Easter Bunny Rules

Over 9,000 brightly colored Easter eggs dotted the Gary Depken Field for the Annual Easter Egg Hunt held on Saturday, April 15th at 10:00 a m

An estimated 300 Heights pre-schoolers through third graders participated and about 200 adults watched the event on a sunny spring morning.

The field was set up into three sections. The three part egg hunt began with four to five year old children in Pre-K lined up on the north side of the field by event organizers. Parents were chased away, leaving only the eager children with their empty Easter baskets.

Police Chief Michael Colaneri began a countdown, blew his whistle and quickly stepped away as the children ran across the field to collect as many eggs as they could.

Each plastic egg contained a piece of candy or toy, but a few eggs held a small treasure

-- a "furry chick."

This sequence continued for K through First Graders in the center section and Second

and Third Graders on the south section.

After the egg hunt, those children who had found the eggs with the "chick," could redeem it for a toy prize.

The Easter Bunny visited, handed out Easter candy and toys and was available for photos by delighted parents and grandparents.

No one could recall when this event began, but many adults remember collecting eggs when they were youngsters.

Free tickets were distributed through the elementary schools and were also available at the Boro Clerk's Office at 320

Money Market Accounts 101

When you want a better interest rate than the typical bank savings account, a money market account (MMA) may be a good alternative.

Money market accounts are liquid savings accounts that generally give you the ability to write a limited number of checks against the account each month.

You can open one at just about any bank or credit union and your deposits are insured up to \$100,000 by the FDIC if you open an account at a bank or by the National Credit Union Share Insurance Fund (NCUSIF) if your account is at a credit union.

Your money will earn about twice the interest it would earn in a regular savings account. But you may have to open the MMA with a higher deposit than you would with a savings account.

High-yield MMAs are money market accounts on steroids.

They can be an even better bet because their rates are often double or triple the standard bank MMA rates.

But they can be difficult to find at the corner bank; you'll likely have to go to an online bank to open an account.

The institutions that offer them are competing for your deposits and, since they have lower overhead than traditional brick and mortar banks, they can offer much better rates.

Money market accounts come with check-writing and money transfer privileges that often have minimum requirements as to the dollar amount of checks and transfers.

Federal regulations limit the number of electronic, telephone or preauthorized transactions to six per month, with no more than three being by check, draft or debit card.

Some institutions may impose a fee after a certain number of withdrawals if your account balance is below a

Helmet Law Took Effect March 1st

With the rise and risk of juveniles sustaining head injuries due to bicycle accidents, the State of NJ has issued a statement stating that all juveniles 17 and under will be required to wear a helmet while riding a bicycle (or as a passenger on a bicycle). Previously the limit was 14 years of age.

This law also includes those minors who are roller skating, in-line skating or skateboarding.

All helmets must be properly fastened and fitted. Bicycle helmets must meet the federal standards developed by the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) effective March 10, 1999 that ensure the best head protection and strong chin straps to keep the helmet in place during a fall or collision.

Initial violators of the helmet law will receive warnings. For minors, the parent or legal guardian may be fined a maximum of \$25 for the offense and a maximum of \$100 for subsequent offense(s), if lack of parental supervision contributed to the offense.

This fine is not subject to motor vehicle points. ###

Buckle Up

The Hasbrouck Heights Police Department reminds residents of New Jersey's Safety Belt Law.

Safety belts improve your chances of surviving a crash by 60%. Most crashes occur within 25 miles of home and at speeds of under 40 miles per hour.

NJ Law requires that all front seat occupants of a passenger vehicle must wear a safety belt system.

The driver is responsible for any passenger under the age of 18. Front seat passengers 18 and over are responsible for themselves.

The penalty for an unbelted front seat occupant is \$20.

The exemptions to this law include: those riding in a passenger auto manufactured before July 1, 1966 and those with physical or medical reasons verified in writing by a licensed physician. ###

Child Safety Seats

The HHPD reminds residents of New Jersey's Child Restraint Law. Children under 18 months of age must be in an approved car seat when riding anywhere in a car.

Children between 18 months and five years old must be in a car seat if they are riding in the front seat and must be secured by a safety belt if riding in the rear seat.

