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Apollo 12: Second Manned Lunar Landing Mission Revisited

On November 20, 2009, at 7 p.m., noted space historian and Education specialist expert, Joe Lennox, will give a 40th anniversary Retrospective of the Apollo 12 mission at the NJ Aviation Hall of Fame. Admission is \$7, children and seniors \$5.

Launched from Kennedy Space Center on November 14,

1969, this sixth manned mission in the Apollo program was the second to land on the moon (just four months after Apollo 11). Key objectives were to achieve more precise landing, visit Surveyor 3 probe, bring back part of it for analysis.

Using a multi-media presentation, Mr. Lennox will give the nuts & bolts of the mission, demonstrate how the mission worked, and answer any questions.

Lennox will display his Apollo memorabilia, items from his personal scrapbook and collectables.

Mutual Aid Knocks Down LF Apartment Fire

Little Ferry firefighters teamed up with mutual aid units to quickly knock down heavy fire that was consuming a first-floor apartment of a two-story ordinary O.M.D. (occupied multiple dwelling) on September 25, 2009.

Shortly after 11:00 p.m., fire companies were dispatched to 64 Route 46 west, and the dispatcher reported on his initial transmission that it was a working fire. Upon arrival, Assistant Chief Rob Cordasco

found fire blowing out of the first floor side windows and ordered his dispatcher to transmit a working fire assignment.

This assignment sent Ridgefield Park Truck 1, Moonachie Engine 3 and Hasbrouck Heights Rescue (F.A.S.T. Team) to the scene. Later, Moonachie Tower 805 was called to the

Little Ferry Engine 309 layed in and members stretched two 1-3/4-inch handlines to the building. Engine 306 established a secondary water supply and worked with handlines in the building. Moonachie assisted with ventilation and overhaul. Ridgefield Park vented the roof and checked the cockloft for any extension.

WRFD Holds Annual Inspection

Mayor Sarlo and Commissioner Gonnella gave special recognition of Meritorious Service to Department members for actions taken by the Wood-Ridge Emergency Squad who saved a woman's life.

On September 12, 2009, the Wood-Ridge Emergency Squad was sent to the aid of an unresponsive citizen. Within three minutes they were on-scene attending to an unconscious woman. Within moments, she had gone into respiratory arrest.

Emergency Squad Lt. Christopher Materia, EMTs Gregory Gorab and Gilbert Ruiz and Fire Lt. Ron Phillips Jr. began CPR compressions,



ventilation and applied the defibrillator. The patient received one shock.

The patient was resuscitated on-scene. Paramedics from HUMC arrived and initiated advanced life-saving interventions. The patient was stabilized and transported by ambulance to HUMC. Four days later, she returned home.

Assistant Chief Thomas Burniston, Lt. Scott Russo and Firefighters Timothy Sullivan, Michael Williams, Angel Martinez, Daniel Flores and Thomas Sarracino assisted at the scene.

Formal presentations were made at the regular Mayor and

Council Meeting held on October 20, 2009.

Following this recognition, the equipment and headquarters were presented for inspection and Department personnel were available to answer any questions. The program concluded with a Benediction by Fr. Paul Sinnema. The Department was dismissed and light refreshments were served.

The event was attended by local officials, as well as Fire Chiefs from mutual aid towns. ###

Operators Recognized at NBAA Convention for "Quiet Flying" at Teterboro Airport

Teterboro Airport (TEB) presented its "Good Neighbor Awards" at the NBAA Convention in Orlando, Florida on October 20, 2009.

The program honors individuals and companies for "quiet flying" at TEB. Awards were given to 29 recipients this year, a new record number for the airport.

To qualify for an award, operators must adhere to Teterboro Airport's voluntary restraints regarding late-night and Stage 2 jet operations and not have received any violations or warnings under the airport's mandatory noise rules. This year's ceremony recognized recipients for 2008.

"There is no better venue than the annual convention of the National Business Aviation Association to present our Good Neighbor Awards" said Rich Heslin, Airport Manager at Teterboro Airport. "There is harmony in the two events as the general aviation community gathers to share its common interests, including good community relations."

"It's a great pleasure for us to present these awards to the growing number of aircraft operators that fully comply with our noise abatement initiatives," said Gabriel Andino, TEB's Noise Abatement Manager. "The criteria for these awards are quite challenging and we are thrilled to have so many operators doing their best to fly quiet."

