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Steamboats and Bridges on and Over the Passaic River

Probably among the most important names are Cornelius Joralemon and John Stevens.

According to Jim Hands, whose historical research of Rutherford and New Barbadoes produced both a historical text and a classic map, Cornelius Joralemon and his sons, built some of the earliest two masted schooners before Cornelius died during the Civil War.

Joralemon was among a group of shipbuilders in what is now Lyndhurst. Cornelius Joralemon is credited with building a schooner with a 70-foot keel in 1873. His successors, Albert and Warren Joralemon operated as Joralemon Brothers at 411 2nd Avenue, Lyndhurst.

According to Harry Emerson Wildes, author of "Twin Rivers," John Stevens (1749-1838) used Nicholas Roosevelt's foundry in Secord River (Belleville) to build the "Polacca," a 60-foot steamer. The "Polacca" took its trial trip on the Passaic River on October 21, 1798.

These vessels sailed from Rutherford to Newark back in the 19th century.

Stevens, a lawyer and inventor, relied on the building skills of Robert Livingston and technical advice of Josiah Hornblower, who is credited with introducing the first steam engine to America. The Hoboken Historical Museum holds an archive of data about the Stevens family, including John's steamboat exploits.

According to Jim Hands' historic map of New Barbadoes area 1650 to 1897, Rutherfurd Avenue Bridge was built in 1872. However, the New Jersey Department of Transportation states that the first bridge to connect Rutherford with the Delawanna section of Clifton was built in 1870. The NJDOT called it the "Rutherford Avenue Bridge."

Historically, the area now called Rutherford and Lyndhurst was known as New Barbadoes Neck. On July 4, 1668, Lords Berkeley and Carteret sold an enormous tract of land to Captain William Sandford of Barbadoes. Sandford was acting on behalf of Nathaniel Kingsland.

Originally the area was known by the Indians as Meghgectecock, meaning a place where May apples grow.

It later became Pegawack and then the English called it New Barbadoes Neck.

One of the earliest Dutch settlers was Arent Schuyler, who arrived in 1695. He settled in New Barbadoes Neck in 1710. His wealth came largely from the discovery of copper.

Note: Additional research of the subject area can be found in "Pre-Revolutionary Dutch Houses," Rosalie Fellows Bailey; and "Old Houses of Rutherford, New Jersey," by Agnes B. Concklin and Helen J. Swenson. In addition, there is helpful information found in "Pre Revolutionary Roads in Northern New Jersey," by Dr. Samuel Pleasants. Provided by Rod Leith, long-time Rutherford historian. ###

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





Most Sacred Heart of Jesus Church Main Hall was transformed into dramatic tableaux that helped enrich the Holy Week experience.

Each year, hundreds of people come to our parish from far and near to visit and pray at our "Tomb of the Holy Sepulcher" for Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday Food Blessings and Easter Sunday Morning.

All together, several thousand people walk through the tomb each year.

The week leading up to Easter Sunday should be the most important period of quality calendar time in the life of every Christian Catholic.

Known as Holy Week or Great Week, the days from Palm Sunday to the Sunday of the Resurrection (Pascha, Wielkanoc), are rich in remembering and reliving the last earthly moments of the God/Man Jesus of Nazareth.

Through signs and symbols, the High Holy Days of our ancient faith re-enact the great drama of our salvation and liberation from sin and death.

For centuries, Christians have always had a great devotion to the sacred places associated with the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Despite hardships, poverty, persecution, war and great distances, Christians have always maintained an intense desire to journey to the Holy Land Despite the limitations of time, history, location and means to travel, the moving tradition of bringing those holy places to the people of central and eastern Europe grew and developed into what we now today as the Shrine of the Holy Sepulchre (Bozy Grob); all beginning at first in the local

"grass roots" Parish Church

community.

(Terra Sancta - Ziemia Swieta).

