On Thursday, April 2, 2015, local officals cut the ribbon on the newly renovated state-of-the-art, Teen Center at the Boys & Girls Club of Lodi.

Speakers attending the ribbon cutting included Freeholders Joan Voss and Maura DeNicola, Lodi Mayor Bruce Masopust, Executive Director Mike Nardino, board members, Keystone Club members, etc.

This Teen Center, known as "The Club," will be a supervised and fun safe haven for high school teenagers. It is a place for teens to be themselves, and is an alternative to being out alone in potentially hazardous situations.

The Club is located on the second floor and has been furnished with diner booths, snack bar, multiple flat-screen TV's, etc.

The concept was developed by Joe Licata. Work included combining two rooms, new ceiling and lightins, new floor, electrical work, etc.

The renovations were made possible through donations from PSE&G (\$45,000) and the 2014 Super Bowl Snowflake Foundation (\$90,000), plus various contractors and other volunteers. ###



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



Artful Thinking

Laura Hendricks Cima's earliest memories of Lodi began when as an 8 year old, and new to the community, she became lost on Prospect Street.

She recalls knocking on someone's door frightened and with eyes overflowing with tears. "An Italian women took me in," recalls Laura. She calmed me down and gave me cookies and milk and called my mother, who came to pick me up. From that moment on Laura fell in love with the town of Lodi and has been a contributing member of the community ever since.

"Lodi was a tight knit town" says Laura. "It has an intense Italian culture with charming traditions. Being of German/English descent, I was always made to feel like one of the family." Laura went on to state that in her experience, the people of Lodi remain conscientious about the welfare of their children.

Laura arrived in Lodi with her parents, Gladys and Ray, and brothers William and Edward, in 1959.

The family put down roots on Autumn Street and immediately became an active part of their new found community.

"I was 8 years old," recalls Laura. "I entered Lincoln Grammar School and graduated in 1963."

In September of 1963 Laura Hendricks entered those sacred halls of Lodi High School and was overwhelmed by both the size of the building and the number of students who rushed seemingly out of control. "It was nerve racking to see all these kids crowding the hallways," says Laura."

"I was immediately intimidated by all the seniors, but after the initial fright wore off I soon felt comfortable." It wasn't long before the dazzled freshman began making what would prove to be lasting friendships.

After her H.S. graduation Laura entered The Hackensack Hospital School of Nursing. "I graduated in 1970 and immediately afterwards began working there," says Laura. In 2014 Laura Hendricks Cima received a PhD at Seton Hall and is currently serving us an Assistant Professor at Felician College in Lodi. "I coedited two books for the joint commission of the accreditation of hospitals," says Laura. "The subject was medication safety."

In 1970 Laura married her high school boyfriend. The couple had three children; Jacqueline, Paul and Jeanne. "We divorced in 1981," says Laura. In 1984, I married William Cima. In 2011, Laura entered the Lodi political area where she currently serves as a member of the City Council.

Cima has ten grandchildren, Stephan Barat, Justin Barat, Daniel Limnios, Derek Glynn, Mark Glynn, Sean Glynn, Kasey Glynn and Anna Marie, Kathleen and Cicelia Schmidig.

"Lodi is a great place to grow up," says Laura. "Community values influenced my life in many positive ways. Along the way I have met some wonderful people."

Medicare: Steps to Take Towards Enrollment

Every day 10,000 individuals turn 65 years old and Medicare Parts A & B become available.

But, how does one decipher the difference of what your personal needs are when you are inundated with a plethora of information? Information which comes not only from Centers of Medicare but also directly from the insurance companies as well.

It can be a very overwhelming and daunting experience. How do you break down all this information where it is tailored to your requirements and you are making sound decisions about your health needs?

There is no secret on how to go about it; it is called being prepared when the time comes and definitely planning ahead (which is the most critical part of the process).

Planning ahead before you reach age 65 requires several steps on your part. While you are still at the age of 64; 3 months prior to your 65th birthday or 3 months past it, you need to contact Social Security to enroll in Medicare for Parts A & B, this can be done by either going to your local Social Security office or online to www.ssa.gov.