If the number of children under five years old exceeds the number of safety belts, children who are not restrained must ride in the rear seat.

Field Dedicated to Larry R. Inserra

Despite the rain, spirits were high as the The Hasbrouck Heights Little League held their 53rd Opening Day ceremony Saturday, April 8, 2006.

The event began as the little leaguers and their families marched from the club house along the swim club parking lot, across Old Field Avenue, down onto the major league field and assembled along the perimeter of the infield.

Hasbrouck Heights Little League President Mark Dulhagen officiated.

The program began with little leaguers stating the Little League code and reciting the Pledge of Allegiance.

Everyone removed their cap and faced the American Flag in the left field during the National Anthem.

Mr. Dulhagen made several

announcements followed by comments by Mayor Ronald R. Jones.

The dedication of the major league field in honor of Larry R. Inserra began with two players presenting flower bouquets on behalf of the league.

Board Member Teddy Abramo presented Larry Inserra Jr. with a commemorative dedication plaque. A second plaque which would be posted on the club house was also unveiled.

A sign underneath the score board stating "Inserra Field" was uncovered.

To kick off the 2006 season, Larry Inserra Jr. threw out the 2006 season opener pitch.

The major league field was dedicated to Larry R. Inserra for his contribution to the Hasbrouck Heights Little League and the community of Hasbrouck Heights.

Larry Inserra died last spring. He was 76.

Mr. Inserra expanded his family's produce business into one of northern New Jersey's largest supermarket chains.

Inserra was the owner and chairman of Inserra Supermarket Corporation in Mahwah, which operates 22 ShopRite supermarkets in the area.

Through his company, he

gave to many organizations in the Hasbrouck Heights area.

"He was just a wonderful man," Larry Inserra Jr. said. "It made him happy to make other people happy." Larry Inserra Jr. now heads the company. ###

Leisure Club Update

May is Older Americans Month, Mother's Day, Memorial Day and the Annual Senior Soiree sponsored by the High School Key Club.

Older Americans Month was established in 1963. President John F. Kennedy's meeting with the National Council of Senior Citizens served as a prelude to designating May as "Senior Citizens Month." In 1980, President Jimmy Carter had the name changed from "Senior Citizens Month" to "Older Americans Month."

Every President since JFK has issued a formal proclamation asking that the entire nation pay tribute in some way to older persons in their communities. In this way, these citizens will be acknowledged for their contributions to our nation. This year's theme for Older Americans Month is, "Choices for Independence."

Mayor Ronald R. Jones and the members of the council have issued a proclamation which acknowledges May 2006 as Older Americans Month, a time when we commend and recognize the older citizens of Hasbrouck Heights both present and past for their countless contributions to our Borough, State and Nation.

In the United States, Mother's Day was first suggested in 1872 by Julia Howe as a day dedicated to peace. Mrs. Howe *(who wrote the words to the Battle Hymn of the Republic)* would hold organized Mother's Day meetings in Boston every year.

In 1907, Anna Jarvis, a resident of Philadelphia, began a campaign to establish a national Mother's Day. Ms. Jarvis and her supporters began to write to ministers, businessmen and politicians to establish a national Mother's Day. By 1911 Mother's Day was celebrated in almost every state. In 1914, President Woodrow Wilson made a formal announcement proclaiming Mother's Day as a national holiday that was to be held each year on the 2nd Sunday in May.

Memorial Day is a time to remember the men and women who lost their lives serving their country. Originally known as Decoration Day, it was established in 1868 to commemorate the dead from the Civil War. It is celebrated on the last Monday in May. Flowers and flags are placed on graves of soldiers.

We all remember hearing the playing of "Taps" at the Annual Memorial Day services. This bugle call was written during the Civil War in 1862. The tune came to Brigade Commander Colonel Daniel Butterfield while reflecting sadly on the large number of Union casualties and losses. He hummed it to his aide who wrote it down. It was performed that evening by his bugler in honor of fallen comrades. In 1874 it became officially recognized by the U.S. Army as an alternative to "Lights Out."

