



#### Maestro Explains the Evolution of The Broadway Musical



Autism impairs a person's ability to communicate and socially relate and interact with others. Statistics reveal that one in 110 individuals is diagnosed with autism; making it more common than pediatric cancer, diabetes, and AIDS combined. In New Jersey, one in 60 boys is diagnosed with autism.

This film profiles the career of former Hasbrouck Heights resident Clarence Chamberlin, who was based out of Teterboro Airport.

After being cheated out of the chance to claim the Raymond Orteig -- \$25,000 prize for the first nonstop aircraft flight between New York and Paris, Chamberlin was the first pilot to carry a passenger across the Atlantic in a fixed wing aircraft.

Chamberlin took off June 4, 1927, from New York, landing in Germany two days later, breaking the distance record set two weeks earlier by Charles Lindbergh (3,911 miles in 42 hours and 31 minutes).

Producer Bill Tooma, stated, "I made this documentary because history can be forgetful. Everyone remembers number one, in this case, Lindbergh, but forget the other guy. By making this film, Chamberlin, the forgotten hero of aviation, can be rediscovered by a new generation."

### **Wesmont Station Resumes**



The Wesmont vision began over nine years ago and despite environmental and economic obstacles, the \$400 million housing and commercial development project re-started in earnest in 2010 with "sitework" construction, and, in 2011, with the start of vertical construction.

Commemorating this achievement, Somerset Development, master developer of Wesmont Station, and Avalon at Wesmont officials were joined by NJ Transit and elected officials at a "shovels in the ground" ceremony on March 23, 2011.

The initial phase includes four buildings of at least four stories with a total of 406 one, two and three bedroom apartments, with an array of first-class amenities including a fully equipped clubhouse, state-of-the-art fitness center, outdoor pool, a five-story parking garage, etc.

There will be 27,000 sq. ft. of retail space on the first floors of the initial buildings. (See drawing above -- the perimeter of the parking area.)

Occupancy is expected to begin during the second quarter of 2012.

Mayor Sarlo said, "Redeveloping this former industrial site has been an intractable problem for many years, and I am particularly pleased to have put a shovel in the ground today, marking a new beginning for this neighborhood.

Large-scale development, especially of a former industrial area, in this economy is not an easy endeavor. To get to this point, we had to work together constructively, involve the community at every level, and stay focused on the ultimate goal.

We made sure that we had the participation of hundreds of residents, who attended our community design workshop sessions, and the tangible result of that process starts today with Avalon at Wesmont Station."

The entire site has been environmentally remediated. The majority of the site has been issued a "no further action (NFA) letter from the NJ DEP.

A small portion, which used to be a landfill for a factory, is currently undergoing DEP soil tests; but does not impact the project. The area affected is a later part of the project.

The "site work" began in September 2010 to prepare for vertical development. This included earth work, building roads, installing water, storm and sanitary sewers and other utilities necessary for Phase I.

With the site work completed, Avalon Bay Communities began construction with the entrance on Passaic Street.

The train station is a separate project to be done by NJ Transit. Somerset Development has a contract to construct a new train station within walking distance of the development. New Jersey Transit has approved the train station which is currently being designed and slated for construction in 2011. The goal is for both the residential/retail structures and the train station to be completed in 2012.

Despite the delay in construction, Wesmont has made all the required tax and fee payments to the Borough and has fulfilled all its obligations to the Borough such as financing the renovation of the Donna Ricker Memorial Field. ###


















This is the 4th major invitational championship meet to be held at Depken Field since the new facilities were installed. (The event used to be called the Twin-Borough Relays.)

#### A Few Good Reasons to **Start Thinking Bullish About Housing**

Four years into the housing downturn, people still seem bearish on real estate. But doom and gloom isn't always terminal; despite a lot of yet formidable challenges, there are plenty of signs for us to feel encouraged and hopeful about real estate today.

**3. Foreclosures.** Frankly, I'm getting tired of people claiming that an impending tsunami of distressed real estate is going to torpedo home prices.

People making that case should really ask themselves if they truly have any idea what they're talking about.

Banks are rational actors, and as much as Bank of America, JP Morgan, Citigroup, Wells Fargo and the rest are demonized, they rarely willfully destroy the value of their own assets.

Which is exactly what flooding the market with bankowned properties would do. It will, no doubt, take years to work through this "shadow"

inventory, but there will be -I'm certain - no flood.

## Pharmacist Corner

#### Osteoporosis— Are you at risk?

Osteoporosis, which actually means porous bones, has many factors that may put you at risk of suffering a fracture without you even knowing it. There are factors that you can't change and others that you can, so that you don't become a statistic.

