his argument. The defense called Adjutant General Lorenzo Thomas to testify on their behalf. He was not helpful to the defense and Benjamin Butler tried to use him in the prosecution's favor.

General William T. Sherman was called and the prosecution expected him to testify that Johnson wanted him to succeed Stanton to stop Congress in interfering in the reconstruction of the South. He testified that Lincoln asked him to succeed Stanton to help the Congress in reconstruction. The Prosecution took another

Johnson didn't testify nor did he appear in his own defense. When the smoke cleared it was up to the Senate to vote his future. Now, in these trials 3/4ths is needed to convict.

At the time there were 27 States so that means there are 54 Senators. So, 36 votes were needed. The vote went 35 to 19. Seven of the Republicans actually voted not to convict. So Johnson was not convicted. Another vote was taken on May 26th on the eleventh article but again Johnson was spared conviction by 1 vote.

So, President Johnson had won his case. The first impeachment trial was now history. Had Johnson lost he would have been forced out of office. That is the punishment.

President Clinton became the second President to be impeached for lying under oath. He too won his trial. Nixon no doubt would have been impeached but before articles of impeachment could be drawn up he resigned. You can disagree with the President but impeachment can only be done with a high crime or misdemeanor. You can't impeach because of speech he might use. It's a lengthy process and you better prove your case. The Office of Tenure Act was ruled invalid in 1887 by the Supreme Court and the Act was repealed by Congress and disappeared into forgotten history. ###

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National Poison Prevention Week

Children Act Fast, So Do Poisons

South Bergen Public Safety officials remind area residents to observe National Poison Prevention Week, March 18-24, 2018, which is designated to highlight the dangers of poisonings and how to prevent them.

Drug-related poisonings cause nearly 700,000 visits to hospital emergency rooms each year. Poisonings cause more than 35,000 deaths each year.

50% of young people are the most likely to be poisoned, with children under age six accounting for half of all poison exposures.

92% poisoning deaths occure among people over the age of 20.

The five causes of poisoning: painkillers, cosmetics or personal products, household cleaning products, sedatives, and antipsychotics medicine and foreign bodies, toys and other objects.

More than 2 million poisonings are reported each year to the 55 poison control centers across the country. More than 90 percent of these poisonings occur in the home. The majority of non-fatal poisonings occur in children younger than six years old. And, poisonings are one of the leading causes of

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Most poisonings occur when parents or caregivers are home, but not paying attention. The most dangerous potential poisons are medicines, cleaning products, antifreeze, windshield wiper fluid, pesticides, furniture polish, gasoline, kerosene and lamp oil.

- Store medicine, cleaners, paints/varnishes and pesticides in their original packaging in locked cabinets or containers, out of sight and reach of children.
- Install a safety latch that locks when you close the door - on child-accessible cabinets containing harmful products.
- Purchase and keep all medicines in containers with safety caps. Discard unused medication.
- Never refer to medicine as "candy" or another appealing name.
- Check the label each time you give a child medicine to ensure proper dosage.
- Never place poisonous products in food or drink con-
- Maintain working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

Treatment: If your child is unconscious, not breathing, or having convulsions or seizures due to poison, contact or ingestion, call 911. If your child has come in contact with poison, and has mild or no symptoms, call your poison control center at 1-800-222-1222. For more information go to: www.poisonpreventions. org ###

Will the New Tax Law **Lower Home Prices?**

For most of us in the real estate industry, the ripple effect emanating from the new tax laws seem to be a bit confusing.

In fact, the question on many homeowners' minds is, I think, pretty obvious: How will they be affected by the tax bill?

Given the contrary media coverage and dearth of details coming out of Washington, even accountants are scratching their heads as they scramble to assess the impact. So it was interesting to read, last month, real estate guru Jeffrey Otteau's optimistic take on the recent changes to the tax code.

"There's no reason to panic here," said Otteau, president of The Otteau Group. "I heard some bold predictions about Armageddon, about house prices collapsing losing 10 to 15 percent in value. There's no basis for that."

Otteau believes overall New Jersey home prices will continue to climb in 2018, but at a slower rate than previously predicted, as would-be new homebuyers step back to assess the newly minted law's impact on their pocketbooks with their accountants. He thinks the most immediate effect of buyer hesitancy will be felt in the first quarter of 2018.

"I expect house prices will

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stall in New Jersey in the first quarter of the year because of the pullback in buying, because people are just really confused about how this is going to play out," Otteau said. As a result, the spring market may get off to a slightly later

Homeowners who put their properties on the market this winter might see their homes sit unsold for a bit longer than average periods. "Sellers aren't going to benefit from being on the market early because they'll be rushing their way into a traffic jam," he said.

For those properties coming on the market, finding the right price will be critical to attracting buyers, particularly as interest rates go up and buyer affordability goes down, Otteau said. Sellers "need to come in at a price that generates excitement and sense of urgency.

However, looking out longer term, the average NJ homeowner is likely to benefit from the changes to the tax code, Otteau added. His reasons for optimism?

