


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SPRING-ing

IRS Extends **Filing Date**

According to the March 21, 2020 IRS Press Release:

The 2019 income tax filing and payment deadlines for all taxpayers who file and pay their Federal income taxes on April 15, 2020, are automatically extended until July 15, 2020. This relief applies to all individual returns, trusts, and corporations. This relief is automatic, taxpayers do not need to file any additional forms or call the IRS to qualify.

This relief also includes estimated tax payments for tax year 2020 that are due on April 15, 2020.

Penalties and interest will begin to accrue on any remaining unpaid balances as of July 16, 2020. You will automatically avoid interest and penalties on the taxes paid by July 15.

Individual taxpayers who need additional time to file beyond the July 15 deadline can request a filing extension by filing Form 4868 through their tax professional, tax software or using the Free File link on IRS.gov. Businesses who need additional time must file Form 7004. ###

April 1 -- New Jersey taxes are now due by July 15, instead of April 15, Gov. Phil Murphy announced Wednesday, making it the last state with an income tax to push back its tax filing deadline.

The legislative leaders will also extend the state fiscal year to Sept. 30, from June 30. ###

Historically Speaking

The word PANDEMIC describes the widespread occurrence of a disease. This has been applied to outbreaks of Cholera, Bubonic Plague, Smallpox, Influenza and HIV/ AIDS in recorded history.

The Novel (NEW) Coronavirus of 2019 (COVID-19), is the latest of many pandemics or plagues that have attacked mankind throughout history. Some of the worst were the following.

- ANTONINE or GALEN PLAGUE. This plague was first recorded in 165 AD. Roman soldiers, returning from Mesopotamia, unknowingly spread this disease. It would affect Italy, Greece, Egypt and Asia Minor. While the true cause is not known, it has been speculated that it was Smallpox or Measles. This plague claimed 5 million lives.
- SMALLPOX has been found in Egyptian mummies dating back to 1157 BC. It was not eradicated until the middle of the twentieth century. It may have caused the death of over a billion people in total.
- THE PLAGUE OF JUS-TINIAN. Named after the Roman Emperor Justinian. This was the first recorded outbreak of the Bubonic Plague. During the years of 541–542, a quarter of the population of the Eastern Mediterranean, about 25 million, succumbed. At its height, it was reported that as many as 5,000 a day died.
- THE BLACK DEATH. This was again the Bubonic Plague. It spread from Asia to Europe and Africa in 1346. Merchant ships carried infected rats and fleas to major trading ports. For the next seven years this plague would ravage Europe. Between 75 to 200 million would succumb.

During this time the first quarantine was imposed. Quar-"quaranta," meaning the number forty. This period of time was chosen from references in the Bible.

The idea was that the arriving ship needed time to rid its self of the "sick vapors." In fact, in the forty-day period, the infected rats and sailors had died, stopping the spread of the Plague.

• THE CHOLERA PAN-DEMIC of 1852-1860. Originating from the Ganges River Delta of India, it ravaged Asia, Europe, Africa, North and South America. Over 1 million died.

working in London during the height of the pandemic, plotted a number of the cases to an infected well. He identified contaminated water as the cause of Cholera transmission to the population of London.

- THE RUSSIAN FLU. In 1889, this Flu strain originated in Central Asia (Turkestan). It spread to Canada and Greenland and then to the many urban areas around the globe. In all, about a million died from this.
- THE SPANISH FLU. The Flu appeared in 1918 among the armies fighting the First World War. Wartime censorship concealed the true figures of those affected. However, Spain, a neutral and free of censorship, reported the number of cases in their country. Because of this it was called the "Spanish" Flu. This Flu spread around the world. There were reported 25 million deaths in the first 25 weeks. The Pandemic would not end until 1920. In all, 50 million deaths would be attributed to the Flu.
- THE ASIAN FLU. Originated in China in 1956. It killed about 2 million people, with 69,800 in the US.
- THE HONG KONG FLU. First reported on July 13, 1968, in Hong Kong, China, within three months it had spread around the world. Total deaths were just over a million people.
- HIV/AIDS PANDEMIC. There are currently between 31 to 35 million people living with HIV. The majority are living in Sub-Saharan Africa. New treatments have made HIV more manageable. Still, 36 million have succumbed to this killer since 1981.