Teterboro Airport launched the Good Neighbor Awards in 2004 to give credit to operators who avoided violations of airport noise rules and latenight operations. The awards program has become part of the Teterboro Airport Industry Working Group, which was formed by Port Authority Chairman Anthony R. Coscia to improve safety, security and reduce noise at the airport. The Working Group includes leading trade groups, such as the National Air Transportation Association (NATA), National **Business Aviation Association** (NBAA), General Aviation Manufacturers Association (GAMA), Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association (AOPA), TEB fixed base operators, and other major operators such as NetJets. The group is cochaired by former Congressman James Coyne, President of NATA, and Joseph Fazio, General Manager of Atlantic Aviation at TEB.

Created to address safety and security at TEB - one of America's busiest general aviation airports – the program also highlights noise abatement with voluntary restraints against operating Stage 2 jets into the airport and from operating any aircraft between 11:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.

According to Mr. Andino, "The voluntary nighttime and Stage 2 flight restraints have proven to be effective since their implementation. Flights after 11:00 p.m. have been reduced considerably since 2006. Our nighttime aircraft noise levels and complaint calls have also declined during that time frame.

Mr. Andino added, "The increased number of awards being presented this year shows that more operators are responding to our efforts to make Teterboro Airport a better neighbor.

The NBAA convention is an excellent venue to thank them for their continued commitment to our noise abatement program."

Fall Back November 1 Change Your Clock, Change Your Battery

Our area Fire Chiefs urge a result of home fires. residents to adopt a simple, yet alarm and carbon monoxide detector batteries when changing clocks back to Standard Time on November 1, 2009.

Warnings from smoke alarms can provide those critical extra seconds people need to get out of their homes safely.

Even though 96 percent of American homes have at least one smoke alarm, 19 percent of those households' detectors are not working, mostly due to missing or dead batteries.

In the U.S., roughly 80 percent of fire deaths result from fires in homes without working smoke alarms. Half of the home fire deaths resulted from fires in the small percentage of homes (five percent) without any smoke alarms. 83% of all civilian fire-related deaths are

Fire deaths peak in winter crucial habit of changing smoke months — December through February.

> The peak time for home fire fatalities is between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. when most families are sleeping," said Hasbrouck Heights Fire Chief Michael Ratkowski.

> "Smoke alarm maintenance is a simple, effective way to reduce home fire deaths. Children and senior citizens are most at risk, and a working smoke alarm can give them the extra seconds they need to get out safely," stated Wood-Ridge Fire Chief Anthony Gentile.

> Moonachie Fire Chief Justin Derevyanik added, "Tragically, many people mistakenly believe they'd be awakened by the smell of smoke in time to escape. Clinical experiments have found the sense of smell

are asleep. Therefore, when smoke enters a bedroom, it does not always awaken the Schwedhelm stated, "Working

Lodi Fire Chief Greg Telep added, "Smoke disorients people and dulls their senses, making it less likely other cues, such as cries for help, will awaken them. This is why working home smoke alarms are so important."

Children are particularly vulnerable during home fires. Children ages five and under are twice as likely as the population as a whole to die in home fires. Adults ages 65 and older are two times more likely to die in a home fire; those ages 75 and older are three times more likely and those ages 85 and older are 4.5 times more likely to die in a home fire. Many older adults need assistance and

actually lessens when people cannot escape by themselves in time.

> Little Ferry Fire Chief Paul smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in a home fire nearly in half by providing an early warning and critical extra seconds to escape."

> In addition to changing smoke alarm and carbon monoxide batteries, smoke alarms should be replaced every 10 years.

> The National Fire Alarm Code recommends a minimum of one smoke alarm on each level of a home, including one inside each bedroom for new construction and one outside each sleeping area. Homes should also have at least one working carbon monoxide detector. ###

Veterans Day Services

On Saturday, November 7, 2009, Wood-Ridge Veterans will have a Mass at Assumption Church at 8 a.m., and a Veterans Service at 10 a.m.

On Sunday, November 8, 2009, The NJ Aviation Hall of Fame and Museum will hold a regional "Salute To Veterans" program at 11 a.m. in their parking lot, 400 Fred Wehran Drive, Teterboro, NJ. Parking is available at Dassault/FalconJet, 200 Riser Road, Little Ferry, with a short walk to the Museum.

