## **Veterans Day Service Nov. 11**

Hasbrouck Heights, Lodi, Moonachie and Wood-Ridge Veterans will each hold a brief Veterans Day service on Tuesday, November 11th at 11:00 a.m. at their monuments. The public is invited.

Origins: In 1921, an unknown World War I American soldier was buried in Arlington National Cemetery. Similar ceremonies occurred earlier in England and France, where an unknown soldier was buried in each nation's highest place of honor (in England, Westminster Abbey; in France, the Arc de Triomphe).

These memorial services took place on November 11, the anniversary of the end of World War I at 11:00 a.m., November 11, 1918 (the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month), which became known as Armistice Day.

Armistice Day officially became a holiday in the US in 1926, and a national holiday 12 years later. On June 1, 1954, the name was changed to Veterans Day to honor all US Veterans.

In 1968, new legislation changed the national commemoration of Veterans Day to the fourth Monday in October. It soon became apparent, however, that November 11 was a date of historic significance to

many Americans. Therefore, in 1978, Congress returned the observance to its traditional date

Official national ceremonies for Veterans Day center around the Tomb of the Unknowns. To honor these men, symbolic of all Americans who gave their lives in all wars, an Army Honor Guard, the 3rd U.S. Infantry (*The Old Guard*), keeps day and night vigil.

At 11 a.m. on November 11, a combined color guard representing all military services executes "Present Arms" at the tomb. The nation's tribute to its war dead is symbolized by the laying of a Presidential wreath and the playing of "Taps." ###

## Fall Back November 2 -- Change Your Clock, Change Your Battery

residents to adopt a simple yet crucial habit of changing smoke alarm and carbon monoxide detector batteries when changing clocks back to Standard Time on November 2, 2008.

Warnings from smoke alarms can provide those critical extra seconds people need to get out of their homes safely.

Even though 96 percent of American homes have at least one smoke alarm, 19 percent of those households' detectors are not working, mostly due to missing or dead batteries.

In the U.S., roughly 80 percent of fire deaths result from fires in homes without workhome fire deaths resulted from fires in the small percentage of homes (five percent) without any smoke alarms. 83% of all civilian fire-related deaths are a result of home fires.

Fire deaths peak in winter months — December through

"The peak time for home fire fatalities is between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. when most families are sleeping," said Hasbrouck Heights Fire Chief Michael Ratkowski.

"Smoke alarm maintenance is a simple, effective way to reduce home fire deaths. Children and senior citizens

Our area Fire Chiefs urge ing smoke alarms. Half of the are most at risk, and a working smoke alarm can give them the extra seconds they need to get out safely," stated Wood-Ridge Fire Chief Anthony Gentile.

> Moonachie Fire Chief William Hunt Jr. added, "Tragically, many people mistakenly believe they'd be awakened by the smell of smoke in time to escape. Clinical experiments have found the sense of smell actually lessens when people are asleep. Therefore, when smoke enters a bedroom, it does not always awaken the individual."

Lodi Fire Chief Joseph Baldino added, "Smoke disorients people and dulls their senses, making it less likely other cues, such as cries for help, will awaken them. This is why working home smoke alarms are so important."

Children are particularly vulnerable during home fires. Children ages five and under are twice as likely as the population as a whole to die in home fires. Adults ages 65 and older are two times more likely to die in a home fire; those ages 75 and older are three times more likely and those ages 85 and older are 4.5 times more likely to die in a home fire. Many older adults need assistance and cannot escape by themselves in time.

Working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in a home fire nearly in half by providing an early warning and critical extra seconds to escape.

In addition to changing smoke alarm and carbon monoxide batteries, smoke alarms should be replaced every 10

The National Fire Alarm Code recommends a minimum of one smoke alarm on each level of a home, including one inside each bedroom for new construction and one outside each sleeping area. Homes should also have at least one working carbon monoxide detector. ###

- Never use lit candles to decorate a tree, and make sure any lit candles in the room are placed away from tree branches.

# **TEB Pump Station Receives Engineering Award**

On October 14, 2008, Dewberry Engineering presented a copy of the panel that was used for presentation for an engineering award, to the Teterboro Mayor and Council.

