The Differences between Residential and Commercial Mortgages

There are several important differences between commercial finance and the more mainstream finance that most people are used to.

When an individual contacts their bank or mortgage lender for a loan there is an automated system which evaluates the applicant's income, financial commitments and general status. This evaluation is then measured against a set of known predictors which gives the lender an overview of how likely they are to get their money back. This automated process is widely known as "credit scoring" which is different from "credit checking."

When a business approaches a commercial lender for a commercial loan there is a different set of variables to consider. In the case of a commercial mortgage the commercial lender will obviously need a full background of the business they are lending money to. These background checks will include the people who control the business. Whether you are a director of a limited company or a sole trader, you should be prepared to answer questions about your personal circumstances when applying for a commercial loan. Only very strong commercial propositions will avoid the need for personal guarantees.

Drawing parallels between a residential mortgage and a commercial mortgage, you could think about a company's

audited accounts in the same way as an individual's pay slips or P60. A commercial lender will look for evidence that the stated income (profit) is sufficient to cover the loan. A set of audited accounts will give the lender details about the business income, financial commitments and general status. The net profit for a company is then used to evaluate the affordability in the same way that the "take home" pay for an individual is used.

How closely the lender will look at the accounts will depend on the Loan to Value (LTV), the amount of money being borrowed, and general viability of the business. In the current commercial mortgage market there is the option to "self-cert" a business income and thus avoid the need to have accounts examined. But self-cert does of course carry its own "price." Very often the interest rate is higher where

supported evidence in the form of audited accounts cannot be provided.

Just like a residential mortgage, a commercial lender will insist on independent verification of the value and condition of the property. This verification is usually carried out by a qualified surveyor who is chosen from a panel of recognized companies. Not all residential surveyors are able to carry out commercial valuations. Depending on the type of business, a specialist report may also be required.

So in conclusion, the question most often asked is "Why is a commercial mortgage so much more expensive than a residential one?" Well, in simple terms, the cost of a loan is usually dictated by the perceived risk to the lender, and in reality far more businesses end up in bankruptcy and repossessions than individuals. ###

News From The Front

Road Project Honors Fallen Seabee

During the month of June, Seabees stationed at Camp Moreell completed construction on Caughman Road.

This new road was built to connect the old Australian camp to the main road that runs through Ali Al Salem Air Base in the Kuwaiti military area.

Caughman Road serves to eliminate the need to enter the logistical support activity (LSA) when entering the camp.

This new road will eliminate traffic at Entry Control Point (ECP) 2 at the LSA. This project was originally tasked to NMCB 22 and was turned over to us when we arrived in theater.

NMCB 22 had just started the job with only stakes in the ground, so much work was needed to complete the road.

The project first began by removing two 75 yard sections of existing fence.

We then moved over 1,000 cubic yards of fill material to the site and lifted the road from one to five feet.

A culvert was inserted below the road and we built a new ECP, which included putting up wire, fencing, and a forty foot wide gate.

The Caughman Road crew was led by Project Supervisor EO1 Gamble, Crew Leader EO2 Snyder, and Safety Petty Officer EO3 Gamboa.

The main body crew consisted of EO2 Oti, EOCN Castillo, EO2 Fulton, EO2 Steen, SW3 Jenks, BU2 Kaplan, and SW1 Reinschmidt.

Bravo Company worked on the culvert pipes, fence and gate, while Alpha Company spread and compacted material.

The Construction Mechanic (CM) shop also had its work cut out for them and was an integral part of Caughman Road. CM1 Brennan and his crew worked countless hours to keep the equipment up and running. Construction began in April and was completed by

mid-June. Two hundred and eighty total man-days were dedicated to the Caughman Road project.

The road is named after Sean L. Caughman, a First Class Petty Officer serving with NMCB 22. Petty Officer Caughman passed away on February 16, 2010, not far from where the new road was constructed. It was only fitting the people from NMCB 22 named the road in his honor, and we are proud to have finished the project in his memory. ###

This Road Project took around 250 to 300 man days and just over a month to complete. The road was a 1/4 mile long and 30' to 60' wide. Over a thousand cubic yards of fill were used and the work was done with an average temperature of 110°. There were no injuries. ###

We prepped and shipped to troops up north over 200 MRAP (Mine Resistant Ambush Protected Vehicles), each costs \$1.2 million and weighs 70,000 pounds.

Seabees in Action

According to Gamble, they had plenty of work. Some of the other projects: over 300 airconditioners in this camp that always needed repair, make shift plumbing that was in bad shape. Removing disabled vehicles from the entry control point, building bunkers, moving heavy equipment in and out of the theater, sided 68 barracks

buildings, doing any repairs on the Iraqi oil platforms, etc.