Hasbrouck Heights, Lodi, and Moonachie will each hold brief Veterans Day services on Wednesday, November 11th, at 11 a.m., at their respective monuments.

Origins: In 1921, an unknown World War I American soldier was buried in Arlington National Cemetery. Similar ceremonies occurred earlier in England and France, where an unknown soldier was buried in each nation's highest place of honor (in England, Westminster Abbey; in France, the Arc de Triomphe).

These memorial services took place on November 11, the anniversary of the end of World War I at 11:00 a.m., November 11, 1918 (the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month), which became known as Armistice Day.

Armistice Day officially became a holiday in the US in 1926, and a national holiday 12 years later. On June 1, 1954, the name was changed to Veterans Day to honor all U.S. Veterans. In 1968, new legislation changed Veterans Day to the fourth Monday in October. Since November 11 was a date of historic significance to many Americans, in 1978, Congress returned to its traditional date.

Official national ceremonies for Veterans Day center around the Tomb of the Unknowns. To honor these men, symbolic of all Americans who gave their lives in all wars, an Army Honor Guard, the 3rd U.S. Infantry (The Old Guard), keeps day and night vigil.

At 11 a.m. on November 11, a combined color guard of all military services executes "Present Arms" at the tomb. The nation's tribute is symbolized by the laying of a Presidential wreath and the playing of "Taps." ###

W-R Re-dedicates Bowman Park

On Saturday, September 19, 2009, the community of Wood-Ridge re-dedicated a park on Jocelyn Avenue to honor one their fallen heros.

In attendance were his sisters Patricia Larsen and Judith Quail and their families.

Harry Thomas Bowman II was born August 31, 1945. He graduated Wood-Ridge High School in 1963. He attended college in Tennessee and joined the ROTC program. In 1966, he enlisted in the Navy, became a hospitalman and served as a medic with the 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines, M Company.

HM3 Harry Thomas Bowman II, USN, was killed in action on Mother's Day, May, 9, 1968. He was awarded The Silver Star posthumously.

According to the citation, during Operation HOUSTON II in Thua Thien, South Vietnam, Bowman's unit came under intense fire from a well entrenched force wounding several Marines.

Observing three injured Marines lying in an open area exposed to hostile fire, he courageously maneuvered across the fire swept terrain and carried the most seriously injured man to safety. Returning to the hazardous area, he brought a second Marine to safety.

While tending the third casualty, he was wounded twice.

According to a member of his unit, Rock Giambrocco, "Doc worked rapidly, he

ignored his own injuries. I glanced up and saw him shield the body of that Marine as a hail of automatic gunfire rained down upon them."

"Within a matter of a few seconds, there was another burst of automatic fire. This time Doc was hit for the third time. He kneeled for a second, then slumped over the Marine he had been trying to save. Doc was dead."

"Doc was a very smart man. He knew the bush, he knew the enemy, and he knew his job. He had a great sense of humor and was always ready to help when he was needed. He was the best medical assistance any Marine could have hoped for. He had a combination of courage, focus, and a strong sense of duty and honor."

Another fellow Marine, Jerry Lomax, wrote, "You were always fun to be around. You were always serious when you had to be. You cared more about Your Marines than you did yourself. This caring cost you your life and to this day, you are my biggest hero. You knew what had to be done even in the face of a vicious and deadly battle. From that moment on, you left a memory that remains, even after 32 years with all those Marines that knew you." Photos and story with the assistance of Marion Davidowicz. ###




A Hobby Becomes a Career for Al Masch





























Little Ferry Mardi Gras

Little Ferry has been holding town days since 1994, its centennial year. ###

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

History of Moonachie

(Editor's Note: In celebration of its 100th Anniversary, over the course of the next year, The Gazette Newspaper is providing a multi-part series of Moonachie's history. The following is reprinted as written, from the 1960 Fiftieth Gold Anniversary Journal.)

Part Four

The dirt trails have disappeared, so now the path once known as Mousetown Road is a broad, smooth, Moonachie Avenue.

The cedar forests are gone. "Peach Island" is no longer an apt name, for Moonachie is no longer an island and the only "peach" trees are the few scattered in backyards.