This year's Annual Senior Soiree will be held on Saturday, May 13th at the Senior Center. The Key Club will provide the refreshments and the entertainment. All seniors are welcomed but they must sign up at the Senior Center by May 4th so that an accurate number of supplies can be purchased. Doors will open at 11:30 a.m. No one will be admitted prior to that time. The Soiree will be from 11:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. ###

AHOF 2006 Annual Induction Dinner



NJ's Greg Olsen Will Be Speaker

The keynote speaker at the New Jersey Aviation Hall of Fame 33rd Annual Induction Dinner on May 24th will be Greg Olsen.

Mr. Olsen was the New Jersey scientist who paid \$20 million to ride into space and was the third private citizen to orbit the earth on the International Space Station (ISS).

After training for five months (900 hours) at the Yuri Gagarin Cosmonaut Training Center in Moscow, he launched on a Russian Soyuz rocket TMA-7 on October 1, 2005, docked to the ISS on October 3rd and returned to Earth on October 11th on the Soyuz TMA-6.

Mr. Olsen flew up with Cosmonaut Valeri Tokarev and Astronaut Bill McArthur.

Greg performed over 160 orbits and logged almost 4 million miles of weightless travel during his 10 days in space.

Greg received a BS in Physics (1966), a BSEE and MS in Physics (1968) from Fairleigh Dickinson University, then was awarded a Ph.D in Materials Science from the University of Virginia (1971).

He performed post-doctoral studies at the University of Port Elizabeth (South Africa), taught elementary physics classes and worked as a research scientist at RCA Labs (Sarnoff Center) from 1972 to 1983.

He developed vapor phase epitaxial crystal growth of optoelectronic devices, including laser diodes and photodectors for fiber optic applications based on the material idium gallium arsenide (InGaAs).

Mr. Olsen was awarded 12 patents, wrote over 100 technical papers, co-authored several book chapters and gives numerous invited lectures to both technical and trade journal audiences.

Greg is an IEEE LEOS

IEEE Aron Kressel Award.

Mr. Olsen founded EPI-TAXX, a fiber-optic detector manufacturer in 1984 with Vladimir Ban and sold it in 1990 for \$12 million.

He then founded Sensors Unlimited, a near-infrared camera manufacturer in 1992 with Marshall Cohen. Sensors was sold to Finisar Corp. for \$600 million in 2000, repurchased by the management team in 2002 for \$6 million, then sold again to Goodrich Corp. in 2005 for \$60 million.

After an illustrious career as a research scientist and entrepreneur, Mr. Olsen is now president of GHO Ventures in Princeton, NJ where he manages his "angel" investments.

He performs numerous speaking engagements to encourage children -- especially minorities and females -- to consider careers in science and engineering.

He is active in the New Jersey Technology Counsel and the NJ Commission on Science and Technology.

Greg is active in many civic organizations including Trenton Big Brothers and Sisters, Trenton Boys and Girls Club, Trenton Soup Kitchen, Princeton Historical Society and Custer Battlefield Preservation Committee.

In his spare time he enjoys golf, country and western music and dancing, opera and horseback riding.

Stormwater Pollution

Stormwater pollution is of storm drains one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water.

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in.

By sharing the responsiblity and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater.

Here are some easy things you can do every day to protect our water:

• Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides

• Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer

• Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted

· Look into alternatives for pesticides

· Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property or yard in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that requires little or no fertilizer

· If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to correctly apply it

 Make sure you properly store or discard any unused portions

• Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local waterbodies and the water is not treated

• Never discard pet waste in a storm drain. Use newspaper, bags or pooper-scoopers to pick up wastes. Dispose of the wrapped pet waste in the trash

• Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost

• Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn

When that happens, the bears must be destroyed to protect your family and neighbors. What's more, it's illegal to feed bears in New Jersey.

Anyone who feeds bears could face a penalty of up to \$1,000 for each offense.

Be Bear Aware

After hiking, fishing, camping or picnics, clean outdoor grills thoroughly after each use. Grease and food residue will attract bears. Do not place meat or any sweet foods in compost piles. Immediately after feeding pets, remove all uneaten food and scraps as well as food bowls. Put your garbage in bear-resistant containers.

American Legion James B. Scarr Post 106

Part Eleven of a series about our American Legion.