If you are already receiving Social Security or Railroad Benefits, you are automatically enrolled in Part A and B coverage on the day you turn 65. Please note, if you do not sign up for Part A, Part B or both when you are eligible, there is an open enrollment period between January 1 to March 31st every year, however, you may be required to pay a penalty for late enrollment and this becomes an annual addition to your Medicare, unless you qualify for low income subsidy (LIS) or a state funded pharmaceutical assistance plan, like PAAD NJ.

to work and have a group insurance policy through your employer or spouse's employer, you may be able to delay Medicare enrollment; this will require you to seek out how the group plan synchronizes and aligns with Medicare.

If you are paying into the company plan and exceed what would be paid with Medicare with either an Advantage Plan or Supplemental Plan, it might behoove you to move into Medicare Part A and B.

If you wish to delay your Medicare enrollment, you may sign up without penalty after your employment or coverage ends, whichever comes first.

This is usually completed during an eight-month period beginning the month after your employment or coverage ends.

• What if I have COBRA health plan for another form of coverage, will I still be qualified for a special enrollment period once it ends?

That question has emanated throughout many individuals' lives, specifically Medicare eligible individuals. To answer the question, COBRA plans are not considered creditable coverage based on current employment and are not eligible for the special enrollment period when that coverage ends.

Researching the plans available is the other part to being prepared for Medicare. Part A covers hospital, Part B covers medical, however, it only pays 80% of the Medicare approved amount leaving the individual to pay the balance.

• What are some of the programs available to you which cover the balance or perhaps no balances? There are several types of polices the individual can avail themselves to: Medigap which are called Medicare Supplemental Insurance policies.

They cover the health care costs that original Medicare does not, for example: co-pays, coinsurance, and deductibles. With Medigap policies the

plans are standardized according to federal and state laws, however the premiums can vary substantially from one carrier to the other.

The second type of policies available are HMO's, PPO's which are considered Medicare Advantage plans. These plans are offered by private insurance companies only approved by Medicare. Generally there are premiums with these plans but, but many offer low to zero premium options.

They provide Part A and Part B coverage and many include prescription drugs unlike Original Medicare where you would have to purchase a standalone drug plan. These polices usually have co-payments to primary doctors, specialists and prescriptions.

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Nurse's Station **Spring Allergies**

Spring is the time of year that we normally think of when it comes to seasonal allergies.

As the trees start to bloom and the pollen gets airborne, allergy sufferers begin their annual ritual of sniffling and sneezing. Each year, 35 million Americans fall prey to seasonal allergic rhinitis, more commonly known as hay fever.

What causes spring allergies?

The biggest allergy trigger is pollen -- tiny grains released into the air by trees, grasses, and weeds for the purpose of fertilizing other plants. When pollen grains get into the nose of someone who's allergic, they send the immune system into overdrive.

The immune system, mistakenly seeing the pollen as foreign invaders, releases antibodies -- substances that normally identify and attack bacteria, viruses, and other illness-causing organisms. The antibodies attack the allergens, which leads to the release of chemicals called histamines into the blood. Histamines trigger the runny nose, itchy eyes, and other symptoms of allergies.

Pollen can travel for miles. The higher the pollen count, the greater the misery. The pollen count measures the amount of allergens in the air in grains per cubic meter. You can find out the daily pollen count by watching your local weather forecast. Allergy symptoms tend to be particularly high on breezy days when the wind picks up pollen and carries it through the air. Rainy days, on the other hand, cause a drop in the pollen counts because the



rain washes away the allergens.

How are spring allergies diagnosed?

If you've never been formally diagnosed with spring allergies but you notice that your eyes and nose are itchy and runny during the spring months, see your doctor. Your doctor may refer you to an allergist for tests.

What's the treatment for spring allergies?

Doctors treat spring allergies with a number of over-thecounter and prescription drugs.

Even though you can buy these allergy drugs without a prescription, it's a good idea to talk to your doctor first to make sure you choose the right medication.

If over-the-counter remedies don't help allergies, your doctor may recommend a prescription medication or allergy shots.

Allergy shots expose your body to gradually increasing doses of the allergen until you become tolerant of it. They can relieve your symptoms for a longer period of time than oral and nasal allergy medications. Although they don't work for everyone, in people who do see a response, allergy shots can stave off symptoms for a few years.

How to manage spring allergies

It's nearly impossible to completely avoid spring allergies if you live in an area where plants grow. However, you can ease sniffling, sneezing, and watery eyes by avoiding your main allergy triggers. Here are a few tips.

Try to stay indoors whenever the pollen count is very high (pollen counts usually peak in the mornings).