A school system that once met in the "Mudhouse," now with the completion of the Dante P. Zirpoli annex, is housed in twenty-one modern rooms.

Moonachie's oldest industry, the brickyards, have been here for almost ninety years. Now it is joined by forty-four new enterprises. Moonachie's population has jumped despite a few setbacks from under 1,000 to 3,010 today.

The first budget of \$1,900 has been multiplied many times.

The town that once had to run dances to buy guns for its policemen is now about to spend thousands of dollars on a sewer system for its inhabitants.

Moonachie is fifty years old this month, but it is a young town. It is young with the laughter of the hundreds of children it is now educating; young with the new homes that are filling empty lots, young with the infant industries that will help Moonachie to grow.

For many years, the Borough has been becoming, slowly sometimes, rapidly other times, the community it now is.

As residents pause here (in 1960), to recall the changes of the past, these are already being dwarfed by the plans for greater changes yet to come.

Forty Years Later

Since so much of Moonachie's early history has been

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forgotten or is not known by the residents who now make up Moonachie's population, the Journal Committee felt the need to reproduce the entire history from the Fiftieth Anniversary Gold Journal. Although a few copies of that journal are still around, most current residents have never seen it and few will remember the message.

So, since this has also been produced as a "Gold" Journal, the complete history is included. We hope you find it interesting and enjoyable.

Now to pick up the history from that which was written in the 75th Anniversary Journal, for the period from 1961 to 1985 and to carry it forward to the present.

During and after the 1960s Moonachie changed from a community of farmers, homeowners, mobile homes and airport to an industrial one.

The industrial "boom" in New Jersey was the result of urban companies desiring expansion and lower taxes. Moonachie was no exception to this "boom" with land readily available.

The small truck farms became a thing of the past. Large tracts of land were used to build industrial complexes.

Some of these are former farmlands between Joseph and West Park Streets. Moonachie Avenue was continued east, becoming Empire Boulevard and State Street, Graphic Place extends north in back of Borough Hall to Little Ferry, and Moonachie Avenue is lined with industrial buildings.

Industry has been a boon to the Borough in that there is support for community organizations and activities.

Shopping centers, along with industry and discount outlets, dot the community and inhabitants can now find restaurants to tempt the palate from fast foods to gourmet.

In 1972, Moonachie be-

came a part of the Hackensack Meadowlands Development Commission. A recent addition is the high rise office building on the corner of Moonachie Road and Empire Boulevard whose first occupant, First Fidelity Bank, is still there, but is now called First Union Bank.

After the industrial development, emphasis was placed on residential improvements. What was once behind Molinari's Picnic Grove is now the site of two-family housing units.

The old McKinney School was demolished to make way for a one-family home development on Albert Street. Two-family homes were developed on Teresa Court, bordering the Robert L. Craig School property.

The last residential development came in the mid 1980s, known as Town & Country Development.

It consisted of 26 new, one-family homes. All of this new construction inspired the renovation and improvement of existing homes.

In 1963, sanitary sewers were constructed, replacing the old cesspools and septic systems that posed a serious threat to the health of our residents.

Over the past ten years, the Borough has replaced or renovated all of its sewer pumping stations and is currently in the process of videotaping the sewer lines to inspect for cracks and areas of infiltration and blockages. These improvements will help maintain an efficient sanitary sewer system for years to come.


The Volunteer First Aid and Rescue Squad built a new building on Moonachie Road to house their ambulance and emergency equipment serving the community. In 1999, they added some space to the building to further accommodate their vehicles and equipment.

The municipal building and Police headquarters have undergone many improvements over the years since the original construction in 1953.

Most recently, a new addition to the front of the building was the main part of a major renovation of the building, which included new barrier free bathrooms, new windows, a new roof, a complete renovation of the Police headquarters and a resurfacing of the parking lot.

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

Dealing with 2009 H1N1 Influenza

There has been a lot of talk recently about the Swine Flu, also known as 2009 H1N1 influenza. It's basically a new strain of influenza virus that has spread worldwide. This new strain, like other flu viruses, can be spread from person to person through the air as well as through contaminated surfaces. Common symptoms include fever, sore throat, fatigue, muscle aches, vomiting and diarrhea. Usually the infection is self limiting, meaning most people feel better in a couple of days. However, others may develop pneumonia, or need to be hospitalized.

