

On April 1, 2010, Bergen County Executive Dennis McNerney, Bergen County Sheriff Leo P. McGuire, Captain Uwe Malakas of the Bergen County Police Department and representatives of the Bergen County Prosecutor's Office, held a press conference at the Bergen County Court House to raise awareness of the new Pedestrian Traffic Law.

\$200 Fine + 2 Points

April 1, 2010, requires drivers to come to a complete stop and remain stopped as soon as a pedestrian enters a crosswalk.

Prior to this legislative change, drivers were only mandated to yield, an ambiguous direction authorities say led to one of the highest rates of pedestrian fatalities in the nation.

Motorists violating the new law face a \$200 fine (double the current fine), plus court costs, and 2 points on their license. They can also be subject to 15 days of community service and insurance surcharges.

In addition, if a motorist

A revised law, effective hits a pedestrian, the burden of proof as to blame falls squarely on the driver. Previously, there was no legal standard.

> Pedestrians may also be cited under state law for failing to use due care when crossing.

The law requires them to obey pedestrian signals and use crosswalks at signalized intersections as well as yield the right of way to traffic if they are not crossing within a crosswalk or at an intersection. Failure to comply with the law carries a \$54 fine, plus court costs.

The changes are designed to lower the number of pedestrian deaths, which account

for more than 25 percent of all traffic fatalities in New Jersey.

Since 2004, about 150 pedestrians have been killed each year on New Jersey streets. The number spiked to 159 last year after a three-year decline, according to the state Division of Highway Traffic Safety.

The Legislature approved the measure during its lame duck session in January. Then-Gov. Jon Corzine signed it into law before leaving office. ###



5 Tips for First-time Home Buyers

Buying a home can be two recent paystubs, the previthrilling and nerve-racking at the same time, especially for a first-time homebuyer. It's difficult to know exactly what to expect.

The learning curve can be steep, but most of the issues can be resolved by doing a little financial homework. Take these five steps to help make the process go more smoothly.

Check your credit

The credit score of the buyer may be the most important factor when it comes to qualifying for a loan these days.

To get a sense of where your credit stands, go to AnnualCreditReport.com to get your free credit report from each of the three credit bureaus.

Scour the reports for mistakes, unpaid accounts or collection accounts. Repairing damaged credit takes time and money if you owe more than lenders would prefer to see relative to your income.

Remember to begin this process at least six months before shopping for a home.

Evaluate assets and liabilities

So you don't owe too much money and your payments are up to date. But how do you spend your money? Do you have piles of money left over every month or are you on a shoestring budget? A first-time homebuyer should have a good idea of what is owed and what is coming in.

Additionally, buyers should have an idea of how lenders will view their income, and that requires becoming familiar with the basics of mortgage lending. Concisely, how you receive and report income as well as how you write off expenses can make a difference to lenders.

Organize documents

The documents homebuyers must produce to be considered for a home mortgage are those which authenticate their income and taxes. Typically, mortgage lenders will request

ous two years' W-2s, tax returns and the last two months of bank statements -- every page, even the blank ones.

Qualify yourself

Ideally, first-time homebuyers would know how much they can afford to spend before the mortgage lender tells them how much they qualify for.

By calculating their debtto-income ratio and factoring in a down payment, buyers should have a good idea of what they can afford to invest, both upfront and on a monthly basis, when it comes to their home.

Though there's not a fixed debt-to-income ratio that lenders require, the old standard dictates that no more than 28 percent of your gross monthly income be devoted to housing costs, called the front-end ratio.

Including all debts with housing costs is the back-end ratio, and lenders prefer this to be under 41 percent.

Figure out your down payment

Scraping up that initial down payment takes some effort. Though FHA loans require a less substantial down payment than conventional loans, it can still be a huge chunk of money for a young person or couple.

Some borrowers working with a state housing finance agency can use the tax credit for a down payment.