We are now facing a new Pandemic called COVID-19. There are recommended methods to survive this Pandemic.

They are: Stay at home. antine comes from Italian If you must go out, keep your distance. Stay at least six feet from others. Wear a cloth face covering. Do not gather in person. Contact family, friends and associates on the phone, Face Time, Zoom or E-mail. Wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Don't touch yours eyes, nose or mouth. Cover your cough or sneeze. If you are sick, stay home and self-isolate! Avoid contact with people who are sick. Clean and disinfect objects and surfaces that you



Filling You In

Are we there yet?

As I awaken every morning lately, I ask that question which parents are all too familiar with, "are we there yet?"

A child may ask this shortly after a trip begins while not having the perspective of the length of their voyage.

Well, I suppose this is why I ask the question. Perhaps it is the pursuit of the perspective as to how long the COVID-19 pandemic road is. We find ourselves all living a lifestyle that would have been unthinkable just a number of weeks ago.

Fear and anxiety have taken a toll already this first week of April as we practice "social distancing" and try to determine if or when our lives will return to normal.

One considerable impact from this pandemic is the limited and difficult access to routine healthcare providers.

As a result, dentists, physicians, and other healthcare providers were asked to stop providing non-emergency clinical procedures.

Governor Murphy has issued an executive order which was carried out by the NJ State

Division of Consumer Affairs. This order in part states: "... Dentists should cancel or postpone any elective procedure or "routine" service until at least April 20, 2020, to limit exposure to and transmission of the virus and help preserve and extend the supply of personal protective equipment...".

Therefore, I have been not able to keep my office open and available as usual and my staff has returned to their homes to care for their families as they "shelter in place."

Patients with dental emergencies can be managed by telephone and then determine how to best resolve their chief concern. For a short time, this partial closure can be manageable.

However, the federal and state governments have extended the "social distancing" recommendations until April 30th.

We anticipate the Governor will extend the aforementioned executive order likewise.

With the understanding that you will be reading this at the end of April or the beginning of May, I anticipate that much may have changed in regards to the limitations the pandemic has placed on all of our lives

I am in constant consultation with the medical community and fellow colleagues in dentistry. We will continue to discuss and deliberate the manner in which we will best reopen our offices and provide the routine care.

In my column of **The Gazette Newspaper's** April issue (available online), I discussed Infection Control Procedures. Those procedures are recognized as a universal standard. As we await the post-pandemic world, I expect that the infection control procedures will be enhanced to provide the safest and most favorable conditions to render care.

We are not there yet. However, with constant optimism and confidence, I have hope that we will see the light at the end of the tunnel.

Until then, I will awaken every morning looking for the answer to my original question. So, in conclusion of this article, I express my deepest concern for the safety, wellbeing, health and happiness of all those in our community.







Meadowlands YMCA Distributed Emergency Food Boxes

Food Distribution every Tuesday until further notice

March 31, 2020 – The Meadowlands YMCA, in partnership with Table to Table, distributed over 600 boxes of Hello Fresh meal kits along with extra fresh produce and frozen pork to assist those impacted by the Coronavirus crisis.

Many of our neighbors in need are already feeling the economic impact of COVID-19, while others find themselves struggling perhaps for the first time

Small businesses have been ordered to shut down and workers are being laid off resulting in food insecurity; children are left without access to school meals, and at-risk seniors are facing food shortages.

Drive-Thru grab-and-go Emergency Food Boxes were distributed Tuesday, March 31, 2020 and Friday, March 27, 2020. Friday's event was in partnership with the Community Food Bank of NJ (CFBNJ) and close to 13,500 meals were given out in a little over an hour.

"We knew there was a tremendous need for food, but when the meals were distributed in 75 minutes, we immediately arranged for the second event today," said David Kisselback, President and CEO of the Meadowlands YMCA.