During the Sacred Triduum, the followers of Jesus Christ gather in prayer, reflection, silence, meditation, song and anticipation at a specially designated and prepared place away from their usual worship space to ponder the many aspects of the life, betrayal, loneliness, abandonment, suffering, torture and brutal death of the: Jesus=The Great Teacher of Nazareth.

It is also here at "The Tomb," that together we watch, wait and keep vigil to once again experience the divine power of the resurrection.

We join the family of the Church of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, as during this time beyond time we come together as his friends and followers to watch and pray.

How To Put Together A Traditional Easter Basket

- Maslo (Butter) This dairy product is often shaped into a lamb (Baranek Wielkanocny) or a cross. This reminds us of the good will of Christ that we should have towards all things.
- Babka (Easter Bread) A round or long loaf topped with a cross or a fish, symbolic of Jesus, who is the Bread of Life.
- Chrzan (Horseradish) Symbolic of the Passion of Christ still in our minds.
- Jajka (Eggs) and Pisanki (decorated with symbols of Easter, of life, of prosperity) - Indicates new life and Christ's Resurrection from the tomb.
- Kielbasa (Sausage) A sausage product, symbolic of God's favor and generosity.
- Szynka (Ham) Symbolic of great joy and abundance. Some prefer lamb or veal. The lamb also reminds Christians that the Risen Christ is the "Lamb of God."
- Slonina (Smoked Bacon) A symbol of the overabundance of God's mercy and generosity.
- Sol (Salt) A necessary element in our physical life. Symbolic of prosperity and justice and to remind us that people are the favor of the earth.
- Ser (Cheese) Symbolic of the moderation Christians should have at all times.
 - Candle Represents Christ as the Light of the World.
- Colorful Ribbons and Sprigs of Greenery are attached to the basket as signs of joy and new life in the season of spring and in celebraton of the Resurrection.

What Is Shavuot (Shavuos)? And How Is Shavuot Celebrated?

The word Shavuot (or Shavuos) means "weeks." It celebrates the completion of the seven-week Omer counting period between Passover and Shavuot. It begins on the sunset, Thursday, May 25, and ends the evening of Saturday, May 27, 2023.

The Torah was given by God to the Jewish people on Mount Sinai on Shavuot more than 3,300 years ago. Every year on the holiday of Shavuot we renew our acceptance of God's gift, and God "re-gives" the Torah.

The giving of the Torah was a far-reaching spiritual event—one that touched the essence of the Jewish soul for all times. Sages have compared it to a wedding between God and the Jewish people. Shavuot also means "oaths," for on this day God swore eternal devotion to us, and we in turn pledged everlasting loyalty to Him.

In ancient times, two wheat loaves would be offered in the Holy Temple on Shavuot. It was also at this time that people would begin to bring bikkurim, their first and choicest fruits, to thank God for Israel's bounty.

How Is Shavuot Celebrated?

- Women and girls light holiday candles to usher in the holiday, on both the first and second evenings of the holidays. It is customary to stay up all night learning Torah on the first night of Shavuot.
- · All men, women and children should go to the synagogue on the first day of Shavuot to hear the reading of the Ten Commandments.
- As on other holidays, special meals are eaten, and no "work" may be performed.
- It is customary to eat dairy foods on Shavuot. Menus range from traditional cheese blintzes to quiches, casseroles and more.
- On the second day of Shavuot, the Yizkor memorial service is recited.
- Some communities read the Book of Ruth publicly, as King David—whose passing occurred on this day was a descendant of Ruth the Moabite.
- Some have the custom to decorate their homes (and synagogues) with flowers and sweet-smelling plants in advance of Shavuot. Source: chabad.org

W-R and its Memorial Foundation Mourn the Passing of The Honorable George Malhiot

The Honorable George D. Malhiot, who called Wood-Ridge home for over 80 years, leaving only to fulfill his military service and pursue higher education, passed away at the age of 97 on March 16, 2023.