However, not all state agencies are offering interest-free or low interest loans to be paid back with the tax credit funds. Other programs can assist buyers with qualifying incomes and situations.

Speak with mortgage lenders when you're starting the process. Check with friends, co-workers and neighbors to find out which lenders they worked with and ask them questions about the process and what other steps first-time homebuyers should take. ###

Eileen Keller started her


career at the school as food services manager in 1971, when the school's new cafeteria and gymnasium were built.


Eileen is fondly remembered by teachers and generations of RLC graduates as the cheerful lunch lady who handed out as many smiles as sandwiches.
























Hasbrouck Heights





Obama's Health Care Reform and What It **Means For Seniors**

On March 23, 2010, President Obama's Health Care Reform Bill was passed and signed into law. The estimated cost of the plan will be \$940 billion dollars over ten years. And would extend insurance to 32 million uninsured Americans. Insurance companies will no longer be allowed to deny coverage to individuals with preexisting health conditions and also won't be allowed to drop coverage either. The benefit of this plan for all Americans is that premiums and out of pocket costs will be reduced. In addition, we will have the

peace of mind knowing that if you lose your job, or start a new business, there is always the option to purchase quality affordable health insurance.

Seniors and Medicare beneficiaries will also benefit from this reform. Annual wellness exams and prevention screenings such as colonoscopies and mammograms will be free. Prescription drug spending will also be reduced. Seniors who fall into the coverage gap or "doughnut hole" for Medicare Part "D" coverage will see a rebate of \$250 by 2010. By 2011, they will also see a 50% discount on brand name drugs while in this coverage gap.

The new law also supports long term home care services

So, in closing, the Health Care Reform Bill may actually be a piece of legislature that could make a difference in the lives of seniors. Only time will tell just what impact this will have on us as well as our children's children.

Mosquito Season is Abuzz

Standing water means you could be raising mosquitoes!

Many generations of mosquitoes can breed right in your own yard. All mosquitoes need water to complete their life cycle. Mosquitoes also are not known to travel long distances from their water source.

Some mosquitoes lay their eggs in standing water where they hatch in just a day or two. They can do this in water that has been standing for as little as four days.

Other mosquitoes may lay their eggs in old tires, tin cans, or other water-holding containers including bird baths, wading and small swimming pools, ornamental ponds, clogged gutters, flowerpots or the drip plates beneath them, cups, glasses, drink cans, etc.

The eggs may remain unhatched for weeks or even months until they are covered with water!

Yard and home checklist:

- Get rid of old tires, tin cans, buckets, drums, bottles, or any water holding containers
- Fill in or drain any low places (puddles, ruts) in yard
- Keep drains, ditches, and culverts clean of weeds and trash so water will drain properly
- Cover trash containers to keep out rain water

- Repair leaky pipes and outdoor faucets
- Empty plastic wading pool at least once a week and store it indoors when not in use
- Make sure your backyard pool is properly cared for while on vacation
- Fill in tree rot holes and hollow stumps that hold water with sand or concrete
- Change the water in bird baths and plant pots or drip trays at least once a week
- Keep grass cut short and shrubbery well trimmed around the house so adult mosquitoes will not hide there
- Keep gutters clean and free of debris and leaves.
- · Store boats covered or upside down.

Protect yourself from mosquito bites

- If possible, avoid being outdoors in the early morning or in the evening.
- If you must go out, wear long-sleeved shirts, long pants and socks.
- The EPA and CDC advise the use of a mosquito repellant, following the instructions on the label.
- Check with your pediatrician before using a repellant on children.
- Keep windows and doors closed or covered with screens to prevent mosquitoes from entering the house.
- Repair screens on windows, doors, porches, and patios.
- Some mosquito control methods do not do a very good job. For example, bug zappers do not work well to control biting mosquitos since they do not emit carbon dioxide.
- Various birds and bats will eat mosquitos, but there is little evidence that this cuts down on the number of mosquitos around homes.
- Electronic mosquito repelling devices don't stop mosquitos biting people either. ###







The New Jersey Aviation Hall of Fame was founded in 1972 and was the first state aviation hall of fame in the nation. Its goal is the preservation of the Garden State's 217 years of aviation and space heritage.