"We are so grateful to our partners, CFBNJ and Table to Table for responding so quickly to the needs of the Meadowlands community. Having a fullservice facility in East Rutherford allows us the opportunity to serve the region in a way that was never possible as a "Y Without Walls."

YMCA is, and continues to be, an advocate and resource in the region. The two branches, the main facility located at 390 Murray Hill Parkway in East Rutherford and the Meadowlands Family Success Center in Little Ferry, have quickly responded to the urgent needs of the community as they arise.

- Food Distribution on March 27 (336 boxes making 13,440 meals) and March 31 (600 boxes making approximately 6,000 meals).

- Made computers available to students in Little Ferry, Moonachie and other underserved areas who do not have access to devices at home,
- Installed internet and gave WiFi access for in-need community in Moonachie so that the families stay connected to school and can participate in distance learning,
- Created Y Online, an online resource portal to provide support to the community at-large.

The Meadowlands YMCA has relied heavily on support

from local businesses. The NY Football Giants funded our first round of FREE childcare for healthcare workers, and our vendors and local merchants have donated much-needed supplies.

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

Above-normal 2020 Atlantic Hurricane Season Predicted

season runs from June 1 to November 30, though storms sometimes form outside those

It is predicted that the 2020 hurricane activity will be about 140% of the average season, with 16 named tropical storms formed, eight of which will become hurricanes.

A tropical storm becomes a hurricane when its wind speed reaches 74 mph.

Of the eight predicted hurricanes, four are expected to spin into major hurricanes - Category 3 to 5 - with sustained wind speeds of 111 to 129 mph or greater.

The chance that at least one major hurricane will make landfall in 2020.

Reasons for the active season include unusually warm seawater in the Atlantic Ocean and also the lack of an El Niño.

One of the major determining factors in hurricane forecasting is whether we are in an El Niño or La Niña climate pattern.

El Niño is a natural warming of tropical Pacific Ocean water, which tends to suppress the development of Atlantic hurricanes. Its opposite, La Niña, marked by cooler ocean water, tends to increase hurricanes in the Atlantic.

The most significant factor in determining how active a hurricane season may turn out to be is how warm the ocean is.

Currently, sea surface temperatures are above normal across most of the tropical development regions in the Atlantic. This is especially true in the subtropical Atlantic close to the U.S. where the Gulf of Mexico, as a whole, is 5 degrees Fahrenheit above normal, with some pockets inflated by a striking 8 degrees.

Warmer sea surface temperatures provide more energy for developing systems. This does not always cause more storms to form, but that "higher-octane fuel" does power stronger systems.

Along with these forecasts,

The Atlantic hurricane research also shows tropical systems are intensifying more rapidly and likely slowing down their forward motion due — at least partially — to a warmer globe. This is leading to more damage due to stronger winds, heavier rain and flooding.

> That fact is significant because an increase in storm intensity does not just cause a modest increase in damage, the change can be exponential. For instance, a storm with winds of 150 mph can produce 250 times the damage compared to a storm with winds of 75 mph. So, if water temperatures remain far above normal for the season it is logical to assume, a landfalling storm will likely cause more damage.

Full Flower Moon

The May full moon will appear on Thursday, May 7, 2020, at 6:45 a.m. It is called the "Full Flower Moon."

According to The Farmer's Almanac, in most areas, flowers are abundant everywhere during this time. Thus, the name of this moon.

Other names include the "Full Corn Planting Moon" or the "Milk Moon."

The Native American Indians of the northern and eastern United States kept track of the seasons by giving a name to each recurring full moon. European settlers followed the custom.

• "What's there to know about lawn mowing? You just push the lawn mower, and it cuts the grass, right?

At the most basic level, Yes. If lawn mowing is merely a mindless chore and you don't care much about the health of your grass, then you needn't know any more about it.

However, if you do care about the health of your grass, there's a bit more to lawn mowing than just keeping your grass short enough to prevent the neighborhood from thinking you abandoned your house.

• The right time and wrong times to mow the lawn


You should not mow the lawn when the grass is wet (under which conditions disease can be introduced, plus you incur the risk of slipping and getting injured), for example.