The Memorial Stone Dedicated May 30, 1919

The following is an excerpt from the Hasbrouck Heights Fiftieth Anniversary Journal, pages 21 through 23, written and designed by William R. Oelkers, Jr., 1944

Armistice Day, November 11, 1918, was a day of great celebration throughout the nation, and Hasbrouck Heights joined enthusiastically.

An impromptu parade was hastily organized, marching noisily up and down the streets of the town. People gathered in small and large groups and far into the night they joyously celebrated the end of hostilities.

In the minds of many that night ran the sobering thought that there would be twelve Hasbrouck Heights sons who would not return, and that there should be some fitting memorial to them as well as to the others who had served their country.

Thus was born, in the midst of celebration, the idea of Memorial Park and the Memorial Monument.

Within two months the Mayor and Council had purchased and taken title to that small triangular plot of land between the old and the recently straightened Terrace Avenue, from Henry Street to Passaic Avenue.

Following weeks of almost continuous session for the Council, the most memorable meeting was "the all-night session of April 15th" when the list of names to be placed on the monument was completed.

At the same meeting the inscription for the monument was adopted: "Dedicated May 30th, 1919, by the Borough of Hasbrouck Heights to her sons who served in the World

With much difficulty it was finally hauled to Hasbrouck Heights that night.

There was another major obstacle to hurdle. The contractors refused to set up the stone.

Citizens came to the rescue, and with the assistance of members of the Council they worked all night. Half an hour before the dedicatory services began all was in readiness.

Thus the first Decoration Day service in Memorial Park occurred -- nor has there ever been a lapse in these exercises in all the intervening years.

Mayor Webb and Councilman Edmund E. Field, Sr., were credited with being the prime movers in the Memorial Park and monument project, and records reveal that Hasbrouck Heights was one of the first towns in the State of New Jersey, if not the first, to erect and dedicate a permanent monument to its heroes of World War I.

In later years, twelve Norway maple trees, stretching the length of Memorial Park on the east side of Terrace Avenue, were dedicated to those who lost their lives in World War I, and in 1943 a temporary Honor Roll of the men and women again serving their country in war was dedicated.

The American Legion Begins

Following the organization of the national American Legion in the spring of 1919, some thirty veterans of World War I met at the Public Library hall on September 3, 1919, and formed a Hasbrouck Heights Post, naming it for Captain James B. Scarr, who made the supreme sacrifice for his country on June 6, 1918, at Chateau Thierry. Francis J. Scarr, Captain Scarr's brother, was elected first Commander of the Post. Other officers were M. M. Sheedy, vice-commander; E. E. Ellis, finance officer; A. E. Browne, adjutant; Henry G. Weimar, chaplain; and Frederick R. Coyle, historian.

Throughout the 25 years of its existence, a civic organization with its first thoughts for the betterment of Hasbrouck Heights and the war veterans, the American Legion Captain James B. Scarr Post 106, has adhered to the preamble of its national constitution: "For God and Country we associate ourselves together for the following purposes:

To uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States of America; to maintain law and order; to foster and perpetuate a one hundred per cent Americanism; to preserve the memories and incidents of our association in the Great War; to inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation; to combat the autocracy of both the classes and the masses; to make right the master of might; to promote peace and good will on earth; to safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy; to consecrate and sanctify our comradeship by our devotion to mutual helpfulness."

For a number of years the local Legion had headquarters in the old First Reformed Church, now the Young Peoples Hall of the church, and it was called Legion Hall.

With the prospect of one day welcoming returning veterans of the present global conflict, the Legion in 1943 took preliminary steps toward the establishment of a "Legion Hut" and community center in Hasbrouck Heights.

Those plans are daily taking on more concrete form, and early this year, with an eye toward the future and the increasingly important place the American Legion will hold in the community, the Mayor and Council leased a piece of Borough-owned property at the southwest corner of Boulevard and Henry Street to the Legion.

The Legion hopes, as soon as building materials again become available, to build a Legion home and community center on the site. James F. Tangney is the present Commander of the Post.

Garison and Turner C. Blaine.

Two years after the organization of the Legion, the American Legion Auxiliary came into being, and it, too, has fulfilled a civic role through the years, ever closely identified with all welfare and patriotic endeavors in the Borough, and never forgetting its principal objective: service to the disabled and needy veterans and their families. It has raised funds for this work in annual Poppy sales in town.