The Aviation Hall of Fame & Museum of New Jersey is located at Teterboro Airport. It is open Tuesday through Sunday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. ###



Aline Rhonie

Aline Rhonie was raised in Warren Township. By the time she was 20 years old Rhonie had already learned to fly gliders, seaplanes and multi-engine aircraft.

In 1930 she earned her pilot's license. In 1933 Rhonie co-founded Luscombe Airplane Company. The follow-

The New Jersey Aviation ing year she became the first woman to fly solo from New York to Mexico City. In 1936, she was licensed to fly in England and, in 1938 became the first American to ever obtain an Irish commercial license.

With war clouds gathering in 1939 Rhonie joined the Women's Voluntary Service in England where she soon became Chair of the Aviation Committee for the British War Relief Society. During 1940, she flew solo across the U.S. raising funds for European war relief.

After America's entry into World War II, Rhonie became the fourth woman to join the Women's Auxiliary Flying Squadron (W.A.F.S.) and flew for both Nancy Love's "Originals" and Pauline Gower's ATA.

After the war she served as President and Chairman of the Board of Allison Radar Corporation and, in 1949, won the Republique Française Medaille de la Reconnaissance Française for her war work supporting the French Republic.

She became a member of the pioneer woman pilot's organization, "The 99's."

Rhonie was also an aviation artist during the late 1940s and is perhaps best known as the creator of a large fresco mural for a hangar at Roosevelt Field entitled, "Early Birds 1908-1916."

This 1,400-square foot masterpiece, which took four years to complete, depicts aircraft and personalities from this golden era in world avia-



William "Bill" DeCota

A resident of Old Bridge, DeCota started his career outside of aviation. He taught graduate-level accounting and finance and later became a business analyst for the Wall Street firm of Dun & Brad-

In 1982, he went to work for the Port Authority of NY and NJ as a financial analyst and then began a stellar career in aviation.

After serving in a number of increasingly important managerial positions during the 1990s, learning the ins and outs of airport management and development, DeCota was appointed Director of Aviation for the Port in December 1999.

He soon began the visualization and execution of what has been called "the largest airport improvement program in our nation's history" involving the overhaul of Newark, Kennedy and LaGuardia.

Among his accomplishments were new state of the art terminals, parking facilities, upgraded roads and the "Air Train" at Newark and JFK.

In 2007, DeCota was at the center of the acquisition of Stewart International Airport for re-development into what will ultimately become the fourth major air transportation center in the New York metro

DeCota's influence went well beyond this region as well. He was a vocal national both airports and airlines. He also worked to advance new air traffic control technologies like the FAA's "NextGen" system which is designed to greatly aid in the reduction of chronic flight delays.

His platform for advancing commercial aviation included important posts in organizations such as the American Association of Airport Executives (A.A.A.E.) and the Airports Council International (A.C.I.).

Mark L. Polansky

Born in Paterson, NJ, Mark Polansky considers Edison to be his hometown. A Purdue University graduate, he received a Bachelor of Science degree in aeronautical and astronautical engineering and a Master of Science degree in aeronautics and astronautics, both in 1978!

Upon graduation, he was immediately awarded a United States Air Force commission. Polansky earned his Air Force wings in 1980 and went on to fly F-15s out of Langley AFB, Virginia for three years.

In 1983, he was chosen for the Aggressor Squadron where he taught pilots how to defeat enemy aircraft tactics flying F-5E's based at Nellis AFB in Nevada and Clark Air Base in the Philippines. In 1986, he went to the USAF Test Pilot School at Edwards AFB. After graduating, he test flew F-15, F-15E and A-10 aircraft at Eglin AFB, Florida.