So the period just after a rainstorm would be a wrong time to mow, as would a time (early morning) when the grass

is still covered with dew. During the late morning (after the dew has evaporated) of a dry day, however, is an example of a right time to mow the lawn.

But deciding on when to cut the grass goes beyond waiting for dry conditions.

Mowing when the sun is pounding down on your grass, as it would during the afternoon of a hot summer's day, puts a lot of stress on the lawn. Cutting grass in the evening, instead, would put less stress on it. On the other hand, you don't want to cut the grass too late in the day, after darkness starts to fall, as this is a period of reduced visibility (which increases the chances for a mowing mishap). All else being equal, the early evening of a dry day may be the right time for mowing lawns. the spruce. com ###





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
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What Is Shavuot (Shavuos)? And How Is Shavuot Celebrated?

The word Shavuot (or Shavuos) means "weeks." It celebrates the completion of the seven-week Omer counting period between Passover and Shavuot. It begins on the sunset, Thursday, May 28 and ends the evening of Saturday, May 30, 2020.

The Torah was given by God to the Jewish people on Mount Sinai on Shavuot more than 3,300 years ago. Every year on the holiday of Shavuot we renew our acceptance of God's gift, and God "re-gives" the Torah.





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In ancient times, two wheat loaves would be offered in the Holy Temple on Shavuot. It was also at this time that people would begin to bring bikkurim, their first and choicest fruits, to thank God for Israel's bounty.

How Is Shavuot Celebrated?

• Women and girls light holiday candles to usher in the holiday, on both the first and second evenings of the holidays. It is customary to stay up all night learning Torah on the first night of Shavuot.

- All men, women and children should go to the synagogue on the first day of Shavuot to hear the reading of the Ten Commandments.
- As on other holidays, special meals are eaten, and no "work" may be performed.
- It is customary to eat dairy foods on Shavuot. Menus range from traditional cheese blintzes to quiches, casseroles and more.
- On the second day of Shavuot, the Yizkor memorial service is recited.
- Some communities read the Book of Ruth publicly, as King David—whose passing occurred on this day was a descendant of Ruth the Moabite.
- Some have the custom to decorate their homes (and synagogues) with flowers and sweet-smelling plants in advance of Shavuot. Source: chabad.org

Mosquito Season is Abuzz

Standing water means you could be raising mosquitoes!

Many generations of mosquitoes can breed right in your own yard. All mosquitoes need water to complete their life cycle. Mosquitoes also are not known to travel long distances from their water source.

Some mosquitoes lay their eggs in standing water where they hatch in just a day or two. They can do this in water that has been standing for as little as four days.

Other mosquitoes may lay their eggs in old tires, tin cans, or other water-holding containers including bird baths, wading and small swimming pools, ornamental ponds, clogged gutters, flowerpots or the drip plates beneath them, cups, glasses, drink cans, etc.

The eggs may remain un-

months until they are covered with water!

Yard and home checklist:

- Get rid of old tires, tin cans, buckets, drums, bottles, or any water holding containers
- Fill in or drain any low places (puddles, ruts) in yard
- Keep drains, ditches, and culverts clean of weeds and trash so water will drain properly
- Cover trash containers to keep out rain water
- Repair leaky pipes and outdoor faucets
- Empty plastic wading pool at least once a week and store it indoors when not in use
- Make sure your backyard pool is properly cared for while on vacation
 - Fill in tree rot holes and

hatched for weeks or even hollow stumps that hold water with sand or concrete

- Change the water in bird baths and plant pots or drip trays at least once a week
- Keep grass cut short and shrubbery well trimmed around the house so adult mosquitoes will not hide there
- Keep gutters clean and free of debris and leaves.
- Store boats covered or upside down.

Protect yourself from mosquito bites

- If possible, avoid being outdoors in the early morning or in the evening.
- If you must go out, wear long-sleeved shirts, long pants and socks.
- The EPA and CDC advise the use of a mosquito repellant, following the instructions on

- Check with your pediatrician before using a repellant on children.
- Keep windows and doors closed or covered with screens to prevent mosquitoes from entering the house.
- · Repair screens on windows, doors, porches, and patios.
- Some mosquito control methods do not do a very good job. For example, bug zappers do not work well to control biting mosquitos since they do not emit carbon dioxide.
- Various birds and bats will eat mosquitos, but there is little evidence that this cuts down on the number of mosquitos around homes.
- Electronic mosquito repelling devices don't stop mosquitos biting people either. ###

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Caution on Fertilizer Pesticide Combinations

Many homeowners and lawn care companies routinely combine fertilizer and pesticides in a series of applications throughout the year.