The Legion Auxiliary, as did the local Legion, took an active part in helping to make possible the Bergen Pines therapeutic pool for convalescents at the County institution.

One of its most recent activities has been the addressing of wrappers in which the local newspaper is sent without cost each week to members of the Armed Forces from Hasbrouck Heights.

Membership in the Auxiliary is limited to the mothers, wives, daughters, and sisters of all men and women in the Armed Forces during both World War I and World War II, who are members of the American Legion.

The first president of the Legion Auxiliary in 1921 was Mrs. Michael Sheedy. Mrs. Leland C. Benton is now president. Serving with her are Mrs. William Doonan, Mrs. Charles Wente, Mrs. Turner C. Blaine, Mrs. Minnie Bossert, Mrs. A. E. Browne, Mrs. B. Rogers and Mrs. Carl Therkildsen. ###

The following clips are from various Mayor and Council minutes from 1919, researched by Borough Clerk Rose Marie Sees, 2006

• Bids were opened for the construction and erection of a memorial monument. The Dymalkon Company bid \$2,100 for a monument F.O.B. New York.

Mr. Emile Lessieu asked permission to show a model of a monument which he said could be built for something like \$2,000.

• Resolved that the Council hereby awards to the Dymalkon Corporation contract for the construction, delivery and erection of a memorial monument, and that the Mayor is hereby empowered to sign contract with the Dymalkon Metals Corporation, provided said contract contemplates the countersinking of all plates and that the plates shall conform to the sketches already submitted, and further provided that the delivery and setting up of said monument in complete condition shall be not later than May 1st, 1919. The amount involved shall be a sum not exceeding \$2,150.00

 Resolved that this Council extend a formal invitation to the sculptor, Mr. J. Kilenyi, 20 East 90th Street, New York, to attend as guest of the Borough the unveiling of the memorial tablet the front panel of which was modeled by him.

• (Councilman) Mr. Field asked that bills be forwarded to the Council for work on Memorial Park, requesting those of John Norsk and Borough Engineer Thomas F. Bowe. The latter stated that he was very glad indeed of the opportunity to do something in connection with the Memorial Park and that his services in connection therewith were cheerfully donated. (Councilman) Mr. Behrens arose and moved that the Borough Council tender a vote of thanks to Borough Engineer Bowe for the donating of his services. ###

CROCAMO PAINTING & GUTTER SERVICE

The many details necessary to complete such a project in so short a time -- from the grading of the park to the purchase of a granite stone, tablet, flagpole and ornamental lights -- involved a vast amount of work.

All went well, however, until the afternoon before Memorial Day of 1919, when the monument was to be dedicated.

Then it was discovered that the monument had been lost somewhere on the way from the quarries in Vermont to New York.

The stone was found in a freight vard near Mt. Vernon, N.Y., and a special locomotive hauled it to the terminal.

To the People of Our Borough

You are today invited to witness the unveiling of a Memorial Tablet, and the opening and dedication of Memorial Park. It is sincerely hoped that this Memorial erected to the memory of those boys contributed by our Borough to our nation in the greatest war in which the world has ever participated will meet with your entire approval. In order that you may have a better understanding of the Bronze Tablet on the front of the Memorial, we give you below an explanation by the sculptor, which we believe you will find of permanent interest.

The figure holding the laurel wreath over the dedication represents Liberty. The action of the figure is sentimental rather than he-

something noble and who in accomplishing it had to suffer and make sacrifices. As the sculptor expresses it, the American soldier and sailor were the children of Liberty. The young figure representing Liberty likewise represents the spiritual mother of the boys. The unselfish spirit with which the United States entered the War is symbolized on the Tablet by placing the American Emblem, of which but a part is visible behind the figure. Here Liberty does not represent America alone; she is here a symbol of liberty for the whole World through the American spirit. The tender position of the left hand is in harmony with the whole figure. The expression of the face is striking and it was the sculptor's intention that it should express happiness, satisfaction and love. We sincerely hope the people of our Borough will always have much pleasure and satisfaction from the use of this little Park, which is so peculiarly well adapted because of its beautiful location for public open-air celebrations, for this and all time to come. This year's Parade will be the 87th year that the American Legion Post 106 will have



commemorated Memorial Day at the Veterans' Memorial in Hasbrouck Heights.