Luckily, there's quite a bit you can do to help protect yourself and your family. All the things mom nagged you about as a kid, still hold true today. Cover your mouth when you cough or sneeze. Wash your hands with soap and water or, in a pinch, some hand sanitizer will do. Stay home if you are sick, it's all fairly basic.

In addition to the above suggestions, vaccines are also available to protect against 2009 H1N1. It's important to note that we are discussing the inactivated vaccine, not the nasal spray which is a live vac-

cine. The next obvious question is who should be getting it? According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) the following groups should receive it first:

- · Pregnant women
- · People who live with or take care of infants younger than 6 months of age
- · Health care and emergency medical personnel
- Anyone from 6 months to 24 years of age
- · Anyone from 25 to 64 years of age with certain chronic medical conditions or a weakened immune system.

As more vaccine is made available, other groups should be vaccinated, including healthy individuals aged 25 to 64 as well as those adults over the age of 65.

However, certain groups shouldn't receive the vaccine or at least wait. These include those that are allergic to eggs or any other substance in the vaccine. Also, if you are severely ill, you may be advised to wait until you feel better. There's usually no need to wait if you have a mild cold or other illness.

As with any medicine, side effects are possible, but severe problems are rare. Again, quoting the CDC, mild problems include: soreness, redness, or swelling at the injection site, fainting, headache, muscle aches, fever and nausea.

If they do occur, they usually start soon after the shot and persist for a day or two after.

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Meet Pastor Susan Nelson-Colaneri

On August 23, 2009, Holy Trinity elected a new pastor, The Rev. Susan Nelson-Colaneri.

Pastor Colaneri interned under supervision of The Rev. George Yoder, former pastor of Holy Trinity, at The Church of the Redeemer in Maywood.

She accepted the call to be Pastor of Holy Trinity and will also serve as Pastor of The Lutheran Church of the Redeemer in Maywood.

Pastor Susan began her work on September 1. She was ordained in Princeton Junction on September 13, 2009, along with 6 other ELCA pastoral candidates, and will be formally welcomed at a Service of Installation at Holy Trinity on Saturday, November 21, 2009, at 5 p.m.

Pastor Susan shares the story of her call to the ministry with us in the following "self introduction":

"There's wideness in God's mercy, like the wideness of the sea." I have always loved the reassurance of these words and faith they give witness to. Over the years, their comfort and promise of God's grace has taken on ever new and deeper meaning. The obstacles of being a mid-life, second career seminarian sometimes tempted me to see the cup of life as "half empty," but these words prompt me to see with the eyes of faith that God's gracious cup of life in Christ is full to overflowing — even more so now as I begin my first call to the yoked congregations of Holy Trinity and Redeemer!

In my late teens, I sensed a call to ministry, which remained somewhat hidden and dormant, even ignored, over the years. Though I did well and thoroughly enjoyed my undergraduate training in music education, upon graduation, it didn't quite feel like "my vocation."

I then decided to work in administration at New York University, my alma mater, during the early years of my marriage. When our daughter was born, I began working as the office manager of my father's private physical therapy practice on Staten Island.

Eventually, following the death of my mother in 2001, my father began to think of retirement and it was at this time, six years ago, that I began to wonder what I should do "with the rest of my life." It was also at that time that I became more involved in the life and ministries of my home Church, St. John's in Summit, New Jersey, when I accepted an invitation to join the council and eventually served as council president.

As I was completing my time of service on council, the



position of Director of Parish Education became open and the pastor asked me if I would consider being a candidate for it. In the midst of all these changes and challenges, my sense of call returned.

With the encouragement and support of my pastor and the congregation, I finally answered, "Here I am."

My life experience is somewhat eclectic though, specifically in the past five years, I have been fortunate to have the opportunity to gain quite a bit of experience in worship planning and leadership, pastoral care, and designing and providing Christian education for all ages, especially for adults.

I have experienced the Church in a variety of manifestations — from small and urban to mid-sized and suburban.

While serving in a suburban setting, I enjoyed developing a wide variety of education programs and honing my passion for teaching and writing; yet, while serving the urban setting of my field-site Church, I experienced a profound sense of connection and satisfaction offering pastoral care with and for the homeless population who took shelter there four mornings each week.