These multi-step programs are promoted as the sure and easy path to the perfect lawn. The pressure to have a perfect lawn, however, has clouded a number of issues and literally mixed ingredients that should be kept separate. Areas of caution include:

• Routine insecticide applications: Most insects found on a lawn are beneficial, and insecticides can harm beneficial insects, as well as birds, pets and people.

Research indicates that only about one lawn in 200 will need an insecticide application in a given year. Even on lawns where harmful insects exist, natural controls or better lawn care will reduce the threat.

• Routine herbicide applications: Weeds are not the cause of an unhealthy lawn, they are the result. The best

defense against weeds is a thick healthy lawn that comes from proper watering, fertilizing and mowing. Routine herbicide applications are unnecessary and their effects can be misleading.

For example, products are widely used to kill dandelions in spring, when the flowers are so noticeable. The curling weeds seem to indicate that the herbicide has been effective, but in fact the herbicide may kill only the top of the weed, not the root.

• Unnecessary nutrient applications: Most commercial fertilizers contain phosphorus, a major water pollutant. Yet many soils already contain enough phosphorus. Low phosphorus or phosphorus-free fertilizers can provide nutrients while avoiding the threat to water quality

In short, applying unneeded pesticides and nutrients in a generic, multi-step fertilizer program can be expensive for the homeowner and harmful to the environment. ###

A Very Serious Strain on Us All

It's Springtime! The hottest time of year for home sales!!

Not this spring, unfortunately. The coronavirus plague is raging across New Jersey and we here in the NYC 'burbs' are too uncomfortably close to ground zero, currently.

As a result, many people have lost jobs or are furloughed; others are isolated with their kids to limit the possibility of infection. The idea of selling or buying a home would seem to be far from anybody's mind, but yet – despite the fear and restrictions – the real estate business is still ongoing.

Earlier this week, the governor clarified that agents can still operate and show houses to prospective buyers on a one-on-one basis or to immediate families. Understandably, there is still a prohibition on open houses.

So we real estate agents are still working, but – as you can imagine – many buyers and sellers are putting their plans on hold.

Joan Sentipal in our office mentioned earlier that she has three potential sellers she was prepared to work with before things became dire. She recommended that they wait a bit. As she put it: "It's just too risky right now, and we need to be concerned with liability as well."

The fact is we have to have all clients sign a hold harmless agreement, just in case someone gets sick despite precautions. It's to protect ourselves and to protect the people we serve. All agencies are now mandated to follow this procedure.

And, of course, the precautions don't end with simple paperwork.

We use disposable gloves, shoe covers and hand sanitizers; we turn on all the lights and open cabinets and doors for

all showings so clients needn't touch anything.

The truth is, though, that there haven't been many showing requests since the governor's stay-at-home order...

But what, you may be wondering, do we do with those contracts already made and in progress? Closings are still happening, but real estate professionals have to be a little more creative because of oronavirus.

"We are conducting our closings with extreme caution and awareness of the current situation," says Joe DiMarco, owner of Empire Title Agency which shares office space with us and does the majority of our closing work. "We have sent all of our clients an extensive overview of how closings are being conducted right now. For example, everyone brings their own pens, masks, and gloves, and we insist on only essential people be in attendance. We are lucky enough to have a conference room with a table that is over twelve feet long, which enables us to continue the practice of 'social distancing' as much as you can in a closing situation." Joe said. "Right now, it's all about thinking on your feet, staying super vigilant, showing the clients added support and superior service."

Other closings, however, are being delayed because some municipalities are closed to the general public. Waiting for a certificate of occupancy or smoke alarm certificate takes

more time, as you now have to apply for them online.