Another job worked on was Hammer Field (recreation area built for the Army), including soft ball field, horse shoe pit, soccer field and they just leveled a 360' x 400' area for recreation. The list goes on... Story and photos by Andy Gamble. ###

Living History Event November 7th puts Spotlight on Veterans: Features "Massing of the Colors"

The Bergen County Historical Society will host a Living History event at Historic New Bridge Landing, at the Campbell-Christie House, 1201 Main St., River Edge, NJ, on November 6 and 7, 2010, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. to honor all our Veterans. Donation is \$7 adult, \$5 children, BCHS members free.

On Sunday, the event will spotlight WW II-era displays and share stories from Veterans of their service. This event will also feature the 3rd New Jersey Volunteers -- a Civil War reenactment unit. At 9:00 a.m., this unit will place a tribute at the Civil War Memorial at Hackensack Cemetery. The unit then returns to Historic New Bridge Landing and sets up camp. During the day they

will present drilling demonstrations and recruit the public into the ranks. After a short time, those recruited will receive recreations of actual Civil War Enlistment Papers. President Lincoln and his wife will also be on site. During the day he will be delivering a number of his famous speeches.

The Army Air Forces Historical Association will also be featured with an interactive living history exhibit at the historic Von Steuben House nearby. This year, a working model of the Norden Bomb Sight will be on site and demonstrated to the public.

Members of the Army Air Forces Historical Association will be performing a dramatic reading of "A Wing and A Prayer." AAFAH members include pilots, navigators, bombardiers and ground service personnel who refueled, armed and maintained the fighters and bombers to keep them in the air.

AAFHA's World War IIera display will feature flight gear, life on the Home Front and numerous oral histories from Army Air Force Veterans in the region.

A special program will conclude this event on Sunday the 7th. It is a "Massing of the Colors." This ceremony can trace its origins back to 1922. This ceremony is rarely seen within Bergen County. These memorial services took place on November 11, the anniversary of the end of World War I at 11:00 a.m., November 11, 1918 (the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month), which became known as Armistice Day.

Armistice Day officially became a holiday in the US in 1926, and a national holiday 12 years later. On June 1, 1954, the name was changed to Veterans Day to honor all U.S. Veterans. In 1968, new legislation changed Veterans Day to the fourth Monday in October. Since November 11 was a date of historic significance to many

Americans, in 1978, Congress returned to its traditional date.

Official national ceremonies for Veterans Day center around the Tomb of the Unknowns. To honor these men, symbolic of all Americans who gave their lives in all wars, an Army Honor Guard, the 3rd U.S. Infantry (*The Old Guard*), keeps day and night vigil.

At 11 a.m. on November 11, a combined color guard of all military services executes "Present Arms" at the tomb. The nation's tribute is symbolized by the laying of a Presidential wreath and the playing of "Taps." ###



Reflections

Who is My Neighbor

character of society by how it treats the weak, the vulnerable, the most easily forgotten."

This profound statement was spoken by President George W. Bush during a commencement speech at Concordia University in 2004.

In many ways it echoes the words of Holy Scripture where we are reminded to take care of the needs of "the least of these" – the hungry, the thirsty, the stranger, the naked, the sick and the prisoner. These people - because we do not live in a bubble, but rather a community - are inevitably our neighbors.

In the Biblical story of the Parable of the Good Samaritan, Jesus responds to a question regarding the identity of our neighbor which Leviticus 19:18 says should be loved.

In usual fashion, Jesus uses an earthly story to illustrate a heavenly virtue. In the parable, an unidentified man assumed to be Jewish is beaten, robbed, and left half dead along the road. First a priest and then a Levite come by, but both avoid the man. Finally, a Samaritan comes by and helps the injured man.

The shock value of this story is revealed by the truth that hatred between Jews and Samaritans was fierce and longstanding.

Yet, the hated Samaritan and not those who would have been expected to help – stops to offer aid. The scripture says, "he took pity on him" - sympathy that led to multiple acts of compassion. He bandaged his wounds, put him on his donkey, brought him to an inn and paid for his care.

Jesus' point is, Simply be a neighbor. Do not rule out certain people as neighbors. A neighbor, therefore, is anyone who is in your sphere of influence. Anyone...even a despised enemy.

It should come as no surprise, then, when God says, "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways." It's one thing to help a friend or a loved one in times of need. Jesus' words to this point are sobering, "If you love those who love you, what

"You can fairly judge the reward will you get? Are not even the tax collectors doing that? And if you greet only your brothers, what are you doing more than others? Do not even pagans do that?" But to help a stranger or even an enemy? Quite frankly, that's hard..