First, the factors that you have no control over would be your gender, age, body size (this is referring to your frame), ethnic background, and of course, your family history. Tobacco use, excessive alcohol intake, sedentary lifestyle (here's your cue to get moving!), low calcium intake starting at a young age, and certain medications are the factors that we do have control over. Let's start with looking at how bone is maintained throughout our lives.

Bone growth occurs, of course, during childhood and adolescence. During these early years, a proper amount of calcium, Vitamin D, and other nutrients are necessary for reaching something called optimal bone mass. Think about it, you wouldn't build a house on empty boxes but instead choose strong, solid pieces of lumber.

When you are young, your body makes bone faster than it breaks it down, so your bone mass is constantly changing for the better. Your peak in bone mass is reached at age 30. At this age, you lose slightly more than you make. So you can see that your early years until age 30 is your time to store up that bone mass so the chance of

So getting back to the factors we can control, let's see what we can do about them.

developing osteoporosis is less.

Tobacco use is pretty obvious and also not easy to stop. There are many different ways to stop smoking. Ask your doctor which one would be the safest and most successful for you.

It is believed that excessive alcohol intake can lead to osteoporosis due to the body being unable to absorb calcium.

Here's your reminder of the values of exercise. Exercises that include walking, jumping, running, dancing, and weightlifting seem to be the most helpful in making bones healthy.

Calcium throughout your lifetime seems to be the key to good bone density. You can have bones, but if they aren't packed with bone mass in order to withstand bone loss due to age or stress, it can result in

Secrets to a Long and Healthy Life

What are the secrets to a stables will increase the fiber

What are the secrets to a long and healthy life? An attempt to answer that question, was made by Pharmacist Justin Di Pisa at the meeting of Central Bergen Chapter 418, AARP held on April 8, 2011.

Mr. DiPisa stressed that we must watch what we eat and what we drink.

He stressed that we should eat breakfast like a king, lunch like a prince and dinner like a pauper. He said breakfast should be the most important meal of the day. Eating five to six servings of fruits and vegetables a day, decreasing the amount of animal fat you eat, and controlling the amount of food you eat can have a positive effect on your health status. Eating more fruits and veg-

etables will increase the fiber in your diet. Fiber is a natural way to prevent overeating.

Mr. DiPisa also discussed the importance of exercise, the need to add more fish and chicken to your diet, getting enough sleep and watching your weight. If you are overweight you are at an increased risk for diabetes, high blood pressure, heart disease and stroke. To help you lose weight cut out cake, cookies, bread and pasta.

Mr. DiPisa's final recommendation was to practice good dental hygiene. Flossing your teeth every day could add years to your life.

fractures.

As far as medications go, long term corticosteroid use, these include prednisone, dexamethasone, and cortisone, is damaging to bones. Some other medicines include those used to treat breast cancer, anti-depressants called the SSRI's, methotrexate, some anti-seizure medications, proton pump inhibitors used to control stomach acid, and aluminum containing antacids have been associated with an increased risk of developing osteoporosis.

So what should you do? Lifestyle changes that include a change in diet, increased exercise, good posture, and talking with your doctor are a good start. There are medications, along with calcium and Vitamin D supplements, that can help slow bone loss and maintain bone mass. There are oral medications that you may have seen on television. These have proven to be very helpful but they must be used with caution in people who have

had past history of stomach problems.

Also, there is a daily nasal spray that is just one spray in one side of the nose once a day -- alternating nostrils each day. There are also daily self-injections as well as ones that have to be administered by your physician every 6 months and even one just once a year!

During the month of May, we will have available at BeJay Drugs, a packet of information that includes a list of medications available for osteoporosis, calcium and Vitamin D recommendations for different age groups, questions you should

ask your doctor about your risks of developing osteoporosis, exercises to improve bone strength, and some safety tips to prevent falls that could result in fractures.

So be aware of your history, increase that bone mass, and stand up straight! Be prepared against the perils of osteoporosis and don't become a statistic!

# Filling You In

#### **Oral Health** and Pregnancy

It's no secret that pregnancy is an important time in a woman's life. While women often hear about how pregnancy causes physical changes that affect their hormones or appetite levels, these changes can have a great effect on their oral health as well.

Despite the fact that good oral health is essential for the overall health of both mother and child, only 22 to 34 percent of women in the United States visit a dentist during pregnancy.

In fact, dental care during pregnancy is not only safe and effective, it's essential for combating the adverse effects of oral disease, according to an article published in the May/ June 2010 issue of General Dentistry, the peer-reviewed clinical journal of the Academy of General Dentistry (AGO). Dentists have the ability to maintain the oral health of expectant mothers by treating the dental findings that are common during pregnancy.

"Hormonal changes during pregnancy can result in several changes in the mouth," says Homa Amini, DDS, co-author of the article. "Reports show that the most common oral disease is gingivitis, which has been reported in 30 to 100 percent of pregnancies."

