### Spring Forward March 13

Daylight Saving Time (previously known as "Fast Time" in the United States) will commence at 2 a.m., on Sunday, March 13, 2022. Clocks should be set forward one hour ahead of standard time (spring forward).

Daylight Saving Time (DST) allows us to take advantage of the longer and later daylight hours.

Spring begins with the Vernal Equinox, Sunday, March 20, 2022 11:33 a.m.



### Full Worm Moon

The March full moon will appear on Friday, March 18, 2022, at 3:20 a.m. It is called the "Full Worm Moon."

According to the Farmer's Almanac, as the temperature begins to warm and the ground begins to thaw, earthworm casts appear, heralding the return of the robins.

Northern tribes also referred to this Moon as the "Full Crow Moon" when the cawing of crows signaled the end of winter; or the "Full Crust Moon," because the snow cover becomes crusted from thawing by day and freezing at night.

The "Full Sap Moon" marks the time of tapping maple trees in another variation.

The Native American Indians of the northern and eastern United States kept track of the seasons by giving a name to each recurring full moon. European settlers followed the custom.

This year, March's full moon (March 18, 2022) occurs before the spring equinox (March 20, 2022), making it the Lenten Moon. April's full moon (April 16, 2022) will be the first full moon to occur after the spring equinox and will therefore determine the date of Easter this year. ###

## As Irish as Corned Beef and Cabbage?

Every St. Patrick's Day, thousands of pounds of corned beef are consumed by Americans in the mistaken belief that they are partaking of the food of their ancestors in Ireland. Yet, one would be hard pressed to find this dish in many parts of the Emerald Isle.

The Irish, for over three hundred years, have immigrated to America.

The first St. Patrick's Day parade was not held in Dublin but in New York City in 1762. However, the largest contingent came in the 1840/50s because of the "Potato Famine" or, as it is called in Ireland, the "Great Hunger."

Many immigrants settled in the poorer sections of New York City such as Hell's Kitchen and the Five Points section of lower Manhattan.

From these locations came the vast majority of men who made up the famous 69th New York Infantry Regiment. The regiment was the cause of an international incident in 1860 when their commander, Col. Michael Corcoran, refused to parade the regiment in honor of the Prince of Wales' visit to New York on October 11, 1860. Col. Corcoran was placed under arrest but with the outbreak of the Civil War, all charges were dropped.

A green flag honoring their actions in defiance of the Prince was presented by the Irish citizens of New York. This flag was carried at the Battle of First Bull Run. Confederate General Robert E. Lee was so impressed with their bravery and devotion to duty when he faced them on many battlefields, that he called them "The Fighting Irish."

The 69th was again called to war in 1917. They had their regimental number changed at this time to 165th Infantry regiment of the New York National Guard and has served in WWI, WWII, Iraq and Afghanistan.

While pork was the meat that these immigrants were most familiar with, it was rather more expensive than the abundant beef here in America.

Their dealings with Eastern European Jewish immigrants in their New York neighborhood introduced them to a cheap cut of meat called corned beef.

This reminded them of Irish bacon; a smoked cured meat similar to Canadian bacon. The corned beef could be cooked in one pot with the cabbage and potatoes.

The popularity of this dish soon spread to other Irish enclaves in Boston, Philadelphia, Chicago and the rest of America. By the 1860s the dish was so popular that it was served at President Lincoln's inauguration dinner.

The Irish assimilation into American society was marked by their interaction with the other ethnic groups that cohabitated in the slums.

This was not always done in a civil manner. The perpetrators of the "DRAFT RIOTS of 1863" were in large part the inhabitants of Hell's Kitchen who felt the draft was a way the rich could buy their way out of serving in the Army.

As poor men they would be forced into the Army. Orangemen parading up 8th Avenue in July of 1881 were showered with "Irish Confetti" (bricks, cobble stones, full chamber pots, etc.) from the roof tops.

This led to a full blown riot. Shillelagh law was all the rage. The local police could not stop the mayhem. The Militia was called and fired into the mob killing thirty and wounding hundreds more before the riot ended.

There were two things that they were denied in Ireland but were readily utilized here in America.

As poor Irish tenant farmers they had no access to an education. In America, education was open to all.

Here, as new citizens of The United States, they had the right to vote. In Ireland only landed gentry could vote. They took advantage of both.

The term "Narrow Back" was applied to first generation Irish Americans. This indicated that because they were able to educate themselves and improve their station in life, they would not be forced to do menial work as their "Broad Shouldered" parents did. It was the willingness of these immigrants to work hard to improve their lot and offer loyalty to their adopted country. They advanced to the point in 1961 that an American of Irish descent, John F. Kennedy, became President of The United States. So when you partake of this dish, think not only of St. Patrick but also of all the men and women of Irish descent who have helped to make a great America. Story by James Halloran. ###

to celebrate the patron saint of Ireland with some corned beef and a pint of Guinness. But some places have their own peculiar celebrations.