The Redevelopment for Vincent Place Stormwater Pumping Station and Housing Units, Teterboro, NJ, was given a Distinguished Award from the American Council of Engineering Companies-New Jersey chapter for engineering excellence (2007).

The redevelopment of Vincent Place paved the way for much-needed residential and open space, while consolidating three aging stormwater facilities.

The new Pumping Station, utilizing six 6-foot diameter Archimedes screw pumps and 96-inch storm drains, blends with the architecture of the residences and embraces smart growth principles.

This project was envisioned to complete redevelopment of a Department of Public Works (DPW) site by consolidating three aging stormwater pumping stations into a more robust facility while making way for much-needed residential space.

The new \$5 million Vincent Place Stormwater Pumping Station project synthesizes these goals to provide improved stormwater management, new townhome properties and significant open space for the Borough of Teterboro's residents. The drainage improvements affect both community residents and users of Teterboro Airport.

As the civil engineer for



the Vincent Place Pumping Station project, Dewberry performed the following tasks: field survey; site/civil, geotechnical, mechanical and environmental engineering; permitting; and construction administration and inspection services. Joseph G. Marra, AIA provided architectural design services and worked very closely with Dewberry throughout the project.



# Ragamuffin Parades Were "Boo-ti-ful"


























# Seniors' Haunted Halloween Party

























## "The bully never remembers, the outcast never forgets"

On October 15, 2008, school violence expert and antibullying activist, Jodee Blanco, made day-long presentations to the Wood-Ridge High School students, the Moonachie R. L. Craig School students, conducted a teachers' workshop in Wood-Ridge and held a parent/community seminar at The Fiesta that evening.


Ms. Blanco is creator and producer of the "It's NOT Just Joking Around!TM" anti-bullying education program.

"School bullying is the #1 fear of teens," according to Ms. Blanco.

As a survivor, she understands how it is to be the school outcast, and knows first-hand what it's like to contemplate "retaliation."

From 5th Grade, she was shunned and tormented by her peers, simply for being different. As an adult, she decided to go public with her story, because she was frustrated with the nation's perception of the true cause of the school tragedies in Columbine, San Diego, and dozens of other locations across America.

She stated, "I open up



and share the story of what happened to me. I specifically address the bullies, and draw climactic attention to the severe damage that they cause. Bystanders are encouraged to speak up without fearing retribution. Then, I shift gears and focus on how to survive school bullying."

During her presentation, she leads an open, honest discussion about bullying and the dynamic of a group of kids picking on an underdog.

There are often lively and candid exchanges between the students. Following the discussion, there is a Q&A, followed by one-on-one time with students who need private attention. A teacher workshop follows.

While students can be inspired to change, and teachers educated on how to support that change, parents must reinforce it in the home. During the evening session, she provided several pointers for the parents, such as how to tell if your child is a bully, a target, or a bystander; ways to relate to the child, and how to take action, if necessary.







## **Pharmacist** Corner

#### **Medicare Part D 2009**

The plans for Medicare Part D have been released and open enrollment once again begins November 15th to the end of December for those that choose to switch plans.

As always, it is in your best interest to carefully evaluate and compare your existing plan with other plans so you avoid spending extra money during the upcoming year.

Many changes have occurred for 2009 including increases in premiums and copays and adjustments to plans' formularies or what drugs may be covered.

For instance, Humana's basic plan, with 1.5 million members, plans to charge monthly premiums of \$38.90, up from \$34.50 this year. United Health Group's AARP "preferred" plan, with 2.7 million members, will lift premiums 13 percent to \$37.

In 2009, the average oneyear premium increase for over 60 percent of people with Medicare--those enrolled in the 10 largest drug plans--will exceed 30 percent.

I have always stressed that shopping around helps you discover other, less popular plans with lower monthly costs and good benefits.