Keep your doors and windows closed whenever possible during the spring months to keep allergens out. An air purifier may also help. Source: www.webMD.com ###



Allergic Reactions

Allergic reactions are sensitivities to a specific substance, called an allergen, that makes contact with the skin, or is inhaled into the lungs, swallowed, or injected.

Some allergic reactions are mild, while others can be severe and life-threatening. Allergic reactions often occur more frequently in people with a family history of allergies.

Substances that don't bother some people (including certain medications) can trigger allergic reactions in others.

What might cause an allergic reaction in the dental office?

Allergic reactions that occur in the dental office may be caused by materials or medications. These allergens may include:

• Latex. Latex can be found in many medical or dental supplies and devices, such as masks, gloves, and syringes.

Unlike some consumer goods made from synthetic latex, natural rubber latex is derived from a milky substance found in rubber trees. Some individuals have developed hypersensitivity to proteins derived from natural rubber latex, which can cause allergic reactions.

If you are allergic to latex, ask your dentist if he or she has latex-safe products available for use during a dental procedure or surgery.

• Local anesthetic. Local anesthetics are used to numb your mouth and gums when vou undergo certain dental treatments.

Although allergic reactions to local anesthetics are rare, they can occur. If you have had reactions to local anesthesia in the past, be sure to tell your dentist before you undergo any treatment.

What are the symptoms of an allergic reaction?

A person who is allergic can experience a range of symptoms, including itchy, swollen eyes; a runny nose; and sneezing.

Hives, dermatitis (skin rash), and asthma also are common reactions. The most severe allergic reaction is the potentially fatal condition known as anaphylactic shock, which is characterized by the following symptoms: generalized flushing of the skin; hives; mouth and throat swelling; difficulty in swallowing or speaking; changes in heart rate; abdominal pain; nausea and vomiting; anxiety; a sudden feeling of weakness (due to a drop in blood pressure); and unconsciousness.

What should I do if I am allergic?

If you have allergies, be sure to tell your dentist and dental staff, and make sure that the information is included in your patient chart.

If you have had severe allergic reactions, you should consider carrying an epinephrine kit (EpiPen®) and use a medic alert bracelet that clearly states your allergy. You also may want to carry a letter of explanation from your physician.

If you have allergic symptoms following a dental procedure, consult your dentist and physician immediately. If you experience a severe allergic reaction after a dental procedure, you should go immediately to the hospital emergency department where you can be closely monitored and treated.

If you have questions about allergies and allergic reactions, talk to your dentist.

NJ State Flag

The next time you pass a public building, take a look at the New Jersey Flag. It is not only a nice looking flag, it is also a symbol of our great heritage. Why is it that color and who was responsible for picking that color? What do the symbols on the flag stand for?

The color of the New Jersey Flag dates from 1779. General George Washington was directed by the Continental Congress to assign uniforms for regiments of the Continental Line. General Washington ordered that regiments from New Jersey would wear blue with buff facings. The Continental War Offices directed, effective February 28, 1780, all regiments should carry two flags; one to be the Flag of the United States and the other the color of their uniform facings. Buff has been the color of the state flag for over two hundredthirty years. The flag bears the Coat of Arms of the State of New Jersey.

In September of 1776, the two houses of the New Jersey Legislature appointed a joint committee to design a seal for the state. The committee returned on October 3, 1776, and proposed that three plows be displayed on a shield. This was to represent agriculture. The shield was to be topped with a helmet which denoted

sovereignty and a crest of a horse's head. The horse is the official state animal. The shield is supported by two goddesses. Liberty is the one on the left. She holds a staff in her right hand. Atop the staff is a red cap with a blue band. On the band are six white stars. Ceres, the Roman goddess of the harvest, is standing on the right. In her left hand is a cornucopia bearing apples, plums and grapes. The two goddesses stand on a three part scroll. The two upper folds have the words "Liberty and Prosperity." The lower fold has the date "1776."

There were a number of versions of the flag until 1896 when a joint resolution of the State Legislature made the current design official. Shortly after 1900, the color blue became the predominant color on the arms. Story by James Halloran. ###

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Tomb of the Unknown Soldiers

At the end of World War 1 in 1918, the grief over the loss of so many lives was great. It is bad enough to know when a family member or a friend was killed in battle, but what made it worse for many was the fact that many of the dead could not be identified.

Many of our fellow countrymen at the time wanted to honor those that could not be traced or identified.