Judge Malhiot was one of the oldest living alumni of Wood-Ridge High School, having graduated as a scholarathlete in the early 1940's when the school first opened. He was a Naval Aviator during WWII and the Korean War and was recalled back to active duty in the Navy Reserves, at the rank of Commander, in 1961 during the Berlin crisis.

In 1952, he married Shirley Jean Mosby of Lynchburg, VA. In 1958, he returned to Wood-Ridge and began a life of raising 7 children, starting his law practice and creating a legacy of service to the Borough of Wood-Ridge which included servings as Zoning Board Attorney, Borough Attorney, Municipal Prosecutor, Municipal Court Judge and Trustee and Counsel of the Wood-Ridge Memorial Foundation.

Additionally, he served in various leadership roles for

the Bergen County and New Jersey State Bar Associations, including Director of the Local Government Law Section for the State Bar Association, and also served as Chairman of the City-State Relations Committee for the National Institute of Municipal Law Officers.

Former Wood-Ridge Mayor Peter Incardone, who appointed George Malhiot as Municipal Court Judge in 1981, fondly recalled his friend and colleague.

"To my knowledge, no one ever had a negative word to say about George. He was simply a very fine gentleman and professional in all that he did. He was there when you needed his advice, plain and simple," stated Mayor Incardone upon learning of the judge's passing.

Judge Malhiot retired as Wood-Ridge Municipal Court Judge in 2004, during Mayor Paul Sarlo's second term as Mayor.

Mayor Sarlo expressed his sadness after hearing of Judge Malhiot's death and also described his sense of nostalgia for a generation that is now nearly gone, which included his late father, Tony "Balbo" Sarlo.
"George Malhiot is a part
of Wood-Ridge history", said

Mayor Sarlo. "He epitomized what Tom Brokaw called 'The Greatest Generation' who were born into humble beginnings in small towns, who answered their country's call to military duty during times of war, and then returned home to pursue education, start families, establish businesses, build careers, and become leaders in their community.

That was George Malhiot. Naval Officer – Lawyer – Judge – Proud Citizen of Wood-Ridge, that's how I'll remember him," said Mayor Sarlo.

After retiring in 2004, Judge Malhiot moved to the Falls Run Community in Fredericksburg, Virginia. Although several states away, the Judge continued to volunteer as cocounsel and senior advisor to the Wood-Ridge Memorial Foundation until 2015, completing 30 years of service to the organization.

Judge Malhiot was predeceased by his wife in 2008. He is survived by his children Mary, Michele, Matthew, Mark, Margueritte, Montgomery, and Michael. Judge Malhiot's and Shirley's cremains will be interred at Arlington National Cemetery.

At the FATS demonstration, students volunteered to participate in simulations of various scenarios like a domestic violence call and an active shooter situation, engaging in the split-second decisionmaking situations encountered by officers.

The event concluded with a panel discussion featuring Lt. Kelly Krenn (BCPO), Captain Ed Young (FLPD), Sergeant Nichelle Ponder, and Officers Litty Thomas and Ken Charlenea (BCSO).

Mow the Lawn, Not your foot!

Lawn care season is back and homeowners need to protect their feet and the feet of those around them when using rotary-blade lawnmowers.

Each year, some 85,000 Americans sustain injuries from power mowers, according to reports issued by the U.S. Consumer Products Safety Commission.

The blades whirl at 3,000 revolutions per minute and produce three times the kinetic energy of a .357 handgun.

Despite the stern warnings from U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission each year we continue to see patients who have been hurt while operating a lawnmower barefoot.

Children under the age of 14 and adults over the age of 44 are more likely to be injured from mowers than others.

We advise anyone who operates a power mower to take a few simple precautions:

· Don't mow a wet lawn. Losing control from slipping on rain-soaked grass is the leading cause of foot injuries caused by power mowers.