Here are the highlights for the basic structure of Part D for 2009:

- Initial Deductible: from \$275 in 2008 to \$295 in
- Initial Coverage Limit: from \$2,510 in 2008 to \$2,700 in 2009
- Out-of-Pocket Threshold: from \$4,050 in 2008 to \$4,350 in 2009
- Minimum Cost-sharing in the Catastrophic Coverage Portion of the Benefit: from \$2.25 for generic or preferred drug that is a multisource drug and \$5.60 for all other drugs in 2008 to \$2.40 for generics and \$6.00 for other drugs in 2009
- Maximum Co-payments below the Out-of-Pocket Threshold for certain Low Income Full Subsidy Eligible Enrollees: from \$2.25 for generic or pre-

ferred drug that is a multisource drug and \$5.60 for all other drugs in 2008 to \$2.40 for generics and \$6.00 for other drugs in 2009

In 2009, there are five less plans (57 to 52) in NJ and five less plans (32 to 27) with \$0 deductible.

Also, the number of plans with any gap coverage in the donut hole decreased from 18 to 13 and the cheapest plan is now \$41.60 vs. \$30.00 last year.

The most drastic change involves the plans that serve low income subsidy (LIS) pa-

In 2008, there were 18 plans that served Medicaid, PAAD, and other LIS patients whereas in 2009 there are only seven. Eleven plans dropped out from helping patients who need help the most as far as what drugs are covered.

I urge everyone that is on a Medicare Part D plan to look at their current plan and make sure that it still is the best plan for 2009.

Last year I did 400 evaluations, so please contact me early to help you determine what 2 plans will be best for

Out of the 400 people that I helped, 70 percent switched plans and saved money and the other 30 percent had peace of mind they were on the best plan. I look forward to assisting you.

## **AARP Learns More About Medicare Part D**

Linda Cross, from the Division of Senior Services in Bergen County, was the guest speaker at the last meeting of the Central Bergen Chapter 418 of AARP. Ms. Cross is an expert on all current information related to Medicare.

Medicare Part A helps to cover inpatient care in hospitals, including critical access hospitals and skilled nursing facilities (but not custodial or long-term care).

Medicare Part B helps to cover doctor's services and outpatient care, some of the services of physical and occupational therapists and some in-home care. Medicare Part D, which is an optional coverage, helps to cover prescription drugs.

The primary focus of her presentation was on the changes that will take place in 2009 affecting Medicare Part D.

Ms. Cross indicated that the Medicare Part D plan will change each year.

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) each year releases a Defined



Standard Benefit or standard Medicare Part D plan as a model for the next year's Medicare Part D plan.

She stated that the Medicare Part A deductible would go up but that the Medicare Part B deductible would remain the same in 2009.

Ms. Cross asked all seniors to be informed that their present provider company must send out a package of their plans for 2009 before October 31st. Seniors will also receive unsolicited mail from other providers with the hope to have

you sign up with them. She suggested seniors complete a Drug Worksheet and send it to her. Her office will help seniors find the best three plans that meet their individual prescription needs.

Ms. Cross reminded all that the Annual Election Period to select a provider is November 15 to December 15. She also advised against paying providers by having the monthly payments automatically deducted from Social Security checks.





# Faith Matters: World Food Day

First Presbyterian Church of Moonachie held a town-wide food drive in mid-October. Partly as an experiment of faith and partly as a response to the bad news that's reported every day, we challenged ourselves and our community to create some good news that we could share with everyone, offering food to the Bergen County Center for Food Action.

Volunteers from the Moonachie EMS/Rescue Squad walked every street one Saturday morning, leaving an invitation at every household. Letters were sent to the industries and services in the town. The police department loaned their sign to help spread the word. On October 10 and 11, the Church opened its doors from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., for people to drop off donations, which were dedicated as a special offering on Sunday, October 12.

People responded generously. The employees at Burger King held their own drive in the store and brought the results to share. Many individuals brought bags—many others brought cases. Gifts of money will be used to purchase turkeys and hams for the holidays, as well as gift certificates for the grocery stores, so that people with special needs can shop for themselves. The committee receiving donations set up one table in the morning—at the end of the day there were five tables piled with evidence of our community's willingness to share.

Those who participated in the drive, whether canvassing, collecting, delivering, or just "eating for Jesus," all worked hard and had a wonderful time, showing once again that you don't have to be a big Church to glorify and enjoy our God.