Likewise, home inspections. The inspection is conducted alone, without the usual informative, running commentary that buyers are eager to see and hear first-hand. The inspector documents any issues or concerns with photos or video and forwards to the buyers with his report. As elsewhere, the human element is subtracted from the process.

Strangest of all (especially for us old timers), is showing a home without physically being inside the house. Video is the way to go, these days. "I sold a home on Face Time last year, so I have experience in this department and can sell on Face Time going forward," said Tom Corrente, a top producer in our office. "There are buyers and sellers who absolutely must be involved in the market. Online searches and virtual tours are critical to them. And to us, as well, I have to say."

It's impossible for any of us to predict what will happen over the next few weeks and months, but, personally, I think we can anticipate a serious uptick in home sales when we finally get an all-clear.

The 'Spring Market' will likely be pushed into the summer or fall, depending on the length of time it takes to get back to normal. And with the stock market's decline, real estate is surely going to be seen as a safer investment bet. So, who knows – unlike 2008, real estate might this time save the economy...

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Artful Thinking

"Those brave souls what did they feel? What valor did they know? Frightened! Yet they walked the path Where heroes go."

The above is an excerpt from a poem I wrote some years ago called "Glory." It was a fitting tribute to the men and women of our Armed Forces who were sent to distant shores and who fought gallantly in the darkness of battle to protect the American way of life.

This month's column is dedicated to those "brave souls" who answered the call to duty and especially to those who made the supreme sacrifice. Among them Marine Corporal Michael Ettz, Vietnam 1967.

Over the years I have interviewed perhaps 40 or so Veterans from the town of Lodi who left home to defend our country. In looking back I suddenly realized that I overlooked (not intentionally) the military service of my close relatives.

My Uncle Armando "Pete" Maglionico served in WWII with the 2nd Infantry Division. He saw action at the Battle of the Bulge. His Division entered Germany in October of '44 and went on to attack and seize the Roer River Dams.

My uncle's division fought their way to Czechoslovakia and overtook the city of Pilsen on VE-Day. My Uncle Mike Maglionico was a Corporal in the Army and saw action in Guam, South Pacific, where he served in various operations including Radar operator and search light crewman.

My Uncle Phil Maglionico served in the Army and took an active part in the invasion of North Africa fighting his way across Italy.

My Father, Vito Maglionico, served on the home front at the Brooklyn Navy Yard. Among the war ships he helped build was the ill-fated light cruiser USS Juneau upon which the five Sullivan brothers met their demise. The war ship was sunk in the South Pacific on November 13, 1942.

My Uncle, Andrew Pesenti, served as a Gunner Instructor in the Army Air Corps. He saw action in Guam, South Pacific.

Among those Lodi residents who served overseas was Peter L. Manzo. During the height of WWII, Manzo marched with the 85th Custer Division as a Cannoneer-Light Artillery 844. Peter saw action across Italy including Rome-Arno, North Apennines and the Po Valley.

Michael De Marco saw

action in Okinawa, Japan. He was a Sergeant in the Army. Donald Stein of Lodi, served with the Army in Korea while the Army's Dan Galdo saw action in Vietnam in 1965.

The following is a brief biography of WWII Veteran, the late James Steccato, of Lodi. I had the honor of chatting with him at the Lodi Library in May of 2000. James was among the many WWII Veterans who gave me 1st hand accounts of what it was like to face death during the horrors of battle. Their stories all ended the same way. "The real heroes never came home."

On Christmas Eve, 1944 in Luxembourg Germany, Lodi's James Steccato almost lost his life when Nazi war planes descended upon his platoon in what was a surprise bombing raid. James leaped from his 40mm anti-aircraft gun just as the shell creased the air above his head. "If you hear the shell coming you have a chance," said James during our talk back in May of 2000. "It's the one you don't hear that gets you."

James entered the Army at age 18. After basic training he was assigned to the 456th AAA Weapons Battalion. Together with Batteries A, B and C. James was sailing over to Europe in what was one of the biggest convoys of 1943. From the English Channel the 456th made its way into Normandy, France and were soon fighting their way out of the hedge rows of Saint Lo where they were experiencing a heavy ground and air attack.

