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## Halloween In The Park


Woodland Park was invaded by ghosts, goblins, aliens and assorted scary characters on the evening of Thursday, October 20, 2011. About 600 participated in this event.



## Fall Back November 6 Change Your Clock, Change Your Battery

Our area Fire Chiefs urge residents to adopt a simple, yet crucial habit of changing smoke alarm and carbon monoxide detector batteries when changing clocks back to Standard Time on November 6, 2011.

Warnings from smoke alarms can provide those critical extra seconds people need to get out of their homes safely.

Even though 96 percent of American homes have at least one smoke alarm, 19 percent of those households' detectors are not working, mostly due to missing or dead batteries.

In the U.S., roughly 80 percent of fire deaths result from fires in homes without working smoke alarms. Half of the home fire deaths resulted from fires in the small percentage of homes (five percent) without any smoke alarms. 83% of all civilian fire-related deaths are a result of home fires.

Fire deaths peak in winter months — December through February.

"The peak time for home fire fatalities is between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. when most families are sleeping," said Hasbrouck Heights Fire Chief Kevin Todd.

"Smoke alarm maintenance is a simple, effective way to reduce home fire deaths. Children and senior citizens are most at risk, and a working smoke alarm can give them the extra seconds they need to get out safely," stated Wood-Ridge Fire Chief Paul Clemente.

Moonachie Fire Chief Victor Migliorino added, "Tragi-



cally, many people mistakenly believe they'd be awakened by the smell of smoke in time to escape. Clinical experiments have found the sense of smell actually lessens when people are asleep. Therefore, when smoke enters a bedroom, it does not always awaken the individual."

Lodi Fire Chief Anthony Maiolo added, "Smoke disorients people and dulls their senses, making it less likely other cues, such as cries for help, will awaken them. This is why working home smoke alarms are so important."

Carlstadt Fire Chief Robert Moore said, "Children are particularly vulnerable during home fires. Children ages five and under are twice as likely as the population as a whole to die in home fires. Adults ages 65 and older are two times more likely to die in a home fire; those ages 75 and older are three times more likely and those ages 85 and older are 4.5 times more likely to die in a home fire. Many older adults need assistance and cannot escape by themselves in time."

Little Ferry Fire Chief Rob Cordasco stated, "Working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in a home fire nearly in half by providing an early warning and critical extra seconds to escape."

In addition to changing smoke alarm and carbon monoxide batteries, smoke alarms should be replaced every 10 years.

The National Fire Alarm Code recommends a minimum of one smoke alarm on each level of a home, including one inside each bedroom for new construction and one outside each sleeping area. Homes should also have at least one working carbon monoxide detector. ###

# **Every Flag**









On Friday morning, October 7, 2011, about 50 volunteers quietly placed about 6,270 American Flags in carefully measured rows on the grounds of the First Presbyterian Church of Moonachie. Each flag represented an American soldier who was killed in Iraq and Afghanistan. Each flag represented the family, friends, neighbors, co-workers and circle of acquaintances of a soldier killed. Each flag represented a prayer. This was the 52nd presentation of the Field of Flags. Under a 20' x 30' American Flag suspended from Little Ferry Fire Department Ladder Company and the symbolic "Riderless Horse" (provided by the BC Sheriff's Department) nearby, a dedication of the Field of Flags was held on Saturday morning at 10 a.m., October 8. A program was distributed which listed New Jersey soldiers who were killed in these conflicts.

Rev. Donald Pitches, First Presbyterian Church of Carlstadt. The invocation was led by Rev. Kimberly P. Chastain, First Presbyterian Church of Moonachie. "Hero" was sung by soloist Ann Clair Macalintal. County, local officials, VFW and American Legion Posts were recognized, as were the Gold Star families. Rev. Pitches read the poem "Is My Name There?," and Ms. Macalintal sang "Proud to Be an American." John Huettemann, co-chair, recognized and thanked the committee. "Taps" was played by Bobby Krupinski and Rev. Chastain gave the Benediction. Each Gold Star Family was given an American Flag, a rose and escorted by the committee so that they could place a Flag in the Field, and have a private moment to honor their loss. Rev. Star Families a flag that had previously flown in the "Field of Flags."

The "Field of Flags" remained until October 27, 2011. Each day "Taps" was played at 1730 hours. A laminated board listing those killed, was also part of the display.

Parking is available at Dassault/FalconJet, 200 Riser Road, Little Ferry, with a short walk to the Museum.

Carlstadt, Hasbrouck Heights, Little Ferry, Lodi, and Moonachie will each hold brief Veterans Day services on Friday, November 11th, at 11 a.m., at their respective monuments.

Origins: In 1921, an unknown World War I American soldier was buried in Arlington National Cemetery. Similar ceremonies occurred earlier in England and France, where an unknown soldier was buried in each nation's highest place of honor (*in England, Westminster Abbey; in France, the Arc de Triomphe*).

These memorial services took place on November 11, the anniversary of the end of World War I at 11:00 a.m., November 11, 1918 (the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month), which became known as Armistice Day.



Honor Those Who Served -- Fly Your Flag November 11th

Armistice Day officially became a holiday in the US in 1926, and a national holiday 12 years later. On June 1, 1954, the name was changed to Veterans Day to honor all U.S. Veterans. In 1968, new legislation changed Veterans Day to the fourth Monday in October. Since November 11 was a date of historic significance to many Americans, in 1978, Congress returned to its traditional date.

Official national ceremonies for Veterans Day center around the Tomb of the Unknowns. To honor these men, symbolic of all Americans who gave their lives in all wars, an Army Honor Guard, the 3rd U.S. Infantry (*The Old Guard*), keeps day and night vigil.