> Being a "Good Samaritan" is hardly easy, because it will mean having to inconvenience oneself and it will always cost you something - time, money and maybe even respect. Former British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher once said, "No one would remember the Good Samaritan if he'd only had good intentions; he had money as well."

> The month of November is synonymous with the celebration of Thanksgiving.

> Traditionally, it has been a time when families come together and share a wonderful meal and watch hours of football. How Good Samaritanlike would it be if rather than

just celebrating the holiday the usual way, we would consider volunteering at a soup kitchen and feeding our less fortunate neighbors a warm meal? Or maybe inviting a stranger to share our Thanksgiving feast? Could we even consider going as far as the Good Samaritan did and reach out to an enemy with kindness? And could we not just limit our actions to a holiday or time of year, but rather make them life principles? Let me be frank, I hold no illusions here. To be a Good Samaritan is radical. Loving our enemy, sacrificing our time, giving our money is counterintuitive.

So the question we need to ask is simply, "Where do we get the power to be a Good Samaritan?" From the Christian perspective, the Bible tells us that Jesus Christ is the ultimate Good Samaritan. Seeing us in a spiritual freefall, he left the glory of heaven, became one of us and picked us up. Rather than striking his enemies down, the Bible says he died for them. That's radical.

Are we willing to die to ourselves, our pride, and our possessions so we can pick up our neighbor? I believe we can and we will when our hearts are overwhelmed with the reality of God's radical love for us his creation and his neighbor. Be a good neighbor. ###



A parade began and ended the event. Children looked at the globe and learned about the famous buildings as well as the geography of Italy.


As Italian music played, the children danced in a circle, with the girls doing a tambourine dance and the boys doing a sword dance.

The school was recently approved to offer an adult program for individuals ages 21 years and older which promises to be a huge success. For more information, call 973-777-5355.









This program is offered through the Horizons Speakers Bureau of the New Jersey Council for the Humanities, a state partner of the National Endowment for the Humanities.



Chimney Safety Tips

Chimney maintenance is vital to your family's safety. The Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department offers these tips:

- Have your chimney inspected and cleaned on a regular basis.
- When possible, burn seasoned woods (dryness of the wood is more important than hard wood versus soft wood).
- Smaller, hotter fires will burn more completely and produce less smoke than larger fires.
- Do not burn cardboard boxes or trash, as they can spark a chimney fire.
- Install stovepipe thermometers, which help monitor flue temperatures where wood stoves are in use, then adjust burning practices as needed. ###

Teterboro Airport Recognizes "Quiet Flying"

Teterboro Airport (TEB) presented its "Good Neighbor Awards" at the NBAA Convention in Atlanta, Georgia in October 2010. The program honors individuals and companies for "quiet flying" at TEB, and awards were given to twentyfour recipients this year.

To qualify for an award, operators must adhere to Teterboro Airport's voluntary restraints regarding late-night and Stage 2 jet operations and not have received any violations or warnings under the airport's mandatory noise rules. This year's ceremony recognized recipients for 2009.

"There is no better venue than the annual convention of the National Business Aviation Association to present our Good Neighbor Awards" said Rich Heslin, Airport Manager at Teterboro Airport. "There is harmony in the two events as the general aviation community gathers to share its common interests, including good community relations."

Heslin assigned airport management staff and members of the airport's office for Noise and Environmental Compliance to attend the NBAA convention and presented the awards during a press conference October 19.

Teterboro Airport launched the Good Neighbor Awards in 2004 to give credit to operators who avoided violations of airport noise rules and late-night operations.

The awards program has become part of the Teterboro Airport Industry Working Group, which was formed by Port Authority Chairman Anthony R. Coscia to improve safety, security and reduce noise at the airport.

The Working Group includes leading trade groups, such as the National Air Transportation Association (NATA), National Business Aviation Association (NBAA), General Aviation Manufacturers Association (GAMA), Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association (AOPA), TEB fixed base operators, and other major operators such as NetJets.

The group is co-chaired by former Congressman James Coyne, President of NATA, and Joseph Fazio, General Manager of Atlantic Aviation at TEB.

Created to address safety and security at TEB - one of America's busiest general aviation airports – the program also highlights noise abatement with voluntary restraints against operating Stage 2 jets into the airport and from operating any aircraft between 11:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.

According to Gabriel Andino, TEB's Noise Abatement Manager, "The voluntary nighttime and Stage 2 flight restraints have helped to reduce the number of flights after 11:00 p.m. Aircraft average noise levels, noise violations and noise complaints have also declined steadily since 2006, thanks in large part to the efforts of our operators."