This year the Grand Marshal of the parade will be Mr. Robert (Bob) Riker of Post 106

Bob enlisted in the Army in October of 1942 and, after basic and advanced training, was assigned to the 36th Signal Heavy Construction Battalion.

Their job was to closely follow the advancing Infantry and Armor and to construct and install the vital communication systems needed by our advancing troops.

The 36th landed in Normandy on D-Day plus 12 near to Ste. Mere Eglise, scene of heavy fighting at the start of the invasion, and followed the Infantry to St. Lo where they helped, after a fierce battle with the Germans, to free that city.

After that battle the 36th was attached to General George Patton's 3rd Army and continued to advance to Paris to assist in its liberation.

Then the 36th went, as a part of the 3rd Army, through northern France into Belgium and became involved in the Battle of the Bulge in the Ardennes Forest area.

After this battle the unit was assigned to the 15th Army and they then continued on into central Germany where they helped in freeing many American POWs held by the Germans.

As a result of these actions, Bob was awarded the European African Central European Campaign Medal with five bronze stars and the WWII Victory Medal as well as the Good Conduct Medal.

He returned to the United States and was discharged in December of 1945 when he, and a couple of million other veterans, gladly received their "Ruptured Duck" emblem from the government upon his discharge.

Bob happily resumed civilian life with his wife, the former Alice DeFeo, whom he had married in December of 1942.

They raised a family and have been happily married for almost sixty-five years. Bob has also been an usher and pillar of the First Reformed Church for many years.

Over time Bob has received a number of citations and medals for his service in WW II.

In 1990, the State of New York awarded him a Certificate of Recognition along with a medal for his service.

In 2001, a grateful French Government gave him, and many other veterans of Normandy, a Certificate of Thanks and a medal for their help in liberating France.

In 2003, in a ceremony at the Teaneck Armory, Bob and other WW II veterans were

presented with the New Jersey Meritorious Medal for their wartime service.

On Memorial Day 2005, the State of New Jersey and Bergen County, in a special ceremony held at Bergen County Community College in Paramus, honored Bob and other Normandy Veterans for their wartime service with the New Jersey Liberty Medal.

This year we too are honoring him for his many years of service to God and Country. ###



An historical note:

In a letter written about 1930 inviting Mayor Oldfield to be part of the Memorial Day Parade, the parade route was described thusly.

The Parade will start at 9:15 a.m. from Jefferson and the Boulevard and proceed south to Henry Street, then East to Terrace Avenue and the Monument.

After the ceremonies there are completed, the parade will continue south on Terrace into Wood-Ridge to their monument where another ceremony will be held.

In the Twenties, Thirties, and Forties the two towns apparently celebrated Memorial Day jointly. The line of march also included a large number of various groups including German Veterans. ###

Going Out

One thing we must not forget: we cannot give what we don't have. As witnesses our first task is to allow the Holy Spirit to empower our lives.

This does not happen automatically. We need a certain discipline if we are going to grow closer to the Lord Jesus.

Scripture reading, prayer, quiet, living in love with others, taking part in the life of a faith community – all of this requires a definite commitment on our part – a lot of decisions have to be made if we are going to really work out our own faith life.

In nature, it seems that things just happen. Trees put forth new shoots and flowers give us new blossoms, grass grows and shrubs give us their greenery.

But none of this happens automatically. It takes just the right combination of sun and shade, rain and dryness, the right kind of soil, and so forth.

With the Ascension, the body of Jesus Christ was taken to heaven, but we, his believIt means walking into the lonely prison of a homebound neighbor and taking her on a rare outing.

It means not calling attention to ourselves but quietly doing an honest day's work and refusing to participate in workplace gossip or crooked practices.

It means speaking up for the poor, the unborn, and the victimized. It means pouring ourselves out for the materially, emotionally, and spiritually poor.

And finally, it means not expecting to see the final results of our labors but working patiently and waiting upon the Lord's own time.