Did you know that the Chicago River is dyed green every year on St. Paddy's Day?

In Hot Springs, Arkansas, you can find the world's shortest St. Patrick's Day parade -- a whopping 98 feet down Bridge Street. Marchers include Irish Elvis impersonators and a middle-age troupe called Lards of the Dance.

Residents of New London, Wisconsin get into the spirit by dressing as leprechauns and changing town signs to say "New Dublin." Green beer and an Irish Elvis -- now that's a celebration! SPM Wire. ###

### Wearing of the Green

Originally, the color associated with Saint Patrick was blue. Over the years the color green and its association with Saint Patrick's Day grew.

Green ribbons and shamrocks were worn in celebration of St Patrick's Day as early as the 17th century.

Saint Patrick is said to have used the shamrock, a three-leaved plant, to explain the Holy Trinity to the pagan Irish, and the ubiquitous wearing and display of shamrocks and shamrock-inspired designs has become a feature of the day.

In the 1798 rebellion, to make a political statement, Irish soldiers wore full green uniforms on 17 March in hopes of catching public attention.

The phrase "the wearing of the green," meaning to wear a shamrock on one's clothing, derives from a song of the same name. ###

### The Nation's Attic

Many families store things like old family photos, granddad's military medals, citizenship papers, old letters and post cards or other mementos, in the attic or basement. These items have sentimental value. This gives the family a sense of tradition and history.

Even though Thomas Jefferson warned in 1791, "Time and accident are committing daily havoc on the originals deposited in our public offices," it would take Congress until 1934 to establish the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA). Before NARA, records were stored by the various government agencies in cabinets, chests, warehouses and unused office space with little regard as to preserving them.

This past January, my wife and I visited the National Archives Building, at 700 Pennsylvania Avenue, in Washington. Entry is by appointment. This can be easily done by contacting Recreation.gov for reservations. This will be sent to your iPhone.

We entered the queue outside the building. Here our reservations were inspected by an armed guard. Upon entering the building, we had to go through a metal detector and were advised that no photography was allowed.

Directly across from this entrance is a room that has one of the four originals of the Magna Carta. This holds the seal of King John. The others are in Great Britain.

We then proceeded upstairs to an area called the rotunda. Here are kept what are called the three Charters of Freedom. They are the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution of the United States and the Bill of Rights. The display case is flanked by two armed guards and a third guard that moves around the room. The lighting in the rotunda is kept dim because of the fading of these documents from over two hundred years of exposure to

- daylight.

Sadly, the Declaration of Independence has faded to the point that we could barely make out the signature of John Hancock. The other documents have fared little better.

We went into another room that held the Emancipation Proclamation signed by President Lincoln. Another display was on the 19th Amendment about women's right to vote.

They have a great gift shop located just before the exit.

The visit took about two hours.

There is another entrance to the building for the use of government and private researchers. Here you can request and view thousands of documents. This is by appointment only.

The NARA holds 13.28 billion pages of textual re-

cords; 10 million maps, charts, architectural and engineering drawings; 44.4 million still photographs, digital images, filmstrips and graphics; 40 million aerial photographs; 563,000 reels of motion picture film; 992,000 video and sound recordings; and 1,323 terabytes of electronic data. All Presidential Libraries are under their jurisdiction. The US Government adds more each year to the collection.

All this material is stored at a number of locations around the country. There are a number of regional centers. One is located in New York City. Due to COVID 19, the New York office is not now open to the public.

The big event this year is the release of the 1950 Federal Census. For additional information, go to Archives.gov ###

The Grand Prix of Monaco draws well-heeled travelers to Monte Carlo, while the Indianapolis 500 and the many NASCAR events draw huge crowds of everyday Americans to speedways around the United States.

## **Real Estate Insight** By Mary Ellen Courtney

### The Market. A Status Report.

Low interest rates. Low housing inventory. Double digit price growth. More 'same old, same old, same old'....

As we all know by now, the real estate market has been in a frenzied boom since the pandemic began. Buyers have been grappling over homes by waging bidding wars and running prices up tens of thousands above asking price. The question now is has it finally peaked?

According to industry experts, that depends on how you measure the peak.

"Yes it has peaked, in terms of the number of home sales," says Jeffrey Otteau, a real estate economist and president of the Otteau Group, based in New Jersey (a veritable oracle for us in the business). His observation in December: "From this point forward, we're seeing fewer home sales occur, which will continue into 2022."

Home sales were down for each of the last five months of 2021 according to data from the Otteau Group. It began in June with a 12% decline in contract sales and continued with a 22% decline in July, 16% in August, 20% in September, 16% in October and 7% in November.