My family and I currently make our home in Millburn, New Jersey. My husband, Joe, is an opera conductor who is on the staff at the Metropolitan Opera as well as Director of the Opera Program at the Mannes College of Music. Our daughter, Katie, is a college senior.

We enjoy cooking and entertaining together and, of course, music. I enjoy reading and writing and I have recently discovered an interest in oral history and the art of producing documentaries.

To date I have compiled and produced three documentaries — one based on the experiences of eight Lutheran church members of the events on 9/11; the second is a brief biography on the life and ministry of the late Rev. Franklin Drewes Fry and the third is a brief biography of the life and work of the Danish philosopher-theologian, Soren Kierkegaard.

In May 2008, I received the Master of Divinity degree from Princeton Theological Seminary; my Lutheran year requirements were completed at the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Philadelphia."
















Teterboro's 6-24 Runway Gets Rehabilitated

This year, Teterboro Airport rehabilitated Runway 6-24, the shorter of TEB's two runways at 6,013 feet. Asphalt runways are usually resurfaced every 10 to 12 years. It was last rehabilitated in 1995.

Just like a roadway, the determination to rehabilitate is based on a wear evaluation (evaluating the effects of weather, rain, snow, ice, traffic, etc.).

This project required nearly 18 months of planning and design work, and included all new electrical components.

A 3-D computer model was developed from the drawings to include lights, stripping, etc.

The computer model was the reference for lasers and GPS which guided the asphalt installation. Lasers control elevation and GPS controls location.

The acceptable tolerance goal was no more than 1/2 inch, but with the fully computerized model the final tolerances were from zero to 1/4 inch.

Referencing the computer model, and using GPS and lasers, the milling work and application of asphalt was reduced to a tolerance of one millimeter.

Milling and Paving

Runway 6-24 was closed during each milling and repaving application. Work was done in sections.

Runway 6-24 has a stone base with a 5 to 8 inch asphalt

The computer model guided three milling machines, cutting 7 feet 2 inches wide per unit, working in tandem taking off about 3 inches of old asphalt of the 150 foot wide runway. During milling, workers would also take manual measure-

A spare milling machine was on standby. The milled asphalt was recycled.

After milling, a tack coat of liquid asphalt was applied to glue the new and old asphalt.

47,800 tons of asphalt was

used, conforming to FAA mix confirm. Spare pavers and rollspecifications.

Two asphalt plants were dedicated to the Port Authority for this project each time the asphalt was poured (a primary with a secondary back-up plant to insure completion).

PA inspectors were on-site both at the asphalt plant and on the runway during work to assure specification confor-

Referencing the computer model, three asphalt paving units, working in tandem were controlled with GPS and lasers, determining the thickness of the asphalt and the grade. A worker would also take manual measurements while asphalt was applied.

A crown was created down the center of the runway to facilitate drainage.

Rollers immediately compacted the freshly laid asphalt. Care was taken to not over roll the asphalt. A device was used to measure compaction and density. The PA did core tests to

ers were on standby here too.

The runway was grooved to FAA standards for drainage to avoid ponding and hydroplaning.

Runway 6-24 is now more uniform after paving.

Electrical Work

Because of conflicting light (Rt. 17, billboards, etc.) and to increase pilot visibility of runway activity, the airport installed a number of additional lighting systems to enhance safety and meet new FAA standards.

New lights were installed down the center line that are flush with the runway. New touchdown zone lighting was installed.

Improved configuration of runway edge lighting was installed, with 200 lights added and spaced closer than before.

All electrical cabling and fixtures are designed to set in brackish water. Lights and conduit on the runway are set/

encased in concrete to avoid movement.

The contract included work in the areas where the two runways intersect. Work in this intersection required that the airport be closed to fixed wing aircraft (helicopters were still allowed) during rehabilitation -- 2 - 36 hour periods, 1-24 hour period and 5-7 hour night time closings.

Work on the intersection will also benefit the rehabilitation of the 7,000 foot Runway 1-19 which is planned for 2010.

All milling and paving work, to include grooving, is expected to be completed by November 11, 2009. All electrical work is expected to be completed by the end of this year.

This project cost an estimated \$10 million. Some of the items were covered under the stimulus package for about \$4.5 million. No wetlands permits were required or issued. There were no injuries reported. ###