In 1992, Polansky left active duty to join NASA and after a few years of working as an aerospace engineer and research pilot, he was selected as an astronaut candidate in 1996.

During the next five years advocate of initiatives to benefit he served as chief of the CAP-COM Branch, Chief Instructor Astronaut and Chief of the Return to Flight and Orbiter Repair Branches after the Columbia disaster.

> In February of 2001, Polansky was launched into space aboard the Space Shuttle Atlantis, as pilot on STS-98, a mission to deliver the U.S. laboratory "Destiny" to the International Space Station

> By 2006, he was named Commander of the STS-116 mission of Space Shuttle Discovery, which continued construction of the I.S.S.

Polansky has logged over 5,000 flight hours in over 30 different aircraft and 618 hours in space.



Mitchell J. (Mike) **Stoddard**

A long time NJ resident, Stoddard's passion for aviation began in the 1920s watching biplanes flying the early air mail routes pass over his childhood home. By 1936 he was taking flying lessons out of Floyd Bennett field. While working at the airport to pay for his lessons, Stoddard befriended a number of the "old time Flying Circus Flyers," Duke Krantz and Andy Stinis among them.

His first connection with the Garden State came about when the Army Air Corps sent him to "Propeller School" at the Curtiss-Wright facility in Caldwell during World War II.

In 1944, Stoddard saw action in the Pacific during the Okinawa campaign flying the L-5 aircraft.

He was also involved in the development of the "Brody System" which used a ship's crane to launch and recover small aircraft.

At war's end, Stoddard went back into civilian aviation starting an airline based at Teterboro, and later operating a flight school and charter service. During this time he joined Princeton's Aeronautical Engineering Department and taught flight-test procedures.

He left NJ in 1952 to pursue a successful career as a journalist, which included an award winning aviation article

After returning to the Garden State, Stoddard served as President of four aviation advocacy organizations and as a trustee of the NJ Aviation Hall of Fame. He was long time Editor of New Jersey Aviation

Stoddard also organized five traveling aviation history exhibits and directed several state aviation conferences addressing NJ aviation problems and solutions.

Throughout his career Stoddard has been one of the strongest advocates for NJ aviation in recent memory.







Is Your Child Safe?

On April 10, 2010, Kundert ducted by Lt. Thomas Archer and Patrolman Ian Robertson who were generous in offering parents safety tips.

> Tips included installation of a child seat, safest in the back seat, because of the airbag. Every installation is customized to the vehicle and

seat specifications. They noted that the 5 point harness with retaining clip should be at the child's breast plate and not the stomach. Parents should check the manufacturer's web-site for recalls.

All area police departments provide this child safety seat inspection free at their respective headquarters.

Many parents are unaware they are using the safety restraint incorrectly (or not at all), thereby placing their child at risk.

The purpose of child safety seats is to reduce the number of child passengers killed or injured in motor vehicle crashes. Many of these injuries and deaths can be avoided with the correct use of child safety seats and safety belts.

The seats function by absorbing and safely distributing crash impact loads over the child's body while holding the child in place and preventing contact with the vehicle's interior components or ejection from the vehicle.

What You Can Do To Make Your Child Safer In The Car

Seat all children ages 12 years old and younger in the back seat and be sure they are properly restrained every time they ride in a motor vehicleeven during those quick trips to the corner market.

Read both the car seat instruction manual and your vehicle owner's manual to make sure you are properly installing and using the seat.

Send in your car seat registration card so that the manufacturer can contact you about any recalls. You can also call the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration Auto Safety Hotline, (888) 327-4236, to find out about recalls.

When choosing a child safety seat, it is important to find one that is age and size appropriate and fits in your car.

Children should start using a booster seat when they grow out of their child safety seats (usually when they weigh about 40 pounds). They should continue to ride in a booster seat until the lap/shoulder belts in the car fit properly, typically when they are 4'9" tall.