As to prices, on the other hand, we've yet to see the peak. But it's coming, Otteau says. "In terms of prices," he states, "we believe the peak won't occur until late summer 2022.

The reason is that the economy will continue to get stronger and that the millennial generation will continue to transition from renter to home ownership which will bring demand. The interest rates will drift higher, but they're still historically low."

Prices increased here in New Jersey 12% in 2020 and 15% in 2021. They will likely

gain another 5% in 2022, predicts Otteau.

The cooling off has to do with homes becoming unaffordable, despite the low interest rates.

The report says incomes have been rising, on average, 4 percent per year. "House prices have risen faster than salaries," Otteau says, adding that there comes a point when the banks say, the house may be worth that much but you don't have the income for the mortgage to be approved.

Moreover, the second half of 2022 will see a return to a more normal pace of growth thanks in part to fewer people moving from New York City, increased housing inventories as Covid concerns wane, as well as mounting buyer fatigue and wariness about overpaying.

"Home prices have gotten really expensive; so high, it's causing some pushback from home buyers." Otteau says.

Looking to 2023, Otteau sees a risk of economic recession and slower growth, which could hurt home sales. "Recessions usually happen every 10 years, and we're overdue for one," he says.

In addition, higher interest rates resulting from inflationary pressures could prompt mortgage lenders to raise interest rates. Otteau notes that every 100-basis point (1 percent) increase in mortgage interest rates erodes home buyer purchasing power by 9%.

So, Bottom Line: The housing market is going to stay strong for the foreseeable future. And this year might be the ideal time to buy a home as there is more upside room and interest rates (forecasted to rise soon) are still, at this

point, very low.

Keri and Frank assessed Richard's condition and immediately dialed 911. It was determined that Richard did not have a pulse and was clearly unresponsive. Keri and Frank started CPR until Wood-Ridge Police Officers, Mike Donato and Jeff Fantacone, arrived on scene. The officers took over CPR at that time and shortly after administered the use of an AED.

Richard needed the AED to be used twice until a heartbeat was detected. The Wood-Ridge Fire and EMS arrived on scene and transported him to the hospital.

According to Keri, she is

thankful that one of the requirements of the Wood-Ridge recreation program is that all head coaches become CPR certified (she has been a head softball coach for the past 13 years). Saving lives runs in the family. Keri's Father and Brother are both active members of the Wood-Ridge Fire and EMS and have been so for over 25 years.

Hasbrouck Heights recreation requires their coaches to be certified in CPR as well. Frank who has been a soccer and softball coach for the past 8 years is also thankful to have been able to use his life-saving skills that day. Once again, saving lives runs in his family as Frank's Mom is a Registered Nurse.

## Diabetes Alert Day

American Diabetes Association Diabetes Alert Day is on March 22, 2022. Observed annually on the fourth Tuesday in March, Diabetes Alert Day is a one-day "wake-up call" that focuses on the seriousness of diabetes and the importance of understanding your risk.

• As of now, more than 10.5% of the United States population is diabetic, whereas those at risk or at the prediabetic stage amounts to approximately 110 million of the total population.

• Nearly 1 in 5 adults living with diabetes, or 7.3 million Americans, are unaware that they have the disease.

• Approximately 88 million people aged 18 years or older have prediabetes, a condition in which blood glucose levels are higher than normal, but not high enough to be diagnosed as diabetes.

• More than 84 percent of people living with prediabetes don't know they have it.

• About 50 percent of women with gestational diabetes go on to develop type 2 diabetes.

• There is a reason why diabetes is known as the silent killer. The human body sometimes shows no symptoms despite blood sugar levels gradually increasing until you are at fatal risk. So being aware of it, finding out about the risks, and getting tested are extremely important. • Spreading awareness about diabetes encourages people to take time out to read up on it. People can get tested, get their blood glucose levels checked, and find out valuable information to help in the long run. For instance, did you know eating a cup of beans can lower blood sugar levels and minimize the risk of heart diseases? Source: NIH ###



### Understanding Aging and Oral Health

The aging population in the United States is growing. Older patients should know that maintaining good oral health is vital to having a healthy smile and optimal overall health.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), oral pain, difficulty eating (due to missing teeth, ill-fitting dentures, cavities and gum disease) and tooth loss are all signs of oral health problems in aging adults. Your dentist can help prevent and detect these oral health problems.

## What oral conditions am I more prone to as I age?

• Dental caries. Dental caries (tooth decay) is one of the main causes of tooth loss, or edentulism. About 23 million people are completely edentulous (toothless), according to the American College of Prosthodontists.

• Periodontal disease. Periodontal disease (gum disease) is a chronic bacterial infection that affects the gums and bone supporting your teeth.

According to CDC, in 2012, one out of every two American adults age 30 and older have had gum disease, which can lead to tooth loss.