Stroke Think "FAST"

- F: Face drooping.
- A: Arm/leg weakness.
- **S:** Speech difficulties.
- **T:** Time to call 911.

· Wear heavy shoes or work boots when mowing – no sneakers or sandals.

- · Don't allow small children to ride on the lap of an adult on a lawn tractor. Children can be severely injured by the blades when getting on or off the machine.
- Mow across slopes, never go up or down.
- Never pull a running mower backwards.
- Keep children away from the lawn when mowing.
- Keep the clip bag attached when operating a power mower to prevent projectile injuries.
- Use a mower with a release mechanism on the handle that automatically shuts it off when the hands let go.

If a mower accident occurs, immediate treatment is necessary to flush the wound thoroughly and oral or IV antibiotics to prevent infection. Superficial wounds can be treated on an outpatient basis, but more serious injuries usually require surgical intervention to repair tendon damage, deep clean the wound and suture it.

Tendons severed in lawnmower accidents generally can be surgically reattached unless toes have been amputated. ###

You can restore your smile with **Dental Implants**

If you lose or break a tooth, a dental implant may be the best option for restoring your smile.

What is a dental implant?

A dental implant is a post, usually made of titanium, that serves as a substitute for a natural tooth's root. The implant is placed in the jawbone so that it may fuse with the natural bone to become a sturdy foundation for a replacement tooth. Implants can be used to replace individual teeth or to support a bridge or denture containing multiple teeth.

Who can receive implants? Dental implants can be provided to most patients who are missing teeth due to decay, disease, injury or other medical conditions. You also may be a candidate for a dental implant if you can't wear dentures or find them uncomfortable, or if you don't want to sacrifice existing tooth structure to support a dental bridge.

Since surgery is required, implant patients must be in good general health with healthy gums and adequate bone structure. If an implant site lacks the adequate structure, a dentist may be able to perform procedures to improve

Implants are not for everyone, however. Conditions such as bruxism, diabetes or leukemia may interfere with healing after implant surgery. This also is the case for patients taking bisphosphonates for osteoporosis.

Additionally, patients who drink alcohol or use tobacco may not be good candidates for implants. Talk with your general dentist to find out whether dental implants are right for you.

How does implant placement work? An Oral Surgeon or your dentist will perform surgery to place the implant in your jaw.

Next, the surrounding bone will heal via a process called osseointegration, during which the bone grows around the implant to hold it firmly in place.

After adequate healing, which can take two to three or more months, the restorative phase can continue.

The dentist will fabricate an abutment which is another structure usually made of titanium as well. This abutment attaches to the implant and extends and is exposed above the gums. It is upon the abutment that a crown can be attached. The crown will look like and function like a natural tooth.

How long does implant placement take? Once the implant placement surgery is completed — usually in an hour or two — the healing process begins for approximately three months (and may differ in length of time). Additionally, the fitting of the permanent replacement tooth is usually accomplished in one to three weeks.

Your dentist may provide you with a temporary replacement to help you eat and speak normally until the permanent replacement is ready.

If your bone structure is strong enough, however, your dentist may be able to place the implant and replacement tooth in one visit.

What can I expect after the procedure? Most patients will adjust to implants immediately. Some people may feel slight discomfort or notice differences in their chewing or speech, but these symptoms are usually temporary.

How should I care for my **implant?** A major reason some implants fail is due to poor oral hygiene. It's important to brush implants at least twice a day, as well as to floss.

Additionally, as many as four dental cleanings per year may be necessary to maintain gingival health. Maintenance is very necessary.

If you think that dental implants may be an option for you, see your dentist for an examination and screening.

- Avoid smoking, vaping, and the use of other tobacco products. People can and do quit smoking for good. Source: cdc.gov




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Artful Thinking

Historically Speaking

As Memorial Day approaches and Americans reflect upon the cost of freedom, it is a good time to ponder on this noble recognition.