Children require a lap and shoulder belt combination when riding in a vehicle. Beltpositioning booster seats raise children up so that this belt combination fits correctly.

Booster seats have been shown to reduce injury risk by 59% compared to safety belts alone, for children ages 4 to 7 years.

"The easiest thing parents can do to keep their small children safe in a vehicle is to make sure they're buckled in a properly installed child safety seat," said Administrator Nicole R. Nason of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA).

NHTSA research shows that approximately 7,000 lives have been saved by the proper use of child restraints during the past 20 years.

"Buckling your child in a properly installed car seat or booster seat can be a struggle for even the most experienced parent," said Nason. "These seat check inspection stations are an invaluable service to caregivers to learn the proper steps and instill confidence that their child is as safe as they can be in the car."

As of September 1, 2002, two rear seating positions of all cars, minivans and light trucks will come equipped with lower child safety seat anchorage points located between a vehicle's seat cushion and seat

Also, all child safety seats will have two attachments which will connect to the vehicle's lower anchorage attachment points.

Together, the lower anchors and upper tethers make up the LATCH system. Source: NHTSA ###

300 Enjoyed "The Saint Joseph Table"









The Saint Joseph Society of Lodi hosted "The Saint Joseph Table" on Saturday, March 20, 2010, at 7 p.m., in the school gym. About 300 attended.

A tableau honoring St. Joseph filled the stage, which also included the main "Sharing Table."

As people entered, they placed their food on the sharing table. Rev. Michael Marotta, C.R.M., Pastor, blessed the food. There was DJ entertainment during the evening.

This "St. Joseph Table" takes place on or about the actual Day of Saint Joseph, March 19th.

Because this holiday often falls during Lent, the dishes are all meatless.

Sixty-five pounds of "St. Joseph's Pasta," which is a spaghetti with a meatless red sauce, was prepared in the school kitchen.

Some of the traditional foods that make up the celebration are the "Saint Joseph Pasta" (buccatini-long pasta, sardines, toasted bread crumbs, fennel, in a red sauce), St. Joseph's Day Cream Puffs (Sfinge di San Giuseppe – an Italian pastry, a large cream puff traditionally filled with ricotta), and many different Italian breads (Pane di San Giuseppe).

Antipasto dishes, mozzarella, roasted peppers, olives and cheese were also served.

In addition to the traditional foods, many people bake

or cook something to bring for what is known as the "Sharing Table" at many "Saint Joseph Tables."

"It's a time of getting together, kind of like Thanksgiving," said Antonino Pollaro, President of the St. Joseph Society in Lodi. Mr. Pollaro elaborated by

giving a brief history of the "Tavolata di San Giuseppe" ("Saint Joseph Table").

The "Saint Joseph Table" was founded in Sicily during the Middle Ages.

History tells us that Sicily had been in severe drought for an extended period of time. No crops grew and countless people died of famine.

The peasants prayed to Saint Joseph to intercede with God on their behalf to bring much needed rain to the island. Their promise in return was to have a special feast honoring Saint Joseph.

By miracle, the rains came and the peasants were able to plant their crops.

With the harvest, the people prepared a feast of foods from their crops which has become known as the "Tavolata di San Giuseppe" ("The Saint Joseph Table").

The Saint Joseph Society of Lodi began holding this event when it was founded in 1915 and celebrated "The Saint Joseph Table" for decades, but the tradition declined during the 1970s due to declining membership in The Society. Today, the Society has 28





members.

This event was reinstituted in the 1980's by Josephine Smiraldi. This is the third consecutive year that the Society has again run this event.

The money raised helps the Society with annual charitable contributions to Parish's Food Pantry, St. Joseph School for the Blind and, most recently, the Haiti Earthquake Relief.

In keeping with tradition, the Society also handed out bread in honor of Saint Joseph to all parishioners on March 19, 20, and 21, 2010, after each Mass at St. Joseph's Church.