They pushed Congress to select one soldier from the War and have him entombed in a place of honor. He would represent all the Unknown Soldiers from America's past conflicts and wars.

So it was, as ordered by the people, so it was done by our Congress. In 1921, a resolution was passed and an order was given to the U.S. Army Quartermaster Corps to select one Unknown Soldier for the honor of internment in Arlington National Cemetery.

Four Unknown Soldiers were selected from four battlefields, the Aisne-Marne, Meuse-Argone, Somme and St. Mihiel cemeteries.

Great care was taken to prove they were Americans by uniform, location of death and original internment.

The four caskets were taken to the Hotel de Ville and one had to be selected. On the morning of October 24, 1921, with the Quartermaster General and the Commanding General of U.S. Forces in Germany and many other dignitaries, Sergeant Edward Younger was ordered to select one.

He slowly entered the room, circled the caskets three times and placed white flowers on the third casket from the left. He then came to attention and saluted. The selection was made. The casket with the Unknown Soldier lay in state in the city of Chalons with an Honor Guard of U.S. and French troops. French citizens came to pay their respects and placed flowers at the casket. It was then transported by caisson to the rail station where it was taken to Le Havre where it was placed on board the USS Olympia for the journey home. As the Olympia slowly pulled away from the pier, French Destroyers fired gun salutes to the Unknown Soldier. When the Olympia pulled into the Navy Yard in Washington, D.C. on November 9, 1921, the casket was escorted to the Rotunda of the U. S. Capitol and lay in state.

Thousands of people came to pay their respects to the Unknown Soldier that paid the ultimate price for liberty. On November 11, 1921, the casket was placed upon a caisson and under military escort as well as the President and Vice President; it was taken on procession to Arlington National Cemetery.

Once it arrived at the Memorial Amphitheater, the Unknown Soldier was given a funeral accompanied by Military Honors and an address by President Warren G. Harding.

The President presented the Medal of Honor to the Unknown Soldier. He was given a 21 gun salute as well as the playing of "Taps" and was placed in the marble crypt.

This doesn't end the story of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. In 1923 someone with no respect for the dead, damaged the tomb with graffiti. With this lack of respect a civilian guard was posted to watch over the Tomb. In 1926 the U.S. Army took over the duty of guarding the Tomb. Also, funds were allocated to build a sarcophagus using marble from Colorado. It was built and it appears as you see it today.

After World War II, the people once again ordered Congress to select an Unknown Soldier for internment from World War II. Congress then ordered the Secretary of War to select one for internment on Memorial Day in 1951. This was put on hold due to the outbreak of the Korean War in 1950.

Once the ceasefire of 1953 was declared, it was decided to bury an unknown from World War II and the Korean War. The selection process was complicated by the fact World War II happened in two theatres, the Pacific and in Europe. the six caskets were taken to a grassy knoll under the water tower at Hickam AFB to await the final selection process.

Colonel Glenn T. Eagleston of the U.S. Air Force was selected to choose. He picked up a lei and approached the caskets. He placed the lei on the casket of his choice. Prayers were offered as a dedication, the National Anthem was played. The Pacific Unknown Soldier had been selected.

At the Epinal American Cemetery and Memorial in France, Unknown Soldiers' remains were assembled to choose a candidate from the European Theatre.

Thirteen caskets were assembled and Army Major General Edward Joseph O'Neil was designated to make the final selection. A Chaplain gave a prayer for guidance and Major General O'Neil moved to the caskets.

He paused at each one in a solemn salute. He then picked up a red, white and blue wreath and started at his original position. He then placed the wreath in front of the 5th casket from the east and saluted.

The European Theatre's candidate was selected. The remains were placed onboard the USS Blandy to begin their final journey home.

Four caskets were exhumed from the National Cemetery in Hawaii. Each casket held an Unknown Soldier from the Korean War. They were taken to the Army's Mortuary at the Kapalama Basin.