Finally after days of being under siege, the German onslaught was put to rout by B-17s, B-24s and English Spit Fires. After the close call at Saint Lo, James' battalion marched throughout France guarding General Patton's 3rd Army. "We spent most of that August at the Seine River putting up pontoon bridges," said James. "That was before the liberation of Paris." During that time James was assigned to a trailer pulled 50 caliber quadruple mounted air cooled machine gun. Each container held over 500 rounds of ammunition. James' 3rd Army anti-aircraft battery held the record for shooting down the most enemy planes...a total of 394.

More than 271 German planes were shot down in early August as the Luftwaffe attempted to stem a breakthrough in France's Cherbourg peninsula. The 3rd Army was later commanded by General Patton as well as the 1st Army's General Omar Bradley.

By the end of WWII James fought in no less than five major battles: The Battle of the Bulge, Normandy, The Seine River, Northern France and central Europe. James Steccato sailed back to his home town of Lodi on a troop ship named America. He was honorably discharged from military service on October 28, 1945.

I walked across a battered city. Smoldering remnants of the

Wearisome I stepped cautiously Toward the cannons deadly blast.

To those who fell and stayed behind

In that Elysian Field Remind me dark and secretly Of when my fate was sealed.

From my poem Elysian Field.

Well folks here's wishing you a happy and at the same time a solemn Memorial Day. May God Bless all of our Veterans as we remember those who made the ultimate sacrifice.

To those who are currently serving in the Armed Forces, especially those who are in harm's way, we at home say thank you, may God protect you, and come home soon. ###

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About Mother's Day

The modern holiday of Mother's Day was first celebrated in 1908, when Anna Jarvis held a memorial for her mother at St. Andrew's Methodist Church in Grafton, West Virginia. St. Andrew's Methodist Church now holds the International Mother's Day Shrine.

Her campaign to make "Mother's Day" a recognized holiday in the United States began in 1905, the year her mother, Ann Reeves Jarvis, died.

Ann Jarvis had been a peace activist who cared for wounded soldiers on both sides of the American Civil War, and created Mother's Day Work Clubs to address public health issues.

Anna Jarvis wanted to honor her mother by continuing the work she started and to set aside a day to honor all mothers, because she believed that they were "the person who has done more for you than anyone in the world."

In 1908, the US Congress rejected a proposal to make Mother's Day an official holiday, joking that they would have to proclaim also a "Mother-in-law's Day."

However, owing to the efforts of Anna Jarvis, by 1911 all US states observed the holiday, with some of them officially recognizing Mother's Day as a local holiday, the first being

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The modern holiday of West Virginia, Jarvis' home ther's Day was first celstate, in 1910.

In 1914, Woodrow Wilson signed a proclamation designating Mother's Day, held on the second Sunday in May, as a national holiday to honor mothers.

Although Jarvis was successful in founding Mother's Day, she became resentful of the commercialization of the holiday. By the early 1920s, Hallmark Cards and other companies had started selling Mother's Day cards.

Jarvis believed that the companies had misinterpreted and exploited the idea of Mother's Day, and that the emphasis of the holiday was on sentiment, not profit.

As a result, she organized boycotts of Mother's Day, and threatened to issue lawsuits against the companies involved

Jarvis argued that people should appreciate and honor their mothers through handwritten letters expressing their love and gratitude, instead of buying gifts and pre-made cards

Jarvis protested at a candy makers' convention in Philadelphia in 1923, and at a meeting of American War Mothers in 1925

By this time, carnations had become associated with Mother's Day, and the selling of carnations by the American War Mothers to raise money angered Jarvis, who was arrested for disturbing the peace.

Mother's Day is celebrated in more than 46 countries throughout the world. On this day, many people pray in Churches in honor of mothers, while some give them presents on this day to express their love. Some may have dinner at home with the family.

One of the most popular ways people celebrate Mother's Day is by giving their mother a card and bouquet of flowers. As it is a holiday, some people prefer to go out for a picnic to celebrate this festival. In schools, kids dedicate poems to their mothers and also perform various roles on this day.