The Purple Heart is a United States military decoration awarded in the name of the President to those who have been wounded or killed while serving on or after April 5, 1917 with the U.S. Military.

The original Purple Heart was established by George Washington when he was commander-in-chief of the Continental Army by order from his headquarters on August 7, 1782 at Newburgh, N.Y.

This was designated as the Badge of Military Merit. It was in the form of a heart of purple cloth. This award was only given to three Revolutionary War soldiers. However, the award had never been abolished.

General Douglas MacArthur, then Army Chief of Staff, sent Congress a draft to revive the Badge of Military Merit.

Elizabeth Will, of the Office of the Quartermaster General, was named to redesign the newly revived medal. MacArthur called in the Washington Commission of Fine Arts. The Commission solicited plaster models from three leading sculptors. John R. Sinnock of the Philadelphia Mint was chosen in May 1931. His plaster cast of the head of George Washington is the one seen today.

The medal is a purple heart edged in gold with a profile of George Washington upon it. Above the heart is the coat of arms of George Washington between sprigs of green leaves.

The reverse is a bronze heart with the words FOR MILITARY MERIT below the coat of arms and leaves. The ribbon is purple edged with 1/8 inch wide white stripe. By Executive Order of The President of the United States and War Department General Order No. 3, dated February 22, 1932, the Purple Heart was reinstituted to honor the 200th Anniversary of Washington's birth.

The 1932 order authorized that the medal could be awarded to soldiers who were wounded or received a Meritorious

Service Citation subsequent to April 5, 1917. This was the day before the United States entered World War I. The first new Purple Heart was awarded to General MacArthur.

With the establishment of the Legion of Merit Medal, the Purple Heart was now only awarded for wounds received in action. In December 1942, the award was extended to Navy, Marines and Coast Guard members. In May 1944, it was extended to civilian personnel during the World War II era.

The Purple Heart differs from all other U.S. decorations as the individual is not "recommended" for the award; rather he or she is entitled to it upon meeting certain criteria.

The individual must have received a wound as the result of enemy action. A wound as defined by the regulations covering the award, is an injury caused to any part of the body from an outside force or agent sustained from combat that was treated by a medical officer and the treatment was made a matter of the official record.

Wounds are enemy related injuries when caused by bullet, shrapnel, or any other enemy related projectile; injury caused by enemy landmine, naval mine or trap; injury caused by the enemy release of chemical, biological or nuclear agents; injury from a vehicle or aircraft accident caused by enemy fire; concussion related injuries caused by enemy generated explosions.

Injuries not qualifying are: frostbite, trench foot, heat stroke, food poisoning, accidents not caused by enemy action, combat fatigue, post-traumatic stress and self-inflicted wounds.

The Purple Heart Medal is only issued for the first wound. Subsequent awards are denoted by oak leaf clusters in the Army and Air Force and by 5/16 inch stars in the Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard.

The most Purple Hearts ever awarded to one person was nine. Marine Sgt. Albert L. Ireland received five in World War II and four in Korea. Some noted recipients are; James Arness, actor, Rocky Bleier,

football player, John F. Kennedy, President of the United States, John McCain, Arizona Senator, Warren Spahn, baseball player and Lex, USMC, military working dog.

Additional changes to the regulations were made with Executive Order 11016 dated April 25, 1962 that included provisions for posthumous award of the Purple Heart and in 1997 Congress passed legislation prohibiting future awards to civilians. Civilian employees of the U.S. Department of Defense who are killed or wounded may receive the Defense of Freedom Medal.

There are two organizations that are connected with the Purple Heart. The first is the National Purple Heart Hall of Honor. This organization was formed by a resolution of Congress in 2002. They are located at 374 Temple Hill Road, Vails Gate, NY 12584-0207. Their mission is to list every person who has been awarded the Purple Heart Medal. Information can be found at their web site www.thepurpleheart.com or by phone at 1-877-28HONOR. Recipients that have been recorded can be accessed on line.