At 11 a.m. on November 11, a combined color guard of all military services executes "Present Arms" at the tomb. The nation's tribute is symbolized by the laying of a Presidential wreath and the playing of "Taps." ###

## **AARP Learns About Medicare Part D Changes**

Linda Cross from the Division of Senior Services in Bergen County was the guest speaker at the last meeting of the Central Bergen Chapter 418 of AARP held on October 14, 2011. Ms. Cross is an expert on all current information related to Medicare.

The primary focus of her presentation was on the changes that will take place in 2012 affecting Medicare Part D. Medicare open enrollment runs from October 15, 2011 to December 7, 2011. During that time, anyone can join, switch or drop a Medicare drug plan. The change will take effect on January 1, 2012 as long as the plan gets requested by December 7, 2011.

Ms. Cross asked all seniors to be informed that their present provider company must send out a package of their plans for 2012. Seniors will also receive unsolicited mail from other providers with the hope to have you sign up with them. She suggested seniors complete a Drug Worksheet and send it to her. Her office will help seniors find the best



three plans that meet their individual prescription needs.

For 2012, there will be 33 Part D plans available. When selecting a plan, seniors must check that the plan covers the most expensive drugs you take; check that all or most of the drugs you must take are covered by the plan; and check that the plan offers coverage to further reduce out-of pocket costs in the donut hole. She said that her office would be available at 201-336-7400.

• If you are doing a lot of raking, try an ergonomic rake, which can be found at most hardware stores and garden centers. ###



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
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## **Borough Thanks 9-11 Committee**

During the Hasbrouck Heights Mayor and Council Meeting on October 11, 2011, Mayor Rose Heck presented Certificates of Appreciation to community members who worked on the 9-11 Memorial Dedication and Service.

The Firemen's Memorial Park (*located at The Circle*), was upgraded to include installation of electricity, irrigation system, new sidewalks, special lighting, landscaping, refurbishing the Firemen's Bell, etc.

This work was funded with an \$18,000 County open space grant, plus an additional \$20,000 contributed by the Borough. Some of the Borough's funding was offset by about \$5,000 with the sale of commemorative bracelets inscribed "9-11 We Will Never Forget" donated by **Heights Flower Shoppe** and sold by Junior Women's Club and Chic Charity Club.

The Borough acquired two, 8-foot, 350 pound steel beams retrieved from the WTC site. Steve Daus, from the DPW, fabricated a 300 lb. base and on August 19, 2011, the twin beams were installed at the Park. The JWC sponsored a September 11th Memorial Poster Contest. The theme is "Reflect, Respect, Remember."

Over several months, the 9-11 committee planned the Memorial Service.

Using light sticks provided by the Kiwanis Club, a procession led by the HHFD Honor Guard and bagpiper, began at Corpus Christi Church, along Burton Avenue, passing Churches which rang out 10 bells as the procession moved to The Circle.

An estimated 1,500 gath-

ered at the Memorial where Deacon Paul Carris, survivor of the WTC attacks, gave the keynote address. Music was provided by the Borough's Church Choirs. Lee Ciocia presented his award winning essay. Officials spoke. The bagpiper played "Amazing Grace."



Gingivitis can lead to periodontal disease if problems persist. In the worst cases, bacteria form in pockets between the teeth and gums, weakening the bone and causing the gums to recede, pulling back from teeth. This can lead to tooth loss if left untreated.

As people age, changes in salivary flow and content may further lead to gingivitis, as well as cavities. Because approximately 80 percent of all American adults suffer from some form of gingivitis, it's important to see a dentist twice a year for regular cleanings and checkups.

As a person ages, he or she may develop dry mouth. Dry mouth (xerostomia) happens when salivary glands fail to work due to disease, certain medications, or cancer treatment. The condition can make it hard to eat, swallow, taste,

that can have an adverse affect on their oral health. "Elderly patients will suck on hard candies and cough drops in an effort to increase saliva flow," he says. "The sugar in these candies can cause disaster for their mouths - and eventually, will cause cavities. Drinking lots of water and avoiding sweets, tobacco, alcohol and caffeine are the best ways to fight dry mouth." A dentist also can prescribe medications to ease the symptoms of severe dry mouth.

If arthritis makes brushing too difficult, certain dental products designed to make dental care less painful are available.

It is sometimes recommended that people with arthritis try securing their toothbrush to a wider object, such as a ruler, to ease arthritic hand pain while brushing.

Electric toothbrushes also can help by doing some of the work for you. Ask a dentist for other suggestions. If regular oral care becomes too difficult to maintain, a dentist can provide alternatives to aid in brushing and flossing.

Studies have shown that maintaining a healthy mouth may keep your body healthier and help you to avoid diabetes, heart disease, and stroke.

Older patients who are planning to enter a nursing home should inquire about onsite dental care.

People who do not have teeth still need to visit the dentist regularly, since many aspects of oral health, such as adjusting dentures and oral cancer screenings, can be handled during routine dental visits. The best way to achieve good oral health is to visit a general dentist at least twice a year. *Ref: Dental Notes, Academy of General Dentistry*

Banks granting SBA loans are placing increased emphasis on business plans, cash flow and profit forecasts in deciding whether to lend. The SBA can also refer businesses to free counseling centers to improve their performance.

Online Opportunities: The Internet is another great source for loans. There are several sites where businesses can seek alternative lenders such as individuals and small companies.

Loans made on such sites range from \$10,000 to \$2 million. Interest rates range from 8 percent to 15 percent. While that's generally more than a bank will charge, it's much less than what you'll have to pay on many credit cards.

Companies that use these internet sites usually pay a one-time fee while other sites are free, although their costs loan rates.

If you're going to list your company on one of these sites,

describe your business in clear and concise language. You can't have typos that will turn off whoever is looking. Make sure

you don't give away any proprietary information and consider using pictures or videos. ###