• Xerostomia (dry mouth). When the salivary glands do not work properly, the amount of saliva in the mouth decreases, resulting in dry mouth, which can lead to decay. Prescription and overthe-counter medications are the most common cause of dry mouth. Dry mouth can make it

difficult to eat, swallow, taste and speak.

• Oral cancer. Oral cancer typically is painless in its early stages but can become painful as it spreads.

Go to your dentist immediately if you observe any of the following: changes in the way your teeth fit together; oral sores that bleed easily or don't heal; lumps, thickening, rough spots or crusty or eroded areas in your mouth; or difficulty swallowing, chewing, speaking, or moving your jaw or tongue.

Your dentist should perform a head and neck exam to screen for oral cancer during your routine checkups.

## How can I maintain my oral health as I age?

• Avoid tobacco, which is a risk factor for periodontal disease and oral cancer, and limit alcohol, which is also an oral cancer risk factor.

• Drink fluoridated water and use fluoride toothpaste to protect against decay.

• Practice good oral hygiene. Brushing your teeth with a soft-bristled brush for two minutes twice a day, and flossing between teeth, can help remove plaque. If you wear dentures, brush them every day to remove food particles and plaque and to prevent staining.

Before inserting your dentures, brush your gums, tongue and the roof of your mouth with a soft-bristled brush to stimulate tissue circulation and remove plaque.

Visit your dentist at least twice a year. People who do not have teeth still need to visit the dentist regularly, since denture adjustments and oral cancer screenings are part of routine dental visits. Older patients who are planning to enter a nursing home should ask about on-site dental care.

## **National Poison Prevention Week**

### Children Act Fast, So Do Poisons

South Bergen Public Safety officials remind area residents to observe National Poison Prevention Week, March 20-26, 2022, which is designated to highlight the dangers of poisonings and how to prevent them.

Drug-related poisonings cause nearly 700,000 visits to hospital emergency rooms each year. Poisonings cause more than 35,000 deaths each year.

• 50% of young people are the most likely to be poisoned, with children under age six accounting for half of all poison exposures.

• 92% poisoning deaths occure among people over the age of 20.

• The five causes of poisoning: painkillers, cosmetics or personal products, household cleaning products, sedatives, and antipsychotics medicine and foreign bodies, toys and other objects. More than 2 million poisonings are reported each year to the 55 poison control centers across the country. More than 90 percent of these poisonings occur in the home. The majority of non-fatal poisonings occur in children younger than six years old. And, poisonings are one of the leading causes of death among adults.

Most poisonings occur when parents or caregivers are home, but not paying attention. The most dangerous potential poisons are medicines, cleaning products, antifreeze, windshield wiper fluid, pesticides, furniture polish, gasoline, kerosene and lamp oil.

• Store medicine, cleaners, paints/varnishes and pesticides in their original packaging in locked cabinets or containers, out of sight and reach of children.

• Keep all laundry products locked up, high, and out of the reach of children

• Install a safety latch - that locks when you close the door - on child-accessible cabinets containing harmful products.

• Purchase and keep all medicines in containers with safety caps. Discard unused medication.

• Never refer to medicine as "candy" or another appealing name.

• Check the label each time you give a child medicine to ensure proper dosage.

• Never place poisonous products in food or drink containers.

• Maintain working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

**Treatment:** If your child is unconscious, not breathing, or having convulsions or seizures due to poison, contact or ingestion, call 911. If your child has come in contact with poison, and has mild or no symptoms, call your poison control center at 1-800-222-1222. ###

## **Safeguard Your Home**

### **BCUA Collects Household Hazardous Waste**

While most people are interested in safeguarding their homes, many dangerous and environmentally unsafe materials gather dust in garages and basements, such as batteries, paints, and insecticides.

Hazardous waste can safely be removed from homes and be recycled or disposed of properly at the Bergen County Utilities Authority (BCUA) Household Hazardous Waste Collections.

BCUA will collect household hazardous waste on Saturday, March 12, 2022, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., at the BCUA (foot of Empire Boulevard) in Moonachie -- rain or shine. This service is free of charge for Bergen County residents -- ID is required. (Directions: Moonachie Avenue. Pass Teterboro Airport (on your left) and continue going straight until road ends into BCUA facilities.)

A partial list of acceptable materials for collection includes: aerosol cans, antifreeze, batteries, blacktop sealers, disinfectants, fertilizer, fire extinguishers, herbicides, insecticides, mercury switches, paints, pesticides, propane gas cylinders (1 lb. & 20 lb. only), solvents and thinners, used motor oil, varnishes.

A partial list of unacceptable materials includes: unlabeled wastes or containers with unknown contents, regulated medical wastes, radioactive materials and explosives, containers larger than five gallons, compressed cylinders *(oxygen or acetylene)*, pressure treated lumber or railroad ties, computers, electronics and tires.