The Military Order of the Purple Heart was chartered by Congress in 1958. Its membership is only open to Purple Heart recipients. However, their mission is to assist not only wounded Veterans but all Veterans in need. They work with the Veterans Administration and lobby Congress on behalf of Veteran interests.

They have a scholarship program and now recognize Law Officers, Firefighters and other first responders who are killed or wounded in the line of duty. The next time you see a member of our Armed Forces or a Veteran with a Purple Heart ribbon or riding in a car with a Purple Heart License Plate, thank that person because they gave their blood for you and America's freedom. ###

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Let's Go Traveling!

Las Vegas May 2023

Change is the only thing that is constant in Las Vegas. The city was founded in 1905 as a watering stop for steam engines along the Union Pacific Railroad line to Southern California.

The year 1931 proved to be pivotal for the area with the start of construction on Hoover Dam and the legalization of gambling. At the time, the population of the vast area of southern Nevada's Clark County totaled less than 9,000 inhabitants compared to the current estimate of nearly 2.5 million residents.

The area began as a compact town centered around Fremont Street, now known as Downtown. For many years, virtually all gaming took place in this original part of town, nicknamed Glitter Gulch. What is commonly thought of as Las Vegas, actually sits outside the city limits in the unincorporated areas of Paradise and Winchester.

Las Vegas Boulevard, commonly known as The Strip, began to come of age after World War II. Two western theme casino hotels, El Rancho Vegas and The Last Frontier, lined the former US Route 91.

In 1946, the Fabulous Flamingo opened featuring more sophisticated and glamorous resort style amenities. With the opening of the first showroom there, celebrity entertainment has been a prominent draw for visitors ever since.

The 1940s and 1950s introduced more casino resorts to the area including the Sands, Stardust, Dunes, Desert Inn, Tropicana, Thunderbird, and Sahara

The 1955 opening of the former Riviera brought the first high-rise property with a whopping nine stories! (The long-delayed Fontainebleau Las Vegas is expected to open by 2024 with sixty-eight floors.)

Recent openings include the Resorts World Complex with three distinct hotel brands



sharing a large casino on the site of the former Stardust, and the adults-only Circa Resort anchoring The Fremont Street Experience entertainment zone.

Over the decades, virtually every top entertainer has graced Las Vegas stages. Numerous entertainers have performed extended appearances known as a residency. These shows complement the one-night or two-night shows in arena settings. The Smith Center for the Performing Arts features symphony, ballet, and touring company performances.

Revues have a lengthy history in Las Vegas with notable long-running shows of the past such as the Follies Bergère and Lido di Paris. Currently, Cirque du Soleil has six different shows performing, including their newest, Mad Apple, at the New York-New York Hotel. A variety of free performances of all kinds are peppered along The Strip or Fremont Street.

A recent phenomenon is the rise in Day Clubs. These are like night clubs but are held during daylight hours at select hotel pools. I recently attended the outstanding Beatles-themed Cirque production of Love at the Mirage. (The Mirage has been sold and will transition to Hard Rock complete with a new guitar-shaped hotel tower.)

After years of having been ignored for fear of gambling tainting its integrity, the sports world has now embraced Las Vegas.

The Golden Knights battled for the Stanley Cup during their inaugural 2017-2018 season in the NHL. The city was successful in luring the Oakland Raiders to a state-of-the-art Allegiant Stadium within walking distance of several casino hotels just two seasons ago.

Next year's Super Bowl LVIII will be hosted there February 11, 2024. Government and civic leaders are now pushing to have the MLB's Oakland Athletics also relocate to a future stadium in the area.

A Formula 1 Grand Prix race will be held on Las Vegas Boulevard and surrounding streets this November. The new Circa Resort features Stadium Swim with a forty-foot-tall video screen to watch these and other sporting events while sunbathing or swimming.

For many years, gaming was the area's only focal point

for visitors, but now food and shopping are also major draws.