• Most tax brackets, including higher-income earners up to \$400,000, are lower under the new law. Otteau predicts the lower brackets will help make up for caps or the elimination of deductions elsewhere. "The approach of focusing only on SALT (state

and local taxes) is really not fair, because tax rates are lower and you'll still be coming out ahead," he said.

- People buy homes for a complex set of reasons schools, proximity to work and transportation, because they like a particular community, investment value, etc. "Taxes rank fairly low on the ladder," he opined.
- The overall economy is improving, with 2 million jobs created in 2017 and unemployment at its lowest in years, putting more spending power in peoples' pockets, he said.
- The massive reduction in the corporate tax rate from 35 to 21 percent will spur more hiring at higher salaries by companies competing for talent, according to Otteau. "This feeds back in to a more favorable jobs market and salaries."
- Interest rates are forecast to rise further this year, to 4.5 or 5%. That will compel some people to buy sooner than later to lock in favorable rates. Otteau noted that for every percentage point rise in interest rates, the price of a home becomes 9 percent more expensive for the buyer.
- People will be motivated to buy because taxes aren't going lower. "The value of what you buy is still going to rise and will be yours, something you own, a place of your choosing and you'll have permanence."

I'm not an accountant, but this sort of reasoning makes sense to me!

While most people are interested in safeguarding their homes, many dangerous and environmentally unsafe materials gather dust in garages and basements, such as batteries, paints, and insecticides.

Hazardous waste can safely be removed from homes and be recycled or disposed of properly at the Bergen County Utilities Authority (BCUA) Household Hazardous Waste Collections.

BCUA will collect household hazardous waste on Saturday, March 10, 2018, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., at the BCUA (foot of Empire Boulevard) in Moonachie -- rain or shine. This service is free of charge for Bergen County residents -- ID is required. (Directions: Moonachie Avenue. Pass Teterboro Airport (on your left) and continue going straight until road ends into BCUA facilities.)

A partial list of acceptable materials for collection

includes: aerosol cans, antifreeze, batteries, blacktop sealers, disinfectants, fertilizer, fire extinguishers, herbicides, insecticides, mercury switches, paints, pesticides, propane gas cylinders (1 lb. & 20 lb. only), solvents and thinners, used mo tor oil, varnishes.

A partial list of unacceptable materials includes: unlabeled wastes or containers with unknown contents, regulated medical wastes, radioactive materials and explosives, containers larger than five gallons, compressed cylinders (oxygen or acetylene), pressure treated lumber or railroad ties, computers, electronics and tires.

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Filling You In

Oral Cancer

Oral cancer is the sixth most common cancer, accounting for nearly 5 percent of all cases. Close to 49,750 Americans are expected to be diagnosed with oral or pharyngeal cancer this year. It is expected to cause more than 9,750 deaths, killing roughly 1 person per hour, 24 hours per day, according to The Oral Cancer Foundation.

Oral cancer is particularly dangerous because it can go unnoticed in its preliminary stages. In many cases, however, general dentists can detect the disease early, which makes the dental community the first line of defense against oral cancer.

Read on to learn more about oral cancer and why it's crucial to talk with your general dentist immediately if you believe that you are experiencing any symptoms. What are the warning signs of oral cancer? Oral cancer typically is painless in its early stages but can become painful as it spreads. Go to your dentist immediately if you observe any of the following: changes in the way your teeth fit together; oral sores that bleed easily or don't heal; lumps, thickening, rough spots, or crusty or eroded areas in the mouth; or difficulty swallowing, chewing, speaking, or, moving the jaw or tongue.

How do dentists screen for cancer? During an oral cancer screening, your dentist will feel for lumps or irregular tissue changes in your neck, head, cheeks and oral cavity. He or she also will examine the soft tissues in your mouth, looking for sores or discolored tissues. He or she also may use screening devices that use rinses, dyes or different types of lights to detect abnormal cells.

It's important to remember that your dentist does not necessarily think you have oral

cancer if he or she performs a screening. An oral cancer screening is part of a routine dental checkup, even when you have no symptoms. How is oral cancer treated? Methods of treatment for oral cancer include surgery, radiation therapy and/or chemotherapy.

This treatment is determined in conjunction with your physician. What are the risk factors for oral cancer? Risk factors for oral cancer include tobacco use, alcohol use, sun exposure (lips), previous head and neck cancer diagnosis and human papilloma virus (HPV) infection. HPV can cause cancer in the back of the throat (oropharyngeal cancer), including the base of the tongue and tonsils.

How can I prevent oral cancer? To help prevent oral cancer, abstain from using all forms of tobacco, and avoid excessive sun exposure and alcohol consumption. Additionally, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends that all preteen boy and girls ages 11 to 12 should be vaccinated for HPV, which may aid in reducing the risk of oral cancer. The vaccines also are recommended for males and females ages 13 to 26 if they haven't received them already.

Because successful treatment and rehabilitation of oral cancer are dependent upon early detection, it is extremely important to regularly check your mouth for any changes and to maintain regular dental visits, at least every six months.