Gingivitis, a buildup of plaque that causes inflammation of the gums, should be treated with a professional cleaning and proper toothbrushing and flossing. If left untreated, gingivitis can lead to periodontitis, a more serious form of gum disease.

"Patients tend to delay the treatment of oral disease due to concerns for fetal safety; however, routine dental treatment can be performed safely at any time during pregnancy," says Dr. Amini. What's more, untreated dental disease can lead to pain, infections and unnecessary exposure to medications, any of which could harm the developing fetus.

Poor oral health also can affect the nutritional intake of expectant mothers, which is essential for fetal growth and survival. The hormonal fluctuations that result from pregnancy can produce benign pregnancy tumors in the mouth. These tumors usually appear after the first trimester and typically go away after delivery; however, surgical removal may be required when these tumors bleed, interfere with eating or do not resolve after delivery.

In addition to examining for oral disease, dentists may notice dental erosion -- the chemical or mechanochemical destruction of tooth materialin pregnant women, due to increased acid in the mouth following morning sickness.

"To neutralize acid after vomiting, pregnant women should rinse the mouth with a mixture of a teaspoon of baking soda dissolved in a cup of water," says Patricia Meredith, the AGD. "The teeth should be brushed only after the mouth has been rinsed and the acid has been neutralized to prevent further damage to the enamel."



# Moonachie Fire Department's 100th Anniversary

(Editor's Note: In celebration of the Moonachie Fire Department's 100th Anniversary, **The Gazette Newspaper** is providing a multi-part series. The following is reprinted as written from the 90th Anniversary Journal.)

In an effort to raise additional funds, the Ladies Auxiliary traveled to New York City in 1939, to see then Mayor James Walker for help. With the financial support from this appeal, as well as other fund raising activities, the fire company purchased a Reo model hose truck from the River Edge Fire Department.

Continuing their efforts to provide modern fire service protection, Hose Co. No. 2 bought the White 1946 Seagrave pumper from the City of Belleville, that some of the long time residents may remember from years back. 1955 would bring about the fire company's biggest challenge yet. For over a year they ran dances and fund raising activities to buy a new Oren pumper, which is still in service today. The members of the Fire Company ran Bingo every week for three years to pay off the new piece of fire equipment.

#### Moonachie Hose Co. No. 3

Except for some of the

long-time residents, not too many people are aware of the fact that a third fire company once operated in the Moonachie Fire Department.

Organized November 14, 1914, Moonachie Hose Co. No. 3 joined the other two fire companies in providing fire protection to the Borough. A group of 12 residents from the west end of town started the Fire Company, and operated from one of the member's barns.

The area they protected focused on the residential section, which borders Wood-Ridge, as well as the homes and property in the section, which is now occupied by part of Teterboro Airport.

Not too much information is available as to the events that took place during Hose Co. 3's early years. However, their firehouse was always located on that end of town, with its final location being on a section of the old Concord Street, on the airport side.

Around 1949-50, the Fire Company acquired a 1946 Dodge pumper from the U.S. Air Force. The truck served as an airport crash truck until it was sold to the Borough as surplus equipment.

In 1954, the Port Authority's mass expansion effort was underway, and caught up in it was the firehouse of Hose

Co. No. 3. Without a home, the members decided to disband the Company in April 1954, with many of its members joining one of the two remaining companies.

The Borough, seeking a place to house the fire pumper used by Hose Co. 3., approached Hose Co. 2 and asked to keep Engine 3 in the present firehouse.

This pumper, affectionately known during the 50s and 60s to the men as "The Dodge," served the community until its retirement to the D.P.W. in 1970.

#### "Sound the Alarm!"

During the early years, the fire alarm system consisted of a large steel ring, comprised of an old locomotive wheel mounted on a wooden arch. At each alarm station was a steel hammer used to strike the ring. Attached to each arch was a code sign indicating the number of times to strike the ring, depending on the location of the fire.

The steel ring alarms were used until 1949, when an automatic siren system was installed throughout the Borough. The sirens continued to serve the needs of the Fire Department, until the mid-1980's, when more modern communications technology

was employed.

## 30 More and Still Counting

The next 30 years saw many changes and advancements. The 1960s brought more industry and growth to the Borough, putting a greater demand on the members of the Fire Department to keep abreast of the changes that were taking place.

For most of the 60s the firefighting fleet consisted of the 1953 G.M.C. Ahrens-Fox, the 1955 Oren, and the old

"Dodge."

In 1964, the Fire Officers took a major step toward modernization. A new radio communications system was purchased and put into service, placing a radio receiver (plectron) in every fireman's home. These plectrons were supplemental to the siren system that remained in service during this time period.