Numerous celebrity chefs have set up shop in casino hotels. These restaurants join long-standing favorites such as the Golden Steer Steakhouse and Battista's Hole in The Wall. Long famous for all-you-caneat buffets, about half of these remain closed from the Covid era with their return uncertain.

When I first visited Las Vegas in 1973, the area featured just one shopping center.

The opening of the Fashion Show Mall in 1981 ushered in high-end shopping on The Strip. Shopping for luxury goods and gourmet dining now dot complexes in and near casino resorts along The Strip in a trend initiated by Caesars Forum Shops.

Activities away from the casinos abound in the valley. The Red Rock Conservation Area, about twenty miles from The Strip, features over thirty miles of hiking trails. A little further down the road is Spring Mountain Ranch State Park.

This former private home and working ranch provides a lush green outpost great for picnics and additional hiking. Valley of Fire State Park is northeast of Las Vegas and the place to see Native American petroglyphs.

Beautiful Lake Mead, created by the construction of Hoover Dam, provides boating options just a short drive away. (Unfortunately, the lake's level has dropped significantly due to reduced rainfall and increased water usage.)

My recent drive to the village of Mount Charleston, where snow still lined the road, provided a 30 degree drop in temperature due to being over 5,000 feet above the valley floor.

There are numerous other choices to fill your day. These include zip lines, a 550-foottall Ferris wheel, Fly Over Las Vegas (like Disney's Soarin'), helicopter rides, the Neon Museum, the Mob Museum, or trips to the Grand Canyon.

Within Clark County there are additional small resort towns such as Laughlin and Mesquite. All in all, there is an abundance of activities supplementing Nevada's famed gaming options.

Las Vegas continues to grow and change but remains a great vacation spot even if you do not gamble. But perhaps you may win \$300 in a casino Bingo Hall, as I recently did!

Is a Permit Required for This?

When it's time to sell your home, you'll have a lot on your plate. The last thing you need is to realize that you didn't get proper permits for the improvements you made over the years. This discovery can become a headache of monstrous proportions when trying to sell.

Retroactive permits can be very difficult to navigate, and the alternative is even worse—ripping out all the work you did and starting over with a proper permit in place.

There's never a situation where skipping a required permit is a good idea. If you think you're making an improvement that will appeal to buyers, but you skip the permitting process because you want to save a little time and money, think again.

All that work you're doing to your home could easily be for naught and will mean nothing to a homebuyer if it's not done correctly. The purpose of permitting is to ensure that the work is being done by a licensed professional and is safe and up to code.

Unpermitted work can be a safety hazard, an insurance nightmare, could potentially cost you in money, time and endless headaches in the long run. Just a few projects that require permits in most New Jersey towns are:

 - Re-roofing
 - Demolition of any part of

the home

If you're doing work on the systems in your home, those projects sometimes require specialized permits. For example, installing a new underground sprinkler system can mean you have to secure a plumbing permit. The best way to find out what's required is to contact your local permitting office.

But – good news for handy homeowners – not all renovation projects need permits. Cosmetic improvements like painting, decks under a certain height, installing new cabinets, putting in new countertops, a whole-house fan, repairing the driveway, building a small fence and more can be accomplished with needing to apply for permits.

What happens if you don't get a permit? It might be tempting to try and skip the permitting process especially because it can be a burden.

However, neglecting to obtain a permit can easily lead to major problems with your town. You might be subjected to hefty fees, or your project could be halted. In some cases, as stated earlier, the town might even require you to destroy the work that's already been completed because there's no way to tell whether the work is up to code. And unpermitted home renovations can definitely hurt sellers when they try to sell their house.

When in doubt, it's always best to contact your municipality to double check the permitting requirements for the projects you hope to complete. Remember, the permit process isn't just red tape, it's actually there to keep you, your family and your buyers safe and secure. It might take a little more time, but it's worth it, guaranteed.