Mr. Andino added: "We have seen an increase in the number of award winners during the last few years and that is a reflection on the collaborative efforts of the Airport, its users and the Industry Working Group to make Teterboro a better neighbor to the community."

Photographing Cemetery Ghosts





extended sun exposure, and alcohol use.

Regular dental checkups can help to prevent cancers because dentists are trained to spot the small red or white spots that appear suspect. Lumps, thickened areas or a sore that does not heal and tends to bleed can all be cause for concern. Problems with speaking, chewing, swallowing are additional signs which may be associated with oral cancer. Be certain to ask your dentist for a complete oral cancer screening. Early intervention will certainly assure the best outcomes. ###

Fair Market Value Via Cyberspace?

For those who have read our articles before, maybe this comes as a surprise; after all, we are major supporters of online real estate information. Indeed, the most dramatic and important changes in the real estate industry have been brought about largely by the internet. Most changes have made the web a useful resource; others, however, are misleading and should be looked upon as silly distractions.

Case in point: the Zestimate. Zestimate is an application offered by the popular real estate website Zillow which is otherwise a useful tool for searching properties for sale. Zestimate is Zillow's purported "method" for estimating market value. Though careful not to represent it as an appraisal, Zillow does claim a certain level of accuracy in determining a home's value.

And the sad fact is, increasing numbers of home buyers are using this application to help them formulate the offers they make on existing properties for sale. They're appearing with Zestimates as proof that most area homes are vastly overpriced!

To see what I'm talking about, go to Zillow. Scroll down to the bottom of the website, to the link that reads "Zestimate Value & Accuracy." On that page you can ascertain the accuracy of Zestimates by state and county. I searched New Jersey to see what Zillow

had to say about its real estate knowledge of Bergen County. The site admits to not knowing very much, evidently. On an accuracy scale of zero to 4 stars, Zillow gave itself a "one'" for Bergen County.

In essence, this means they are simply using tax assessor valuations or are – in their own words – "unable to compute," meaning they have no data whatever to relate.

Now most people know that fair market value can only be determined by carefully analyzing recent home sales of comparable properties in like-same areas. Tax assessed values vary from municipality to municipality; in some cases they can be over market value, in others they can be under market value (sometimes, way under!).

Bottom line: steer clear of Zestimates (especially if you want to know anything about Bergen County, NJ). And though Zillow is a fun way to search properties for sale - with maps and other interesting features - it can't replace the real thing. A good Realtor can offer a wealth of relevant information (not a computer generated mishmash) and a good website (www.GatewayToHomes.com, for example) can give you IDX listings for most New Jersey via the New Jersey MLS, the Garden State MLS, the Hudson County MLS and others. It's a no-brainer!



In 1909, a self-made millionaire publisher from Chicago named William Dickson Boyce was on a business trip with a stop in London, Eng-

One afternoon the city was covered in a thick fog. Boyce lost his way in the fog. He was approached by a boy about age twelve who offered to show him the way.

Boyce offered to pay the boy for his service. The boy refused the money saying "No sir, I am a Scout. Scouts do not accept tips for courtesies or good turns."

Being intrigued, Boyce later visited the British Scouting office and picked up materials on their programs. Boyce came home determined to start Scouting in America.

On February 8, 1910, he filed incorporation papers for the Boy Scouts of America; the rest, as they say, is history.

To celebrate the One Hundredth Anniversary of Scouting the Northern New Jersey Council B.S.A. held its Centennial Camporee on October 1, 2, and 3, 2010. Scouts from the Council's nine districts assembled at Campgaw Mountain County Reservation in Bergen County.

The nine districts represent communities from all of Bergen, Hudson, Passaic, Essex Counties and the City of Newark. Scouts from both Hasbrouck Heights and Wood-Ridge troops were among over 2,000 Scouts taking part in this event.

Scouts arrived Friday night

and set up camp. Saturday morning they took part in the opening ceremony. Scout troops entered through an entranceway of American flags.

The ceremony was concluded with directions on the day's events which included a variety of Scout skills and a special area devoted to Disabilities Awareness. Part of this was a series of challenges to include, one arm volleyball, cane maze, wheelchair basketball and other challenges.

During the day there were a number of demonstrations presented to the Scouts. Among this was N. J. Transit Police with their Police dog named "Karlos." This dog is trained to locate explosives. This Karlos did very quickly. Also present was the N. J. State Police and also Cadets from the N.Y. Maritime Academy. These Cadets inspected and graded each campsite. Other presentations included robotics, white water boating and conservation groups of New Jersey.

Saturday night saw the closing ceremony with the presentation of the colors by Cadets from West Point. The event ended with a laser light show which was the highlight of the evening.