There Master Sargent Ned Lyle, a recipient of the Distinguished Service Cross for action in Korea selected the Korean War's Unknown Soldier. He paused as he looked at each casket. He then walked over to the end one on his left and placed a wreath and delivered a hand salute. On May 17, 1958, the Korean War Unknown and World War II's Pacific Unknown were transported to a U.S. cargo plane and flown to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. In Cuba, the caskets were put on board the USS Boston and went to rendezvous with the Blandy. Once the two ships met at sea off of Virginia, the European remains were sent by highline to the USS Boston. Honors were rendered as the ships paid their respects to the dead and now the three caskets were together on the Boston. One final selection had to be made. The Boston rendezvoused with the USS Canberra where all three caskets were sent by highline, to the Canberra.

and the European Theater caskets. He paused and stood silent for a long moment, looking at the caskets. He started to his left, then turned right placed a wreath on the right casket and saluted. The selection was now complete. The casket selected, along with the Korean War Unknown was sent back to the Blandy.

The casket not selected was buried with Military Honors at sea. The USS Blandy took the two selected caskets up the Potomac River. The Blandy, in accordance with U.S. Naval tradition, rendered Honors as they passed Mount Vernon, the Home of President George Washington and brought the remains to the Capitol on May 28, 1958.

Once in Washington, D.C. the caskets lay in state at the Capitol Rotunda.

There, Vice President Richard Nixon, who presided over the Senate, placed a wreath at the two caskets.

On May 30, 1958, the U.S. School of Music Band sounded attention. Military and civilians joined in the procession to Arlington National Cemetery. At the Washington Monument, cannon fired a 21 gun salute as the caskets were moved to the cemetery. Once there, the caskets were placed in front of President Dwight Eisenhower and Vice President Richard Nixon.

The President presented both unknowns the Congressional Medal of Honor. The National Anthem was played, along with Taps. Prayers were offered and the Unknowns were placed on each side of the World War I Unknown and entombed.

Unfortunately, these would not be the last ones buried from a far off war. Nine years after the end of the Vietnam War the remains of a soldier found near a stream in An Loc back in 1972, and known only as X-26, was chosen by Sergeant Major Allan Kellogg Jr., a Marine that had received the Congressional Medal of Honor, to be the Vietnam War's Unknown Soldier. The Unknown Soldier was given a ceremony at Pearl Harbor and placed on board the USS Brewton and taken across the Pacific to the Alameda Naval Base in California. There it was taken to Travis Air Force Base and flown to Washington.

Arlington National Cemetery as an escort for the Unknown Soldier.

They paused at the Vietnam Memorial to receive a salute from Vietnam Veterans from all the states and Territories of the U.S. President Ronald Reagan, as Presidents had done before, bestowed upon the Unknown Soldier the Congressional Medal of Honor.

There he was entombed with his comrades of the past three wars. This Unknown Soldier had a different outcome though. With the science of DNA, he was exhumed and able to be identified. He was returned to his family in St. Louis, Missouri.

Today the Vietnam Tomb lies empty. It is hoped that all the Missing and Unknown Soldiers will one day be identified.

Every Memorial Day, the President places a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldiers. People go and watch the Honor Guard as they go through the drill of marching back and forth.

Impressive as it is, sometimes we forget exactly why they are there going through those motions.

To me they are not unknown. We know who they are, they are our countrymen, and a representation of the best our society produces. May they forever rest in peace. ###

The four Unknowns from the Philippines were flown to Hickam AFB on April 29, 1958. There they joined the other two caskets.

Once it was determined that no possible identification of these remains was possible

Is War Threatening?

Two months ago, the National Association of Realtors (NAR) announced that the number of homes in the US had reached a low not seen since 1999.

More homes have hit the market since then, but Lawrence Yun, NAR's chief economist, said in March that in many areas around the nation, the inventory of homes for sale is unlikely to keep up with the number of interested buyers.

He's right! We're seeing it here in our south central Bergen County area where new listings are coming in way too slowly and far too infrequently. Growing buyer demand is being stretched.

Yun goes on to say: "Buyer traffic is 40% above a year ago, so there is plenty of demand but insufficient inventory to improve sales more strongly.

We've transitioned into a seller's market in much of the country." He concludes: We expect a seasonal rise of inventory this spring, but it may be insufficient to avoid more frequent incidences of multiple bidding and faster-than-normal price growth."

For us on the front lines, this year's real estate market may end up resembling a brawl.

Bidding wars were commonplace in the early years of this century when buyers, frustrated by the slow trickle of new listings, pounced whenever any attractive property in their price range came onto the market.

It's beginning to look like that all over again as the ques-





Lodi Fire Draws Two-Alarms



Bagpiper Sharon Dunn led the Carlstadt Fire Department into the Church. The service was open to area mutual aid departments.


Pastor Pitches' theme was "The Call."
